General statement of the Board's activities pursuant to Clause a

Purpose

The Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST Board) was created in 1977 by legislation making Minnesota the first state to license law enforcement officers. Subsequent legislation passed in 1979 provided for the licensing of part-time peace officers as well. The POST Board also licensed constables for several years until the legislature abolished township constabularies in 1985.

The Minnesota Peace Officer Training Board was the current board's predecessor from 1967 until 1977. It regulated the selection of new officers by law enforcement agencies and the basic course to be completed by these officers; however it exercised only a limited authority over advanced training and it had no responsibility for professional standards of conduct.

The POST Board's charge was to foster professionalism in a number of ways. It certifies the post-secondary programs which now prepare students for careers in law enforcement. It prescribes minimum hours of continuing education to be completed by licensed peace officers as a condition for renewal of their licenses. Through administrative rules it sets minimum standards of professional conduct as well as minimum selection standards for persons entering the profession.

Membership and staff

The POST Board consists of fifteen members with the following representation:

- two members appointed by the governor from among county sheriffs in Minnesota;
- four members appointed by the governor from among peace officers in Minnesota municipalities, at least two of whom shall be chiefs of police;
- two members appointed by the governor from among peace officers, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Minnesota state patrol association;
- the superintendent of the Minnesota bureau of criminal apprehension or a designee;
- two members appointed by the governor from among peace officers, or former peace officers, who are currently employed on a full-time basis in a professional peace officer education program;

- two members appointed by the governor, one member to be appointed from among administrators of Minnesota colleges or universities that offer professional peace officer education, and one member from among the elected city officials in statutory or home rule charter cities of under 5,000 population outside the metropolitan area;
- two members appointed by the governor from among the general public.

The Governor appoints the membership to their terms of four years and also names the chairperson.

An Executive Director serves at the pleasure of the Board. A staff of 12 employees assists the Executive Director.

Promulgation of administrative rules

The POST Board is authorized to promulgate administrative rules in matters falling under its legislative mandate.

Licensing of peace officers

The Board's rules require that applicants for peace officer licensing meet prescribed minimum educational, physical and psychological fitness standards. The rules also set out the general content of the post-secondary educational programs which prepare candidates for licensing.

All candidates must pass a licensing test administered by the POST Board. There are two such tests, one for students and the other for persons who have completed basic training in law enforcement and had at least a year of experience in some other state or Federal jurisdiction.

Part-time peace officer licenses are issued to applicants who complete statutory selection standards under the sponsorship of a law enforcement agency that intends to hire them and then pass a licensing test.

Continuing education and reimbursement

Each peace officer must complete at least 48 hours of continuing education within the 3year period for which he or she is licensed. The courses must be approved either by the POST Board's staff or by certain major providers that have been empowered to certify their own offerings.

The POST Board helps to subsidize continuing education by providing reimbursement to defray part of the costs of law enforcement agencies that provide training for their officers. Funds are provided from a surcharge on fines imposed by local courts. The per officer share varies slightly from year to year depending on the number of officer positions submitted by agencies for reimbursement. This amount was \$324.62 per officer in 1995 and \$322.52 per officer in 1996.

Renewal of licenses

Approximately one third of all licenses are due for renewal on July 1 of each year. Licensees do not need to be currently employed in law enforcement in order to renew their license, most inactive officers choose not to renew. There is a restoration process for those who failed to renew the license in time or who later decide to return to law enforcement.

Revocation of licenses

Legislation was passed in 1995 where the license of a peace officer convicted (includes a finding of guilt, whether or not the adjudication of guilt is stayed or executed, an admission of guilt, or a no contest plea) of a felony is automatically revoked. The POST Board has the authority to revoke a license, but only for a small number of serious reasons. The board's complaint process provides due process for licensees.

The Board has licensing jurisdiction when infractions lead to a criminal conviction. Licensing action can also be taken against a chief law enforcement officer when the chief law enforcement officer fails to implement a Board mandated policy or follow a directive of the Board.

Testing

Licensing tests are administered at least six times annually. The test is always offered in the metropolitan area, and it is offered elsewhere when a second site is justified by the demand. Reciprocity and part-time peace officer tests are scheduled by individual appointment and conducted in the Board's office.

Candidates may take a licensing test more than once, but a remedial study program is required after a third failure.

Unauthorized practice of law enforcement

The Board is empowered to take action against an unlicensed individual when that individual practices law enforcement. This provision will be prosecuted by the Attorney General.

Publications

The Board issues publications that are related to its mission, such as a book of learning objectives for post-secondary programs. The Board is in the process of revising/updating the learning objectives with an expected completion of September 1997.

The Board revised the "Administrators Manual - a Guide to Law Enforcement Licensing and Hiring" in October of 1995. This manual was mailed to all law enforcement agencies in Minnesota.

Legislative Mandates

The Board along with the Minnesota Police and Peace Officer Association conducted a survey on what resources are available to peace officers in need of job related professional counseling. The survey was conducted on a sampling of officers in Minnesota. This report was submitted to the Legislature.

All chief law enforcement officers must report to the Board summary data regarding investigation and disposition of cases involving alleged misconduct, indicating the total number of investigations, total number by each subject matter, number dismissed as unfounded and number dismissed on grounds the allegation was unsubstantiated.

Law enforcement agencies in Minnesota are mandated to report to the Board any allegations of fifth degree assault, domestic abuse and related violations. The Board mails to the agencies forms requesting this information twice a year. These forms are then evaluated and a report is to be submitted to the Legislature by January 1997.

Model Policies

The Board along with representatives from several law enforcement associations as well as professionals from other related fields developed "Response to Reports of Missing and Endangered Children; Model Policy and Procedures." This was mailed to all law enforcement agencies in February 1995.

The Board developed model policies for "Conduct Unbecoming a Peace Officer" and "Community Notification of the Release of Sex Offenders." The model policies were mailed out to all law enforcement agencies in Minnesota. These projects involved putting together the necessary work groups and many hours in the planning and developing of the policies.

Employment opportunities

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Persons seeking employment in law enforcement can call the peace officer opportunity line (POOL), a recorded message service maintained by the Board. The POOL line is updated on a weekly basis.

Rules proposed and/or adopted during the biennium (pursuant to Clause f)

The Board adopted a number of changes to its administrative rules (Chapter 6700) in October 1995. These rules related primarily to the standards of conduct of peace officers. These changes are significant in that the threshold Board jurisdiction is lowered from the felony level to the gross misdemeanor level. The new rules also allow for jurisdiction in four areas where the violation may be a misdemeanor, they are, violation of an order for protection, criminal sexual conduct in the fifth degree, receiving stolen property and violation of a restraining order.

The new rules also include strong self reporting rules that impact both the licensee and the agency head. The rules also broaden the definition of conviction by allowing for Board Jurisdiction whether or not the adjudication of guilt is withheld or not entered, an admission of guilt, or a no contest plea.

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Board examinations pursuant to clauses i, j and k

The POST Board administers the following examinations:

<u>Peace Officer Licensing Examination (POLE)</u> for students who have earned a minimum of a two-year college degree and have completed a clinical skills course. The students are eligible to be licensed for a period of three years following passing the Peace Officer Licensing Examination (POLE). People who become eligible to be a Minnesota peace officer do not apply for their license until they have been hired by a law enforcement agency in Minnesota. This examination has been administered since April 20, 1990.

<u>Eligibility reinstatement</u> for persons whose three years of eligibility for licensure have expired. People who seek eligibility reinstatement must pass the eligibility reinstatement examination. Upon passage they become eligible to be licensed for the following three years.

<u>Reciprocity test</u> for persons who are certified peace officers in another state or a Federal jurisdiction. Eligibility to take this test is based on a combination of basic training and experience. Passing the test makes the person eligible to be licensed in Minnesota for a period of three years. People who seek <u>reciprocity eligibility reinstatement</u> must pass the reciprocity test again. Upon passage they become eligible to be licensed for the following three years.

<u>Part-time peace officer test</u> for persons who have completed selection and training standards for part-time peace officers under the sponsorship of a law enforcement agency that intends to hire the candidate when he or she has passed the part-time licensing test. This test is increasingly being administered to people who are eligible to take the Peace Officer Licensing Examination, but must wait for the next available test date, and will be hired as a peace officer by the sponsoring agency.

The <u>Peace Officer Licensing Examination</u> is administered a minimum of six times per year. <u>Reciprocity</u>, <u>part-time peace officer and eligibility reinstatement tests</u> are scheduled by appointment and administered in the POST Board offices.

Other objective information (pursuant to Clause p)

Unlike other licensing boards, the POST Board does not issue licenses immediately to persons who pass the Board's examination. They are considered "eligible to be licensed" at this point. The license certificate issues when a law enforcement agency notifies the Board that it has hired one of these eligible persons and that he or she has met all of the selection standards that are prescribed in the Board's rules.

The Board issued 527 peace officer licenses during fiscal year 1995 and another 529 licenses during fiscal year 1996. In comparison, 419 persons gained licenses in fiscal year 1993 and 472 licenses were issued in fiscal 1994. Some of this increase may be attributed to the fact that many agencies hire first time licensees on a part-time basis.

The following table shows the number of persons licensed by gender and by the age groups distinguished in the data on testing.
