


# Dispostion of Bills to Governor

While waiting for the HF to be transmitted from the House, the Senate will often take the Senate companion or another designated SF and amend the bill and lay it on the table. When the HF is transmitted to the Senate, they will take up the House file, delete everything after the enacting clause, and insert the language of the SF companion or designated bill that was worked on during the Senate floor session.
