State Shutdown Coordinating Team Announces "Critical Services" to be Continued in Event of Government Shutdown

St. Paul, Minn. — Julien C. Carter, Commissioner for the Minnesota Department of Employee Relations (DOER), today announced the list of state agency functions identified as "critical services" for the purposes of a state government shutdown. Critical services are those functions that would continue to be provided by the State if government operations cease due to a lack of legislative appropriations on July 1, 2001.

Commissioner Carter provided a short list of state government services determined to be those most crucial to protecting and preserving life, health and safety in Minnesota – along with some functions needed to support such operations. The Shutdown Coordinating Team prioritized and selected services that made the list from among those submitted by the state agencies.

Some of the government functions named as critical services include custodial care of residents in state nursing homes, veterans homes and other facilities; operation/supervision of correctional facilities; basic law enforcement and emergency services; support of functions related to providing child support and public assistance nursing care; food and dairy inspection, etc.

According to Carter, important state government functions not included on the critical services list would probably not be provided during a shutdown. "We would have to suspend road construction and maintenance projects, close down the state parks, stop issuing documents that range from drivers licenses to fishing licenses, and cut back on a whole host of public services," he said. "This will not only cause a lot of inconvenience and dissatisfaction among citizens, but could end up costing taxpayers millions of dollars due to delays in completing state contracts and losses of public revenue."

Carter said that state agencies will immediately begin notifying customers (including counties and municipalities), contractors and employees about the critical services that they would provide and about the possible impact of suspending other services if government operations cease.



Minnesota State Government Shutdown Fast Facts June 20, 2001

- There are 52,677 State Employees.
- The number of state employees deemed critical is 8,076.
- 24,025 state employees are scheduled for limited interruption.
- Minnesota State Colleges and Universities (MNSCU) have 19,306 employees who are not included in the employees affected by the shutdown because they have funds available through other sources to continue operations through mid-July.
- · Daily lost productivity of individuals on limited interruption: \$3.8 million
- Over the last week, there have been over 20,000 hits on the State Government Shutdown Site.
- Over 500 requests for information and creditor letters have been received at the Shutdown Call Center.
- Never before has the State of Minnesota faced the possibility of reducing services to citizens because of a legislative impasse over the budget.
- In addition to lost productivity during a possible shutdown, the State will face expenses for "restarting" government once a shutdown ends.
- The effects of a government shutdown would likely linger far into the future, affecting citizen's confidence in state government. It would also impact organizations that utilize state government services and provide services and products to state government.
- May have a negative impact on the State's ability to retain skilled and dedicated employees.



HOW WOULD A SHUTDOWN AFFECT THE OPERATIONS AND SERVICES OF STATE AGENCIES? June 20, 2001

Department of Agriculture

While inspection of dairy farms, processing plants, and grocery stores would continue under a state government shutdown, there are many other important services that would cease. For example:

· Food recalls

In a foodborne outbreak, it is very important for regulators to move quickly and have good information. Last December, in the midst of a major recall of E. coli contaminated ground beef, the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's laboratory facility helped confirm the contamination and its suspected source. As a result, the MDA, the Department of Health and the U.S. Department of Agriculture were able to move quickly to get the product off store shelves and investigate the facility to which the meat had been traced.

By greatly reducing our lab's operations capacity, a government shutdown would mean this important lab work would not be done nearly as quickly. This would increase the time required for government regulators to respond to an outbreak, meaning more people could become ill.

Agricultural Chemical Emergency Response

On the morning of Friday, May 11, an anhydrous ammonia nurse tank being pulled by a pickup truck tipped over while turning at an intersection. As a result, more than 800 gallons of anhydrous ammonia were released. A timely response by local officials and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's agricultural chemical incident response personnel helped protect citizens from the effects of this dangerous chemical.

Unfortunately, in a government shutdown our ability to respond to such an incident would be significantly impaired. Only 11 of the 112 employees in the MDA's Agronomy and Plant Protection Division would be retained in a shutdown. These 11 would be responsible for responding to all pesticide and fertilizer spills, human exposures, and misuses in the state.

Department of Children Families & Learning

- All school districts will experience cash flow issues due to the loss of state categorical aid payments, and the absence of an inflationary increase in general education funding from the previous year. Some districts may be unable to cover payroll and other obligations on a timely basis, causing them to cash in investments early and pay penalties. Cancellation of services and teacher layoffs may also occur.
- Payments to Adult Basic Education providers (many of them small non-profit organizations) would cease, causing cash flow difficulties.
- General Education Development (GED) classes may be discontinued, causing delay in employment or enrollment at higher education institutions for GED program participants.
- Adult English as a Second Language classes may be discontinued, slowing full participation of immigrants in the workplace and community.

Department of Corrections

Prisoners would be locked in cells up to 23 hours daily at higher custody facilities, like Stillwater Prison. Medium-custody institutions cannot lock inmates in cells, intensifying concerns about safety with reduced staffing.

Offender Community Supervision/Related Activities

- Suspended activities:
 - Sex offender and chemical dependency services including programming, the community notification process, and drug and alcohol testing
 - Grants and subsidies activities related to pass-through funding for a wide variety of services at the local level including the community corrections act and county probation officer reimbursement
- Staffing levels will be maintained to ensure supervision of highest risk offenders (i.e., intensive supervision, sex offender supervision).
- Minimal staffing levels will be maintained for supervision of other offenders in the community and offenders controlled by the Interstate Compact.

Department of Economic Security

Certain functions available through the Minnesota Department of Economic Security will be closed, including Disability Determination Services, State Services for the Blind, Vocational Rehabilitation and the Energy Assistance.

Department of Health

The health and well-being of Minnesotans could be dramatically affected by a government shutdown, which would all but close the Minnesota Department of Health.

- Minnesotans will be at increased risk for infectious diseases because we won't have our full capacity to detect disease outbreaks.
- Minnesotans will be at higher risk for food-borne illness and disease because we won't be inspecting restaurants.
- Minnesotans will be at increased risk for disease from unsafe drinking water because we won't be inspecting public water supplies.
- The public's ability to exercise certain legal rights, such as obtaining passports or applying for licenses will be affected because they won't be able to get copies of birth and death certificates.
- The care of frail elderly residents in nursing homes and hospitals could be compromised because we won't be inspecting those facilities for safety and proper treatment.
- Minnesotans' access to needed health care services could be affected because we won't be responding to assistance that people may need from their HMOs.
- Some women may not get the needed follow-up for abnormal screening results because we won't be continuing our breast cancer detection program.
- Home and business construction projects could be delayed because contractors may not be able to get the licenses or inspections they need to do the work.
- Local public health agencies, nonprofits (such as United Way agencies) and other organizations in communities across the will not receive the funds they need to help us protect the public's health.
