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# BILLS BOTH HOUSES PASSED - 1978

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<u>Gorn detasselers</u> <u>HF1789</u> - M. Sieben, Pehler, Enebo, H. Sieben \*SF1643 - Sikorski, Vega

Requires corn detasseler's employers to provide transportation to corn detasselers they terminate, or who become injured or sick, to the location where the employer picked them up on that day. Employers must also provide an easily accessible, potable water supply.

Effective: Day following final enactment.

Defining corporate and family farms \*HF1931 - Wenstrom, G. Anderson, Eken, Langseth, Fjoslien SF2002 - Hanson, Olhoft, Willet, Strand, Coleman

Limits corporations of beef and hog producers to five shareholders and a majority of the shareholders must live on the farm. Corporations currently in hog and cattle production may continue operations.

Effective: August 1, 1978.

Family Farm Security loans - income tax exclusion \*HF1881 - G. Anderson, Wenstrom, Eken, Friedrich, M. Nelsen SF2001 - Nichols, Hanson, Moe, Strand, Peterson

Exempts the interest a property seller receives on a guaranteed seller-sponsored loan from gross income for tax purposes. <u>Effective</u>: For interest received for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1977 and before January 1, 1982.

Ch 610 Grain weighing and inspection \*HF1575 - Munger, Lehto, Jaros, Berkelman, D. Carlson SF1642 - Solon, Ulland, Johnson, Chmielewski

> Requires the commissioner of agriculture to appoint grain weighers to perform their duties at designated export points when the state resumes grain weighing activities. <u>Effective</u>: Day following final enactment.

Ch 529 <u>Banking day - change in definition - conventional mortagage loans - usury</u> <u>HF1944</u> - Ellingson, Casserly, Suss, Friedrich, Corbid \*<u>SF1662</u> - Davies, Sikorski, Kirchner, Johnson, Sieloff

Defines a "banking day" as any day a bank is open to the public for carrying on substantially all of its banking functions, excluding Saturday, Sunday, and holidays. Clarifies provisions of the laws relating to conventional mortgage loans and usury rates. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 642 <u>Credit unions - reserve fund requirements</u> <u>\*HF1998</u> - Simoneau, Voss, G. Anderson, Abeln, R. Anderson <u>SF2170</u> - Spear, Johnson, Borden, S. Keefe

> Modifies state chartered credit unions' reserve requirements to conform with the reserve requirements of federally chartered credit unions.

Effective: August 1

Ch 469 Electronic funds transfer

\*HF1180 - Hanson, Suss, Corbid, Abeln, Ewald SF1062 - Laufenburger, S. Keefe, Kirchner, Solon, Kleinbaum

Allows the use of electronic fund transfer systems, either manned, point-of-sale terminals or unmanned automated-teller machines. Customers could withdraw cash, make deposits and transfer funds, disburse loans against a pre-established credit line, make loan payments, but could not open accounts or take out loans using the terminals.

Effective: Day following final enactment.

Ch 611 <u>Industrial revenue bonds - limitation of trust statutes</u> \*HF1598 - Neisen, H. Sieben, Biersdorf, Schulz, McEachern <u>SF1314</u> - Knutson, Sikorski

> Provides that trustees need not file inventories of trusts created in connection with the issuance of industrial bonds. Requires confirmation of trustees of trusts in connection with the issuance of industrial bonds and allows such trustees to apply to the court for instruction. Defines "beneficiary" to include bondholder. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 643 <u>Interest rates - savings account loans</u> <u>\*HF2000</u> - Pehler, Suss, Heinitz, Ellingson, Wenzel <u>SF1846</u> - Kleinbaum, Bang, Solon

> Allows financial institutions to raise interest rates to over eight percent if a person is borrowing money and using a long-term savings account as security on the loan. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 663 Powers of credit committees \*HF2147 - Skoglund, Brinkman, Norton, Ewald, Corbid SF2158 - Penny, Borden, Johnson, Solon, Sikorski Allows credit union credit committees to approve an advance line of credit for a member and advance money to the member within the limit of the extension of credit without additional loan application. Effective: Day following final enactment Ch 544 Removal of officers of financial institutions \*HF 842 - A. Kempe, Faricy, McCollar, R. Kelly, Suss SF 370 - Luther, Solon, Spear, Laufenburger, Vega Establishes procedures for the issuance of orders and removal of officers of financial institutions. Provides due process provisions to protect the rights of the parties involved which include a notice of charges, a hearing procedure, and judicial review. Effective: Day following final enactment Savings and loan associations - additional powers

\*<u>HF1520</u> - George, Swanson <u>SF1886</u> - Tennessen, Bang, Benedict, Sikorski

Gives state chartered savings and loan associations the same powers state chartered commercial banks have in maintaining IRA and keogh accounts. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 664 Unclaimed property

\*HF2151 - Suss, H. Sieben, Patton SF2003 - S. Keefe

Provides for classifying, as abandoned, all intangible personal unclaimed property a government or political subdivision or agency holds for an owner for more than seven years. Requires such subdivisions or agencies to pay 12-percent interest on the unclaimed property to the state treasurer if they fail to return the property within a specified period of time. Effective: Day following final enactment Ch 698 <u>Certificates of trade name - secretary of state</u> <u>HF237</u> - Casserly, L. Carlson, Vanasek, Adams, M. Sieben \*SF437 - Tennessen, Luther, Jensen, Spear, Borden

> Requires businesses to file commercial trade names with the secretary of state. The secretary of state will keep a list and charge a \$10 filing fee. The public, attorneys and businesses could check the validity of certain business names. Effective: August 1

Ch 709 Division on small business

HF1446 - White Wenstrom, Samuelson, R. Anderson, Evans \*SF1450 - Peterson, Johnson, Willet, Lessard, Setzepfandt

Creates a division on small business within the department of economic development. It also creates a one year advisory task force to advise the commissioner on structuring the division, to define small business, to develop a plan for a statewide educational consortium on small business development, to study the feasibility of establishing regional educational consortiums for small business development. <u>Effective</u>: Day following final enactment. Sections 3 and 6 shall expire July 1, 1979.

Ch 712 <u>Domestic corporations - filing an active status</u> <u>HF2076 - Cohen</u> \*SF1611 - Davies, Sillers, Merriam, Dieterich

> Requires domestic corportations to file an active status report with the secretary of state between July 1, 1979 and June 30, 1982. Corporations that fail to file reports shall lose exclusive rights to their names. Effective: Upon final enactment

Ch 701 Entertainment - coin-operated amusement devices - liquor stores <u>HF 832</u> - McEachern, Neisen, M. Sieben \*SF 774 - H. Olson, Johnson, Ueland

> Permits municipal liquor stores in cities under 10,000 to offer entertainment and coin-operated amusement devices. <u>Effective:</u> August 1

Ch 516 Eyeglasses - price advertising permitted <u>HF1389</u> - M. Sieben, Ellingson, Pleasant, Casserly, Adams \*<u>SF1229</u> - Luther, Sikorski, Tennessen, Dieterich, Johnson

> Allows optometrists to advertise the price of eyeglasses. Effective: August 1

Ch 537 <u>Filing fees for domestic corporations</u> <u>HF2072</u> - Jaros, Berkelman, M. Sieben, R. Anderson, Hanson \*SF1830 - Solon, Ulland, Davies, Purfeerst

> Equalizes the fees the state requires foreign and domestic corporations to pay, providing a uniform fee of \$10. <u>Effective</u>: Section 1 is effective the day following final enactment. Section 2 is effective August 1, 1978.

Ch 590 Foreign currency exchanges at airports - disclosures \*HF2445 - Enebo, McCarron, Berg, Voss, Searle SF2300 - Davies, Sillers, Kirchner, Borden, Laufenburger

> Requires foreign currency exchanges at airports to disclose the corporate name of the operator and the current rates for buying and selling all traded foreign currencies. Effective: August 1

Item pricing - retail merchandise \*<u>HF 37</u> - Jacobs, Hokanson, Hanson, A. Carlson, Adams <u>SF 303</u> - Solon, Johnson, Borden, Spear, Milton

Requires any store using an electronic scanner which reads the prices of merchandise at the checkout counter to label all canned, bottled, boxed, or bagged items with the selling price. Exempts food items one can eat on or about the retail premises: vending machine items, items on sale for seven days or less, cigarettes, cigars, tobacco and tobacco products with a retail price of \$1.00 or less, and items that don't have the uniform products code or similar marking the electronic checkout equpiment scans for price. Exempts retailers from the item marking requirement on not more than 25 classes or individual items (which the retailer shall post on a list in the store) and on an additional 25 items the retailer advertises or features at reduced price. Effective: August 1

Ch 687 <u>Liquors - hours and days of sale</u> \*<u>HF2307</u> - Jaros, Fudro, Pleasant, Lehto, Brandl SF2204 - Solon

> Allows off-sale liquor stores in cities of the first class (Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Duluth), and cities within 15 miles of a city of the first class within the same county, to remain open until 10 p.m. on Fridays as well as Saturdays. Effective: August 1

- Ch 621 Liquor license applicants certain tax information \*HF1806 - Casserly, Scheid, Novak, W. Kelly SF2294 - Tennessen Relates to confidentiality of income and sales tax returns; provides that counties or municipalities could request the commissioner of revenue to certify whether or not a liquor license applicant is liable for any state or local taxes which he/she did not pay when due. Effective: July 1, 1978 Ch 710 Repair of motor vehicles, appliances, dwelling places HF1344 - Simoneau, Scheid, Novak, Byrne, Neisen \*SF1468 - Merriam, Luther, Spear Regulates repairs of motor vehicles, appliances, and dwelling places; provides that when repair work costs more than \$100 and less than \$2000 the customer may request a written estimate before the shop begins the repair. If the customer provides authorization to make the repair after reviewing the total estimated price, the shop cannot charge more than 10 percent over the total estimated price. Effective: August 1
- Ch 473 <u>Repeal of fair trade laws</u> \*<u>HF1882</u> - Hanson, Jacobs SF1647 - Tennessen, Spear, Sieloff, Davies, Dieterich

Repeals the Minnesota Fair Trade Act, which allows minimum resale price agreements. Federal legislation covers this. <u>Effective:</u> August 1

Ch 695 Uniform commercial code - uncertified securities \*HF2516 - Ellingson, H. Sieben, Jude SF2048 - Davies, Kirchner, Knoll

> Amends provisions of the Uniform Commercial Code relating to uncertified securities (stocks and bonds). Effective: January 1, 1979

Ch 502 <u>Vending machines</u> <u>HF2389</u> - King, Mann, Kalis, Erickson, McDonald \*<u>SF1431</u> - Luther, Willet, Dunn, Hanson

> Removes vending machines from the definition of "place of business"; regulates inspection and licensing of vending machines; limits the state to a two dollar fee per machine; allows the agriculture department to require owners to mark machines with the company's name. Effective: August 1

Domestic assault

HF883 - Cohen, Lehto, Wynia, Evans, Novak \*SF318 - McCutcheon, Sikorski, Lewis, Coleman, Kirchner

Allows for the arrest of a person who has assaulted his or her spouse. States that a police officer may make the arrest without a warrant if the officer has observed a recent physical injury. The officer may make the arrest only at the person's residence. The act allows the officer in charge of the police station or the county sheriff to hold the arrested person for up to 24 hours if the officer believes the individual may cause more harm to the spouse and provides for judicial review after detention. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 707 Inmates - psychiatric care and treatment HF1210 - Corbid, Samuelson, Nelson, Moe, Laidig \*SF1073 - Lewis, Kirchner, Vega, Sikorski

> Establishes a psychiatric unit for the care and treatment of correctional inmates at Stillwater State Prison; provides for examination of an inmate if correctional institution authorities feel the inmate may be mentally ill. If the examiner (physician or psychologist) finds the inmate is mentally ill, the examiner may recommend treatment at the psychiatric unit. If the inmate refuses to voluntarily undergo treatment, the case would go to court for commitment proceedings.

Effective: August 1

Licensing of correctional facilities \*HF2124 - Jaros, Welch, Clark, Nelson, Esau SF1926 - Lewis, Spear, Kirchner, Sikorski

Provides for the licensing of correctional facilities; requires the corrections commissioner to license and inspect all correctional facilities and revoke licenses of those facilities (not jails and lockups) that don't meet standards; includes group homes for delinquent children in the definition of "correctional facility"; prohibits juvenile courts from placing more than one juvenile delinquent in an unlicensed home; makes it a felony for introducing a dangerous weapon into any correctional facility; provides for an advisory task force which would include a representative of juvenile court, probation officers, and county board members to assist in the development of standards for the correctional facilities.

Effective: Section 2 is effective September 1, 1979. All other sections are effective August 1, 1978. Section 6 shall expire August 1, 1981.

Police use of firearms <u>HF387</u> - Nelson, Casserly, Lehto, Clark, Norton \*SF2361 - McCutcheon

Clarifies when law enforcement officials can use "deadly force"; defines "deadly force" as force known to cause death or great bodily harm, force involving the intentional discharge of a firearm in the direction of a person or vehicle; allows a law enforcement official to use deadly force for self protection or for the protection of another person from apparent death or great bodily harm, or if it is necessary to arrest, capture, or prevent the escape of a person the officer has reasonable grounds to believe has committed, or has attempted to commit a felony, and if the officer believes (unless he/she apprehends the person) the suspect may cause bodily harm or death. <u>Effective</u>: Sections 1, 2, 3 are effective August 1, 1978. Section 4 is effective the day following final enactment.

Ch 638 Possession of traffic signs

\*HF1976 - Lemke, Fudro, Hokanson, D. Anderson, Samuelson SF1882 - Purfeerst, Kirchner, Laufenburger

Prohibits the possession of certain traffic signs and provides immunity for persons who voluntarily notify law enforcement officials that they have the signs. Effective: August 1

Ch 629 <u>School buses displaying stop signals</u> \*HF1884 - Wenzel, Prahl, McDonald, Murphy, Vanasek SF2215 - Wegener, Sikorski

> Increases the penalty for passing a school bus that is displaying the stop signal from a petty misdemeanor to a misdemeanor. Effective: August 1

Sentencing guidelines

HF386 - A. Kempe, R. Kelly, Laidig, Cohen \*SF65 - McCutcheon, Knoll, Sikorski, Menning, Vega

Creates a nine-member commission to establish sentencing guidelines for the district court by January 1, 1980. The guidelines would establish the circumstances under which imprisonment of an offender is proper and a fixed sentence for such offenders, which judges could deviate from by 15 percent. The Minnesota Corrections Board will lose its power of parole and will mainly supervise prisoners on work release programs.

<u>Effective</u>: Day following final enactment and shall apply to all offenses committed on or after that date.

Ch 639 <u>Small amounts of marijuana - reducing past convictions</u> \*<u>HF1977</u> - Clark, Moe, Jude, A. Carlson, Nelson <u>SF1946</u> - Dieterich, Spear, Knoll

> Retroactively reduces past convictions involving small amounts of marijuana to a petty misdemeanor. Persons convicted of possessing a small amount of marijuana before April 11, 1976 may petition the court to change the conviction on their records. Effective: April 11, 1978

Ch 512 <u>Trespassing on cemeteries</u> <u>HF678</u> – Wigley, Osthoff, Kvam, Voss, McCarron \*SF194 – Ueland, McCutcheon, Sieloff, Merriam, Frederick

> Makes it a misdemeanor for anyone to be on the premises of a public or private cemetery during the hours officials have posted the cemetery as closed to the public. Effective: August 1

#### EDUCATION

Ch 550 <u>Coaches - right to hearing</u> \*<u>HF1447</u> - Waldorf, Mangan, Scheid, Berkelman, Knickerbocker <u>SF1551</u> - Chenoweth, Stumpf

> Provides a due process hearing for licensed athletic coaches who receive notice they are going to lose their jobs. Requires school districts to notify the coaches of the termination and state their reasons for the proposed termination. Allows coaches to request a hearing within 14 days after getting the notice. Allows school boards to terminate a coach for any reason they can support with substantial and competent evidence. Effective: August 1

Ch 578 Environmental education act

\*<u>HF2081</u> - R. Kelly, Stanton, Mangan, Metzen, McEachern SF2030 - Strand, Nichols, Benedict

Allows the commissioner of natural resources to supply tree planting stock to environmental education programs, and in this case only, allows use of the trees for purely ornamental purposes. Expands the department of natural resources's authority in providing education programs. Allows the department, in addition to providing education programs to elementary and secondary school children, to provide some adult education training on a voluntary basis. Effective: Day following final enactment High school advising \*HF2170 - King, Fugina, Faricy, Erickson, Dean SF1933 - Hughes, Humphrey, Moe, Stumpf, J. Keefe

Provides for statewide career guidance program. Requires the Higher Education Coordinating Board to establish an advisory task force to develop improved educational measurers and counseling tools. Effective: August 1

Ch 718 <u>Midwest Education Compact</u> <u>HF2040</u> - Fugina, Johnson, Berglin, Sabo, Savelkoul \*SF1849 - Humphrey, Hughes, Anderson, Sillers

> Allows Minnesota to be a member of the Midwestern Education Compact, an education consortium involving 15 states. The compact would coordinate educational programs (emphasis on higher education) and services for citizens in the participating states. Effective: August 1

Ch 603 Private college registration - definitions \*HF1323 - Cohen SF1573 - Hughes, Stumpf, Ueland

> Requires public post-secondary educational institutions in other states or countries offering or making available to Minnesota residents any course, program or educational activity which does not require residents to leave the state to register with the Higher Education Coordinating Board. Exempts certain post-secondary institutions, including seminaries, from having to register. <u>Effective</u>: Day following final enactment

Ch 616 <u>Repealer law - removal of planning task force members</u> \*<u>HF1754</u> - Suss <u>SF1703</u> - Strand, Nichols, Penny

> Eliminates and corrects certain obsolete provisions relating to education. Gives school boards the authority to remove planning task force members and allows schools which consolidate to select one representative to represent their new district on the task force. Effective: August 1

Ch 581 Special election districts

\*<u>HF2204</u> - Voss, Jacobs, Eken, McEachern <u>SF1874</u> - Merriam, Schaaf, Anderson

Changes the requirements for petitions for division into and changing of boundaries of special election districts. Effective: August 1 Non-public school aid

<u>HF1750</u> - Pehler, Wenstrom, Faricy, Savelkoul, Wenzel \*SF1722 - Kleinbaum, Stumpf, Merriam, Schrom, Dunn

Provides \$2.6 million for aid to private schools in the 1978-79 school year. Grants much of the state aid for textbooks, standardized tests, and health services. Includes \$90,000 for nonreligious private schools with small enrollments. Grants aid for the administration of the program and for guidance and counseling services two years from now for secondary pupils in private schools. <u>Effective</u>: Sections 1 - 13, 15 - 17, 20, 21, 23, effective the day following final enactment. Other sections - August 1

<u>Omnibus school aids bill</u>

\*<u>HF1885</u> - Eken, Tomlinson, Johnson, Esau, Berg <u>SF1781</u> - Merriam, Anderson, Sillers, Hughes, Dieterich

Makes various changes in the laws relating to school aids, appropriating \$15.7 million in additional aid to schools. Provides \$4.6 million for increasing the per-pupil-unit aid from \$1,090 to \$1,095 for the 1978-79 school year. Provides foundation aid levels for 1979-80 and 1980-81 of \$1,155 and \$1,220. Provides \$3.7 million for school districts with declining enrollments, allowing the districts to spread the loss of students out over a  $3\frac{1}{4}$ -year period, rather than the current two years. Provides \$3.1 million for increasing the state's share of salaries for special education teachers, having the state pay for 68 percent (now 65 percent), to a maximum of \$12,000 a teacher.

Effective: All sections effective day following final enactment, except Section 143, Subdivision 2 which is effective July 1, 1979; Sections 61 and 69 which shall govern the computation of aid for the 1977-78 school year; Sections 95 and 99 which shall be retroactively effective on July 1, 1977; Section 29 affecting pairs of independent school districts which is effective upon approval by the boards of both of the paired districts; the rest of Section 29 is effective the day following final enactment; Sections 4,5,7, 10,40,51,57,118, and 122 are effective July 1, 1978; Section 64 which is effective July 1, 1978, except the provision changing the reference to the minimum required levy is effective July 1, 1979; Sections 65 and 66 are effective July 1, 1979; Sections 81,82,116, and 120 are effective and apply to extended leaves beginning in fiscal year 1979 for teachers granted an extended leave of absence pursuant to section 125.60 after June 9, 1977.

Ch 706 <u>Statutory revision - education laws</u> <u>HF1611</u> - Byrne \*<u>SF 912</u> - Stumpf, Gunderson, Anderson, Merriam, Ueland

> Corrects and eliminates obsolete, erroneous and ambiguous references in education laws. Effective: August 1

Ch 561 Student CC board member

\*HF1833 - Wenstrom, Cummiskey, Fugina, Laidig, Jude SF1641 - Dieterich, Stumpf, Nichols, Ueland, Anderson

Requires that one member of the Community College Board be a student at a community college at the time of appointment or was a student within one year before appointment. <u>Effective</u>: August 1

Ch 632 Teachers' file data

\*HF1908 - Wenstrom, Berg, Tomlinson, Johnson, R. Anderson SF1847 - Merriam, Tennessen, J. Keefe, Davies, Nelson

Relates to grounds for terminating teachers' contracts. Requires school districts to erase from teachers' files, excluding administrators, materials found false or substantially inaccurate through grievance procedures.

Effective: August 1

#### ELECTIONS

Ch 463 <u>Campaign financing</u> \*<u>HF404</u> - George, Petrafeso, I. Anderson, Rice, Cummiskey SF1006 - S. Keefe, Staples, Benedict, Strand, Luther

> Limits campaign financing and candidate spending; applies spending limits to candidates accepting public checkoff funds; changes distribution of funds according to vote totals and the number of persons using the check-off system in the legislative district; changes laws governing the ethics commission; allows contributors to get an income tax credit only if the candidate abides by state spending limitations.

<u>Effective:</u> Sections 106 and 107 are effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1977. The remaining sections are effective the day following final enactment.

<u>Elections - judges - ballots - constitutional amendments</u> <u>HF 357</u> - Lehto, Stoa, Enebo, Osthoff, Biersdorf \*<u>SF 744</u> - Stokowski, Schaaf, Coleman, Ueland, Jensen

Defines a member of a political party, primarily for the purpose of selecting judges, as a person who supports the principles of the party's constitution, a person who voted for a majority of that party's candidates in the last election or a person who intends to vote for a majority of a party's candidates in the next election. Changes outdated language. Alters various provisions relating to publication of constitutional amendment explanation, ballots, judges, summary statements, canvasses and returns. Effective: Day following final enactment

#### ELECTIONS

Ch 714 <u>Elections - voter registration</u> <u>HF1894</u> - Cummiskey, Knickerbocker, Sabo, I. Anderson, Novak \*SF1630 - S. Keefe, Strand, Stokowski, Sikorski, Schaaf

> Provides safeguards against improper registration. Provides rules for election day requirements. Provides guidelines for the administration of absentee ballots. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 572 Municipal elections - changes

\*HF2010 - McEachern, Berg, Kostohryz, Schulz, Biersdorf SF2139 - Dunn, Schmitz, Chmielewski, A. Ueland, Wegener

Clarifies language relating to municipal elections and hours polls are open, candidacy requirements, filing fees, and sample ballots. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 591 <u>Public buildings available for precinct caucuses - filing dates</u> \*<u>HF2451</u> - Novak, Dean, Simoneau <u>SF2308</u> - Borden, S. Keefe, Sikorski

> Requires political subdivisions to make their public facilities available for precinct caucuses, legislative district and county conventions, and prohibits these units from charging prices higher than the lowest amount any other group pays; sets a time for filing of nominating petitions. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 456 U.S. Senate seat vacancies \*HF1500 - Rice

Requires special elections to fill U.S. Senate seat vacancies in the year the vacancy occurs except when the vacancy occurs - 1) six weeks before the regular primary preceding the election in November - 2) in the last year of the Senate term. Provides that successors take office immediately following their election and certification and that the governor will appoint someone to fill the vacancy until the election.

Effective: Day following final enactment.

Contested cases involving public waters

HF1142 - Eckstein, Birnstihl, Johnson, Biersdorf, Peterson \*SF1120 - H. Olson, Jensen, Purfeerst, Wegener

Requires that contestants in a case involving public waters bring their cases to the county that has the water within its boundaries, or if the dispute involves more than one county, to the judicial district that has most of the water in question within its jurisdiction. Effective: August 1, 1978

Ch 640 Informal sales of state timber

Allows any county other than Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott, and Washington counties and the solid waste districts in northern Minnesota to prohibit the transportation of solid waste to other counties for disposal. Establishes a temporary joint legislative committee on solid and hazardous waste which will advise and assist the director of the state planning agency and other agencies. Trespass bill

> Prohibits employers from discriminating or discharging a state legislator from his/her employment in retribution for his/her political acts, statements or beliefs while a member of the legislature, regardless of the elapsed time since continuation or restoration of employment. Transfers the environmental education board from the state planning agency to the department of natural resources. Effective: July 1, 1978

Appropriates \$13 million for repairs and improvements to state buildings. Some of the projects include: -\$2 million for projects at the state capitol. -\$720,890 for the department of natural resources. -\$30,000 for a new heating plant in the armory at Madison. -\$1.1 million for remodeling, and maintenance for community colleges. -\$6.5 million for the department of transportation. -\$1.2 million for general projects for welfare institutions. -\$654,000 for general projects for corrections institutions. Effective: Day following final enactment '

Ch 592 Open appointments

> Prohibits Minnesota's state agencies from buying materials for governmental purposes which are not United States manufactured, except if U.S. manufacturers do not produce needed materials in large enough quantities; if the price unreasonably exceeds the price of foreign manterals; if the quality of materials is substantially less than that of foreign products; if the purchase of U.S. products is not in the public interest. <u>Effective</u>: For all contracts the state executes after July 1, 1978

Supplemental appropriations bill \*HF2527 - Norton

Appropriates \$6.5 million for various projects last year's spending bills did not cover. Some of the projects include: -\$633,000 to the department of economic development for tourism

# Resolution on MIA's and POW's \*HF2177 - Jensen, Birnstihl, Langseth, Biersdorf, Waldorf

<u>SF1973</u> - Chmielewski, Penny, Benedict, Sieloff, Anderson

A resolution expressing the concern of the Minnesota Legislature for unaccounted MIA's and POW's (Missing in Action and Prisoners of War). Urges action by the national leadership to end the heartache the lack of information about these servicemen has caused.

#### TAXES

### <u>Inheritance taxes</u> \*<u>HF 551</u> - Vanasek, Searles, White, Scheid, Abeln <u>SF1522</u> - Olhoft

Clears up some inconsistencies and vague language in the present inheritance tax laws. Provides for the transfer of jointly held property to heirs of decedent joint tenant. Clarifies marital exemption provisions. Provides for a deduction for certain taxes on estates of nonresidents. Clarifies time for filing and extension. Provides for abatement of penalties in cases of reasonable reasons for delay. Effective: August 1

Omnibus tax bill

\*<u>HF2250</u> - W. Kelly, Jacobs, Tomlinson, Scheid, Wenzel SF2051 - McCutcheon, Sikorski, Nelson, Penny, Schmitz

Provides approximately \$105 million in tax relief. Repeals the state sales tax on home heating fuels. Increases the personal income tax credit from \$30 to \$40 for taxes paid in 1978. Establishes a homemaker credit of \$50 for parents earning less than \$25,000 a year who take care of their children in their home. Raises the eligibility ceilings for the existing "working poor programs," which provides total income-tax forgiveness to people below certain income levels. Repeals the employers' excise tax. Reduces the tax rates for those with incomes of \$25,000 or more. Provides an annual tax credit of \$140 for members of the National Guard. Provides a \$7,200 exclusion from state income taxes for recipients of public and private pensions, excluding Social Security and railroad benefits which a pensioner receives plus any earned income over \$13,000 a year. Effective: Section 1 - effective for taxable years beginning after Dec. 31, 1973. Section 2 - effective for claims based on rent paid in 1979 and after, and on property taxes payable in 1980 and after. Section 3 - effective July 1, 1978. Section 4 -Effective for property taxes payable in 1979 and after.

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Ch 567 <u>Realty certificates of value - tax effect</u> \*<u>HF1923</u> - Eken, Johnson, Waldorf, Casserly, W. Kelly SF1766 - McCutcheon, Merriam, Hanson, Peterson, Johnson

> Amends the law that requires filing of certificates of real estate value with the county auditor within 30 days of the sale of any real estate. Removes the provision relating to filing within 30 days and provides that no real estate anyone sells after January 1, 1978, which requires a certificate of value, shall receive a homestead credit, agricultural mill credit, or taconite homestead credit, unless a certificate of value is on file with the county auditor.

Effective: For property sold after January 1, 1978 and thereafter

# Tax assessments - special assessments - appeal to court \*HF1726 - A. Kempe, R. Kempe

Amends two separate sections of Minnesota statutes relating to appeal procedures on tax assessments. Clarifies that one section relates to appeals on general ad valorem tax assessments and not special assessments. In another section, extends the appeal procedure for special assessments from 20 to 30 days after adoption of the assessment Effective: Day following final enactment but shall not apply to

any appeal filed prior to that date.

<u>Taxation - revenue department bill</u> \*<u>HF1916</u> - Pehler, Vanasek, Skoglund, Abeln, Casserly SF1929 - McCutcheon, Peterson, Merriam, Stokowski, Johnson

Makes corrective changes in the tax laws. Makes changes in allowable court use of sales ratio studies. Allows the commissioner of revenue to require the use of Social Security numbers on all forms the department requires. Extends the time a taxpayer would have to pay certain additional tax liabilities from 30 to 60 days. Creates a new 3a property which is commercial use recreational property on lakes and provides reduced assessed value. Provides definition for resident trusts and resident estates effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1978. Amends sections relating to low income tax credit and minimum tax on preference income.

Effective: Sections 1 to 3,35,36 and 39 are effective the day following final enactment. Sections 4 to 6, 19 to 33 and 37 are effective July 1, 1978. Sections 7 to 9 and 11 are effective for taxes levied in 1978 and subsequent years, payable in 1979 and subsequent years. Sections 10,12 and 13 are effective for taxes levied in 1977 and subsequent years, payable in 1978 and subsequent years. Sections 14 to 18 are effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1977 except that clause (b) of section 17 is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1976, and before January 1, 1978. Section 34 is effective for taxable years beginning after June 30, 1978. Section 38 is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1977. Taxes - certain leased property in U.S. - taconite taxes \*HF1805 - W. Kelly, Skoglund, Abeln, Pehler, Evans SF2217 - Peterson, Johnson, Hanson, Setzepfandt, Sillers

Clarifes the tax status of certain leased United States property and the status of certain taconite taxes. <u>Effective:</u> Section 1 - effective for taxes levied in 1978 (payable 1979) and thereafter. Sections 2 & 3 - effective for property taxes levied in 1978, payable 1979, thereafter. Section 4 -Effective for iron ore concentrate produced in 1975 and 1976.

Taxes - property - income - inheritance - gift - liquor \*HF1915 - Vanasek, Skoglund, Scheid, Casserly, W. Kelly SF1930 - Setzepfandt, Peterson, Olson, Bernhagen

A department of revenue housekeeping bill. Changes some provisons of the tax laws to conform with some changes that the federal government has made. Gives the commissioner some flexibility in designing income tax tables. Brings some provisions of the tax laws into compliance with recent court decisions. Eliminates some obsolete language. Effective: Sections 1, 6, 20 - day following final enactment. Sections 2,3,7, 19 - December 31, 1977. Section 5 - December 31, 1978. Sections 8,14,15, 16 - July 1, 1978. Section 9 - effective for claims on property taxes payable 1976 and after and rent paid in 1975 and after. Section 10 - effective for claims on property taxes payable 1978 and after and rent paid in 1977 and after. Section 11 - June 30, 1978. Sections 12, 13 - December 31, 1978. Sections 17, 18 - effective for property taxes levied in 1978, payable 1979 and after.

## TRANSPORTATION

Ch 660 <u>Airport acquisition - types of airports</u> \*<u>HF2111</u> - Eckstein, Kalis, Mann, D. Anderson, Eken SF2118 - Willet

> Changes the reference in statutes of "secondary airports" to "intermediate airports." Provides for state reimbursement to municipalities for part of the cost of acquiring an airport or moving an airpot. Increases the number of certain types of airports.

Effective: Day following final enactment

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Bicycle regulations

\*HF 474 - Kahn, Dean, Lehto, Ellingson, Novak SF2058 - Gunderson, Purfeerst, Frederick, Kirchner, Brataas

Makes regulation changes for bicyclists. Prohibits motor vehicles from using bicycle lanes except when turning, when parking in permitted parking areas, or when leaving the highway. Allows bicyclists to use their right hand when signaling a right turn. Requires bicyclists to follow the same traffic regulations as drivers of any other vehicles with certain exceptions. Prohibits carrying passengers except in cases where the bicycle equipment includes a baby carrier or when the bicycle has two seats. Requires bicyclists to ride on the right-hand side of the road with certain exceptions. Requires certain bicycle equipment. Prohibits bicyclists from riding on sidewalks in business districts unless local authorities permit it. Requires bicyclists to give pedestrians the right of way. Effective: August 1

Ch 569 <u>Construction of interstate highway I-94</u> \*<u>HF1965</u> - Hanson, George, Laidig, Kostohryz, R. Kelly <u>SF2031</u> - McCutcheon, Coleman, Ashbach

> Directs the department of transportation to use the existing trunk highway No. 12 between highways I-94 and I-694, 494 to the St. Croix River in central Washington County for the construction of interstate highway I-94. Effective: August 1

Ch 655 <u>Delivery of certificate of title</u> \*<u>HF2066</u> - Abeln, Wenzel, Brinkman <u>SF1900</u> - Benedict

> Requires the secured party, if there is no next secured party, to mail by certified mail the motor vehicle certificate of title to the owner. Effective: August 1

Ch 495 <u>Great River Road - route</u> <u>HF2187</u> - McEachern, Jude, Sarna, Niehaus \*SF1758 - Purfeerst, Bernhagen, Kleinbaum

> Gives the commissioner of transportation authority to designate routes for the Great River Road, with the approval of the Mississippi River Parkway Commission. <u>Effective</u>: Day following final enactment.

Ch 539 Interstate passenger carriers - sales tax HF2345 - Pehler \*SF2078 - H. Olson, Chmielewski, Kleinbaum

> Extends the method of sales tax computation the legislature adopted in 1977 for carriers transporting property to include carriers transporting passengers. Effective: Day following final enactment

I-35E Moratorium lift

\*HF 544 - A. Kempe, Osthoff, Kostohryz, McCollar, R. Kempe SF 543 - Vega, McCutcheon, Knutson, Engler

Lifts the ban on construction of highway I-35E in St. Paul. Permits a four lane parkway going from West Seventh Street into the downtown area with a connection to the junction of Highways I-35E North and I-94. Prohibits routing I-35E over the Lafayette Freeway and prohibits connecting Lafayette Freeway with I-94 or I-35E. Requires the Metropolitan Council to do an environmental impact study on the highway before September 1, 1979. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 636 Personalized license plates - recreational vehicles, trucks \*HF1967 - Simoneau, Neisen, Enebo, Clawson, St, Onge

> Allows owners of a van or pickup truck under 9,000 pounds to personalized license plates; prohibits the owner from get using the plates for commercial advertising. Effective: August 1

Ch 667 Rail user loan guarantee program \*HF2192 - Stanton, B. Anderson, Peterson, Fudro, Casserly SF2017 - Penny, Moe, Setzepfandt, Hanson, Purfeerst Establishes a rail user loan guarantee program to assist rail users (shippers) who participate in contracts for rail line rehabilitation. Provides that the state would guarantee 90 percent of the loan plus interest.

Effective: Day following final enactment

State aid system - funds in municipal account Ch 686 \*HF2299 - Fudro, Lemke, Birnstihl, D. Anderson SF2117 - Schmitz, Chmielewski, Wegener, Laufenburger, Kirchner

> Allows counties to use funds from municipal accounts for county state-aid highways within the county outside of municipalities having a population of less than 5,000 if the commissioner of transportation approves the use of funds. Effective: Section 1 - January 1, 1979. Section 2 - day following final enactment

Ch 472 Statutory corrections - trunk highways \*HF1879 - Lemke, M. Nelsen, Murphy, McCollar SF1881 - Laufenburger

> Makes deletions and corrections in the statutes relating to the trunk highway system. ; Effective: August 1

#### TRANSPORTATION

Ch 700 <u>Sunday Holiday Law</u> \*<u>SF757</u> - Schaaf, Laufenburger, Vega, Penny, Setzepfandt

> Repeals the "Sunday Holiday Law" which prohibits commercial vehicles from operating within 35 miles of cities of the first class on Sundays and legal holidays. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 570 <u>Surety bonds of motor vehicle dealers - definition of "bus"</u> \*<u>HF1966</u> - Neisen, Simoneau, Enebo, Rose, White <u>SF1980</u> - Willet, Purfeerst, Ashbach

> Extends protection that motor vehicle dealer surety bonds provide to any transferrer or seller; authorizes the issuance of nontransferrablecertificates of title; changes the definition of a "bus" so that it doesn't include vehicles a manufacturer designs for carrying more than 10, but less than 14, passengers and that people operate for personal or family use. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 506 <u>Transportation construction contracts</u> <u>HF2071</u> - Casserly, Berglin, Norton, Pleasant, McCarron \*SF1955 - Knoll

> Changes the wording of the transportation construction contract law to comply with regulations for federal funding. Effective: August 1

#### VETERANS/MILITARY

Ch 478 <u>Amendments to the state military code</u> <u>HF2007</u> - Waldorf, Jacobs, Kostohryz, Biersdorf, McCarron \*<u>SF1787</u> - Penny, Nichols, Anderson, Gunderson, Sieloff Makes technical amendments to the state military code; relates to the National Guard. Effective: August 1

Ch 625 <u>County veterans service officer</u> \*<u>HF1857</u> - Suss, Vanasek, H. Sieben, Laidig, Rice <u>SF1786</u> - Schmitz, Bernhagen, Stumpf, Knoll, Hughes

> Requires all counties to appoint a veterans' service officer, excluding Clay County. Effective: August 1

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Ch 552 Military justice amendments \*HF1612 - H. Sieben, G. Anderson, Hokanson, Fjoslien, Wenzel SF1823 - Kleinbaum, Wegener, Solon, Dunn Amends the military justice program to bring it into conformity with federal military law. Provides for military judges to handle all court martial cases in the Minnesota National Guard. Effective: August 1 Ch 498 Mud flaps - U.S. military vehicles HF1552 - Wenzel, I. Anderson \*SF1096 - Sikorski, Chmielewski, Stokowski Exempts U.S. military vehicles from wheel flap requirements. Effective: August 1 Ch 532 National Guard - increased pay for active duty HF2008 - Hokanson, Waldorf, Jacobs, Kostohryz, Biersdorf \*SF1693 - Schmitz, Setzepfandt, Vega, Penny, Dunn Increases the pay for enlisted national guard persons on active duty from \$12 to \$35 a day. Effective: August 1 de, Ch 635 Veterans - classification of records \*HF1945 - Birnstihl, Kostohryz, McDonald, B. Nelsen, Waldorf SF1788 - Lessard, Vega, Staples, Nelson, Knutson Classifies veterans' service medical records as private data Effective: August 1 Ch 682 Veterans preference - enforcement of orders \*HF2273 - McCarron, Birnstihl, Jacobs, Kostohryz, Waldorf SF2047 - Olson, J. Keefe, Penny, Chmielewski, Gunderson

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Allows the commissioner of veterans affairs to petition the district court for enforcement of his orders. Allows the commissioner to appeal to the supreme court from orders of the district court. Effective: Day following final enactment

#### YOUTH/CHILDREN

Ch 657 Detention of juveniles - after adjudication \*HF2080 - Byrne, Tomlinson, Mangan SF1958 - Davies

> Relates to juveniles found delinquent of a status offense for a second or third time, prohibiting counties from placing such juveniles in a secure juvenile detention facility. Effective: Day following final enactment

Ch 637 Detention of juveniles - before adjudication \*HF1973 - Nelson, Clark, Kaley, Novak SF2096 - Vega, Solon, Nelson, J. Keefe, Staples

> Relates to the detention of juveniles prior to the juvenile's appearance before a judge, allowing counties to detain juveniles in a jail, or another confinement facility for adults, if the commissioner of corrections approves the facility and if there is not a secure detention facility for juveniles available to the county. Effective: August 1
