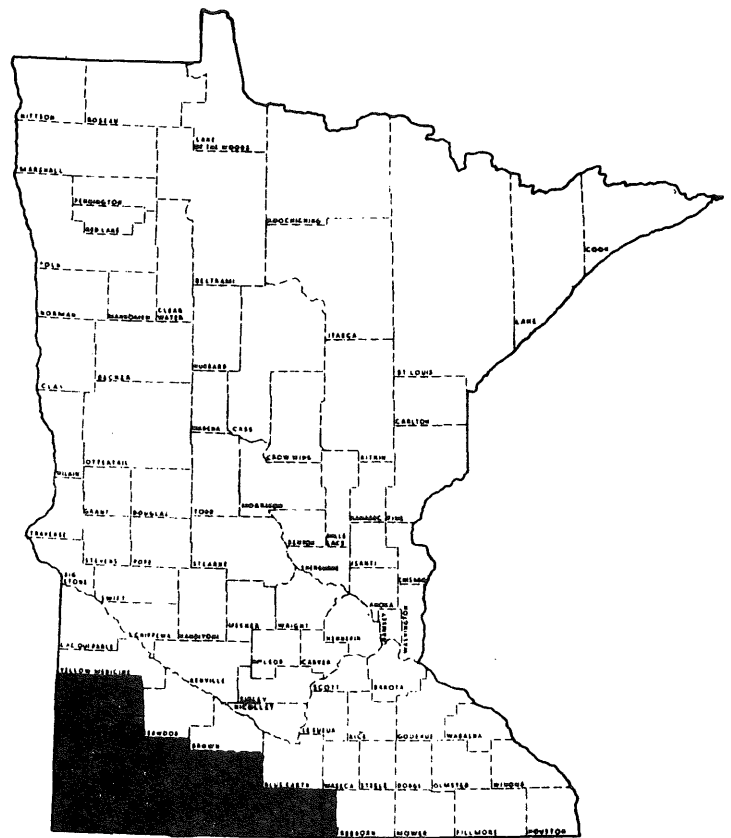
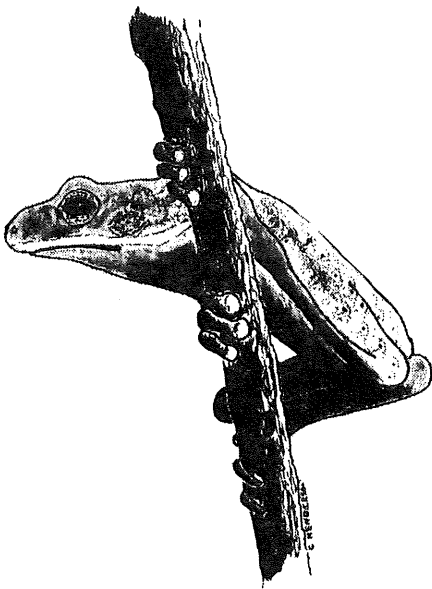

Guide to the Herpetofauna of Southwest Minnesota

Region 4 - South

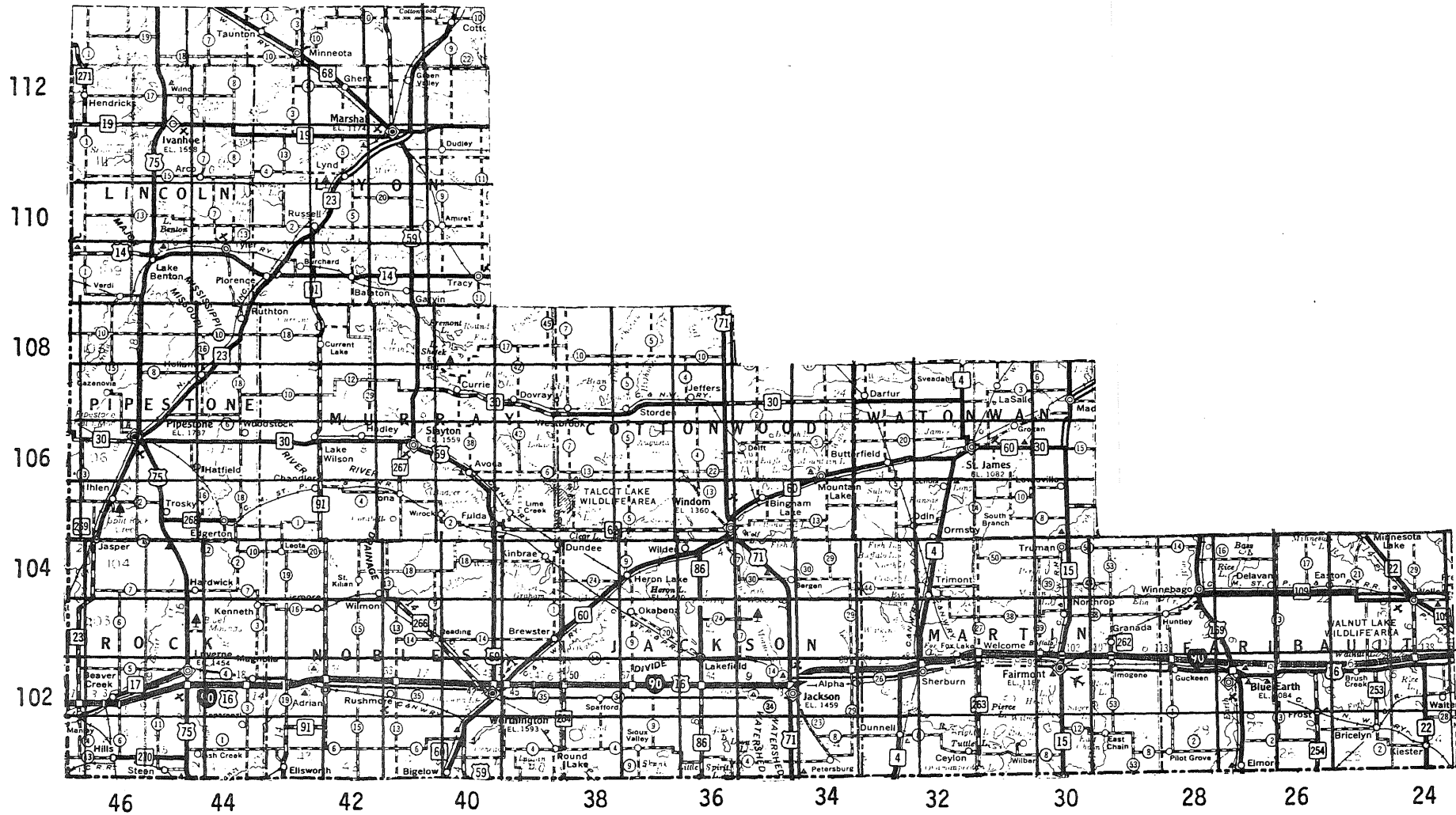


Figure 1. Map of Region 4-South. Township numbers are shown in the left margin and range numbers are shown along the bottom.

This preliminary guide has been prepared as a reference to the occurrence and distribution of reptiles and amphibians in Region 4 - South of Southwestern Minnesota. Taxonomy and identification are based on "A Field Guide to Reptiles and Amphibians" by Roger Conant (Second Edition, 1975). Figure 1 is a map of the region.

Counties Included: Cottonwood, Faribault, Jackson, Lincoln, Lyon, Martin, Murray, Nobles, Pipestone, Rock and Watonwan.

Summary

A total of 15 species have been recorded in Region 4 - South. Two subspecies of the tiger salamander and the chorus frog are present.

Species of special interest in this region include the gray tiger salamander, great plains toad, western smooth green snake, and Blanchard's cricket frog. Any sightings of these should be documented and sent to the nongame supervisor.

County records for this region are given on the following pages. If you encounter any new county records, the specimen should be captured and either photographed from several angles or preserved in isopropyl alcohol. Record the collector's name and address, date, county, township, range, section number (or distance and direction from nearest town), and the habitat in which the animal was found. The nongame supervisor should be contacted concerning disposition of specimens.

Unless otherwise specified, all county records are derived from Reptiles and Amphibians of Minnesota by Walter J. Breckenridge.
