EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Postsecondary Enrollment Options Act (PEOP) was enacted by the Minnesota Legislature in June 1985. The purposes of the Act were to promote rigorous educational pursuits and to provide a wider variety of options for students.

In order to aid in the implementation of this new program, the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) initiated a number of leadership activities. These included activities such as the development of guidelines, providing a toll-free telephone number for the public, conducting meetings around the state to explain the program and developing a booklet titled "Choosing Wisely - Choosing Well" to aid counselors, students and parents to make sound decisions regarding participation. Commissioner Ruth Randall also appointed a Task Force to aid in the implementation of these programs.

In the fall quarter, 1,679 students participated in the program. They came from 226 districts and attended 67 postsecondary institutions. Most students, about 70%, attended the postsecondary institution less than full-time.

In December 1985, the MDE conducted a telephone survey of the participants. The survey was developed by The Pelavin Associates, a Washington, D.C. consulting firm. Responses were received from 90% of the students. Seventy-six percent (76%) of the students reported that they had high school grade point averages of 2.75 or higher. Most found out about the program from their high school.

A total of 3,138 courses were taken by the 1,679 students. Of these, 54% of the students enrolled in communications courses, 37% in social science, 19% in mathematics, 18% in social studies, 14% in business, 13% in a foreign/world language, 12% in science and 11% in history. Fewer than 10% enrolled in other course categories.

Seventy-seven percent (77%) of the students reported that they believed the postsecondary courses were more challenging than high school courses. In general, 96% of the students stated that they were satisfied with their experience and 82% said they intended to take courses again in the future under this program.

While the students reported that their overall experience with the program is positive, they did report a number of problems which they had encountered. Scheduling of courses was reported as a problem by 25%, course availability by 23%, transportation by 18%, receiving high school credit by 12% and high school counseling by 12%. Other problems were also reported.

The Act provides that the State Board of Education develop transportation guidelines to set criteria for the payment of aid to families in financial need. These guidelines were developed and \$17,246 of the \$50,000 appropriation have been expended. The Board also serves as the appellate body for appeals regarding the allocation of high school credit for postsecondary courses. Three appeals have been filed with the Board.

The MDE plans to conduct an extensive evaluation of this program and report the findings to the 1987 Legislature, as required by law.

INTRODUCTION:

In June 1985, the Minnesota Legislature enacted the Postsecondary Enrollment Options Program (PEOP). (See Appendix A). This program enables 11th or 12th grade pupils to enroll in nonsectarian courses or programs in eligible postsecondary institutions at no cost to the pupil. The purposes of this Act are to:

- 1. Promote rigorous educational pursuits; and,
- 2. Provide a wider variety of options for students.

Students may participate in a postsecondary program under the Act on either a full-time or part-time basis.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

Upon enactment of the Act the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) initiated leadership activities to aid in its implementation. The MDE effort was implemented in collaboration with the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB) as well as representatives from the higher education systems, the public schools and parent groups. The following activities have been implemented under the leadership of the Department:

- 1. On August 7, 1985, guidelines were distributed to all school districts.
- 2. A "Fact Sheet" was printed for distribution to the public.
- 3. A toll-free telephone number was established for the public. Over 1500 calls were received in August.
- 4. Statewide meetings were held in August for the purpose of explaining the guidelines. The meetings were held in Mankato, Marshall, Fergus Falls, Thief River Falls, St. Cloud, Rochester, Staples, the Metro area, Eveleth and at the superintendents' conference.
- 5. The MDE assisted the State Board of Education in developing and distributing guidelines regarding transportation aid.
- 6. The MDE assisted the State Board of Education in developing guidelines for use in resolving disagreements between students and school districts regarding the amount of secondary credit to be awarded for postsecondary work.
- 7. In November, eleven regional workshops were held for districts and postsecondary institutions. Their purpose was to provide information and materials which would assist secondary and postsecondary personnel in working with parents and students interested in this program.
- 8. In November, thirteen regional evening meetings were held for parents and students. The purpose of these meetings was to

provide information and to encourage parents/students to plan jointly with the high school and the postsecondary institution so that decisions are made in the students' best educational interest.

At the meetings for both school district personnel and parents, a booklet entitled "Choosing Wisely - Choosing Well" was distributed. The booklet is intended to assist in the communication process among the schools and the parents/students.

- 9. Department staff members have participated in a number of radio and television programs, as well as presented at conferences and workshops, to discuss the implementation of the program.
- 10. Commissioner Ruth Randall held four news conferences to share information about the program.
- ll. A task force was appointed by Commissioner Ruth Randall in October. The charge to the task force was to assist the Commissioner in designing the system for evaluating the program and to assist in the identification of issues and their possible solutions.
- 12. A meeting was held with students to enable them to provide information to the MDE regarding their experiences with the program.

DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

In order to gather information regarding the implementation of the program during the first quarter/semester, three sources of data were utilized. First, data were obtained from MDE sources including "Student Registration Forms", which by law were required to be filed with the Commissioner, and "Transportation Reimbursement" forms. Second, information was obtained from postsecondary institutions. Third, in December, the MDE conducted a telephone survey of participating and nonparticipating students. The survey instrument (see Appendix B) was designed by The Pelavin Associates, an independent consulting firm from Washington, D.C. These consultants are under contract with the United States Department of Education and were assigned by that Department to provide assistance to the Minnesota Department of Education. Pelavin Associates trained the telephone surveyors to utilize the survey instrument.


The population for the survey consisted of two groups. One group consisted of 1,000 students who were not participants in the program. This sample consisted of 500 students who came from districts which did not have participants in the program and 500 who came from districts which had students participating. Approximately 92% of these students were successfully contacted. The second group consisted of the 1,679 participants in the program for whom the Department received a Notice of Student Registration form. Approximately 90% of these students were successfully contacted.

POPULATION INFORMATION: FALL QUARTER/SEMESTER

The following statistics provide an overview of the population of participants in the program for the fall quarter or first term:

- * 1,679 11th and 12th grade students participated in the program. This represents approximately 1.5% of the total statewide 11th and 12th grade population. [See Appendix C1
- * 61% of the students were female and 39% were male.
- * 74% of the students were 12th graders and 26% were 11th graders.
- * Students came from 226 school districts. [See Appendix D]
- * Students attended 67 postsecondary institutions. [See Appendix E]
- * Of the 1,504 students contacted in the survey, 1,489, or 99.0%, said they were enrolled in high school last year, ll said they had dropped out and did not attend school at all last year, and four said they had attended, but had dropped out during the year.
- * Only 26, or 1.7% of the students, were enrolled in a private high school prior to participating in this program.
- * 32% of the 12th graders and 30% of the 11th graders attended a postsecondary institution full-time. Full-time is defined as any student enrolling in 12 or more credit hours.

Students were asked to identify the sources from which they received information about the program. Figure 1 shows the results of their responses. [See figure 1]




The data below identify the variety of courses students chose as well as the frequency with which the courses were chosen. In all, 3,138 courses were taken at the postsecondary level. In order to summarize these courses, a list of general classifications was developed. Within these classifications, several courses were identified. These classifications do not specify course levels. Therefore, advanced algebra, trigonometry and calculus are classified as "Mathematics".

The following table represents the postsecondary courses which students took during the fall quarter or first term. The first column lists the percentage of students who took courses in these classifications. The second column lists the percentage of courses in a specific classification when compared to the total number of courses taken.

In addition to providing the course titles, students were asked to make a judgment regarding how challenging the course was when compared to a high school course. Figure 2 is a summary of their responses. [See figure 2]



One thousand five hundred and four (1,504) participating students were contacted. One thousand one hundred seventy-nine (1,179) or 78.3% indicated they had high school grade point averages above 2.75.

When students were asked what grades they expected to receive, 20% indicated they expected to receive A's, 22% expected A's and B's, 26% B's, 16% B's and C's, and 9% C's. The rest expected to receive a grade lower than C or did not know.

The data displayed in Table 2 provide a summary of the grades students received from postsecondary institutions. Results are grouped by postsecondary system.

Figure 3 displays the responses students gave when asked how satisfied they were with the program. [See figure 3]





Figure 4 illustrates the responses students gave when asked if they planned to take additional courses through this program.

Students were asked to identify any problems they had encountered during their participation in the program. Their responses are as follows:

- * 25% responded that the time courses were scheduled was a problem.
- * 23% responded that the course availability was a problem.
- * 18% responded that transportation was a problem.
- * 12% responded that receiving high school credit was a problem.

- * 12% responded that high school counseling was a problem.
- * 10% responded that meeting with the postsecondary instructor outside the classroom was a problem.
- * 8% indicated that the difficulty of classroom presentations was a problem.
- * 10% identified a variety of other problems they encountered.

TRANSPORTATION

The statute required that the State Board of Education develop guidelines with respect to eligibility for reimbursement of transportation expenses incurred by students "in financial need" while participating in the program. The Board's guidelines provide that a family be at the poverty level before transportation be paid. As of February 1986, a total of \$17,246.58 has been disbursed to 68 students from twenty school districts. A total of \$50,000 has been appropriated for the biennium.

CREDIT APPEALS

During the first quarter of implementation, the State Board of Education received several inquiries. The questions fell into three main areas: amount of high school credit to be awarded for postsecondary work, judgment of comparability of postsecondary courses to high school courses already completed, and compliance with high school graduation requirements.

Three appeals were received by the Board. One appeal dealt with the amount of high school credit awarded for a postsecondary course. State Board determined that the high school was awarding less credit than the Board's guidelines recommended. The appeal was resolved by awarding the student more credit than the high school initially had indicated but less credit than the student was appealing for. other two appeals concerned comparability of a postsecondary level course to the high school level course. The State Board clarified its policy on comparability by stating that a postsecondary course, by its very nature, is more rigorous than a high school course. However, a school district which contends that the content of a particular high school course is comparable to that offered by the postsecondary institution has the opportunity to provide documentation supporting its contention. The districts did not pursue the appeals.

SURVEY OF NON-PARTICIPATING STUDENTS

One thousand (1,000) non-participating students were contacted. Five hundred nineteen (519) or 56% had high school grade point averages above 2.75. Of these 1,000 students, 642 or 70% were aware of the PEOP. The majority of these 642 students indicated that they received their information through the high school, friends or the media. Even though these students were aware of the PEOP, 481 indicated that they did not intend to participate in the program; 74 said that they might participate, others indicated that they did not know at this time.

FUTURE EVALUATION

In accordance with the Act, a comprehensive evaluation will be presented to the Legislature by January 15, 1987, regarding the implementation of the Postsecondary Enrollment Options Program. This report will provide information about the participants, describe the implementation of the program, identify the impact of the program on students, high schools and postsecondary institutions, and provide a fiscal analysis of the impact of the program. The data sources will consist of student and parent questionnaires, questionnaires to high schools and postsecondary institutions, postsecondary faculty questionnaires and MDE records. The Pelavin Associates, an independent firm from Washington, D.C., has been assigned by the United States Department of Education to provide the MDE, HECB and others with assistance regarding the completion of this evaluation.

SUMMARY

The first quarter/term of implementation for the PEOP has just been completed. This preliminary report provides an update on the status of the program thus far. Based on this information, the following highlights best summarize the program.

- * The majority of students who participated in the program were very satisified with the PEOP and plan to take additional courses.
- * The number of students who were initially enrolled in private high schools and participated in this program is minimal.
- * Students received information about the program through a variety of sources. However, the majority indicated that the high school was their main source of information.
- * The summary of grades received indicates that the majority of students received a grade of B or higher.
- * The courses students chose most frequently were English, literature, composition, speech, algebra, calculus, economics, political science, psychology, sociology, and computer technology.
- * The majority of students found postsecondary courses to be more challenging than high school courses.
- * The most significant problems named by the students who participated in the PEOP were course scheduling, course availability, transportation, high school counseling, and receiving high school credit.
- * The student input at Commissioner Randall's meeting with participating students in early February 1986 reinforced the results of the telephone survey.

* The interest in the PEOP from school administrators, parents, students and the general public continues to be high, as indicated by the large number of phone calls which continue to be received by the MDE.

1985 OMNIBUS SCHOOL AIDS ACT

ARTICLE 5 ACCESS TO EXCELLENCE

SECTION 1. (123.3514) (POST-SECONDARY EMBOLLMENT OPTIONS ACT.)

Subdivision 1. (CITATION.) This section may be cited as the "post-secondary enrollment options act."

- Subd. 2. (PURPOSE.) The purpose of this section is to promote rigorous academic pursuits and to provide a wider variety of options to high school pupils by encouraging and enabling secondary pupils to enroll full-time or part-time in nonsectarian courses or programs in eligible post-secondary institutions, as defined in subdivision 3.
- Subd. 3. (ELIGIBLE POST-SECONDARY INSTITUTIONS.) For purposes of this section, an "eligible institution" means a Minnesota public post-secondary institution or a private, residential, four-year, liberal arts, degree-granting college or university located in Minnesota.
- Subd. 4. (AUTHORIZATION; NOTIFICATION.) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, an 11th or 12th grade pupil may apply to an eligible institution, as defined in subdivision 3, to allow the pupil to enroll in nonsectarian courses or programs offered at that post-secondary institution. If an institution accepts a secondary pupil for enrollment under this section, the institution shall send written notice to the pupil, the pupil's school district, and the commissioner of education within ten days of acceptance. The notice shall indicate the course or programs and hours of enrollment of that pupil.
- Subd. 5. (CREDITS.) A school district shall grant academic credit to a pupil enrolled in a course or program under this section if the pupil successfully completes the course or program attended. If no comparable course or program is offered by the district, the state board of education shall determine the number of credits that shall be granted to a pupil who successfully completes and passes the course or program. If a comparable course or program is offered by the district, the school board shall grant a comparable number of credits to the pupil. If there is a dispute between the district and the pupil regarding the number of credits granted for a particular course or program, the pupil may appeal the school board's decision to the state board of education. The state board's decision regarding the number of credits shall be final.

The credits granted to a pupil shall be counted toward the graduation requirements and subject area requirements of the school district. Evidence of successful completion of each course or program and credits granted shall be included in the pupil's secondary school record.

Subd. 6. (FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS.) At the end of each school year, the department of education shall pay the tuition reimbursement amount within 30 days to the post-secondary institutions that enroll pupils under this section. The amount of tuition reimbursement shall equal the lesser of:

ARTICLE 2 SECTION 15 Subd. 4. (TRANSPORTATION AID FOR CHOICE PROGRAMS.)

For transportation of pupils who attend post-secondary institutions pursuant to article 5 there is appropriated:

\$50,000....1986.

The commissioner shall allocate this appropriation among school districts based upon criteria adopted by the state board of education under article 5, section 1, subdivision 8. This money shall be available until June 30, 1987.

Postsecondary Enrollment Options (PEO) - Estimated Fiscal Impact - FY 1986

The estimated annual fiscal impact on district revenues attributed to the 1985-86 student participation in the Postsecondary Enrollment Options (PEO) program is attached. Postsecondary payments are expressed as a percentage of district revenue in four categories and are shown in the four rightmost columns:

- 1. Total District Operating Revenue (OPER REV)
- 2. Foundation Revenue K thru 12
- 3. Foundation Revenue 11 and 12
- 4. Foundation Revenue PEO Participants

The data in the other columns is defined as follows:

Total Operating Revenue - Estimated state aid entitlements plus certified levies for the general, transportation, and community education funds, excluding appropriated levies (e.g., statutory operating debt, school bus purchase).

Foundation Revenue - K-12 - Total estimated state foundation aid plus certified foundation program levies.

Foundation Revenue - 11-12 - Total foundation revenue times the ratio of actual pupil units in grades 11 and 12 to total actual pupil units.

Foundation Revenue - PEO - Total foundation revenue times the ratio of actual pupil units in PEO program to total actual pupil units.

Amount Paid to Postsecondary Institutions (PSI) - Annual projection of payments computed in accordance with Minn. Stat. 123.3514, Subd. 6, and based on:

- (a) an estimate of the FY 1986 formula allowance plus tier revenue,
- (b) the reported first term high school course enrollment ratio, and
- (c) the reported estimate of first term postsecondary costs under this program.

The estimated amount paid for each student is equal to the lesser of:

- (a) the estimated annual postsecondary costs for a student, assuming that students will maintain the same postsecondary course load throughout the year, or
- (b) the total foundation allowance for the student (basic plus tier), times the proportion of the student's high school day not in credit courses at the high school. This assumes that the student maintains the same high school course enrollment throughout the year.

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

CHOOSING WISELY CHOOSING WELL

INTRODUCTION

If you are an 11th or 12th grade public school student, the Postsecondary Enrollment Options act provides you with an opportunity to take classes at eligible postsecondary institutions. These institutions include community colleges, vocational technical institutes, state universities, the University of Minnesota, and some private colleges and universities.

The purpose of the program is to promote rigorous academic pursuits and to provide a wider variety of options to high school students.

You and your parents may have several questions about this program. This guide can help answer some of them. For more help in deciding whether this opportunity is right for you, check with your guidance counselor or principal.

ADVANTAGES OF THE PROGRAM

The program could benefit you in several ways.

- o You have the opportunity to take courses that may not be offered by your high school.
- o You have a chance to see what postsecondary education is all about.
- o You can take classes which academically challenge you or which cover areas of particular interest to you.
- o You and your parents can use this opportunity to become involved with your high school in your education and career planning.
- o You earn high school and college credits at the same time.
- o The program is free to you.

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

- o You can enroll in post-secondary courses under this program if you are a Minnesota 11th or 12th grade student enrolled in a public school.
- o You don't have to pay for the costs of tuition, textbooks, materials or fees. You may need to pay for equipment which you keep, such as tools or calculators.

- o The credits you earn in the postsecondary courses will count toward the graduation requirements of your school and as college credits.
- o Your high school determines the number of high school credits you receive for postsecondary courses. If you disagree with the decision, you may appeal to the State Board of Education.
- o You must be admitted by an eligible post-secondary institution. The post-secondary institution you want to attend may have special entrance requirements you must meet before you can take courses there.
- o You can attend a postsecondary institution either full time or part time, but you can't attend your school full-time (all day) and still attend a postsecondary course under this program.
- o If you are eligible to graduate from high school early, you still can participate in this program for the rest of your senior year.
- o You can apply to your local school district to be reimbursed for transportation expenses you incur under the program. The State Board of Education has established guidelines, based on financial need, to determine eligibility.

DECIDING TO PARTICIPATE

Before you decide to participate in the program, you and your parents should consider these points:

<u>Future Plans</u>. If you plan well, this program can assist you in making future education and career decisions and in exploring post-secondary education opportunities.

High School Graduation. Even if you participate in this program, you still must meet your high school graduation requirements. Review the requirements and your standing with your high school counselor or principal. Make sure that the number and types of courses you take will meet local graduation requirements. Also, be sure classes you take at a postsecondary institution do not repeat classes you already took in high school.

Scheduling. Participating in this program on a part-time basis means that you must schedule classes at your high school and at a postsecondary institution. Yearly schedules and vacation times usually are different between the two. Sometimes it may be difficult or impossible to take the courses you want at both schools because of scheduling conflicts.

College-level work. College-level classes are more accelerated and academically challenging than high school courses. You need to be able to work without close supervision and have self-discipline. Be sure you are ready for these responsibilities.

<u>Transportation</u>. If you attend classes at both a high school and post-secondary institution, you need to think about transportation between the two schools. Be sure you can make arrangements to get to classes on time.

Extracurricular activities. If you take part in this program, you will not be in your high school full time. You might miss out on participating in some high school activities as a result of your enrollment in post-secondary courses.

STEPS TO FOLLOW

If you are interested in participating in the program, you will want to talk to your parents, your high school counselor and a representative of the post-secondary institution you plan to attend. Do this as far in advance of your possible postsecondary enrollment as possible. Follow this process each quarter or semester:

- 1. Discuss your plans with your parents.
- 2. Meet with your high school guidance counselor to discuss the program and how it might fit with your education and personal goals. If you decide to participate, complete Part 1 of the Notice of Student Registration form and obtain an official, current high school transcript. (This is a photocopy of your grades stamped by your high school.)
- 3. Meet with the admissions staff of the post-secondary institution you want to attend. Take the Notice of Student Registration and your transcript wih you to this meeting. If a student/counselor guide form was completed, incude it because this information will help the post-secondary institution.
- 4. Complete the necessary postsecondary admission forms. If you are admitted, the postsecondary institution will complete Part 2 of the Notice of Student Registration form. Within 10 days after registration, the postsecondary institution will send a copy of this form to you, your high school, and the Minnesota Department of Education.
- 5. Register for your courses. Provide your high school counselor or principal a copy of the postsecondary registration form. Be sure to contact your counselor if course changes from your original plan were made when you registered.
- 6. Verify the number of credits you will receive from postsecondary courses by having your high school complete Part 3 of the Notice of Student Registration form.
- 7. Provide the high school with a copy of the grades you earned at the postsecondary institution once your courses are completed.

8. If you decide you will no longer participate in the program before the term has ended, file withdrawal forms with the postsecondary institution and meet with your high school counselors to develop a new course schedule.

CONCLUSION

This guide should have helped answer some of your questions about the Postsecondary Enrollment Options Act. Think carefully about the advantages the program gives you and your decision to participate. Talk it over with your parents. If you have more questions, see your guidance counselor or principal.
