HIGHLIGHTS

Action update

Working toward a March 17 adjournment date, the Legislature has completed its work on a number of bills and sent them to the governor. And the governor has signed eight into law, among them, the state's first mandatory seat-belt law.

Other issues are in conference committees where House and Senate conferees are attempting to settle differences. Those include: the budget-balancing bill which would cut state agency budgets in an effort to offset a revenue shortfall; a legislative farm package; the 21 drinking age bill; (RIM) the reinvest in Minnesota bill; and the tax budget-balancing bill.

Among bills yet to make it through before Monday's adjournment, are legislation to crackdown on drunk boaters, a bill to raise the state's gas tax; reform plans for the state's workers' compensation and unemployment insurance systems; bills making changes to the Post-Secondary Enrollment Options Act and to State High School League rules; a smokeless tobacco regulatory bill; and a bill calling for changes to the state's charitable gambling law.

Still pending in the House, are several bonding proposals to help rural Minnesota's economy and to bolster the Family Farm Security Program.

White Earth Reservation

"White Earth is not for sale" was the message tribal members of the White Earth band delivered on the T-shirts they wore and the speeches they gave before the Minnesota House Appropriations Committee March 12. Many of them live on the White Earth Indian Reservation in northwestern Minnesota. And they came to voice objections to HF2138 (Rose, IR-Roseville), a bill that would extend until 1990 Minnesota's investigation into Indian charges that the state holds thousands of acres of land that belongs to them.

Tribal members say Minnesota violated an 1867 treaty with the Chippewa tribe. And as a result, the titles to over 100,000 acres are now "clouded," making the land difficult to sell or use as loan collateral. They supported Reps. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls.) and Phyllis Kahn's (DFL-Mpls.) unsuccessful amendment which would have called for appointment of a commission to investigate land claim disputes and report its findings to the Legislature by 1988.

On March 13, the committee recommended HF2138 to pass. It goes to the full House next.

High School League

On a vote of 85-30, the House March 12 endorsed a bill to modify some High School League rules for athletes.

In debate, supporters said HF2010 (Shaver, IR-Wayzata) would prevent the league from enforcing mediocrity in high school athletics. But opponents charged that it would let some schools dominate others.

Author Rep. Craig Shaver said the bill underwent numerous changes from its first proposal, including some changes the league suggested.

"We have gone the extra mile to try to be accommodating to the state High School League," he said. "As a result, we have a very good product that they can go forward and use in the development of their rules and regulations."

But Rep. David Battaglia (DFL-Two Harbors) disagreed. He called the bill "elitist" and said it would reverse the league's attempts to provide a level playing field for all schools in high school sports.

The bill would prohibit recruiting, relax rules that say when transfer students can play sports, allow students freedom to play as they wish during the summer, and allow individuals to mediate their disputes with league decisions.

Boating while intoxicated

The House passed the boatingwhile-intoxicated bill March 12 after a long debate and a series of unsuccessful amendments.

SF31 would subject boaters who drink and drive to the same penalties as drunk drivers on land. It would apply to all watercraft, not just motorboats. Department of Natural Resources officers would be able to stop boaters for probable cause, administer tests at the scene, and take the boater in for a breathalyzer test.

The House turned back amendments to apply the bill only to Lake Minnetonka and to apply the bill only to boats with motors higher than 40 horsepower. It also rejected an attempt to eliminate a section that would allow officials to use a blood alcohol content of .05 to indicate whether the person may be drunk.

Sex discrimination

Private golf clubs could pay up to four or five times more in property taxes if they discriminate on the basis of sex. On March 12, the House voted (109-3) in favor of a bill that would take away a discriminating club's favorable property tax status under the state's open space property tax law.

Under the bill, golf clubs could have separate events for men and women no more frequently than one weekday each week or one weekend each month to retain their favorable tax status. Golf clubs could have additional separate events as long as the hours, days, and conditions are equal for each sex.

To qualify for the favorable tax status, a club would have to submit an affidavit to the county assessor saying the bylaws or rules of the club meet the eligibility requirements of the bill.

Author of HF2077, Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester), told the House, "You have women working all day, working all week, wanting to play golf on the weekends with their husbands, with their partners, and with their friends," he said. "They don't see any reason why the good old boys should dominate Saturdays and Sundays."

The bill went to the Senate for concurrence of House amendments. On March 13, the Senate refused to concur. The bill now goes to a conference committee.

Illegal drugs

On March 11, the House passed HF1767 (Schreiber, IR-Brooklyn Park), a bill to tax illegal drugs, but rejected including tobacco.

Rep. William Schreiber said his bill would be another way to arrest and convict illegal drug dealers and tap "the large sums of money that are transferring hands without any taxes being imposed." Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls.) offered an unsuccessful amendment to include a tax on tobacco which she called one of the state's most harmful drugs. Her amendment would have subjected tobacco to taxes of \$100 an ounce.

As it passed in the House, the bill would tax marijuana at \$100 an ounce; other controlled substances sold by weight at \$5,000 an ounce; and each 50-dosage unit of a controlled substance not sold by weight at \$2,000.

Home health care

Should Minnesota regulate home health care via licensing or registration? That question sparked debate in the Appropriations Committee March 10, and marks the major difference between the House and Senate versions of the home health care bill.

HF370 (Onnen, IR-Cokato) would have the Health Department, counties and service providers examine the pros and cons of licensure, and then report to the Legislature. Rep. Tony Onnen's bill could lead to licensure, or it might conclude—as have many other states—that registration is adequate and less restrictive.

SF51 (Berglin, DFL-Mpls.) by contrast, proposes consumer protection through licensure.

Rep. Lee Greenfield (DFL-Mpls.) argued the Senate's position before the committee saying, "A registration system alone doesn't guarantee a level of service," he said. "It only says that if you aren't registered, then you can't say you are."

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The committee amended the House File language into SF51. The bill now goes to a conference committee.

Drinking age

House and Senate conferees decided March 10 that Minnesota's legal drinking age should be 21, no matter what the border states do.

The border-state issue became controversial as the House and Senate worked on a plan that would meet the federal government's requirement that states raise the drinking age to 21 or lose federal highway funds.

Rep. Gil Gutknecht (IR-Rochester) objected to a proposal by Sen. Clarence Purfeerst (DFL-Faribault) that would call for cancellation of the bill on enactment day—if any border state had a lower drinking age. Gutknecht said the Legislature shouldn't make its decisions based on what other states do.

But Purfeerst defended his amendment, saying a 21 age here would send younger adults across the border to drink.

The amendment failed.

The conferees agreed on a bill that would raise the drinking age to 21 beginning Sept. 1, except for those who turn 19 before then.

The bill requires state officials to give pamphlets that describe alcohol's effects to driver's license applicants and requires the driver's license manual to include the information. It also forbids liquor dealers from serving alcohol at oncampus events.

Home education

Children who get their education at home or in unlicensed, sectarian schools could expect to take annual achievement tests under HF1744 (Quist, IR-St. Peter).

An amendment to the bill that the House adopted at a March 10 session calls for the local school district superintendent to select the test.

In the home education bill's original form, superintendents would have decided whether to test homeschool children and the home school would have chosen the type of test to use.

"Some individuals in home schools feel that some standardized achievement tests may be somewhat prejudicial against their particular program," said the bill's sponsor, Rep. Allen Quist. "Therefore, they feel they should have some say over which particular achievement test is used."

During floor debate, Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury) pointed out that local superintendents already suffer enough political pressure without "putting them in the position about having to choose" whether to test home school children. Furthermore, the local school district would be paying for the tests.

"The home school ought to be tested like all the other children in that district—with that same achievement test—the one that the school district uses," he said.

Under HF1744, which passed as amended by a 112-11 margin, home schools would have to provide local school superintendents with the names and ages of children who've enrolled in their schools. Like licensed Minnesota schools, home schools would operate 175 days a year and teach all basic courses in the English language. Another amendment from the floor would require all schools to make daily class attendance records.

The Minnesota Supreme Court spurred the legislation by deciding that the state's compulsory attendance laws regarding home schooling were vague and unenforceable.
