Did You Know

Did you know that St. Peter almost became Minnesota's capital?

Legislator "Jolly Joe" Rolette took the bill authorizing the St. Peter move and hid in a St. Paul hotel for eight days. With only a few days left in the 1857 session, Rolette's absence deadlocked the territorial senate for 123 hours.

At the stroke of midnight on the last day of session, just as the president declared the Council adjourned, Rolette burst into the chamber, too late for action on the bill. St. Paul remained Minnesota's capital city.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Session Weekly

The Session Weekly is part of the Minnesota House of Representatives public information service. Each week during the session, it includes: 1) highlights of House committee and floor action, 2) a list of committee and floor action on bills, 3) bill introductions, and 4) an advance committee schedule.

Highlights of committee and floor action give you a sampling of what happened from Thursday (2 p.m.) to Thursday (2 p.m.).

As legislative activity increases, the listing of committee and floor action on bills will give concise information so that you can follow particular bills.

Committees can only recommend action on bills, so coverage of committee action will tell you if a committee recommended a bill to pass, to pass as amended, not pass, or rereferred it to another committee for further consideration.

Coverage of floor action will tell you what happens to a bill after it leaves a committee and appears on a calendar for action by the full House.

Bill introductions give you House File numbers, authors, committee assignments, and brief descriptions of bill contents.

The advance committee schedule gives you the information you need to attend committee meetings, all of which are open to the public.

State of the State

Governor Rudy Perpich says he plans to bring out the "Best of Minnesota" during the next four years. He laid plans for tax reform, commitment to education, and research in his State of the State message to a joint session of the Legislature Jan. 7.

Tax reform tops the governor's list of priorities. "We must harness the momentum of federal tax reform to initiate a major overhaul of our entire tax system," he said.

"This year we will propose the most sweeping reform in the history of this state. Our tax plan will be the fairest and most thoughtful of any state in the nation this year," Perpich said. The governor's plans call for a revised tax system that is "competitive, honest, simple, and fair." He says he hopes to change the perception of Minnesota as a hightax state to attract and create more jobs.

Perpich also urges continued and increased support of public education. Excellent education will pave the way out for many dependent Minnesotans, he says, and represent "real welfare reform."

The third-term governor asks legislators to join him in establishing a "vital" goal for Minnesota's future. "By the year 2000," he told them, "I propose that 50 percent of the workforce in Minnesota will have an education two years beyond high school, and that 35 percent will have completed at least four years of college."

Perpich also calls for emphasis on research to revitalize areas of the state hurt by the shifting economy. Research investment opens doors into the next century for Minnesota to become a world-renowned research center, he says.

Minnesota House: 75th Session

Secretary of State Joan Growe, in line with the duties of her office, sounded the gavel to call the 75th Session of the Minnesota House of Representatives to order Jan. 6.

Opening day activities for 133 House members (one member was absent) included a swearing-in ceremony, adoption of temporary operating rules, and the election of the speaker--a position some legislators peg as the second most powerful spot in state government. The speaker appoints all committee chairs and members and has control over the flow of legislation in the House.

House Majority Leader Rep. Robert Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) placed Rep. Fred Norton's (DFL-St. Paul) name in nomination for the speaker's chair. Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth), a 22-year House veteran, supported the nomination saying,"His integrity, sense of fairness, and mild-mannered approach...will bring about respect for the high office of the Speaker of the House."

Independent Republicans nominated Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone) to lead the House. Minority Leader Rep. William Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park), said Carlson is a true reflection of the four million Minnesotans the body collectively represents. Carlson is a farmer and veterinarian serving his eighth term in the House.

Norton became speaker on a final vote of 82 to 51. This is Norton's second experience in the position. He also served as speaker in the 1980 session.

House profile

Twenty-seven members of the House are farmers, the most common of legislators' occupations. Educators

come in second with 23; business persons total 17. The remaining members' occupations include 13 in law, 4 homemakers, and 2 auctioneers.

The 1987-88 House of Representatives has 134 members--112 men and 22 women, 83 DFL and 51 IR. One hundred twenty-one members are married; 13 are single. The average age is 45, the youngest is 22, the oldest 76.

Fifty-six House members hold college degrees, 31 have graduate degrees, and 18 have done graduate work. Seventeen have completed some college work and/or vocational-technical training. Twelve members have attended high school.

One House member is returning for a 16th term and 29 representatives are first time members.

New House committees

Speaker of the House Fred Norton (DFL-St. Paul) created two new committees this legislative session, and renamed several others.

The new Future and Technology Committee will look at the state's long-range economic and job needs, emphasizing Minnesota's place in the world market. Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin), says the committee is a response to the need to address the governor's initiatives in high tech, research, and education.

The new Metropolitan Affairs Committee will hear Metropolitan Council recommendations and take up the problems of transportation, airport noise, and sewers in the Twin Cities seven- county area. The Local and Urban Affairs Committee will deal mainly with the needs of greater Minnesota communities.

Last year's Commerce and Economic Development Committee has become two committees: Commerce, and Economic Development and Housing. According to Rep. Todd Otis (DFL-Mpls), Economic Development and Housing Committee chair, this separation will put a better focus on creating jobs and developing the rural economy.

The Ways and Means Committee, previously the Budget Committee, will bring together fiscal concerns.

This year, the title of the Regulated Industries and Energy Committee has changed to the Regulated Industries Committee.

This year, the Taxes Committee has two divisions instead of one: Property Tax and Tax Laws.

With horse-racing a reality and the lottery a possibility in Minnesota, "gaming" has been added to the title of the General Legislation and Veterans Affairs Committee, making it General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming.

Higher Education is its own committee this session, instead of a division of the Education Committee as it was in the 1985-86 session.

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


It's a fact!

Not because Minnesota has a lot of gophers, but because a famous 1857 political cartoon lampooned the Legislature for passing a \$5 million bonding bill. The cartoon depicted rail leaders as gophers pulling the "gopher train" over the bending backs of taxpayers. From this cartoon,

came Minnesota's nickname, the "Gopher State."





The Minnesota Miracle

Addressing state legislators at the Minnesota Horizons Legislative Conference on Jan. 15, Dr. Julia Friedman, professor, Macalester College, St. Paul, said Minnesota doesn't need to abandon its 1970s tax policy goals to achieve tax reform in the 1980s. Proposed tax reform legislation would give Minnesota a fair tax policy and good economic growth.

In the early 1970s the "Minnesota Miracle" set up progressive tax policy goals to:

- increase state funding for public education;
- decrease imbalance among local property taxes; and
- base tax burden on person's ability to pay.

To keep these goals and achieve tax reform, Friedman says the state needs to take a targeted approach to tax reform. Some of this targeting would involve state assistance for communities with insufficient tax funds to provide local services, such as law enforcement. Other targeted areas involve helping low income people pay their taxes and seeing that the wealthy pay a higher percentage of income tax than the poor.

Friedman assured legislators that the goals of the Minnesota Miracle are well in reach. She also emphasized the need for Minnesota to commit to focus and target its areas of tax reform, so the state doesn't jeopardize these goals.

Learners at risk

Students in Minnesota's education system are "at risk," because they face difficulties in learning, growing, and developing due to interruptions, distractions, or disturbances. Many of these obstacles occur because of absent parents, unstable homes, poverty, drug or chemical use, and teen pregnancy, according to conference presentors at an education conference for House and Senate members Jan. 14.

Speakers from education and corporate organizations talked about these issues to help policymakers understand the situation Minnesota's education system faces with students who are "at risk," and the future implications of this problem.

Conference workshops encouraged state legislators to speak and voice their concerns and intentions to introduce and support legislation that would help reduce the number of "at risk" Minnesota children. As educators see it, a few of the issues facing legislators this session include designing legislation to:

- create better licensing procedures that will ensure high quality before and after school daycare;
- create more care centers to decrease the number of "latch-key" children who are at home after school without adult supervision;
- create an adult literacy campaign; and
- create programs to lower the rate of teenage mother dropouts.

Because many "at risk" students are from low-income families, the issue corresponds with those of welfare reform. Proposed legislation in the Minnesota House usually goes to the House Health and Human Services Committee, chaired by Lee Greenfield (DFL--Mpls), for study and public hearing.

Minnesota's economy

Minnesota's economy tends to track national cycles of growth and decline. But by1990, forecasters expect the Minnesota economy will outrun national figures in number of jobs and per capita income.

This information and more came at the fourth Minnesota Horizons Legislative Conference, "Turning Point to the '90s," in St. Paul, Jan. 13.

Briefing legislators on economic trends, Prof. James Houck of the U of M, said national economic policies and international trade strongly influence the state's economy.

Says Houck, "International trade not only affects the state's mining, manufacturing and agriculture industries, it also rips the social fabric Minnesota is made of."

Reviewing U.S. trade activity, Houck says imports are more evident in the 1980s. Prior to that, he says imports and exports closely paralleled. Today, imported goods make up 21 percent of the domestic market. This, along with the federal budget deficit and the high dollar, undercuts economic growth, Houck says.

He also says the move from manufacturing to a service-based economy is a continuing trend.

Statistics from the State Planning Agency show service-producing industries such as retail trade, professional services, finance, transportation, and communications, have dominated the state's employment growth and earnings for the last 15 years.

Houck predicts national economic policies and international events will remain prominent in the Minnesota economy. State legislatures, he cautioned, must try to provide a cushion (e.g. retraining, relocating, and early retirement) for those who feel the impact of economic change in the job market.

Government and state economy

How is a changing economy affecting Minnesota industry, jobs, families, and the workforce? Dr. Philip Raup, professor emeritus in agricutural and applied economics, University of Minnesota, gave legislators an overview of the problems and talked about government's role in the solutions at the Minnesota Horizons Legislative Conference Jan. 13.

Raup says service industries are growing fast in Minnesota, among them communications. He says, to accommodate that growth, state government should build telecommunication systems as it once built roads and brought electricity to rural areas.

However, he says social and economic change inevitably will cause unemployment and displace people, and government often creates problems when it tries to stop these effects. For example, he says government rent subsidies keep people living in areas that can't support them economically. So he suggests legislators use caution in creating jobs and assistance programs.

Raup says, too, that urban and rural economies are very similar, that technology, the changing family, and the changing nature of work affect them both. He pointed to growing numbers of people who work part time, more women in the workforce, and more people changing jobs and careers.

In families, Raup says, young people leave home and move into their own apartments at an earlier age than they did a decade ago. More elderly people live alone in their own condominiums or homes, he said.

These family changes cost more and add to individual debt. Government debt increases as government creates programs to help single-person households, Raup says.

According to Raup, when baby-boomers came of age in the '70s, some agricultural family businesses took out mortgages to help their children take over or expand. But land values plummeted in the '80s and many had to go out of business.

In the face of all of this, Raup says labor laws aren't keeping pace. Modern technology makes it possible for people to work at home, but Raup says laws often prevent it. He says the minimum wage is too high in many rural areas where the cost of living is lower than in cities, and small businesses can't afford to hire. He also says strict bonding and licensing laws stifle small businesses.

Low-level radioactive waste site

Low-level radio active waste (LLRW) comes in many forms, including contaminated lab equipment, luminous dials, sealed radiation sources, wiping rags, protective clothing, hand tools, vials, needles, test tubes, animal carcasses, filter and liquid resins, and internal components for reactors. Radioactivity levels are considered relatively small, but potentially harmful. LLRW is not considered as dangerous as high-level wastes, so it requires less rigorous isolation from the environment for a shorter period of time.

At a University of Minnesota conference, Jan. 12, Minnesota state legislators, staff, and others discussed choosing an LLRW storage site. Speakers from the Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, and the State Attorney General's Office contributed information on the topic.

Minnesota, with six other states (Iowa, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin), formed the Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact in response to laws the federal government passed in the early 1980s. In turn, the compact appointed the Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission to:

- develop policies for reducing the amount of LLRW the region produces;
- determine the type and number of facilities needed to manage the waste; and
- identify a host state(s) responsible for those facilities.

Minnesota faces two federally set milestones (deadlines) this year. On Feb. 27, the commission will name four possible host states, using as criteria the amount of waste each state generates and its radioactivity level. Then a 90-day "withdrawal clock" begins, when the four states can decide whether to remain in the compact. At the end of May (the second milestone), if no state has volunteered to host the facility, the commission will make the decision.

If Minnesota is one of the four states the commission names in February, legislators face a number of questions in the coming months. The issue is likely to come before the House and Senate Environment and Natural Resources committees.

Education needs

Educators from around the state called for stable, sufficient, and fair funding as they told Education Committee members of their needs for the next two years. At the Jan. 12 meeting, speakers for metro education groups and groups from greater Minnesota put in their bid for legislative programs and financial support. They pointed to larger decreases in funding compared to other states and said making school programs work takes a stable source.

"We cannot operate schools well when funding is going up and down as it has in the past few years," said Bob Astrup, president of Minnesota Education Association. "It's impossible for administrators to put together programs and have any kind of coordinated effort. It's tremendously difficult unless the funding is stable," he said.

Legislators say they'll look for ways to improve the quality of Minnesota education without increasing funds, but they'll also ask educators to make suggestions for improving programs.

Department of Finance report

Jay Kiedrowski, commissioner of finance, presented the Department of Finance's (DOF) Proposed Fiscal Agenda (1987-91) and Budget Stability Report to the Appropriations Committee Jan. 12.

The Proposed Fiscal Agenda includes six recommendations for state budgeting:

- maintain or improve credit rating;
- halt short-term borrowing;
- sustain budget stability;
- slow state spending;
- redesign public services to make them more
- effective and accountable; and
- reform tax structure.

The Budget Stability Report, subtitled The Limits of Forecasting--Creating a Manageable Budget, explains why state budget forecasts are wrong, leaving the state with unexpected shortfalls or surpluses. Since 1979, biennial forecasts have had a nine percent (or \$900 million) average error, the report says. Dealing with these errors often means changing public services and commitments to taxpayers. According to the report, incorrect forecasts result from complicated, changing relationships among the national economy, the state economy, the tax system and state spending.

Kiedrowski says because forecast errors are inevitable, DOF makes two recommendations for achieving budget stability. First, the legislature and administration should have a budget plan that anticipates budget deficits or surpluses. Second, DOF recommends budgets for annual, rather than biennial, cycles.

Glenn Nelson, state economist (DOF), and Nellie Johnson, deputy commissioner (DOF), went over the Minnesota Quarterly Financial Report for the Committee, and Brian Roherty, assistant commissioner (DOF), presented this session's budgeting calendar.

Rep. Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham), committee chair, said the Appropriations Committee will discuss the capital budget and sale of bonds for state construction projects at its next meeting.



Resolution protesting use of Minnesota National Guard in Central America was before the House Rules and Legislative Administration Committee Jan. 13. The committee recommended the resolution to pass. It goes next to the House floor.

Lottery issue's back on the legislative agenda in HF4. Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul) introduced the bill Jan. 12 and says, "It would be beneficial if people would tell their representatives and senators that they want the right to vote 'yes' or 'no' on the lottery."

"Minnesota Horizons--

Turning Point to the '90s," a legislative conference for state policymakers, focused on three policy areas: the rural and urban economy; human needs and the human services system; and the state's tax and finance structures. Speakers talked about emerging trends at local, national, and international levels that will shape Minnesota state policy in the 1990s. (See Highlights) Learners at risk include: 8,790 school dropouts in 1984-85; 5,235 child-bearing girls age 19 and under in 1983; 23, 649 abused or neglected children reported in 1984; and 15,608 cases of delinqency and status offenses involving children and youth processed through Juvenile Court in 1984. (See Highlight)

Minnesota observes the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution this year. Delegates to the Constitutional Convention signed the constitution on Sept. 17, 1787, and the necessary nine states ratified it by June 21, 1988. It went into effect March 4, 1789, nearly 13 years after the nation's founding by the Declaration of Independence. During most of the interim, the Articles of the Confederation governed the country.

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

HF1--Olson, K (DFL)--Agriculture

Agriculture; extending and financing the mediation and interest rate buy-down programs; appropriating money; amending laws.



State budget

What's in the state's budget and why are there so many problems getting it right? State Budget Director Brian Roherty briefly explained the budget process to Governmental Operations Committee members at a Jan. 21 meeting.

According to Roherty, twothirds of all state income has two sources--state sales tax and individual income tax. Over threefourths of that revenue goes right back to local governments for education and property tax relief.

Roherty suggests reasons for the budget gap legislators face. Two years ago, Minnesota had a \$450-million reserve that no longer exists. And, he says, "timebombs" are a problem--the legislature and the governor enact future commitments into law, but don't provide money for them in the current biennium. These commitments total more than \$600 million going into 1988 and 1989.

Roherty says the governor's budget will answer the question of how to get spending down \$1 billion and/or raise taxes to

cover the budget gap. Governor Perpich will present his budget proposal Jan. 27.


Teacher turnover

One-half of Minnesota's teachers will quit teaching during their first seven years, Commissioner of Education Ruth Randall said Jan. 21.

Randall told Education Committee members that teachers' salaries and working conditions make teachers feel powerless compared to professionals in other occupations. School administrations have to stop telling teachers how to teach and start letting them play a more professional role, she said.

"We shouldn't have teachers in checking bathrooms and monitoring halls and doing the kinds of things they're doing now," Randall said. "Instead they should be using their expertise to actually work on the two processes of teaching and learning."

Randall said that the Governor's Discussion Group report suggests state incentive programs for schools that will place teachers in rolemaking positions that match their



knowledge. She said Minnesota needs to change to attract and keep the best and brightest people as teachers for our children.

Highway funding resolution

A resolution urging Congress to free up federal highway monies moved out of the Transportation Committee Jan. 21. Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park) sponsors HF66 which will go next to the House floor for action.

Last session, Congress failed to extend the federal-aid highway program which expired last September. Under the program, states get federal aid for road work. For Minnesota, this means over \$250 million.

Testifying in favor of the bill, Roger Borg from the Federal Highway Administration said, "Many states, Minnesota included, have only the money left over from last year's budget to spend on road projects.

"Swift action by Congress early in the 1987 session is necessary, or Minnesota could lose the '87 construction season...and a number of important interstate projects that need to be finished."

Leonard Levine, newly appointed commissioner of transportation, talked directly about the impact on Minnesota. He said, "If Congress doesn't appropriate federal funds by March, we could lose \$70 million. Anytime thereafter, Minnesota would stand to lose \$90 million."

The U.S. House of Representatives is expected to take action on the highway program soon.

New Courts building

Minnesota Supreme Court Justice Lawrence Yetka told the Appropriations Committee Jan. 21 that legislators should let the judiciary have a new building. He says it's time the Legislature approve plans, 74 years in the making, for a building to house Minnesota's Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, hearing rooms, law library, judges' chambers, and administrative offices. Presently, the Supreme Court is in the State Capitol, the Court of Appeals rents space in Amhoist Tower, and administrative offices are in other St. Paul buildings. Rented space for the courts costs \$250,000 per year.

The proposed \$44 million judicial complex would include remodeling the 38,000-square-foot Minnesota Historical Society building just east of the Capitol, and building a 128,000-square-foot addition to it.

Though the Legislature has given money over the years to study, plan, and design a courts building, lawmakers have not approved money for its construction. Yetka says that's because "There are no large lobbying groups to urge the legislature to provide facilities for the judicial system." He added, "The Legislature is not just another department of the executive or a semi-state agency. It is a co-equal branch of government, and one branch (the Legislature) should help another branch (the Judiciary) do its job more efficiently."

New historical center

Nina Archabal, acting director of the Minnesota Historical Society (MHS), told the Appropriations Committee Jan. 21 that MHS needs a new building to better serve the public.

The \$57.7 million plan, designed by a Minneapolis architectural firm, includes museum galleries; a central reference room for manuscripts, newspapers, documents, photographs, and artifacts; temperature and humidity controlled storage space; an auditorium; meeting rooms; and a restaurant.

"We have to turn school groups

away because we just don't have the space," she said of the present MHS building east of the Capitol. MHS moved into that building nearly 80 years ago when goals weren't as public-oriented as they are today, says Archabal. The building may become part of a proposed courts complex Minnesota Supreme Court Justice Lawrence Yetka presented to the Appropriations Committee on Jan. 21 (see "New Courts building").

The 1985 Legislature allowed MHS to buy the \$5 million Miller Hospital site in St. Paul for a new building. But before construction can begin, the 1987 Legislature needs to approve the cost and design.

Welfare reform goals

Welfare reform proposals for Minnesota are "rather modest," according to Human Services Commissioner Sandra Gardebring. The commissioner outlined the department's goals Jan. 20 at a Health and Human Services Committee meeting.

Gardebring says reforms focus on groups such as teenage mothers and long-term welfare recipients. Some of the reforms would:

- create more jobs for welfare recipients;
- put more money into childcare for those receiving AFDC funds while training for jobs; and
- create formal links among training programs for AFDC recipients, AVTIs, and community colleges.

"I would characterize these proposals as rather modest." said Gardebring. "I understand that perhaps some who are interested in this issue were expecting something far more revolutionary."

Gardebring says that even though some welfare reform advocates say the proposals fall far short of the mark, the department doesn't lack the courage, creativity, and commitment to find new and better ways of doing things. She says the department's goal is to help people reach their maximum level of self-sufficiency.

Adoption agency records

Couples who want to adopt a child would have access to certain adoption agency records under a bill the Judiciary Committee heard Jan. 20.

The bill's author, Rep. Bob Milbert (DFL-South St. Paul), says HF41 attempts to let people examine agency records on their suitability as adoptive parents. Right now, the law allows access to suitability records only after the agency has rejected a couple's adoption application.

Speaking in favor of the bill, Bob DeNardo from Catholic Charities, said, "We see it as a joint process. There's no reason that...couples should not know, and do not know the questions that we have as we're having them."

The proposed changes still allow courts to withhold the identity of individuals who provide information for the files.

The committee plans to act on the bill Jan. 27.

AVTIs' changing role

The average age of students in Minnesota Area Vocational Technical Institutes (AVTIs) is going up each year. It's currently about 27, says Joe Graba, state AVTI director.

Graba says economic and technological changes are forcing more adults back to school. And he says the "elementary school model" requiring students to start programs in September and devote six hours a day, five days a week to class has to change to meet the needs of older students.

"The thirty-five-year-olds that have car payments and house payments

and insurance payments and groceries to buy and medical bills cannot afford to wait until next September to start their programs," Graba says. " Yet that's how we continue to operate the system."

He says part-time programs with a flexible delivery system could be the answer. Possible changes for AVTIs could include:

- •conversion to course credit system from the present class hour system;
- •part-time programs with flexible starting dates; and
- •increased cooperation with colleges and universities to ease transfer procedures.

Graba made his remarks at a Jan. 20 meeting of the Education

Division of the Appropriations Committee.

Economic trends, outlook

Low wages could be good for Minnesota's rural communities, Wilbur Maki, professor of agricultural and applied economics at the University of Minnesota, says.

He spoke to the Economic Development and Housing Committee about the state's current economy, job trends, and economic outlook, Jan. 19. Maki said, "The fact that earnings are one-third less in rural areas than in urban areas is a benefit to greater Minnesota in attracting industries. I consider it an opportunity."

But Maki also says that manufacturing isn't providing jobs to unemployed farmers now as it did in the'70s. He says manufacturing industries are down in Minnesota because of the U.S. dollar's high value and loss of markets to foreign competitors.

But some industries, such as office equipment manufacturing, business services, and health services are growing in Minnesota, according to Maki. Minnesota should make the most of this growth, but should also "restructure job requirements in manufacturing to improve our competitive position in world markets," he says.

And what should state government do to improve Minnesota's economy? According to Maki, the state should establish applied research centers to study product development. He also says colleges, universities, and vocational schools should focus on improving Minnesota's economy and train students for jobs.

Interest buydown program

The interest buydown bill, HF1, won preliminary approval from members of the Agriculture Finance Division of the Agriculture Committee Jan. 20.

The vote came after division members adopted a delete-everything amendment that trimmed dollar amounts and extended the program for one year. When Rep. Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn) first introduced the bill, it called for \$38 million to extend the program for the next two fiscal years. It also covered the program's present \$14-million deficit, and provided \$3 million for the farm mediation program that the University of Minnesota Agricultural Extension Service administers.

The bill now goes to the full Agriculture Committee. Its present version provides \$20 million to extend the interest buydown program for one year and the \$14-million deficit payment. It sets a cap of \$12 thousand on the total interest subsidy a farmer can receive. It no longer carries monies for the farm mediation program.

The mediation and interest buydown programs were part of the farm aid package the Legislature passed a year ago. The buydown program calls for lenders and the state to work together to make springoperating credit available to farmers at affordable rates of interest.

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Minnesota Trade Office


The Minnesota Trade Office won't be in the hands of the Agriculture Department under a bill likely to come before the Legislature.

According to testimony at the Agriculture, Transportation, Semi-State Division meeting Jan. 20, Governor Perpich's push to reorganize the state's three trade agencies prompted the Department of Energy and Economic Development (DEED) to put together the proposed legislation.

The purpose of the Trade Office is to promote foreign and domestic trade. For the last three years, the office has actively provided pre-export capital to qualifying small firms selling to foreign markets. Minnesota is the first state in the nation to have such a program.

Under the proposed plan, DEED would oversee the trade office. The Department of Public Service would handle energy projects. And the Trade Office would work with the World Trade Center, matching foreign companies with Minnesota firms.

Supporters say the merger would avoid duplication and make Minnesota the most intregrated and centralized international trade unit in the country.





The House Thursday, Jan. 22 passed a resolution proclaiming Jan. 25-31 as Young Astronaut Week and Jan. 28 as Challenger Day in Minnesota.

•Also passed resolution expressing the sense of the Minnesota House of Representatives that the governments of the United States and Socialist Republic of Vietnam take all action to determine persons missing in action and/or held as prisoners of war in East Asia.

•Another resolution passed expressing sense of the House that the United States Congress propose an amendment to the United States Constitution to protect human life. Also passed resolution requiring establishment of an affirmative action plan and designating an affirmative action officer for the Minnesota House of Representatives.

•House rereferred to the General Legislation, Veterans' Affairs, and Gaming Committee, a resolution congratulating the citizens of Bemidji on the 50th anniversary of Paul Bunyan's arrival to their waterfront.

•Also rereferred a concurrent resolution protesting use of the National Guard in Central America to the General Legislation, Veterans' Affairs, and Gaming Committee.

Pull tabs wouldn't be taxed upfront until Aug. 1 under HF64 (Kostohryz, DFL-St. Paul). On Jan. 22, General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee members approved the proposed delay of the new 10 percent tax which would change 1986 law. The bill now goes to the House.

As overviews in House committees continue, directors of legislative commissions described their functions before the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 22.

Glenn Nelson, state economist, and Lee Munnich, deputy commissioner of the Department of Energy and Economic Development, presented their views of Minnesota's economy to the Economic Development and Housing Committee Jan. 22.

Metropolitan government agencies' chairs and directors briefed the Metropolitan Affairs Committee Jan. 21 on their activities and concerns. Tom Todd, House researcher/legal analyst, gave an overview of metropolitan government and finance.

Representative Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) and Senator Bill Luther (DFL-Brooklyn Park) joined State Finance Commissioner Jay Kiedrowski to discuss the state budget and its impact on Minnesota counties at the 87th annual Conference of the Association of Minnesota Counties, Jan. 20.






Do You Know

- be at least 21 years of age.



Wastewater treatment facilities

As many as 189 Minnesota municipalities are in need of new or improved wastewater treatment facilities, and some don't have much time, said Tim Scherkenbach of the Pollution Control Agency (PCA). They must meet federal water quality standards by July 1, 1988.

Scherkenbach, at the Local and Urban Affairs Committee meeting Jan. 29, updated lawmakers on PCA's 10-year plan to get the state in compliance with federal regulation.

He says 468 municipalities are in compliance, but many small communities on the national policy list are waiting for funding to complete first-time sewagecontrol projects. Also, Scherkenbach says, 20 percent of the sewers in St. Paul, Minneapolis, and South St. Paul are separate.

Scherkenbach estimates the state and its municipalities will have to pay out \$400 million over the upcoming years to complete the 10-year plan. Eightyfour million dollars would come

from the federal government, he says.

After the federal compliance deadline, Scherkenbach says a revolving loan fund will replace state and federal grant programs. Municipalities would use the fund to upgrade wastewater treatment facilities.

Education budget

Commissioner of Education Ruth Randall says she's delighted that the governor has kept his promise and made education number one in his proposed budget.

Randall and members of the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee took their first look at the governor's new budget proposal on Jan 28.

Education programs are the biggest budget winners. Under the governor's plan, education funding would go up \$570 million, an increase of 14 percent.

Twenty-six percent of state money would go directly to school districts as foundation aid. The state would also give school districts another 20 percent to help reduce school

It's a fact!

property taxes.

Randall said the governor, through his plan, hopes to challenge school districts with incentive programs, and not mandate action. Money would be available to schools that start improvement programs such as staff development and open enrollment, she said.

Crime victim emergency aid

"We receive several calls each week from victims who are in need of immediate, small types of cash assistance to provide them with immediate safety needs, shelter needs, or needs that cannot be met through other sources of assistance," says Fern Sepler-King.

Sepler-King, who is the executive director of the Crime Victim and Witness Advisory Council, spoke in favor of HF144 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) before the Judiciary Committee Jan. 27.

The bill would create a special fund that would allow law enforcement officials to offer on-the-spot assistance to people who've suffered personal or property damage.

According to Sepler-King, the money could be paid directly to victims, or wherever possible, directly to those providing goods or services to a crime victim.

The Judiciary Committee recommended the bill to pass. It goes next to the Appropriations Committe.

Day care

Student representatives from state colleges, universities and AVTIs called for affordable, quality oncampus child care during their meeting with the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee members Jan 27.

Students say the increasing number of non-traditional students places a greater burden on campus day care. University of Minnesota students compete for space in three on campus facilities, according to University representative Bob Trewartha. He said the system serves only 300 children of the estimated 2,600 students who need to find day care. The limited space leaves 400 to 500 students on waiting lists each semester, he said.

AVTI student Jon Olson told committee members that less than one- third of Minnesota's 34 AVTI campuses currently have child care facilities. He said affordable, dependable child care is an especially important issue to students who attend AVTI classes in rural areas of Minnesota.

Students stress the fact that available child care is an access issue for older students who must find affordable day care services before they can return to school. They urge legislators to strengthen state-funded child care facilities on campuses throughout the state.

Environmental issues

Environmental groups made their legislative priorities known at an Environment and Natural Resources Committee meeting Jan. 27. People representing the Audubon Society, Clean Water Action Project, Izaak Walton League, Minnesota Public Interest Research Group, League of Women Voters of Minnesota, The Nature Conservancy, RIM Coalition, and Sierra Club presented background information on their organizations and voiced concerns such as:

• additional funding for the Reinvest in Minnesota (RIM) project;

• pollution issues, including storage and disposal of hazardous wastes (both low-level radioactive wastes

and household hazardous wastes); and
a mandatory deposit on beverage containers.

Mail order sales tax

Direct marketing sellers could begin collecting sales and use tax for states in which they sell.

A proposed resolution, HF 135 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls), would allow Minnesota to collect substantial revenue from mail order purchases in the state that it can't collect under a 20-year-old Supreme Court ruling. The Taxes Committee recommended passage of the resolution Jan. 27.

Chief author McLaughlin says, "Minnesota businesses are at a significant disadvantage because the mail order companies don't charge sales tax. There's a significant loss of state revenue--revenues that are rightly due the state."

According to Dorothy McClung, director of legal and legislative affairs, Department of Revenue, Minnesota is losing about \$30 million a year from sales tax revenue due to mail order business. She says the resolution would require companies to collect taxes for all states in which they sell.

If the Minnesota Legislature passes the resolution, it will go on to Congress.

Funding for State Departments Agencies

Legislative analyst Lisa Larson presented the 1987 House Research guide "Funding for State Departments Agencies" to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 27.

The guide gives sources of funding for the nearly 50 state agencies that receive funding through House and Senate State Departments Divisions. "The guide shows the relationship between the type of funding structure the Legislature selects for an agency and the extent of control the Legislature has over that agency," Larson says.

It's the first such guide the research department has produced, and Chair

Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) says, "It is one of the most useful documents I've ever seen."

Less money for states

Attorneys Jim Holmes of Holmes and Graven, Tim Marx of Briggs and Morgan, and Jim Solem, director of the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency, explained the effects of new federal tax laws on bonding to the Economic Development and Housing Committee Jan. 27.

The U.S. Congress cut the amount of money states can use per year for private activity bonds in half, from \$150 per capita in 1986, to \$75 per capita in 1987. In 1988, bonding amounts will further decrease to \$50 per capita.

With less money for private activity bonds, and new restrictions on the use of government activity bonds, competition for bonds will increase.

Minnesota's Legislature, says Solem, will need to decide how much bond money to use for manufacturing, housing, and student loans, and how much authority state, county, and city governments will have in granting bonds.

Open enrollment

Most high school students want to represent their hometown or neighborhood in school activities and probably wouldn't use the open enrollment option if they had the chance, according to a representative of the Minnesota Association of Secondary School Principals.

Education experts and members of the Education Finance Division of the Appropriations Committee discussed questions surrounding open enrollment at their Jan. 26 meeting. Brooklyn Center High School principal Dennis Morrow said that given the chance to decide, students usually pick the school closest to home that offers the greatest chance for involvement.

Morrow said an agreement between Brooklyn Center and Anoka school districts allows 10th graders to change schools. He said 86 percent of the students who made the one-time move during the past two years made the decision on their own, without the influence of parents.

Legislators say they're concerned that students might switch schools strictly for athletic programs without considering the educational effects. But, Morrow said 55 percent of students in his district chose to participate in extracurricular activities after deciding to transfer.

Morrow said offering enrollment choice to Brooklyn Center and Anoka students has worked very well. "I think students who want to be at a certain school are going to be less of a disciplinary problem and they're going to like school more," he said.

Winona State University

Winona State University officials say they need to take advantage of Winona's high-tech business climate to establish a new engineering program. Several companies in the area make composite materials for aerospace, medical, and recreation industries. Composite materials are durable, light-weight compounds made from resins and fibers.

At the first meeting of the new Future and Technology Committee Jan. 26, Dr. Thomas Stark, Winona State University president, told lawmakers that the school needs a composites science engineering program. According to Stark, the proposed program is an effort to make the state an industry leader in composite materials.

Stark says, "We think that students who would be in this engineering program would have an unusual educational experience being in a laboratory setting in these industries. We want to carve out a niche in the state and support the surrounding industries." Committee Chair Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin), says one of the goals of the new committee is to move high technology into greater Minnesota, and keep promoting it in the metro area.

Smaller classes in elementary schools

Minnesota educators are calling for smaller classes in elementary schools to help improve the remedial education of students.

Bob Arnold, executive director of Minnesota Elementary School Principals, told the Education Committee that students' reading skills will keep getting worse if elementary classrooms stay the way they are now.

Arnold says a combination of factors are responsible for declining reading and writing skills such as: changing family structure, increased classroom size, and greater diversity of skill levels within a single classroom.

Arnold urges legislators to consider programs that would limit class sizes to 18 to 20 students. He says smaller classes with more one-on-one teaching could help raise school achievement levels.

Arnold spoke at the Education Committee's Jan. 26 meeting.

Restructuring the DNR

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) needs to be more responsive to local concerns, says Aaron Reynolds of Touche Ross and Co. accounting firm. The Legislature hired the firm to do an organization and management study of the DNR.

Reynolds told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 26 that the DNR often responds to local concerns from behind the scenes, without consulting or informing the community. The DNR's isolation

from the public causes resentment, hostility, and suspicion, he says.

To solve this problem, Touche Ross and Co. recommends that regional administrators develop plans addressing local concerns, and act as spokespersons for the DNR commissioner.

But the firm also says the DNR needs to balance local problems with statewide policies and goals. And the department needs to more clearly define responsibilities of DNR divisions and bureaus.

While Touche Ross and Co. didn't present a budget, structural changes in the DNR would cost money. House members on the State Departments Division, faced with no increases in the governor's budget proposal and an overall budget shortfall, said they're concerned about the cost, practicality, and effectiveness of the firm's recommendations.

Farm loan interest buydown

The farm interest buydown bill jumped another hurdle Jan. 26 when the Agriculture Committee unanimously voted to extend the program for one year.

As it stands now, HF1 provides \$20 million for program extension and \$14 million to pay off the program's present deficit. It also sets a cap of \$12,500 on the total interest subsidy a farmer can get. The cap, according to the bill's author, Rep. Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn), will limit participation and stretch program dollars.

Some committee members questioned the cap. Among them was Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter) who said the cap may hurt farmers most in need of the program.

An attempt to do away with the cap failed by legislators who favor raising the debt-to-asset ration to limit participation.

The bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Youth in government

More than 750 youth from about 125 high schools and YMCAs across the state got a firsthand experience running state government. They took part in a four-day YMCA Youth in Government event at the State Capitol Jan. 22-25.

During the four-day mock session, students assumed roles in the three main branches of state government. At a special convention last November, the youth elected judicial, constitutional, and legislative officers, and appointed about 50 cabinet-level positions.

Rep. Peter Rodosovich (DFL-Faribault), director of the program, says the program helps youth work with and respect people. He says it also helps them to better understand and appreciate the legislative process and to be responsible voters and citizens.

Some students took roles of media personnel: television and newspaper reporters, anchors, and technical personnel. Some were pages, some lobbyists for mock sessions of the House and Senate.

They met with actual lobbyists, drafted bills, and determined lobbying strategy. Most participants had opportunities to meet their real-life counterparts.

Proposed budget plan


The Ways and Means Committee recommended adoption of a plan Jan. 22 that would give the House until March 31 to set state tax and spending limits for the next two years.

Committee Chair and Speaker of the House Fred Norton (DFL-St. Paul) says the new budget plan would allow time for deliberation and public testimony, and a more accurate budget proposal.

Norton says, "The proposal is a coming together of the taxing ability and the needs of the taxpayers."

The plan comes later in the session than a similar budget plan did two years ago. It goes next to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee, and then to the House floor for consideration.





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YMCA Youth in Government

Unemployment compensation, workers' compensation, and minimum wage were the topics of Jan. 26 Labor-Management Relations Committee meeting. Business and labor leaders from Minnesota Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Independent Business Association of Minnesota, National Federation of Independent Businesses, Minnesota AFL-CIO, and Minnesota Teamsters Union testified.

"DAV is financially sound. Therefore, we are withdrawing our request of \$25,000," John Merthan told the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division Jan. 26. Merthan's state adjutant for Minnesota's Disabled American Veterans Department (DAV). Merthan says successful thrift store and members' support has made DAV self-sufficient.

Minnesota and other Great Lakes states lose tourists to

southern states, especially in the winter, said Hank Todd at Jan. 27 Commerce Committee meeting. To even the score, Todd says in July and August, when blistering heat hits southern states, Great Lakes states may team up and push their "natural air-conditioning." Todd's director of the Office of Tourism, recent winner of 1986 National Travel Marketing Award for its Explore Minnesota promotional packet.

The State Departments Division of Appropriations toured the Department of Employee Relations Jan. 27.

Annual Minnesota highway deaths are down from 610 to 570 Paul Tschida, commissioner of public safety reported Jan. 28 at a Transportation Committee meeting. Tschida says the state's made progress with DWI offenders who are social drinkers, but a lot of hard-core drunk drivers are still on the roads.

The House unanimously approved a resolution Jan. 26 urging Congress to free up federal highway money. Congress adjourned last year without reauthorizing the federal-aid highway program. The program gives federal aid to states for road work. For Minnesota, this means over \$250 million.

House appointees to the Commission on the Economic Status of Women are: Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls); Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn); Sidney Pauly (IR-Eden Prairie); Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope); and Gloria Segal (DFL-St. Louis Park).

Minnesota and five other Great Lakes states put retailers on notice to voluntarily register by March 31 to collect sales and use tax from out-of-state customers or they'll be subject to audits. States will exchange the names of customers. Action's part of the Great Lakes States Interstate Sales Compact. Purpose: to enforce sales and use tax laws. Other states in the compact: Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. The Health and Human Services Committee will tour St. Paul Children's Hospital Thursday, Feb. 5. A bus will leave from the front of the State Office Building at 10:05 a.m.

Legislators will have to keep Minnesota's competitive situation in mind when determining tax reforms, said House Minority Leader Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) at Jan. 29 Taxes Committee meeting. He says lawmakers must look at what other states are doing because Minnesota's in a competitive environment.

Three bills that would reject the recommended salary adjustments for legislators, constitutional officers, and the judiciary were on the agenda for Governmental Operations Committee Jan. 29. Discussion will continue at the committee's meeting early next week on HF39 (Shaver, IR-Wayzata), HF40 (MCPherson, IR-Stillwater), and HF68 (Vanasek, DFL-New Prague).

Environment and Natural Resources Committee heard testimony favoring HF91, the Minnesota Pipeline Safety Act (Knuth, DFL-New Brighton) Jan. 29. The committee plans to hear opponents of the bill Feb. 3.

HOW A BILL BECOMES A LAW

A bill is an idea for a new law, or an idea to abolish or change an existing law. Several thousand bills enter the legislative process in Minnesota each time the Legislature meets.

Minnesota has a bicameral Legislature, or two groups of elected citizens (senators in the Senate, representatives in the House of Representatives) who study, discuss, and vote on bills, acting for the people of Minnesota. Bills begin their legislative journey in either the House or the Senate, or both. To become a law, all bills must pass in both the House and Senate, and be approved and signed by the governor.

The idea

Anyone can propose an idea for a bill - an individual, consumer group, corporation, professional association, governmental unit, or the governor. Most ideas come from members of the Legislature. The revisor of statutes puts the ideas for bills into proper legal form as a bill for introduction. Only legislators can introduce bills into the lawmaking process.

Chief author

The legislator who sponsors and introduces the bill in the Legislature is the chief author. The chief author's name appears on the bill with the bill's file number for identification as it moves through the legislative process. The chief author may select up to four other authors, whose names also appear on the bill.

Introduction in the Legislature

When the author introduces a bill in the House, it gets a House File (HF) number (HF264, for example), indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction. In the Senate, the bill gets a Senate File (SF) number (SF224, for example). Each HF in the House usually has a companion SF in the Senate. All revenue-raising bills must begin in the House.

Committee consideration

At introduction, the bill has its first reading. (The Minnesota Constitution requires three readings on three separate days for all bills.) The presiding officer of the House or Senate refers the bill to an appropriate committee for action. All committee meetings are open to the public. A committee may: recommend passage of a bill in its original form; recommend passage of a bill after it has been amended by the committee; or make no recommendation, in which case a bill may die when the session ends. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its actions and recommendations to the House or Senate.

General orders

After approval of the committee report in the House and Senate, the bill has its second reading and goes onto General Orders-a list of bills waiting House action. House members, acting as the Committee of the Whole, discuss bills, debate the issues, adopt amendments, and present arguments. They may recommend that a bill "do pass," be postponed, or have further committee action.

Calendar

The calendar is a list of bills the Committee of the Whole recommends to pass. At this point, a bill has its third reading. Amendments to a bill on the Calendar must have the unanimous consent of all House members in this final vote. By committee recommendation, noncontroversial bills may bypass General Orders and go directly onto a Consent Calendar, usually passing without debate. Every bill requires a majority vote of the full membership of the House and Senate to pass.

Conference Committee

If the House and Senate do not agree on a bill, a conference committee of three or five senators, and an equal number of representatives, meets to reach an agreement. If both bodies then pass the bill in compromise form, it goes to the governor.

Governor

When a bill arrives at the governor's office, the governor may: sign it, and the bill becomes law; veto it (return it with a "veto message" stating the objections); pocket veto the bill (take no action and let adjournment of the Legislature, in effect, veto the bill); or line veto portions of appropriation bills. If the governor does not sign or veto a bill within three days after receiving it, and the Legislature is in session, the bill automatically becomes law.





Do You Know

To "progress" a bill on the House floor means to *delay* its consideration-- temporarily.

Even though a member requests progress, a bill on General Orders (a list of bills that have been reported out of committee and had a second reading) keeps its place . But on the third request, the bill loses its place and goes to the end of General Orders, unless the member requests that it retain its place.

"Progress" originated in English Parliament and meant to "pass over or around." This definition, though no longer found in most contemporary dictionaries, has been in use in the Minnesota legislative process for over 100 years. To progress a House bill on the floor, means to pass over.

State Courts' budget

Minnesota's court system needs more money to buy computers and hire staff, according to Sue Dosal, state court administrator. She told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 5 the system needs both to give the public faster court service.

State Courts' budget requests include \$1.5 million to expand the computer service Trial Court Information System to 28 additional counties. Under the proposal, computer center headquarters would be in Beltrami, Blue Earth, Itasca, Kandiyohi, Lyon, and Winona counties. Dosal says the computer system improves financial and records management, makes court administration more efficient, and helps the courts respond better to public need.

Dosal also asks legislators to grant funding for six additional Supreme Court clerks. Dosal says that even though the Supreme Court's caseload has decreased since the establishment of the Court of Appeals in 1983,

the Court's workload has increased because only the most difficult cases make it to the Supreme Court.

In addition, the judiciary asks that legislators continue the 1986 Family Farm Legal Assistance Program, offering legal advice to Minnesota farmers in financial trouble.

Investment board

The State Board of Investment will have greater investment flexibility if the Legislature approves HF186 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley).

Howard Bicker, executive director, presented the board's recommendations in HF186 to the Governmental Operations Committee Feb. 5.

Bicker says HF186 would give the board the authority to purchase certain high-yield debt obligations and foreign securities. He says this would allow the board to enhance investment returns without adding to investment risk.

It's the board's bill, says Bicker, and "we're requesting additional flexibility that we believe in the long run will enhance our ability to

It's a fact!

Minnesota's Legislature is in its Diamond Jubilee session (75th). A look back at an early dilemma gives us reason to celebrate.

maximize the total rate of return."

The bill would also require the board to adopt an investment policy statement. Bicker says the statement would provide guidelines to assure that any future changes in either the make up of the board or staff would maintain the policies the board has in place.

The committee recommended the bill to pass. It goes next to the full House.

Interest buydown program

Farmers who qualify may pay only half the interest on their loans again this year. HF1 (Olson, K., DFL-Sherburn), the interest buydown bill, won approval in the Appropriations Committee Feb. 4.

The interest buydown program goes back to 1985. That year, over 1,000 farmers got operating loans. Changes to the program came in 1986, and its popularity grew. Farm borrowers exhausted its \$5 million appropriation in 10 days, and as a result, the Department of Commerce returned hundreds of loan applications. Later, when the program reopened, more than 6,000 farmers got loans. The higher-thanexpected demand for farm loans ran the state \$14 million in the hole.

Under HF1, as amended in the Agriculture, Transportation, and Semi-State Division Feb. 2, the commissioner of commerce could not accept loan applications after the program has spent its \$20 million in appropriated funds. Legislators say this should prevent future deficits. Other provisions in the bill would extend the buydown program for another year and provide for payment of the program's \$14-million deficit. It also sets a \$12,500 cap on the total interest subsidy a farmer can get.

Representatives will vote on the bill next week on the House floor.

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Farm mediation program

The Minnesota farmer-lender mediation program works according to farm mediators who testified at the Agriculture Committee's Agriculture Finance Division meeting Feb. 4.

"Farmers and lenders are meeting at the table to restructure debts to head off foreclosures. It's my job to even out the sides of the table," says Ward Nefstead, a volunteer mediator from Waseca.

Nefstead says he has settled 90 percent of his cases. He says mediation works if people make a commitment to the process. The mediation program allows farmers facing foreclosure to meet with lenders for up to 60 days to settle debt problems. Mediators schedule these meetings and guide the discussion.

According to a status report from the University of Minnesota Agricultural Extension Service mediation has settled over 1,000 cases. As of Jan. 2, some 3,000 farmers requested mediation statewide. Fifty-one percent of the requests came from farmers in Southwestern Minnesota.

Higher ed teamwork

The Education Division of the Appropriations Committee looked at the Higher Education Advisory Council (HEAC) plan to improve student education while strengthening state institutions. At the division's Feb. 4 meeting, questions focused on transfer of credits, educational access, and state funding.

Gerald Christenson, HEAC Chair, says the Council's mission differentiation plan would still provide educational access to students in the state, but not at every institution. He says the University, state universities, community colleges, and AVTIs would each have an area of specialization. He says changes would more fully use Minnesota's community college and state university systems. The plan to decrease University of Minnesota enrollment would really serve undergraduate students better, according to Christenson. "I don't see where it serves the people of the state to have 2,500 students sitting in an auditorium at the University of Minnesota watching a video tape," he says. "Is that quality? We think the vast majority of freshmen and sophomores would receive as good an education, and in many cases a better education at a community college or state university."

Christenson says joint admission could better serve students who want to attend the University. A proposed plan would automatically admit students to upper division courses at the University after completing general course requirements at a community college or state university.

Rep. John Rose (IR-Roseville) says encouraging college transfer brings back an across the board problem involving transfer of credits.

"I think the problem is that there are some people out there that are either ill advised, misinformed, or they assume too much," he said. "When they go to school, they think the whole state system is intermingled and that if they take classes here or there they'll transfer anywhere."

Christenson says it's a problem that will never go away, but the systems are working to bridge credit transfer gaps. A recent agreement will make transfers between community colleges and state universities easier, he said. Also, he said a similar agreement is in the works between community colleges and the University of Minnesota.

Aging veterans

The national American Legion commander says current state and federal veterans programs are dragging behind the needs of aging veterans.

Commander James P. "Jimmy" Dean shared his personal observations and concerns about veterans programs at a joint meeting of the House General Legislation, Veterans Affairs, and Gaming Committee and the Senate Veterans Committee Feb. 4.

Dean says federal program dollars have been shrinking for the past 10 years, while needs for hospital and nursing home care have grown quickly. Although Congress keeps passing veterans' legislation, he says, they know the Veterans Administration will tighten its belt if there isn't enough money to back the services.

"We cannot continue to shrink the services offered to 2.7 million veterans in the United States," says Dean. He hopes Minnesota can help fund programs needed by veterans.

Pipeline Safety Act

The Minnesota Pipeline Safety Act got a favorable recommendation from the Environment and Natural Resources Committee Feb. 3. HF91 addresses safety issues that arose after the gas pipeline explosion in Mounds View last summer.

The bill would create a statewide notification center that excavators could call to locate underground lines before digging. Supporters say this will help cut down on accidents and damage to underground lines.

Another provision in the bill would create the Office of Pipeline Safety. One of the duties of the office would be to promote the 9-1-1 telephone system to notify emergency responders of pipeline releases. It would also work with local emergency management and civil defense groups to train personnel and develop emergency response plans.

No one opposed the bill at this hearing. It goes next to the Transportation Committee.

Welfare reform

One welfare reform goal in Minnesota is to help people on welfare rolls become self-sufficient, says Randy Johnson, co-chair of the Governor's Commission on Welfare Reform. Johnson, who is also Hennepin County Commissioner, spoke to members of the Health and Human Services Committee Feb. 3.

He says the system should encourage welfare recipients to get out of the poverty cycle. He says, "Instead of a system that asks, 'How comfortable can we make you while you're on it?', the focus has to be, 'How can we help you get off the system?' or 'How can the system help you become as self-sufficient as possible?'''

Johnson says reform would focus on young mothers and long-term recipients. Reform would also create greater case management and require recipients to take self-sufficiency programs and develop self-sufficiency plans.

Drunk driving

Drunk driving on Minnesota roads has been cut in half in the past 10 years. That's the good news, Forst Lowery, state alcohol safety coordinator, told the Judiciary Committee's Crime and Family Law Division Feb. 2.

Multiple offenders are the hard-core problem, according to Lowery. More than 20,000 Minnesota drivers have been arrested three or more times for DWI. Lowery says Minnesota probably does the best job of any state in meeting the DWI problem through good laws, enforcement, and getting problem drinkers into treatment.

But, he says, that's not enough. Minnesota should do a better job of preventing drunk driving instead of just catching, punishing, and treating one out of 100 people. Lowery suggests the state consider efforts to: • encourage or require commercial licensed sellers and private social hosts to serve alcohol responsibly;

- promote and encourage efforts to deglamorize heavy drinking;
- increase social acceptance of not drinking;
- provide drug and alcohol education for children in early grades;

• find ways to separate drinking occasions from driving occasions; and

• consider public or alternative transportation in locating and licensing drinking places.

The division expects to hear prevention proposals soon.

Criminal trials

The prosecution and defense lined opposite sides of the room, as a bill proposing changes to criminal trial procedure had its first hearing Feb. 3. HF137 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), drew some 30 people to the Judiciary Committee to testify for and against it.

The bill would allow the court, in most cases, to jointly try two or more defendants in court for the same crime. It would also allow the prosecution a chance to respond to the defendant's closing argument. And, in certain cases, it would give the prosecution and defense the same number of chances to challenge and remove a juror without explaining why.

Supporters claim the bill is one way to head off increasing crime rates and to better respond to crime victims' needs. Opponents claim the legislation's not needed--that the courts should have the right to set their own rules and procedures.

Testimony will continue at the next Judiciary Committee meeting, Feb. 10.

Minimum wage

Joe Samargia, commissioner of jobs and training, says Minnesota lawmakers should raise the minimum wage. He discussed jobs and training

with the Economic Development and Housing Committee Feb. 3.

When asked about his position on minimum wage, Samargia said, "I think it's really difficult for anybody that's sitting in this room to say they could work for \$3.35 and make a living. I don't think any one of us could." He pointed out that the minimum wage has been the same for six years, even though cost of living has gone up. "The issue should be debated in Washington," Samargia said.

Workers' rights

Jay Benanav, assistant commissioner of labor and industry, says his department is primarily concerned with protecting workers' rights.

At the Unemployment Compensation and Workers' Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Committee meeting Feb. 2, Benanav explained the process of making a worker's compensation claim.

The Department of Labor and Industry not only helps workers, but also employers, insurance companies, and doctors understand workers' compensation laws. But, Benanav says, the department spends most of its time helping workers because they often don't know the laws.

Technology development

Executives from high-tech corporations and experts in technology development told the new Future and Technology Committee Feb. 2, that Minnesota needs to position itself for future technologyintensive industries.

Don Sullivan, president and CEO, MTS Systems and member of the Minnesota High Tech Council, says the state needs to strengthen education in science and technology, starting in kindergarten. He also says the state needs to put heavier emphasis on research programs in state universities. "For the state to develop technology-intensive industries in greater Minnesota, we need to invest in our universities. Industry in greater Minnesota will not grow unless there is a university around," says Sullivan.

Herbert Johnson, president of the Minnesota Technology Corridor Corp., says the objective of the corridor is to encourage and foster the development of technology-intensive industry in the state. And corridor supporters want to spin off technology-intensive companies in greater Minnesota.

The corporation is a joint effort including Minneapolis, the University of Minnesota, the state, and private industry. The corridor is an area between the University of Minnesota and the Minneapolis downtown business district. It hosts and helps develop high-tech companies. The corridor's first major development came in 1986 with the completion of the Supercomputer Center.

Attorney General's Office

Attorney General Skip Humphrey requests a \$2.5 million budget increase for his office in 1988-89. He presented his proposal to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 2.

Humphrey says his top priorities include computerizing the Attorney General's Office for greater efficiency, and increasing attorneys' salaries.

Also, he says, starting salaries at the Attorney General's Office are \$4,000 less than other public law firms, and \$15,000 less than private firms. Elected public lawyers in metropolitan counties and at the University of Minnesota make \$5,000-\$15,000 more than lawyers in the Attorney General's Office. Humphrey says the Legislature needs to correct these salary disparities so the office can attract and keep top lawyers.

New commissioner of energy and economic development, David Speer, presented department's program to the Economic Development and Housing Committee Jan. 29.

Members of the Future and Technology Committee will take a high technology tour Tuesday, Feb. 10 from 2 to 5 p.m. Tour sites include Pillsbury Co., Life Corporation, and University of Minnesota Super Computer Institute. For transportation, members will meet at front entrance of the State Office Building.

Artists from across the

country (60 Minnesotans) will showcase and sell their work for five days in April, Sam Grabarski told members of the Agriculture, Transportation, Semi-State Division Feb. 4. Grabarski, executive director of the Minnesota State Arts Board, says American Craft Enterprise selected Minnesota to sponsor one of four national craft fairs. Show's at the St. Paul Civic Center April 8 -12.

On a scale of zero to 10, Minnesota farmers give AVTIs a rating of 8. According to John Ostrem that's because AVTIs have beefed up agricultural programs-adding 19 management programs to their curricula. Ostrem from the State Board of Vocational Technical Institutes says farmers who take the programs better their chances of staying in business. He spoke to the Agriculture Committee Feb. 2.

Department of health commissioner, Sister Mary Madonna Ashton, brought her department's budget to the Health and Human Services Division/ Appropriations Feb. 2 and 3.

Some of hottest issues this session are minimum wage, prior notice of plant closings, workers' compensation, and unemployment compensation, said members of the Labor Management Relations Committee. Discussion came at Feb. 3 meeting when leaders from Minnesota Retail Merchants Association, Minnesota AFL-CIO, Department of Employee Relations, and Department of Labor and Industry gave overviews of their organizations.

Revenue Commissioner Tom Triplett presented the Governor's

budget and tax initiatives to the Taxes Committee Jan. 29 and Feb.
Committee discussed income tax, property tax, and corporate tax reform. Triplett urged action on income tax reform legislation in '87, in accordance with '86 federal reform.

Drunk driving costs Minnesota taxpayers \$40 million a year--\$1,000 for each

drunk driving arrest. Cost is \$3,000 to \$7,000 for the average person who finds him/herself under arrest on a DWI charge. Drunk drivers spend nearly 200,000 days in jail per year, an average of about five days each. Repeat drunk drivers take up 11 percent of Minnesota jail capacity at a average cost of \$38 per day. (Statistics from committee testimony by Minnesota Department of Public Safety).

Last week the DAV withdrew a request for \$25,000 in state

funds. (see "Notes," *Session Weekly*, Jan. 30, 1987). Feb. 4, the House recognized DAV action by adopting House Resolution 14 commending the Disabled American Veterans Department "for outstanding service and their willingness to continue this service without financial aid from the state of Minnesota for this biennium."

Local government aid may take a cut if legislators back the governor's budget recommendations, says Steve Hinze, a House researcher. Hinze spoke at the Feb. 5 Local and Urban Affairs Committee meeting. He says the governor's recommendations call for across-theboard cuts of about 1.5 percent, and a phase-out of the aid program by 1988.

United States Congress The House Public Information Office can give you names of Minnesota's members of Congress.

BILLS Need a copy of a bill? The Chief Clerk's Office can give you copies of bills and resolutions.

You can get the information you want about bills on the CRT. House Index lists bills by committee and by over 150 topics (e.g. environment, taxes, education) on the CRT.

You can call the *House Bill* Status Line for a 24-hour recorded message on the day's committee activities on bills, (612) 297-1264.

became law? Bills that became law are on the CRT in House Index. The House Public Information Office also publishes brief summaries of new laws each session. Call the Information Office to get on the summary mailing list.



They also declared they would legalize their acts upon admission of the state into the Union. On March 25, 1858, they recessed until June 2, and finally adjourned Aug. 12 after passing some important measures. Among those, the famous, much-protested, \$5 million loan bill to aid the construction of railroads and provide a basis for banking in Minnesota.

Although the first Legislature had solved its governorless, stateless dilemma, the duly elected first governor of the new state of Minnesota, Henry H. Sibley, never signed the first 124 bills the Legislature passed. He signed his first bill into law June 10, 1858.

Nonpoint source pollution

Nonpoint source pollution is probably the key water quality issue that the country has to come to grips with, says Tom Kalitowski, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (PCA) director. He spoke to the Environment and Natural Resources Committee Feb. 12.

According to the PCA, nonpoint source pollution is pollution that has no single source. It comes from sources such as polluted runoff from agricultural land, from city streets and storm sewers, and construction sites. The agency estimates about 75 percent of the pollution in Minnesota's surface waters, lakes, and streams is attributable to nonpoint sources.

Kalitowski says the problem is difficult and solutions complex. He says it's going to involve changes in activities on the surface of the land--what we do with storm water in cities and urban areas, or how we apply pesticides and agricultural chemicals in farm areas.

HIGHLIGHTS

According to Kalitowski, the PCA and six or seven other state agencies have worked for over a year to come up with recommendations to handle nonpoint source pollution. He says the governor's budget recommends funding for a Clean Water Partnership among those state agencies.

'No refund' notices

"No refund" signs would appear in retail shop windows, or somewhere in the owner's shop, if that's the owner's return policy.

Feb. 12, the Consumer Affairs Subcommittee recommended to pass a bill that would require retailers who don't give refunds to post a notice of their no-refund policy in a conspicuous place. If they don't post notice, the bill requires them to give cash refunds to customers for returnable goods or credit their accounts for goods they purchased with credit cards.

HF65 requires consumers to return goods soon after buying,

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with proof of purchase. The bill applies only to personal, family, or household goods, not commercial or agricultural goods, or goods consumers buy for business purposes. The bill would exclude retailers who give refunds and car dealers.

Rep. Harold Lasley (DFL-Cambridge) is author of HF65 which goes next to the Commerce Committee.

Pipeline Safety Act

HF91, the pipeline safety bill, moved out of the Transportation Committee Feb. 11 with the support of all 27 committee members.

The bill's thrust is to improve pipeline safety and public awareness, and speed up emergency response to pipeline leaks. Moreover, it gives the state a more active role in overseeing the miles of pipelines within its borders says the bill's author Rep. Daniel Knuth (DFL-New Brighton).

Knuth says he lives about a halfmile from where the Williams' pipeline exploded last July. The explosion killed a woman and her daughter and prompted Knuth to sponsor HF91.

Key provisions in the bill would: • create a pipeline safety office. The office would inspect and test pipelines, enforce federal pipeline safety laws, and require pipeline owners to provide public education on pipeline operation and safety; • establish a one-call system to reduce third-party dig-in accidents. The bill requires excavators to contact the statewide notification center 48 hours before digging; • promote the use of the 9-1-1

statewide emergency telephone system to notify state and local officials of pipeline leaks or spills;

require counties to set up emergency response plans;
authorize the Environmental

Quality Board to designate routes for pipelines; and

• require pipeline operators to file information about the location and

operation of pipelines in the state.

No one testified in opposition to the bill. Knuth says the industry supports the bill's concept but, he says, they're concerned about costs.

HF91 goes next to the Regulated Industries Committee.

House budget resolution

A budget resolution became part of the 1987-88 Permanent Rules of the House Feb. 11. House members spent two days debating and amending the rules before adopting them.

The budget resolution first appeared in House rules for the 1985-86 session. This session's version requires the Ways and Means Committee to present a budget to the full House within seven days after the governor presents the last state revenue forecast during the regular legislative session, or March 31, whichever is earlier.

The budget resolution, when presented, will set a general fund maximum limit on spending and taxes for fiscal years 1988-89. It will also establish an amount to set aside as a budget reserve. The total of all major tax and spending bills the House considers must fall within the set general fund limit.

Postsecondary options

Students, parents, counselors, and schools are pleased with Minnesota's Postsecondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) Program and say it should continue, according to a recent survey of 1985-86 program participants.

On Feb. 11, members of the Education Committee reviewed a report that focuses on problems and accomplishments during the first year of the program.

Ninety-five percent of students who were in the program say they were pleased with it. Some say they learned more in the program courses than in standard high school courses; 53 percent of the students received A's and B's. Most student problems involved coordinating schedules between college and high school, getting into the classes they wanted, or transferring credits.

Both high school and postsecondary institutions supported the program, but officials feel student counseling services need improvement. Greatest program disapproval comes from high school teachers, with only 48.9 percent voicing support.

The 1985 Legislature approved the PSEO Act. The tuition-free program allows public school juniors and seniors to take college classes for high school or college credit. Approximately 2,100 students are currently enrolled in the program.

Commitment to Focus

Some Higher Education Committee members say they aren't convinced the University of Minnesota's Commitment to Focus-(CTF) program will meet all the goals U of M officials have promised.

University President Ken Keller responded to numerous questions from committee members Feb. 11. Keller says the plan to reduce undergraduate enrollment, raise admissions requirements, and concentrate on graduate education is the University's way of increasing per student funding without asking for more state money.

Rep. Ken Kludt (DFL-Moorhead) questioned whether University officials have found that Minnesotans want, can afford, and will benefit from a top-rated graduate institution.

Rep. Dave Gruenes (IR-St. Cloud) added that he's uncomfortable spending money without knowing what Minnesota will get in return. "We're basing plans on the assumption that the more we spend, the better off we're going to be," he said. "I know that we pay for what we get. But what measurable outcomes can we expect that will justify spending \$16 million?" Other members questioned how CTF changes would affect students from greater Minnesota, small school districts, and Postsecondary Enrollment Option students.

Keller responded to questions, saying Minnesota can't afford to support duplicate programs at state institutions. Keller says the University is concentrating on what decision-makers think the University can do best to give students the chance to fulfill their learning potential.

"CTF isn't an attempt to slam the door in anyone's face," Keller said, "But it's time to implement the plan. If we don't move now, I think the house of cards falls apart. It's extremely important to move forward."

Rep. Ken Nelson (DFL-Mpls) spoke for CTF. Nelson says Minnesota needs to present clear goals and defined institutions to K-12 students. "I think the University has tried to be all things to all people. We've overloaded it, and we ought to let it streamline itself so it can forge ahead. It's not that CTF says the University is better by comparison, just that it has a different mission."

Prison space

The state's been getting tougher on criminals and may be headed for a prison-space shortage in two or three years, says Deparment of Corrections Commissioner Orville Pung.

Pung made his statement at a Feb. 10 meeting of the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee. He says stiffer sentencing guidelines are causing the problem. "If we continue in the direction we're going," says Pung, "we'll be at our capacity in two or three years."

Pung says there may be a few solutions. The classic corrections approach, he says, is to build more prisons. The other, according to Pung, is to modify the corrections system, to let offenders serve terms in more unconventional ways. The

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state's corrections system is in good shape, says Pung, but it does have to face the future space problem now, at a stage Pung calls "controllable."

Organ donation

Seeing that transplantable organs aren't wasted is the easiest solution to meeting the increasing medical need for organ and tissue transplants, according to Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls).

Members of the Physical and Mental Health Subcommittee of Health and Human Services Committee heard testimony on HF23 (Kahn, DFL-Mpls) Feb. 10. The bill would require hospital administrators or a designated staff member to make families of braindead patients aware of donation programs without actually requesting an organ donation.

Gayl Rogers, St. Paul Red Cross director of organ/tissue procurement, said the bill could double the 350 transplants medical teams have done in Minnesota during 1986. Although it sounds difficult to approach family members, she says many times the idea of helping someone else actually comforts them.

"If hospitals approached families of everyone who died under the right circumstances where there could be a donor, and if they did consent, we probably wouldn't have a shortage of organ donors," she said. Rogers says she hopes organ donation, especially by families of accident victims, loses its science fiction reputation as people become educated about it.

Subcommittee members recommended passage of HF23. It goes next to the full Health and Human Services Committee.

County medical claims

Minnesota statutes are unclear and don't allow counties to recover money from estates of deceased persons who have been receiving county medical aid, says Virginia Watkins of the Minnesota Social Service Association. She addressed members of the Social Services Subcommittee Feb. 10.

She says county agencies tell her association they aren't able to recover money they're entitled to. The money would come from estates of the deceased medical recipients or their deceased spouses. Watkins' association favors a new bill, HF18 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin), that would clarify a statute entitling counties to the money.

"The intent of current law supports making claims on the estate of the surviving spouse," says Watkins, "but the language is not clear enough to support the county's ability to collect on the estate."

The subcommittee recommended HF18 to pass and rereferred it to the full Health and Human Services Committee for consideration.

Injured workers

Qualified Rehabilitation Consultants (QRCs) from the Department of Jobs and Training gave an overview of their program to the Unemployment Insurance and Worker's Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Committee Feb. 9.

Acting as legal advocates, counselors, and medical advisors, QRCs help injured and disabled workers find jobs, says QRC Vic Schulz. Schulz listed lack of job skills, depression, and drug and alcohol use as major problems for injured workers. He says depression and drug use often become problems after an injury. "When you've lost a \$35,000 a year job because of an injury and your company offers you a \$3.35 an hour job, there'd be something wrong with you if you weren't depressed," says Schulz.

Schulz says the workers' compensation system could be more effective if it were less complicated. He also says QRCs sometimes have to work on cases where they're not

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needed. He suggests changes to correct these problems.

Minimum wage

The House Labor-Management Committee heard testimony Feb. 9 on HF3 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would raise the minimum wage from \$3.35 to \$4.25 per hour for adults, and from \$3.02 to \$3.83 per hour for workers under18.

Supporters, including labor and student groups, say that while the cost of living has gone up 26%, the minimum wage has been the same since 1981. A person working full time for minimum wage makes less than \$7,000 a year. With one child, that's below the poverty level, says Rep. Randy Kelly, the bill's sponsor. Kelly says over half of the people working for minimum wage are men and women with children. Supporters say that raising the minimum wage will help people get off welfare.

Those opposed to the bill include restaurant, motel, resort, and retail store owners. They say raising the minimum wage would force small and medium-sized businesses to lay off workers. Richard Larson, restaurant owner, suggests phasing in an increase to minimum wage, instead of suddenly jumping 90 cents an hour. And he suggests that employees who get tips, not get a wage increase.

The Labor-Management Committee plans to make a recommendation on the bill Feb. 16.

Farm legal assistance

To offset influence of extremist groups in rural areas, the state needs the Farm Legal Assistance Program, says James Massey, director of the Farmers Legal Action Group. Massey made his comments to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 9.

The Farm Legal Assistance Program began in July of 1986. It helps farmers with legal problems, foreclosures, repossession of property, and denial of credit. The state bar association and many farm groups support the program; Massey says it's critical in dealing with the farm crisis. "We have to be out there, those of us who have responsible solutions. We don't always have good news, and we don't always win our cases, and we don't always save farms. But I think we have to repeatedly be out there hammering on what's real and what's credible, and to provide people an access to the system," he says.

About 80,000 of Minnesota's 10,000 farm families have incomes below the poverty level, and nearly 30,000 have debt-to-asset ratios of over 70%, according to the program's statistics.

The Legislature granted the Farm Legal Assistance Program \$650,000 in 1986, and the state Supreme Court is requesting an additional \$400,000 in 1988-89.

Adult literacy

Substandard literacy is the current form of slavery for an estimated one out of five adult Minnesotans, say members of the Minnesota Adult Literacy Campaign.

Executive Campaign Director Peter Pearson told members of the Education Committee Feb. 9 that lifestyles and basic job skills are changing the definition of literacy. He said past literacy standards focused on ability to write one's name. New definitions focus on basic skills needed to provide individuals with opportunities and choices in their lives.

Literacy experts say government must expand present community programs statewide to meet the needs of 236,000 adults who function below the seventh grade level.

"Across the state there is an incredible need for literacy programs in every district," Pearson said. "The need is not concentrated in the metropolitan area, but is just as great a problem with people who have not completed high school and are in need of basic skills in greater Minnesota."

Literacy campaign members say programs must focus on people who have quit school or squeaked through graduation using memorization. Although small elementary classes may prevent more kids from leaving school illiterate, they say possibly the easiest way to fix education's K-12 literacy problem is to make sure kids have literate parents.

Liquor bill

Minnesotans could pay more for liquor under a bill that would give liquor wholesalers exclusive franchise rights for certain brand name liquors.

The House Regulated Industries Committee considered HF266 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) Feb. 9, but laid the bill over because some committee members said interested groups still may want to testify.

Those against the bill, including liquor store owners, say current law allows them to buy from "full service" wholesalers. They say it's a good system because they can get the brands they need from one wholesaler, not four or five. Under the proposed legislation, opponents say they would pay higher prices at what they call wholesale monopolies.

Ogren says he doesn't know of any other commodity state law controls in this way. He says the bill can work in the same way for distilled spirits as it works for beer, wine and other similarly regulated commodities.

Supporters of the bill say it will help a hurting wholesale liquor industry. Both opponents and supporters of the bill say the legislation will probably raise consumer prices.

Property tax

Minnesota's property tax system is seriously flawed and needs drastic overhaul, according to the Department of Revenue's assistant commissioner, John Haynes.

Speaking to the Taxes Committee Feb. 5, Haynes outlined Minnesota's property tax system and proposed changes to streamline the classification system. Haynes says the current system, with 68 classifications, is a maze which has created over 6,000 taxing units in the state. He added that recent tax hikes surpass the rate of inflation many times.

The department proposes to reduce the 68 classifications to five: homestead, rural land, commercial and industrial, residential nonhomestead, and family farmland.

Also, the department proposes to reduce the number of state aids and credits from 10 to one, creating the new State Education Credit which applies to all classes of property. According to Haynes, the current local aids system failed to restrain property tax increases.

Haynes says he hopes the department's proposed reforms will help citizens understand the property tax system.

Biotechnology venture

A bill to help develop a future biotechnology industry in northeastern Minnesota passed in the Taxes Committee Feb. 5.

The Endotronics bill, HF92 (Minne, DFL-Hibbing), would allow the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Board (IRRRB), to invest \$24 million of the Northeastern Minnesota Economic Protection Fund ("2002 Fund"). The IRRRB, an economic development agency, would invest the money to help develop a Hibbing-based production plant for Endotronics, a Minneapolis company pioneering in cancer research.

Minne says the new facility would

generate about 1,500 new jobs. These jobs, according to Endotronics representatives, would require an average level of technical skill, because the production plant would use highly specialized equipment.

Supporters say the new biotechnological industry would help diversify an economically depressed northeastern Minnesota economy.

Committee deadlines

On Feb. 11, the House adopted a series of deadlines to help move bills through the legislative process. • After Friday, April 10, the House must refer committee reports on House Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action. • After Tuesday, April 28, the House must refer committee reports on Senate Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action.

These deadlines don't apply to committee reports from the Taxes or Appropriations Committees, or to the education finance bill. • After Friday, May 8, the House can act on only conference committee reports, bills that the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee report (Special Orders), and bills in messages from the Senate or governor.

The deadlines are part of the 1987-88 Permanent Rules of the House.

Taxes Committee Feb. 6 and 12 heard overview of the state's property tax system from Assistant Revenue Commissioner John Haynes. Overview included recommendations for simplifying the system. (See Highlight: "Property tax")

Department of Revenue could focus more on "people who are really cheating" if verification and auditing systems were simpler, says John James, state assistant commissioner, Compliance Tax Program. At Feb. 12 Taxes Committee meeting, James and Tom Triplett, revenue commissioner, overviewed the department's Tax Compliance System.

Governor's Office of Science and Technology staff presented science and technology initiatives in Minnesota for Future and Technology Committee Feb. 9.

Eighteen percent of freshmen leave the "U' before completing one year, said University of Minnesota President Ken Keller at Feb.11 Higher Education Committee meeting.

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Also, at Feb. 11 Higher Ed Committee meeting, Rep. Ben Boo (IR-Duluth) said the traditional enrollment-driven funding of higher education through average-cost funding won't work if the University gets smaller. He says legislators have to start talking about quality-driven financing.

Discussion of property-tax reform and liens on property for unpaid taxes brought a caution from Rep. Kathleen Blatz (IR-Bloomington) at Feb. 12 Taxes Committee meeting. Blatz says tax liens would require tax searches and raise closing costs when people buy and sell property. Says Blatz, "...I just know there's going to be another line on the list of closing costs...".

Orville Pung, Department of Corrections commissioner, presented his department's budget to members of the Health and Human Services Division/Appropriations Committee on Feb. 10, 11, and 12.

Members of the Governor's Commission on Mental Health reported on the state's mental health care system to the Health and Human Services Committee Feb. 12.

Legislators got a tour glimpse of how technology creates jobs and state revenue. Tour included LifeCore Biomedical, Inc., a metro-area company specializing in fluid for use in eye surgery; Pillsbury Co. where plant engineers use computer-aided drafting techniques to design food processing facilities: Supercomputer Institute and some of world's fastest, most powerful computers which Minnesota companies manufacture. Minnesota High Technology Council, Inc., hosted the Future and Technology Committee tour Feb. 10.

County and city officials laid out their legislative agenda at a Feb. 12 meeting of Local and Urban Affairs Committee. On their list: light rail transit, local government aid, tax and welfare reform, highway funding, capital bonding, mandate reform, fiscal disparities, and urban revitalization.

Governmental Operations heard pension overviews this week. Speakers representing the Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement, Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA), the State Retirement System, and the Minnesota State Fire Departments Association came before the committee.

Judiciary Committee's Crime and Family Law Division gave preliminary approval to HF151 Feb. 9. Chief author, Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul), says the bill aims to improve administration of the Crime Victims Reparations Act.

The governor's budget doesn't recommend funding the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCMR) or any of its projects. But on Feb. 10, Commission Chair Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone) reviewed the commission's responsibilities and recommendations for the 1987 Legislative Session at a meeting of the Environment and Natural Resources Committee.

Courts and judicial boards, state planning agencies, regional commissions, and the Department of Administration brought their budget proposals to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 9-12. The Maroons and Golds, a nonpartisan mix of about 40 legislators, faced off at Biff Adams Arena in St. Paul Wednesday night. The Maroons won the tensionreleasing, just-for-fun hockey game on a 10-7 score. - 13



Salary increase rejection

On a unanimous voice vote Feb. 19, the Governmental Operations Committee recommended to pass HF68 (Vanasek, DFL-New Prague), making the first move to reject the State Compensation Council's recommended salary increases for state officials.

Minnesota's Constitution requires legislators to set salaries for themselves, the state's constitutional officers, and judges. The Legislature created the State Compensation Council in 1983 to assist in this process. However, the Legislature must appropriate money to pay for any recommended increase.

While offering overall praise for the council's work, Committee Chair Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) said, "This last time...the compensation council erred in their decision...the increases they suggested for legislators went beyond what we had ever envisioned."

HIGHLIGHTS

The proposed increases, which were to take effect Jan. 1, 1989, ranged from four percent for the governor, to 22 percent for the state treasurer, and 18 percent for legislators.

The committee amended the bill to limit any future legislative salary increases to no more than the lowest comparable rate of increase for other state employees.

If HF68 becomes law, the compensation council's recommended increases would not go into effect unless the Legislature acts again to amend or repeal the rejection.

Medical school costs

High tuition and resulting debt levels are keeping more students out of professional medical programs each year, say University of Minnesota officials.

Dr. Neal Vanselow, U of M vice president for health sciences, told the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 19 that medical students accumulate \$25,000 to \$32,000 in debts by the time they graduate. He said health

(back page). science students have the highest tuition rates in the University, but still pay only about one-fourth of actual program costs.

U of M medical, dental, veterinary, and pharmacy programs are the only choices for students who can't afford outstate or private institutions, Vanselow said. But, he said, lower cost medical programs are an expense to all undergraduates who currently pay an average of \$90 more yearly to support the University's high cost medical programs.

He asked legislators to consider subsidizing health science programs to keep from raising tuitions or continuing to shift program costs to other U of M students.

Commitment to Focus

Calling it a bold plan for change, University of Minnesota-Duluth (UMD) faculty endorsed the University's Commitment to Focus (CTF) Feb. 18.

Dr. Roger Fisher, UMD history professor, says the UMD staff sees no problems with CTF or the proposed changes for the Duluth campus. Fisher says CTF is the "first real example of leadership from the president's office in a generation."

Faculty members say the proposed enrollment cut at Duluth won't decrease access for northern Minnesota students. Fisher says the change will displace about 300 students, but mostly from metropolitan suburbs.

Fisher says UMD staff have already committed their focus on high quality education and that upgrading and standardizing admission requirements will force them to get even better. But, he said, UMD's ability to deliver what CTF asks depends on money, autonomy, respect from the public, U of M regents, and President Ken Keller.

Fisher made his remarks at the Feb. 18 meeting of the Higher Education Committee.

Classroom technology

Computers and interactive television are two tools that could help teachers improve education for Minnesota students, according to a study of state technology demonstration sites.

On Feb. 18, Education Committee members reviewed a threeyear, state-funded program that tested new technology in 96 school districts statewide.

The study showed that interactive television classes benefit the greatest number of students. Students learned as much through closed-circuit television instruction as from traditional classroom teacher instruction, according to the study.

The study found no evidence that computers have direct benefit on learning. Although word processors don't increase student writing skills, the report says kids who enjoy using the computers write more.

Program evaluator Diane Morehouse told legislators that people have to be realistic about what technology can and cannot do for students. Computers and other technology are only tools like books or typewriters, she said, but goodteaching is still the key to learning.

Mental health funding

Minnesota's mental health funding structure will have to change drastically to meet the mental health needs of the state, according to Sandra Gardebring, Human Services commissioner.

Gardebring appeared before the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 18 to present the department's budget and speak for a new funding structure.

She told lawmakers the department proposes to consolidate nearly 10 funding sources counties use to pay for mental health care. Gardebring says the multiplefunding sources have contributed to the state's severely limited and fragmented mental health care system.

Gardebring says the department would consolidate the funding in 1989, after a year of planning and preparation. She called the proposal "a very aggressive change in the state's mental health program."

Milk in schools

A bill that would give free milk to students in Minnesota's elementary and secondary schools moved out of the Dairy and Livestock Subcommittee Feb. 17 and is on its way to the full Agriculture Committee.

HF153 would require all school districts to provide one-half pint of milk to students in K-12. Most school districts dropped out of the milk program because of federal budget cuts reaching nearly 85 percent over the years since1981.

The bill's author, Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples), estimates the milk program would cost the state about \$10 million every two years. Under the proposal, the Department of Agriculture would reimburse school districts for the cost of the milk.

Supporters of the bill say the milk program would provide daily nutrition for Minnesota students and give farmers more milk markets.

Property tax reform

Property tax is a critical issue for state tax reform this session, Minnesota economists told the Taxes Committee Feb. 17.

Julie Friedman, an economist from St. Paul's Macalaster College, says the state's property classification system is inefficient in the way it shifts property tax burdens in certain areas.

According to Friedman, the state's system is one of inequity because it provides relief to individuals with the same kind of property as others, but who don't have similar needs. She says relief is poorly targeted to help those in question. She proposed that targeted, rather than broad-base relief, will get relief to those the system wants to help.

Friedman's remarks echo statements that officials of the Department of Revenue made at the Taxes Committee meeting Feb. 5. They say Minnesota's property tax system is seriously flawed and needs drastic overhaul.

According to the Department of Revenue, Minnesota has 68 property classifications, more than any other state. The department proposes to reduce that number to five. Officials added that the current classification system has created over 6,000 taxing units in the state.

The department also proposes to reduce the number of state aids and credits from 10 to 1, and create a State Education Credit. Revenue officials say they hope this will hold back property tax increases.

Credit applications

Personal and commercial lenders could no longer require two signatures when a married person applies for credit under a proposal Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester) brought to the Judiciary Committee Feb. 17.

Bishop told committee members that some lenders require a spouse's signature on applications and credit papers when they know the applicant is married. But if the applicant is not married, they don't require a second signature.

If the applicant meets other credit requirements, Bishop says, a spouse's signature shouldn't be necessary, except where the spouse has an interest, as in the case of a mortgage or homestead. Also, HF222 would make it unfair for lenders to discriminate because of sex or marital status when extending personal or commercial credit, or in the requirements for obtaining credit.

The committee recommended the bill to pass; it now moves to the full House for further action.

Criminal trials

The next time you serve on a jury, the prosecution, rather than the defense, may have the last word.

After several hours of testimony and committee discussion, the Judiciary Committee gave preliminary approval Feb. 17 to HF137 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul). The committee added a provision that would give the prosecution up to five minutes to respond to statements in the defendant's closing argument. Current law gives the defense the final word.

Other provisions would allow a judge to order, in writing, a joint trial for two or more persons authorities have charged with the same felony. And, in certain cases, it would give the prosecution and defense the same number of chances to challenge and remove a juror without explaining why.

The bill goes next to the full House.

Headphones

Bicyclists who wear headphones while riding could not wear headphones that cover both ears, under a bill the Transportation Committee's Safety Subcommittee recommended to pass Feb. 17.

HF269 (Kahn, DFL-Mpls) would, however, allow bikers to wear an earphone in one ear. Violators would face a petty misdemeanor fine of up to \$100.

The bill's author, Rep. Phyllis Kahn, says bicyclists, like other traveling motorists, need to be on the alert. She says excluding bikers from the present law that prohibits motorists from wearing headphones was an oversight.

HF269 has the support of the American Youth Hostels, a group that organizes bike tours, and the Minnesota Coalition of Bicyclists.

The bill goes next to the full Transportation Committee.

Austin enterprise zone

Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin) is proposing HF133, a bill that would authorize Austin as an enterprise zone, even though the deadline for such authorization was Dec. 31, 1986. As an enterprise zone, Austin's new businesses would get special tax breaks. Reding told the Economic Development and Housing Committee Feb. 17 that because of the Hormel strike, Austin needs special consideration to create jobs.

During the discussion on HF133, some committee members said Austin should not get into the enterprise zone program after the deadline. They said Austin is not unique in its problems of lost jobs, diminished populations, reduced land values, and the farm crisis.

Rep. Bob Neuenschwander (DFL-Int'l Falls) questioned the policy of creating enterprise zones. He says they don't solve state economic problems, but only shift them from one part of the state to another by encouraging businesses to leave one city for another.

After the discussion, the committee recommended on a voice vote that the bill pass. The proposal move to the Taxes Committee.

Iron range electric utility

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The Regulated Industries Committee laid a bill over Feb. 16 that supporters say may save 600 Iron Range jobs.

HF70 (Minne, DFL-Hibbing) would give National Steel, a major Minnesota taconite producer, the right to negotiate low-energy rates with electric power suppliers.

A company spokesperson says this would create a savings for National Steel of about \$3 per ton on production costs. Without the proposed energy cost reductions, he says the company would probably close the plant. In fact, he says, the plant has already started closing procedures.

Steelworker union officials say the energy savings would keep the company in business, help it regain its competitive edge, and save 600 jobs.

Hibbing Mayor Richard Nordvald says the bill would help keep a struggling taconite industry alive, and Iron Range communities support it.

The committee will continue testimony and discussion on HF70.

Science and technology

Minnesota has lost ground in the areas of science and technology, says Ettore Infante, dean of the University of Minnesota's Institute of Technology.

He talked about the role of technology in Minnesota's future at the Future and Technology Committee meeting Feb. 16.

In the last 20 years, according to Infante, universities in other states have been gathering a larger proportion of federal research and development money. He says the University of Minnesota ranked 11th in 1964, but now ranks17th.

But, Infante says, the state is blessed with what he calls "traditionally the best educational system in the United States." He adds that the educational system has created one of the "best work forces in the nation, and has been able to capture and utilize technological development."

He says the state has one of the most unusually well-prepared work forces for an industrial setting, because it's an "ethically conscious and hard-working labor force."

Infante says the state must emphasize education to move ahead in future science and technological initiatives. He adds that this educational strengthening in science and technology must occur at all levels, beginning in kindergarten, lasting through college and vocational education.

Minimum wage

The Labor-Management Relations Committee recommended to pass HF3 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) Feb. 16. The bill would gradually raise Minnesota's minimum wage. By 1989, adult minimum wage would increase from \$3.35 to \$4.35 an hour. Minimum wage for people under 18 would increase from \$3.02 to \$3.92 an hour. Workers who get tips would not see an increase until 1988.

The debate centers on the cost of doing business versus the cost of living in Minnesota. Opponents of the bill argue that raising the minimum wage would force businesses to hire fewer workers. Proponents say full-time workers should have a guaranteed wage above the poverty level. Leaders from business, labor, worker's groups, and the National Organization of Women testified before the committee.

Workers' compensation

Duane Harves, chief administrative law judge in the Minnesota Office of Administrative Hearings, talked with the Unemployment Insurance and Workers' Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Relations Committee Feb. 16 about delay problems in the workers' compensation system. • Ċ

Harves says resolving claims often takes up to 38 months. "Most states consider a six-month delay too long. But we're just trying to get down to six months," Harves says. He blames delays on a heavy caseload and the "triple track" claim processing system in which adjusters process rehabilitation, medical, or liability claims differently. Cases that involve more than one issue must go through different processes for each issue.

"If we never received another case, our existing staff could, in 11 months, process the 3,935 backlog of cases," says Harves, but workers filed 63.7 percent more cases in 1986 than in 1984."

Eighteen judges presently work on workers' compensation cases. "We have requested 10 additional judges plus 6 support staff positions," he says. The governor has recommended 6 new judges plus 4 support staff positions "to curb the increase in delay and to reduce time between claim petitions and hearings."

Pension fund money

Should the State Board of Investments invest pension fund money in foreign companies? Legislators disagreed on the House Floor Feb. 12, and rereferred HF186 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley) to the Governmental Operations Committee for further discussion. The bill would give the state board authority to purchase certain foreign securities.

Supporters of the measure say giving state investors more flexibility in high-risk investments would bring in more money for retired state employees than does lowrisk investing. Opponents say investing in some foreign companies is too risky and raises political issues. They also say that Minnesota shouldn't invest in foreign companies that compete with companies in the United States and Minnesota.

Rep. Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) questioned whether Minnesota pension dollars should go to countries that compete with United States' markets, even if there's a 12 percent return on those investments. He said the state should invest in American companies to create more jobs here.

Minnesota Futures, Inc.

Nationally known business consultant David Morris of St. Paul says Minnesota should use its \$719 million federal tax windfall, not to lower taxes, nor to supplement this year's budget, but to give every Minnesotan a \$20 share of stock in Minnesota Futures, Inc. (MFI).

MFI would be a publicly owned, profit-making corporation seeking efficient, economical solutions to the state's social problems, such as waste management and care for the disabled, says Morris. According to Morris, Minnesota would save money and improve the economy by contracting with private venture capitalists in solving these problems.

"Conservatives believe private, profit-oriented efforts are the best problem solvers. Liberals maintain communities have a responsibility to provide for the weak and the needy and to protect the environment. MFI combines conservative means and liberal ends. It would commercialize inventions that reduce the need for public expenditures," says Morris.

He presented his idea to the Economic Development and Housing Committee Feb. 12. Also, Melva Radtke, executive director of the Minnesota Center for Community Economic Development, and Warren Hanson, executive director of West Bank Community Development Center, overviewed Minnesota Community Development Corporations.

New Minnesota history textbook will soon be on its way to elementary school teachers. Minnesota Historical Society (MHS) has drafted the first two chapters reports Nina Archabal, MHS director, at Feb. 16 Transportation, Agriculture, Semi-State Division of Appropriations meeting. MHS is in charge of producing the book. Scheduled completion date is fall of1988.

Farmers who use the state's mediation program are generally 48 years old, have farmed 26 years, support five people with their farm income and their wives' off-farm income. They have a cash crop enterprise and total farm debt of \$372,000. Kathy Mangum, the state's farm mediation program coordinator reported statistics to the Agriculture Committee Feb. 16.

Health and Human Services Division/Appropriations Committee heard continuing and new budget overviews Feb. 16 and 17 from Orville Pung, Department of Corrections commissioner; John Poupart, ombudsman for corrections; Debra Dailey, director, Sentencing Guidelines Commission; and public testimony on Department of Corrections budget. Minnesota's in a good

position to harness and develop future science and technology-related industry, says Dean Ettore Infante from U of M's Institute of Technology. State needs to compliment its unusually good workforce with emphasis on science and technology education. (See Highlight: "State technological strength")

The University of Minnesota's Institute of

Technology instructs over 5,600 students. Its staff of about 400 regular faculty teaches courses in areas such as aerospace, chemical, civil and electrical engineering, computer science, and physics. The Institute offers more than 25 technology or science-related majors, says the Dean's Office.

About 2,800 high-tech companies make their home in Minnesota, according to statistics from the Governor's Office of Science and Technology. About 2,100 or 75 percent of high-tech companies are in the Twin Cities metro area.

A bill that would toughen the state's child passenger protection law won support from the Safety Subcommittee of the Transportation Committee Feb. 17. HF29 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) would make all drivers responsible for buckling children under four years old into a child restraint. The bill would penalize first-time offenders. Would exempt from requirements, children in an emergency medical vehicle or taxi or riding with peace officers, and children who, for medical or physical reasons, can't ride in the safety seats.

Department of Human Services Commissioner

Sandra Gardebring presented her department's budget to the Health and Human Services Division/Appropriations Committee Feb. 18 and 19.

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Postsecondary students had

their day at the Capitol Feb. 19 to voice concern about increasing student debt. Day included rally with participation from Rep. Mike Jaros (DFL-Duluth), Higher Education Committee chair.

The Property Tax Division

heard public testimony Feb. 19 from groups concerned about state property tax reform. Areas of discussion included simplification of property classification system, disparities in current classification system, and shifting of tax burden on different types of property.

"What will Minnesotans want to do outdoors in the year

2000?" and "What action needs to be taken to ensure outdoor recreation needs are met?" Former IR Speaker of the House, Rod Searle, presented "Recommit to Recreation--A Report on Minnesota's Future Outdoor Recreation Needs," to the Environment and Natural Resources Committee Feb. 19. The report summarizes four months of public hearings throughout the state focusing on these two questions.

Employers may have to withhold child support from

employees' wages under a proposal before Judiciary's Crime and Family Law Division. Hearings continued Feb. 16 on HF163 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca), with testimony from county child support agencies, parents' organizations, and members of the public.

Highway projects on the

books for 1988-89 may go on the back burner if the highway funding forecast doesn't clear. On Feb. 18, officials from the Minnesota Department of Transportation explained where they get and how they spend road-maintenance funds. The department could run short on funds during the 1988-89 biennium. Department's calling on legislators to help find alternative funding for highway construction projects.

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Rep. Mary Forsythe (IR-

Edina) is for Commitment to Focus. At a Higher Education meeting, Forsythe said, "We've done a great deal of discussing of those students who come from the rural areas, the metro areas, but there's one kind of student that we have not mentioned. That is the student, and we have a lot of them around the state of Minnesota, with a high degree of intelligence, a high standard for themselves. These hard-working kids want a school that has a high academic standard, one that they can go to and feel that they will be challenged....We must provide a school of this kind of standard within the state of Minnesota, and certainly the Twin Cities campus of the University is it."

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

As the story goes, Thomas Jefferson asked Washington why the Constitution framers decided to have a House of Representatives and a Senate.


Washington countered with, "Why do you pour your coffee into your saucer?"

HIGHLIGHTS

Housing Finance Agency

Housing in Minnesota will face tough times in the next few years, says Jim Solem, Housing Finance Agency (HFA) director.

He told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 26 that availability of rental housing will suffer most from new federal limits on state tax breaks for rental developers, and the governor's \$5 million reduction in HFA funding. Affordable rental housing will be scarce, says Solem.

HFA has proposed a budget that eliminates urban Indian housing programs, and cuts other loan programs by 66 percent. But the department is asking increased funding for elderly home sharing and renovation of run-down rental units.

Department of **Human Rights**

Mismanagement problems in the Department of Human Rights that made news some months ago are over, according to a report from the

governor's Human Rights Advisory Task Force. The governor set up the task force last year to investigate alleged human rights violations and reports of mismanagement.

On Feb. 25, task force members reported at a joint meeting of the Government Structures Subcommittee of the **Governmental Operations** Committee and the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee. The task force says the department is competently and effectively enforcing the Minnesota Human Rights Act.

The panel says the department should remain separate from the Attorney General's Office, and should continue to spend its time enforcing human rights laws and educating the public.

On Feb. 26, Jayne Khalifa, Department of Human Rights acting director, presented the department's 1988-89 budget proposal to the State Departments Division. She says the department needs four new employees and a better computer system

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to aid in "administering and enforcing the Minnesota Human Rights Act that prohibits discrimination in housing, employment, public accommodations, public services, education, and credit on the basis of age, race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, public assistance status, and familial status." She says 80 percent of the department's cases involve alleged discrimination in employment.

Winona State

Winona State University could get a new one-of-a-kind engineering program under HF114 (Pelowski-DFL, Winona), a bill the Higher Education Committee recommended to pass Feb. 25. It would establish a composite science and engineering program for undergraduate students.

Rep. Gene Pelowski says Winona is the best location for the program that would compliment local industries currently using resin-fiber composites. Products containing the materials range from airplanes and canoes to the Jarvik-7 artificial heart.

If the bill passes, Winona State would be the only U.S. institution educating undergraduate students for careers in the rapidly growing composite industry.

Mail-in ballots

Minnesota voters could soon find county or municipal election ballots in their mail boxes.

General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee members gave unanimous approval Feb. 26 to HF281 (Steensma, DFL-Luverne) authorizing experimental mail elections.

The bill would give county and municipal governments a low-cost option that could increase voter turnout on special-issue elections, according to Rep. Andy Steensma. Officials could issue mail-in ballots only for special elections local governments hold on days other than the general election day and don't include candidates for office.

The bill would require a two-year test and review period for the mail-in ballots.

State universities

St. Cloud State President Brendan McDonald says recent enrollment growth at Minnesota institutions is a good sign.

"It suggests that more of Minnesota's young people are investing in themselves and in Minnesota's future, "McDonald told members of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee.

More than 3,100 new students enrolled in the seven state universities since 1985. Although that's good news, system presidents say it hurts the growing schools that come under the state's average cost funding, a system that bases state appropriations on enrollment figures from two years before.

System Chancellor Dr. Robert Carothers told legislators that this funding system works well for shrinking enrollment, but leaves growing schools with unfunded students for two years. He says systems aren't ready to absorb costs that come with large enrollment increases.

"We're forced to reallocate resources within the system to respond to those needs" he says. "What that frequently means is that we fund those sections of new students by not buying books for the library, not buying equipment, and not doing other things that we need to do to maintain the quality of the institution."

Carothers says that funding lag is a consistent problem. He told legislators the state could meet student needs better if the system more closely tied funding for enrollment increases to current enrollment levels.

The committee looked at State University System budget requests Feb. 24.

Home health care licensure

People who provide home health care in the state may need a license to continue that service, under a bill the Health and Human Services' Social Services Subcommittee approved Feb. 24.

HF120 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls), according to its author, would protect the elderly from abuse and ensure quality home health care for those who need it.

Supporters voiced concern over adult abuse cases in the home health care field. They say the bill would protect elderly and vulnerable adults from abusive care providers who are unqualified for their jobs.

Spokespersons from Minnesota's Senior Federation (MSF) say the state's elderly population is mushrooming, and abuse cases are increasing. They say adoption of mandatory licensing would be a "giant step forward" in protecting the rights of those who need home health care.

Karina Allen of MSF told committee members that rural Minnesotans--especially the elderly-need the same quality home health care as the rest of the state. She says, "I resent the idea that rural people should not demand standards as high as people in urban areas. They should not be forced to accept an untrained person for a position that requires expertise."

Under the bill, hospice care providers would also need licenses to continue their service to terminally ill patients in a home setting.

Child support withholding

A bill proposing immediate income withholding moved a step further in the legislative process Feb. 24 when the Judiciary Committee recommended it to pass.

The committee amended HF163 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca) to give counties the option to begin courtordered withholding for all child support or maintenance orders courts initiate or modify after Aug. 1, 1987.

Supporters say requiring immediate withholding would make it more likely that children would receive support in a timely and regular manner. Opponents say it presumes the parent is irresponsible and won't pay.

The committee amended another of the bill's provisions to allow the court to divide the responsibility for a child's non-insured medical and dental expenses between parents according to each parent's ability to pay.

The bill goes next to the Health and Human Services Committee.

Credit card surcharges

A bill that would ban credit card surcharges moved out of the Commerce Committee Feb. 24.

Minnesota retailers who charge an extra fee to credit card users could go to jail for up to 90 days and/or pay a \$700 fine under HF240.

The bill, which Rep. John Sarna (DFL-Mpls) sponsors, has AFL-CIO support. Tobey Lapakko, spokesperson for the organization, says 10 other states have similar legislation on their books and it's time for Minnesota to join with them.

Rep. Tony Bennett (IR-Shoreview) and Rep. K.J. McDonald (IR-Watertown) oppose the bill. "We need to look a little deeper into this. It's another restriction on our local merchants on our local streets that may help another major corporation such as American Express that does their business outside...Minnesota," Bennett says.

HF240 would not take away retailers rights to offer discounts for cash and the bill doesn't cover Master or Visa cards or any credit cards that originate in other states, according to Lapakko.

Mystery Cave

With a little help from the state, Rep. Elton Redalen hopes to give people a chance to explore Mystery Cave, near Spring Valley in southeastern Minnesota.

HF398 (Redalen, IR-Fountain) proposes that the Department of Natural Resources buy Mystery Cave to safeguard the cave's natural and educational value. The cave's present owner closed it and moved out of Minnesota.

Redalen told the Environment and Natural Resources Committee Feb. 24, that southeastern Minnesota needs some attraction to bring people into an area that can no longer support itself on agriculture alone. Adding Mystery Cave to Forestville State Park could make the park as attractive to tourists as many other Minnesota state parks, he says.

The committee approved the bill and sent it on to the full House.

Farm Advocate Program

When Lou Ann Kling helped a neighboring farmer restructure an old debt with the Farmers Home Adminstration five years ago, she never thought her efforts would lead to the Minnesota Farm Advocate Program.

Kling, a southwestern Minnesota farmer, is one of 25 farm advocates in the state. Her one-on-one sessions with farmers gave birth to the Department of Agriculture's Farm Advocate Program in1984.

Under the program, the department contracts with trained advocates, generally farmers themselves, to help other farmers facing foreclosure. Advocates get \$5 to \$6 an hour for 20 hours a week, but Kling says they actually work around the clock to get farmers ready for mediation. "The calls may start at 5:30 a.m. and continue past midnight," she says.

Anne Kanten, assistant commissioner of agriculture, says the advocate program has helped approximately 10,230 farmers to date. She says the current client load for advocates is 803 farmers, each carrying an average of 36 active files. She says a department survey shows that 30 percent of the state's farmers could use the program in upcoming years.

The department, Kanten added, has submitted a change-level request to raise advocates' salaries to \$8 an hour and transfer the program to the AVTI system.

Kling and Kanten reported to the Agriculture Committee Feb. 23.

Labor-management bills

The Labor-Management Relations Committee Feb. 23 recommended passage of HF52 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin), a bill that would require ski resorts to pay overtime wages to seasonal workers who work more than 48 hours in a week. Opponents of the bill argue that ski resort workers shouldn't get overtime pay because they don't work year-round. Under the proposal, the law that lets state fair workers earn overtime pay would also cover ski resort workers.

The committee also recommended for passage a measure that would give privately contracted food service workers at some state universities the option to get state employee life and health insurance. According to Bob Johnson (DFL-Bemidji), author of HF119, the workers had state employee insurance coverage until the state reclassified them as privately contracted workers in 1977. To compensate for reclassification, Johnson says the workers should have an option to buy the employee insurance. Opponents say the state should not allow private employees to contract with the state for insurance.

The committee also supported HF134 (Price, DFL-Woodbury), a bill that would require employers to notify employees and job applicants if they file for bankruptcy or if someone files petition for

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involuntary bankruptcy against them. On a voice vote, the committee unanimously recommended the bill to pass.

Unemployment insurance

How do you file for unemployment insurance?

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Terrence Clark, Department of Jobs and Training, explained the process to the Unemployment Insurance and Workers' Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Relations Committee Feb. 23.

To be eligible for benefits, says Clark, workers must be unemployed through no fault of their own, and have earned at least \$108.00 a week for 15 work weeks prior to their unemployment. "Eligible unemployed people receive unemployment benefit payments to stabilize their income and free them to look for work on a full-time basis," he says.

Minnesota offers the highest benefits of any state for unemployed workers. An average weekly payment is \$158.77, Clark says. Employers maintain Minnesota's unemployment insurance fund through payroll taxes.

Chair Rep. Mary Murphy (DFL, Hermantown) says the division will look at ways to lower unemployment insurance costs and reduce the number of workers who get benefits they don't deserve. Clark says most fraudulent cases involve an employer who pays cash wages to a worker receiving unemployment benefits, and neither the employer nor the worker report the wages on tax forms.

Clark says that last year, unemployment insurance fraud investigators uncovered a total of 2,248 fraudulent claims amounting to over a million dollars. The department recovered nearly \$750,000 of that amount.

New gas pipeline

Some natural gas consumers may save money on their gas bills if the state gets a proposed new pipeline.

The Regulated Industries Committee approved a bill Feb. 23 that would give Minnesota's Public Utilities Commission the right to approve plans for a new gas pipeline between Cambridge and Coon Rapids. Supporters of HF420 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids) say it would provide metro-area consumers with cheaper Canadian natural gas.

Under the bill, Rep. Joel Jacobs says, the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission would have regulating authority for the proposed pipeline. Supporters say the pipeline is strictly an intrastate venture, and it could get underway faster if the state rather than the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) approved the project. They say FERC would take over the project if the state didn't take action.

Gary Peterson, a Minnesgasco spokesperson, told lawmakers that the cheaper gas would save their customers between \$4 and \$8 million.

Adopted child's death

The Department of Human Services has a little-known rule that requires adoption agencies to notify birth parents of their child's death. Rep. Kathleen Vellenga wants to make this rule a law, and add a little flexibility in the process.

Adoption agencies would have to let birth parents know when an adopted child dies, if birth parents ask for that notification. On the other hand, birth parents could designate someone to notify the adoption agency if they should die.

Cheryl Hall, representing Liberal Education for Adoptive Families in Minnesota (LEAF), testified in favor of HF270 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul), which would put the Department of Human Services rule into law. Hall says,"It would be less than humane to put people in the situation...where you spend a great number of years believing that you'll be reunited with the child you place for adoption. Or, as an adoptee, you spend that time believing that you'll be reunited with a parent from (whom) you're separated, only to find out that parent has been dead a...number of years. And that is known to an agency but not to you."

Hall spoke at a Feb. 23 Crime and Family Law Division hearing where members approved the proposal. It now goes to the full Judiciary Committee.

Cigarette tax

If the cigarette tax goes up, some college and vocational students could be thanking smokers for better classrooms and libraries.

On Feb. 23, members of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee looked at the governor's plan to fund capital improvements on state campuses with money from an increase in the state cigarette tax.

The plan would boost the tax six cents a pack. That could raise 75 percent of the funds the governor has asked for to expand facilities on several campuses.

A large part of the estimated \$48 million in cigarette tax receipts would pay for expansion of library facilities at Mankato, St. Cloud, and Bemidji State universities. Funds would also go to establish child care services at AVTIs and community colleges.

But some lawmakers worry about the plan. They say the state is banking on money it may never collect because the Legislature hasn't approved the tax increase.

Biotechnology future

On the threshold of a biotechnology revolution, Minnesota needs to embrace developing technology to position itself as a world leader, according to authorities in the field.

Experts from the Minnesota Council on Biotechnology and members of the state's education community spoke in support of biotechnology at a Future and Technology Biotechnology Subcommittee meeting Feb. 23. They say Minnesota is in a good position to make biotechnology a future core industry.

A. Richard Baldwin, chairperson of the Minnesota Council on Biotechnology, compared the industry to the computer industry in the late 1930s and early 1940s. He says that even though research in the field is new, biotechnology could impact society more than computers did.

Members of the education community advise a greater emphasis on education now. They say when school age children reach adulthood, they will need skills and tools to carry the "biological revolution" into its next phase. Educators say we are now in a pioneering phase, and that technology is moving faster than anyone expected three or four years ago.

Dr. Stephen Weber, vice president for academic affairs, St. Cloud State University, agrees. He says the state must provide more education opportunities to keep pace.

"The revolution is moving so quickly that if we're not careful, it will outstrip the educational infrastructure which is committed to perpetuating this revolution and to assisting it with the next generation of students," says Weber.

Estimates from experts say the biotechnology industry will create 52,000 jobs by the year 2000.

State budget forecasting

Estimating state revenues is a tough job, and it's getting tougher, says Jay Kiedrowski, commissioner of finance.

At a meeting of the Taxes Committee, Feb. 20, Kiedrowski said constantly changing tax laws cause the most problems for budget forecasting. And this year, he says he can't imagine a more difficult time to try to estimate state revenues because of changes in the state's tax system. Tax law changes, according to Kiedrowski, account for 20 percent of forecast errors.

Kiedrowski says the state's biennial budget approach is generally a good forecasting structure. But, he says, some pieces of it need an annual review because factors like inflation, property tax relief, and school spending vary from year to year.

Rental housing

Changes in federal tax laws will create a shortage of low- and moderate-income housing and increase the number of homeless in Minnesota, says Jerrold Boardman, director of the Bloomington Housing and Redevelopment Authority. He spoke before the Housing and Community Development Subcommittee of the Economic Development and Housing Committee Feb. 19.

"The budget for Housing and Urban Development has been cut dramatically since 1980. And with tax changes, it will also become more difficult for the private sector to provide decent, safe, and affordable housing," says Boardman.

He says private developers need at least \$750 per month for a twobedroom unit in the metropolitan area. In the past, developers could charge \$500 a month because tax shelters protected them from losses. Renters assistance programs reduced rent further so that one could pay \$176 a month for a \$750 a month unit. Essentially, the federal government was paying over 60 percent of the rent for some lowincome renters.

Cutbacks in federal funds mean many renters won't be able to afford housing, says Boardman.



Rural Development

Subcommittee of the Economic Development and Housing Committee continued review of HF2 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca) Feb. 24. The bill would restructure the Department of Energy and Economic Development and establish the Greater Minnesota Corporation. The subcommittee is also holding public forums to get citizen views on rural development programs at: Thief River Falls, City Auditorium, Feb. 27, 10-11:30 a.m.; Willmar, Kandiyohi Entertainment Center, Feb. 27, 2:30-4 p.m.; Morris, Sunwood Inn, Feb. 28, 9:30-11 a.m.; Jackson, AVTI, Feb. 28, 2-3:30 p.m.

Museum programs would go out to greater Minnesota under a school services program the St. Paul Science Museum hopes to have. The Science Museum wants a \$130,000 budget increase in 1988-89 "for a new school services program that will not only bring Minnesota students from rural areas to the museum, but will also bring the museum's programs throughout the state," says museum president Dr. James Peterson. The Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State **Division of the Appropriations** Committee toured St. Paul Science Museum and Omni Theater Feb. 24.

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Air traffic control towers, Metropolitan Airport Commission offices, and equipment and airplane maintenance garages had a visit from Metropolitan Affairs Committee members. The legislators toured Wold-Chamberlain (Twin Cities) International Airport Feb. 20.

Emergency phone service 9-1-1 serves nearly 90 percent of Minnesotans. And the Department of Administration is in the process of hooking up the other 10 percent, Babak Armajani, deputy commissioner, told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee at budget hearings Feb. 23-24. At same meeting, Minnesota Public Television Association and the Association of Minnesota Public Educational Radio Stations presented budget requests including \$1,200,000 increase in 1988-89 for matching grants and broadcasting equipment.

Minnesota schools that

dropped the milk-in-schools program because of federal budget cuts could again offer milk to students under HF153 (Krueger, DFL-Staples), a bill the Agriculture Committee recommended to pass Feb. 24. It requires all schools to provide one-half pint of milk a day to students in K-12 and appropriate \$10 million to the Department of Education to reimburse schools. HF153 goes next to the Education Committee.

St. Paul homeowners who sell homes dating back before

1973, may have to install hard-wire smoke detectors before putting their houses on the market. On Feb. 24, the Local and Urban Affairs Committee recommended to pass HF357 (Orenstein, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would let St. Paul's City Council move ahead with plans to require the detectors. Bill's author says state law currently requires hardwire smoke detectors in homes people built since1973. He says the council wants to go a step further because about 53,000 St. Paul homes went up before1973.

Minnesota could get over \$5 million in revenue if it captures five percent of the more than \$100 billion national software industry, says Rosemary Fruehling, director of the Office of Software Technology Development. She presented her office's plans to expand Minnesota's software industry at the Feb. 25 meeting of the Future and Technology Software Subcommittee. Fruehling says Minnesota now has 2.7 percent of the national market.

About 13,000 Minnesotans

work in the state's software industry, up from 2,500 10 years ago. Between 1976 and 1984, the state's software industry was the fifth largest creator of jobs, according to statistics from the Department of Energy and Economic Development.

Legislators heard firsthand about effects of AT&T divestiture on Northwestern Bell (NWB) when the Regulated Industries Committee toured NWB's St. Paul plant this week.

Local Liquor licensing, nonalcoholic advertising, rare wine auctions, and cased liquor pricing issues were on the agenda when Regulated Industries Beverage Subcommittee met for the first time Feb. 24.

Proposals that affect taxes on aircraft, petroleum, deeds and mortgages, pulltabs, gross earnings, cigarettes, liquor, and lodging are in the governor's miscellaneous tax bill, HF528 (Voss, DFL-Blaine). John Haynes, assistant revenue commissioner, spoke for the bill at the Taxes Committee Feb. 26.

Members of the Taxes Committee Tax Laws Division heard a presentation on the state's corporate tax structure Feb. 24, from John James, state assistance commissioner, Compliance Tax Program.

Minnesota counties oppose mental health care fund consolidation, says Dorothy Grotte, president of the Association of Minnesota Counties. The proposal would "straightjacket" counties and dictate what they can offer the mentally ill, Grotte told the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 25.

The money lag in average cost funding (ACF) is causing problems, the Education Division of Appropriations Committee heard Feb. 24. ACF dollars follow students on the basis of two-year-old enrollment figures, educators say. Some said they'd like more immediate funding for new students, but something of a safety net lag against possible enrollment decline.

Deer hunters may have a shot at keeping the two-deer hunting rule if a proposal the Environment and Natural Resources Committee heard Feb. 26 becomes law. An experimental program in current law allows hunters in certain areas of the state to take two deer in the 1986 and '87 hunting seasons. The committee approved HF400 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin) which would make the program permanent. Hunters who want to take advantage of it would purchase an additional license at a cost of about \$16.

Current active members of the Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA) would become immediately vested under a bill Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) presented to the Governmental Operations Committee Feb. 26. HF463 would decrease from 10 to 5, the number of years an employee must work to become vested in PERA. The association has 25,000 active members, 16,000 are women.

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

Do You Know

In 1887, the University of Minnesota became an integral part of the state system of public instruction--in some sense, the head of the system. If you inquired about costs to attend, you'd get information something like this:

"The University has no dormitories. Students live chiefly in families in and about the city. They also form clubs. Prices for board are: in families, \$4 to \$6; in clubs, \$2 to \$3. Self-boarding is a little cheaper. A large number of students gain their whole support by their work while at the University.

"Average expenses are: for boarding in families, \$300; boarding in clubs, \$225. This includes board, washing, fuel, lights, books and stationery, literary society, travel, clothing, and miscellaneous.

"The eastern terminus of the street railway is one block from the main entrance at University Avenue and 14th Avenue S.E. Fare is 5 cents.

Farm mediation law changes

For the last six weeks, the Agriculture Finance Division of the Agriculture Committee has been meeting with farmers, mediators, lenders, farm equipment dealers, and officials from the Minnesota Extension Service to hear of ways to improve the farm mediation program.

Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld (DFL-Waseca) told the division March 4 that his bill, HF210, would address concerns many people voiced at earlier meetings.

Key provisions in HF210 would:

• allow farmers, financial analysts and mediators to meet in an orientation session to prepare for the first mediation meeting;

• prevent lenders from requiring farmers to waive their mediation rights as a condition of a loan agreement;

• require termination statements at the end of mediation;

• allow lenders to inspect a farmer's collateral after the farmer has requested mediation; and

• further clarify the lack of good

faith provision and deny farmers declaring backruptcy from entering into mediation.

The division will vote on HF210 at its next meeting.

Commitment to Focus

Two resolutions that could postpone approval of the University of Minnesota's Commitment to Focus (CTF) program were before the Higher Education Committee March 4.

Authors Rep. Ernie Larsen (DFL-Ramsey) and Rep. Bob Johnson (DFL-Bemidji) presented and discussed their resolutions with committee members.

Larsen says he supports the program, but is cautious because of problems that may not surface until the mid-1990s. He says lawmakers should oversee the development of the program to be responsible to Minnesotans.

Johnson says he's opposed to funding CTF at this time because the Legislature has received too little information about the use of funds and its actual educational impact. His measure would stop any money from going to the University until

after further study.

Both resolutions call for a joint House and Senate subcommittee to study during the interim the University's plan to cut enrollment and focus on graduate education and research.

Work-study dollars

Minnesota college and vocational students may have to work more to get money for school next year.

On Mar. 3, the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee reviewed a plan that would decrease some types of student aid while increasing available work-study money.

The governor's proposed budget would target an additional \$5.3 million for work-study to institutions in areas where opportunities for student employment are most limited. At the same time, the state would cut \$25 million from student scholarship and grant programs.

The proposed 71 percent increase in work-study money would be the second part of the governor's plan that would require students to work more and receive fewer student grants.

The change would both help and hurt students, says David Longanecker, executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB). He says HECB will increase the number of on-campus positions for students at non-metro schools who want to work, but can't find jobs. But, he says, the workstudy increase would take grant money from students and force them to work more than is reasonable.

Rep. Ben Boo (IR-Duluth) opposes the change in funding. He says it would abandon long standing student aid policies.

Osteoporosis prevention

Osteoporosis is a bone disease that affects many people. Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) says the public could benefit from education and prevention programs about osteoporosis.

She sponsors HF178, a bill that would appropriate money for such programs around the state.

Clark says one of the bill's goals is to bring a virtually unknown disease into the open. She says it's a serious problem that hasn't had adequate attention.

On March 3, the Physical and Mental Health Subcommittee recommended the bill to pass. It goes next to the full Health and Human Services Committee.

Lemon law

Car manufacturers who want to do business in Minnesota may have to provide a state-approved arbitration program for new-car buyers.

At a meeting of the Senate and House Commerce Committees March 3, Attorney General Skip Humphrey announced plans for a bill that would amend the state's lemon law to make arbitration more effective.

Most car makers have some kind of arbitration program. Ford and Chrysler have independent arbitration boards; General Motors, AMC, and several others pay the Better Business Bureau to arbitrate disputes.

But Humphrey says some arbitration programs, like Ford's, allow up to four dealers and factory reps to debate, but fail to invite or notify consumers. He says that's not fair.

Under Humphrey's proposal, new car buyers would have access to an effective, fair, and privately run arbitration program. It would require boards to let consumers present oral arguments rather than submit written statements. And the proposal would require arbitrators to offer consumers the same remedies--replacement or refund--that the lemon law guarantees them.

The Legislature passed the lemon law in 1983. It requires manufacturers or their authorized dealers to repair, free, any reported defect or problem their written warranty covers. It also gives consumers the option of replacement or refund of their money if after four repair attempts, the manufacturer cannot correct the problem. Other provisions require consumers to use the manufacturer's arbitration program to settle disputes.

Rep. Joe Begich (DFL-Eveleth), author of the 1983 bill, supports the attorney general's proposal.

Job Skills Partnership

Minnesota's Job Skills Partnership program is successfully training workers for jobs, director Monica Manning told the Economic Development and Housing Committee March 3.

The partnership brings together employers and state schools to train displaced workers; it has placed 2,300 unemployed workers since 1984. That's a 90 percent success rate at a cost to the state of only \$600 per student, says Manning. She says the partnership gets matching grants from companies to pay the rest of the bill. Not only is retraining cheap, the state also saves on unemployment and welfare costs, and collects over \$3 million annually in income tax from those employed workers, she says.

"Capital mobility is very speedy. A plant can leave a town, and open a month later in Mexico. . . . Human mobility is not as fast. One of the roles of the state is to look at how we can assist the human mobility so that people who are displaced will get jobs where new capital is coming into the state," says Manning.

The state can't carry all of the responsibility for retraining workers. But neither can industry, says Manning. A company must hire over 500 workers before their own retraining program would pay off. But only one percent of businesses in Minnesota employ that many people.

Manning says bringing the public and private sectors together is the

most important part of the job program: "The short-term training is of assistance immediately. But the long-term relationships that education is learning how to build with industry, and industry is learning how to build with educators, is the future of keeping a well-trained and well-educated work force will be."

Student work restrictions

A bill that would prohibit high school students under age 17 from working later than 11 p.m. on school nights, got the approval of the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 2.

Supporters of HF110 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin) told the committee that the bill would prevent work from interfering with school. Richard Mans, president of the Minnesota Federation of Teachers, testified for the proposal: "Teachers from all over Minnesota can tell you similar stories about working students falling asleep during class...not because of boredom or lack of motivation. It's exhaustion, pure and simple."

But Rep. Howard Miller (IR-Redwood Falls) says students' work schedules are not for the state to decide. "If schools are allowed to have students participate in athletic programs late at night, how can we say the parents and students can't choose to work late at night?" he asks.

Tom Newcombe of the Minnesota Restaurant, Hotel, and Resort Association says, "These are the folks [parents and guardians] that control the lives of their children. They're the ones that can say, 'if that job is tiring you too much, or the employer is keeping you too late, then get another job or stay home and study.'"

Bar closing time

Later closing times for bars could mean greater economic development, job opportunities, and safer roads for the state, according to supporters of a bill the Regulated Industries Committee approved March 2.

HF397 (Kahn, DFL- Mpls), would allow bars to stay open until 3 a.m. both weekdays and weekends. Supporters say the bill would attract more convention business to the state, create more jobs and revenue, and strengthen the state's tourism industry.

Rep. Phyllis Kahn, the bill's author, says another reason to extend bar hours is to keep drinking drivers off the road while others are driving. She says, "The driving density on the road falls off dramatically after midnight and then starts picking up in the morning. So at 3 a.m. there's just not much traffic on the road."

Phone bill payments

People in towns of 1,000 or more may not have to worry about where they can pay their phone bills under HF152 (Begich, DFL-Eveleth), a bill the Regulated Industries Committee recommended to pass March 2.

Author of the bill, Rep. Joseph Begich, says in his community some people have no place to pay their phone bills because phone companies have closed offices. He says the problem affects mainly low-income and elderly persons. Supporters say the bill would affect at least 165 communities.

Now, according to Begich, those without checking accounts must pay at least \$3 extra for money orders to pay phone bills because they can't mail cash.

Under HF152, if a town's governing body asks for a place for people to pay phone bills, the phone company would provide it.

Opponents say the phone companies that would provide the locations would pass their costs on to consumers.

Department of Revenue

The Department of Revenue is asking the Legislature to grant \$5.2 million over the next two years for 130 additional tax auditors and collectors. Commissioner Tom Triplett told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee March 2 that the department needs the help to track down people and businesses that don't pay their taxes.

But some committee members questioned whether a problem exists, and whether the department could collect enough unpaid taxes to pay for the state's additional staff.

Triplett says prosecuting tax evaders would make people more willing to pay their taxes voluntarily. "The more people perceive the system as fair, the more willing they will be to pay their taxes," says Triplett. He says the department collects \$5 billion annually in taxes, and expects to collect \$49 million more with the added enforcement staff.

The department's other budget requests include funds for improved telecommunication systems, and new quarters for its seven metro area offices.

Farm land values

Recent plummeting of farm land values may bottom out in the near future, according to Mike Wandmacher of the Department of Revenue.

Wandmacher appeared before the Property Tax Division of the Taxes Committee Feb. 27. He told committee members the decline in farm land value that began in the early 1980s is tapering off. And, he says southern Minnesota has felt the effect of decreased land values more than other areas in the state, such as the Red River Valley.

A major problem for farm owners, says Wandmacher, is that even though land values drop, property

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taxes remain the same due to mill rate increases.

According to Department of Revenue figures, average farm land values went down by more than onethird in the last three years.

Media Day at the Minnesota House was Thursday, March 5. Journalists from all over the state came to be part of a learning/working day at the Capitol. Journalists took on the roles of committee members and testifying citizens at a mock committee meeting. Jan Krause Kolars of KEYC-TV, North Mankato, was author-for-a-day of a bill proposing an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution to reduce the size of the Legislature.

Twenty-six states have better groundwater programs than Minnesota according to a report by the Fund for Renewable Energy and the Environment. The state's low ranking prompted Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin) to introduce HF373, a bill that would allow the Hennepin County Soil and Water Conservation District to draw up plans for a countywide groundwater management program. Nelson presented HF373 to the Local and Urban Affairs Committee March 3.

Current active members of the **Public Employees Retirement** Association (PERA) would have a reduced vesting standard under a bill Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) presented to the **Governmental Operations Committee** Feb. 26. HF463 would decrease from 10 to 5, the number of years an employee must work to become vested in PERA. Under the proposal, 25,000 active members, of whom 16,000 are women, would become immediately vested. (correction to story in last week's Session Weekly "Notes")

An 87-page bill that would restructure the Department of Energy and Economic Development (DEED) got a hearing in the Rural Development Subcommittee of the Economic Development and Housing Committee Feb. 26. HF2 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca) would restructure DEED and create the Greater Minnesota Corporation. Bill's author, Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld, says HF2 will go through several committee reviews before it gets to the full House.

State Planning Agency director Lani Kawamura discussed the Rural Development Act, HF2

(Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca), with the Economic Development and Housing Committee March 3. The bill would change the responsibilities of the Department of Energy and Economic Development and establish the Greater Minnesota Corporation.

A bill that would lower and simplify rates for waste disposal in the metropolitan area came out of the Environment Subcommittee of the Metropolitan Affairs Committee Feb. 27 with a recommendation to pass. HF499 (Nelson, DFL-Champlin) would allow the Metropolitan Waste Control Commission to charge a single rate, rather than charging seven rates in different parts of the Twin Cities. The bill also calls for a budget reserve so the commission doesn't have to raise rates in emergencies. HF499 goes next to the full Metropolitan Affairs Committee.

Unemployment Insurance and Worker's Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Relations Committee, heard reviews of workers' compensation insurance from the Insurance Federation of Minnesota and Minnesota's Self-Insurers Association March 2.

Department of Labor and Industry March 3 presented its budget to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee. The department regulates and enforces occupational safety and health, employment standards, and workers' compensation.

Department of Revenue is asking for \$17 million over the next two years to update its automation systems. Present computers are 10 to 25 years old, and are "fragmented, unstructured, and far from adequate," says Deputy Commissioner Ray Dore. He told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee March 4 that better computers would cut down on paper work and help the department collect \$20 million in delinquent taxes.

Positioning Minnesota and the midwest as high-tech leaders was the subject of the Future and Technology Committee's March 2 meeting. Ellen Brown, vice president of the Midwest Technology Development Institute, told committee members her organization is developing cooperative partnerships with industry and education in nine midwest states. The goal? To increase expertise in areas of advanced ceramics and composites, advanced manufacturing, and farm enterprise.

Members of the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee heard continuing budget overviews from the Deparment of Human Services March 2-4.

A 14-year-old computer needs upgrading in the Department of Human Services, says Bob Baird, director of the department's Health Care Programs. Baird told the Health and Services/Appropriations Division March 4 that scotch tape is holding together the computer the department uses to process medical claims. Testimony continued on the state's corporate structure March 2 at the Taxes Committee's Tax Laws Division meeting--John James, assistant revenue commissioner, Compliance Tax Program, again doing the presentation.

Minnesota can expect a four percent inflation increase in 1987, says Dick Todd of the Minneapolis Federal Reserve. He and a Norwest Bank economist say the state's economy will grow at a slower rate than the national average in the near future. They made their predictions at a Ways and Means Committee meeting March 3.

Taxpayers have three new sources of help in the Minnesota Department of Revenue. The department has an Appeals Office, a Problem Resolution Office, and a Taxpayer Information Division.

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1987-88 MINNESOTA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEE COVERAGE

The Minnesota Legislature creates, abolishes, and changes laws to fit the needs of Minnesotans. Legislators introduce hundreds of proposed laws each session. The House of Representatives and the Senate consider bills separately, but they must agree on a bill before it can become law.

The Legislature relies on committees, divisions, and subcommittees to be sure all bills get careful study and review. In the House, the Speaker of the House decides on the committees the House will have, and appoints the members and chairs who will serve on them. The speaker also assigns bills to the appropriate committees by topic.

Here's a list that briefly describes the function of each 1987-88 committee and division:

Agriculture--Sets out

farm policies and programs for assistance to farmers, promotion of interstate and international trade, marketing commodities, and soil conservation.

Agriculture Finance Division--Makes budgetary decisions for programs the Agriculture Committee creates, including sources of funding. Reviews effectiveness and efficiency of farm programs.

Appropriations--

Recommends objectives and goals in appropriating state money; reviews the governor's budget proposals; recommends level of funding for all state agencies and any other program the state finances; provides estimates of appropriations to the Ways and Means Committee; reviews every bill that needs an appropriation even if the bill had its first hearing in another committee. For example, a proposal having to do with agriculture that involves spending money, would go first to the Agriculture Committee or one of its divisions.

Agriculture,

Transportation, Semistate Division--Reviews and makes recommendations for funding of agricultural programs, the World Trade Center, transportation projects, the departments of agriculture and transportation, Economic and boards and organizations the state partially funds.

Education Division--

Recommends funding for the University of Minnesota, state universities, community colleges, AVTI's, and the Department of Education.

Health and Human Services Division--Recommends funding for state health and human service programs.

State Departments

Division--Proposes the omnibus state departments bill appropriating money for state departments and agencies.

Commerce--Addresses consumers' concerns; works closely with the Department of Commerce and the **Consumer Services Division** of the Attorney General's Office in writing consumer protection legislation.

Development and Housing--Makes

recommendations for programs in job development and training, financing businesses, housing and community development, and rural development. Makes recommendations for allocating private activity bonds. Also reviews programs in the Department of Energy and Economic Development.

Education--

Recommends programs for K-12 education. Looks to making education fair and equal among different regions in the state and among different social and economic groups. Also addresses teachers' training and parent/community involvement in education.

Education Finance

Division -- Reviews and makes recommendations for the funding of school systems and educational programs. Creates a formula for distributing funds among school districts.

Environment and Natural

Resources--Concerned with hunting and fishing regulation and promotion, pollution, waste management, wildlife protection, forestry and mining.

Financial Institutions and

Insurance--Concerned with consumer rights in insurance; affordability and availability of insurance for individuals and companies; reviews banking charges and definitions of accounts and services.

Future and Technology--

Concerned with long range economic and job needs, emphasizing Minnesota's place in the world market. Anticipates demographic (population) changes in the state for consideration in educational, economic, housing, health, crime, environmental, tax, and other policy decisions.

General Legislation, Veterans Affairs, and Gaming--

Addresses gambling issues and regulations; veterans' programs; regulation of elections; and other miscellaneous legislation.

Governmental Operations--Reviews

any bill that substantially changes or creates a new state department, agency, commission, board or bureau, though the bill may have had its first review and hearing in another committee; deals with public employee pension plans, and state workers' bargaining procedures.

Health and Human Services--

Reviews and makes recommendations for the policies, goals, objectives, reform and creation of welfare programs; concerned with the availability of programs and services; also deals with the licensing of health care providers and social workers. (The Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee works on the funding of programs.)

Higher Education-

-Makes recommendations for the goals and objectives of AVTI's, state universities, community colleges, and the University of Minnesota; assesses the quality, availablity, and governance of these institutions; concerned with student financial aid and enrollment.

Judiciary--Considers sentencing guidelines, bail requirements, citizen rights, and corrections. Evaluates structure and organization of courts.

Crime and Family Law Division--Concerned with sentencing guidelines and procedures in juvenile deliquency, and child abuse, custody, and support cases.

Labor-Management Relations--Concerned

with negotiation procedures, wages, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and the rights and responsibilities of workers, managers, and owners.

Unemployment Insurance and Workers'

Compensation Division--Deals with the concerns of businesses, workers, and insurance companies, and the effectiveness and availability of unemployment insurance and workers' compensation.

Local and Urban Affairs--Makes

recommendations concerning relations between state and local governments, the impact of federal and state programs on local government, and the jurisdiction, control and bonding authority of local government.

Metropolitan Affairs--Reviews the

structures, goals and programs of metropolitan agencies; concerned with transportation, sewers, roads, bridges, parks, airports, and bonding for state construction projects in the metropolitan area.

Regulated Industries--Concerned

with controls on industries the state regulates, such as liquor, phone, power, and commercial soliciting.

Rules and Legislative Administration--

Establishes a budget for House committee expenses; determines House rules, joint rules, and administrative duties of the House. **Taxes**--Reviews any bill that affects state income, sales, use, or property tax policy, though tax bills may first go to another committee; concerned with budget stability; provides estimates of current taxes to the Ways and Means Committee.

Property Tax Division--Evaluates property tax system, state aid to local governments, property tax relief for individuals, and fairness of tax base.


Tax Laws Division--Concerned with tax laws, including tax formulas, that carry out tax policy.

Transportation--


Concerned with safety, highway construction, maintenance, regulations of road use, and licensing of vehicles.

Ways and Means--

Sets overall spending and taxing policies and limits for the Appropriations and Taxes Committees, and the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee.

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
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Do You Know

Like the Star City program (see "It's a Fact," front page) in the 80's, the establishment of port authorities in the 1920's was a move to help economic growth in Minnesota.

In 1929, the Minnesota Legislature enacted the first Minnesota port authority in St. Paul as an agency to develop river commerce. Today, however, the authority has little to do with river commerce or water ports. It's basically an economic development agency that has helped over 227 firms locate or expand throughout St. Paul since the early 1930s.

Duluth, a port dealing with international goods, has the only "true" Minnesota port authority. Bloomington, Granite Falls, Minneapolis, St. Cloud, South St. Paul and Winona have port authorities similar to St. Paul's.

How a Bill Becomes a Law

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Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

Vending machines

Food vending machine inspection fees could go down under a bill the Local and Urban Affairs Committee recommended to pass March 12.

Rep. Bob McEachern (DFL-St. Michael) sponsors HF469, a bill that would prohibit city and county inspectors from charging their clients more than what the state charges--currently \$15.

Fees are much higher in some cities than in others, says McEachern. He says in Minneapolis, fees go as high as \$75 while in St. Paul they're only \$11. McEachern says his bill would bring some conformity to cities that license and inspect vending machines.

Some legislators question whether cities and counties will lose money and/or drop the food inspection program if HF469 becomes law.

Tom Briant, spokesperson for the Minnesota Automatic Merchandising Council, says cities and counties wouldn't lose money, because they could rewrite their ordinances and charge the maximum \$15 fee for the first

machine and \$3-4 for each additional machine.

Cigarette tax

Raising cigarette taxes, according to the American Lung Association of Minnesota (ALAM), is one of the best ways to stop people from smoking.

That was the message from Dottie Berg of ALAM to members of the Taxes Committee March 12. She says her organization supports a 15cent tax increase on cigarettes, as the governor's miscellaneous tax bill, HF528 (Voss, DFL-Blaine) proposes. A 1985 Harvard University study, says Berg, shows a correlation between higher cigarette taxes and decreased smoking by young people.

Opponents of the cigarette tax article in the bill say a higher tax will drive consumers to neighboring states to buy cigarettes and other goods. Representatives from small business organizations agree. They say the tax increase will hurt small businesses, and that cigarette buyers going to other states will mainly affect the small convenience stores and supermarkets in border towns.

It's a fact!

"We, the people of the state of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this



constitution," states the preamble to Minnesota's Constitution.

The preamble sets a tone of a people united. But fierce party debate, not unity, marked the founding of our state. (See "Do You Know?" on back page)

Veterans Home bridge

The Minnesota Veterans Home owns a bridge it would happily turn over to the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT).

The 600-foot bridge spans Minnehaha Creek in south Minneapolis and connects Minnehaha Avenue to the State Veterans Home. It's over 70 years old and needs significant structural repair to bring it up to state standards.

Veterans Home officials told Governmental Operations Committee members March 12 the bridge serves as a vital link for fire and ambulance service to the Home, and between the Home and the nearby U.S. Veterans Hospital. But they say their expertise lies in human services, not bridge maintenance and repair.

MnDOT officials agree bridge maintenance would come under department jurisdiction. However, they feel that the repair project has a better chance for timely completion if it stays with the Veterans Home.

Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls) plans to meet with Hennepin County officials, and Veterans Home and MnDOT officials, to work out a compromise. The Governmental Operations Committee will take up the issue later this session.

St. Paul TVI

Legislators toured St. Paul Technical Vocational Institute (TVI) in light of a \$7.3 million building project request.

Dr. Harlan Sheely, St. Paul TVI director, told members of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee March12 that \$5.3 million would go to remodel existing space and replace an unused one-story athletic facility with a five-story classroom tower. He said the 35,330 square feet of useable space in the tower would replace 12 portable classrooms and reduce overcrowding at the school.

Construction costs also include a child care center that could

accommodate about 80 students' children. Sheely said the day care center would allow students to spend free time with their children, one of the biggest problems forcing students to drop out of programs.

If legislators approve the request, only 85 percent of the total will come from state funds. Local school district levies would raise the balance.

College planning

A measure that would expand the scope of post high school planning programs won approval of Higher Education Committee members March 11.

HF640 (L. Carlson, DFL-Crystal) would expand career counseling to eighth graders planning to go to a college or a vocational-technical institute after high school. Broadened services would also help adults interested in post-secondary education.

David Longanecker, executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Board, says the expanded program would enrich the program now serving 11th and 12th graders. New services would also serve the growing number of adults re-entering the education systems, he says.

Speaking in support of the bill, Carol Pomroy, Minneapolis Public Schools' counselor, says the program would reduce the number of redundant tests students take to assess their skills. Assistance would also encourage early planning and encourage students and adults to consider the full range of post-secondary options, she says.

The bill now moves to the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

U of M spending

Members of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee, March 11, started unraveling the University of Minnesota's plans for money the University wants for Commitment to Focus (CTF).

Stanley Kegler, vice president for University Relations, says University officials plan to sink 65 percent of the additional \$24 million they've requested into improving undergraduate instruction on all University campuses. The biggest chunks of money would go to courses in the Institute of Technology and general education instruction at U of M-Duluth, he says.

Because the distribution of public education dollars depends on student numbers, Kegler says the University has over-recruited students. And problems of high enrollment, he says, result in mediocre, impersonal instruction to oversized classes.

Kegler says U of M officials think decreasing undergraduate enrollment will mean smaller classes and more personalized, quality instruction.

"It's possible to have very good graduate programs and very bad undergraduate classes," he says. "Right now the kind of strengthening we need at the University's graduate level is surpassed by changes needed in undergraduate classes. At the end of CTF, we will still have three undergraduates for every one graduate. We just intend to pay more attention to them."

Child restraints

"Minnesota's child restraint law has no teeth," says Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls). "Threefourths of the drivers in this state could drive through the loopholes in the law," he says.

Skoglund sponsors HF29, a bill he says would put teeth into the state's child passenger protection law. It would make all drivers (not just parents or legal guardians) responsible for buckling children under four years old properly into a child restraint.

The bill would set a \$25 fine for first-time offenders, but would exempt from the restraint requirements: children in emergency

vehicles, children riding with peace officers, and children who, for medical or physical reasons, can't ride in safety seats.

The Transportation Committee recommended the bill to pass at a March 11 meeting.

At the same meeting, the committee also recommended HF269 (Kahn, DFL-Mpls), a bill that would prohibit bicyclists and people who walk, skate, or jog on Minnesota roads from wearing headphones that cover both ears.

License plate impoundment

Drunk drivers may face stiffer consequences if the Legislature approves a package of bills the Judiciary Committee's Crime and Family Law Division heard March 9.

Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul) and Rep. Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope) presented four bills proposing changes to DWI laws currently on the books.

Under one of the bills, offenders would have to hand over their drivers licenses and their license plates until they regained their right to drive.

Steve Simon, director of the Minnesota Criminal Justice System DWI Task Force, supports all four proposals. About plate impoundment, he says, "You can't stop somebody from driving by merely taking the plastic out of [his or her] wallet, especially the problem drinker...we have to take what we consider to be reasonable measures to literally separate individuals from their vehicles until such time as they have dealt with their chemical dependency/chemical abuse problem."

As the law stands now, judges have the *option* to impound plates. Simon says *requiring* judges to impound them would make sentencing more uniform.

However, Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester) says he's concerned the proposed changes to DWI laws would give judges less power to tailor sentences to individual situations.

Crime victims

Crime victims would have a chance to tell their stories and offer sentencing recommendations to the court under a proposal Rep. Art Seaberg brought to the Judiciary Committee March 10.

HF336 (Seaberg, IR-Eagan) would give victims the right of allocution, that is, the right to talk to the judge before sentencing. Victims would submit an oral or written statement to tell about harm or trauma they've experienced, economic damages they've suffered, and what they think is appropriate sentencing.

According to Fern Sepler-King, executive director of the Crime Victim and Witness Advisory Council, 24 states grant the right to allocution.

Sepler-King says victims often become invisible in our courtrooms. She says that Seaberg's bill is a way to insist that victims count among those who need consideration at the time of sentencing.

Judiciary Committee members recommended the bill to pass and sent it to the House floor.

Hazardous waste transporters

Minnesota's Department of Transportation (MnDOT) may begin licensing hazardous waste transporters if legislators agree with HF298 (Long, DFL-Mpls), a bill the Environment and Natural Resources Committee heard March 10.

The bill is the result of efforts by MnDOT, the State Attorney General's Office, and industry representatives to come up with a workable proposal to regulate hazardous waste transportation.

The bill would require the commissioner of transportation to set rules governing such things as driver qualifications, operational safety, and equipment repair and maintenance. Transporters would have to display the name and address of the licensee on both sides of their vehicles. The bill would also allow the commissioner to revoke licenses for any serious or repeated violations of rules or laws.

Tom Johnson, Minnesota Waste Management Board, favors the bill. He says it would allow agencies to look at transporters before they start to haul hazardous waste, consider their qualifications and track records, and provide some better enforcement tools.

Marianne Curry, Minnesota Chamber of Commerce, says the chamber supports reasonable efforts to provide for safe transportation of hazardous substances. But, she says, one of the chamber's concerns with this bill is that it may take away transporters' right of due process if it allows the commissioner to revoke licenses without a hearing.

Caboose requirements

Cabooses may ride Minnesota rails again under a bill the Transportation Committee recommended to pass March 10.

Since 1982, cabooses have disappeared from local runs; the reasons are many. Railroad representatives at the March 10 meeting rallied around a 1982 collective bargaining agreement between the United Transportation Union and major railroads that allowed certain trains to run without cabooses. They also pointed to studies that show trains run just as safely without cabooses as with them.

Union officials maintained cabooses make trains safer. They gave examples of train accidents (such as the one in Miamisburg, Ohio) that may not have happened if a caboose and crewperson had been at the rear.

"The crew in the caboose are the eyes and ears of a very fast moving freight train," said Robert Carlson, mayor of Thief River Falls. "Safety should not be traded to profit railroads," Carlson said.

Under HF428 (Welle, DFL-Willmar), trains 2,000 feet or longer, transporting hazardous materials in Minnesota would have a caboose--and in that caboose would be a conductor. Exempt from the caboose requirement would be short line railroads, trains traveling short distances from the terminal, and trains running on block signal territory.

Rep. K.J. McDonald (IR-Watertown) says HF428 will impact farmers. He offered an unsuccessful amendment to exclude unit trains hauling grain.

HF428 goes next to the House Floor.

Mental illness

"If you had a heart attack or cancer you'd be covered [by insurance]," says Rep. Gloria Segal (DFL-St. Louis). " But, we're on our hands and knees pleading for a cap of 60 hours a year for an illness that's costly to the state, devastating to families, and ruins too many people's lives."

High medical costs and poor insurance coverage cause middle-class Minnesotans with mental illness to suffer more than patients with any other illness, according to Segal.

She told the Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee, March 10, that current laws and insurance don't provide enough coverage for mental illness. Also, she said social stigmas and custodial costs make mental illness twice as difficult for middle income patients and their families who can't afford treatment without relying on welfare.

Segal is author of HF412 which would require insurers to cover 80 percent of the first 10 hours of treatment for mental illness each year, with an option for additional treatment. The bill would also provide group treatment for families with a minor child under a doctor's treatment.

Insurance companies say they oppose the bill. They say additional costs of added treatment would be a considerable cost for insurers and would raise premiums.

Educational teamwork

The Education Division of the Appropriations Committee looked at five programs in the governor's recommendations March 10 that would link public higher education services to workers and businesses that need training and assistance.

Higher education system representatives explained two existing and three proposed initiatives for individuals and businesses. They said the programs would be a cost-effective way to aid economic development while building communications between education and business.

Training programs would work to improve skill levels of workers to keep up with technology's rapidly changing operation, maintenance, and repair. Programs would also coordinate services to businesses, and provide management counseling.

Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld (DFL-Waseca) says he's afraid the governor's plans could cut the state's ability to create the Greater Minnesota Corporation. He cautioned members to carefully consider the economic development programs that are in the higher education budget.

Workers' compensation

Minnesota workers' compensation cases wait an average of 15 months before they get a hearing by a judge, says Chief Administrative Law Judge Duane Harves. On March 9, he asked the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee to approve funding for 10 additional judges and six support staff members to cut down on case delays.

Harves says, "Minnesota, without a doubt, has the most complex workers' compensation law in the country." To simplify the system, he recommends that the Legislature put workers' compensation back on a single track system. The present triple track system categorizes claims by type of litigation in an attempt to speed up the process. But because many cases fit into more than one category, a single claim may be in all three tracks at the same time, says Harves.

Drug testing

Labor representatives, toxicologists, physicians, and business owners testified in favor of the need for drug testing regulations, and more testimony is to come on HF42 (Pappas, DFL-St. Paul).

The Fair Employment Practices Subcommittee of the Labor-Management Relations Committee began hearings March 9 on HF42, a bill that would regulate drug testing in the workplace.

The bill would "balance the rights of employers and employees, ensure that drug tests are as accurate as possible, and limit testing to circumstances that threaten individual or public safety," says Rep. Sandy Pappas, author of the bill.

AFDC mothers

More money for higher education child care could help cut the number of single mothers on state welfare lists, according to Joe Graba, Minnesota AVTI director.

Graba told the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee members March 9 that AVTIs currently educate over half the 5,000 AFDC mothers in public higher education systems. He said the governor's plan to channel \$10.6 million to child care could provide single mothers with assistance to continue their education.

Graba says he expects vo-techs would get the largest chunk of child care dollars because of the number of AFDC mothers and older, nontraditional students in the system. Graba says this additional money would compliment current federal funds the system now targets at subsidizing child care costs for single parents and allow the money to expand efforts to train AFDC mothers to support themselves. "If we get adequate funding for child care," Graba says, "more of the money set aside for single parents [by the federal government] could be channeled into programs to enhance their chances of enrolling and succeeding in AVTI programs."

Long distance deregulation

Deregulation of Minnesota's AT&T long distance service may give consumers greater choices--and higher prices, according to testimony on HF189 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids). The bill was before the Regulated Industries Committee March 9.

AT&T representatives claim present regulation discriminates against AT&T because it is the only long distance company the state regulates. They say deregulation will bring a more level playing field to the industry, greater competition among long distance carriers, and more choices for the state.

A spokesperson for a senior citizens' group says senior citizens fear that deregulation will let long distance companies raise their prices. He says senior citizens, most of whom are on fixed incomes, worry that long distance costs will rise above their means.

Alternative minimum tax

The Minnesota Chamber of Commerce warns that an alternative minimum tax, part of proposed corporate tax reform, could seriously harm small business in the state.

Mark Anderson, representing the chamber, told the Tax Laws Division of the Taxes Committee March 6 that the state shouldn't create a new corporate tax and expect business to shoulder a shortfall when the time comes to balance the state budget.

Anderson says the corporate tax reform proposal would add an undue burden on the business community. And, he says, the proposal seems inconsistent with the state's forwardlooking economic development goals.

Clarification/correction:

In the "Housing Finance Agency" highlight on page 1 of the Feb. 27 issue of *The Session Weekly*, paragraph three should have read:

In compliance with the governor's budget recommendations, the Housing Finance Agency proposes to eliminate urban Indian housing programs and to reduce most other loan programs. But the agency is asking continued funding for elderly home sharing, and is developing a new program for the renovation of rental units.

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Highway speed limits could drop to 20 miles per hour when maintenance crews are at work if HF323 (Lieder, DFL-Crookston) becomes law. The bill would allow road authorities to set speed limits in highway work zones 15 miles lower than the posted speed, but no lower than 20 miles per hour. Crews generally cone off the areas and put up warning signs and arrow boards a half-mile or so before the work zones. But Leonard Levine, commissioner of transportation, says highway maintenance workers have had a lot of near misses.

The farmer-lender mediation

bill is in the Agriculture Finance Division where legislators are hammering out a compromise plan. At a March 11 meeting, division members adopted an amendment that would allow contract-for-deed holders who are in mediation to file a lien for the reasonable rental value of the property. This is the first of many expected amendments to come before the division.

Smoking-related illnesses caused 4,500 deaths in Minnesota in 1984, according to Department of Health statistics. Mike Moen from the department told Taxes Committee members March 12: cigarette taxes have directly decreased cigarette consumption; the 1985 cigarette tax lowered cigarette use by nine percent; and 12 states have cigarette taxes higher than Minnesota's.

The time has come to license social workers, says Mary White of the Minnesota Coalition for Licensure of Social Workers. White appeared before a March 12 meeting of the Health and Human Services' Physical and Mental Health Subcommittee. She says the time has come for accountability in the social work field. According to coalition statistics, unethical and incompetent practices by social workers have resulted in over 80 reported cases of harm to clients. White says coalition members have no doubts that the social work field needs regulation.

HMO members may pay higher premiums if the

Legislature accepts a proposed two percent premium tax on some health care providers. Roger Wheeler, Minnesota Council of HMOs, told a March 6 meeting of the Tax Laws Division of the Taxes Committee that a two percent premium tax would pass right on to consumers. He says because Minnesota HMOs are nonprofit organizations, they have no profit margin that will absorb the proposed tax.

Minnesota is the only state that, by law, has nonprofit Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs). Minnesota enacted the Health Maintenance Act of 1973-giving life to this innovation in health care systems--and required the system to function on a nonprofit basis.

Department of Labor and Industry's commissioner Ray Bohn, and judges from the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals gave budget overviews to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee March 5.

Bemidji, Virginia, Winona, and Fairmont hosted the Job Development and Job Training Subcommittee of the Economic Development and Housing Committee public hearings March 6 and 7. Topics for discussion were displaced workers, emergency employment development, and jobtraining. in Bemidji, Virginia, Winona and Fairmont. Media people made news at the Capitol March 4. They took on the role of legislators at a meeting of the Governmental Operations Committee where they considered and voted down a proposal that would reduce the size of the Legislature and stagger legislative terms. Over 100 press people from all over Minnesota spent their day following the legislative process at the House biannual "Media Day on the Hill."

Budget reviews continue in State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee. Presenters March 6 were: The Council of Black Minnesotans, Public Employee Relations Board, and the Office of Administrative Hearings. March 10,11, and 12: Pollution Control Agency's water quality, air quality, and solid waste disposal programs; Waste Management Board; and the Department of Employee Relations.

Every dollar a farmer spends generates an additional \$7 in the economy, according to the Minnesota Corn Growers Association. The association's hoping for passage of HF777 (G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham). The bill would make ethanol a required ingredient in unleaded gasoline at Minnesota pumps after June 30, 1987.

In a late evening meeting March 12, the Canterbury Downs bill got a recommendation to pass from the General Legislation, Veterans' Affairs, and Gaming Committee. The bill, HF740 (Kostohryz, DFL-North St. Paul), would lower the parimutuel tax and drop the state's share of the breakage. Committee member, Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter), opposed the bill because he says it helps one ailing business without balancing cuts for farmers.

Utilities; trade practices; restricting use and connection of automatic dialingannouncing devices to telephone lines; proposing coding for new law.

HOW A BILL BECOMES A LAW

A bill is an idea for a new law, or an idea to abolish or change an existing law. Several thousand bills enter the legislative process in Minnesota each time the Legislature meets.

Minnesota has a bicameral Legislature, or two groups of elected citizens (senators in the Senate, representatives in the House of Representatives) who study, discuss, and vote on bills, acting for the people of Minnesota. Bills begin their legislative journey in either the House or the Senate, or both. To become a law, all bills must pass in both the House and Senate, and go to the governor for signature.

The idea

Anyone can propose an idea for a bill - an individual, consumer group, corporation, professional association, governmental unit, or the governor. Most ideas come from members of the Legislature. The revisor of statutes puts the ideas for bills into proper legal form as a bill for introduction. Only legislators can introduce bills into the lawmaking process.

Chief author

The legislator who sponsors and introduces the bill in the Legislature is the chief author. The chief author's name appears on the bill with the bill's file number for identification as it moves through the legislative process. The chief author may select up to four other authors, whose names also appear on the bill.

Introduction in the Legislature

When the author introduces a bill in the House, it gets a House File (HF) number (HF264, for example), indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction. In the Senate, the bill gets a Senate File (SF) number (SF224, for example). Each HF in the House usually has a companion SF in the Senate. All revenue-raising bills must begin in the House.

Committee consideration

At introduction, the bill has its first reading. (The Minnesota Constitution requires three readings on three separate days for all bills.) The presiding officer of the House or Senate refers the bill to an appropriate committee for action. All committee meetings are open to the public. A committee may: recommend passage of a bill in its original form; recommend passage after amendment by the committee; or make no recommendation, in which case a bill may die when the session ends. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its actions and recommendations to the House or Senate.

General orders

After approval of the committee report in the House and Senate, the bill has its second reading and goes onto General Orders-a list of bills waiting House action. House members, acting as the Committee of the Whole, discuss bills, debate the issues, adopt amendments, and present arguments. They may recommend that a bill "do pass," recommend postponement, or have further committee action.

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Calendar

The calendar is a list of bills the Committee of the Whole recommends to pass. At this point, a bill has its third reading. Amendments to a bill on the Calendar must have the unanimous consent of all House members in this final vote. By committee recommendation, noncontroversial bills may bypass General Orders and go directly onto a Consent Calendar, usually passing without debate. Every bill requires a majority vote of the full membership of the House and Senate to pass.

Conference Committee

If the House and Senate do not agree on a bill, a conference committee of three or five senators, and an equal number of representatives, meets to reach an agreement. If both bodies then pass the bill in compromise form, it goes to the governor.

Governor

When a bill arrives at the governor's office, the governor may: sign it, and the bill becomes law; veto it (return it with a "veto message" stating the objections); pocket veto the bill (take no action and let adjournment of the Legislature, in effect, veto the bill); or line veto portions of appropriation bills. If the governor does not sign or veto a bill within three days after receiving it, and the Legislature is in session, the bill automatically becomes law.

Budget forecast

The state may have an extra \$77 million to spend on state programs in the next biennium, according to Finance Commissioner Jay Kiedrowski.

Kiedrowski spoke before the Ways and Means Committee March 19. He says the state's budget forecast exceeds a January forecast by about \$61 million. Athough the state has already earmarked most of the money, Kiedrowski says a \$6-million hedge remains.

The commissioner says the forecast increase comes from unexpected receipts due to federal tax shifting, warm weather, and the new federal W-4 form. He says the state economy will experience modest growth over the next biennium, but that further growth really depends on the national economy.

The forecast increase, says Kiedrowski, will allow the state to restore \$30 million to the higher education fund and \$11 million to the state's interest buydown program to help distressed farmers.

Local government mandates

The state calls on local governments more and more to carry out local services. But those mandates have become burdensome to local governments, according to county and city officials who testified at a Local and Urban Affairs Committee meeting March 19.


They claim that some state laws are silent on how local governments should carry out services, and that some services impose added costs, but don't benefit citizens.

Under HF518, a bill Rep. Wayne Simoneau, (DFL-Fridley) sponsors, all agency rules or bills the Legislature introduces after Dec. 31, 1988 that impose a mandate on local governments, would state goals and expectations, outline how local governments should carry out the mandate, and provide information on its effectiveness.

HF518 would give local governments the option to turn down certain mandates and rules if the state does not supply the funds for them. The bill would also create a division that would review state mandates and rules on local

governments once every five years. The committee laid the bill over for interim study.

Latch key kids

A program that could give latch key kids a place to call home before and after school got attention of lawmakers March 18.

Bill sponsor Rep. Steve Trimble (DFL-St. Paul) told members of the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee that in1995, two out of three school age children will have working mothers. He said youngsters left on their own before and after school when their parents are at work need attention.

The program HF694 proposes would aim funding for educationally oriented child care at hours bordering the school day. School districts could levy up to \$1.25 times the district's population to pay for the service.

Trimble says the part-time child care would cost the state between \$5.1 and \$5.7 million. But, he says, counseling costs for kids who don't receive any child care would be 10 times more than the price of the new program.

Representatives from Minneapolis and St. Paul school districts support the proposed plan. Nick Tamali, director of community education in Mounds View, speaks for the plan, but says he hopes lawmakers would allow the Department of Education to license the facilities.

Elementary class size

Smaller elementary class sizes was the recommendation of five bills the Education Committee considered March 18.

All five bills call for pilot programs that would establish and test results of smaller classes for kindergarten through third grade. Proposals would cut class size from the common 30 to 1 pupil-teacher ratios to rooms with about 15 pupils per teacher. Educators say large classes provide unmanageable situations for teachers, and result in lower quality instruction for children. They say pupils need more one-on-one attention for academic and emotional development.

Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury) and Rep. Gene Pelowski (DFL-Winona) say studies in Tennessee and Indiana have shown student performance increases with reduced class size. They and 23 other House sponsors of the legislation say it's time to test the plan in Minnesota.

The committee rereferred the bills to the Finance Division of the Education Committee for further consideration.

Gasoline prices

"The petroleum industry has a twotier pricing system whereby refiners charge service station dealers 6 to 10 cents more for fuel than what they charge wholesalers," says Brian Ettesvold, spokesperson for the Minnesota Service Station Association.

Ettesvold remarks came at a March 17 meeting of the Commerce Committee where legislators recommended to pass HF661 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey), a bill that would allow service station dealers to purchase fuel from either a wholesaler or refiner, even though they're under contract to buy fuel from certain refiners.

Given this option, Ettesvold says some service station dealers could buy gas cheaper from wholesalers and consumers could save money at the pumps.

Doug Johnson, a representative from Amoco, disagrees. He says the bill would increase gas prices and could lead to supply shortages.

"A price differential doesn't mean that a dealer could buy gas below Amoco's dealer buying price," Johnson says. Suppliers such as Amoco base the two cost structures on different services and expenses which relate to wholesaler and dealer accounts, he says. Service stations now under contract to buy fuel from refiners would not benefit from HF661. The bill would apply to contracts service station owners make after Aug. 1, 1987, Ettesvold says.

Collision coverage

Minnesotans who buy collision coverage when renting a car may be paying too much for something they already have, according to Commerce Commissioner Mike Hatch.

Members of the Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee heard testimony March 17 on coverage and costs of buying Collision Damage Waiver (CDW) protection when renting a car.

Lawmakers are looking at a section of HF392 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) that would allow the state to limit costs that some insurers say is too high and unnecessary.

Gerald Knickerbocker (IR-Hopkins) says renters unfamiliar with their own auto coverage often blindly purchase the \$8.95-a-day collision coverage (which releases renters from collision costs) even though their own policies cover rented vehicles.

But a National Car Rental system spokesperson says they train their employees to explain to customers that CDW is an option. They say the CDW is not insurance, and the rates shouldn't be state controlled.

Bond allocations

A bill that would define procedures for the allocation of tax-exempt bonds came out of the Economic Development and Housing Committee March 17 with a recommendation to pass.

Testifying for the League of Minnesota Cities, Gene Ranieri says HF754 (Rest, DFL-New Hope) is a reaction to the 1986 Federal Tax Act limiting tax-exempt financing. "Cities have always used tax-exempt financing to build things like schools, sewers, streets, and police stations. And cities have used

Industrial Development Bonds (IDBs) to stimulate economic and commercial development," says Ranieri. He says Congress began limiting tax-exempt bonding in 1980 because federal lawmakers saw it as a drain on the federal budget.

Federal tax reform reduces Minnesota's bonding authority to \$316 million in 1987 (\$75 per capita) and to \$210 million in 1988 (\$50 per capita). Author of the bill, Rep. Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope), says, "Bonding caps were \$2 billion for Minnesota in 1984. That's a sharp reduction in a very short period of time."

State agencies and the League of Minnesota Cities wrote HF754 as a way to decide who should get the few bonds that will be available. The bill ranks manufacturing, multifamily housing, student loans, redevelopment, and single family housing projects, in that order, for bonding priority. Cities could apply to the state for bonds on a first-come first-served basis.

Tax-exempt property

In an effort to broaden the state's property tax base, some tax-exempt property may go on the tax rolls. That was the message from the Department of Revenue at a March 17 meeting of the Property Tax Division of the Taxes Committee.

Mike Wandmacher of the Department's Property Tax Review Division explained to members that many areas of tax-exempt status are uncertain because statutes are not clear. He says the department needs legislative guidance to make decisions on some tax-exempt property that could possibly be additions to the property tax base.

Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain) says changes may have to happen to stop abuses of the process. He says some organizations have unfair advantages in tax court when litigating a tax-exempt decision. Wandmacher adds that these cases are largely due to unclear laws that determine who gets tax exempt status.

According to Wandmacher, a few of the unclear categories may include religious broadcasting stations that advertise, recycling centers, and daycare centers run out of churches, which he says, may give unfair competitive advantages.

Minnesota Trade Office

Minnesota Trade Office director William Dietrich told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee March 17 that the office is committed to promoting Minnesota businesses in international trade. "For every dollar that's been spent on our budget, we have generated \$32 in sales, contracts, loan guaranteed exports, and investments," says Dietrich.

He says Canada is Minnesota's number one trading partner, and the office has also targeted markets in Korea, Taiwan, and Scandinavian countries. "We don't want to be just another state expanding into Japan," says Dietrich.

He says the office tracks down trade leads, and conducts workshops around the state to educate Minnesota businesses on how they might enter the export market.

The office's 1988-89 budget requests include funds to: rent space in the World Trade Center, establish a continental European trade office and an Asian trade office, upgrade promotions of the port of Duluth, buy an International Trade Show display, promote the sale of forest products, and create a consortium of international small business development centers.

Mental health care

Minnesota ranks 37th in the nation in the mental health field, says Allyson Ashley, assistant commissioner of the Department of Human Services. But the state could reassert its leadership, she says. Ashley spoke for HF 765 (Segal, DFL-St. Louis Park), at a March 17 meeting of the Health and Human Services' Physical and Mental Health Subcommittee. She says the bill would meet the mental health needs of communities in the state's 87 counties.

The aim of the bill, she says, is to create a unified, accountable, and comprehensive mental health care system by 1990. "We need to make sure that we close the gaps the clients have fallen through in the past," says Ashley. "So we're talking about what's necessary to have a system work for all 87 counties."

Rep. Gloria Segal says the bill marks two years of hard work that has laid the groundwork for a desperately needed system. She adds that it's time the state recognizes mental illness as treatable for over 80 percent of the mentally ill population.

Employee drug testing

The Fair Employment Practices Subcommittee of the Labor-Management Relations Committee recommended to pass an employee drug testing bill March 16. Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul) proposes HF42, a bill she says would balance the rights of employers and employees, and make sure drug tests are accurate. HF42 would prohibit random drug testing, and allow employers to test an employee only when they suspect drug use, and only when safety is at risk.

Business owners, toxicologists, physicians, and labor representatives testified in support of the measure. Tobey Lapakko of the Minnesota AFL-CIO says, "Dependence on alcohol and/or other drugs is a major contributor to the deterioration of family life, impaired job performance, increased absenteeism, and the rising rate of crime. There are those who will tell you, 'Test everyone. That's the only way.' What of the presumption of

innocence? Shouldn't the working force be protected under the provisions of the Constitution? This legislation does that."

But the Minnesota Chamber of Commerce says the bill is too restrictive because employers could test only workers in safety sensitive jobs.

The bill goes next to the full Labor-Management Relations Committee.

Commercial/industrial property taxes

Commercial and industrial (C/I) property taxes in Minnesota are rising faster than inflation, and the state needs to reduce them for the sake of Minnesota commerce, says Jim Stuebner, National Association of Industrial Office Parks. Stuebner presented his organization's views to the Property Tax Division of the Taxes Committee March 16.

Stuebner says his association surveyed several states with large industrial and commercial developments and found that Minnesota's C/I property taxes are an average of 160 percent higher than other surveyed states.

Stuebner's organization is calling for a reduction in C/I property taxes from about 5 percent to 2-1/2 percent. He says this will give Minnesota some tools to develop more commerce; lower property taxes will attract more business. The lower taxes will help small businesses who are sometimes hurt the most because they don't have a relocation option, says Stuebner.

Some small business owners say one of their largest expenses is property taxes. An owner of a \$1 million facility says he pays about \$64,000 in property taxes annually, and that property taxes are one of the main reasons small businesses don't expand. He says they need the extra money to reinvest in and expand their companies.

Stuebner says he opposes C/I property tax increases the Department of Revenue has proposed. To create new property tax revenue, he says, the state may want to look at some tax exempt property--other than churches.

Minnesota robotics

Home-grown robotics technology may make Minnesota the birthplace of advanced robotics.

Minnesota Project Innovation, Inc. (MPI) is an organization whose purpose is to help start companies involved in technology development and manufacturing. Officers from MPI spoke to Future and Technology Committee members March 16. They explained how their organization helps foster entrepreneurial efforts of creative Minnesotans.

With funds from a federal grant MPI told him about, native inventor Mark Rosheim is busy developing new technology for robotics. He says his several wrist and joint patents may usher in future applications for robots in the home, industry, and NASA's proposed space station. Rosheim started his own company with MPI's help. Now, he says, many companies are curious about his robotics technology, especially in the area of aerospace application.

Members of MPI say grants for inventors and entrepreneurs like Rosheim are desparately needed to keep technology in the state and carry it into the manufacturing stage.

James Bracke, president of Life Core Biomedical, Inc., a St. Paul biomedical firm, says Minnesota is one of the best places in the world to develop technology-oriented firms. But, he says, the state has to do more to keep the technology after the initial incubation stage.

Arts high school

Minnesota's tuition-free arts high school could be a reality as early as September 1988.

James Undercofler, director of the Minnesota School and Resource Center for the Arts, gave Education Committee members plans for continued development and phase-in of the statewide high school, March 16.

Current proposals call for a fouryear phase-in of courses beginning in fall 1988. Instruction for each of the 550 students would cost the state approximately \$5,000 per year, with an additional \$2,600 for non-metro students' room and board.

In the arts school, students would learn to use their talents and skills in a variety of professions, not only in arts careers, according to Undercofler. An incorporated resource center would allow all Minnesota students and teachers additional involvement in the arts and arts education like the established programs in North Carolina and Alabama, he says.

Critics of the proposal say sinking money into the program could throw a new problem into current school equity discussions. They also say specialized arts training rarely results in actual careers in the arts.

But Rep. Kathleen Vellenga (DFL-St. Paul) says that, in time, specialized arts training can pay off. "There is this perception that no one can make money in the arts," she says. "So we take away from people the very thing that they need to do to earn money in arts, which is to have excellent preparation."

DWI proposals

Drivers courts convict of DWI may find it tougher to get back on the road after Aug. 1, 1987. The Crime and Family Law Division of the Judiciary Committee gave preliminary approval March 13 and 16 to several bills that make up a DWI package.

HF704 (Rest, DFL-New Hope) would require offenders to give up license plates and registration certificates for vehicles they were driving at the time of their offense. Any member of the offender's household who has a valid driver's license could get temporary plates, carrying a special series of identifying letters or numbers, at a

cost of \$20.

HF590 (Rest, DFL-New Hope), would let a judge suspend a DWI offender's final sentence for up to two years. The second year would be unsupervised, unless the judge determines that supervision is still necessary.

HF705 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) would require certain DWI offenders to take a comprehensive chemical-use assessment. If the assessment report recommends the defendant receive care for his or her chemical-use problem, the court must either require such care as a condition of probation or suspended sentence, or carry out the sentence.

The full Judiciary Committee will continue hearings on the bills during the next few weeks.

Mental retardation

The state's way of dealing with mentally retarded citizens is outdated and unrealistic, John Clawson, executive director of the State Council For The Handicapped, told the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee March 13.

At the standing-room-only hearing, lawmakers got the public's reaction to a Department of Human Services proposal to move 400 mentally handicapped individuals from state hospitals to smaller group homes and independent living situations.

Supporters say it's time the state provides more alternative care to meet the needs of the mentally retarded. Clawson says the handicapped need to live in communities and not in isolation if they are to have quality lives. "There is the potential to develop community options that reflect a full range of choices for persons with disabilities." Minimally, this includes the right to live in a normal sort of environment, says Clawson.

Opponents say the proposed shift would limit rights of people to choose the kind of care they'd like loved ones to have.

Livestock productivity

A bill that would authorize a study to look at the reasons farmers are struggling with decreasing milk production and high livestock losses got a recommendation to pass from the Agriculture Committee March 13.

Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples) sponsors HF349 which calls for a livestock low productivity study. According to Krueger, the commisssioner of agriculture would select a study team to inspect dairy farms that are near high voltage wires and are subject to the effects of stray voltage. The team would also look at other farms where milk production is low and livestock health is poor for other reasons. The team would report its findings to the Legislature no later than Feb. 1, 1989.

An advisory board of farmers, utility representatives, a practicing veterinarian, and University of Minnesota and Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Board representatives would assist the study team. They'd meet quarterly to review progress reports on the study.

HF349 goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

In other action, the committee recommended passage of a resolution calling on the federal government to pass legislation that would require the Farmers Home Administration to participate in the Minnesota Farmer-Lender Mediation Program.

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Of the state's 300,000 hearing impaired, about 5,000 need mental

health care services, according to Dr. Howard Dickman, director of hearing impaired health and wellness services at St. Paul Ramsey Hospital. Dickman supports the Department of Human Service's current budget proposal. He says it's a step in the right direction for the state's mental health delivery system for the hearing impaired.

Rising industrial and

commercial property taxes are a serious problem, according to Rep. Kathleen Blatz (IR-Bloomington). She says the issue is not so much a business issue as a job issue. Rep. Elton Redalen (IR, Fountain) says, the average effective tax rate for commercial and industrial property in greater Minnesota is 7 to 8 percent; about 5 percent in the metro area.

"The exempt rolls are

growing each year," says Don Monk, Hennepin County assessor. And tax exempt property in the Twin Cities metro area has grown about 55 percent from 1980 to 1986, according to a 1986 Department of Revenue report. Greater Minnesota tax exempt property increased about 28 percent for the same time period, the report says. Monk says \$6.1 billion, or about 15 percent of an estimated \$40.5 billion in property in Hennepin County is tax exempt.

Minimum 9-1-1 emergency phone service would include a standard automatic caller/location identification feature under HF839 (Rukavina, DFL-Virginia). It would display a caller's address and name on a viewing screen. The bill would require 9-1-1 answering points, serving at least 50,000 phones, to include the feature. The feature has saved lives of callers unable to identify themselves, says Rukavina. Users would pay with a four-cent phone bill increase.

A resolution urging U.S.S.R. General Secretary Michail Gorbachev and the Soviet Chief of Immigration to grant exit visas got the unanimous approval of the Judiciary Committee. Immediate visas would go to Jewish former prisoners of conscience and those who've waited over 10 years. Next they would go to those the Soviets have refused to issue visas to for 5 to 10 years. Rep. Gloria Segal (DFL-St. Louis Park) is the author.

Definition of "marital status" in laws the State Department of Human Rights enforces would expand under HF208 (Minne, DFL-Hibbing). The State Human Rights Act would include a definition that would mean employers couldn't refuse to hire a qualified job applicant because the applicant's spouse holds elected public office, is a candidate for elected public office, or is politically active.

Minnesotans have ideas that could transform life in the 21st Century, according to Minnesota Project Innovation (MPI). The Governor's Commission on Small **Business Innovation Research Grants** created MPI, a non-profit organization, in 1983 to help entrepreneurs with innovative new technologies. MPI also promotes and provides assistance in getting key federal grants for small business innovation and development (SBIR). MPI people say, in 1983, before MPI, Minnesota businesses captured only six SBIR grant awards. By 1985, with MPI's help, they say, local entrepreneurs won 27 SBIR grant awards.

Almost \$8 million per year will go back to taxpayers because of rehabilitation efforts in Minnesota's Department of Jobs and Training. The department reports that, in 1985, its programs rehabilitated 4,400 persons who had vocationally handicapping disabilities and got them into the work force. State taxpayers will save money over the lifetime of these people because they're employable, the department claims. Public Assistance payments will decrease almost \$48 million, and new workers will add about \$31 million to the state's tax rolls in their lifetimes, according to the report.

Minnesota could regain its place as the nation's leading wild rice producer, say supporters of HF589 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin). The bill would allow the DNR to sell over 2,000 acres of state land to wild rice farmers who want to expand production to meet growing consumer demands. Last year, Minnesota fell behind California in production yields. For the first time in history the state doesn't control the wild rice market.

New safety rules and

mandatory licenses could soon be a requirement for hazardous waste haulers traveling in Minnesota. Under HF298 (Long, DFL-Mpls), transporters of hazardous waste would have to get licenses from the Minnesota Department of Transportation. They'd pay \$500 for a threeyear license and \$25 dollars for a vehicle identification tag. The commissioner of transportation could revoke or suspend licenses for serious or repeated violations of rules or laws governing transportation of hazardous waste.

Two-for-one park permits could be available this year for people who visit Minnesota-Wisconsin Interstate Parks. The parks are on the St. Croix River--in Minnesota, just south of Taylors Falls, and in Wisconsin, just south of St. Croix Falls. HF554 (Rukavina, DFL-Virginia) proposes a reciprocity agreement between Minnesota and Wisconsin to let people visit both parks with a state park motor vehicle permit from either state.

State park users who own more than one motor vehicle would get a break this year. Under HF554 (Rukavina, DFL-Virginia), Minnesota park users who purchase one motor vehicle permit at full price (\$15) could apply to the Department of Natural Resources for a second motor vehicle permit at half the cost.

Department of Energy and Economic Development (DEED) Commissioner David Speer says he supports proposed changes in DEED, among them, those that would: shift the energy division to the Department of Public Service; move the Minnesota Trade Office to DEED from the Department of Agriculture; and create partnerships in economic development projects among state and local authorities, higher education, and businesses.

To care for an aging veteran population, the state will need more veterans' hospitals and nursing homes, predicts Jeff Olson, assistant commissioner of the Veteran's Affairs Department. He says by the year 2000, the number of veterans over age 65 in the state will have doubled to nearly 140,000. Half of those will be over 85.

TV ads with actress Linda

Kelsey, and a seasonal newspaper promoting recreation and the arts, triggered nearly 400,000 inquiries for state travel information - almost all from out of state, the Tourism Office reports. That's up 95 percent since 1985. Posters, bumper stickers, brochures, booklets, and guides are all part of the Office of Tourism's "Explore Minnesota" tourism promotion.

The World Trade Center Board is developing programs to bring in revenue including seminars, workshops, and an accredited degree program in international trade. "The World Trade Center is going to be a terrific resource for small businesses, 90 percent of whom do little or no international trading right now....," says Board President Rick Nolan

A bill that would establish the state workers'

compensation insurance fund as a domestic mutual insurance company gained a recommendation to pass from the Unemployment Insurance and Workers' Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Relations Committee. The bill would allow the state board of investment to invest in certificates, surplus notes, or debentures of domestic insurance companies the fund issues.

LIBRARY School administrators

Elementary and high school principals told Education Committee members March 25 they oppose a bill that would put them back in a classroom as teachers every five years.

HF977 (Nelson, K., DFL-Mpls) would require principals, superintendents, and supervisory personnel to teach fulltime for at least one academic term every five years. Nelson said the requirement would put administrators back in touch with classroom reality and would help them support and better understand teacher development plans.

Principals say most of them have already taught six or more years, and understand the challenges and needs of teaching.

Harold Boyum, Northdale Junior High School principal says he's skeptical about the plan: "I'm not sure that the principal's participation in the classroom is necessarily where you want to go. It's sort of like the coach of the basketball team. The coach doesn't go out and play the game every

five years." While administrator's professional organizations say they support the concept, they say administrators can better help

teachers in the coaching capacity. Members amended the bill to allow voluntary administrator participation.

Scholarship fund

A bill that would set up a permanent scholarship fund for state education systems came out of the Higher Education Committee March 25 with a recommendation to pass. The bill, HF182 (Jaros, DFL-Duluth), would take \$15 million from the Permanent University Fund (PUF) and an equal amount from the state general coffers as set-aside money for yearly scholarships. The fund balance would remain intact from year to year, but interest the money earns would fuel merit scholarships for students throughout the state.

Students from AVTIs, state community colleges, and state universities would split the

estimated \$1.2 million in yearly interest on the money in the fund which comes from the state's general fund. University of Minnesota students enrolled on the coordinate campuses of Duluth, Crookston, Waseca, and Morris would also have a chance at approximately 600 scholarships of \$2,000 each from their own scholarship fund.

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Rep. Mary Forsythe (IR-Edina) says excluding Twin Cities campus students from the scholarship money would be unfair. But bill supporters say it would balance the state funding currently going to the University for endowed professorships, money that other campuses and systems don't get.

The bill now moves to the Appropriations Committee.

Hazardous waste disposal

Legally disposing of hazardous waste is becoming so costly that it encourages illegal actions, according to Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin).

Nelson sponsors a bill, HF401, which specifies criminal penalties for violators of hazardous waste laws or rules. He says current laws can't deal with situations the attorney general's office has encountered.

The bill would target those who intentionally and illegally transport, treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste. It also goes after anyone who intentionally provides false or inadequate information.

Critics from the industry say the perception outside is that those within are all "bad guys." They say business tries hard to comply with a maze of regulations. They encourage legislators to deal with willful violators, and avoid entrapping everyone.

The Judiciary Committee recommended the bill to pass March 24 and sent it to the Governmental Operations Committee.

Wastewater treatment grant program

Almost 200 Minnesota communities need new or improved wastewater facilities to resolve serious pollution problems, says Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth). Most are small communities that even with public assistance, face critical issues of affordability and economic hardship, he says.

The Environment and Natural Resources Committee, March 24, recommended to pass a bill that the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (PCA) says fits the specific needs of those small communities.

Munger says his bill, HF1030, would provide state money to continue the wastewater treatment construction grant program which the federal government previously funded. It would allow grants to communities for amounts up to 80 percent of the cost to build or update wastewater treatment facilities, he says.

Speaking in favor of HF1030, PCA director Tom Kalitowski says, "...given the decreasing federal dollars, coupled with the smaller communities limited ability to pay...it's really the state's obligation to step in with some kind of financial support if we are to achieve our long-time goals of protecting state waters."

Kalitowski says, with this bill, the PCA feels it has a plan for dealing with wastewater treatment needs.

Beginning farmers

Farmers looking to get a start in agriculture could get low-interest loans under the beginning farmer program. Supporters say the program could help stabilize plummeting land values which forced many farmers to default on their loans and turn back acres of land to the state and many lenders.

Under the program, qualifying beginning or re-entry farmers could apply for low-interest loans to purchase parcels of land the state or commercial lenders own. If a lender loans a farmer money, the state would guarantee 85 percent of any losses on the loan contract.

The loan guarantees could not exceed \$100 million and the maximum loss the state could accrue is \$12,750,000, says Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld (DFL-Waseca), chief author of HF776, the bill that creates the beginning farmer program. "We've built these safeguards into the program to reduce risk to the state," Schoenfeld says,

To qualify for the beginning farmer program, applicants must: demonstrate an ability to run a stable farm operation; have a net worth of less than \$150,000; and agree to take part in an approved farm management program for five years.

The bill has the support of Farm Credit Services (who agree to make loans to eligible buyers), the Farmer's Union, and the Farm Bureau. The Agriculture Finance Division recommended the bill to pass March 24. It goes next to the full Agriculture Committee.

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Lemon law

A bill that would toughen the state's lemon law moved out of the Commerce Committee March 24.

Rep. Joe Begich (DFL-Eveleth), sponsor of HF845, says the bill would amend the auto warranty law to make arbitration effective as a speedy, inexpensive alternative to going to court.

The bill would require all auto makers in Minnesota to provide a state-approved arbitration program that allows consumers to make oral presentations when they arbitrate disputes. "Some programs don't offer consumers an oral hearing. And it's not fair," Begich says.

The bill would also require arbitrators to apply lemon law guidelines during arbitration. This would give consumers the right to replace a lemon with another vehicle or get their money back including any sales tax, towing, or rental expenses they paid. Doug Blanke from the Attorney General's Office says some consumers who get a refund have to go to court to collect these extras. This should prevent the court trip, Blanke says.

An attorney representing General Motors (GM) testified additional regulation is not necessary. He says GM has an arbitration program that works just fine. GM pays the Better Business Bureau to arbitrate disputes, and under the program, consumers can make oral presentations and could get a buyback after two significant repairs, he says.

Faradic electric shock

Minnesota would outlaw an electric shock treatment for the severely retarded under a bill the Health and Human Services' Social Services Subcommittee recommended to pass March 24.

Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) sponsors the bill which would prohibit the use of faradic electric shock to keep individuals from physically harming themselves. Staff members administer faradic shock with a hand-held, battery-operated device that connects to electrodes on a person's skin.

Clark says the state should give more money to teach personnel other treatment methods. She says evidence shows treatment centers could use alternatives to faradic shock that are less restrictive, intrusive, and abusive. "It seems to me there are plenty of other methods that can be used," says Clark. "And we don't need to preserve something in our state law that is outlawed internationally."

Opponents of the measure say that in some extreme cases, faradic shock is the only viable treatment. Without the treatment, they say, some profoundly retarded individuals could kill themselves or cause themselves irreparable damage. Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter) says he thinks the Legislature should give medical professionals and the Department of Human Services the freedom to have a state or federal court decide faradic shock cases.

Human Services officials say, right now, only one person in a state treatment center receives the shock treatment. And the committee adopted an author's amendment from Clark to phase-out the shock treatment for that person.

The bill goes next to the full Health and Human Services Committee.

Minimum wage

On a vote of 74 to 53, the House approved a proposal March 23 to raise the state's minimum wage 20 cents in 1988 and 30 cents in 1989. The original bill proposed a \$1 increase over the two-year period. The final version represents a compromise legislators worked out after hours of discussion in committee and on the House Floor.

Opponents say the measure will increase an employer's cost of doing business, resulting in layoffs of those who need jobs most. And members representing border towns say a minimum wage increase would draw lower-paid, experienced workers from other states, leading to unemployment for less-skilled Minnesotans.

Supporters say the minimum wage represents a safety net for those who want to work. And they say adjusting the minimum wage means giving fair pay for the work.

The bill's author, Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul), says Minnesota has between 150,000 to 175,000 minimum wage workers. About 30 percent are teens, two-thirds women, and one-third heads-of-households.

Unemployment insurance

The Unemployment Insurance and Workers' Compensation Division of the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 23 debated HF284 (Welle, DFL-Willmar). It's an unemployment insurance bill that would create a quarterly reporting system, lower the maximum weekly benefit, lower the amount a worker has to earn to qualify for benefits, and increase the number of weeks a worker has to work to requalify after quitting a job.

Supporters say HF284 would allow full-time workers, making minimum wage or just above, to qualify for unemployment insurance benefits. Most low-wage earners don't get any other benefits--not health insurance, sick leave, vacations, nor retirement. "Unemployment insurance would allow them one badly needed benefit," says Margaret Boyer of the Child Care Workers Alliance.

But Glen Mayer from St. Mark's Lutheran Nursing Home in Austin testified against the bill. He says nonprofit organizations, and other employers, would still have to pay unemployment benefits to some people who voluntarily quit their jobs.

Mayer says a worker who quits one job, works somewhere else for eight weeks and then gets laid off, could get coverage for unemployment from the first employer. "Why should I be responsible for the unemployment of a worker who voluntarily quits?" says Mayer.

Rep. Steve Sviggum (IR-Kenyon) says a bill he's proposing would eliminate that problem by requiring workers who quit or get fired for misconduct to start over in gaining eligibility for unemployment insurance.

Plant closing

Some businesses would have to announce plant closings or major layoffs 120 days in advance under HF649 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin). The bill got a recommendation to pass from the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 23.

Author of the proposal, Rep. Paul Ogren, says HF649 would only affect employers who have hired at least

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100 employees for six months, and whose layoffs would reduce employment by at least 20 percent. It would not affect construction sites or other temporary workplaces.

Ogren says the measure gives workers and communities some time to prepare for the economic blow of a plant closing. Right now, a company can close a plant without forewarning.

The bill doesn't create any new programs for the unemployed or distressed communities. But it does set up a system so people can more easily find out about already existing services.

The bill would also require companies to provide severance pay and health insurance for a period of time after a layoff. The bill goes next to the Taxes Committee.

Drug testing

A bill that would prohibit random drug testing got a favorable recommendation from the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 23, and is on its way to the House floor. Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul) says her bill, HF42, would balance the rights of employers and employees, make sure drug tests are accurate, allow testing only when individual or public safety is at risk, and only when an employer has reason to suspect drug use.

Pappas says the United States Bill of Rights protects individuals only against government intrusion. She says her bill would extend that protection to the private workplace.

Those opposed to the measure argue the bill would restrict employers too much in disciplining workers. "I think this bill is too lenient and protects drug users," says Rep. Steve Sviggum (IR-Kenyon).

But Pappas says the bill wouldn't restrict other ways an employer could deal with drug use, such as firing a worker. "But if they're going to take bodily fluids from their employees to test for drug use, then they have to follow these guidelines," says Pappas.

Phone service deregulation

The Regulated Industries Committee heard a bill March 25 that could deregulate Minnesota's telephone service.

The bill, HF701 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids), would provide a phasein approach to deregulating all phone services in Minnesota. Under the bill, the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) would authorize a company's deregulation on the basis of the competitiveness of its service with other carriers.

PUC Chair Barbara Beerhalter told members, "the bill provides clear legislative direction that competition is the policy of the state, but the commission feels it has reduced regulatory restraints about as far as it can without more legislative and statutory direction."

Supporters at that hearing said one of the most important consumer protection features of the bill would require the PUC to hold public hearings before considering deregulation of a phone service.

At a March 23 meeting, the attorney general told lawmakers that consumer protection is a key provision of the bill. He says the state should ensure that deregulation "must not work a hardship on the millions of telephone users in this state."

The committee recommended to pass a similar bill March 16--one that would deregulate only long distance service in the state.

Programs for disabled

The state is catching the vision that physical disabilities no longer have to mean dependence, says John Clawson of the State Council for the Handicapped.

He says the state has entered a new era of progressive programs that benefit the independence of the state's handicapped. And he urged the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee, March 20, to construct a budget to strengthen programs that allow disabled persons to live integrated and independent lives.

Old programs and old ways of funding, says Clawson, fostered longterm dependence. He says old ways of treating the disabled drain the spirits of those who could lead independent lives, under the right circumstances. Clawson also cautioned members that a fair distribution of funds across the state is essential to ensure that quality programs exist for disabled in "all four corners of the state."

Education merger

"It's not a new or revolutionary idea," says Rep. Ernie Larsen (DFL-Ramsey) of his bill that would merge Minnesota's Community College and AVTI systems.

Larsen presented HF1100 before a House and Senate committee March 20 in hope that lawmakers could bring the 20-year-old merger issue to a vote. The measure proposes a marriage of the two systems, not a takeover, says Larsen. The merger would follow the lead of 19 other states and make it easier for students who have problems working between the separate systems, he says.

Although Joe Graba, state director of AVTIs, says they do need credit system and governance changes, he's afraid that AVTIs will lose visibility and strength in the merger. He says merging staff salary scales could cost the state about \$20 million in the next biennium.

But bill supporters say legislators shouldn't look on the merger as a money saver. Community College Chancellor Gerald Christensen believes that one consolidated system would work better for students.

"This bill is not designed to save all kinds of money," says Christensen. "I doubt that there are big savings in dollars, but I think the emphasis should be on service to the

student and service to the state of Minnesota. I think that is appropriate."

Committee deadlines

On Feb. 11, the House adopted a series of deadlines to help move bills through the legislative process. • After Friday, April 10, the House must refer committee reports on House Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action. • After Tuesday, April 28, the House must refer committee reports on Senate Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action.

These deadlines don't apply to committee reports from the Taxes or Appropriations Committees, or to the education finance bill. • After Friday, May 8, the House can act on only conference committee reports, bills that the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee report (Special Orders), and bills in messages from the Senate or governor.

The deadlines are part of the 1987-88 Permanent Rules of the House.

The state and nation could lose between \$250,000 and \$300,000 each year if the state cuts programs to help blind business people. Eighty-eight blind Minnesotans contribute to local, state, and federal tax coffers each year, says Jack Hicken, Minnesota Business Enterprise Program for the blind. Minnesota's business program for the blind is one of the best in the country, says Hicken.

Commission on the Economic Status of Women announced final commission member appointments. House members are Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls), Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn), Sidney Pauly (IR-Eden Prairie), Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope). Gloria Segal, (DFL-St. Louis Park) chairs the commission.

Small rural school districts

are working on plans to link classrooms with television monitors. Several school districts are testing interactive television to offer advanced or specialized courses to a small number of students. The twoway audio-video systems allow students and teachers to hear, see, and talk to classmates in schools miles apart. They transmit over fiber optic cables, the same lines many telephone companies use for phone service.

House members passed a new compulsory education bill, 105-19, March 23. Lawmakers say HF432 (McEachern, DFL-St. Michael) would regulate home schools without running into legal trouble, as the1985 law did when the Minnesota Supreme Court struck it down. The bill lays out six requirements for teacher qualifications and requires yearly testing of private and home school students.

A new sales tax proposal may

increase state income \$260 million over the biennium, according to the Department of Revenue. Commissioner Tom Triplett calls the proposal a base-broadening effort that would extend sales taxes to exempt products and institutions. According to the department, the measure would gather almost \$127 million from state and local governments and about \$51 million from non-profit sales taxes. Other new revenue would come from sales tax on nowexempt products.

Large corporations can bypass some sales taxes by owning their services, such as telecommunications systems, but small businesses are locked into paying new sales taxes, says Minority Leader Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park). He says any new sales tax makes it harder for small business to compete. A 300-page bill making its way to the House floor would combine current economic development laws dating from 1947 to 1985 into one law. The bill would make economic development laws more consistent, logical, and easy to understand by putting them all in one place and getting rid of obsolete and redundant language, says its author, Rep. Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope).

DNR wants the governor's recommended \$10.5 million

budget increase to improve trails and parks, for water resource management, fire-fighting equipment, and other needs. Deputy DNR Commissioner Steve Thorne says DNR's budget is only 1.5 percent of the state budget. Not much, he says for managing12,000 lakes; 94,000 miles of water ways; 5.3 million land acres, including 4.6 million acres of forests; and 64 parks. The department generated \$141 million in revenue last biennium from user fees, land leases, sale of hunting/fishing licenses and permits, and services. "Almost half our budget...," says Thorne.

The \$64 million additional revenue over previous

forecasts is mainly due to trade improvements and warm weather, says state economist Glen Nelson. Construction crews continued to work through the mild winter, so the state collected more in income taxes and didn't pay out as much unemployment compensation. Also, road repair costs have been lower this year. The governor wants to use the unexpected money to refund his previous cuts in student financial aid and renter's tax credits and to increase bonding for building projects. Watching mock dog fights from his tent in the Boundary Waters Canoe area doesn't appeal to Rep. Tom Rukavina (DFL-Virginia). Rukavina's concerned about U.S. Air Force's proposal to hold bomber training flights 300-500 feet over northeastern Minnesota, including the Boundary Waters Canoe Area. He's sponsoring a bill that would create a commission to study environmental and economic effects training flights would have. The Air Force proposes B-52, B-1B, and FB-111 bombers fly four runs during the day and one at night at speeds of 450 and 580 mph.

"Local government may be able to eat the cost, but it would be awfully difficult chewing," says Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain). Redalen opposes a proposal that would require local governments to pay sales tax.

The bidstead program is

Koochiching County's grass roots plan to lure families to the economically depressed area, says Rep. Bob Neuenschwander (DFL-Int'l Falls). Neuenschwander sponsors HF779, a bill that would allow qualified bidstead applicants to build and maintain a homestead on 40 acres of land Koochiching County owns. In return for homesteading and paying property taxes for a total of 10 years, program participants would get warranty deeds for the land.

People who operate and use the state's public transit system turned out for a Mar. 23 meeting of the Agriculture, Transportation, and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee. Transit officials called for transfer of the motor vehicle excise tax into the highway user and transit funds to prevent cuts in service. They say public transit is the lifeline for senior citizens, low-income people, and disabled persons. Without it, they say most of these people would be cut off from society.

Should the federal government do away with milk marketing orders? Minnesota milk producers say, "Yes." Milk marketing orders came into vogue in the 1930s when milk supplies and prices were at an all-time low in some areas of the country. Legislators and the state's agriculture commissioner say the orders have had a negative effect on upper midwestern producers, and that the federal government should get rid of or change them so they benefit midwestern milk producers.





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Do You Know

The United States Constitution is 200 years old and has functioned longer than any other written constitution of the modern world.

In May 1787, when shapers of the document met in Philadephia, only a few of the nation's 3.5 million population voted or participated in public life. Native American tribes saw themselves as independent nations. Most black men and women were slaves. Women had virtually no role in public life. Married women had no legal or political identity separate from husbands. White American males, too poor to qualify to vote or hold office, had no political power.

Because the status of these excluded groups contradicted ideals of the Revolution, they challenged the bookish and scholarly creators of the Constitution to develop a charter that would unite the people as a nation. Therefore, although powerless, they played an important role in the shaping of American politics. (see "It's a fact!" front page)

Animal dealers

Bunchers (or bounty hunters) collect dogs and cats--often right out of owners' yards--and turn them over to animal dealers for money. Dealers are in the business of providing unwanted or stray animals to research facilities for experimental purposes. But Rep. Rich O'Connor (DFL-St. Paul) wants to make sure those animals really are unwanted or strays--and not pets.

O[°]Connor proposes to license dealers, and require that they keep records on all animals in their care. This includes information on who brought the animal to the dealer and where the dealer placed the animal. O[°]Connor's bill, HF683, would set a penalty of up to \$1,000 for violators.

O'Connor told the Governmental Operations Committee, "...if we pass this bill, we'll go a long way in protecting the pets of the people in the state of Minnesota...there are some very unscrupulous people out there currently operating, and...it just takes one or two bad apples to bring to our attention the fact that we need to mandate laws that would

regulate the dealers." The committee recommended the bill to pass April 2 and sent it to the Appropriations Committee.

Government sales tax

Minnesota cities oppose extending the state's six percent sales tax to local government purchases. They say the extension would raise property taxes.

would raise property taxes. On April 2, speakers for the cities told the Taxes Committee that the practice of government taxing government is bad public policy. They say a new sales tax on local government is a roundrobin scenario that would eventually burden property taxpayers.

Lori Hacking of the League of Minnesota Cities says the sales tax measure comes at a difficult time when shrinking tax bases are raising property taxes in many areas of the state.


The Association of Metropolitan Municipalities says the state's tax policy has been like a roller coaster ride since the early 1980s. They say the policies need stabilization,

It's a fact!

The Legislature adopted the "Wild Lady Slipper or Moccasin Flower," or Cypripedium Calceolus, as the state flower in February 1892. Mrs. A. L. Stebbins of Rochester was a leading force in presenting a signed petition to the Legislature urging its adoption.

Women of the St. Anthony Circle, through Mrs. E. C. Chatfield of Minneapolis, later announced that the calceolus didn't grow in Minnesota. So in February, 1902, the Legislature changed the designation to the reginae.

Thus, the Cypripedium Reginae, a member of the orchid family, the showy, regal, pink and white moccasin, became the state flower. The name Cypripedium comes from Greek words meaning the shoe of Venus. Its common English and American popular names, Lady's Slipper, Moccasin Flower and Indian Shoe, refer to the sac (pouch-like) and somewhat shoe-like form of the largest petal. The plants grow preferably in cool and moist woods and in bogs. They flower from May to June.

Handicapped parking

People who unlawfully park in handicapped parking spaces could pay a \$100 fine if law officers catch them.

A bill, HF629, making its way through the Legislature would increase the handicapped parking fine from the present \$25 to \$100.

"The stiffer fine should discourage violators", says Michael Ehrlichmann, spokesperson for the Minnesota Council for the Handicapped. "We believe if the fine for parking in a handicapped parking spot has what we call an "ouch" factor, non-disabled persons may be less inclined to violate the law," Ehrlichmann says.

Rep. Tony Bennett (IR-Shoreview), a St. Paul police officer, says officers may be reluctant to tag if the price of the violation gets too high.

Other provisions in HF629 would require that all handicapped parking signs display the new fine. And people who illegally use handicapped certificates or license plates wouldpay a \$500 fine under the guidelines of the bill.

Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin) sponsors HF629, which the Transportation Committee recommended to pass April 1.

Interest buydown bill

The interest buydown bill, which for the past two weeks has been on hold in a House and Senate conference committee, cleared the House of Representatives April 1.

The compromise bill would provide \$14 million to extend the state-run interest buydown program for one year. Under the program the state would pay 2.8 percent and lenders 1.7 percent on the first \$60,000 of an operating loan to eligible farmers. To qualify for the loans, farmers must have a debt-toasset ratio of more than 50 percent, have a reasonably good long-term financial outlook, and take part in an approved adult farm management course at the request of a lender.

HF1 (Olson, K., DFL-Sherburn) would also provide \$1.5 million in 1987 and 1988 for a state lender/Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) interest subsidy program that Minnesota farmers could use to get low-interest loans. And it would pay off the state-run interest buydown program's present \$14million deficit.

In other action this week, the farmer-lender mediation bill moved out of the Agriculture Finance Division to the full Agriculture Committee. The amended version of HF210 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca) would extend the program for another two years and would allow farmers and mediators to meet in orientation sessions to prepare for the first mediation meeting.

The bill calls for a termination statement at the end of mediation. It also would allow contract-for-deed holders and farm equipment dealers who are in mediation to file a priority lien for the fair rental value on the property or seasonal machinery they've rented or sold to the farmer.

Illegal drugs, death

Is a seller of an illegal drug guilty of a felony if the buyer dies after injecting the drug? Under current law, the Minnesota Supreme Court said the seller would be guilty only if he or she actually injected the drug into the buyer.

Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester) disagrees. So, March 30, he presented HF350 to the Judiciary Committee's Crime and Family Law Division. He says the bill should help clarify the Legislature's intent.

Testifying in favor of Bishop's bill, Olmsted County Attorney Ray Schmitz says, "...the purpose of the statute is to extend the felony murder doctrine to the sale of a controlled substance where that sale causes the death of a human being."

The division recommended the bill to pass March 31 and sent it to the full Judiciary Committee.

Cigarette tax

A hike in cigarette taxes may make Minnesota a smoke-free state by the year 2000, according to the Department of Health.

Members of a Health and Human Services subcommittee heard a bill March 31 that would increase cigarette taxes by 18 cents a pack. A large part of the new tax would pay for a proposed Institute for Health Research to look into cancer and drug abuse.

Health Commissioner Mary Madonna Ashton says the bill follows a 1985 cigarette tax increase and prevention program the department aimed at young people. Ashton sees this measure as a means to strengthen that effort: "I believe the bill will assist us in preventing today's youth from experiencing smoking related death and disability in the future."

The new tax measure would also fund several Health Department programs including health insurance for low-income families, AIDS research, and a statewide cancer surveillance system.

Prefabricated homes

Owners of some prefabricated homes and other single-family houses, may get advice from the state on how to stop their homes from molding and rotting.

Many of these homes are so airtight, moisture can't escape. They rot, and wet insulation freezes in the winter making them icy cold. Poor ventilation also causes respiratory health problems for residents. And homeowners say repairs often cost more than the house is worth.

Rep. Harold Lasley (DFL-Cambridge) has introduced HF673, a bill that would create a task force to help homeowners find practical solutions to these problems. The task force would also study other air quality problems in dwellings, such as flue gas spillage.

But Rep. Paul Thiede (IR-Pequot Lakes) says HF673 doesn't address the source of the problem. He says state and federal agencies may have misled buyers by putting a seal of approval on the plans and inspections of the homes. About 4,000 people have bought the homes in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Northern Michigan.

Economic Development and Housing Committee members gave HF673 a recommendation to pass March 31. The bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Financial aid

The \$77 million the state budget forecast uncovered in March could both help and hurt college students who pay for part of their education with state dollars.

David Longanecker, executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Board, told the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee March 31 that the governor's revised budget reverses an earlier plan that would have forced students to work more, and get less help from the state. He said a \$30 million funding increase would have noticeable impact on scholarship and work-study programs.

New plans would restore a recommended \$25 million cut in state grant and scholarship programs. The move intercepts a decrease that would have cut 10,000 students from state-aid rosters and increased the student's share of education costs to 60 percent. Longanecker said the replaced money will allow education funding to stay at the current 50 percent share for both students and state.

The governor's revised budget drops a call for an additional \$6.3 million it originally earmarked for a new non-metro focus work-study program. Although work-study funding will remain unchanged from past years, Longanecker says that if lawmakers pass minimum wage legislation, the dollars would be less help to students.

Election changes

Two bills that would change the timeline for Minnesota politics got the go ahead from a House subcommittee March 31.

HF1327 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) would move precinct caucuses ahead from the third Tuesday in March to the fourth Tuesday in February. Rep. Wes Skoglund says the bill would revoke a change the Legislature made in 1984 to accommodate national party conventions, and put Minnesota needs back in the political spotlight.

"With our current caucus date, Minnesota is an afterthought for presidential candidates," he said. "If we want to be heard...if we want our messages out there...if we want input into the process...then I think we should move ourselves up earlier (in the process)."

Both IR and DFL parties say they support the non-partisan issue as a way to increase voter participation and local impact in national elections.

But Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul) says the change would abandon former political ideas and cave in to media, editorials, and national candidates.

Elections Subcommittee members recommended to pass HF1128 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park), a bill that would move primary elections from September to June.

Rep. Linda Scheid says political parties, media, and public have discussed moving the election as a way to add some new lifeblood into Minnesota's primary system. Seven weeks between elections isn't enough time for candidates to organize for general elections, especially statewide campaigns, she says.

Committee members opposed to the measure say summer vacations and farm work could interfere with voter participation for June elections.

Property tax exemption

Tax-exempt organizations may start paying property tax under a proposal the Property Tax Division of the Taxes Committee heard March 30. Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul), sponsors the proposal that would add several tax-exempt organizations to the state's property tax rolls.

Osthoff says the proposal comes at a time when exemption from property taxes is skyrocketing. He says the number of current exemptions goes far beyond what constitution framers intended. Osthoff calls the measure a "rational, meaningful way to reform property taxes without creating new revenue sources."

Some supporters say that as much as \$22 billion worth of property in the state is now tax exempt. Under the bill, they say the addition of exempt property would reduce property taxes by about seven percent.

Hospital representatives say, combined with a proposed sales tax, the new property tax would have a devastating impact on hospitals.

Parental leave

A bill that would require employers of 10 or more workers to give new mothers and fathers up to six months unpaid parental leave, got a recommendation to pass from the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 30. The bill would also allow parents to use sick leave days to care for an ill child.

Opponents say the measure would be harmful to women in their childbearing years because employers wouldn't want to hire them.

But supporters say the bill wouldn't cause discrimination against women because it applies equally to mothers and fathers. "This bill would help alleviate parents' conflict between supporting and raising their families," says Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls), author of HF234. He says allowing parents unpaid time off doesn't put an undue burden on employers, and assures that new parents aren't forced to put their families in economic jeopardy.

Budget resolution

The Ways and Means Committee voted 12 to 4 March 26 to recommend a resolution that would cap state appropriations for spending at \$11.29 billion for fiscal years 1988 and 1989.

Speaker Fred Norton, committee chair, says the measure is an increase of about \$55 million over the governor's proposal. He says the resolution reflects an emphasis on education, property tax relief, and welfare reform. The budget resolution also includes a \$250 million reserve fund.

Norton says the budget will underfund some programs and exclude others. He says the budget proposal would cut spending by \$61 million, but would reflect an increase of \$40 million in K through 12 education spending.

Norton says he expects the House to adopt the resolution next week.

Business interest buydown program

A bill that would create an interest buydown program for small businesses got a favorable recommendation from the Economic Development and Housing

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Committee March 26. The bill, HF442 (Steensma, DFL-Luverne), is similar to the farmer interest buydown program.

If HF442 becomes law, the state would pay 37.5 percent of the interest on loans to heavily indebted rural businesses. Banks or other lenders would pay 12.5 percent. The business itself would have to pay 50 percent of the interest on an outstanding loan. Supporters say lowered interest rates allow businesses to pay back their loans, instead of going out of business.

But Rep. Don Frerichs (IR-Rochester) says the state should make reductions in the direct costs of doing business rather than "propping business up temporarily with a buydown program." And Rep. John Burger (IR-Long Lake) says the program would cover up symptoms of a bad economy without really solving the problem.

Supporters of the measure argue that helping people stay in business is cheaper for the state than supporting unemployed citizens. They say rural businesses need assistance because hard times more deeply effect them than businesses in urban areas.

Rep. Becky Kelso (DFL-Shakopee) says, "We in urban areas have diversified economies. That's the main difference. If you lose your job in Shakopee or Bloomington, you don't necessarily have to move because there's enough diversity to find work. But the only choice when you lose your job in a single economy community is to leave. There's a rapidly spiraling down-turn in farming communities. This bill would provide some help to stop that decline.

HF442 goes next to the House Appropriations Committee.





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A bill that would lower credit card interest rates to an amount closer to the federal reserve discount rates is HF242 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul). Author says the bill would allow businesses with \$25 million annual gross sales, or more, to charge a 10.5 percent rate or 4 points over the reserve rate. Businesses with sales under \$25 million could charge 24.5 or 6 points above reserve rate. Rates couldn't go higher than 18 percent.

The \$11.291 billion budget resolution passed in the House March 30 on a 71.61 vote after hearings in the Ways and Means Committee and debate on the House floor.

The bill that would give insurance breaks to about one fourth of Minnesota drivers won a 131-2 House vote March 30. The bill calls for insurance firms to extend their discount rate offer to drivers 55 or older who pass an accident prevention course. About 6,000 drivers 65 and older have taken the course since the first premium reduction law passed in 1985.

St. Paul District public schools met state desegregation regulations for the first time in over 10 years in the 1985-86 school year. District representative Mary Gilbert says five elementary magnet schools, offering specialized programs, attracted students from throughout the district and improved racial balance.

Productivity, rather than the market may be the best way to value agricultural land in the state, says Rep. Don Frerichs (IR-Rochester). Artificially high market values, says Frerichs, cause many farmers to file law suits, which the courts award, lowering property values as much as 40 percent under market value. Frerichs says the state should look seriously at another valuation system for agricultural land, because the present one will not work for the long haul.

Over 100,000 Minnesota children are uninsured, according to Dr. Paula Kelly, Pediatrcian, MN Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics. She says three cents from the proposed tax increases on cigarettes would provide insurance for low-income families who need health care. She says the insurance would keep people working rather than resorting to welfare. Kelly says the new insurance would give pregnant mothers proper care, saving over \$16 in medical expenses for every dollar that goes for neonatal or infant care neonatal, or infant care.

"The commission is needed, respected, and does a good job," says Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone), chair of the Legislative Commission on Natural Resources (LCMR). The governor has recommended eliminating

the 25-year-old commission. But Carlson says the commission "provides the Legislature with background necessary to evaluate programs proposed to preserve, develop and maintain the natural resources of this state.'

One hundred tons of individual income tax returns come into the Department of Revenue each year, says Commissioner Tom Triplett. They fill eight miles of filing shelves, and that's not counting business, corporate, sales, and withholding tax forms. To cut down on paper work, Triplett's asking the Legislature to grant \$15 million for improved computer systems. He says the computers would also help the department catch more tax evaders.

Compensation for emergency

volunteer work shouldn't count as deductible earnings in unemployment insurance, just as compensation for jury duty and service in the national guard or military reserves are not deductible, says Rep. Joe Begich (DFL-Eveleth). Begich is sponsor of HF14, a bill that would prevent the state from reducing unemployment insurance payments to the unemployed who volunteer as firefighters or ambulance attendants.

Public relations and public image are two items the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) needs to improve, according to a Touche-Ross Consulting Firm study. Steve Thorne, deputy commissioner agrees. He says the department is consulting with private corporations and retraining staff to cooperate more with the public.

Elderly and handicapped individuals would make up half the membership of a special Minnesota mobility advisory council if Rep. Richard Jefferson (DFL-Mpls) has his way. Jefferson's sponsor of a bill that he says would give special mobility riders power in governing that carries and results the would give special mobility riders power in governing that service and require the Regional Transit Board to train drivers in handling the handicapped. Metro Mobility in the Twin Cities would be the largest handicap transportation program the measure would affect.

"As is" used-car sales could be a thing of the past in Minnesota if HF85 (Begich, DFL-Eveleth) becomes law. Under the bill, used-car dealers would provide a 60-day or 3,000 mile implied warranty for certain vehicles even if they tag them, "For sale as is--no warranty." They'd also provide a state-approved arbitration program to settle repair disputes. Supporters say the bill repair disputes. Supporters say the bill offers some solutions to the problems buyers face. Opponents argue it'll drive up cost of used vehicles and lower trade allowances.

Minnesotans may get the chance to put medical alert identifiers on their driver's license or identification cards under HF1191 (Kelso, DFL-Shakopee). HF1191 doesn't allow for a person's medical condition to amount on the medical condition to appear on the license, but supporters say the identifier could still alert medical officials to medical problems.

If you have a question, send it to us so readers can share Questions and Answers.

•Who is the chief author of a bill?

The legislator who sponsors a bill and whose name appears after the file number on the bill. A chief author may select other authors whose names also appear on the bill. A bill may have a total of five authors in the House and five in the Senate.

•Who can introduce a bill in the Legislature?

Only elected representatives and senators can introduce bills in the House and Senate. The legislator who introduces a bill then becomes its chief author. At the time of introduction, the bill gets a House File (HF) number indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction in the House. In the Senate it gets a Senate File (SF) number.

Do You Know

In addition to other duties as elected representatives, legislators work on commissions which study and report on issues and problems of concern to the state. For example, the Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement, Legislative Commission on Employee Relations, and the Great Lakes Commission.

The majority of members on legislative commissions must be legislators. In the House, the speaker of the House appoints the members. In the Senate, a subcommittee selects senators to serve. Appointments are for two years.

Legislative commissions are ongoing, long term, and more permanent than study groups, task forces, and joint legislative committees. Laws about their purpose and how they function differ for each.

To establish a commission, a legislator introduces a bill proposing the commission. The bill then must go through the committee and legislative process, pass the House and Senate, get the governor's signature, and become a part of *Minnesota Statutes*.

The number of commissions and the length of time they exist varies as the need for them comes and goes.

Beginning farm program

The bill for beginning farmers moved a step closer to becoming law April 9, when members of the Agriculture Committee recommended HF776 to pass.

Under the proposal, qualifying beginning or re-entry farmers could apply for low-interest loans at their local banks to purchase land that the state or commercial lenders presently own.

If a lender lends a farmer money, the state would guarantee 85 percent of any losses on the loan as long as the loan guarantee doesn't exceed \$100 million. To reduce risk to the state, HF776, sets a \$12,750,000 cap on the maximum loss the state can accrue.

To qualify for the beginning farmer program, applicants must demonstrate the ability to run a stable farm operation, have a net worth of less than \$150,000, and agree to participate in a farm management program for five years.

Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld (DFL-Waseca) sponsors HF776. It goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Minnesotans place a high priority on children. Six different state agencies have programs relating to the concerns of children, and a variety of policies and rules in various councils, boards, and commissions. But the state has no central coordinating office.

Through HF1395, Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) hopes to create such an office for children in the State Planning Agency. On April 8, the Governmental Operations Committee supported the bill with a recommendation to pass.

Polly Keppel, League of Women Voters, favors the bill, in part, "...because children can't vote there's been no strong consistent priority assigned to their concerns. We believe that a central planning unit for children in Minnesota would do much to direct public attention to the needs of children and to plan efficiently to utilize scarce public dollars," she says

The governor included \$200,000 for the proposed Office for Children in his budget recommendations for the coming

It's a fact!

The original Great Seal of the State of Minnesota disappeared from the rubble of the State Capitol after fire destroyed the building, March 1, 1881.



Peter A. Bergsma, a visiting businessman, passing the ruins the day after the fire, caught the gleam of a brass object in the ashes. He dusted it off, put it in his pocket, and returned to England.

He forgot about the shiny souvenir until a day in 1894 when he came upon it in his desk and recognized it for what it was. He realized he somehow must return it to Minnesota.

His chance came in 1901 when Mr. and Mrs. J. Dyer of St. Paul stopped in Bergsma's city while on a European trip. It was to Dyer that Bergsma entrusted the seal for its journey home and a place of honor in the Minnesota Historical Society where it is today. 2

biennium. The office would assess agency policies, programs, and services, look for potential duplications or gaps, and serve as a central information source.

Fond du Lac school

Higher Education Committee members recommended approval of a bill April 8 that would set up a community college center on the Fond du Lac Indian Reservation in northern Minnesota.

Supporters of HF899 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) say the pilot project would help meet educational needs of a large region that local institutions currently miss, including a large Indian population.

Rep. Paul Ogren says a cooperative agreement with the Bureau of Indian Affairs would allow the state to break new ground and split center operating costs if the center is on the reservation. The center would build a bridge with the Indian community and ease the cultural segregation present education systems create, he says.

A one-year legislative task force that studied the idea recommended the learning center as a cost-effective way to reach the underserved region and the Indian community.

The learning center would operate and grant associate of arts degrees as a branch of the Arrowhead Community College from the fall of 1987 until June 30, 1989. The twoyear pilot project would allow area students to take day or evening classes on the reservation in addition to extension and workshop offerings.

Health, social club registration

Health spas and other social clubs that want to do business in Minnesota would have to register with the state attorney general under a bill Rep. Phil Carruthers (DFL-Brooklyn Center) brought to the Commerce Committee April 7.

Carruthers says his bill, HF949, stems from several incidents where

some major health clubs went bankrupt and cheated members out of thousands of dollars. In one case, he says, the attorney general, whose job it is to enforce the Club Contract Act, didn't know the health club existed because the club never posted a bond with the office.

HF949 would require all clubs (except for private clubs and nonprofit organizations) to register annually with the attorney general. The initial registration would cost clubs \$250 with a \$150 per year renewal fee.

Other provisions in the bill would: • streamline claims procedures to insure quicker refunds to consumers; • allow smaller clubs that can't get a surety bond to post a letter of credit or deposit cash in lieu of a bond; • require clubs under construction that pre-sell memberships to register and post a surety bond with the attorney general; and

• set a \$200,000 cap on the amount of security clubs must post.

In other action, the Commerce Committee recommended HF822 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul) to pass. The bill would require all credit card issuers that distribute applications in Minnesota to disclose the financial terms (i.e. interest rates, membership fees, or any interest-free periods) of the plan.

Seat belt penalty

On a 16 - 8 vote, the Judiciary Committee April 7 recommended to pass a proposed \$25 penalty for motorists who don't wear seat belts.

State Patrol Lt. Col. Glenn Gramse says state troopers have been enforcing the seat belt law for the last eight months with warnings only, issuing between 5,000 to 6,000 tags every month. But 1986 Department of Public Safety survey results show that only 32 percent of motorists statewide comply with the seat belt statute that carries only a warning.

Gramse says the state patrol's primary function is traffic safety, and

he favors adding a penalty to the law. He says most people look at an accident as something that always happens to someone else. "Strangely enough," he says, "we do look at the chance of a police officer seeing us, giving us a ticket, and subsequently...paying a fine as a much more realistic possibility."

The committee amended the bill to provide that one-half the fines the state collects from violators would go into a special account to pay for emergency medical services.

The Senate passed the seat belt bill on March 30. In the House, the bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Firearms legislation

A glitch in a 1986 federal law brought U.S. Attorney Tom Heffelfinger to the Legislature to testify and help draft proposed legislation.

Before 1986, under federal law, felons whom courts convict of violent crime could not possess, ship, or transport firearms for 10 years after regaining their civil rights. But Minnesota, and a handful of other states, automatically restore those rights to felons when they complete their prison time,

Heffelfinger told the Crime and Family Law Division of the Judiciary Committee April 6, "...one thing that's changed has to do with the interface of Minnesota law and federal law. The McClure-Volkmer bill says that federal firearms legislation may only apply to a prisoner or to an ex-felon who has not had his civil rights restored."

Heffelfinger helped draft HF990 (Segal, DFL-St. Louis Park) to bring released Minnesota felons back under the 10-year prohibition. The bill would make state law the same as federal law which would allow authorities to enforce federal law when people commit violent crimes in the state.

The division recommended the bill to pass April 7.

Work quality, productivity

Power for workers in decisionmaking and managing, not more layoffs and supervisors with stopwatches, would bring quality and productivity to the workplace, says labor organizer Bob Killeen.

Killeen, who has served on the Governor's commission on the Economic Future of Minnesota, supports Rep. Todd Otis' (DFL-Mpls.) proposal to set up a council to educate labor and management on how to improve quality and productivity.

Kileen says, "productivity and high quality work is going to give us job security. And if we don't start getting that message out to all of our people, we're not even going to be in the ball game when it comes to competition worldwide.

So I'm in this thing because I'm sick and tired of plant shut-downs. Productivity and quality are good for all of us. That's the message we have to get across, and that's what this council will be working on."

The bill, HF1109, would set up a nine-member council to "provide businesses, labor organizations, and the general public technical assistance and information about quality and productivity," says Otis.

He says the council would research the effectiveness of education programs, new production technologies, and new managementlabor relations. The state would support the council for two years, "and if by that time the council hasn't proven itself to be so useful that private businesses won't support it themselves, then we won't keep putting state money into it," he says.

The bill got a recommendation to pass from the Economic Development and Housing Committee April 7; it goes next to the House Floor.

Wage subsidies

The governor recommends eliminating the wage subsidy program, but Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls) sponsors HF857, a bill that would double funding to \$40 million in 1987-88. He says the program has served 8,400 thousand workers, 85 percent of whom have kept their jobs after the six-month subsidy ends.

Under the Minnesota Employment and Economic Development wage subsidy program, the state pays an average of 80 percent of the wages for workers who would otherwise be unemployed. That's \$4.00 an hour in wages and \$1.00 an hour in fringe benefits the state pays to every \$1.20 an hour the employer pays. But the subsidy lasts only six months. Then the employer has to keep hiring the worker, or pay back 70 percent of the state's investment. Priority goes to small Minnesota companies.

McLaughlin's bill would target most of the money to people getting welfare, families with no income, and financially troubled farm families. It would also direct the subsidies to manufacturing companies, and those that export.

McLaughlin says the program is good for economic development and welfare reform: "This bill will solidly establish the wage subsidy program as an anchor in the middle of this state's 1987 welfare reform efforts."

He says businesspeople who've participated are overwhelmingly enthusiastic about the program. The Economic Development and Housing Committee, on a voice vote, recommended HF857 to pass April 7. It goes next to the Taxes Committee.

Insurance tax

The Tax Laws Division of the Taxes Committee heard John James from the Department of Revenue April 7 explain a proposed extension of a two percent premium tax to nonprofit insurance companies. Those companies would include HMO's and similar nonprofit health organizations.

James says the extension is a good, solid program that follows

national industry standards. He says it will create a level playing field that will ensure consistent competition in the insurance business.

According to James, the department feels the proposal is a rational measure--one that will allow the state to tax some products the way it has taxed others for years.

"We feel we are taxing like products in the same way, subjecting them generally to the two percent gross premiums tax," he says. "It is the industry standard, not only in Minnesota, but around the country."

James says the extension would not affect senior citizens health care by burdening Medicare with the two percent premium tax.

Alternative minimum tax

The Property Tax Division of the Taxes Committee heard HF616 (Voss, DFL-Blaine) April 6.

The State Department of Revenue presented the bill which would impose an alternative minimum tax on all corporations in the state. The tax would equal one-tenth of one percent of the company's Minnesota property, payroll, and sales factors beyond the company's regular tax liability. Opponents say the measure is poor policy because it taxes those least able to pay--smaller businesses and family farm corporations.

Mark Anderson of the Minnesota Chamber of Commerce and Industry says it hurts struggling smaller businesses. He says it would decrease business expansion beyond current disinvestments and declines in agriculture, manufacturing, and mining.

Julie Bleyhl of the Minnesota Farmers Union says the alternative minimum tax would aggravate family farm corporations already bearing the burden of the agricultural crises.

Bleyhl says the proposed tax is regressive because it would hit farm corporations twice by taxing dividends farmers get from cooperatives and then again as business income.

Wine in grocery stores

The wine-and-food bill is back in the Legislature--the fifth time in the past 10 years.

This year, Representative Linda Scheid (DFL-Brooklyn Park) sponsors HF1342, a bill that would allow metropolitan grocery stores to sell wine alongside other food items. On April 6, the Regulated Industries Committee recommended the bill to pass.

Supporters say one-stop shopping for food and wine is convenient and would satisfy a great consumer demand. An added benefit, they say, could be an increase in cheese sales, incidental with wine purchases. Scheid adds that state revenue may go up \$5 million as a result.

"This may be the only proposal to come before the House this session that enables us to raise revenue for the state without raising a tax or extending any tax base," says Scheid.

Opponents say the bill would be a death blow to liquor retailers and question whether grocery stores would be able to keep minors from buying liquor.

Under an amendment, a grocery store would need a 3.2 beer sales license to get a wine license. Another amendment would allow liquor stores to sell cheese, cheese products, and snack foods.

Composite engineering program

Now's the time to explore composite engineering as a new industry, according to the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee.

Members tentatively approved a portion of the education budget April 3 that would fully fund planning for a new composite engineering program at Winona State University in 1988. The version of the bill that came out of committee would require state university officials to come back to the Legislature next year to get program money for 1989. Although members say possibilities for regional economic growth are encouraging, they say the idea is moving too quickly. They asked program planners to slow down and study program specifics including projected enrollment, job possibilities, and industry growth during the next year.

Rep. Lyndon Carlson (DFL-Crystal) says he hopes a one-year study can answer some questions before the state gives more money to the program.

"If we move forward with continued funding we need to have a high degree of comfort that we are going to have on all of our (state university) campuses, good, sound, first class engineering programs," he says.

Rep. Bob Haukoos (IR-Albert Lea) opposes expanding engineering offerings. He says the state should concentrate on current programs.

If the full House approves the recommendation, Winona State could get \$873,000 over the next two years.

Mental health

After more than 10 hours of hearings, lawmakers recommended passage of a plan to change the way Minnesota funds mental health. The vote came at a Health and Human Services Committee meeting Apr. 3.

Bill author Gloria Segal (DFL-St. Louis Park) says the state was once a leader in mental health services--even a model for federal legislation. Now, she says, the state ranks 37th nationally in delivering mental health services. But she says the blame isn't easy to fix on anyone.

"Perhaps the real blame is on each and every one of us and on society as a whole," Segal says, "because we've allowed people with needs to sit on the street corners... to sleep on the grates in Washington D.C. ...to fall between the cracks of the system."

Supporters say the legislation will

give sorely needed leadership and coordination for each county to help the mentally ill in their communities. The bill now goes to the Appropriations Committee.

Credit card interest rates

A bill that would lower credit card interest rates came out of the Commerce Committee April 3 with a recommendation to pass.

Under HF242 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul), large retailers such as Dayton's and Donaldson's, whose rates presently hover around 18 percent, could charge no more than 10.5 or 4 points over the Federal Reserve discount rate on open-end credit sales. Rates for smaller retailers, those with annual sales under \$25 million, would drop to 14.5 or 6 points above the reserve rate.

Rep. Rich O' Connor, the bill's author, says retailers have not responded to the interest rate drop in the financial market. Credit is now available at reasonable rates, but the revolving rate is still at 18 percent, says O'Connor.

Steve Watson, from Dayton-Hudson Stores, says the legislation is anti-business, discriminatory, and will have a negative impact on the consuming public.

HF242, which will go to the House Floor, has the support of the Minnesota AFL-CIO, the Teamsters, and Minnesota Public Interest Research Group (MPIRG).





House and Senate members will hold a joint convention April 15 to approve House and Senate committee recommendations for the University of Minnesota Board of Regents. Nominees include Elton Kuderer, Fairmont; M. Elizabeth Craig, Minnetonka; Dr. J. P. Grahek, Ely; and David K. Roe, Medicine Lake. House Higher Education and Senate Education Committee members tentatively approved the candidates at a joint meeting April 8.

The House will recess after session on Wednesday, April 15 until Monday, April 20 before moving into the final weeks of session.

Over 100,000 children in Minnesota don't have health insurance, says Luanne Nyberg of the Children's Defense Fund. She supports Eileen Tompkin's (IR-Apple Valley) bill that would require employers, in business more than 10 years and who hire at least 20 people, to provide health insurance to all fulltime workers. Most of the uninsured work, live in rural areas, have children, and can't afford insurance, says Tompkins. Opponents say taxpayers, not employers, should pick up the costs of health insurance for the uninsured.

DNR's proposing an extensive wildlife reserve project around Swan Lake. Supporters say the area was the most important waterfowl breeding area between the Gulf of Mexico and Canada before agriculture and development started draining the lake's sloughs. Project would put 5,000 to 8,000 acres of farmland out of production--land opponents say is some of the most productive in the state. Companies that close plants in Minnesota would have to notify workers 10 days in advance, and the state would have to retrain workers for new jobs, if Rep. Karen Clark's (DFL-Mpls) bill, HF363, becomes law. She says the federal government has cut funding for retraining, while the number of displaced workers has increased. Rep. Don Frerichs (IR-Rochester) disagrees, says the state has enough job training programs in vocationaltechnical schools, and state agencies.

Employees have a right to know why they've lost their jobs, says Rep. Gil Gutknecht (IR-Rochester). He's proposing HF823, a bill that would require employers to tell workers in writing, and within five days of their request, the reason for firing or laying them off.

Unemployment compensation recipients wouldn't have to travel to the Twin Cities for hearings and medical exams if HF109 (Tunheim, DFL-Kennedy) becomes law. Hearings would be in the county where the employee lives, and medical examines available within 150 miles.

People shouldn't have to pay to apply for a job, says Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls). He's author of HF31, a bill that would prohibit companies from charging job application fees. Skoglund says the fees are a money-making scam, and if the practice becomes common, the unemployed won't be able to afford to apply for work.

Out-of-state employees of outof-state companies wouldn't collect workers' compensation in Minnesota just because they incur injuries in this state under a change the Department of Labor and Industry's recommending in the use of the special compensation fund. The fund goes to reimburse people for second injuries, supplements reimbursements for long-term disabilities, and covers employees of uninsured employers. The proposed change is part of HF1450 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley).

"We behave like everybody says they want state government to behave--like a corporation. We don't spend any more than we have to," says Housing Finance Agency Director Jim Solem about his agency.

Shelters are supposed to be temporary emergency housing, but they've become part of the state's housing stock, says Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul). She says development projects continue to destroy low-income housing. She's proposing HF789, a bill that would provide state matching grants to build and renovate single room occupancy (SRO) housing-- one room units, with shared bathrooms and kitchens. They'd rent for \$150 a month and go to people earning up to 150 percent of poverty level (\$7,400 a year).

Budget recommendations for 44 state departments, agencies, boards, and councils went into the omnibus State Departments Appropriations Bill this week. The State Departments Division of Appropriations is readying the bill for review by the full Appropriations Committee before the proposed budgets go to the House floor for a final vote.

Hotel fires in Puerto Rico, Kentucky, and Las Vegas prompted Rep. Tony Kinkel (DFL-Park Rapids) to sponsor HF1366. Kinkel says most people who lost their lives in those fires died from inhaling poisonous fumes that came from burning furniture and carpets. HF1366 would set up a task force to study whether the state should license interior designers and be sure the indoor accessories they use meet OSHA standards.

U of M officials could get 70 percent of additional state money they asked for to fund Commitment to Focus plans. The Education Appropriations Division recommended a \$16,765,000 onetime allocation for improved instruction. Members say they intend to add language that will stress that the funds go to Minneapolis, Morris, Duluth, and Waseca campuses for improvements to graduate and undergraduate classes. Emphasis is to be on lower division undergraduate instruction and counseling. The U had asked for \$24 million for the program.

Congratulations to Rep. Loren Solberg (DFL-Bovey), recipient of a Bush Foundation Scholarship. The award recognizes special leadership qualities in an individual serving the public. Solberg plans to enroll in a Master's Program at the Harvard John F. Kennedy School of Government, working toward a Master's Degree in Public Administration with concentration in community and economic development.

The House of Representatives confirmed three appointments to the State Ethical Practices Board April 6: Martin J. McGowan, Kimball; Judith Gilbert Schotzko, Blue Earth; and Douglas R. Ewald, Minnetonka. McGowan and Schotzko will serve terms from Jan.1987 to Jan.1991; Ewald from Nov.1986 to Jan.1988. Board administers public disclosure laws for campaign finance, lobbying, public officials' economic interests and conflicts of interest, and public financing of candidates.

"Minnesota has taken a giant step forward, but I'm afraid something may backfire," says Representative Tony Onnen (IR-Cokato) of a proposed mental health care system for the entire state. Onnen says he's concerned that the proposed changes could totally control the way counties help clients and ultimately harm the service clients receive.

A new science and technology division in the Department of Energy and Economic Development (DEED) could come out of a bill the Future and Technology Committee recommended to pass April 6. Supporters say DEED is an appropriate home for the new division which would replace the Governor's Office of Science and Technology.

•What is General Orders?

A list of bills awaiting preliminary action in the House and Senate each day during a session. The bills have had committee hearings and committees have presented their recommendations on the bills to the House in committee reports.

After the House adopts the committee report on a bill, it goes onto General Orders of the Day. When the House takes up General Orders as part of the order of business, the speaker of the House will say, "The House will now dissolve itself into the Committee of the Whole." The full House then becomes one Committee of the Whole and acts on bills on General Orders.

The Committee of the Whole may debate the issues, adopt amendments, and vote to recommend bills to pass, recommend to postpone action, or recommend no further action. If the Committee of the Whole recommends a bill to pass, it goes onto the Calendar.

•What is the Calendar?

A list of bills the Committee of the Whole recommends to pass. At this point, amendments to bills must have the unanimous consent of the full House. Legislators vote on them for the final time.

By committee recommendation, noncontroversial bills can bypass General Orders and go directly onto a Consent Calendar, where they usually pass without debate.

•What is the Consent Calendar?

A list of noncontroversal bills awaiting action in the House or Senate that usually pass without debate.

•What is Rule 1.10?

A rule of the House that directs the House to act on any bill that relates to taxes or raises revenue, whenever the chair of the Taxes Committee requests action. It also directs the House to act upon any appropriations bill whenever the chair of the Appropriations Committee requests action.

•What is a Conference Committee?

A committee of three or five representatives and an equal number of senators who meet to reach agreement on a bill when the House and Senate do not agree on a version of a proposed law.

•Who is the Chief Clerk of the House?

Edward A. Burdick is Chief Clerk of the House. He is an elected officer of the Minnesota House and unofficial parliamentarian. He acts as parliamentary advisor to the Speaker of the House who is the presiding officer. The Chief Clerk supervises the flow of all paper work at the front desk in the chamber of the House. And he's responsible for publication of the daily *Journal*, the legal record of House action.

•Who is the Revisor of Statutes?

The Revisor of Statutes is Steven Cross. He puts ideas for bills into proper legal form as a bill for introduction into the House or Senate, usually both. He's responsible for publication of *Minnesota Statutes* and updates the statutes to include all new laws.

•Who is the Speaker of the House?

Rep. Fred C. Norton is Speaker of the Minnesota House. The House elects him to be the presiding officer. The Speaker appoints committee members and chairs. He also assigns bills to committees after their introduction in the House.




Minnesota's Constitution requires a bill to have three readings before the House can vote on it. With each reading, the bill enters a new stage of the legislative process.

The first reading happens upon its introduction in the House. (Speaker of the House must have a copy at least 24 hours before convening of the daily session.)

Second reading comes when the bill's up for discussion in the House, (either on General Orders, or by committee recommendation, on the Consent Calendar). Third reading happens when the House votes on the bill's final passage.

Before typewriters or copying machines, legislators didn't have copies, so the clerk of the House read the entire bill aloud. Today, the chief clerk reads the bill's number, not its contents. Copies must be in members' files at the chief clerk's desk 24 hours before the House considers the bill.

Requirement's the same on the federal level. But for Congress, the House and Senate official manuals lay out the rules, not the Constitution. The practice comes from British Parliament, where the House of Lords and the House of Commons required three readings for bills.

University regents

During a half-hour joint convention April 15, the House and Senate appointed four new regents to the University of Minnesota. The four will serve six-year terms which began the first Monday in February, 1987.

The new regents are Elton Kuderer of Fairmont; M. Elizabeth Craig, MD, of Minnetonka; Dr. J. P. Grahek of Ely; and David K. Roe of Medicine Lake.

Members of the House Higher Education and Senate Education Committees approved their nomination at a joint meeting April 8.

The University of Minnesota Board of Regents consists of 12 members serving staggered six-year terms. The new regents will help determine overall policy for the University.

Rep. Paul Thiede (IR-Pequot Lakes) made the only nomination from the floor, recommending former governor C. Elmer Anderson.

A vote of 16 to 14 kept state funding for the proposed arts high school alive in the Education Committee April 15.

Rep. Dave Gruenes (IR-St. Cloud) proposed an amendment that would have pulled \$2.8 million from the arts high school and spread the money to school districts to develop local arts programs.

Arts school backers say splitting up the money among 400 districts would break momentum and support for arts education. They say the school would give talented, low or moderate income students from every region of Minnesota the chance to benefit from concentrated arts education that local districts could never provide.

Rep. K.J. McDonald (IR-Watertown) says he appreciates the plan to develop an arts school, but thinks the timing is wrong.

Committee members adopted an amendment that would eliminate full-time enrollment of students in

It's a fact!

The 1893 Legislature passed a law to adopt a state flag. Mrs. Edward H. Center of Minneapolis designed it.

The flag is silk, white on one side, blue on the other, with a bullion fringe border. The state seal is in the center in a wreath of white moccasin flowers on blue. The red ribbon entwining the wreath bears the state motto "Letoile Du Nord" (Star of the North)--and, in gold, the dates 1819, date of the settlement of Minnesota, and 1893.

Above, in gold, is 1858, the date Minnesota became a state. "Minnesota" is below the design in gold letters. The groupings of 19 stars around the seal represent the fact that Minnesota was the19th state to join the Union. The three at the top include the North Star, symbolizing the North Star State.

A gold cord and tassel tie the flag to the standard which a golden gopher proudly surmounts. The original flag is entirely in needlework.



grades 9 and 10. Appropriations the committee approved as part of the \$3.1 billion omnibus education finance budget will finance the school's scheduled opening September 1989.

State agency funding

Members of the Agriculture, Transportation, and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee spent the week on a funding plan for the next biennium for several state departments and agencies.

So far, the proposed plan stays close to the House budget resolution and the governor's proposed budget recommendations, both of which set a \$181 million spending level from the general fund for such agencies. Division allocations for the 1987-89 biennium stand tentatively as follows:

• Department of Agriculture --\$19 million;

• Department of Commerce --\$18.5 million;

State Arts Board -- \$875,000 (\$125,000 below the governor's proposed recommendation);
Charitable Gambling Board --

\$1.25 million;

• Public Utilities Commission -- \$3.7 million (a \$100,000 reduction);

Non-health boards such as the Board of Accountancy -- \$1.8 million; and
Minnesota Historical Society -- \$18 million.

Rider language in the bill would add \$15,000 each year to the Historical Society's budget for the Humanities Commission Chautaqua Program. The rider would also dedicate Fort Snelling's biennial income of \$211,000 to the society. The division cut the society's funding for repair and betterment and micro fiche programs \$340,000.

The semi-state division meets next week to allocate funds for the Departments of Transportation and Public Safety, and transit progams.

Light rail transit

The Metropolitan Affairs Committee continues hearing testimony on a bill that would allow Hennepin County to develop a light rail transit system (LRT). A 1985 legislative decision prohibits a regional transit authority, metropolitan government, the Metropolitan Transit Commission, or the Regional Transit Board from spending money on a light rail project.

Rep. Ken Nelson (DFL-Mpls), author of the bill, says Minnesota's Legislature has been studying the costs, benefits, and feasibility of light rail transit for over 14 years. LRT systems throughout the United States and Canada prove they're a success, says Nelson. And he says traffic congestion and energy conservation efforts make the time right to develop what would be the first LRT project in the Twin Cities.

But Rep. Don Valento (IR-Little Canada) questions how individual counties setting up their own LRTs could come up with one integrated transportation system for the metropolitan area.

Hennepin County Commissioner John Derus told the Metropolitan Affairs Committee April 15 that a small scale pilot project is needed to demonstrate the effectiveness of light rail before developing an all inclusive project.

The Senate passed their light rail transit bill, SF282 (Luther, DFL-Brooklyn Park).

Alzheimer's disease funding

On April 14, the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee recommended funding for a bill that may give researchers of Alzheimer's disease a better understanding of the illness.

The bill's author, Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls), says the \$50,000 fund would pay for autopsies to study brain tissue of people who suffered from what physicians diagnosed as Alzheimer's.

Skoglund says the disease is difficult to verify while a patient is alive, so about 36 percent of all diagnoses of Alzheimer's cases are incorrect.

Dr. William Fry, Ramsey Medical Center's Alzheimer's clinic, says medical assistance covers expenses of many victims of the disease, but won't pay for autopsies. According to Fry, if funding autopsies helped doctors learn more about Alzheimer's, the state could save money that now goes for care of misdiagnosed cases.

Fry adds that autopsies may assist doctors in ruling out other similar illnesses such as vitamin deficiency diseases.

Flexible insurance

Many Minnesota homeowners currently pay for insurance coverage they don't need and could never collect on, according to Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls).

McLaughlin told the Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee April 14 that standard homeowner's package policies offer no options for consumers to determine their actual needs for personal property coverage. HF417/SF80 (McLaughlin) would require insurers to provide at least one policy that allows the insured to pick coverage for additional structures and personal property.

Present policies burden many homeowners with costs of overinsured personal property because insurance companies base insurance on as much as 70 percent of a structure's value, according to Russ Stanton, licensed insurance agent.

"A person who owns the property and needs insurance is in a much better position to determine what kind and how much insurance he or she needs," he says, "much better than insurers who are making 100 percent profit on extra insurance that

can never be collected upon."

Insurance companies say the bill makes an anti-consumer change that may cost policyholders less in premiums, but would allow too many people to under insure their belongings.

Tom Newcome, State Farm Insurance, says the present system has served their customers well until now. Over insuring at the time of policy purchase or renewal provides customers with a coverage cushion that protects new purchases, he says.

Members recommended passage of the measure and sent it to the House floor.

DWI mandatory minimum sentence

Second-time offenders of DWI laws may face stiffer, more consistent sentencing in the future.

Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin) brought a bill that would tighten DWI sentencing to the Judiciary Committee's Crime and Family Law Division April 13. HF1165 would impose a mandatory minimum penalty on people courts convict of DWI violations twice within five years, or three or more times within 10 years.

Steve Simon, director of the Minnesota Criminal Justice System's DWI Task Force, says the task force worked with the organization of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers to come up with the proposal.

According to Simon, the bill's purpose isn't really deterrence, because people most likely to be repeat [DWI] offenders are those who are chemically dependent. "And they're not deterred by the threat of a potential jail sentence," he says.

Simon says the bill emphasizes two things--fairness and sentencing appropriate to a violator's previous driving record.

The division amended the bill to allow a court to sentence a violator to a minimum of 30 days in jail, or 240 hours of community service work, or any combination that equals a 30-day minimum sentence.

The bill goes next to the full Judiciary Committee for consideration.

House action

The Minnesota House of Representatives took final action on several bills April 13.

On a vote of 97-36, the House passed HF234 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls), the "parental leave" bill. The bill would require employers to give new mothers and fathers up to three months unpaid parental leave after the birth or adoption of a child. The measure would apply to employers who hire at least 10 full-time workers.

On unanimous votes, the House passed two bills affecting retirement. HF1077 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley) would conform Minnesota's retirement age with the Federal Age Discrimination Act, which Congress passed in 1986. Known as the "Claude Pepper amendment," the provision would eliminate a mandatory retirement age for all public employees except police, firefighters, and tenured college professors.

The second retirement bill, HF1159 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley), would prohibit state and local governments from borrowing money from one pension plan to fund another plan's deficit. The prohibition would also preclude pension plans from borrowing from one another to fund deficits.

And, on a vote of 78-53, the House gave final approval to HF332 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin), which would allow the Pollution Control Agency director to assess administrative penalties against violators of hazardous waste management laws, or pollution control laws. The bill would give violators 30 days to correct the violations, before assessing the penalty.

Hearing impaired

A proposed 10-cent charge on monthly phone bills could pay for equipment to help hearing impaired and blind people use the telephone.

A bill the Regulated Industries Committee recommended to pass April 13 would guarantee specially equipped phones for low-income, hearing-impaired, or blind people through the new tax:

The bill would require Northwestern Bell to administer a program to furnish and install the special phone devices. The bill would also require Northwestern Bell to develop a system allowing communication between people with the special equipment and those with ordinary phones.

The Senate has approved the bill; it goes next to the House floor.

Alternative minimum tax

The Tax Laws Division of the Taxes Committee recommended a bill to pass April 10 that would impose a new alternative minimum tax on corporations.

The tax would be one-tenth of one percent of a company's payroll, sales, and property beyond its regular tax liability. The Department of Revenue says only companies with annual sales over \$5 million would have to pay the new tax.

Opponents say if the state wants to impose the tax, they should create one that taxes profits, rather than sales. Opponents say the tax would hurt companies who earn more than \$5 million in annual sales, but still lose money.

The bill now goes to the full Taxes Committee.

Rural rehabilitation

Education Divison of the Appropriations Committee members say they can't free up money right now to fund proposed regional development centers across Minnesota.

State University System officials proposed development of six such centers on state university campuses that would work to support economic development and job creation in various regions. Centers would use university faculties, facilities, and technical resources to increase applied research for local interests and small business development.

Lawmakers originally planned to fund the \$3.7 million project with money from both the general fund and rural rehabilitation fund, but ran into problems releasing the rural rehab money for the program.

Division members said, April 10, that they plan to keep looking for other funding sources as the session goes on.

Six-year license plates

Minnesota motorists may have to buy new license plates for their cars, pick-up trucks, and certain vans every six years, under a bill the Transportation Committee recommended to pass April 9.

HF80, better known as the the sixyear license plate bill, would require Minnesotans to pay \$2 to replace license plates that are six years old when they renew their vehicle registrations.

This is not the first time the state has attempted to switch from lifetime plates to six-year plates. The 1985 Legislature authorized the switch, but a Hennepin County judge issued a temporary restraining order halting the sale of the plates after a lawsuit challenged the law's constitutionality.

Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) sponsors HF80, which has the support of the Department of Public Safety and state law enforcement groups who complain that older plates are hard to read.

The bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

We need your help!

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The House recessed after session on Wednesday, April 15, adjourning until Monday, April 20.

"Independent contractor" is often a sham so employers can get out of providing compensation for lack of work and injuries, says Rep. Jim Rice (DFL-Mpls). He's proposing HF1397, a bill the Teamsters union supports that would redefine construction company employees and selfemployed workers. But the Independent Construction Truck Owners Association says Rice's bill is anti-free enterprise, and would completely eliminate independent contracting.

"I'm very confident that we can bring in \$48 million with our new compliance initiative," says Tom Triplett, commissioner of the Department of Revenue. He says delinquent taxpayers owe the state \$500 million, most of which the state will never recover. But he says proposed improvements in computer collections and auditing systems will help track down some of those unpaid taxes.

The DNR should work on doing a good job in a few priority projects, says Rep. Howard Miller (IR-Redwood Falls). "You're spreading yourself too thin doing an inadequate job with too many programs," Miller told Deputy Commissioner Steve Thorne. But Thorne says the Legislature dedicates DNR funds to particular programs, leaving little room for effective management. The DNR hires 1600 employees in over 10 divisions, making it among the largest Minnesota state departments. Business owners don't always pay employees for their work, especially if the business is laying off or is in financial trouble, says Rep. Paul Ogren, author of HF1250. He says, right now the only way a worker can recover wages is in conciliation court. That, he says, is slow, expensive, and rarely results in paid wages. HF1250 would establish a \$200,000 wage protection fund for 1987-88 to reimburse wages workers can't get from employers.

Employers of an equivalent of 10 or more full-time people would have to offer new parents an unpaid leave of up to 14 weeks to care for their children under HF234 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls). The bill passed in the House April 13 on 97-36 vote and is on its way to the Senate. (see highlight)

Nonprofit health services and health maintenance organizations (HMOs) would remain exempt from a two percent premium tax under an amendment to the Corporate tax bill HF616/SF638 (Voss, DFL-Blaine). The amendment also deletes farm cooperatives from the proposed alternative minimum tax.

About 270,000 Minnesotans are hearing impaired, according to Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls). Clark is author of a bill that would guarantee special telephone communication devices to hearing impaired persons. She says, of the approximately 25,000 households with one hearing impaired person, only 1,000 have access to special phone equipment.

The pace was hectic as legislators raced to meet the midnight Friday, April 10 committee action deadline on House bills. From Monday, April 6 to Friday, April 10, House committees took up 293 bills and recommended 259 to pass. Activity peaked Wednesday as House committees recommended to pass almost 60 bills. Committees will continue to consider Senate bills this week. House Taxes and Appropriations Committees will take up House bills. Five percent less in state payments would go to care providers who serve medical and general assistance (MA/GA) patients under a rider the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee adopted at a late evening meeting April 14. Rep. Mary Forsythe (IR-Edina) says she's concerned the five percent reduction will drive some care providers to stop serving MA and GA recipients.

The farm mediation bill, HF210/SF89 (Schoenfeld,

DFL-Waseca), is on its way to the House floor for a final vote after more than 20 hours of legislative hearings. The mediation program, part of the 1986 farm aid package, has helped thousands of farmers, according to Agriculture Extension Service reports. HF210/SF89 would make changes in the way the program works now and extend it for another two years.

Heavier and longer trucks (110 feet long and 105,500 pounds) may be able to travel on designated interstate roads outside the metropolitan area as part of a twoyear demonstration program. April 14, the Transportation Committee recommended to pass HF733 (McEachern, DFL-St. Michael), the bill that would allow the Department of Transportation to issue \$30, 36hour permits for the longer trucks to operate during the two-year trial period.

QUESTIONS YOU'VE ASKED

•What are House Advisory bills?

A House member will introduce an idea for a new law as a House Advisory rather than a formal bill usually to study an issue, to get reaction from other legislators and the public on an issue, or to avoid duplicating ideas for new laws or changes to present law before officially proposing new legislation in a bill.

Under the rules of the House, a legislator may introduce an advisory bill in the same way as a bill. But the legislator does not have to have the revisor of statutes examine and approve an advisory bill as to form and compliance with the Joint Rules of the House and Senate and the Rules of the House. He or she would have to do that with a bill. Approval requires only the revisor's endorsement on the House Advisory bill.

Rules of the House state that each advisory bill must be typewritten on a form the Chief Clerk provides. It must have a title not exceeding 12 words in length and contain a specific proposal for a new law or a proposal to abolish or change a law. It need not be in a form appropriate for enactment into law.

Advisory bills get a first reading in the House upon their introduction, they may have committee hearings, but the full House does not give them second readings and does not consider them, except that the committee may report to the House its recommendation for re-referral of an advisory bill to another committee.

Bills in the House get a House File (HF) number. House Advisory bills get a House Advisory (HA) number.

Two examples of House Advisory bill introductions that appeared in the Feb. 13 issue of *Session Weekly*, on page 15 are:

HA2--Nelson, K (DFL), (House

member who authored the HA), Economic Development/Housing (committee the Speaker of the House referred it to): A proposal to study residential real estate closing procedure (title of the HA).

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HA3--Krueger (DFL), Judiciary. A proposal to study adoption in Minnesota.

•What is the title of a bill?

The title of a bill is the statement of the contents of a bill and section of the law it would affect. The title appears with the bill's number at the top of the printed bill.

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•What does the term "bill status" mean?

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A bill's status refers to where the bill is in the legislative process. For example, a bill may be in a committee waiting for a hearing. Or its status may be that it is on one of the calendars (lists of bills waiting action by the House) or it may have passed both the House and Senate and be on its way to the governor. To find the status of a bill, call the House Index Department at 296-6646. The House Public Information bill status line, 297-1264, is a recording of the daily action on bills by committees or the full House.

What does "yield" mean?

During a floor session of the House, a member yields when he or she surrenders the floor (the right to speak) temporarily to another member to hear a question. It happens during debates on proposed legislation. A member will ask if another member will "yield to a question," or just "yield." The member directs the request to the speaker of the House who then asks the member if she or he will yield.

• What does "call of the House" mean?

Call of the House requires that all unexcused members come to the chamber to vote on the issue before the House. Under rule 2.2 of House Rules, 10 members may demand a call of the House at any time except if voting has begun.

According to House Rule 2.2: "When such call is demanded, the doors shall be closed, the roll shall be called, the absent members shall be sent for, and no member may be permitted to leave until the roll call is suspended or completed. . . . A call of the House may be lifted by a majority of the whole House."

What does interim mean?

The interim is the time between the two sessions of the biennium. When the first session adjourns, members set and announce the date on which the Legislature will begin meeting for the second session of the biennium. In other words, they adjourn until a certain date. This is different from the final adjournment at the end of the second session of the biennium when the Legislature adjourns "sine die."

• What does "sine die" mean?

1.19.20

Sine die means "without a day." When the Legislature adjourns at the end of the second session of the biennium, the Speaker of the House will say, "The House is now adjourned sine die." That is, without naming a day certain on which the Legislature will meet again.

The House officially adopted Mason's Rules in 1957. Before then, the body used Jefferson's Manual and Robert's Rules of Order.

The House uses Mason's manual only after referring to five other sources for the answer when a parliamentary question arises: the Minnesota Constitution, Minnesota Statutes, Permanent Rules, Joint Rules, and Custom and Usage.

Paul Mason, as parliamentarian of the California Senate, wrote Mason's Rules in 1935. He designed the manual for legislative and administrative bodies. Because of this unique design, Mason's manual meets the particular needs of the Legislature and covers the procedural, or point of order problems that may come up in official public bodies of all kinds.

Omnibus tax bill

DFL House leaders April 22 announced a change in tax plans. On the 23rd, Taxes Committee Chair Rep. Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine) said upcoming amendments to the omnibus tax bill would most likely delete proposals to impose the state's six percent sales tax on local government purchases and legal services. Those proposed cuts would contribute to a possible reduction of almost \$225 million from state taxes.

Branch banks

Some of Minnesota's independent bankers are opposed to a bill that they say would destroy local control and accountability for community banks.

HF791 (Wynia, DFL-St. Paul)

would increase the number of detached facilities banks operate from two to five and allow branch locations up to 100 miles from the main bank.

Proponents of the measure say the change will allow banks to offer better services to larger groups of Minnesotans. System bankers say the expansion would also bring new life to faltering rural banks that could close without help from a healthy bank.

But Larry Lindeberg, Forest Lake State Bank, says local communities deserve the commitment of a local bank, and that small banks can do a better job on a local level. "Where other banks have their branches, we have our roots," he said.

Local bankers say they fear remote administrative and lending decisions could turn home-owned,



The state song has had lots of media attention this past week. The question has been, "Is 'Hail! Minnesota' the official state song?" The answer is, "Yes."

In 1945, the Minnesota House of Representatives and the Minnesota Senate adopted a joint resolution naming "Hail! Minnesota" the state song at the suggestion of the Minnesota Federation of Women's Clubs.

"Hail! Minnesota" had long been the song of the University of Minnesota.

Truman E. Rickard, a 1904 graduate, wrote the music and two stanzas as a class song. The second stanza changed in 1905 when Cyrus Northrop, then president of the University, asked Arthur Upson, a young poet who became well-known, to write a new second stanza.

The University Alumni Association held the copyright for "Hail! Minnesota" until 1945 when the association gave the state permission to use the words and music as the state song. (For the words, see *Do you know*? on the back page.)

local interest banks into depositgathering devices for overgrown metropolitan institutions.

Financial Institutions & Insurance Committee members considered the bill April 22 and laid it over for further discussion.

Agency heads' salaries

State agency heads may have to be satisfied with current salaries for a while longer. On a roll call vote at an April 22 meeting, the Governmental Operations Committee defeated HF727 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley), a bill that would have increased salary ranges for state agency heads.

Employee Relations Commissioner Nina Rothchild told members that most agency heads have reached the top of their current salary ranges. She says this bill would not increase the present salaries of any affected agency heads. However, it would put a higher range into law which would permit future pay increases. Rothchild emphasized that the Legislature must approve all salary changes.

But Rep. Steve Dille (IR-Dassel) summed up the opposition saying, "The state's already in financial trouble...we ought to leave these salaries where they are."

Franchise contracts

In 1985, Arlen Simi, owner of the only Pier 1 Imports franchise in the state, got a closeout notice from the store's franchisor. Simi filed a lawsuit against Pier 1 and called on Rep. Dave Gruenes (IR-St. Cloud) for help. The lawsuit is still pending as is HF1404, a bill that Gruenes introduced as a remedy for Simi and others with similar problems.

Under the bill, franchisors would have to give franchisees a written notice of their intention not to renew the contract 180 days before the contract expires. The franchisee would then run the business for a sufficient period of time to recover the fair market value of the franchise.

Current law allows franchisees to recover cash they paid for the business, but in Simi's case, that would be a very small amount of what his Pier 1 store is now worth.

Another provision in HF1404 would require that franchisors who want to terminate or cancel a contract send the franchisee a 90-day termination notice which includes the reasons for termination. The franchisee then has 60 days to correct any business problems.

The Commerce Committee recommended HF1404 to pass April 23. It now goes to the House Floor.

Light rail transit

Plans for a light rail transit system in Hennepin County moved closer to reality April 22. The Metropolitan Affairs Committee recommended to pass a bill that would allow Hennepin County to spend money to develop plans for light rail.

Supporters of the bill say the metro area needs light rail to ease traffic congestion and an anticipated energy crisis. But present law prohibits local governments or transit boards from spending money on light rail transit.

Rep. Ken Nelson (DFL-Mpls), House sponsor of SF282, says a small- scale pilot project in Hennepin County is necessary to demonstrate the effectiveness of a light rail system.

Opponents say the bill will increase property taxes for metro area residents. But the committee voted down several attempts to reduce the taxing authority for light rail projects. Nelson says Hennepin County needs to retain authority to levy a four-mill tax so it can buy abandoned railroad right-of-ways as they become available. Also, he says, a lower taxing limit would mean other counties wouldn't be able to acquire land for their own light rail projects. The bill goes next to the House floor.

Braille education

About 750 blind students in Minnesota could benefit from a bill a Minnesota House committee recommended to pass April 22. The bill would require school districts to provide instruction to blind students who want to learn to read and write braille.

Judy Sanders, National Federation of the Blind, told House Education Committee members that partially blind students often learn to read from large print books instead of braille because it's easier. But, she said, many people gradually lose their limited sight, and without braille, have no reading skills.

Supporters of the bill say legally blind students deserve to learn skills that will last a lifetime, not one skill that could fade over time.

But, Todd Kelly, a legally blind Robbinsdale high school teacher says teaching braille takes many hours and may be a waste of time for many students.

"I believe that because we are in a sighted society," he says, "children should be taught to use the best methods to get them by in the long run, to give them the best advantage for their future."

He says braille is a fine skill for those who need it and choose it, but only as a complement to other methods of education.

Crime victims' restitution

Courts could tap state tax refunds to help pay restitution to crime victims under a bill the Judiciary Committee recommended to pass April 21.

HF1274 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin) would authorize the Department of Revenue to cooperate with any public agency that collects court-ordered restitution for crime victims. The agencies would work together to identify individuals who will receive a tax refund and who owe restitution for crimes they've committed. The Department of Revenue would collect the amount from the refund.

Anoka County probation officer, Richard Dahlberg, says the bill would affect only those people who have been working regularly and have had income taxes withheld. He says it's often difficult to get substantial, regular, and timely restitution payments, and total payment may not happen for several years. Dahlberg says using tax refunds would help make the victim whole sooner.

Mobile home park closings

People who live in mobile home parks may get a financial break when the park owner closes or sells the park.

On April 21, the Economic Development and Housing Committee recommended to pass HF574, a bill that would allow cities to require owners to reimburse residents when a park closes.

Rep. Phil Riveness (DFL-Bloomington), the bill's author, says most people living in mobile home parks own their trailers, but rent their lots. And many park owners, especially in the metro area, are selling out to commercial developers, leaving residents with no place to live, he says.

His bill would also change other state regulations on mobile home parks, including a provision that would allow park owners to evict residents who are loud and annoying to their neighbors.

HF574 goes next to the House floor. The Senate version, SF 631 (Merriam, DFL-Coon Rapids), is on the Senate floor.

Fetal disposal

At an April 21 meeting, the Health and Human Services Committee voted 16-7 to recommend passage of HF633, (Wenzel, DFL-Little Falls), a bill that would require cremation or burial of aborted and miscarried fetuses.

The bill's author says the measure would provide regulation of fetus disposal which current law doesn't cover.

Wenzel says the major difference between his bill and the Senate's is the exclusion of incineration as a method of disposal. According to Wenzel, some hospitals currently incinerate fetuses with other waste material and then send the waste to a landfill. "This is not a dignified method of disposal," he says.

Supporters say hospitals and abortion clinics should use dignified, sanitary, and unified methods to dispose of fetuses. They noted that one abortion clinic disposes of fetuses in the garbage; another discharges fetus tissue into the sewer system.

But opponents say current methods of fetus disposal aren't against the law or unsanitary. Spokespersons from both the Pollution Control Agency and the Department of Health testified that the state does monitor current disposal methods to ensure public health safety.

The bill now goes to the full House.

Domestic harassment

In 1985, some 30,000 people called Hennepin County authorities to complain about harassing phone calls--an average of 2,500 calls per month, or 577 per week. But law enforcement officials couldn't do much to help victims.

On April 20, the Crime and Family Law Division of the Judiciary Committee recommended passage of HF1115, a bill that author Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul) says will close in on domestic harassment.

According to Pappas, "Anyone can become a victim of harassment, but harassment goes beyond reasonable behavior, such as repeated phone calls, by day or night at work or at home, letters and packages delivered at all hours of the day and night, constantly being watched or followed during one's daily routine...."

The bill would expand current laws that cover trespass, "interference with privacy"; phone calls; and use of the mail to deliver unwanted letters, packages, or telegrams. It would call for a misdemeanor penalty for anyone who intentionally acts to harass, abuse, or threaten other people.

Emergency employment

The Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee approved a bill April 20 that would give \$11 million to the Minnesota Emergency Employment Development (MEED) job program. That amount is down from the program's original \$40 million price tag.

MEED helps low-income people find jobs and offers financial incentives to businesses which provide them.

Division Chair Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) says approval of the funding will send a message that MEED is a legislative priority, even though the governor wanted to phase out the program.

The bill's author, Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls), says some new provisions in the bill would finetune the program. He says one would require at least 80 percent of state money to go to find jobs for target groups, such as those eligible for welfare and financially troubled farm families.

The proposal will be part of the omnibus appropriations bill that will go to the full House for consideration.

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Property tax bill

A new property tax proposal would provide a tax credit for small businesses in the state, decrease the homestead credit, and restrict city and county spending. The Property Tax **Division of the Taxes Committee** recommended the bill's passage at a meeting April 20.

The new tax credit for small businesses (with a value of less than \$100,000) would provide an estimated \$50 million in tax relief. The bill would reduce the state's homestead credit by five percent and lock cities and counties into a three percent spending increase over last year.

Backers of the legislation say the small business tax credit will give the most relief to cities in greater Minnesota. House Majority Leader Robert Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) says imposing the three percent levy limit on cities and counties would parallel the majority party's philosophy to hold the line on government spending.

Local government officials say, of the restriction on city and county spending, they don't know where local government will get the money to fund community programs. They say mandated programs from the state will be priorities under the three percent spending restriction. Some opponents called the measure a major departure from current statutory philosophy.

An amendment to the bill would exclude pensions and bonding allocation from the three percent levy limit. Opponents said that including bonding in the spending limit would have brought any new bonding proposals to a "screeching halt."

Liquor sales by minors

A bill that would prohibit anyone under age18 from selling liquor in liquor stores, bars, or restaurants, got a recommendation to pass from the **Regulated Industries Committee** April 20.

John Novak, director of Liquor Control, says the bill would put into statute an age-18 guideline that his department has used for several yearseven though it has never formally been on the law books. Novak says his intent in supporting this legislation is to have the rule apply to all sales of liquor--in liquor stores, convenience stores, or bars.

However, under an amendment the committee adopted, the bill would allow minors to sell 3.2 beer in convenience and other stores with a 3.2 beer license.

Supporters say they haven't heard of problems with those under 18 selling beer in grocery stores. They say many high school students may lose jobs if they can't sell the beverage in such places as familyowned resorts and convenience stores.

The bill goes now to the House floor.

We need your help!

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Neighborhoods sometimes need help in settling disputes, such as those between tenants and the people they rent from. Under a bill the Local and Urban Affairs Committee recommended to pass, communities could voluntarily use trained mediators and arbitrators to work with the parties to settle differences they'd otherwise have to go to court to settle. Bill's author is Rep. Phil Carruthers (DFL-Brooklyn Center).

The Education Appropriations Division pulled funding from the proposed arts high school. On a seven to two vote members moved \$30 million from the program to a new statewide, outreach arts program that would use several existing sites.

Mobile home park residents should have a safe place to go during storms, says Rep. Rich O'Connor (DFL-St. Paul). He's sponsoring HF196, a bill that would require park owners to provide underground shelters or an evacuation plan for residents by Aug. 31, 1989. Most parks already have shelters because of local building codes, says O'Connor. But about 20 percent of the parks in the state, most of them older parks, don't have any provisions to protect residents.

A \$10 million appropriation for the Minnesota Zoo in 1988-89 was the recommendation of the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee--\$2 million over what the governor recommended. The \$10 million includes \$500,000 to match private funds the zoo raises.

About \$3 million in additional

revenue for the Secretary of State's Office could come out of a corporation filing fee increase on business, nonprofit, foreign, professional, cooperative, banking, and insurance corporations doing business in the state. Depending on the business status they apply for, fees would range from \$10 to \$90.

Tribal Indian and urban Indian housing programs gained support from the State Departments Appropriations Division. The division recommended \$1.5 million in state funds for the Housing Finance Agency's budget to continue the programs. Other recommendations were: \$50,000 in the biennium for funding the Indian Affairs Council's protection of Indian burial grounds; \$20,000 in matching dollar-for-dollar funds for money they raise from private sources for all five minority councils whose budgets were before the division.

A strong telecommunications network will be the backbone for economic growth in the next century, just as roads and transportation networks were in the past," says Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples). He says the state could save up to \$140 million next biennium by evaluating and setting standards for data processing in state agencies.

Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCMR) may receive \$16 million to continue its recreation and natural resource projects, in spite of the governor's recommendation to discontinue the commission. Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone), LCMR chair and member of the appropriations division that recommends funding the commission, says LCMR is nonpartisan, hard-working, and successful.

The state's Office of Science and Technology isn't leading Minnesota as it should in technological breakthroughs, says Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls), chair of the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Commitee. Her division recommends discontinuing the office's biomedical projects and reducing its computer software program. Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin), chair of the Future and Technology Committee, is sponsoring HF1453, a bill that would create new science and technology programs for the state.

Trout stream season opened April 18, DNR announced. Trout lake season begins with the start of the walleye opener statewide on Saturday, May 16. The state has stocked 121 streams and 167 lakes throughout the state with 5.7 million trout and salmon, weighing a total 122 tons.

Resident combination angling licenses are for sale at all county auditors' offices and from DNR license agents.

Help's available for state employees with personal problems that affect, or could affect their job performance. The State Employee Assistance Program (EAP), in its ninth year, focuses on assessment of troubled employees, shortterm counseling and referral to affordable community resources. EAP provides services at a metro office near the Captiol and in16 other locations throughout the state. All services are private and confidential. Contact person is Keith Tvedten (612) 296-0765.

Minnesota Cities are worried about a proposed three percent cap [over last year] on city and county spending. League of Minnesota Cities spokeswoman, Laurie Hacking, says the three percent levy cap would set back operation of local government. She says cities and counties won't have an option

to raise needed revenue to make up for 26 percent of federal and state aid cities lost from 1980 to 1985.

Three fourths of the state's

emergency employment development (MEED) jobs have been in the private sector over the past year and a half, with the average wage over \$5 per hour, according to Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls). He says 3,000 employers have participated throughout the state, most of them small businesses. More than 80 percent of the people the program placed were elgible for some form of welfare, and 61 percent of the jobs were in greater Minnesota.

Over 17,000 Minnesota families

each year experience an infant miscarriage, according to Sherokee Ilse, president of the Pregnancy and Infant Loss Center, Wayzata. She says this estimate equals or exceeds the number of abortions each year in Minnesota. She supports HF663 (Wenzel, DFL-Little Falls), the fetal disposal bill (see Highlight). She says it would give parents peace of mind that their unborn babies had dignified treatment.

Junk phone calls could tie up a phone line for as long as 13

seconds after a person hangs up, says Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids). Quinn is author of HF124 which would regulate companies that market products through recorded phone messages. The bill would require a recorded message to automatically disconnect after someone receiving the call has hung up.

Continuing the military pay exclusion from state taxes would cost other Minnesota taxpayers an additional \$23 million, says Taxes Committee Chair Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine). The National Guard Enlisted Association opposes the deletion, saying

it could drive military personnel out of the state and keep others from joining. Personnel costs make up an

average of 55-60 percent of city budgets, according to the League of Minnesota Cities. Cities oppose a state mandate to begin comparable worth programs because it could increase personnel costs statewide an estimated \$30-35 million, says the league.

1987-88 MINNESOTA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEE COVERAGE

Functions of House committees, divisions

The Minnesota Legislature creates, abolishes, and changes laws to fit the needs of Minnesotans. Legislators introduce hundreds of proposed laws each session. The House of Representatives and the Senate consider bills separately, but they must agree on a bill before it can become law.

The Legislature relies on committees, divisions, and subcommittees to be sure all bills get careful study and review. In the House, the Speaker of the House decides on the committees the House will have, and appoints the members and chairs who will serve on them. The speaker also assigns bills to the appropriate committees by topic.

Here's a list that briefly describes the function of each 1987-88 committee and division:

Agriculture--Sets out farm policies and programs for assistance to farmers, promotion of interstate and international trade, marketing commodities, and soil conservation.

Agriculture Finance Division--Makes budgetary decisions for programs the Agriculture Committee creates, including sources of funding. Reviews effectiveness and efficiency of farm programs.

Appropriations--Recommends objectives and goals in appropriating state money; reviews the governor's budget proposals; recommends level of funding for all state agencies and any other program the state finances; provides estimates of appropriations to the Ways and Means Committee; reviews every bill that needs an appropriation even if the bill had its first hearing in another committee. For example, a proposal having to do with agriculture that involves spending money, would go first to the Agriculture Committee or one of its divisions.

Agriculture, Transportation, Semi-state Division--Reviews and makes recommendations for funding of agricultural programs, the World Trade Center, transportation projects, the departments of agriculture and transportation, and boards and organizations the state partially funds.

Education Division--Recommends funding for the University of Minnesota, state universities, community colleges, AVTI's, and the Department of Education.

Health and Human Services Division--Recommends funding for state health and human service programs.

State Departments Division--Proposes the omnibus state departments bill appropriating money for state departments and agencies.

Commerce--Addresses consumers' concerns; works closely with the Department of Commerce and the Consumer Services Division of the Attorney General's Office in writing consumer protection legislation.

Economic Development and Housing--Makes

recommendations for programs in job development and training, financing businesses, housing and community development, and rural development. Makes recommendations for allocating private activity bonds. Also reviews programs in the Department of Energy and Economic Development. Education--Recommends programs for K-12 education. Looks to making education fair and equal among different regions in the state and among different social and economic groups. Also addresses teachers' training and parent/community involvement in education.

Education Finance Division--Reviews and makes recommendations for the funding of school systems and educational programs. Creates a formula for distributing funds among school districts.

Environment and Natural Resources--Concerned with hunting and fishing regulation and promotion, pollution, waste management, wildlife protection, forestry and mining.

Financial Institutions and Insurance-Concerned with consumer rights in insurance; affordability and availability of insurance for individuals and companies; reviews banking charges and definitions of accounts and services.

Future and Technology--

Concerned with long range economic and job needs, emphasizing Minnesota's place in the world market. Anticipates demographic (population) changes in the state for consideration in educational, economic, housing, health, crime, environmental, tax, and other policy decisions.

General Legislation, Veterans Affairs, and Gaming--Addresses gambling

issues and regulations; veterans' programs; regulation of elections; and other miscellaneous legislation.

Governmental Operations-

Reviews any bill that substantially changes or creates a new state department, agency, commission, board or bureau, though the bill may have had its first review and hearing in another committee; deals with public employee pension plans, and state workers' bargaining procedures.

Health and Human

Services--Reviews and makes recommendations for the policies, goals, objectives, reform and creation of welfare programs; concerned with the availability of programs and services; also deals with the licensing of health care providers and social workers. (The Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee works on the funding of programs.)

Higher Education--Makes recommendations for the goals and objectives of AVTI's, state universities, community colleges, and the University of Minnesota; assesses the quality, availablity, and governance of these institutions; concerned with student financial aid and enrollment.

Judiciary--Considers sentencing guidelines, bail requirements, citizen rights, and corrections. Evaluates structure and organization of courts.

Crime and Family Law Division--Concerned with sentencing guidelines and procedures in juvenile delinquency, and child abuse, custody, and support cases.

Labor-Management

Relations--Concerned with negotiation procedures, wages, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and the rights and responsibilities of workers, managers, and owners.

Unemployment Insurance and Workers' Compensation Division--Deals with the concerns of businesses, workers, and insurance companies, and the effectiveness and availability of unemployment insurance and workers' compensation.

Local and Urban Affairs--Makes recommendations concerning relations between state and local governments, the impact of federal and state programs on local government, and the jurisdiction, control and bonding authority of local government.

Metropolitan Affairs--

Reviews the structures, goals and programs of metropolitan agencies; concerned with transportation, sewers, roads, bridges, parks, airports, and bonding for state construction projects in the metropolitan area.

Regulated Industries--

Concerned with controls on industries the state regulates, such as liquor, phone, power, and commercial soliciting.

Rules and Legislative Administration--Establishes a budget for House committee expenses; determines House rules, joint rules, and administrative duties of the House.

Taxes--Reviews any bill that affects state income, sales, use, or property tax policy, though tax bills may first go to another committee; concerned with budget stability; provides estimates of current taxes to the Ways and Means Committee.

Property Tax Division--Evaluates property tax system, state aid to local governments, property tax relief for individuals, and fairness of tax base.

Tax Laws Division--Concerned with tax laws, including tax formulas, that carry out tax policy.

Transportation--Concerned with safety, highway construction, maintenance, regulations of road use, and licensing of vehicles.

Ways and Means--Sets overall spending and taxing policies and limits for the Appropriations and Taxes Committees, and the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee.

• Does the word "session" always refer to the two-year biennium?

In the Legislature, use of the word "session" may have five meanings:

1) Session: the biennial (twoyear) period during which the Legislature meets as: "The 75th Session."

2) Regular session: the annual meeting of the Legislature between the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January, and the first Monday after the third Saturday in May (this session, May 18).

3) Special, or extra session: session after expiration of 120 legislative days in a biennium, or after the date the law prescribed for annual adjournment.

The governor calls the Legislature into special session. But the governor may not dictate the matters the Legislature will consider, nor the length of the special session.

4) Daily session: a meeting of the House or Senate in its chamber. Most people use the term "daily session" interchangeably with "legislative day."

5) Joint session: meeting of the House and Senate together, same as joint convention.

• What is a legislative day? A legislative day is a day when either the House or the Senate is in session; a 24-hour period beginning at 7 a.m.

How many members serve in the Minnesota House of Representatives?

The Minnesota House has 134 members. The Senate has 67. Each House member represents about 30,000 people. They serve two year terms. Senators serve four year terms.

How do I know who my state representative is?

You live in one of 67 legislative districts in the state. Each legislative district includes two House districts, A and B. One senator represents both A and B. A and B each have one representative--one who represents the people who live within the boundaries of District A. and one who represents those who live within the boundaries of District B. If you don't know which district you live in or who represents you, call the House Information Office at (612) 296-2146, or call your county auditor's office. Either office will tell you your district number and who your state representative and senator are.

What is a quorum?

A quorum refers to the required number of members that must be in attendance to conduct business (50 percent, plus 1 -- in the House, 68). 14

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

Omnibus tax bill

After five hours of debate and discussion April 29, the House of Representatives passed the omnibus tax bill for 1987 on a vote of 74-59. Under provisions of the 424-page bill, (HF529, DFL-Voss), the state would collect approximately \$490 million more than current law provides.

A breakdown of some estimated increases shows: corporate income taxes, \$240 million; sales and use taxes, \$119 million; telephone gross earnings tax, \$98 million; and cigarette and tobacco products taxes, \$20 million.

The bill proposes a four-level rate structure for personal income taxes, ranging from 4.2 percent to 9.2 percent. And beginning in 1988, if the state budget reserve falls below \$100 million, it would trigger a set of higher income rates, ranging from 4.4 to 9.4 percent until the deficit's made up.

Omnibus farm bill

At the Agriculture Committee's last meeting April 29, lawmakers

hammered out an omnibus farm bill which the committee's chair, Rep. Steve Wenzel (DFL-Little Falls), sponsors.

HF1136, in amended form, would make changes to the 1986 farm real estate debt restructuring program which the Rural Finance Administration (RFA) administers. The program assists eligible farmers struggling with low cash flows and heavy real estate debt by suspending principal loan payments and lowering interest for a period of time.

Wenzel proposes to: rename RFA the Rural Finance Authority, clarify RFA powers and duties, clean up statutory language, modify eligible criteria for the homestead redemption program, and authorize RFA to participate in other federal farm debt restructuring programs and to sell state bonds.

Other provisions in the bill would provide funding for: pseudorabies control, several agricultural research projects, the multi-state grain compact, and the milk-in-schools program which the bill now limits to first-, second-, and third-grade students.

It's a fact!

With a ceremony on the shore of Lake Superior, Minnesota adopted the Lake Superior Agate as the state gem stone in 1969. Artisans use the quartz mineral for jewelry and other artifacts, such as decorative paper weights. Fourteen Minnesota rockhound clubs, including the Minnesota Mineral Club, voted the layered crystal their favorite stone. The club asked Sen. Mel Hansen, a Minneapolis conservative, to carry a bill declaring the agate the state rock. Supporters believed the bill to be noncontroversial, but it met a storm of partisan opposition. It passed after lengthy debate among loud shouts of "no" from opponents who said it was a commercial gimmick and made the Legislature look trivial and ridiculous. Glaciers spread the agate over Minnesota during the last melt about 10,000 years ago. HF1136 would reactiviate the agricultural data collection task force and clarify amendments to the notification procedure for redemption of agricultural homesteads.

The beginning farmers program, also part of the bill, would allow qualifying beginning or re-entry farmers to apply for low-interest loans to purchase land the state or commercial lenders own. If a lender lends a farmer money, the state would guarantee 85 percent of any losses on the loan.

HF1136 goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Higher education spending

The Appropriations Committee members recommended a \$1.6 billion budget for state higher education April 28.

The bill includes a 10.6 percent increase over the last biennium to fund programs at state universities, colleges, and AVTIs, but falls \$48.5 million short of the governor's recommendation. New budget plans include increased services to special need students and a \$16.5 million increase in available scholarship and grant money for students during the next two years.

Education Division members who put the bill together cut \$33.7 million in spending from their original budget, including a drop of more than \$13 million from the University of Minnesota's budget for the proposed Commitment to Focus plan.

New programs were the target for most of the budget cuts the division made April 24. Division Chair Rep. Lyn Carlson (DFL-Crystal) says the committee hopes to protect system budget bases, and postpone new programs statewide.

Campus child care, a top priority for students statewide, lost half of the \$10.6 million original proposals had slated for state campuses. Lawmakers also postponed planning for the proposed Composite Engineering program at Winona State until 1989 and cut back dollars that would have expanded course offerings at state universities and community colleges.

Minnesota Trade Office

Minnesota Trade Office employees will move from their current home in the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's building to the World Trade Center in downtown St. Paul.

The World Trade Center developer has given the Trade Office 20,000 square feet on the 10th floor. The only costs to the state are operating expenses for such things as heat and light--about \$9 per square foot.

Also, HF1095 (G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham), would transfer the trade office's duty to promote, develop, and facilitate trade and foreign investment in Minnesota to the newly named Department of Trade and Economic Development.

On April 28, the Governmental Operations Committee recommended HF1095 to pass and rereferred it to the Appropriations Committee.

Gasohol

By July 1, 1988, all unleaded gasoline for sale in Minnesota for use in motor vehicles would contain the grain product, ethanol, under a bill the Agriculture Committee recommended to pass April 28.

HF777 would require gas stations to sell the ethanol-based gasoline, commonly known as gasohol. The bill's author, Rep. Roger Cooper (DFL-Bird Island), says gasohol is a potential boon to the state's stagnant rural economy. It could, Cooper says, create about 10,000 new jobs in rural Minnesota and increase state revenues.

Supporters of HF777 say gasohol, a new market for otherwise unusable corn and grain, is a way to lessen United States' dependence on foreign oil. Environmentalists claim gasohol will help clean up the air. Pollution Control Agency reports show that cars burning ethanol-blend fuels emit 24 to 34 percent less carbon monoxide than cars burning gasoline.

But, opponents say, because gasohol is a grain-based alcohol fuel, the product could cause engine problems. They say alcohol and gasoline don't homogenize. They also question the availability of regular unleaded gas for motorboats and small displaced engines.

If HF777 becomes law, it would not apply to marinas or service stations with only one gas pump. And it would not require small displaced engines to use gasohol.

The bill, which goes next to the Taxes Committee, would also repeal ethanol distributors' two-cent tax credit on Oct. 1, 1988.

Spending bill

The Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee recommended passage of a spending bill April 27 that would decrease available funding for the state's health and human services programs by about \$27 million.

The largest cuts came in medical assistance funds for chemical dependency treatment, the state's emergency employment development program, and medical and general assistance payments.

Division Chair Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) says that even though she hesitated to offer the amendment to cut funds, reductions were necessary to meet the two percent decrease in the state's budget.

The bill now goes to the full Appropriations Committee.

Department of Human Rights

The appropriations division that allocates state department budgets, took a step April 27 toward abolishing the Department of Human Rights as a separate agency and moving its functions to the Attorney General's Office. The proposed move is part of a \$13 million cut-back in state agency spending.

Rep. David Bishop (IR-Rochester) says the move would improve human rights enforcement. And Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls), division chair, says it would save the state over \$1 million by cutting 11 of the department's 54 positions. "We have to come up with budget cuts," she says. "Postponing and combining functions is the most painless way. We don't have many options left."

But neither the Department of Human Rights nor the Attorney General's Office wants the change. They say transferring the department from the governor's cabinet to a division in an office that has many other responsibilities would degrade the cause of human rights. Opponents also say it could create a conflict of interest, because the attorney general would become an advocate for protected groups.

The division added the proposed Department of Human Rights move to the division's omnibus state departments bill that goes next to the full Appropriations Committee.

AIDS reporting

Under a bill the Health and Human Services Committee recommended to pass April 27, the Department of Health would be able to take action to help stop the spread of communicable diseases, such as AIDS.

The bill (HF1076, Greenfield, DFL-Mpls) would allow health officials to act on reports that people with communicable diseases are spreading them through noncompliant behavior. To stop the behavior, health officials may offer appropriate services such as counseling, treatment, and support services. If a disease carrier continues the behavior, the department may petition a court order to impose the least restrictive remedy. Court orders would not include jail sentences.

Even though the bill covers several

infectious diseases, most debate focuses on AIDS. And supporters say the proposal would touch only a small percentage of those infected with the AIDS virus.

Some panel members say the bill's provisions don't go far enough to protect the public from AIDS carriers. One amendment the committee voted down would have mandated health professionals to report each person that tested positive for the AIDS virus. But the original provision makes reporting an option.

The bill now goes before the full House.

Missing children

Local school districts may play a new role that could help law enforcement officials track missing children.

On April 27, Education Committee members recommended to pass HF259 (Bishop, IR-Rochester) that would require all Minnesota school districts to notify parents or guardians when students are tardy or absent from school. The bill would also require schools enrolling a student for the first time to request a birth certificate or record of registration from the last school, and notify local authorities if they suspect the child may be missing from home.

Bishop says schools that monitor children every day would help cover bases that investigators can't do on their own. The tracking this bill proposes would help eliminate the most common and most difficult form of disappearance--that of a natural parent who takes a child from his or her legal custodian, he says.

Minnesota Zoo

The Minnesota Zoo Board would double in size under a bill the Governmental Operations Committee recommended to pass April 27.

The bill, HF586 (Brown, DFL-Appleton), would increase the number of board members from 15 to 30. Supporters say that would help the zoo find private sector expertise the state can't afford to provide.

Zoo Director Kathryn Roberts says a larger board would be an opportunity for better representation from the scientific and corporate communities, and assure geographic representation of Greater Minnesota.

Under the bill, the governor would initially appoint the 15 new members. After that, as terms end or vacancies occur, the board would fill the positions.

The proposal would also exempt board members from filing a statement of economic interest with the State Ethical Practices Board--a requirement zoo officials say many potential board members view as an invasion of privacy and a reason to refuse appointments to the board.

It goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Golf clubs

Sex discrimination is still part of the golf scene in Minnesota, says Rep. David Bishop (IR-Rochester). He says golf clubs have not been following the letter of the law the Legislature passed last year to prevent discrimination during prime playing times on Minnesota golf courses.

Bishop says HF533 would tighten up a law the Legislature passed in 1986 to give golf clubs a property tax break for nondiscriminatory policies. But now, says Bishop, golf clubs are finding loopholes to discriminate and still retain their tax break.

Under the bill, clubs couldn't force a family to choose which spouse will play during prime tee-off times. Currently, says Bishop, some clubs make a couple choose which one will play. He says most of the time the man gets preferential treatment.

The bill now goes to the House floor.

Ways and Means

The Ways and Means Committee met April 27 to approve the taxing limits the Taxes Committee adopted April 24. The panel determined that the new tax limit would be within the \$11.5 billion budget the House is proposing.

Taxes Committee Chair Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine) says the new biennial tax ceiling will be \$490 million--a \$200 million cut from the DFL's original tax plans. But House Minority Leader Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) says the tax bill will eventually create more than \$600 million in new taxes.

Appropriations Chair Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham) told committee members that spending bills would remain within the appropriations limit.

Fiscal policy

The State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee approved a bill that would create a new 18-member legislative commission on fiscal policy, and added the proposal to the division's omnibus bill April 24. The bill's author, Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester), told the committee that the commission, away from day-today political debates, would provide objective consideration to fiscal issues.

Bishop says the Legislature deals with an \$11 billion biennial operating budget. But with dedicated funds, user fees, and revolving funds, the state actually has a \$19 billion budget, he says. "We need a policy commission to look into whether we want to continue moving money out of the general fund and into special accounts, and what revenue sources are appropriate for certain state-funded programs," says Bishop. He says the commission would also study funding and timing of capital bonding bills. Rep. Howard Miller (IR-Redwood Falls) says the commission would allow the

Legislature to make its own budget projections, rather than reacting to the governor's recommendations.

Division Chair Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) agrees, suggesting a \$190,000 appropriation for the commission's first two years. Division members voted to support the measure, although Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin) says he doubts whether a commission would really affect budget decisions.

The Governmental Operations Committee approved the bill earlier this session. At those hearings, Rep. Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham), Appropriations Committee chair, Rep. Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine) Taxes Committee chair, and Professor James Vernbey of Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs supported the proposal.

'As is' warranties

Dealers sell about 70 percent of their used cars on "as is" terms, says Rep. Joe Begich (DFL-Eveleth), author of HF85. The bill offers a state arbitration program for consumers who buy "as is" vehicles. Begich says defects show up in about 40 percent of those vehicles within 60 days after purchase. Under HF85, dealers would have to provide a 60-day or 3,000-mile implied warranty on "as is" vehicles they sell for more than \$2,000 or under 100,000 miles. It would also require dealers to set up or participate in an arbitration program to help settle any repair disputes that may arise during the warranty period.

It's hard to know how many of the cars would go to arbitration because, according to Begich, most licensed dealers, especially those in smaller communities, will deal with consumers immediately and won't go to arbitration.

The bill passed the House on a 70-61 vote. It would take effect Jan. 1, 1988 for metropolitan used-car dealers, and Jan. 1, 1989 for Greater Minnesota dealers.

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County home rule charter could soon be a reality in Minnesota under SF557. The bill would set up a Ramsey County Charter Study Commission to determine whether the county should have a home rule charter. The bill requires the 17-member commission to report findings to the county board by June 1, 1988, and to prepare a draft charter for presentation to voters in the 1990 election, if the commission determines a charter is desirable. Rep. Richard Kostohryz (DFL-North St. Paul) is House author of SF557.

Minnesotans could drive 65 mph on rural interstates if HF295 (Bishop, IR-Rochester) becomes law. If caught driving any faster, the speeding violation would go on their driving records. The bill would raise the speed on rural interstates, but retain the 55 limit on freeways in urban areas. It would also apply the socalled 10-mile grace law to 55 mph highways only. Under that law, speeding violations for driving 10 miles over the posted speed, does not affect a driver's record.

Excellent foreign markets exist for such Minnesota products as medical devices, processed foods, wild rice, or computer software according to Minnesota Trade Office executive director Bill Dieterich. He says the Trade Office offers help to business people through seminars, training, and exposure to small businesses which have successfully operated in international trade. The office also leads trade missions to target markets where business people can contact potential buyers or distributors for their products, says Dieterich.

The state should spend more to combat AIDS, says Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter) "It's radically wrong to spend only one seventieth of the Department of Health's budget on a disease that will become America's number one public health problem in the next decade or decades to come," says Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter). He says the department should spend between 20 and 40 percent of its budget to combat the spread of AIDS.

The state will have \$2.24 billion to spend on health and human service programs in the next biennium under a bill the Appropriations Committee approved April 30. The bill would earmark about \$2 billion for human services, \$196 million for corrections, and \$70 million for health programs, among other funding proposals. The Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee last week cut almost \$27 million in spending from the bill. Cuts were to comply with a two percent reduction in spending provisions from the state's budget.

Minnesota's making Time

magazine, according to news reports. A new ad campaign to promote Minnesota's health care industry will hit the pages of *Time* May 4. The campaign, a marketing effort of the governor's Commission on Promoting Minnesota Healthcare Resources, features a 16-page advertising supplement focusing on the state's nationally and internationally renowned health care system. Price tag's about \$315,000. State funds provide \$7,500; the rest comes from private donations.

"Robin Hood style" is the term Rep. Phil Riveness (DFL-Bloomington) uses to describe the school aids bill, HF753 (K. Nelson, DFL-Mpls). Riveness says the bill pulls money from inner suburban districts for statewide distribution. The Appropriations Committee recommended the bill to pass April 28. It was on the floor of the House late Thursday, April 29, after review by the Ways and Means Committee.

Utility companies should contribute as much to solving the acid rain problem as they do to creating it, says Rep. Steve Trimble (DFL-St. Paul). He's sponsoring a bill that would require public utility companies to cover 60 percent of what the Pollution Control Agency spends on acid rain control. Each public utility would contribute to a fund over the next five years. The amount of a company's contribution would depend on the number of kilowatt hours the company sells in Minnesota.

One million dollars may go to the Science and Technology Office in the Department of Energy and Economic Development over the next two years to support Minnesota Project Innovation, the Midwest Technology Development Institute, and the Minnesota Inventors' Congress. Rep. Phyllis Kahn, (DFL-Mpls), chair of the State Departments Division of Appropriations, spoke in support of the programs. And the division voted to include them in the omnibus state departments bill while eliminating some of the office's other functions.

"It's a good program that the businesses like. But we just can't afford it anymore," says Rep. Loren Solberg (DFL-Bovey) about the State Departments Division of Appropriations Committee's decision to eliminate the state Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) programs. The Federal government is continuing its OSHA programs. But Ken Peterson, deputy commissioner of the Department of Labor and Industry, says if state cuts become law, it would reduce the number of workplace inspections by one-half.

The state's Washington D.C. office lost its \$164,000 funding from the State Departments Division of Appropriation's omnibus bill. Barbara Rohde, office director, says the office provides state officials valuable information on federal legislation affecting Minnesota, and has been successful in bringing federal money into the state. The division voted April 28 to scratch the appropriation that would have supported the office for the next two vears.

"Instead of the yo-yo actions that get dealt with only in the battleground scenario of conference committees," says Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester), the Legislature needs a legislative commission on fiscal policy to evaluate and recommend budget action. (see Fiscal Policy highlight)

"It all depends on how the political winds are blowing at the moment," is how Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin) describes legislative budget decision-making. He opposes a proposal that would create a legislative commission to study fiscal issues, saying it wouldn't really have any affect on legislative decisions.

The DNR has spent \$3.5 million this year to fight forest fires, Jim Brooks from the department told the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee. Brooks testified in favor of HF601 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey) a bill that would make accidental starting of a forest fire a misdemeanor and provide a \$100 [down from the \$1,000 in the original bill] reward to those who furnish information about fire starters.

Legal difficulties will require two bills to deal with intentional and accidental fire starting as two separate issues. So Rep. Loren Solberg's bill HF601 no longer includes a felony charge for people who intentionally start a fire but deals only with accidental fire starting. Solberg's amended bill gained preliminary approval from a House appropriations division April 24. It will get further committee review before going to the House floor.



• What is legislative immunity?

Legislative immunity refers to Section 10, Article IV of the Minnesota Constitution which says: "The members of each house [House of Representatives and Senate] in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house, they shall not be questioned in any other place."

• What is the wording of the oath of office that representatives take after election?

Section 8, Article IV of the Minnesota Constitution says: "Each member and officer of the Legislature before entering upon his [her] duties shall take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the constitution of this state, and to discharge faithfully the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

So each elected representative takes the following oath: "Do you solemnly swear that you will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and that you will faithfully discharge the duties of the office to which you have just been elected to the best of your judgment and ability, so help you God?"

• Who is the Speaker Pro Tempore?

Speaker Pro Tempore is a member the Speaker of the House, the presiding officer of the House, appoints to preside in his absence. This session, Speaker Pro Tempore is Rep. Dee Long of Minneapolis. • What does "majority" and "simple majority" mean? A majority, needed for final passage of a bill in the House, is 50 percent plus one of all elected members of a legislative body: 68 votes in the House; 34 votes in the Senate.

In a committee, subcommittee, division, and Committee of the Whole, a simple majority is 50 percent plus one of those members present and voting.

What is a minority report?

A minority report contains the opinion of a minority of the members of a standing committee who disagree with the recommendations in the committee report on a bill or resolution. The House takes up the minority report before the committee report, and if the House adopts the minority report, it stands as the report of the committee on an issue.

As with the word, "session," the word "report" has several uses in the Legislature in addition to "minority report":

1) Some people use report instead of the more commonly used, traditional term "reading," as in the reading of a bill;

2) Committee report: recommendations of a standing committee that a bill or resolution "be

passed" or "be passed as amended," with or without reference to another committee; 3) Comparison report: formal

announcement by the Chief Clerk of the House or Secretary of the Senate that companion House and Senate bills are identical or nearly identical;
Progress report on Conference Committee: report to the full body by a conferee, updating members on the status of a conference committee's negotiations.

Who represents you at the State Capitol? The House Public Information Office

The House Public Information Office publishes the *Official Directory of the Minnesota Legislature* and the *Members Directory*, both including legislators' committee assignments. You can get copies in the House Public Information Office when available.

What legislation did your representative introduce? The House Index Department has a Cathrode Ray Tube (CRT) which shows information on a televisionlike screen. The CRT lists each member's name and the bills he/she sponsored in the current session. Staff members can help you use the CRT.

Where members sit in the House Chamber

The House Public Information Office publishes a *Seating Arrangement of the Minnesota Legislature* with members' photos. United States Congress The House Public Information Office can give you names of Minnesota's members of Congress.

BILLS

Need a copy of a bill? The Chief Clerk's Office can give you copies of bills and resolutions.

Want to know a bill's author, status, or committee assignment?

The computerized House Index tracks all bills through the legislative process. You can get the information you want about bills on the CRT. House Index lists bills by committee and by over 150 topics (e.g. environment, taxes, education) on the CRT.

You can call the *House Bill Status Line* for a 24-hour recorded message on the day's committee activities on bills, (612) 297-1264.

Which bills become law?

Bills that became law are on the CRT in House Index. The House Public Information Office also publishes brief summaries of new laws each session. Call the Information Office to get on the summary mailing list.

Standing committees and committee assignments The Members Directory lists committees and committee assignments. Both are available in the House Public Information Office and Chief Clerk's Office.

The House Information Office publishes *Three Branches of Government*, a brochure showing the structure of state government. Staff members can help you find various state departments and agencies, and furnish phone numbers.

In the Senate

The Secretary of the Senate's Office (612) 296-2343 and Senate Information (612) 296-0504, Room 231, State Capitol, provide services similar to the Chief Clerk's Office and House Index. The Senate Information Office also provides services similar to those of House Information. Call the Senate Hotline, (612) 296-8088, for committee meeting schedules.

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A bill is an idea for a new law, or an idea to abolish or change an existing law. Several thousand bills enter the legislative process in Minnesota each time the Legislature meets.

Minnesota has a bicameral Legislature, or two groups of elected citizens (senators in the Senate, representatives in the House of Representatives) who study, discuss, and vote on bills, acting for the people of Minnesota. Bills begin their legislative journey in either the House or the Senate, or both. To become a law, all bills must pass in both the House and Senate, and go to the governor for his signature.

The idea

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Anyone can propose an idea for a bill an individual, consumer group, corporation, professional association, governmental unit, or the governor. Most ideas come from members of the Legislature. The revisor of statutes puts the ideas for bills into proper legal form as a bill for introduction. Only legislators can introduce bills into the lawmaking process.

Chief author

The legislator who sponsors and introduces the bill in the Legislature is the chief author. The chief author's name appears on the bill with the bill's file number for identification as it moves through the legislative process. The chief author may select up to four other authors, whose names also appear on the bill.

Introduction in the Legislature

HOW A BILL BECOMES A LAW

When the author introduces a bill in the House, it gets a House File (HF) number (HF264, for example), indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction. In the Senate, the bill gets a Senate File (SF) number (SF224, for example). Each HF in the House usually has a companion SF in the Senate. All revenue-raising bills must begin in the House.

Committee consideration

At introduction, the bill has its first reading. (The Minnesota Constitution requires three readings on three separate days for all bills.) The presiding officer of the House or Senate refers the bill to an appropriate committee for action. All committee meetings are open to the public. A committee may: recommend passage of a bill in its original form; recommend passage after amendment by the committee; or make no recommendation. in which case a bill may die when the session ends. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its actions and recommendations to the House or Senate.

General orders

After approval of the committee report in the House and Senate, the bill has its second reading and goes onto General Orders--a list of bills waiting House action. House members, acting as the Committee of the Whole, discuss bills, debate the issues, adopt amendments, and present arguments. They may recommend that a bill "do pass," recommend postponement, or have further committee action.

Calendar

The calendar is a list of bills the Committee of the Whole recommends to pass. At this point, a bill has its third reading. Amendments to a bill on the Calendar must have the unanimous consent of all House members in this final vote. By committee recommendation, non-controversial bills may bypass General Orders and go directly onto a Consent Calendar, usually passing without debate. Every bill requires a majority vote of the full membership of the House and Senate to pass.

Conference Committee

If the House and Senate do not agree on a bill, a conference committee of three or five senators, and an equal number of representatives, meets to reach an agreement. If both bodies then pass the bill in compromise form, it goes to the governor.

Governor

When a bill arrives at the governor's office, the governor may: sign it, and the bill becomes law; veto it (return it with a "veto message" stating the objections); pocket veto the bill (take no action and let adjournment of the Legislature, in effect, veto the bill); or line veto portions of appropriation bills. If the governor does not sign or veto a bill within three days after receiving it, and the Legislature is in session, the bill automatically becomes law.

Do You Know

Marble, granite, limestone, and sandstone went into the construction of Minnesota's Capitol. But controversy arose among the Board of State Capitol Commissioners over which type of stone to use. They had to consider affordability, strength, durability, and beauty. Also, some wanted to use only Minnesota-quarried stone. But Minnesota granite wasn't as pretty, was more expensive, and more difficult to prepare than Georgia marble. The compromise decision was to use St. Cloud granite for the basement, Georgia marble for the exterior. The marble was cut to size in Georgia to save on railroad transportation costs, and polished in St. Paul to provide Minnesotans with jobs. Cutting the sixteen 21-foot flawless columns exhausted the Georgia quarry of its marble.

State departments spending bill

Amid budget cuts, the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee came up with a \$1.3 billion budget bill that chair Rep. Phyllis Kahn says consolidates similar state programs, delays new ones, and makes state government "leaner and more efficient."

Kahn told the Appropriations Committee May 5 that major provisions of HF1315 (G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham) include: eliminating the state Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA); "severely truncating" the State Planning Agency; eliminating the Department of Human Rights and moving some of its functions to the attorney general's office: eliminating the Legislative Commission on Public Education: reducing the science and technology office in the Department of Energy and Economic Development; and

reducing base-level funding to the Department of Natural Resources.

Kahn says the bill puts a high priority on increased use of computers and telecommunications; better evaluation and planning within departments; and a more targeted, accountable, and forward-looking budget process.

The DNR's Game and Fish Fund would get an additional \$5 million in hunting, fishing, and trapping license fee increases. And the bill would restore \$2 million to the Minnesota Zoo if the zoo finds private funds to match state dollars. Minority councils receive similar matching grant support in the bill.

The state departments funding bill passed the House floor May 6, and will get conference committee review.

Admissions tax

The choice wasn't easy. Back in 1947, the Goldfinch was up for the honor, but legislators voted it down. After that, a statewide news-paper poll revealed that adults favored the Robin and school children wanted the Scarlet Tanager.

The issue rested for 10 years. Then, in 1961, the 700-member Minnesota Ornithologists' Union, with the support of the Minnesota Museum of Natural History, petitioned the Legislature to adopt the Loon as the official state bird. One ornithologist observed, "To people who have journeyed to Minnesota's northern woods, the loon is a symbol of unspoiled wilderness, of remoteness."

Finally, on March 13, 1961, after 14 years of debate, the Legislature passed a bill making the Common Loon Minnesota's state bird. (Facts about the Loon appear in *Do You Know?* on the back page.)

admission prices under a bill the Taxes Committee recommended to pass May 7.

The bill, HF1219 (Kelso, DFL-Shakopee), would impose a 25-cent tax on all admissions to major amusement facilities in Scott County.

County officials, testifying before the committee, say they need the new revenue (about \$600,000 to \$700,000 per year) to help pay for a new \$52 million Bloomington ferry bridge. Without it, they say Scott County would lose matching federal funds for the bridge, and the burden of the cost would rest on local property taxpayers.

Canterbury Downs officials say the new tax would cost the racetrack about \$350,000 annually. They say they would have to pay the tax to hold down admission fees, which already include a 50-cent state and local tax. A vehicle tax would be more equitable, says a racetrack representative, because it would raise revenue from cars using county roads to get to the track.

The bill now goes before the full House.

Building grants

New buildings could soon be on the drawing board for small school districts that combine high schools.

Rep. Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham), Appropriations Committee chair, is proposing an \$8 million grant program that could give qualified school districts up to 75 percent of school construction or remodeling costs. The plan would offer grants as an incentive for small school districts to combine grades with neighboring districts.

Committee staff members say Anderson came up with the idea as a response to the needs of struggling, rural districts, whose shrinking enrollments are forcing program cuts.

The committee will consider the incentive plan next week as a part of the committee's capital bonding bill.

Merging schools

House members sent a measure back to committee from the House floor May 5 that some lawmakers say could only hurt small school districts that want to merge.

HF1035 (Larsen, DFL-Ramsey) would require small school districts planning mergers of secondary grades to negotiate a placement plan with their teachers for teaching positions. If negotiations don't bring about an agreement, the plan would then require districts to place surplus teachers on unrequested leave according to a combined seniority list.

Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park) says she supports the idea. Mandated cooperation is the logical placement method for teachers who could lose their jobs in a merger, she says.

"Seniority is important in every profession," she says. "It would be no more fair to just throw out employees when companies merge than it would be to throw out teachers from a small school district."

But the majority of members opposed the idea and say it needs more study.

Rep. Bob McEachern (DFL-St. Michael) who made the motion, says he wants districts to use cooperation as a way to give kids the best possible education. But, he says, this bill would create a state law that would be a road block for local agreements that could stop needed mergers.

Lawmakers say they plan to study the idea and bring it back again next year.

Hazardous waste disposal

On a vote of 125 to 5, the House gave final approval May 5 to HF401 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin), which would impose criminal penalties on those who intentionally mishandle the disposal of hazardous waste.

Legal disposal is becoming increasingly more costly, says the bill's author, Rep. Darby Nelson. And, in Nelson's words, that creates strong economic incentives for illegal actions. The attorney general's office says current laws don't cover many of those actions.

Nelson's bill would target those who intentionally and illegally transport, treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste. It also goes after anyone who intentionally provides false or inadequate information.

House members amended the bill to clearly define items the bill does not cover, including household hazardous waste, pesticides, and used oil. They also removed a provision which would have paid a reward to anyone who turns in violators to the Pollution Control Agency.

House action

Less than two weeks remain of the 1987 legislative session, and several hundred bills await action. The House made a dent in the work May 4 when members acted on 51 bills during a seven-hour floor session.

Here are some of the bills the House passed:

HF1204 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park): would allow the Hennepin County Board to hold closed meetings on certain Hennepin County Medical Center business where an open meeting would harm the Medical Center's competitive position.
HF1319 (Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca): would authorize the use of vertical wheelchair lifts, inclined stairway wheelchair lifts, and inclined stairway chair lifts in public buildings.

• HF1420 (McDonald, IR-Watertown): would allow people who have Federal Communications Commission amateur radio licenses to install in any motor vehicle, radio equipment capable of receiving or transmitting on police emergency radio frequencies.

• HF1475 (Jefferson, DFL-Mpls): would authorize including 50 additional full-time positions within state government agencies in a supported work program for persons

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with severe disabilities, and would allow up to three persons with such disabilities and their job coach to share a full-time position.
SF409 (House author--Solberg, DFL-Bovey): would broaden the Child Abuse Reporting Act to require certain teachers and health care providers to report any suspected child abuse or neglect within the past three years.

Minimum fines, restitution

People who are guilty of criminal or sexual assault would pay to get help for their victims under a bill the House passed on a unanimous vote May 4.

Rep. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester), author of HF1174, asks "Why should we make anybody else pay for counseling, for victim and witness assistance, if we can make the offender pay for it?"

The bill would impose fines on people the courts convict of assault. The fines would range from a \$100 minimum for assault, a \$300 minimum for criminal assault, and a \$500 minimum for sexual assault.

Bishop estimates the fines would bring in an additional \$600,000 which would go to fund local victim assistance programs, including crime victim crisis centers, victim-witness programs, battered women's shelters, and sexual assault programs.

The bill goes next to the Senate.

Credit card disclosure

A bill that would require credit card issuers to spell out financial terms and interest rates when consumers apply for credit cards passed the House of Representatives May 4.

Under HF822 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul), all credit card applications in Minnesota would disclose the financial terms of the credit card plan including any late fees, grace periods, membership fees, and all annual charges. The disclosure requirement does not apply to credit card ads or retail catalogues which do not include a credit card application.

The bill goes now to the Senate.

Health, human service spending

The state's \$2.24 billion health and human service spending bill passed the House Floor May 2 on a 91-37 vote.

The two-year appropriation bill, HF243 (G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham), would target human services programs with almost \$2 billion dollars, corrections programs with about \$196 million, and almost \$70 million for the Department of Health (DOH).

Most floor debate centered on funds the DOH spends for AIDS research and education programs. Some members say those programs should get more of the department's funds.

Rep. Allen Quist (IR-St. Peter) offered an amendment that would require engaged couples to take a mandatory AIDS blood test. Quist says he offered the amendment because he's concerned about the future of his children and their families.

Opponents to the amendment say mandatory AIDS testing would waste DOH resources on a population group not likely to have the virus. They say attention should focus on high risk groups.

The House adopted the Quist amendment on a roll call vote of 85 to 40.

State agency funding

Minnesota lawmakers approved a \$2 billion spending bill May 2 to fund the state's agriculture, transportation, and semi-state agencies for the next two years.

The bill, which is headed for a House and Senate conference committee, would provide \$26 million over the next two years for the Department of Agriculture, \$19 million each for the Department of Commerce and the Minnesota Historical Society, and \$1.7 million for non-health boards such as the Board of Accountancy.

For transportation, the House allocated \$1.7 billion for the biennium. The federal highway aid program provides \$429 million of the state's transportation funds. Other funding comes from highway user taxes (\$259 million) and motor vehicle excise tax (MVET) revenues (\$45 million).

The MVET transfer differs from the governor's proposed budget recommendation which was to keep highway monies in the general fund. The House recommended a 10 percent MVET transfer over the next two years. Each year thereafter, the transfer would increase 10 percent until all MVET revenues go into highway user and transit funds.

Rep. Jim Rice (DFL-Mpls), chair of the division that put the bill together, says the bill is in line with the House budget resolution.

DNR cuts

The State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee cut \$3 million from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in an allnight meeting April 30. Instead of getting additional funds for an unusually expensive fire-fighting season, the DNR will have to reduce its general fund base-level to pay the unexpected cost.

Rep. Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham), chair of the Appropriations Committee, says reductions in the DNR are a necessary part of the Legislature's efforts to reduce the state's total spending by \$225 million.

The commissioner of natural resources would decide which programs and positions to cut in meeting the budget reduction. But the provision would shield certain programs, including enforcement, firefighting, and youth services.

Plans for a light rail transit system in Minneapolis won another victory May 1: By a vote of 96-36, the House passed SF282 (K. Nelson, DFL-Minneapolis). The bill would allow Hennepin County, and any local government or transit board in Minnesota, to develop electric trams, but would reduce from four mills to two the amount counties could levy for light rail.

The state may have found a way to deal with the elk problem in northwestern Minnesota, and compensate farmers for the crop damage elks cause. HF1351 (Tunheim, DFL-Kennedy) would require the DNR to create an elk management plan to keep the animals off agricultural land. The bill would also allow an open hunting season on elk when their population exceeds 20. Cost of a two-person hunting license would be \$200.

"The only reason to vote against this bill is to support organdonor medical services," says Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) about HF1228 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would impose a \$25 fine for not wearing a seatbelt. Half the funds the fine would raise would go to an emergency medical services relief account. Rep. Lee Greenfield (DFL-Mpls) says the measure would save lives, reduce injuries, and improve public health at no cost to the state. Anyone who violates hazardous waste laws knowing that the violation endangers someone else could be convicted of a felony under provisions in HF401 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin), a bill the House passed May 5. The bill exempts household wastes, pesticides, and used oil from the definition of hazardous wastes.

May 11-15, 1987

Under 18-year-olds couldn't sell or serve liquor in restaurants, bars, or liquor stores under a bill that cleared the House May 5. But the measure would allow minors to work in convenience stores or pizza places that sell 3.2 beer, says House author Rep. Joel Jacobs (DFL-Coon Rapids).

Metro parks shouldn't get

maintenance money from the state's general fund, unless county and municipal parks in greater Minnesota also get state support, says Rep. Howard Miller (IR-Redwood Falls). Backers of state money for metro parks say many parks in the Twin Cities serve the same purpose, and get the same use, as state parks in greater Minnesota.

A bill that would require

cremation or burial of aborted or miscarried fetuses passed the House Floor May 7 on a vote of 106-20. HF663 (Steve Wenzel, DFL-Little Falls) would cover only abortions or miscarriages that occur in a hospital, clinic or medical facility.

The Tax Laws Division of the Taxes Committee voted down a proposed cut in the state's 1.75 percent parimutuel tax. Taxes Committee Chair Rep. Gordon Voss told panel members the requested \$4.4 million tax break for the race track would mean tax increases or cuts in state services. Other members said it would be imprudent to give a tax cut to Canterbury Downs in a year when state budgeting is tight.

Only 46 percent of the state's eligible voters went to the polls in the 1986 state and congressional elections, says Rep. Paul Ogren (DFL-Aitkin). Statistics from the secretary of state's office show highest turnout in rural and northern areas, and lowest in metro suburbs. To improve voter turnout, Ogren is offering a bill that would authorize a statewide voter registration computer network, allow residents to register when they get a new drivers license, and provide voter registration forms with income tax forms.

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Do You Know

The Common Loon--the great northern diver--is the oldest bird in North America and one of the oldest birds on earth. One fisherman describes its laugh-like call as "the loneliest voice on earth."

A large, brawny bird, its wingspread is nearly five feet. Its body, about three feet long, weighs about nine pounds--three times the weight of a mallard duck and about three pounds lighter than a bald eagle.

The Loon is an agile water bird, but if it lands on the ground, it's stranded. Its feet are back near its tail creating an impossible balance for walking. So, on land, it moves by pushing its belly along in a sliding motion for only a few feet at a time. From the ground, this heavy bird can't gain enough speed to fly.

With this handicap, migration is dangerous for the Loon. But every year, it flies miles inland from both North American seacoasts in search of calm, isolated waters where it can nest and find fish.

Telephone subsidy

On May 13, House members amended the telephone deregulation bill by adding \$2.5 million to fund a new program.

Plans would call for a statewide charge of up to 11 cents per phone, per month to fund the lifeline phone service for qualified low income senior citizens. The money would match a current federal subsidy to provide service to elderly who need a phone, but can't afford it.

Members who oppose the idea say it's another squeeze on taxpayers.

But Rep. Paul Ogren (DFL-Aitkin), sponsor of the amendment, says the idea is simple and many other states have used it without imposing on taxpayers.

"We're not asking you to featherbed the Minnesota senior citizens," he says. "We're talking about people that are elderly that are on low fixed incomes who really need this--people who have been subject to, in almost every instance, dramatic increases in their telephone rates in the past four or



Home health care

People who provide home health care for a fee may need a license to continue that service under a bill that won approval of the House May 13.

SF51 (House author: Greenfield, DFL-Mpls), which passed on a vote of 107-12, would help prevent abuses from unqualified providers, according to Rep. Lee Greenfield. He says it will ensure quality home health care for those who really need it, which many times means the vulnerable elderly.

The proposal would provide a bill of rights for home care patients, and a process to report patient complaints. The bill would also regulate and license hospice programs that provide home care to terminally-ill patients.



anglers. Because they feed in schools at dusk and dawn, anglers can sometimes catch their limit in one outing. Most Walleyes weigh one-half to three pounds. But one lucky person fishing in Basswood Lake in 1955 pulled out the largest Minnesota Walleye on record-- a 16-pound, 11-ounce prize. Because of the mild winter and few freeze-outs, the Department of Natural Resources predicts an increased Walleve population this fishing season.

To run the program, the bill would appropriate a little over \$500,000 from the state's general fund.

The bill now goes to the governor.

Minimum wage

On a vote of 90 to 38, the House gave final approval May 13 to HF3 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would phase-in a state minimum wage increase over the next three years.

The original House bill, as it came out of committee, would have raised the present \$3.35 minimum wage 90 cents over a two-year period. On the House floor March 23, members cut the increase to 50 cents over two years.

The bill now on its way to the governor is the Senate's version which passed May 12. It proposes a two-tier system that supporters say would give small businesses a break. Adult workers at larger businesses would get a 60-cent increase over the next three years, to equal \$3.95 by Jan. 1, 1990. Adult workers at smaller businesses (those with annual gross sales of less than \$362,500) would get a 45-cent increase over the three-year period, to equal \$3.80. (See graph)

Workers under age 18 would also fall under the two-tier system, but would receive slightly smaller increases over the three-year period.

The bill would delay an increase until Jan. 1, 1989 for employees who receive tips on their jobs.

House sponsor Rep. Randy Kelly says it's likely that the federal government will increase federal minimum wage within the next two years. He says HF3 would provide a phase-in period for Minnesota employers to adjust to the increase. And, says Kelly, it's a step in the right direction for those people at the bottom of the wage scale.

If the governor signs the bill, the first increases will take effect Jan. 1, 1988.

Social worker licensure

A bill to license social workers, and marriage and family therapists passed the House May 12 on a vote of 99 to 28.

HF290 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls) would establish four categories of social worker licensure and provide a grandfather clause to cover those currently working in various social work categories. The bill would not require licensure of social workers in county and state agencies, hospitals, and nursing homes.

Rep. Lee Greenfield says the measure provides public assurance that social workers, or people with titles, have at least a minimum level of competency. He calls it a consumer-protection bill, which social workers have long sought.

The bill would also create a social worker licensing board to collect licensing fees and administer social worker examinations.

Rural Development Act

The House approved the \$20.5 million Rural Development Act May 12. House author Rep. Jerry Schoenfeld (DFL-Waseca) says SF1 would stimulate new industries in Minnesota.

Schoenfeld's economic development bill would create the Greater Minnesota Corporation, a publicly owned venture capital company that would fund research and development, and provide grants and loans to private businesses. The bill also calls for restructuring the Department of Energy and Economic Development.

Farming and mining, once the state's backbone, are now faltering, says Schoenfeld. He says Minnesota, the "brain-power" state, needs to emphasize its exceptional education system and technology in developing new industries and jobs for the future. "Other economic development programs help people find jobs that already exist. The Greater Minnesota Corporation would create new jobs," says Schoenfeld.

Not everyone agrees, however. Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) says it's a waste of time, energy, and money to create completely new economic development programs after cutting established and successful programs earlier in the session. House Minority Leader Rep. Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) says venture capital investments require the kind of expertise state government, swayed by political influences, can't provide.

But the bill passed on a 93-33 vote, with an amendment that would preserve Minnesota's Urban Revitalization Action Program (URAP), providing \$3 million for development in depressed metropolitan neighborhoods.

SF1 now goes to a conference committee.

Credit card charges

Credit card users may see a new service charge on their monthly statements under a bill House members passed May 12.

SF800 (Wynia, DFL-St. Paul) would allow banks to charge credit card users each time they get a cash advance at an automated teller machine (ATM).

Minnesota bankers who issue VISA, Master Card, and other credit cards say cash advances at cash machines cost them money because out-of-state ATM owners charge them a processing fee each time someone uses a machine. They say the charge credit card users should pay is small and wouldn't apply to bank cash cards that directly access checking or savings accounts.

The bill would also allow banks to make additional charges for payments involving overdrafts or automatic payment withdrawal requests, delinquent payments, and overcharged credit limits.

In other action that day, the House gave final approval to HF240, a bill that would ban credit card surcharges.

Minnesota retailers who charge an extra fee to credit card users would be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a \$700 fine under the guidelines of HF240.

The bill, which is on its way to the governor, would not take away retailer's rights to offer cash discounts, and the bill doesn't cover credit cards that originate in other states.

Rep. John Sarna (DFL-Mpls) sponsors the bill.

AIDS reporting

The House approved a bill May 11 that would give health professionals the option to report AIDS carriers to the Department of Health, if the carriers continue to spread the disease through noncompliant sexual behavior.

The bill, HF1076 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls), passed on a vote of 131

to 0. Under the proposed law, the Department of Health could attempt to stop behavior of a disease carrier who puts others at risk for AIDS. The department could provide counseling, treatment, and support services, but could not take action that would impose a jail sentence on the AIDS carrier.

The body voted down an amendment that would have mandated the reporting. Bill author Rep. Lee Greenfield says the amendment would have had a chilling effect on AIDS prevention programs because persons at-risk for AIDS would not take a test if they feared corrective action by the Department of Health.

Unemployment insurance

The House passed a bill May 11 that targets reform of the state's unemployment compensation system. The bill would add six percent to the unemployment compensation taxes employers pay, and reduce benefits the state pays to unemployed workers by five percent.

Author Rep. Phil Riveness (DFL-Bloomington) says the bill would make the state's unemployment compensation system more stable and avoid the need to borrow money to meet unpredicted fluctuations. Opponents say the tax increase would hurt businesses. The House passed the measure on a 68-58 vote.

Ethanol bill

The ethanol bill, HF777, came out of the Taxes Committee May 11 with a recommendation to pass.

The bill no longer requires unleaded gasoline to contain the grain product, ethanol. Instead, it would extend for eight years the state sponsored 20-cents per gallon payment to ethanol producers. It would also set up a half-cent per bushel of corn income tax check-off for producers. The money from the check-off would go into the ethanol development fund. HF777 would also allow the commissioner of agriculture to use fund monies to promote the grainbased alcohol fuel.

Bill author, Rep. Roger Cooper (DFL-Bird Island), says the amendments are a result of negotiations among the petroleum industry, farm groups, and ethanol producers. Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain) sponsored the producer check-off amendment.

Other provisions in the bill would prohibit service stations from posting "no ethanol" signs. If gasoline contains ethanol, the ethanol label will appear on the gas pump, Cooper says.

HF777 goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Speed limit: 65 mph

A bill that would allow Minnesota motorists to drive 65 mph on interstate highways got a favorable vote in the Appropriations Committee May 8, but not without struggling past some road blocks. The committee voted down HF295 (Bishop, IR-Rochester) May 4, reconsidered it May 7, and finally passed the bill May 8 after making some amendments.

Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury) offered a successful amendment that would allow higher speeds only outside the Twin Cities metropolitan area, where traffic is less. And Rep. Henry Kalis (DFL-Walters) gained support for his amendment that would allow the governor to reduce the speed limit to 55 mph in the event of another energy crisis.

Rep. Jim Rice (DFL-Mpls) says it's hypocritical to support a fine for not wearing a seat belt, and then vote in favor of increasing speeds that "impose a death sentence on some as yet undetermined number."

Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) withdrew her amendment that would have repealed present law preventing tickets for speeding less than 10 mph over the limit from appearing on a driver's record. She says she intends to raise the issue again when the bill comes up on the House floor.

Adopted child's death

The House gave final approval May 8 to HF270 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul). The bill would put into law a little-known Department of Human Services rule requiring adoption agencies to let birth parents know when an adopted child dies, if the parents ask for that notification.

HF270 would require adoption agencies to inform birth parents at the time they plan an adoption for their child that, if they wish, the agency will inform them of the child's death. At the same time, the birth parents may designate someone to notify the adoption agency if the parents should die.

The Senate amended the bill to allow birth parents to request notification of a child's terminal illness. House members agreed with the Senators and passed the bill. It now goes to the governor.

Small-scale brewers may get a license to sell their products on their premises under a bill that's on its way to the governor. House sponsor is Rep. Sally Olsen (IR-St. Louis Park). The proposal would permit small-scale brewers to sell liquor in a restaurant or bar that is part of their breweries, but not on the wholesale market. The bill defines small-scale brewers as those who make fewer than 2,000 barrels of malt liquor a year. All rooms are in the State Office Building unless otherwise indicated. Courts could tap state tax refunds to help pay restitution to crime victims under HF1271 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin) a bill that would authorize the Department of Revenue to cooperate with public agencies to collect court-ordered restitution for crime victims. The agencies would work together to identify individuals who are due a tax refund and who owe restitution for crimes they've committed. The House passed the bill May 14.

People who intentionally and illegally transport, treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste may find themselves facing criminal penalties under HF401 (D. Nelson, DFL-Champlin). The bill, which the House approved May 14, would not apply to household hazardous wastes, household appliances, pesticides, or used oil.

State and local laws sometimes interfere with Minnesota's small businesses, says Rep. Wally Sparby (DFL-Thief River Falls). To improve the state's business climate, Sparby says he's proprosing HF803, a bill that would create a legislative commission to study government and business competition. The commission would make recommendations to the Legislature by March 1, 1988.

Toxins people throw into mainstream garbage collection systems create problems for recycling, incineration, and co-composting, says Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin). And some people consider household hazardous wastes a greater health and environment problem than industrial pollution. Rep. Dee Long (DFL-Mpls) is sponsoring a bill that would among other things, establish a household hazardous waste program, public information and education services, and ban the disposal of car batteries and used motor oil in mainstream garbage.

Minnesotans may have to buy

new license plates every 6 years, if a bill Rep. Wayne Simoneau from Fridley is sponsoring becomes law. Simoneau says new plates are easier for police to read, but HF80 would also call for special plates for Vietnam veterans, Pearl Harbor survivors, and former prisoners of war, honoring their service. The bill would allow seven (rather than the present six) characters on personalized license plates and special plates for limousines.

The fine for parking in

handicapped parking spots without a special license plate or certificate would go from \$25 to \$50 fine under a bill Rep. Leo Reding from Austin is sponsoring. The proposal would also require handicapped people to renew their plates every six years. Anyone using the plates illegally would pay a \$500 fine.

Hearing and speaking impaired people who could not otherwise afford a communication relay service may get the phone devices free from the state, under provisions in HF1002 (Clark, DFL-Mpls). The bill would levy a10-cent charge on all phone lines in Minnesota to raise money to buy the devices that enable communication-impaired people to communicate by phone with the nonhearing-impaired.

"We entrust our children to school bus drivers every day," says Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury). He supports Rep. Ken Nelson's (DFL-Mpls) bill that would put new school bus drivers back in the classroom for training in defensive driving, emergency and accident procedures, traffic laws and safety, and human relations. The bill would require drivers to complete three hours of in-service training once a year.

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

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Do You Know

A female Walleye deposits more than 500,000 eggs in one spawning run soon after winter ice melts. But only a tiny fraction of the large number of eggs produce fry (newly hatched Walleye) that survive to adulthood. Since last fall, the Department of Natural Resources stocked Minnesota lakes with about 96 tons of Walleye fingerlings to keep the population up and improve fishing. With more than two million anglers fishing the state's lakes, streams, and rivers each year, fishing is a major part of the state's tourism industry. And Minnesota continues to lead the nation in Walleye production.

The 1987 Walleye season began May 15, and the annual governor's opener this year was at Hall Lake at Fairmont. The governor's opener was the idea of a group of volunteers who, after the Depression, formed the Ten Thousand Lakes Association, a private organization to promote Minnesota's recreation industry. The association held the first governor's open in 1948.

End of session

At midnight May 18, a rap of the speaker's gavel brought the first year of the 75th Legislative Session to a close. Before adjourning, lawmakers set Tuesday, February 9, 1988 as the date for beginning the next regular session.

Floor and conference committee activities continued almost around the clock during the closing three days. During the last 47 hours, House members gave final approval to more than 83 bills and sent them on to the governor.

In the stack of approved legislation were several major spending bills, completing work on an \$11.4 billion state budget. Three budgets approved in the final day's action will fund state agencies, elementary and secondary education, and human services during the next two years.

For more about 1987 legislation, see other highlights in this issue, and the bill listings under "Floor Action."

State departments funding

A conference committee reached agreement in the early hours of May 18, on a bill that would fund Minnesota government agencies. Later in the day, the House passed the bill on a 71-56 vote.

The measure would increase game and fish license fees by a range of \$2 to \$5, and establish a new \$4 license for senior citizens, who now fish without charge. Seniors could, however, get their money back if they request a rebate within 30 days. The Department of Natural Resources expects that charging people over 65 to fish will bring in an additional \$400,000.

The bill would also keep the Department of Human Rights as a separate agency. The original House version would have eliminated the department and moved some of its functions to the attorney general's office. But conferees from the House and

It's a fact!

Minnesota is the first state to have an official state mushroom. In 1984, the Legislature selected the Morel, or sponge mushroom, as one of the state's symbols. Because the Morel is one of the easiest to recognize and has a prized flavor, it is the most popular of wild mushrooms.

Warm spring rains bring out dozens of Morels. They grow wild in old orchards, lightly burned areas such as old grasslands, or near dead elm trees. Mushroom lovers follow the Morel's growth and say mid-May to early June is the best picking time.

In 1984, lawmakers also named milk the official state drink--an action dairy farmers say helps highlight the importance of Minnesota's dairy industry, the fourth largest in the U.S.

Senate agreed to retain the agency as a free-standing department.

In addition, the bill would give five percent pay increases in both 1989 and 1990 to the governor, state executive officers, judges, and legislators. By 1990, the governor's salary would be about \$105,000 per year, legislators would get about \$27,000, and trial judges \$75,000. State workers would get a 2.5 percent increase in both 1988 and 1989.

The governor gets the bill next.

Education aids

House members gave final approval May 18 to the money package that will fund elementary and secondary education over the next two years. The simplified education aids bill is the compromise that came out of a House/Senate conference committee.

The bill wipes out the complicated tier system the state previously used to determine aid levy balance for each of the state's 435 school districts.

House sponsor Rep. Ken Nelson (DFL-Mpls) says the new funding system will provide a more equitable scale. He says the bill no longer designates special equity dollars for struggling school districts. But, Nelson says, the new formula will lend a hand to low-property-wealth districts that are unable to raise money they need to run their schools.

Conferees also revived the arts school as a part of the final bill. Under the bill, arts school officials could continue planning and building up staff numbers for a scheduled opening in September 1989, but will have to come back to the Legislature to ask for money to cover actual school operating costs.

The bill provides \$53 million new state aid over the next two years--\$74 million coming from property taxes. That amount is less than half the tax burden in the original House bill.

Health, human services

Legislators raced to beat the clock May 18 to approve major funding bills to keep state programs alive for the next two years. The state's \$2.2 billion health and human services spending bill was one of them.

The bill allocates almost \$1.9⁺ billion for human services. One of the funding proposals would deliver mental health care through a network of county-based services.

Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul), chair of the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee, says the bill is a major step forward in helping longterm welfare recipients get training for jobs and become self-sufficient and independent. Supporters of the bill say welfare reform and mental health care top the list of landmark changes in the state's human services policies.

House and Senate conferees deleted a House provision that would have required marriage license applicants to test for AIDS. Also, they recommended \$1 million for a nutrition program for women, infants and children (WIC).

The bill now goes to the governor.

Bonding bill

The House passed a \$470 million state construction package 81-46 May 18, with the 60 percent minimum "yea" votes needed to approve a bonding bill.

The measure includes \$4.2 million in land acquisition and planning of the arts high school, although the governor had asked for almost \$31 million to build the school.

Olympic hockey, track and field, soccer, swimming, and ski training facilities would get \$29 million for projects in Blaine, St. Cloud, Biwabik, and other parts of the state.

The bill would also appropriate \$19 million for Reinvest in Minnesota, a program that sets aside marginal farm land for wildlife habitat and outdoor recreation.

In Capitol mall construction, the new judicial complex to house the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals would get \$32.5 million. And \$54.7 million would go for a new state history center on the old Miller Hospital site south of the Capitol.

Other provisions include: \$167.6 million for vocational-technical schools, community colleges, state universities, and the University of Minnesota; \$47 million for waste water treatment grants; \$16.5 for sewer separation in the Twin Cities; \$9 million in bridge construction around the state; \$8 million for school merger incentive grants; \$6 million for a public access on Lake Minnetonka; and \$4 million to the Duluth Zoo.

Rep. Glen Anderson (DFL-Bellingham), chair of the Appropriations Committee, says the bonding bill authorizes construction projects, but it's the Department of Finance that decides when to sell bonds to fund projects. Depending on interest rates, the economy, readiness of building plans, and other factors, projects in the bonding bill are likely to begin at different times over the next few years, Anderson says.

Tax bill

A tax bill that calls for an estimated \$691 million in new taxes over the next two years passed the House and Senate May 18. The House approved HF529 (Voss, DFL-Blaine) 73 to 61. In the Senate, the vote was 36 to 30.

House and Senate conferees hammered out the bill over more than a week of hearings. It represents a compromise between an initial \$490 million House tax bill and an almost \$732 million tax increase the Senate projected.

The bill adopts the governor's tworate income tax structure (see table). It also includes a built-in trigger tax to raise individual and corporate income taxes if current revenues won't maintain the state's \$450 million budget reserve. The proposal extends the state's six percent sales tax to several new items and services (see list), and adopts a new alternative minimum tax on corporations.

The bill would reduce property tax refunds about 33 percent for 1987 and increase property taxes an average of five percent statewide. A miscellaneous tax would add another 15 cents to the tax on a pack of cigarettes.

The bill makes historic changes to the state's tax system, while meeting Minnesota's budget needs, according to House Majority Leader Bob Vanasek (DFL-New Prague). "I believe it will go down as one of the most far-reaching, comprehensive tax reform packages this Legislature has ever enacted," he says.

Rural Development Act

A \$39 million economic development proposal is on its way to the governor after the House voted May 18 to approve the bill. Twentyfive million dollars would come from the state's general fund; the remaining \$14 million would transfer from already existing state funds.

The Rural Development Act, as it came out of conference committee, would create the Greater Minnesota Corporation, and would provide \$12.5 million to the publicly owned venture capital company to fund agricultural research and development, and provide grants and loans to private businesses.

SF1 (House author: Schoenfeld, DFL-Waseca) would also provide:
\$9 million to develop depressed neighborhoods in Minneapolis and St. Paul;

• \$4 million to the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Board to develop jobs and encourage economic diversification on the Iron Range;

• \$3.5 million to an agricultural product utilization research center to find new uses and markets for the state's farm products;

\$3 million to the Department of Natural Resources for forestry programs and minerals research;
\$1.5 million to the Higher Education Coordinating Board to establish education and training programs for dislocated rural workers.

Drug testing

With no dissenting votes, the House passed, May 18, a bill that would regulate and restrict drug testing in the workplace. Having passed both the House and Senate, the bill is on its way to the governor.

Rep. Sandy Pappas's (DFL-St. Paul) original bill would have prohibited random drug testing, and allowed testing only when individual or public safety is at risk, and only when an employer has reason to suspect drug use.

But a conference committee balanced HF42 with SF91 (Chmielewski, DFL-Sturgeon Lake) to form a bill Pappas says has the support of both business and labor. She says the compromise would allow employers to test job applicants, and random test employees who are in safety-sensitive jobs. Employers could also test workers they believe are using drugs, have been in possession of drugs on the job, or have been involved in work-related accidents. Current law doesn't place any restrictions or controls on private employers who do drug testing.

The bill also limits the kinds of tests employers may administer, sets standards for laboratories, and provides for counseling and rehabilitation.

Parental leave

New mothers and fathers who work for medium and large businesses in Minnesota could soon have up to six weeks to spend at home with their child.

A House and Senate conference committee ironed out the differences between two parental leave bills May 16, just hours before the House approved the compromise measure 112 to 14.

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HF234 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls) would require firms that employ more than 21 employees to offer a parent six weeks of unpaid leave. The measure limits the elective new parent-leave program to employees that have worked for the company at least 20 hours a week for one year or more.

The original House bill would have allowed up to 14 weeks' leave for both parents and permitted parents to use up to 10 days of sick leave yearly to care for an ill child.

Sports and drinking

People who operate snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles while under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance would be guilty of a misdemeanor, and could not use the vehicle for one year under a bill the House passed in the final hours of the 1987 legislative session.

HF1015 (Rest, DFL-New Hope) would also require anyone whom law enforcement officials believe to be under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance while operating a motorboat, snowmobile, or allterrain vehicle to take a blood, breath, or urine test. Testing is to determine whether alcohol or a controlled substance is present. If the person refuses to take a test, he or she would be subject to a fine up to \$500 and would have to give up boating or vehicle-use privileges for one year.

Rental cars, insurance

Minnesota auto owners would never need to buy extra collision insurance when they rent cars under a bill lawmakers approved May 18.

House and Senate conferees added a new provision to HF392 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) that would require all insurance companies that operate in the state or insure Minnesotans to cover the full collision costs for rental cars. The coverage would apply to policies insurers sell in the state and to out-of-state residents who rent cars in Minnesota.

Rep. Wes Skoglund says many policies currently don't cover rental vehicles or may only insure them up to the value of the renter's personal vehicle. If the bill becomes law, all policies issued or renewed after Aug. 1, 1987 will include the clause.

The provision arose as a protective move to safeguard all Minnesotans, according to Skoglund. He says this measure will help clear up the mystery for renters who often buy the daily coverage they already have through their own policies.

Unemployment compensation

The House passed a new unemployment compensation bill May 14. The governor and Department of Labor and Industry offered the proposal for legislative consideration less than 24 hours before the House vote.

House sponsor Rep. Phil Riveness (DFL-Bloomington) says the bill would ensure solvency in unemployment compensation. It would cut benefits to laid-off workers four percent over the next five years, and maintain employer taxes at the level of present law. But the bill would shift the burden for paying those taxes to companies that have a history of layoffs, says Riveness.

The bill would also set up a "solvency surcharge" to impose an additional 10 percent tax when the fund drops below a certain level, and five percent more if the fund goes lower.

Riveness says more low-income part-time workers are eligible for unemployment compensation under the new provision, which is on its way to the governor.

Farm legislation

Farmers who qualify may pay only half the interest on their spring operating loans again this year. The interest buydown bill, HF1 (K. Olson, DFL-Sherburn) was one of the first bills the governor signed into law. It provides \$14 million to extend the buydown program for one year and another \$14 million to pay off the program's present deficit.

To qualify for the interest subsidy, farmers must have a debt-to-asset ratio of more than 50 percent, have a reasonably good long-term financial outlook, and take part in an approved adult farm management course at the request of a lender.

HF1 also provides \$1.5 million in 1987 and 1988 for a state lender/ Farmers Home Administration interest subsidy program that Minnesota farmers may use to get low-interest loans.

Other farm legislation to clear this session:

• gives local farmers facing foreclosure up to 90 days to meet with lenders to settle farm debts under the mediation program (Lawmakers extended the program for another two years in addition to making a few operational changes. One such change allows private professional mediators to enter the process, if all the involved parties agree and the debtor and creditor are willing to pay for such services.); · makes changes to the powers and duties of the Rural Finance Authority (The authority will now run the farm real estate debt restructuring program, the homestead redemption program, and the beginning farmer program, a new program that aims to help beginning or re-entry farmers get lowinterest loans to buy farm land.); • sets a three-year execution limit on deficiency judgments on personal property people use in agriculture and makes changes to the right for first refusal amendments; and • provides funding for pseudorabies control, the agricultural data collection task force, the interstate grain compact, AVTIs that offer farm management programs, and several agricultural research projects.

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Minnesotans will be able to drive 65 miles per hour (mph) on stretches of rural interstates, beginning June 17. On May 21, the governor signed an executive order authorizing the higher speed on about 700 miles of freeways in Minnesota. The so-called 10-mile grace law, which prohibits convictions for speeds between 55 mph and 65 mph from going on a driver's record, doesn't apply to convictions for speeds over the new 65 mph limit.

Is it a fact or a fish story? At least one person's called and others have stopped by to mention that Minnesota anglers have landed Walleyes larger than the one on record--a 16-pound, 11-ounce prize that came out of Basswood Lake in 1955. (See last week's *It's a Fact!*)

"Parking in handicapped parking zones when you're not handicapped is a serious offense," says Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin). Reading's House author of a bill that would increase fines for illegally parking in a handicap spot from between \$25 to \$100 to between \$100 and \$200. The bill would also fine a person obstructing a handicap parking space up to \$500; change the process for issuing temporary certificates to make sure they go to only disabled drivers; grant life-time license plates to handicapped drivers; and allow people with handicap certificates or license plates to park free in metered parking spaces. The bill's on its way to the governor. With his signature, it goes into effect Aug. 1, 1988.

A bill that would authorize an elk hunting season when the elk population exceeds 20 in northwestern Minnesota has gone to the governor. The bill would also authorize compensation to farmers for crop damage elk cause.

A proposal to change the order of final argument in criminal trials received final approval in the House May 15. HF137 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) would allow the prosecution to first present a final argument to the jury, with the defense presentation following. The prosecution could then reply directly to any statement the defense makes during final argument which the court determines to be misstatement of law or fact, or inflammatory or prejudicial.

If Minnesota becomes a designated host state for a lowlevel radioactive waste (LLRW) facility, there'll be a process in place to choose a site under abill the House passed

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May 16. SF1202 (Kahn, DFL-Mpls) would establish an 11-member LLRW board if and when the governor issues an executive order for thefacility. The bill would require the board to maintain health, safety, and environmental considerations above all other siting criteria and attempt to select an area within the state that's volunteered to host the site. The Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission faces an end-of-May deadline to choose a host site.

The Pipeline Safety Act is on it's way to the governor after hearings during the '87 session in six House committees and six Senate committees. SF90 (House author: Knuth, DFL-New Brighton) addresses safety issues that arose after the gas pipeline explosion in Mounds View last summer. The bill would set up an Office of Pipeline Safety to regulate pipelines in the state, promote public use of the 9-1-1 emergency telephone system to notify emergency responders of an emergency release, and provide training to local government emergency response personnel. It would also require all pipeline operators in Minnesota to file a detailed pipeline map with the commissioner of public safety before pumping a hazardous liquid or gas into the pipeline.

The Twin Cities is one of the few metropolitan areas in the country with a good supply of ground water and the state needs to treat it like a natural resource and protect it from pollution says Rep. Darby Nelson (DFL-Champlin). Nelson is co-author of SF353, a bill to allow metropolitan counties to develop ground water management plans for local governments to use with existing water controls for prevention of ground water pollution. The Legislature approved SF353 May 15 and sent it to the governor.

Legislators put some teeth into present law and closed loopholes with amendments to the state's child passenger protection law. The new law would make all motor vehicle drivers, not just parents or legal guardians, responsible for buckling children under four into child restraint seats. If drivers fail to fasten a child in a seat, law officers could tag them with \$25 fine.

The so-called ethanol bill, HF777 (Cooper, DFL-Bird Island), no longer requires unleaded gasoline in Minnesota to contain the grain product, ethanol. Instead, it appropriates \$200,000 to the Department of Agriculture over the next two years to promote the grain-based alcohol fuel. The bill, which the Legislature passed May 18, allows the state to continue (for eight years) to pay ethanol producers 20 cents for every gallon of ethanol they produce. And it allows service stations to post "no ethanol" signs. People who provide home health care for a fee will need a license to continue that service under SF51 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls), a bill the House passed 107-12 May 13. An amendment to the bill would also require licensure of hospice programs in the state. The Senate passed the measure May 14 54-0. It has now gone to the governor.

Social workers and marriage and family workers will also need licensure under a bill that passed the House May 12 on a vote of 99-28. HF290 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls) would establish four categories of social worker licenses and provide a grandfather clause to cover those currently working in various social work classifications. The bill won't require social workers in county and state agencies, hospital and nursing homes to become licensed. The Senate passed the measure May 16, 37-23, and sent it to the governor.

Minnesotans may see an extra ten cents on their phone bills starting July 1, 1987. The Senate and House passed SF1029 May 16 (House author: Clark, DFL-Mpls), a bill which would require an up to ten cent surcharge on all phone lines to help pay for special phone equipment for hearing impaired and blind individuals. The House voted 89-25; the Senate, 45-1. Northwestern Bell will coordinate the program with other local phone companies to provide the expensive specialized phone equipment to people who couldn't otherwise afford it.

A bill to give a tax break to the state's horseracing industry didn't make it past the session deadline May18. The bill, which passed the Senate twice, would have lowered pari-mutuel taxes by almost \$5 million. The House voted down the measure in its Tax Laws Division of Taxes May 6. The Senate called a conference committee on the bill, but House and Senate conferees couldn't reach agreement before the midnight deadline.

Day care centers, clinics, and hospitals will be smoke free when HF1283 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) becomes law. The bill prohibits smoking in the centers, clinics, and hospitals and prohibits free distribution of cigarettes and smokeless tobacco--except for single serving samples tobacco stores distribute. The new law would allow a hospital patient to smoke if a doctor gives written permission. The bill passed in the House, 99-30, and in the Senate on a vote of 35-25 May 18 and has gone to the governor.

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Do You Know

Minnesota produces more than 80 percent of the world's natural and domesticated wild rice. The only cereal grain native to Minnesota and the U.S., wild rice (zizania aquatica), is not really rice. It's actually a hardy aquatic grass, similar to oats.

American Indians first identified and conserved the food qualities of wild rice. In fact, the Chippewa word for rice, "Mahnomen" still names northern Minnesota cities, lakes, and rivers. The grain was an important natural resource to Native Americans who even fought wars for prime wild rice fields.

The Department of Natural Resources directs the harvest of wild rice that grows in public waters. In fact, state law still requires the traditional Indian flail method for harvesting natural stands of rice. Flailing involves two people in a small boat or cance--one paddles or poles while the other ricer uses two sticks to bend the rice stalks over the boat and gently taps the ripe grain off the stalk.

Minnesotans adopted wild rice as the state grain in 1977 as a way to promote Minnesota.
