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


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It's a fact!

An amendment to Minnesota's Constitution begins in the State Legislature. Both the Minnesota House of Representatives and the Senate must approve the wording of the proposed amendment. After approval, the amendment will appear on the ballot at the next general election. If a majority of all people voting in that election vote for the amendment, it becomes part of Minnesota's Constitution. (See Do You Know? on page 3.)

At the Nov. 8, 1988 general election, voters considered three amendments to Minnesota's Constitution. They approved amendments that establish an environment and natural resources trust fund, permit the use of sixmember juries in certain cases, and permit the Legislature to authorize a state-operated lottery.



The Session Weekly.

On Tuesday, Jan. 3, the Minnesota House of Representatives and the Minnesota Senate officially open the 1989-90 Legislative Session. And this, the first of 22 issues of the *Session Weekly*, will give you a look at what's ahead for 1989 and bring you up to date on what has happened during the 1988 interim.

You'll find a statistical profile of 1989 House membership; a schedule of events for the opening week of the session, a list of committees and their meeting times, and a feature article on Jean Steiner, legislative public information officer for the Minnesota House of Representatives Public Information Office. Steiner retires in January after 15 years of public service.

In review, you'll find photo coverage of the 15 newly elected representatives at an after-election orientation program, a photo story on the House's awardwinning State Fair information exhibit last summer, and a summary of the activities of the legislative commissions during the interim (May through December).

For those of you who are new readers, the *Session Weekly* is part of the Minnesota House of Representatives' public information service. Each week during the session it includes highlights and notes on House committee and floor action, a list of committee and floor action on bills, bill introductions, a committee schedule for the upcoming week, legislative information, and educational material.

Highlights of committee and floor action give you a sampling of what happened from Thursday (2:30 p.m.) to

Highlights

Thursday (2:30 p.m.) each week.

As legislative activity increases, the listing of committee and floor action on bills will give concise information so that you can follow particular bills.

Committees can only recommend action on bills, so coverage of committee action will tell you if a committee recommended a bill to pass, to pass as amended, not pass, or rereferred it to another committee for further consideration.

Coverage of floor action will tell you what happens to a bill after it leaves a committee and appears on a calendar for action by the full House.

Bill introductions give you House File numbers, authors, committee assignments, and brief descriptions of bill contents.

The committee schedule gives you information you need to attend committee meetings, all of which are open to the public.

Throughout the session, feature items on different aspects of the Legislature and frequent lists of information on House members help those who are interested become part of the government process.

Jean Steiner House public information officer retires

Jean Steiner has decided to call it quits after 15 years as public information officer for the Minnesota House of Representatives.

Under Steiner's direction, the Information Office became a fixture in the Minnesota House, and nationally recognized for its public information program. With the goal of making state government more accessible to all publics, she created an information program that features educational materials about state government and the legislative process (such as the Government is for Everyone information series, and How a Bill Becomes a Law in Minnesota brochure), as well as specific information about who's who (The Official Directory of the Minnesota Legislature) and what's happening in the Minnesota Legislature (Session Weekly newsletter). She managed all office print and audio-visual productions, including slide, video, and cable television. And she introduced desktop publishing to the office as part of the ongoing up-dating of functions to modern technology.

While serving as public information officer, Steiner conducted communications training and development seminars for state and national audiences; served as a consultant in the Metropolitan State University (MSU) Communications Department; taught college level public relations courses at MSU and the College of St. Thomas; and completed undergraduate and graduate work in communications. She also received accreditation from the Public Relations Society of America.

Steiner took on the job in December 1973, following two others who

had briefly filled the position when the House first authorized the office in 1969. The first director, a former news service reporter, stayed only a few weeks. The second, a former military public information officer, came on board for one session in 1972.

Steiner left her public relations/ education position with the Minnesota Medical Association to come to the House. Her previous experience included eleven years in business, five-and-a-half years in elementary school education, three years as training coordinator for the TIES computer project (the first educational on-line system in the country), and two years with the Medical Association. She was also a published freelance writer and had operated, for eight years, a group daycare home for children from troubled homes while her own three children were growing up.

Public response to the Information Office program is constant and positive. Steiner has received the International Association of Business Communicators' (IABC) Award of Excellence/External Publications for Session magazine, as well as various IABC awards for magazine organization and editorial content. IABC also recognized the Information Office State Fair exhibit with a Statewide Special Event Award, while the Minnesota State Fair has given the display an Outstanding Exhibit Award three times.

Steiner has also received professional recognition from groups including Women in Communications, Inc. ("Headliner" award), the St. Paul Business and Professional Women ("Woman of the Year" award), YWCA Minneapolis and St. Paul (Leadership awards), the Minnesota Women's Consortium (Excellence in Management award), WCCO Radio ("Good Neighbor" award), and the Minnesota Association of Government Communicators (Fellow award). In addition, she holds a Public Relations Student Society of America Mentor Award for her help to young people and others entering the work force.

Steiner plans to take a long, welldeserved break immediately following her retirement from the House on Jan. 16. After some travel and relaxation, she says she'll continue to work on her doctorate, continue her public relations educational consulting and training work, and perhaps return to the college classroom as an instructor in the summer quarter.

And she plans to write.

Do you know

In 1897, voters adopted the "extraordinary majority requirement," an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution making the process of amending the constitution more difficult. "Extraordinary majority" means that a majority of everyone voting in an election, not just a majority of those voting on an amendment, must vote for the constitutional change before it can happen. During the 130 years of Minnesota's statehood, the Legislature has sent proposed constitutional amendments to the voters 201 times. (As some proposals appeared more than once, voters have actually considered 167 different questions.) Minnesotans have voted in favor of adopting over one-half, or 110 amendments.

Before adopting the "extraordinary majority requirement," voters adopted 73 percent of all proposed amendments. Since then, the approval rate has fallen to 45 percent.





Profile '89 Minnesota House of Representatives






Fifteen newly elected House members will take office on Jan. 3, 1989. Along with the 119 returning members, they'll make decisions in the next six months that'll effect all Minnesotans.

The Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party retained their majority with 81 members; Independent-Republicans number 53. The average age among them is 47; oldest member is 77; youngest 24.


Farming continues as the top-ranking occupation for House members, with 26 people listing it as their primary occupation. Educators and full-time legislators come in at a tie, listing 20 members in each category. Businesspeople number 19; lawyers 16; homemakers 7; trades/labor 6; consultants and realtors tie at 5 each; sales 3; and auctioneers 2. Remaining occupations include police and firefighters, a loan officer, a financial planner, and a golf pro.

Of the 26 women and 108 men in the 1989 House, 31 hold graduate degrees; 27 have done some graduate work; 31 hold undergraduate college degrees; and 32 have done some college/vo-tech work.

The House's senior member will begin his 17th term in 1989. One member begins his 10th term. The largest group of returnees are the 28 second-term members, followed by 21 fourth-term members.




Party Representation

Legislative Commissions

Legislators, in addition to their other duties as elected officials, work on commissions which study and report on areas of interest to both House and Senate.

The majority of members on legislative commissions must be legislators. The speaker of the House appoints House members. In the Senate, a subcommittee of the Senate Rules and Administration Committee selects senators to serve. Appointments are for two years.

Legislative commissions are ongoing, long term, and more permanent than study groups, task forces, and joint legislative committees. Laws regarding purposes and how they are carried out differ for each commission.

Here are in-brief summaries of interim activities for eight legislative commissions.

Legislative Commission on the Economic Status of Women

August: heard testimony on pay equity, job evaluations, and job contracting with a focus on child care, custodial, clerical, and food service workers, and bus drivers.

September: heard University of Minnesota's compensation manager speak on the implementation of pay equity at the University's Child Care Center.

December: heard results of a study of women and farm issues; adopted 1989 legislative proposals.

Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources

May: held the Issues Seminar; established priorities and requested proposals. July - September: reviewed 230 proposals totaling over \$64 million; moved to recommend 77 programs totaling \$17.2 million to the 1989 Legislature.

November: changed commission's name to Minnesota Future Resources Commission after voters approved the Environmental Trust Fund amendment; assumed additional responsibilities.

Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement

May: discussed actuarial services contract; adopted new two-year contract with the Wyatt Company; authorized the chair to execute the actuarial services contract on the commission's behalf. July: received updated information on the commission's pension benefit adequacy study; presented information on future retirement benefits and retirement plans, citing how the unusual birth pattern in the United States in this century has implications on Social Security funding, as well as for public and private pensions; approved the Public **Employees Retirement Association** (PERA) mortality assumption. August: adopted recommended changes to the Standards for Actuarial Work: presented one of four parts of information pertaining to the pension adequacy study.

Legislative Commission on Planning and Fiscal Policy

August: discussed quarterly revenue collection report, Administration's budget guidelines for the 1990-91 budget, new budget information system; new national accounting standards' potential impact on state budget practices. October: presented 1988 Development Report Card for the States; heard Finance Department reports on the Capital Budget Process and "Must Do" Capital Projects for 1989 Session.

November: heard reports: Legislative Participation in Computerized Biennial Budget System; Alternative Ways to Stabilize State Budget; Capital Budgeting/NCSL Recommendations; Trends in Earmarking of State Funds.

Legislative Commission to Review Administrative Rules

June: Full commission heard initial and final staff reports on issues relating to telephone rates for extended area service; adopted recommendation advising the Public Utilities Commission to consider adopting the proposed EAS rule before

getting further legislative direction. August: Subcommittee on Rulemaking Exemptions heard staff background report describing the subcommittee's history, purpose, and concerns; heard testimony from the World Trade Center, Department of Natural Resources, and Amateur Sports Commission. September: Subcommittee on Rulemaking Exemptions heard testimony from the Department of Corrections, Pollution Control Agency (PCA), Minnesota State High School League, and Department of Transportation. Full commission heard preliminary assessments on Department of Human Services Instructional Bulletin on applicant background checks, and on Board of Aging Policy Manual affecting area agencies on aging.

October: Subcommittee on Rulemaking Exemptions discussed concerns about the high number of exemptions, difficulty in locating the exemptions throughout statutes, the lack of an exempt rules publication requirement, so the public can know what the rules are, and occasional and inconsistent legislative committee control over granting exemptions in both houses; explained the 1988 exemptions. November: Subcommittee on Rulemaking Exemptions heard from departments of Corrections and Human Services and took testimony from others concerned about the Administrative Procedures Act and exemptions.

Legislative Commission on Waste Management

July: heard Waste Management Board's (WMB) "Revised Draft of the Stabilization and Containment Report on Facility Development"; heard and discussed the Metropolitan Council report on the Landfill Abatement Fund; reviewed and discussed Pollution Control Agency's (PCA) Contingency Action Fund report on Fiscal Year 1989 work plan and budget; heard testimony on PCA's risk assessment and risk management process. August: Executive Committee heard three proposals on disposal fee regulation and selected D.P.R.A. Inc. and Briggs and Morgan, P.A.; selected commission

director as consultant to study disposal fee structures and develop recommendations to regulate disposal fees in Minnesota. Full commission discussed how to avoid losing potential host counties for the hazardous waste stabilization and containment site; discussed municipal tort claims liability and future Superfund budgetary considerations; heard PCA presentation on the Municipal Wastewater Treatment Program and discussed Municipal Needs List; heard an overview on recycling problems in the Capitol Complex; discussed recent court actions on the 1988 amendment removing the 25cent cap on county fees metro landfills charge.

September: reviewed WMB management structure and personnel changes as they relate to the board's mission and the efforts of the board and the Legislative **Commission on Waste Management** during the 1989 Legislative Session. November: heard PCA's annual reports on the Metropolitan Landfill Contingency Action Fund and the Superfund; heard PCA Office of Waste Management Grants and Assistance present the WMB Biennial Report; heard PCA and Environmental Quality Board briefing on the Governor's Executive Order reorganizing WMB; heard the Metropolitan Council 1988 Metropolitan Landfill Abatement Progress Report; heard Office of Waste Tire Management biennial report on Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Industrial Grant and Loan Evaluation: heard State Solid Waste Management Policy Report. December: heard PCA preliminary report on Waste Pesticide Collection; heard Governor's Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment overview and recommendations; heard State Solid Waste Management Policy Report; heard Metropolitan Council recommendations for the 1989 Legislature.

Legislative Coordinating Commission

May-December: The commission's Reapportionment Oversight Subcommittee discussed planning for redistricting after the next census, computer systems, timeline for work, and budget matters; provided staff support to the Regent Candidate Advisory Council in developing criteria for selection of regents and a description of regents' responsibilities; assisted the Transportation Study Board to prepare to hire a director; provided staff support to the Injury Compensation Study Commission.

Mississippi River Parkway Commission

Mav-December: co-sponsored and participated in Mississippi River Fair in Osaka, Japan to promote Minnesota tourism and commerce; represented Minnesota in the 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Great River Road by waterskiing in downtown St. Louis, Missouri; co-produced Mississippi River segment, state, and national Great River Road maps with Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) and Great River Road Association; worked with Minnesota congressional delegation on drafting the federal Mississippi River National Heritage Corridor Act; secured Minnesota's financial commitment and participation in an international Mississippi River Marketing program of the 10 states; discussed continued By-Ways development at the Scenic By-Ways Conference in Washington, D.C.; held joint meetings with the Upper Mississippi River Basin Association to discuss mutual interest and programs; developed plans with MnDOT to continue developing Great River Road projects; distributed Great River Road literature and maps at the 1988 Minnesota State Fair; initiated program with Council on Asian Pacific Minnesotans for Japanese-Minnesota Home-Stay program; worked with MnDOT and local communities on completion of Great River Road signing projects; developed status reports with MnDOT on highway development and maintenance needs for the Great River Road.

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






Left and below: Fairgoers test their knowledge of Minnesota government and history on the "State Government I.Q. Quiz."

The Minnesota House of Representatives had a Grand Prize year at the 1988 State Fair. Education Building officials presented an outstanding exhibit award to the information display.

New this year, the computerized "Legislative Notebook" encouraged fairgoers to check out legislators' biographies, committee assignments and photos, and demographics for the entire House. A color photo display depicted the art and architecture of the House Chamber in the State Capitol. Returning favorites included the computerized Government I.Q. Quiz and, for the children, the State Symbols Game. And more than 4,700 people voted in the Unofficial State Fair Opinion Poll.

For the fifteenth year, House members and staff were on hand all 12 days of the fair to visit with fairgoers and answer questions.





It's a fact!

The name, Charles H. Graves, may not be one you know. But 100 years ago it was prominent in Minnesota, when Graves served as speaker of the House. Graves was a merchant, who moved from Springfield, Mass. to Duluth in 1877. He served as mayor of Duluth and as a state senator before becoming speaker in 1889.

The speaker's post, which is that of presiding officer of the House, wasn't the first officer position that Graves held. In the 40th New York Volunteers, a military organization, Graves rose from the rank of private to lieutenant, and then, captain. He also held offices as assistant adjutant general, brevet lieutenant colonel, and captain in the United States Volunteer and Regular Army.

Highlights

76th Legislative Session

Speaker Robert E. Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) rapped the gavel Jan. 3 to begin the 76th Legislative Session of the Minnesota House of Representatives.

During the largely ceremonial opening session, Secretary of State Joan Growe presided as Minnesota Supreme Court Chief Justice Douglas Amdahl administered the oath of office to the members present as their families and friends watched from the floor and the galleries.

Representatives voted to change the time when the House meets, from 2 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. The change allows for a

lunch break between scheduled committee meetings.

Vanasek, in his second term as speaker, pledged to hear and work with all members, make use of all members' talents, provide policy direction and "enhance public respect for the legislative process."

Fifteen new members took the oath of office during the opening session.

Besides approving changes in committees' scopes, the membership also nominated and elected House administrative officers.

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

1989 House leaders

Speaker of the House

Rep. Robert E. Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) has served in the Legislature since 1972.

Vanasek graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1967 with a B.A. in political science. His interest in politics led to his legislative career.

Vanasek's colleagues elected him assistant majority leader in 1978, 1980, and 1982. In 1985, he received a Bush Fellowship to attend the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University where he earned an M.A. in Public Administration. He became majority leader in 1986 and speaker of the House for the 1987 Special Session. The Minnesota VFW Ladies' Auxiliary and *Politics in Minnesota* magazine named him "Legislator of the Year" in 1987.

Vanasek's not only a seasoned legislator, he's also active in his community. In 1979 and 1984, the U.S. Jaycees named him "Outstanding Young American." Many other organizations have given Vanasek service awards, including the Minneapolis/St. Paul Archdiocese.

Majority Leader

Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) is a seven-term veteran of the House. She chairs the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee and has served on several other committees.

Wynia earned a B.A. in government from the University of Texas and an M.A. in political science from the University of Wisconsin. As an instructor in political science, she shares her knowledge of government with students at North Hennepin Community College in Brooklyn Park. In 1986, Hamline University appointed her adjunct professor of public affairs. She's also on the executive committee for the Minnesota Center for Women in Government at Hamline.

The St. Paul Business and Professional Women's Organization named her "Legislator of the Year" in 1982. In addition, Wynia has received several other public service awards during her years of service in the House.

Minority Leader

When he's not working at the state Legislature, Rep. Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) runs a potato growing and packaging business.

Schreiber, a Minnesota native, studied business at St. Cloud State University. After serving as a member of the Brooklyn Park City Council for five years, Schreiber moved on to the Legislature. First elected to the House in 1972, he chaired the Taxes Committee when Independent-Republicans controlled the House in 1985.

Schreiber has received many honors for his dedication to the Legislature and his community, including the Excellence in County Government Award from the Association of Minnesota Counties.

And Hennepin County named Schreiber, his wife Carol, and children Rob and Wendy, Farm Family of the Year in 1980.

Youth in government 📟

The YMCA Youth in Government program sets the stage for students to learn and experience how real government works. High school students from around the state filled the Capitol Jan. 5, as they took on the roles of legislators, judges, lobbyists and reporters.

They began preparing for their days (Jan. 5-8) at the Capitol last September. Eight hundred-fifty students, from grades eight to twelve, are participating in this year's program. Students join one of the House, Senate, Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, Administrative Cabinet or the Executive Branch model groups. They spend weeks studying the functions of each branch of government. It all comes together during the weekend at the Capitol, the final performance of their roles.

Here, young legislators present their bills to peers who, in turn, point out flaws and make recommendations. Youthful judges hear prosecution and defense lawyers in court cases. New to the program, eighth grade students work as pages and decide what they would like to do next year. Ambitious lobbyists converse with legislators. The model press corps plays their newscast tape every day on closed circuit television.

The students close their session Sunday, and then participate in a major cleanup of the Capitol.

Nonsmoking policy

Smoke-filled rooms and corridors will be a vision of the past for the House of Representatives beginning in 1989.

At a Jan. 4 meeting, the House Rules and Legislative Administration Committee adopted a resolution designating nearly all of the State Office Building as off-limits for smokers. Private offices and the third floor lounge are the only exceptions to the nonsmoking rule.

The resolution defines smoking to include anyone who carries a lighted cigarette, cigar, or pipe, or uses any other smoking materials, such as smokeless cigarettes.

Also included in the resolution, House employees who participate in a stop-smoking program and who demonstrate that they haven't smoked for at least a year can receive partial reimbursement for the program's cost.

The nonsmoking provisions apply only to portions of the State Office Building that fall under House jurisdiction.

State of the State

Gov. Rudy Perpich delivered his seventh State of the State address in the House of Representatives Chamber at the State Capitol Jan. 4. Speaking to a joint session of the Legislature, the governor reported on a "much stronger" state with an unemployment rate of 4.5 percent, an increase of 450,000 jobs in six years, sound fiscal management and a \$550 million dollar rainy-day fund.

Perpich stressed job creation, the central goal of his administration, in the areas of education, research and development, the environment, and tax reform and fiscal management.

Perpich proposed state-wide testing for teachers in core curriculum areas of math, English, science and social studies at the sixth and tenth grades to build a stronger education system. "Choice, supported by testing," he said, "will create a marketplace for education that is accountable and responsive to the individual needs of our students."

In research and development, Perpich wants the state to compete in the global economy with advances in biotechnology, supercomputers, natural resources, and agriculture. To balance a robust economy, Perpich asked the Legislature to make nature conservancy a priority in the 1989 Session, noting the need for water protection and interstate environmental cooperation.

The governor called for budget restraints to protect Minnesotans against possible downturns in the economy. He also appealed to legislators to reform the tax system for a better business climate and to preserve and enhance jobs already created.

Committee Coverage

The Minnesota Legislature creates, abolishes, and changes laws to meet the needs of Minnesotans. Legislators introduce hundreds of bills each session with only a small portion passing both bodies of the Legislature to land on the governor's desk for a signature. The House of Representatives and the Senate consider bills separately but must agree on a bill before it becomes law.

The Legislature relies on committees, divisions, and subcommittees to carefully study and review all bills. In the House, the speaker names the committees and their topics, appoints members to the committees and selects chairs to lead them. Once the committee assignments are made and the House convenes for its session, the speaker assigns bills to the appropriate committee.

Here's a list briefly describing the function of each 1989 committee and division:

Agriculture:

Sets out farm policies and programs to assist farmers, promote interstate and international trade, marketing commodities, and soil conservation.

Appropriations:

Recommends objectives and goals in appropriating state money; reviews the governor's budget proposals; recommends funding levels for all state agencies and programs the state finances; provides estimates of appropriations to the Ways and Means Committee; reviews every bill that needs an appropriation even if the bill had its first hearing in another committee. For example, a proposal having to do with agriculture that involves spending money, would go first to the Agriculture Committee or one of its divisions.

Agriculture, Transportation

& Semi-State Division: Reviews and recommends funding for agricultural programs, transportation projects, the departments of Agriculture and Transportation, all public safety activities, the Minnesota Historical Society, and boards and organizations the state partially funds.

Education Division: Handles legislative funding for the state's four higher education systems and the Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Health & Human Services Division: Reviews governor's budget; recommends funding for state health and human service programs; reviews funding needs for legislation the Health and Human Services Committee recommends to pass.

State Departments Division: Reviews and recommends appropriations for state departments and agencies.

Commerce:

Deals mainly with consumer affairs, professional licensing, tourism, and small business issues.

Economic Development:

Covers rural development, community development, international trade, technology development and applying technology to the marketplace; considers job development, training, and retraining, business finance and technical assistance issues; recommends allocation of private activity bonds; reviews programs in the Department of Trade and Economic Development.

Community Stabilization & Development Division:

Reviews and proposes strategies for communities or neighborhoods to counter negative impacts, such as: population dislocation, economic, criminal, environmental, or geographic upheaval; focuses on enabling citizens to survive the effects of such destabilizing forces and to realize creative opportunities for community development; considers both rural and urban communities' concerns.

International Trade & Technology Division:

Examines Minnesota's economic and job needs, emphasizing world competitiveness; makes recommendations for smalland medium-sized businesses to improve manufacturing techniques and enhance exporting opportunities; promotes technology transfer from learning institutions to industry.

Rural Resource Development Division: Examines areas of forestry and minerals, agriculture (except agricultural production); looks at experimental farms, stations and University of Minnesota extensions, diversifying rural resource economies, and promoting value-added production.

Education:

Handles policy areas such as statewide funding and structure of public education for K-12, and organization of educational districts.

Education Finance Division: Reviews and recommends funding for school systems and educational programs; creates a formula to distribute funds among school districts.

Higher Education Division: Makes recommendations for the goals and objectives of technical institutes, state universities, community colleges, and the University of Minnesota; assesses the quality, availability, governance, and administration of these institutions; considers student enrollment, educational/professional advisement, and financial aid.

Environment & Natural Resources:

Examines hunting and fishing regulation and promotion, pollution, waste management, wildlife protection, forestry and mining, ground water protection, solid waste reduction and recycling.

Financial Institutions & Housing:

Reviews laws and bills for banks, savings and loans, credit unions, and industrial thrifts.

Housing Division: Reviews and proposes programs and regulations to improve access to quality housing.

General Legislation, Veterans Affairs & Gaming:

Handles gambling matters and regulations, election concerns, veterans' programs, and general miscellaneous legislation.

Elections Division: Considers election issues and ethics, voter registration, and ballots.

Gaming Division: Handles areas such as charitable gambling, horse racing, betting, the lottery and other related issues.

Governmental Operations:

Reviews any bill that substantially changes or creates a new state department, agency, commission, board or bureau, though the bill may have had its first review and hearing in another committee; deals with public employee pension plans, and state workers' bargaining procedures.

Health & Human Services:

Receives all bills relating to health issues and various social services in the state; reviews issues relating to health maintenance organizations; deals with the licensing of health care providers and social workers; reviews and recommends welfare programs' policies, goals, objectives, reform and creation.

Insurance:

Examines consumer rights in insurance, and affordability and availability of insurance for individuals and companies.

Judiciary:

Considers sentencing guidelines, bail requirements, citizen rights, corrections, custody cases, and child abuse; evaluates structure and organization of courts.

Criminal Justice Division: Examines sentencing guidelines, procedures in juvenile delinquency, child abuse, support and custody cases, and adoption.

Labor-Management Relations:

Considers unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and labor standards, i.e., hours, wages and working conditions.

Local Government & Metropolitan Affairs:

Looks at local government and makes recommendations concerning relations between state and local governments, the impact of federal and state programs on local government, and local government's jurisdiction, control and bonding authority; reviews metropolitan agencies' structures, goals and programs; considers transportation, sewers, roads, bridges, parks, airports, and bonding for state construction projects in the metropolitan area.

Regulated Industries:

Examines controls on industries the state regulates, such as liquor, phone, power, and commercial soliciting.

Rules & Legislative Administration:

Establishes a budget for House committee expenses; determines House rules, joint rules, and administrative duties of the House.

Taxes:

Reviews bills that affect state income, sales, use, or property tax policy; in 1989 session, will fine-tune property tax reform.

Transportation:

Addresses policy matters concerning highways, truck weights, transit systems, airports, and the departments of Transportation and Public Safety.

Ways & Means:

Sets overall spending and taxing policies and limits for the Appropriations and Taxes committees, and the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee.



Do you know

At the voting polls, the words "privacy" and "secrecy" fulfill their meaning. People enter voting booths alone to mark their ballots for or against candidates or issues that affect their government and their lives.

Back in 1889, Minnesota established a secret voting system, known as the "Australian ballot," for cities with 10,000 or more people. The procedure, similar to the Australian voting system, had three types of ballots—white, blue, and red—that listed candidates' names.

It worked as follows: the voter would enter the booth alone, indicate his choice (at this time, women were not allowed to vote) by placing an "x" opposite the candidate's name, sign and fold the ballot so the ballot clerk's initials appeared outside, and hand it to the election judge. The judge would deposit it in the appropriate box: white for state elections, blue for county, and red for city.

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

It's a fact!

People are asking, "When will we be able to buy lottery tickets?" Voter approval in last fall's election changes the state constitution to permit a state lottery. But much has to happen before money and tickets change hands. A statewide election requires the secretary of state's canvassing board to certify vote totals to be sure that a majority of those voting approved the amendment. Then, the Legislature holds committee hearings where people can give their opinions. If a bill defining how a lottery would run in Minnesota comes out of the committee process, passes the Legislature, and gets the governor's approval. people can buy lottery tickets. Lottery information


Lawmakers sought answers on operations, advertising and social fallout during a Jan. 12 informational meeting of the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee.

Members quizzed representatives of the Washington State Lottery Commission about its setup, advertising limits, and any possible socio-economic problems arising from its lottery.

Evelyn Sun, Washington's lottery director, told the panel the lottery is a state-operated, revenue-producing agency that runs as a business to inspire public support. "If confidence fails, so will sales," she says. Advertising is "consistent with the dignity of the state," Sun says, explaining that television commercials are lighthearted, not hard-sell, and in good taste.

The lottery hasn't caused a jump in crime, according to Sun. Citing a 1986 study, she reports, "The lottery has not been compromised by anyone...the lottery has not promoted illegal gambling activities and there's no evidence to show that the lottery actually causes compulsive gambling."

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

Higher education images

"We found a great deal of misperception and misunderstanding about postsecondary education among our survey group," says Kathleen Kies, acting executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB).

"There's been a terrible thunderstorm that has come across the University of Minnesota," says Nils Hasselmo, president of the University of Minnesota. "But, you know how fresh the air can be after a good thunderstorm." Hasselmo says he's confident the public is ready to rally behind and support the university.

Kies and Hasselmo talked to the Higher Education Division of the Education Committee Jan. 11 about improving the public image of postsecondary institutions.

Kies says continued financial aid and enrollment support for students are top priorities. She presented a report on the goals HECB has for the year 2000. Committee members asked Kies to prioritize student funding needs.

Hasselmo says his primary concern is to improve working conditions to retain outstanding faculty. He also asked for time "put the house in order." Committee members had many questions and concerns about University of Minnesota governance. Some members suggested that Hasselmo move his office away from the Twin Cities campus. They also noted that he should be more sensitive to needs and issues of the whole university system.

Child care

While children dream about what they want to be when they grow up, many adults worry about whether these dreams can come true.

The concern of children's health, education, and welfare took the front seat on the agenda in a Joint House and Senate hearing in the State Capitol Jan. 10. Lt. Gov. Marlene Johnson told legislators, "Our goal not only in rhetoric, but in reality, will be to make 1989 the year where children are clearly the priority for our state."

The "Children's Agenda" included testimony from 17 Minnesotans on children's topics such as child care, education, nourishment, and welfare reform. Speakers cited suggestions and goals to make Minnesota's children healthier from birth to adulthood.

Minneapolis Mayor Don Fraser says that of the 5,500 children born in Minneapolis each year, 20 to 30 percent are at risk at birth. Risk factors include being a product of teen pregnancy, drug abuse, crime, or jobless parents.

Deputy Commissioner Robert Wedl, Department of Education, says the department's goal is the number 96—to have a 96 percent high school graduation rate by 1996.

Racing commission

Canterbury Downs lost almost \$7 million during the last racing season, says Don Price, executive director of the Minnesota Racing Commission. He blames the loss on ineffective marketing and a population base too small for a facility of Canterbury's size.

Price says attendance at the track is down about 30 percent over the last two years. He told the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Jan. 10 that the track wants simulcast broadcasting this season, which he says would help the track break even or make money.

But legislators questioned whether the broadcasting would further lower track attendance. They voiced other concerns about the commission's performance, such as issuing a racing license for a Little Falls racetrack which the developers returned, too little communication with Canterbury Downs, and perceived short-term rather than long-range planning.

Labor seminar

Unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and a crash course in labor movement history highlighted a half-day seminar on labor relations issues for Minnesota lawmakers.

About 100 Minnesota legislators and staff members attended the Jan. 10 seminar at the University of Minnesota's Earle Brown Center.

George Seltzer, a U of M professor, says unemployment insurance fund reserves need a boost during boom years because "you need it to pay off in the bad times."

"In the long view, the Legislature must maintain a responsible, watchful oversight, not complacency, in regulating unemployment insurance," says Seltzer.

U of M professor Art Williams cited several workers' compensation issues that could come before lawmakers this year, such as whether:

• the worker's degree of disability is accurately measured;

• minimum benefits are too high;

• Minnesota's approach to permanent partial disability works;

the dispute resolution system is too complex and uncertain; and
to limit temporary partial disability benefits to 90 days after maximum medical improvements.

"If you could solve one or two of these questions, that'd be great," Williams said.

Seminar sponsors included the Minnesota Bureau of Mediation Services, Metropolitan State University Labor Studies Program, and several U of M divisions.

Super school districts

Minnesota students can get a broader education thanks to about 30 "super" school districts, the Education Committee learned Jan. 9. Neighboring local school districts agree to create such districts.

Minnesota law requires that the districts provide a number of services, says Bob Buresh, interdistrict cooperation/management assistance specialist for the Minnesota Department of Education. Vocational education, academic enrichment, or community education are such services.

About 55 percent of eligible schools take part in the cooperative venture, according to Buresh. Each district also has a "super" school board that handles district money and program matters, but doesn't replace the local school district board, he says.

State and local money share funding responsibilities, according to Buresh. The state may provide up to \$60 a pupil. He says the education department doesn't oversee district spending, but it may recommend that districts develop longrange plans and discourage using the money to "supplant revenue or a business-as-usual type thing."

Six-member juries

The first bill introduced in the House this session addresses a constitutional amendment that permits the use of sixmember juries in nonfelony cases. Voters approved the amendment in the 1988 general election.

Why the amendment? Last spring, the Minnesota Supreme Court declared unconstitutional the law which allows fewer than 12 people on juries in misdemeanor and gross misdemeanor cases. The Court ruled that framers of Minnesota's Constitution intended a 12member jury when they set forth the right to a jury trial in criminal cases.

HF1 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) would reenact the law permitting six-member juries. The Judiciary Committee recommended the bill to pass Jan. 9. It goes next to the full House.

Victims' rights

Victims' rights headed the Judiciary Committee's agenda Jan. 9. Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul), committee chair, introduced HF14, a bill he says would improve the restitution system in Minnesota.

Kelly's bill incorporates recommendations in a recent study from the Minnesota Victim Witness Advisory Council and the State Court Administrator's Office. Council director Fern Sepler says Kelly's bill "...proposes to make modifications in Minnesota law which will, we [the council] believe, strongly and vastly improve the likelihood that a victim of a crime will receive financial compensation from the individual who should pay that personal, individual debt, as well as the debt to society."

The committee laid the bill over to give members more time to discuss and possibly amend it.

Minnesota housing

Demographics are changing the housing scene in Minnesota, and the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency (MHFA) is trying to keep up, focusing more on apartment rehabilitation than new apartment construction.

"We have changed direction at the agency in the last two or three years in terms of more preservation and rehabilitation and less new construction in the rental area," says MHFA Commissioner James Solem. "Where we do finance new construction we are trying to target very low-income activities...to use federal rental tax credits as much as we can and link up with local governments, foundations and non-profits...to achieve affordable housing," he told the Financial Institutions' Housing Division meeting Jan. 9.

MHFA provided funding for nearly 14,000 units of housing in 1988, Solem reports. In addition, the agency manages a rental portfolio in over 260 developments around the state and provides mortgage financing for those developments.

Solem estimates the agency's total portfolio of loans, including mortgage loans and home improvement loans, at


around \$1.6 billion, with resources stemming from 20 programs. Two-thirds of the resources come from the sale of bonds, most of which are tax exempt, and go to pay for the Single Family Mortgage Program.

MHFA runs an apartment renovation program, the first of its kind in the country, which started last year. It uses taxable financing for renovation, as well as permanent mortgage financing for rental units.

Higher education

Higher education progress and goals topped the agenda at a meeting of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 9. Gerald Christenson, chancellor of the Minnesota Community College System, and Nils Hasselmo, newly appointed president of the University of Minnesota, presented informational overviews.

Minnesota's 18 community colleges serve a student population of 50,000, according to Christenson. Of this figure, he says more than half are over 25 years old, 61 percent are women, and 56 percent attend on a part-time basis. He says that because the community college system includes "more and more older students," and "more and more diversity," it's "performing a vital function for the state."



One hundred thirty-four people took an oath of office in the House last week; 133 are at work this week. Rep. Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine) resigned Jan. 4 to become chief administrator at the Metropolitan Waste Control Commission. Voss represented District 52A, including parts of Blaine, Circle Pines, Lexington, Mounds View, and Shoreview. Gov. Rudy Perpich called a special election for Feb. 4 to fill the vacancy.

Chances are good that children born in Minnesota will begin their educational life in the Gopher State. Department of Education statistics show that about 90 percent of children born in any year will attend Minnesota public schools five years later. The rest attend private or home schools. Movement of preschool children in and out of the state helps balance the figures.

Student enrollment will increase by 5 percent or more in the Twin Cities, St. Cloud and Rochester areas by the 1991-92 school year, according to Department of Education projections. On the down side, the Arrowhead Region could see a loss of 5 percent or more. The estimates are for a five-year period beginning in 1986-87.

Each committee's job is to hold public hearings on bills, put bills into their best form, and send to the full body with their recommendations those bills the committee feels merit further consideration.

A committee may recommend passage of a bill in its original form, recommend passage after amending the bill, or make no recommendations. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its action and recommendations to the House.

To get an idea of what legislators will consider during the first year of the 76th Legislative Session, House Information staff writers surveyed House committee chairs and administrators to determine what's ahead in the way of topics. For each committee, writers have listed several topics in order of descending importance. Some committees, at this point, have definite agendas; others are still open. Who represents you at the State Capitol?

The House Public Information Office can tell you which legislative district you live in, and who represents that district.

Do you need legislators' districts, addresses, phone numbers, office locations, biographical details, and photos?

You can get copies of various publications in the House Public Information Office when the information becomes available.

What legislation did your representative introduce?

The House Index Department has a Cathrode Ray Tube (CRT) which shows information on a television-like screen. The CRT lists each member's name and the bills he/she sponsored in the current session. Staff members can help you use the CRT.

Who's in the United States Congress?

The House Public Information Office can give you names of Minnesota's members of Congress.

To write your legislator, address him/her as follows:

The Honorable (name) Minnesota House of Representatives (or Minnesota Senate) State Capitol St. Paul, MN 55155

Dear Representative (or Senator) name:

BILLS

Need a copy of a bill?

The Chief Clerk's Office can give you copies of bills and resolutions.

Want to know a bill's author, status, or committee assignment?

The computerized House Index tracks all bills through the legislative process. You can get the information you want about bills on the CRT. House Index lists bills by committee and by over 150 topics (e.g. environment, taxes, education) on the CRT.

You can call the House Bill Status Line for a 24-hour recorded message on the day's committee activities on bills, (612) 297-1264.

Which bills become law?

Bills that became law are on the CRT in the House Index Department. The House Public Information Office also publishes brief summaries of new laws each session. Call the Information Office to get on the summary mailing list.

You can get listings in the House Public Information Office as the information becomes available.

GOVERNMENT _________ The Legislature - how it works

The House Public Information Office has brochures on Minnesota and its government, including: "How a Bill Becomes a Law in Minnesota" and the "Government is for Everyone" information packet with single sheets on how to contact your legislator, where to get information, Minnesota facts, how legislators make voting decisions, and an explanation of the differences between state and federal government. For youngsters, the House Public Information Office provides "The Road to Minnesota Laws," a cartoon version of how a bill becomes a law; and "Your House on the Hill," a coloring book.

Proceedings in the House

The Chief Clerk's Office can answer your questions. The office publishes the *Journal of the House*, the official daily record of legislative action.

House Agendas

The Chief Clerk's Office has copies of the schedules of House floor action (e.g. Calendar, General Orders).





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Do you know

Canvassing boards, at various levels of government, certify all election results for elected officials and questions that are on election ballots. The lottery vote, for example, was certified by a canvassing board. In city and town elections, the board consists of the city council or town board.

In counties, the board consists of two county commissioners, the county auditor, clerk of courts for the county, mayor of the largest city in the county, or chair of the town board of the county's largest township.

County boards must also certify vote totals for all state and federal elected officials and questions in counties that have only one legislative district. The secretary of state's canvassing board certifies all elections and questions that involve more than one county. The secretary of state, two justices of the Supreme Court, and two judges from district court make up this board.



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
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Lottery

A successful lottery depends on many factors, some the Legislature can control and some it can't, the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee learned Jan. 19.

While no universal definition of a successful lottery exists, House researcher John Williams says the most common one is "maximizing gross sales." Conditions such as the dignity or welfare of the state sometimes may inhibit sales, he adds.

If sales measure success, then how much the lottery operates as a business rather than a government agency in purchasing, personnel, budgeting, marketing, and advertising may deter-



mine its success, Williams says. The capability of a lottery's policymakers and administrators also determines a lottery's performance.

The lottery's age, state poverty levels, unemployment and competition from lotteries in adjacent states-factors which lawmakers and lottery administrators can't control-also influence the game's success.

Williams stresses the need for common understanding of success standards. Those responsible for running a lottery need to know what a "good job" is and whether they're doing it.

"If there's a widespread lack of agreement on what a good job is, I think it greatly reduces the likelihood of anyone doing one," Williams says.



Mental health care

Mental health care issues took most of the discussion time at the Health and Human Services Committee meeting Jan. 19.

Sandra Gardebring, Department of Human Services (DHS) commissioner, told legislators that the department's focus again this year is to give people sufficient resources to make their own way to a normal economic life.

Gardebring, citing results from a 1986 study, says at that time, Minnesota ranked 37 among the 50 states in the delivery of mental health services, and now ranks 33. The DHS also plans to bring a proposal on children's mental health services to the Legislature this session, she says.

Gardebring asked legislators to extend the Children's Health Plan to people up to age 18. The plan currently provides basic outpatient health care to children up to age 8. She says it would be the beginning of an incremental program to provide health insurance to the uninsured and underinsured.

The DHS budget request focuses on three areas:

· transforming Minnesota's regional treatment centers from old-fashioned institutional systems to structures that reflect modern treatment and program approachs;

• continuing PATHS, a welfare reform program, and approving the Minnesota Family Investment Plan; and

• targeting programs for: increased child care, increased funding for child support enforcement activities, child abuse prevention, and permanency planning to prevent children from bouncing in and out of foster homes.

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

Shipwreck

Minnesota isn't going to war, but it may sink a ship in Lake Superior. Steve Thorne, deputy commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, presented the idea to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 18, along with other ideas to increase opportunities for the state's divers. Thorne presented a feasibility study proposing to sink a ship off Split Rock Lighthouse Park or another spot on the North Shore, build a facility for divers to use, and expand the area surrounding the state park. Study objectives include promoting economic development and tourism, enhancing diver safety, and protecting historic shipwrecks.

Minnesota has about 35,000 divers who spend about one-quarter of their time on the North Shore, the study says. If half of those divers make one trip a year there, the study estimates that the area could see an \$8.7 million increase in tourism and development, and as many as 290 new jobs.

The study recommends creating a safe shipwreck and upgrading emergency medical and weather services to increase diver safety and protect historic shipwrecks from souvenir hunters.

MSPAN report

Minnesota needs to develop creative educational alternatives to keep its "educational advantage," reports the Minnesota Postsecondary Access and Needs Project (MSPAN). The report examines current conditions and changing needs for postsecondary education among residents in Minnesota's urban population corridor from St. Cloud to Rochester, including the Minneapolis-St. Paul metropolitan area.

SRI International, a Californiabased, independent consulting firm, presented the MSPAN report to the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 18. The Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB) is working with SRI to paint a picture of Minnesota's postsecondary institutions. In the coming months, the two will provide an assessment of higher education to help the division map out the future for Minnesota's schools.

SRI recommends in the MSPAN

report, due in final form to the division in February, that Minnesota's universities and technical institutes (TIs) respond to the changing needs of their students, evaluate underused programs, and develop areas of excellence.

SRI suggests options, including establishing: a new urban university in the Twin Cities, a new community college in St. Paul, a practitioner-oriented graduate program, and a stronger science and technology program in step with Minnesota's economy, perhaps through development of a private institution. It also suggests creating alternative programs for non-traditional students, such as employer/college/TI partnerships for adult learning.

Transportation needs 💻

Aging highways and bridges are key issues facing the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT), Transportation Committee members learned Jan. 18.

More than 31 percent of the state trunk highway system is at least 50 years old, says Transportation Commissioner Len Levine. Also, about 3,175 bridges are 60 years old.

Growth in truck travel is another issue. MnDOT is upgrading the strength capacity of state roads to eliminate seasonal load limits. The department wants a year-round, 10-ton road system, Levine says, adding that low volume roads also need examination. Reducing traffic tie-ups in the state's urban areas is another concern. Currently, the Twin Cities area ranks 11th among major urban areas in traffic congestion severity, Levine says. "By the year 2000, it could take twice as long for motorists to get to and from work in the Twin Cities area," he adds.

"Transportation is the lifeline that links products and markets, and connects people to jobs," says Levine. "It connects people to shopping and health services, and to recreational opportunities."

U of M policy review

Members of the Education Committee's Higher Education Division were skeptical as University of Minnesota officials presented overviews on organizational structure and financial accountability at a hearing Jan 18. The officials presented results of a selfstudy in finance and accountability, and the Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission Report on Governance.

Rep. Mike Jaros (DFL-Duluth), division chair, declared support for the faculty and improvements in the university system for better service to students. But later he cited flaws in the Blue Ribbon report, and division members questioned its objectivity. Jaros also noted that the university had largely ignored a 1972 legislative commission study.

Members also questioned the

responsibilities and operations of the University's Board of Regents. Some say the board depends too heavily on the administrative staff and should have an independent staff to gather and distribute information.


Consumer legislation

Home and car buyers, senior citizens, lawn care companies and radon testers are parts of a consumer legislation package from the Minnesota Attorney General's Office.

Attorney General Hubert Humphrey III outlined the proposals Jan. 17 for the Commerce Committee.

Home buyers could get more information, such as appraisals or credit reports, under the Home Buyers' Bill of Rights. The measure also would require that buyers get a list of all costs five days before closing the purchase agreement.

The auto defect bill would require

new-car dealers to list any damages incurred or repairs made to a vehicle.

Another bill would cover scams aimed at senior citizens or other vulnerable adults. If the proposal becomes law, it would carry a \$10,000 penalty per violation.

Two other consumer-oriented proposals would require written contracts with lawn care companies, and Department of Health regulation of radon testers.

DNR overview

"The key approach that we are taking in the Department of Natural Resources is balance. We have tried throughout all of our management to balance the needs for long protection and preservation against shorter term benefits," says Steve Thorne, deputy commissioner, Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Thorne talked about the need to balance environmental issues with economic issues at an Environment and Natural Resources Committee hearing Jan. 17. While the DNR continues to manage and preserve natural resources, it's experiencing staff shortages, a rising use of outdoor recreation facilities, and a need for greater financial resources, he says.

John Chell, DNR regional administrator, says a Department of Administration report on DNR support staff work loads shows that a full-time clerk at the DNR processes 2,000 more accounting transactions per year than do clerks from the departments of Administration, Transportation, or Corrections.

"We do need an increase of \$1.4 million," Chell says. "It would represent a significant increase of 25 percent in our budget." The increase would allow the DNR to add 67 staff positions, he says.

According to DNR data, the department's present allocation from the state amounts to \$14 per person in Minnesota. Other funding sources include fees/licensing, state taxes, and federal funds.

"With increased services that we're providing at the local level, and the increased demands...on regional staff, we feel that those requests are justifiable," Chell says.

The DNR has recycling, ground water, forestry, minerals, and outdoor recreation issues on its agenda this year.

Economic forecast 🖿

Economic forecasts, the budget reserve, and expectations of economic risk got a hearing in the Taxes Committee Jan. 17. Tom Triplett, commissioner of finance, gave the committee an economic forecast for Minnesota.

Even though Minnesota's economy continued to remain strong through 1988, the Department of Finance and the Council of Economic Advisors expect a slowdown in the rate of real economic growth in the next biennium. A strong budget reserve can offset a slowdown in the economy, but not in a full-scale recession, says Triplett. Therefore, a budget reserve plays a key part in Minnesota's risk management strategy, he says.

Education needs

President Nils Hasselmo, University of Minnesota, told the Appropriations Committee Jan. 17 that he would like to see a true partnership develop in higher education to meet Minnesotans' concerns. He told the committee he intends to take personal responsibility for the institution's actions.

Hasselmo asked legislators for \$198.7 million to improve educational quality at the University. The figure includes \$1.8 million for advising, particularly in the College of Liberal Arts. "Advising is very important. It's not only a matter of admitting students to the University, but you must make sure that they can benefit from the education that is provided," says Hasselmo.

Joe Graba, state director of technical institutes, told the committee that changing student demographics, changing technologies in the work place, and external economic factors are major components for their budget request. Graba asked legislators for \$51.1 million for instructional expenses and \$9 million for non-instructional expenses.

Chancellor Robert Carothers, State University System, cited statistics from a National Center for Higher Education Management study. It compared the Minnesota State University System with 43 other similar state systems, and found that Minnesota ranks 33 in per student funding, \$1,000 per student below the national average. Carothers asked legislators to make a commitment to get Minnesota to the national average of per student funding in the next four years.

World trade

Lawmakers examined the role Minnesota can play in today's global economy at a Legislative Forum on International Trade Jan. 17 at the World Trade Center in St. Paul.

Rep. Todd Otis (DFL-Mpls), Economic Development Committee chair, told business leaders, world trade professionals, and his colleagues from the House that Minnesota is on the "threshold of a new era in international trade." He stressed the importance of opening new markets for Minnesota products.

Richard Bohr, Minnesota Trade Office director, says Minnesota is on the forefront of the linkage between international trade and economic development. Minnesota's tapping new markets in the Soviet Union and making breakthroughs in trade with China, he says.

Bohr and other speakers emphasized the importance of education in spreading the message about trade opportunities. Rick Nolan, World Trade Center president, advocates the "globalization of education," saying it's important that people gain an understanding of other cultures to understand foreign business practices. Nolan spoke of a telecommunications system that would allow schools to tap into conferences on international trade. Foreign trading partners use such a system for face to face meetings, he says.


Government officials and business leaders called for cooperation between public and private sectors in developing foreign trade policies. One trade consultant suggested such cooperation could lead to more continuity in trade policies as executive branch administrations change over time.

Cocaine

Cocaine trafficking and use in Minnesota cuts through all facets of society, from the rich all the way down to the lowest socio-economic class, says Mark Shields, Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension.

Shields told the Judiciary Committee Jan. 13 that many "undesirables have taken foothold in our state." He says "the amount of cocaine...the number one area we're confronted with, is just simply unbelievable."

Shields says the cocaine problem in Minnesota focuses on two forms of the drug: "crack," the newest arrival, found primarily in the inner cities, is now making its way into the suburbs; and "flake" cocaine, the powder version of the drug, is now found in every county and almost every city in the state. Shields told lawmakers that problems with crack are minimal compared to those associated with flake cocaine.

Should the state incorporate metropolitan regional parks into the state park system? The State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 18 considered a study on the feasibility of this proposal. Cost of the land to the state would be \$1.8 billion, according to study estimates, with an additional \$23.4 million needed annually for the state to operate and maintain the parks. The study concludes that "the high expenses...of incorporating the regional park system into the state park system cannot be justified on the basis of cost efficiency, visitor characteristics or park use."

The state would regulate appraisers and auctioneers if Department of Commerce proposals become law. Commerce Commissioner Mike Hatch told the Commerce Committee Jan. 19 that the bill to regulate appraisers also would set up a code of conduct. Auctioneers want to be regulated by Minnesota so they can call auctions in surrounding states that have regulations, Hatch notes. Criminal justice specialists are on the verge of a major scientific breakthrough regarding DNA, according to Mark Shields, Bureau of Criminal Apprehension. DNA is the genetic make-up that determines an individual's characteristics. Shields says blood and bodily fluids can help investigators identify criminal suspects because the substances are unique to individuals, as are fingerprints. Judiciary Committee members will consider the breakthrough's significance this session.

About 3.1 million Minnesotans are licensed drivers; according to Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) statistics. That means Minnesota ranks 21 in the U.S. MnDOT figures show that Minnesotans registered about 3.3 million motor vehicles with the state. And they drive those vehicles more than 35 billion miles across the Gopher State, according to MnDOT. That's an average of about 10,000 miles per vehicle. Nationally, Minnesota ranks 20 in the registration category and 21 in the miles-traveled category.

Livestock farming contributes to the rural economy in more ways than does crop farming, says Commissioner Jim Nichols, Department of Agriculture. There are many secondary industries that support livestock farming such as feed stores, veterinarians, construction companies, and medicine. The livestock industry also keeps processing plants and jobs in the local area, says Nichols. In livestock farming, the farmer will make many trips to town. In crop farming, the farmer will make one trip to town to buy his seeds, and one trip to sell his product.

Minnesota minerals are a secret because they can't be seen on geological maps, says William Brice, Department of Natural Resources Minerals Division director. Minnesota is covered with glacial drift. Under the drift is a mineral economy in taconite, silica sand, clay, pearlite, and limes, among other minerals. Presently, Minnesota has an exploration economy of \$14 million. "The more people we have out looking for minerals, the greater chance we have of finding them," says Brice.

Private land owners need technical assistance in forest management, according to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). They also need good information to avoid theft of precious trees and fraud in the cabinet industry. The DNR plans to acquire approximately 80,000 acres of privately held lands. Their goal is to manage and preserve Red

Oak and Black Walnut trees. They also plan to develop a forest management plan with private land owners.

Do you know

Although the term "gerrymandering" comes from the name of Elbridge Gerry, he's better known as a governor of Massachusetts who had strong political beliefs.

Gerry, born in 1744, graduated from Harvard College in 1762. His strong anti-British sentiments gave him a broad political base in Massachusetts.

As a Continental Congress delegate in 1776, Gerry signed the Declaration of Independence and the Articles of Confederation. A strong defender of state's rights, he was also a delegate to the Constitutional Convention of 1787. Gerry didn't sign the Constitution because he disagreed with certain parts, but he did support the new government and served in the U.S. Congress from 1789-1793.

Gerry was elected governor of Massachusetts in 1810 and again in 1811. He was ousted from office in 1812 after signing the redistricting bill that led to the term "gerrymandering." Ironically, he never sponsored the bill and history says he signed it reluctantly.



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
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Diploma requirements —

Students will need a different body of knowledge to earn a diploma when the Minnesota Board of Education decides what children should know before graduation, a state board official says.

The board may change diploma requirements from a credit base to a learner outcome base, board administrator Ted Suss told the Education Committee Jan. 25. The board wants to retool the credit-base system to mirror proposed changes in course requirements and expectations. The panel is also examining learner outcomes, or what a student is

Highlights expected to know by the end of a course, he said.


"The state board is interested in perhaps...abolishing entirely the current system of granting graduation based on completion of specific classes and instead identify a set of learner outcomes which districts would have to attest that students achieved to receive a diploma," Suss said. "We would be breaking ground that has not been broken in any other state."

Redefining the basis for a diploma is a natural flow from the changes in course requirements and learner outcomes, Suss says. If educators develop one subject area each year, he says, it would take

It's a fact!

about seven years to have the changes fully in place.

Defining learner outcomes may not be difficult, Suss said after the meeting. Translating them into measurable objectives and setting success points is. The process is complex, time-consuming and demands public involvement.

Juvenile sex offenders 📖

Most juvenile sex offenders suffered sexual abuse as children and have learned firsthand how to rape, says Joe Heinz, Hennepin County Home Schools superintendent. Heinz and his staff receive national recognition for their work with juveniles, and they've participated in several workshops and task forces on the problem.

Heinz told the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division Jan. 25 that 48 of the 132 juveniles at the Hennepin County facility are sex offenders. Young males in the program range in age from 12 to 18 years. Heinz says it's not uncommon for a juvenile in the program to admit to hundreds of sex offenses, and that without treatment, they'll continue committing such offenses.

Heinz says, "Spending dollars on some juveniles for treatment is money well spent, particularly when we know there are methodologies that can both protect the community and change the behavior of that juvenile sex offender."

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

U of M report

Lawmakers heard criticisms of and recommended improvements for the University of Minnesota's (U of M) physical plant operation during a joint House-Senate meeting Jan. 25.

Legislative Auditor James Nobles outlined a report critical of the U of M's physical plant operation. He cites as problems the department's inexact accounting and inventory systems, worker transportation, and an apparent lack of communication with the university's central administration and the Board of Regents. Nobles also outlined recommendations to improve the department's accountability and management.

William Thomas, associate vice president for Physical Plant Operations in the Twin Cities, told legislators that he and other officials developed an action plan shortly after the auditor issued the report last year. Thomas says he worked on about 60 percent of the report's recommendations. The department rejected five recommendations, he says, because they required action from another source.


The Education Divisions of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance committees plan to meet again to discuss the report and the U of M's response.

Banking outlook

James Miller, deputy commissioner of Commerce, is an optimist when it comes to the banking climate in Minnesota. He told the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee Jan. 25 that more banks want to provide more services.

A Department of Commerce financial report through last September indicates that banks losing money from operation costs reached a three-year low in 1988. But while there are fewer problem banks, Miller reports the number is still above pre-agricultural crisis levels.

Looking ahead, Miller cites some major banking issues facing Minnesota, including the effects of the 1988 drought, risks involved in new bank powers, and the continuing effects of deregulation in the financial services industry.

University governance

University of Minnesota (U of M) officials would benefit greatly by having the two-hat system of governing removed, says Rep. Mike Jaros, (DFL-Duluth).

Jaros told the Education Committee's Higher Education Division Jan. 25, that the university president has two jobs one to supervise the whole university system and one to deal with daily affairs of the Twin Cities campus.

Chancellor Lawrence A. Ianni, U of M-Duluth, says there's no time for officials wearing two hats to do both jobs effectively.

Jaros says other governance and structural problems in the University system need addressing. He suggests an independent staff for the Board of Regents, a decentralization of the system, and a president's cabinet of chancellors from each campus. His bill, HF67, outlines other problems and recommendations.

Rep. K.J. McDonald, (IR-Watertown) says the university should take every precaution while restructuring its governance policies, to avoid building hiding places for staff who use fear and intimidation against others.

Industrial waste reduction

There are only three of its kind in the world — one in Germany, one in Japan, and one in Roseville, Minnesota. It's a treatment plant that takes hazardous waste, recovers valuable products, and reduces the amount of original waste in the process.

The Environment and Natural Resources Committee toured the treatment plant, Metro Recovery Systems (MRS), in Roseville, Jan. 24. Brian Rooney, MRS Sales and Marketing manager, led the tour and explained the recovery process.

MRS reduces 60 tons of industrial waste to 2.5 tons of waste daily, says Rooney. The treatment process recovers useable byproducts such as zinc, copper, and nickel and sells them to refiners. Rooney says MRS could also produce metallic compounds if they had buyers for those products. The company treats the remaining 2.5 tons of hazardous waste to meet all legal environmental protection standards and ships it to a landfill in Oklahoma.

MRS representatives stress recovery as the key concept of its operations. The company creates useable products, reduces the volume of original waste, and brings its clients into total compliance with environmental safety and disposal regulations.

Regional treatment centers

What are regional treatment centers? Whom do they serve? How do they serve them? The Health and Human Services Committee set up a task force in 1988 to find answers to these questions.

Rep. Peter Rodosovich (DFL-Faribault), task force chair, told the committee Jan. 24, that their goal was to learn more about Minnesota's regional treatment center (RTC) system, and to share the knowledge with others.

Task force members toured each of Minnesota's RTCs and two state-run nursing homes during the past few months. They recommend that the Legislature:

• continue to serve "residual" clients in a residential setting, and provide non-residential services to clients within the region;

• continue RTC crisis care and respite care;

• provide the best possible care to each client at the most reasonable cost to the client and state, and

• be aware of the need to develop additional community services and housing for people with mental illnesses.

The recommendations are part of a 53page report Rodosovich presented to the committee. He says one of the most positive aspects in the regional treatment area is the interest and care staff delivers to clients.

Canterbury Downs

Canterbury Downs expects to make \$1.5 million in the upcoming racing season, says Lu Burdick, a member of the track's board of directors. She presented the track's plans for turning a profit this season to the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Jan. 24.

The track lost nearly \$7 million in the 1988 season. Burdick lists severe heat, the Twins' popularity, and charitable gaming as factors that hurt business.

Burdick points out that the track cut \$3 million in costs over the last three years. She outlined some of the track's marketing proposals, which include providing better service to their one million regular fans, and special events to attract more local participation.

Canterbury plans to ask the Legislature to permit simulcast broadcasting to outstate Minnesota, according to Burdick. They would also like to see legislators write upcoming lottery legislation to include Canterbury's participation, and turn the track into a year-round facility using simulcast broadcasting from warm weather tracks.

Military update

Past and present military personnel testified at the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Jan. 24 on their organizations' needs and proposals.

The Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars told legislators that recent budget cuts for veterans' services have created a crisis situation in providing services. Jeff Olson, deputy commissioner, Department of Veterans Affairs, says 99,000 veterans in Minnesota are over age 65, and that number will increase to 138,000 by the year 2000. He says spending cuts threaten services to older veterans.

The groups thanked the committee for recommending passage of SF83 (House author: Kostohryz, DFL-North St. Paul), a resolution asking Congress to restore full funding to veterans medical centers.

Adjutant General Eugene R. Andreotti, Minnesota National Guard, talked about the Guard's plans and legislative proposals. He says the Guard wants the Pentagon to upgrade the 47th Division's priority rating, and to transfer new units to Minnesota. Andreotti mentioned medical units, a defense language institute, and engineering units as those he wants reassigned. He says the Guard's legislative proposals include bills that would provide a flag to families

of deceased Guard members, an increase in tuition assistance, and a yearly bonus for Guard members.

Andreotti talked about the current lawsuit Minnesota filed against the federal government concerning control of the Guard, saying he and the Pentagon consider it a friendly states' rights lawsuit.

Knowledge and wealth

New knowledge produces new wealth, say Minnesota higher education officials. They testified at an Economic Development Committee meeting Jan. 24 about their contributions to Minnesota's economy.

The nation has developed an economy based on knowledge and information, say the officials. Higher education enterprise has become important in the business community. Higher education institutions and business communities are now interdependent.

During the hearing, officials made commitments to form partnerships with business communities to increase economic impact in their areas.

State University System Chancellor Robert Carothers says higher education institutions could share their resources with business communities. They have faculty expertise, facilities, and equipment to offer businesses.

"In turn, the business community needs to help us with the internship experiences for our students, with professional development of our faculty, and with the acquisition of increasingly expensive and increasingly short-lived instructional equipment," Carothers says.

Officials also point out that higher education institutions help communities build and maintain economic vitality through the knowledge and skills of their graduates who live and work there. Minnesotans who are victims of crime in another state may be eligible for compensation from this state. A provision in HF95 (Bishop, IR-Rochester) would give relief to victims who don't receive reparations from the state where they were victimized. The Judiciary Committee gave the bill preliminary approval Jan. 23.

Under present law, Minnesotans who are victimized in Minnesota could be compensated for the cost of: medical and hospital care; psychiatric or psychological services; loss of income greater than \$50; child care or household services; funeral, burial, or cremation; and loss of support.

Currently, only four states don't have victims' reparations programs. And, according to Bishop, the federal government now requires states to expand their coverage to get federal dollars for the Crime Victims Reparations Fund.

HF95 would also clarify Minnesota's right to deny a reparations claim if the victim making the claim contributed to the crime.

Flip the switch

One push to conserve energy begins with the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). The PUC requires gas and electric utilities to provide conservation programs to its customers.

"The Conservation Improvement Program has been an evolving program over the last several years," says Barbara Beerhalter, PUC chair. She spoke to the Regulated Industries Committee Jan. 23.

"We require utility companies to provide certain kinds of energy efficient programs for their customers, both residential and commercial. The commercial is a growing activity, and under those programs in the current year, we have authorized approximately \$11-12 million worth of conservation improvement programs," Beerhalter says. The PUC also works with improving operation efficiency in the utilities themselves.

The PUC regulates telephone, gas, and electric companies in Minnesota, including price rates for each service. This year, the commission expects to consider nuclear de-commissioning, rate of return regulation of utilities, and alternative operator services.

Home-share for seniors 📟

Senior citizens can avoid high nursing facility costs and stay in their own homes if they participate in home-sharing programs, according to Sally Kundert, president of the Minnesota Shared Housing Association. She presented her study of the program to a Financial Institutions and Housing Division meeting Jan. 23.

The home-share program matches senior citizens with able-bodied people who help with daily chores and provide companionship. In return, homeseekers receive a house to live in for little or no rent.

Kirsten Olson, a University of Minnesota student and a live-in with Maureen Hanson, testified before the division.

"It's been beneficial for both of us," says Olson. "Maureen seems to have lost about four years off her age, and she likes the freedom."

"I sure do," says Hanson, who lived in a nursing facility for four years before returning to her home.

Six home-sharing programs currently operate in the state with funding from the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency. Kundert told legislators that seniors able to live at home with a roommate can save up to \$18,000 annually in nursing facility costs. Most homeseekers are students looking for low-cost housing, and about two-thirds are women, she says.

AIDS awareness programs

AIDS is a priority in Minnesota, says the Minnesota Department of Health. It reports 429 AIDS cases as of the end of last October. Of the reported cases, 235 resulted in death. The statistics prompted the department to initiate programs aimed at preventing AIDS and stopping the spread of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

Michael Moen, Department of Health Disease Prevention and Control director, told the Appropriations Committee Health and Human Services Division Jan. 23 that the department is expanding counseling and testing sites. It opened the first Minnesota sites in July 1985, where they provide antibody testing and risk reduction counseling.

The Statewide Risk Reduction and Disease Prevention Center Plan objectives include providing public education to adults and youths, professional education to health care providers, and programs aimed at changing behavior to reduce or eliminate the risk of AIDS.

Education recommendations

Ruth Randall, commissioner of Education, agrees with the legislative auditor's report calling for statewide improvements in education. But she disagrees with some of its recommendations.


Randall responded to the report's major recommendations during a Jan. 23 Education Committee meeting. The report cites, among other things, falling college entrance test scores, lax monitoring, and weak statewide graduation standards. Recommendations include extending the school year, testing students' proficiency in math and reading, and phasing out the smallest school districts.

The department doesn't support adding five more days to the state's 170-day school year, says Randall, because of the \$100 million price tag. "Seat time is not the way to go," she adds. "We think the outcome route is."

While she agrees the state should test students, Randall says the department would rather test overall learner outcomes than specific subjects. The report recommends statewide testing in math and reading to ensure that students have 11th grade proficiency levels.

Randall also agrees that high school districts should have at least 100 students. But she believes local districts should reorganize on their own, not because of a state mandate.

Randall agrees with report recommendations for mandatory homework, annual district certification, and uniform statewide standards. She also agrees that the state could better monitor districts, but adds that she doesn't want the state to become regulatory in education.



Two parrots and a boa constrictor helped Dr. Kathryn Roberts, Minnesota Zoo director, make a presentation to the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Jan. 24. Roberts outlined new program plans for the zoo, including an outdoor amphitheatre, a tropical coral reef exhibit, a dolphinarium, an arctic exhibit complex, and main building renovations. The programs would cost about \$43 million, with the zoo seeking \$30 million in state bonding funds and the rest in gifts from corporations, foundations, and individuals. She also outlined a new corporate exhibit sponsorship program at the zoo that allows corporations to sponsor wildlife exhibits.

Talk about the high cost of education! In 1933, officials at state colleges decided to charge tuition. Minnesota students paid \$10 a year, while out-of-state students forked over \$15, according to testimony at a Jan. 24 meeting of the Appropriations Committee's Education Division.

Minnesota's first college graduates earned degrees from Hamline University, the state's oldest private college. Hamline, founded in 1854, was also the first in the state to provide a college level medical school. The medical school later merged into the University of Minnesota, according to testimony at an Appropriations Committee Education Division meeting Jan. 24. The legislative auditor's report on high school education in Minnesota says the statewide 20-credit graduation standard is weak. But Ruth Randall, commissioner of Education, says local districts often go beyond the minimum. In fact, she refers to charts in the report to show that 22 is the average number of required credits. Randall spoke to the Education Committee Jan. 23.

Raw products from rural regions of Minnesota can produce a viable economic resource for the state, according to Reps. Roger Cooper (DFL-Bird Island) and Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn). The paper industry could use kaolin clay, and high tech and medical industries could use ceramics. Smooth sumac can provide poly-ethonols, oils, and polymeric hydrocarbons for industrial and chemical purposes. Cornstarch can produce ethonol and bio-degradable plastics. Cooper suggests that the Rural Resource and **Development Division of the Economic Development Committee consider** transportation, technical legal changes, and tools people need to bring about economic development in rural areas.

The state could make better annual budget comparisons and simplify its accounting procedures if the Legislature approves some Department of Finance proposals. Ted Spiess, from the Finance Department, presented recommendations to the Appropriations Committee State Departments Division Jan. 24. The recommendations would consolidate certain special revenue fund accounts into the General Fund and limit the number of new special revenue fund accounts. Finance Department officials say their proposals would allow the General Fund to more accurately show state spending levels, and permit a better review of state spending policies from one accounting period to the next.

Insurance concerns rank high on legislators' agendas this year. Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls), Insurance Committee chair, says he expects to hear a lot of talk about the Minnesota Comprehensive Health Association (MCHA), which makes insurance available to people who are uninsurable. The committee will focus on MCHA funding and revisions, says Skoglund.

Kids, teachers and their computers filled a corridor in the State Capitol Jan. 23. Students from 22 elementary school districts demonstrated computer technology and skill for legislators at "Capitalize on Technology," a computer and videography exhibition. "It was neat seeing how other people work on the computer and what software they use," says Jenny Reimer, a fifth-grader from Cornelia Elementary School, Edina. Kids from McKinley Elementary School, Ham Lake, produce a weekly program on cable TV, channel 51-NCTV. Their TV crew taped some legislative committee hearings.





Do you know

Minnesota's Constitution, adopted in 1857, established a judicial system with the Supreme Court at the top. One chief justice and two associate justices made up the original court. In 1881, the Legislature added two more associates.

Over the years, voters approved several amendments to Article 6 of the Constitution (the Judiciary). In 1875, they removed the restrictions of six judicial districts with only one judge per district. Minnesota now has 10 judicial districts, with at least three judges serving in each district, making a total of more than 230 district judges throughout the state.

Amendments in 1883 reduced terms of office for Supreme Court justices and district judges from seven to six years each, and later, in 1920, increased probate judges' terms from two to four years. And after several attempts, a 1930 amendment increased the number of Supreme Court associate justices from four to six, where the number stands today.





It's a fact!



Child care credit 🛲

The Taxes Committee considered a bill Feb. 2 that would adjust the child care credit on individual income taxes. HF94 would expand child care credit to include individuals who currently don't qualify for the credit because their incomes are too high. The bill would increase the maximum income level to qualify for the child care credit from \$12,200 to \$15,600 to stay in step with inflation rates.

According to author Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls), the law used to serve middle class families where both parents worked and placed their children in child care. But inflation made middle class families ineligible for the credit. McLaughlin says his bill would restore child care benefits to families with a combined income up to \$30,000. Currently, couples with a combined income of \$24,000 lose the credit.

The Department of Revenue says if this bill becomes law, it will have no significant impact on the state general fund during the next two bienniums.

Pipeline safety office

Minnesota's Office of Pipeline Safety plans to take over inspection authority for all pipeline systems in the state by June 1991.

William Barbeau, pipeline safety director, told the Commerce Committee Feb. 2 that the agency now oversees intrastate natural gas, hazardous liquid, and liquified natural gas lines.

Barbeau says his office wants interstate agent status so it can inspect and monitor all pipeline systems in Minnesota, not

just state-based systems. The federal government told the office it needed jurisdiction over all pipelines on an intrastate level — such as propane, hazardous liquids, and liquified natural gas — to achieve interstate status. Barbeau says propane line inspections will start in July.

Barbeau told legislators that the office upgraded its inspectors' qualifications and started a comprehensive inspection program.

The Legislature created the office about 18 months ago in response to a fatal gas line explosion in Mounds View. Before the Pipeline Safety Act of 1987, Barbeau says, the state fire marshal's office handled only natural gas line inspections.


Elections

Secretary of State Joan Growe gave an update on elections activities in her office to the Elections Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Feb. 2.

The statewide voter registration system is underway, and Growe hopes to have it completed by year end. More than 219,000 people registered to vote last year, with forms provided at driver's license offices, supplied in tax booklets, and from state agencies. The system paid off in the last general election, she says, when 67.2 percent of eligible Minnesotans voted, compared to 48.9 percent nationally.

Growe talked about two studies her office conducted. The first shows that a special election law the Legislature passed last year led to increased voter participation in special elections where two or more questions appear on mail-in ballots.

The second study deals with voter "falloff," a comparison of the total number of votes cast for an office with the total number of people voting in the election. To deal with this problem, Growe's office recommends: reviewing the current ballot page format; improving instructions provided in the ballot booklet, the voting booth, and the verbal instructions election judges provide; and adding graphics to the ballot pages.

Minnesota thrifts

Minnesota savings and loans are healthy, despite the recent rash of thrift failures in Texas and the federal government's recommendation to take control of 350 insolvent thrifts across the nation. John Corbid, a former Minnesota representative and public affairs director for the Savings League, reviewed the savings and loan industry at a Financial Institutions and Housing Committee meeting Feb. 1.

Corbid says that Minnesota's thrifts are profitable. Nationally, only 24 of the approximately 2,600 institutions claimed insolvency and needed a bail-out in 1987. Those failing thrifts represented more than half the industry's annual losses. Healthy savings institutions bailed out the ailing thrifts with no cost to taxpayers, according to Corbid. And, he says, a special assessment on insurance coverage to bail-out troubled thrifts kept 69 national savings and loans from showing a profit. Thrifts, a primary supplier of home mortgages, made more than half of all home loans in 1987. Minnesota has 227 thrifts.

Teachers' salaries

A study the legislative audit staff presented to the Education Committee's Education Finance Division Feb. 1 found that while significant cost of living differences exist between the outstate and Twin Cities metro area, teachers' salary schedules compensate for it.

The cost of living in outstate areas is about 11 percent lower than in the Twin Cities metro area, according to the study, with the biggest difference in shelter costs. Shelter costs, which include home prices, rents, property taxes, and homeowner's insurance, are 40 percent lower outstate than in the metro area, while other costs remain similar.

Outstate teacher salaries are lower than those of metro teachers because metro teachers tend to have more years of teaching experience and higher levels of postgraduate training. And their schedules are generally 9 percent higher overall. The study also found that real salaries are 1 to 2 percent higher outstate due to the cost of living differences.

The report doesn't recommend changes in the education finance formula because the cost of living is only one of the factors affecting the cost of education. It concludes that legislators should consider other education costs, along with cost of living differences, before changes in education funding take place.

Health care coalition

Access to health insurance is a problem in northeastern Minnesota, says Nancy Gruver, director of the Health Ensurance Coalition. A group of small business owners, consumers, health care providers and local government people formed the coalition in 1987 to solve the lack-ofhealth-insurance problem.

"Our health care delivery system is very complicated...partially private, partially regulated, partially public. It's incredibly complicated," Gruver told the Health and Human Services Committee Jan. 31. The coalition decided that all groups concerned with lack-of-healthcare issues would have to compromise to solve the complicated problem.

Last year, they mailed a survey to some 4,500 businesses in nine northeastern Minnesota counties, Gruver reports. Ten percent responded. Of those, 37 percent didn't offer health insurance to their employees.

Ground water dependency -

Minnesotans depend a lot on ground water, says Martha Brand of the Environmental Quality Board. Three out of four people get their drinking water from the ground. Some rely on private wells that don't have any treatment facility. And ground water supplies about 60 to 80 percent of the water farmers use for irrigation.

Despite this dependence, Brand reports that Minnesotans have very little information about the ground water. We know little about the aquifers (underground lakes), she says, or the general quality of ground water. Brand told legislators she's concerned about how ground water pollutants are transported and how they break down over time.

Minnesotans are especially ignorant of actions that contaminate ground water, Brand says. For example, some people don't clean up their septic systems; others are unconcerned about the effects of lawn chemicals on ground water. Citizens need to know how to properly dispose of household hazardous waste, she says.

Brand, and other witnesses at a Jan. 31 hearing, urged members of the Environment and Natural Resources Committee to support legislation on ground water protection.

STARS

Department of Administration officials unveiled a proposal for a statewide telecommunications network at the Economic Development Committee's International Trade and Technology Division Jan. 31.

The Statewide Telecommunications Access and Routing System (STARS) would provide voice, data, and video transmissions for educational and governmental services, says Judy Pinke, assistant commissioner of administration. Pinke told lawmakers that the department wants to implement a STARS plan in the spring of 1990.

The department advocates a public/ private partnership for STARS. The proposal suggests the state manage STARS, but calls for private ownership, construction, and maintenance.

Some lawmakers showed interest in the proposal, but expressed concern about the STARS budget. The department wants the Legislature to allocate \$4 million for STARS in the next two years.

Community development

Legislators took time at a Jan. 31 committee hearing to set some guidelines for their work this session. Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) chairs the Economic Development Committee's Community Stabilization and Development Division. She gave each member "a chance to dream and share visions" about community development.

Committee members talked about rural and urban community issues. Urban representatives say they're concerned about stabilizing culturally and racially diverse communities. Reducing crime, empowering neighborhood initiatives, and revitalizing projects are other concerns.

Stabilizing the population in their districts topped rural legislators' concerns. They're interested in creating jobs and developing the economy to stop flight to the cities. The committee developed several guiding principles, including: allowing community stabilization and development to occur from within; providing residents with leadership development, personal stakes, and access to information; and having them invest their own time and energy in developing their communities.

Plastic recycling

Minnesota businesses are collecting, processing, and selling recycled plastic. That's the news legislators heard at a joint meeting of the House and Senate Environment and Natural Resources committees Jan. 31.

Katie Boone, Reuter, Inc. of Hopkins, says her company is currently collecting and processing recyclable plastic from around the state, and selling it locally and internationally to China and Canada.

Biodegradable plastics are making their way into the market. But according to recycling industry representatives, biodegradables break down and contaminate the plastic supply, threatening the recycling industry. Plastic collection in rural areas is often expensive and difficult, they say, but they're working to organize collection efforts.

Recycled plastic goes into many things, including fence posts and chairs, according to University of Toledo professor Bob Bennett. The industry is replacing many paper food containers with plastic

containers, which increases the supply of used plastic on the market. Bennett says other reasons to use recycled plastic rather than materials such as aluminum and wood include lower production costs and the ability to resist corrosion.

U of M physical plant =

Objective, statistical measures can help determine whether the University of Minnesota's (U of M) physical plant operation passes muster, says Legislative Auditor James Nobles. But, he notes, subjective views will keep alive doubts about how the physical plant runs.

Nobles discussed the U of M's physical plant operation during a Jan. 31 joint meeting of the education finance divisions of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance committees. His report outlines problems in the physical plant operation's procedures such as accounting, inventory, transportation and communication.

"The thing that's really most troubling is the conflict between physical plant management and the board of regents," the auditor says, adding that some regents say they don't trust the operation's management.

Nobles suggests that the physical plant operations' management needs to cultivate trust if the operation's image is to improve. But the physical plant's current officials shouldn't be blamed for problems that have developed over many years, he says.

The auditor's staff plans to re-evaluate the physical plant operation to check on improvements.

Farm loans

The U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FHA) notified more than 3,600 farmers of their loan delinquencies last November, Director Russ Bjorhus told the Agriculture Committee Jan. 30. FHA also offered to restructure the loans; 64 percent of the farmers accepted.

Bjorhus says the FHA wants farmers to attend agriculture classes for training in farm management and bookkeeping. Such training is essential for successful future farmers, he says.

Bjorhus also discussed the Emergency

Loan Program that provides low interest loans to farmers who lost more than 30 percent of their crops during the drought. In a survey last fall, the FHA predicted 5,000 to 6,000 loan applicants, but now expects only half that number to apply. Bjorhus says many farmers don't want to add to their farm debt; others feel they won't qualify because of their income.

Interest rates range from 9.5 percent for operating loans to 6.5 percent for limited resource loans to 4.5 percent for drought emergency loans.

Educational requirements

Minnesota has lots of rules about schools and school time, says James Sauter, assistant commissioner of Education, but few on what students should learn.

"We have no clear, concise definition about what students should be learning," Sauter told the Education Committee Jan. 30. He presented a departmental proposal to outline what the state wants students to know before they graduate. Local districts would develop programs for students to meet the objectives.

"The decisions that are the best in terms of getting the job done are usually those that are made closest to the point of action," Sauter says. "...we want teachers and parents who are involved in...the action of the school."

Schools need at least 30 teachers, and the support within the building and from the district superintendent to make headway under the proposal, Sauter says. And, he adds, changes in the schools would take at least five years.

Buses: food and drink

A woman who had a seizure on an MTC bus during last summer's heat wave gained the Judiciary Committee's attention Jan. 30. Lawmakers criticized a bus driver who wouldn't let the woman carry a beverage on the bus. Due to lack of fluids, she had a seizure.

Currently, bus drivers decide whether to allow beverages on their buses. Rep. Kathleen Vellenga (DFL-St. Paul) says the Metropolitan Transit Commission (MTC) does a good job, but incidents like this erode public trust in the bus service. She says, "it's a sad commentary on the judgment of people and also on the transit system that this situation was not taken care of administratively."

HF122 (Beard, DFL-Cottage Grove) would allow people to consume food or beverages on a bus if they need to for medical reasons, such as diabetes. The committee gave the bill unanimous preliminary approval.


Facsimile machine



Nothing is more sacred to Minnesotans than parks (Okay, maybe the Twins). More than 13 million people visited parks in the metropolitan region last year, with St. Paul's Como Park seeing the most activity, according to Larry Kitto, Metro Parks and Open Space Agency. Kitto spoke to the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee Feb. 2. The agency hopes to get funds for other projects, including completion of a park on Lake Minnetonka, development of a park in Big Marine at Lake Waconia, and continued development of Como Park and Minnehaha Park in Minneapolis.

Funding for environmental and water protection comes from many sources, including governmental appropriations, contributions, and fees. The Governor's Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment (SCORE) proposes a new source of funds — a surtax on recycling household hazardous waste, and possibly a fee on hauling services for the curb-side recycling projects. "The more you reduce or recycle, the lower the fee," according to the SCORE report.

Children isolated in adult prisons commit suicide five times more often than juveniles in the general population, according to the Minnesota Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee. Nationally, many states have limited the amount of time they may hold juveniles in adult jails to six hours in metro areas and 24 hours outside metro areas. The Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division discussed similar limitations Feb. 1.

Strengthening financial relationships between bankers and socially or economically disadvantaged business is the thrust of HF42 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls). The bill would permit certain public agencies and private foundations to contribute money to a guarantee fund to supply short-term, working capital loans for some small and new businesses. The Governmental Operations Committee unanimously approved the bill Feb. 2 and rereferred it to the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee.

Minnesota law denies scheduled pay increases to some state department managers, says Nina Rothchild, commissioner, Department of Employee Relations (DOER). Current law prohibits a department manager from making more than the department's commissioner, she says, sometimes blocking pay increases for managers they would otherwise receive. DOER isn't recommending any change to the law this year, Rothchild reports, but may do so within the next two years. The commissioner testified at an Appropriations State Departments Division meeting Jan. 31. Academics are important, but so are co-curricular and extracurricular activities, students from Twin Cities area schools told the Education Committee Jan. 30. Several students attended the committee hearing to receive a governor's proclamation declaring the week of Jan. 30-Feb. 3 as Minnesota Co-Curricular Activities Week. Committee Chair Rep. Bob McEachern (DFL-Maple Lake) presented the proclamation to a student.

Officials of the Greater Minnesota Corporation (GMC) reported on their activities in Greater Minnesota to a joint legislative hearing Feb. 2. The Legislature established the GMC in 1987 to encourage economic development activity in rural areas.

The missing lynx

Curious and curiouser, as Alice in Wonderland would say. Transportation Committee members gave Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone) a Cheshire cat during a Feb. 1 meeting to celebrate his return after successfully undergoing neck surgery last weekend. Carlson, a big game hunter, recently fell victim to the theft of a full-sized, mounted lynx from his statehouse office. Committee members hope the stuffed cat will help replace the missing lynx.

Rep. Henry Kalis (DFL-Walters), committee chair, read this poem:

It's awful when you're feeling ill, It's bad to lose your Lynx. It's clear that in the case of Doug, Being here must be a jinx.

It's good to see Doug's well again, It's good to see him here. But something still is lacking, He's been through a lot, I fear.

And though you're looking healthy, We can't find your Lynx just yet. But 'til we do, we've gotten you Another little Pet.

GENERAL ORDERS





In 1898, John Francis Wheaton, a Republican, was the first black elected to the Minnesota Legislature. Fewer than 100 blacks lived in the district that sent him to the Capitol. Before his election, Wheaton served as a legislative clerk and deputy clerk of Municipal Court in Minneapolis.

Since Wheaton, only four blacks have served in the Minnesota Legislature. Sen. B. Robert Lewis and Rep. Ray Pleasant, were the first to serve in this century. Reps. Randolph Staten and Richard Jefferson followed. Jefferson currently represents District 57B, Minneapolis.

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
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Nursing home residents would avoid harmful disruptions in bed shifting, if the Legislature passes a bill the Health and Human Services Committee discussed Feb. 9.

Currently, a resident receiving benefits from the Minnesota Medical Assistance Program (a partially state-funded program) who is approved for Medicare (a federally funded program) might have to transfer beds. Such transfers upset

some residents who have occupied their beds for many years. HF326 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) would prevent these moves.

Iris Freeman, executive director, Minnesota Alliance for Health Care Consumers, told the committee that the moves relate only to potential changes in the payment source for residents' care, not their medical status, service, or staffing needs.

Paisley Park 💻

Paisley Park Studios, a plush facility, sits on nine acres of meadow and woodlands in Chanhassen.

The Minnesota Motion Picture and Television Board (MMPTB) invited the House and Senate Economic Development committees to tour Paisley Park Feb. 8. Prince, founder and owner of the studios, wasn't available to greet legislators since he was on tour in Japan. The MMPTB overviewed their contribution to Minnesota's economic development.

The MMPTB promotes Minnesota to producers as a place to make movies. The dollars producers spend in Minnesota turn over about three to four times. Hotel, restaurant, and distribution industries benefit from what producers spend. A myriad of other businesses also benefit from film production crews.

Paisley Park Studios ranks with the Nashville, New York, and Los Angeles recording industries. It attracts many outof-state artists because of its high quality, innovative equipment, and fine facilities.

Buffie Stone, MMPTB executive director, requested additional state appropriations to expand the agency's programs and services. MMPTB is a private, nonprofit agency.

Minnesota banks 🚥

Faced with growing competition and a changing financial landscape, Minnesota bankers asked legislators to reconsider banking laws. They told the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee Feb. 8 that current laws prevent state-chartered banks from fully competing in the financial market — especially the smaller, independent banks.

It's a fact!

The candidate who wins in a general election may not become president because the framers of our Constitution decided, in 1787, that neither Congress nor the people should elect the president. They created the Electoral College.

They reasoned that Congress would be too partisan, and the president would be under its control. And the general population might not be well educated enough, own enough property, or go to the proper church. Therefore, the country couldn't count on the people to make a responsible

decision. President John Quincy Adams (1824), Rutherford B. Hayes (1876), and Benjamin Harrison (1888) won, not in the general election, but through the Electoral College vote. (See "Do you know?" on page 15.)

Bill Sands, president of both the Minnesota Bankers Association and the Western Bank in St. Paul, says it's increasingly difficult for banks to command a share of the market. For example, federal savings and loans and credit unions put convenience banks in supermarkets to handle checking, loans, and other common banking needs. But state laws restrict Minnesota banks from branching in supermarkets; therefore, banks are at a competitive disadvantage.

Sands urged members to consider the economic impact of legislation on the banking industry.

Cocaine babies

Concerned medical professionals, social workers, law enforcement officials, and private citizens came to testify at a Feb. 8 joint committee hearing on cocaine babies born in Minnesota.

Several speakers supported a bill that would require medical personnel to report cases of newborns showing signs of controlled substance exposure. It would also require school districts to develop education programs that encourage proper prenatal care and discourage substance abuse during pregnancy. Many of the witnesses spoke against another bill that would make it a felony for a pregnant woman to use cocaine.

One medical professional testified that cocaine use and problems have exploded in the past year. Statistically, the number of cocaine born babies in metropolitan hospitals has increased.

Several witnesses agreed that cocaine use affects a baby in its early stages, and may have long-term effects as the child gets older.

Members of the Health and Human Services Division of Appropriations and the Criminal Justice Division of Judiciary postponed voting on either bill until Feb. 13.

High school, college credit 📟

High school juniors and seniors can and are taking college courses while in high school, permissible under a 1985 Minnesota law. Critics say, however, that some students are taking advantage of the system by getting the college credit at taxpayers' expense.

The Education Committee heard pros and cons of the Post-Secondary Enroll-

ment Options program during a Feb. 8 meeting. The program allows high school juniors and seniors to take general education classes at college for either high school or college credit. Jessie Montano, Department of Education, says the state picks up the tab if students take college classes for high school credit, while students pay if they want college credit.

But high school officials told lawmakers that some students originally sign up for high school credit, then change that designation once they get to college. As a result, these students don't pay anything for the college courses. Officials say they can't track students' progress in college courses, and that students may take less challenging classes. And, they say, students sometimes fail to let teachers or advisers know soon enough that they're taking college classes.

Committee members plan to draft legislation addressing such concerns.

Judicial system costs

Minnesota's Supreme Court Chief Justice Peter S. Popovich and retired Chief Justice Douglas K. Amdahl say the state should take over from counties the costs of funding trial courts and the public defense system. They appeared before the State Departments Division of Appropriations Feb. 9.

Popovich says the state should assume these costs to ensure equal service and treatment for all Minnesotans, make judicial resources equally available to all parts of the state, and provide for more uniformity of service from the courts,

The total biennial cost of the takeover would be \$75.5 million, according to Popovich. He's asking legislators for a \$71 million appropriation for the 1990-91 biennium, and to require counties to turn over some fee and fine revenue to help reduce state costs.

Amdahl says a state takeover of court costs would be a logical step in the process of current court reforms, and that state financing would solve some problems facing the judicial system. The property tax base varies too greatly from county to county to allow for uniform funding. And, he points out, the judiciary is the only branch of state government that has to go to counties for funding.

Kaolin clay 📟

A future Minnesota clay market could compete with the state of Georgia and Cornwall, England. Kaolin is a type of clay manufacturers use to make paper, pharmaceuticals, and high tech ceramics.

Bill Brice, director, Department of Natural Resources Minerals Division, testified at an Environment and Natural Resources Committee meeting Feb. 7.

Brice says England has the world's best quality kaolin, as well as a second grade of clay found in Cornwall. Minnesota's kaolin deposit is comparable to the Cornwall clay and is marketable.

Southwestern Minnesota has a large deposit of kaolin, second only to Georgia's. Currently, Georgia holds 60 percent of the world market for clay.

Extracting kaolin would require open pit mining of about 80 acres of land for about 20 years, says Brice. Such a mine would produce about 200,000 tons of clay annually. Clay mining would create many local jobs in product refining and transportation industries.

Brice also says land reclamation and environmental protection would naturally follow the mining operations.

American Legion

H. F. "Sparky" Gierke, national commander of the American Legion, says "veterans know the cost of freedom, and we sure know that freedom is not free." He outlined the legion's activities and goals for a joint hearing of the House General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming and the Senate Veterans and Military Affairs committees, Feb. 7.

Gierke is a North Dakota State Supreme Court justice and the first Vietnam veteran to head the American Legion. He visited the Minneapolis Veterans Medical Center earlier in the week, and says "it is the most beautiful center I have ever set foot in." But, he adds, it has a \$6.8 million shortfall, which caused the facility to close 110 of their 725 acute care beds, and 80 of their 120 extended nursing care beds.

Minnesota currently has 492,000 veterans, according to Gierke. And, he says, the state can expect to have 138,000 veterans over age 65 by the year 2000. Federal funding cuts threaten medical care for the growing number of older veterans. Gierke says that the legion also works on children's programs and national security. It contributes to Boys State and Girls State, sponsors over 2,500 Boy Scout troops throughout the country, awards \$120,000 in its high school oratorical contest, and educates children about drugs, teenage suicide, and child abduction.

Disabled Minnesotans

More than 300,000 Minnesotans between the ages of 16 and 65 are disabled, and approximately two-thirds don't have jobs, according to Bill Neiderloh, assistant commissioner for the Department of Jobs and Training Rehabilitation Services Division.

Neiderloh told legislators at a Feb. 7 Appropriations Health and Human Services Division meeting that the department needs money for 31 additional staff people, and for case service dollars — funds that counselors use to purchase services for individual clients. He says fulfilling these requests will add to the department's current resources, and help bridge the gap between job needs and the department's ability to respond to the needs.

The division's largest activity is the Vocational Rehabilitation Services

Program, which helps people with disabilities find or maintain employment, says Neiderloh. He reports that more than 3,600 people received rehabilitation help last year, which reduced public assistance payments by more than \$3.5 million.

Drug-testing guidelines

Possible U.S. Supreme Court rulings later this year could guide employers on drug testing, a legislative analyst says.

The court will probably draw lines for other courts to follow regarding drug testing in the workplace, says Steve Liss, House Research, as he reviewed Minnesota's drug-testing law for the Labor-Management Relations Committee Feb. 6. The federal high court has two drug testing-related cases before it.

Liss says Minnesota's law is a compromise between employers and employees. The 1987 measure spells out when drug testing may occur, such as after an employer offers a job, during a physical examination, or when an employer suspects an employee of using drugs. It also outlines protections for employees and job applicants.

Without the drug-testing bill, Liss says, employers could test at any time. The measure includes "fairly strict safeguards for the rights of the employees," he says.

Teamsters official Jack Mogelson told legislators that his union surveyed labor and management groups on the matter of drug testing. Mogelson says many companies indicated they would wait until the Supreme Court rules on the matter before setting any drug-testing guidelines.


Sexually abused children 🚥

People who were sexually abused as children may have more time to report the abuse if HF154 becomes law.

Current law prevents the state from bringing charges against an alleged child abuser more than seven years after the crime occurred. A member of an Isanti County citizen's support group called "Lean On Me" told the Judiciary Committee Feb. 6 that many incidents of child sexual abuse are not reported until several years after the crime. Then it's too late to prosecute the alleged abuser.

The group inspired Rep. Harold Lasley, (DFL-Cambridge) to author a bill that would allow the state to charge alleged abusers up to seven years after someone reports the crime or until the victim's 25th birthday, whichever comes first.

Some lawmakers expressed concern that extending the statute of limitations could lead to an increased number of false reports. They suggested changing current law to extend the limit to the victim's 21st birthday. But the committee recommended passing the bill with the limit at age 25.

Vocational education report 📟

Plans to restructure high school vocational education would work well with other efforts to reshape the idea about what a high school diploma should reflect, according to a Department of Education official.

Nancy Skelton, assistant commissioner of education, told the Education Committee Feb. 6 that the state must move to an education system based on outcomes, rather than the calendar, to determine credit. Outcome-based education, outlines what students are expected to know at the end of a course, and presumes students will succeed, she says.

Skelton briefed lawmakers on a report about learner outcomes in vocational education. It outlines outcomes broad enough to include all aspects of education, not just vocational. Proposed changes wouldn't mean vocational education will be assimilated into regular education or vice versa, Skelton says.

The report also recommends that: • the Legislature and the State Board of Education be flexible in reaching proposed outcomes;

 state and local education officials support the changes;

• the Legislature, state school board and local districts make both immediate and long-term changes; and

• the Legislature provide funding for the proposals.

AIDS: criminal justice

Minnesota lawmakers grappled with the idea of imposing criminal sanctions against people who willfully pass on HIV, the AIDS virus, through sexual assault.

The Judiciary Committee discussed the impact of AIDS on the criminal justice system at a Feb. 6 meeting. Fern Sepler, Crime Victim and Witness Advisory Council director, told the committee that taking a position now on mandatory testing for the AIDS virus in sexual offenders is premature. "We believe these issues are extremely complex and require additional analysis," she says.

Some people advocate testing sexual offenders for the virus as soon as they're apprehended. However, Sepler says immediate testing has little value, because recently infected HIV carriers may take as long as six months to test positive. A negative test result right after an offense may give a victim a false sense of security, according to Sepler. Therefore, she says, victims need safe, confidential, and free testing starting three to six months after an assault.

Telephone companies 💻

A telephone deregulation proposal that fine-tunes competitive phone laws came before the Regulated Industries Committee Feb. 6. Mike Bradley, assistant attorney general, presented the proposal which is primarily technical and aims to clarify snags in existing deregulation laws. It raised the eyebrows of a few representatives concerned that such provisions would increase rates for consumers.

"Our proposal flat out prohibits any type of rate increases as a result of inflation or any other artificial index. It prohibits the pass-through of depreciation expenses," says Bradley. "...[It] permit[s] the pass-through, either up or down, of other governmental costs, such as taxes....Our belief is that telephone companies gain earnings...through fruits of their labors...and...rate payers gain the possibility of lower rates," he says.

The proposal, which will be introduced as a bill in the coming weeks, would prohibit telephone companies from using competition as a reason for flexible tariffs unless they first elect to have telephone service treated as a competitive service, according to Bradley. It also defines procedures for companies to file rate change cases, similar to laws governing gas and electric utilities, and would use incentive regulation to encourage companies to operate more efficiently and with greater productivity.

Minnesota Safe Kids 💻

Accidents are the number one cause of injuries and fatalities to children, says Carol Bufton, executive director, Minnesota Safety Council. She testified on childhood safety before the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of Appropriations Feb. 6.

Bufton asked legislators to set aside \$20,000 per year for the next five years for "Minnesota Safe Kids," a new childhood safety program. Two national surveys found there is no organization dedicated to childhood safety and accident prevention, says Bufton.

Minnesota Safe Kids would address childhood safety issues and programs. It

would also compile statistics on the nature of childhood injuries. Bufton says statistical information on childhood accidents is unavailable at this time.

The new program will need seed money to get off the ground, she says. State allocations would help attract private funds.



Healthspan, a proposal that would make health insurance available for all Minnesotans, had its first hearing in the Insurance Committee Feb. 8. Committee Chair Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls) says he wants to discuss HF150 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) now to avoid deadline pressure near the session's end. The Insurance and Health and Human Services committees are simultaneously considering different aspects of same bill, an unusual occurrence in the legislative process.

A fluffy white earmuff?

Clue No. 12

The Capitol mall Is the hiding place Look north of a green fence And you'll win the race. By a sidewalk that takes you To a building for vets, Is a fluffy white earmuff With a treasure inset.

All the clues led to the state Capitol grounds last week. Hundreds of treasure hunters like Jon Harper came armed with shovels, hoes, and rakes to search for the King Boreas medallion. The treasure hunt, a St. Paul Winter Carnival annual event, ended early on the morning of Feb. 4 when a St. Paul man found the medallion in a fluffy white earmuff by the Veterans Service Building on the Capitol mall. He shared the prize with his twin brother and a friend. Whew! Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee members toured the Seneca Wastewater Treatment Plant in Eagan Feb. 7 to see the plant in operation. It serves 165,000 people and treats 275 million gallons of wastewater daily. Eight tons of incinerator ash result from the treatment. The Metropolitan Waste Control Commission is studying new ways to recycle the ash.

Women and minorities enrolled in Minnesota Academy of Science programs represent less than half of the enrollment figures, reports Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul). She pointed out the disparity during an appropriations division hearing Feb. 6. Pappas recommends that the St. Paul school keep records of women and minorities in science programs if their goal is to increase participation. Academy officials have asked the state for \$100,000, about 28 percent of their projected budget. Legislators recommend that the school renew its request.

Should the governor's budget include the lieutenant governor's budget? The Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division discussed the idea at a Feb. 6 meeting where they considered constitutional office budgets. The lieutenant governor's budget is the only constitutional office for which the governor recommended an increase. The \$50,000 increase would go toward several children's initiatives, which the lieutenant governor has undertaken at the governor's request. Committee Chair Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) says it "shows an additional link to the governor's office that might make a joint budget more acceptable."

Small- and medium-sized businesses may attend free or low cost seminars that teach business people how to tap foreign markets, among other things. Minnesota Trade Office (MTO) officials told the Economic Development Committee's International Trade & Technology Division that they offer a variety of services to enhance Minnesota's place in international trade. Do you know

Every state has as many Electoral College votes as it has senators and representatives in Congress. Minnesota, with two senators and eight representatives, has 10 electoral votes.

Originally, state legislatures chose Electoral College members. Now, each major political convention chooses its own 10 people (electors).

Electors from the party whose candidate wins in the general election vote in the Electoral College.


Some states' laws allow electors to choose any candidate, but most remain party faithful. Although Minnesota's electors are "pledged, not bound," the winning party assumes they'll vote for its candidate.

Since 1804, electors have differed with their parties' choices 33 times. The 1892 Grover Cleveland and Benjamin Harrison election had the largest number (five) of states with such split electoral votes.

Maryland has had the most "faithless" electors; seven times they've strayed from their parties' winners.

The most recent electoral split was in 1976. Eight of Washington state's nine votes went to Gerald Ford, one to Ronald Reagan.

Minnesota has never had a split presidential electoral vote.

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
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Highlights

Budget deficiencies

Five state departments presented budget deficiency requests to the State Departments Division of Appropriations Feb. 15. Deficiency requests for all state departments amount to \$6.8 million, with all but \$600,000 coming from the general fund.

Department representatives say the deficiencies occur for a number of reasons. Some departments take on activities for which they do not budget; others have cost overruns and unanticipated maintenance costs.

For example, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Parks and Recreation Division says their deficiency comes from firefighting and relief programs associated with last summer's drought, and from increased attendance at state parks. The Legislature allocates division funds from a dedicated fund, while the fees generated from attendance go into the state general fund. The division wants the Legislature to use the extra fee money to clear its deficiency. Chair Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) says this type of deficiency is costeffective because it reallocates funds the activity creates.


The Attorney General's Office says deficiencies in that office result from the state's involvement in major new litigation. His office sometimes contracts with local or specialty attorneys to provide the needed expertise for a case.

Testimony for the governor's Year of the City program attracted more than 200 people Feb. 14 to the Economic Development Committee's Community Stabilization and Development Division hearing room.

Fifteen witnesses from Twin Cities and Duluth neighborhoods talked about the conditions of inner city communities. They addressed issues from childhood health and education to crime and drugs.

Speakers described inner city neighborhoods as culturally and economically diverse. High rents cause many residents to move often. These issues affect urban communities' economic development.

Most witnesses say they're concerned about rehabilitating houses, urban economic development, and encouraging pride and ownership in communities. Many offer solutions for improving urban neighborhoods, focusing on community networks and communications.

The agenda for the Year of the City hearing included guided tours through St. Paul and Minneapolis neighborhoods for senators and representatives.

Wild animals

The wild and exotic animal bill went through a transformation Feb. 14 in the Environment and Natural Resources Committee. The committee removed the bill's original language and amended in new language.

The bill's purpose remains to protect humans, animals, and the environment from harm or damages that wild or exotic animals may cause.

Opponents criticized the original bill as being too general because all exotic or wild animals would have fallen under its regulation requirements. Some opponents said many exotic and wild animals would never survive a Minnesota winter and would not be a threat to humans, animals, or the environment.

The amended bill would require owners of wild and exotic animals to report them to local authorities. It would exempt llama, American bison, and livestock.

The bill would require public meetings to determine the scope of problem wild animals, and which ones should be regulated. The list would tell local authorities where wild and exotic animals are, in the event of injuries or damages.

Owners who don't report their wild and exotic animals to authorities would be guilty of a petty misdemeanor under the amended bill.

Author Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids) says pet store owners and breeders probably wouldn't be regulated, since they would be regulated under game and fish laws.

Nurses Association

Can nurses provide the same services as primary care physicians? Recent studies say they can, according to Gretchen Musicant, a registered nurse. Nurses can perform 70 to 90 percent of the functions doctors perform, she says, and they're better able to give preventive care and communicate with patients.

Musicant spoke for the Minnesota Nursing Association (MNA), at a Health and Human Services Committee meeting Feb. 14. She told legislators that the MNA supports Healthspan, a bill that would provide affordable health care coverage for Minnesotans. They like the bill's emphasis on outpatient and preventive services. Musicant suggests limiting catastrophic costs and placing a priority on preventive and primary care, if legislators need to trim service package costs.

The MNA supports direct reimbursement to nurse practitioners, midwives, and registered nurse anesthetists for medically necessary services, such as prenatal and well-baby care, screenings, and yearly disease checkups. These nurses often charge less than physicians, says Musicant, and studies show that direct billing actually decreases the charges for nursing services.

Sexual violence

Minnesota Attorney General Hubert Humphrey III presented his final report on preventing sexual violence against women to legislators Feb. 15. The report is the work of a task force Humphrey created last year to study the problem.

Humphrey told members of the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division that sex offenders need longer sentences. "Let's put the rapist behind bars and keep him there. Longer and tougher sentences, particularly for those who are repeat and violent offenders and who do not seem amenable at all to any kind of treatment or rehabilitation," will better protect the public, according to Humphrey.

He says the state should offer a broader range of services to victims of sexual violence and set up educational programs that aim to prevent sexual violence in the first place.

HF315 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul) would put many of Humphrey's recommendations into law. Some lawmakers say the bill should also allow judges to sentence repeat violent offenders to life in prison without parole.

The division plans to give the bill a formal hearing Feb. 22.

Contractors =

A bill giving contractors easier access to public jobs gained support in the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee Feb. 14. Author Rep. Kathleen Blatz (IR-Bloomington) says HF279 would give contractors the opportunity to use irrevocable bank letters of credit instead of performance bonds when bidding for public work.

Blatz says letters of credit help small contractors, who can't afford bonds, to bid for jobs with their bank's support. The local unit of government is protected as well, because creditors have an easier time collecting on bank letters. Both letters of credit and performance bonds are subject to identical legal requirements.

The committee recommended the bill to pass.

Law enforcement

"Minnesota law enforcement education has a favorable national reputation," says William Carter, executive director of the Peace Officers Standards and Training Board (POST). Carter testified at the Appropriations Committee Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division hearing Feb. 14.

Carter says the POST Board has a strong commitment to recruiting women and minorities. Of the 7,000 peace officers in Minnesota, 5 percent are women, and 1 to 2 percent are people of color.

Competition among recruiters for women and minorities is tough, Carter

says. There are several theories about why it's difficult to recruit women and minorities into law enforcement careers. Two theories pertinent to Minnesota are that: 1) mentors are lacking in law enforcement for minorities, and 2) recruiters compete with corporations that cultivate minority interest. Corporations offer scholarships, grants, and internships that influence minority graduates to favor corporate rather than law enforcement careers.

Other factors include cultural differences, small population bases, lack of encouragement from career counselors, and the education differences between minorities and whites.

"Recent national research indicates that college is not a deterrent to the recruitment of minorities into law enforcement, and that minorities are better educated than their white counterparts when they are hired by law enforcement agencies," Carter says.

The POST Board is seeking additional appropriations for a staff position to recruit women and minorities into law enforcement.

Brain injuries

Minnesota can expect about 9,000 new cases of brain injured people each year, with over 900 requiring ongoing assistance, according to Eleanor Hands, executive director of the Minnesota Head Injury Association.

Hands told the Health and Human Services Division of Appropriations Feb. 13 that she believes the Legislature's recent failure to pass a mandatory motorcycle helmet law will increase the number of accidents resulting in brain injuries in Minnesota.

She says that nearly two million people in the United states have suffered traumatic brain injury; two-thirds of them are under age 30. Many of these people were articulate and independent before their accidents, and now need help to reach their maximum potential for independence. Independence, Hands says, means employment.

Brain injured people want to work, she says, and the Department of Jobs and Training (DJT) Division of Rehabilitation Services provides the basic service that puts them back to work.

The DJT wants \$7 million for the next biennium to expand basic vocational rehabilitation services and client services.

Workers' compensation


The Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals does the job for which it was created, says Peter Popovich, chief justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court.

"The things that it is attacked for are not based on real fact," Popovich told the Labor-Management Committee Feb. 13. He reported on the Supreme Court's role in workers' compensation disputes.

Changing membership could be a problem with the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals, according to Popovich. "It is rare that judges get reappointed," he says, adding that judges' longevity could lend continuity to workers' compensation issues.

Popovich reports that the Supreme Court overturned only about 8 percent of the workers' comp appeals in 1988. Of the 850 appeals the Supreme Court considered, 170 were workers' compensation matters.

The state supreme court is a court of last resort for workers' compensation cases, he says. Administrative law judges hear disputes first; if appealed, the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals hears them. If a dispute isn't resolved there, the high court hears the case.

Combined budgets

Legislators talked about combining the budgets for the governor and lieutenant governor at a Feb. 13 meeting of the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee.

Lynn Anderson, chief of staff, presented the governor's budget, saying the governor would have no problem if the Legislature combined the two budgets.

Division Chair Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) says the idea came up because the lieutenant governor's budget is the only constitutional office for which the governor requested an increase. The \$50,000 request would pay for children's initiatives which the lieutenant governor pursues at the governor's direction.


Legislators say a combined budget would help them track programs coming from the governor's office.

Living will

A bill that would allow medical professionals to recognize statements people make regarding medical care they want when and if they become unable to make such decisions gained ground in the Judiciary Committee Feb. 10. Members gave the "living will" measure preliminary approval on a vote of 16 to 9.

Minnesota Concerned Citizens for Life (MCCL), a group that generally opposes living wills, backed an amendment that would have killed the bill, according to author Rep. David Bishop (IR-Rochester). He argued against the amendment, which the committee later defeated on a one vote margin.

Mary Senander, Human Life Alliance, told the committee that the alliance opposes the amendment, and that "all living wills are fundamentally flawed." However, several Minnesota physicians, medical ethicists, and seniors testified in favor of a living will saying people should have the right to decide what type of medical care they would receive if, for example, they became comatose.

Minnesota's homeless

Minnesota's homeless include veterans, high school graduates, union members, and adults who have lost their jobs because plants moved or jobs ended. Sue Watlov-Philips, chair of the Minnesota Coalition for the Homeless, presented issues on Minnesota's homeless population to the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions & Housing Committee Feb. 13.

High housing costs and low incomes mean that people must leave their homes and live in cars, emergency shelters, and transitional facilities, says Watlov-Philips. Contrary to popular belief, she says most homeless people are state residents, not transients, and they hold jobs. Watlov-Philips calls the Minnesota homeless problem a "homegrown issue" and asks legislators to give it immediate attention. The number of individuals using shelters, she says, has more than doubled since 1985, and the number of children has tripled—more than 3,000 people per night use shelters.

Watlov-Philips says "...on any given night, between 31 percent and 38 percent of the sheltered population in the state of Minnesota are children, under the age of 18, typically with their parents."

Watlov-Philips started Minnesota's first transitional housing program —a resource program focusing on rebuilding people's lives rather than giving them short-term overnight shelter. She asked legislators to continue strengthening the program.

Regent nominees

The panel that selected nominees to the University of Minnesota Board of Regents considered the entire board, not just individual regents, legislators learned Feb. 13.

During a joint meeting of House and Senate committees on education and education finance, Mel George, Regent Candidate Advisory Council chair, listed candidates for the board openings. He explained the reasoning behind the advisory council's selection process. George also outlined responsibilities for the board of regents as a whole and for individual members. Legislators expressed concern about several areas of the selection process, including questions about affirmative action, political activity, and loyalty to the university. And they were concerned about reports of possible age discrimination regarding the student regent position.

While they would use the list of nominees as a guide, lawmakers said they may consider candidates not included in the advisory council's report. "We will have an open [selection] process in the House," says Rep. Bob McEachern (DFL-Maple Lake), Education Committee chair.

Lawmakers will consider nominations for the student regent, the Fifth District regent, and two at-large regents.

Electric company 📟

A bill that could set a precedent for the state got a hearing in to the Regulated Industries Committee Feb. 13. Rep. Bob Haukoos (IR-Albert Lea), author of HF374, presented a bill that would establish circumstances under which certain utility customers could be considered located outside muncipalities.

In other words, a customer whose property stretches over two power districts may petition for power in one area and then use it anywhere on the property. Such a law would allow Farmstead Foods of Albert Lea to drop its current supplier, Interstate Power Company, and use Freeborn Mower Cooperative, an electric company that offers lower electric rates. Farmstead Foods could cut electric costs and keep the company profitable and competitive in the meat-packing industry, according to Henry Savelkoul, attorney for Farmstead Foods and proponent of Haukoos' bill.

Opponents of the bill say that if Interstate Power loses Farmstead's business, it could raise electric rates for consumers. Interstate Power Company, the bill's major opponent, supports the public policy the Legislature set in 1974 creating service territories to prevent duplication of utility services.

Open enrollment 📟

Open enrollment may be part of the answer to a school district's ills, but school officials say it's not the entire solution. Educators told the Education Committee Feb. 10 that they have problems with the open enrollment law. Open enrollment allows students from one district to enroll in a school in another district.

Open enrollment can spur improved academic programs and facilities, educators say. The law also gives students and parents a choice about education.

Schools now may participate voluntarily in open enrollment, although the law becomes mandatory for the 1990-91 school year.

The law isn't without flaws, school officials say. Students don't have to commit to attending another school under open enrollment, and that creates staffing and funding problems. Also, students enroll elsewhere because of athletics or other extracurricular activities, not for academic programs as the law intended.

Witnesses told legislators the law is good, but could be tightened. They suggested requiring students to tell why they want to enroll elsewhere and forcing them to commit to their preferred school. Educators also suggested athletics restrictions such as "red shirting," or sitting out for a specified time.

"Open enrollment may not solve all the problems facing all the Minnesota schools," says Superintendent Dave Metzen, South St. Paul schools, "but it may be part of the puzzle."



Moving more people for less money is the thrust of a resolution on a traffic management demonstration project on the Interstate 35W corridor between Minneapolis, Richfield, Bloomington, and Burnsville. The resolution, authored by Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls), asks the federal government to authorize and fund a project that would examine alternatives to traditional highway construction projects, such as lane expansion. The corridor has major construction scheduled to begin in the mid-1990s. The resolution is in the Transportation Subcommittee on Surface Transportation.


Minnesota has fallen from a national leading position in the arts. In 1973, Minnesota state government ranked fourth in the nation for supporting the arts. Today, Minnesota ranks 28th. However, the quality of the arts and the arts industry continues to grow in Minnesota in spite of fewer state appropriations. Officials of the Arts Board testified at the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of Appropriations Feb. 15, about the need for more state support to expand and foster artistic development in Minnesota. Does the Department of Finance need an internal auditor? Nellie Johnson, deputy commissioner of finance, answered that question for legislators at a meeting of the Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division Feb. 14, and explained funding increases the department is seeking for the new biennium. An internal auditor wouldn't duplicate the functions of the state auditor or the legislative auditor, she says. And an internal auditor would be able to give department managers early warning of any problems and provide better service from the department.

Appreciation, attendance, and wagering are on the rise for Canterbury Downs, according to Ralph Strangis, Minnesota Racing Commission chair. He told the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of Appropriations Feb. 14, that Canterbury Downs generates jobs and economic development in Minnesota. "My goal is to do everything we can to help Canterbury Downs be successful," Strangis says.

Rising medical malpractice insurance premiums caught the attention of the Insurance Committee Feb. 15. Commerce Commissioner Michael Hatch issued a detailed report showing that the frequency and severity of malpractice claims have remained about the same over the past six years. Hatch says huge increases in doctors' insurance premiums seem unjustified. Officials from The St. Paul Companies, the largest carrier of malpractice insurance in the country, dispute the report's findings, saying the methodology used in the study is flawed. However, Hatch points out that only one of several actuaries who analyzed the report disagrees with the findings.

The judicial branch presented its budget requests for the Minnesota Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, and trial courts to the State Departments Division of Appropriations Feb 10. Sue Dosal, Supreme Court administrator, says the judiciary wants five new staff people and more money when it moves to the new judicial building. They're also asking for additional funding for two new legal staff positions and for changes in the Trial Court Information System (TCIS). Students and faculty at William Mitchell College of Law in St. Paul watched Minnesota lawmakers in action Feb. 13. The future lawyers heard the Judiciary Committee discuss crime issues at a special meeting, where students could get a first-hand look at how the laws they study are made, according to committee chair Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul).

Media Day on the Hill



Professional and student communicators from all over the state came to the Capitol Feb. 16 for "Media Day on the Hill." The program, which the Minnesota House of Representatives Public Information Office sponsored, gave participants an inside look at how a bill becomes a law in Minnesota.

Here, participants questioned House leaders about priorities for this year's session. The panel, seated at the microphones, included, *from the top*, Assistant Minority Leader Rep. Steve Sviggum (IR-Kenyon); Assistant Minority Leader Rep. Terry Dempsey (IR-New Ulm); Speaker of the House Rep. Bob Vanasek (DFL-New Prague); and Majority Leader Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul).

In a mock committee hearing held in the morning, some newspeople became "legislators," "lobbyists," and "citizens" testifying for and against a bill that would establish a lottery. (The bill lost on a 13-13 vote.)

After mingling with House members at lunch, participants went on a Historical Society tour of the Capitol, and then watched legislators debate the "living will" bill on the House floor.

Later, they attended a press conference in the governor's reception room with Lt. Gov. Marlene Johnson.





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
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It's a fact!

"Main Street," when first published, didn't sit well with the residents of Sauk Centre, model for Sinclair Lewis' Gopher Prairie, the town in Lewis' novel.

With that book, Minnesotan Lewis became his hometown's harshest critic and best publicist.

Critics praised the Nobel Laureate for baring small towns as provincial, smug, dull. But accusing fingers wagged at small town bigotry and cruelty. People quoted "Main Street" and joked about Sauk Centre.

In exposing Gopher Prairie's blandness, Lewis wrote, "Life at its most passionate is but a low-grade infection." Attitudes change. In February 1985, the community reveled in commemorating the 100th anniversary of Lewis' birth. The Minnesota House passed a resolution, noting his works "were superb satires marked by unforgettable characters and an unmatched 'ear' for the sound of common speech." Highlights

Lottery

A House gaming division got its first look at a comprehensive lottery and gaming bill Feb. 23.


Members of the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee heard a part of the gaming legislation that would create a state lottery, and regulate charitable gambling and horse racing. It also would form a new public gaming enforcement agency.

Division Chair Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids) stressed the bill's unusual nature. He said the measure would break

ground in state government and would defy a normal organization flow chart.

"We are creating, hopefully, an entity here that has nothing like it in state government. We're not creating a linear flow when we have a commissioner of gaming. There's not one person in absolute charge of everything," Quinn said. "We've created a kind of confederation of independent entities that are related in terms of long range policies, that are related in terms of enforcement."

Members and staff plan to discuss the bill next week, when the committee expects to hear public testimony.



Katie Doyle found the questions of the Health and Human Services Committee a little tiring on the evening of Feb. 22 as her father, O.J. Doyle, responded to them. Doyle, a paramedic representing the Minnesota Ambulance Association, testified before the committee in favor of Healthspan, a bill that would provide statewide health care. Committee chair, Rep. Paul Ogren (DFL-Aitkin), invited Katie to sit with her father during the hearing.

Healthspan testimony

F.B. Daniels, Minnesota Farmers Union spokesman, told lawmakers at a Feb. 22 Health and Human Services Committee meeting that most of the uninsured are rural Minnesotans. Access to health care is a fundamental right in today's society, he said, and Minnesota can't deny its residents care simply because critics say that any state-sponsored insurance program may be abused.

Daniels supports the Healthspan bill that would provide affordable health care to Minnesotans. He says that Minnesota is a state of caring people and has a reputation for taking care of its own. He told legislators that he has faith in them to initiate a program to address the serious health care problem in Minnesota. Rep. Paul Ogren (DFL-Aitkin) is the bill's author.

Great River Road 🖛

The Great River Road. It'll run along the Mississippi River from Itasca State Park in northern Minnesota to New Orleans. On its way south, the federal road project will wind through downtown Minneapolis and join with West River Parkway in south Minneapolis.

Economic development possibilities for the downtown Minneapolis segment are tremendous, says Al Whitman, assistant superintendent, Minneapolis Park Board. "But we live too close to it to recognize its potential."

On Feb. 22, Whitman, along with representatives from two other agencies — the Minnesota Historical Society and the Mississippi River Parkway Commission of Minnesota — presented development plans to the Agriculture, Transportation & Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee.

Developers say they plan to acquire land along the riverfront and convert it to a public park with bicycle and walking trails.

In another phase, they say they plan to excavate waterways and building foundations of the early 1900s. As a result, Minneapolis will have the first archaeological exhibition of urban ruins, they say.

Urban planners say they expect the riverfront area to become prime property. Already, they point out, there are condos, apartments, and hotels on the riverfront. And they predict that housing and business opportunities along the parkway system will continue to grow.

The Great River Road will separate the riverfront public park area from the downtown business district.

Medicare supplements

Senior citizens would have more protection against insurance agents who mislead them about Medicare supplement policies if HF611 becomes law.

Rep.Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls), author of the bill, told the Insurance Committee Feb. 22 that the state should stiffen penalties for dishonest agents who take advantage of senior citizens. "There really is the threat of jail bars here for people who 'rip-off' seniors," according to Skoglund. He says that even though

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most agents are honest, the public needs protection against the so-called "bad apples."

The bill would also set standards for policies that insurance companies can sell as Medicare supplements. Some of the standards would prohibit companies from charging consumers for policy features that are basically worthless, says Skoglund.

The committee plans to take further action on the bill March 1.

Health insurance

Minnesotans without health insurance are getting more attention from state lawmakers.

A spokesperson for American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) told the House **Governmental Operations Committee** Feb. 21 that the state now hires more part-time employees than in the past and many of them have no health coverage. AFSCME argues that the state should strengthen the right of part-time employees, many of whom work another parttime job, to bargain for benefits. Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park), introduced HF100, a bill she says would have "the state attempt to see that all its employees have access to health insurance."

Several lawmakers say the situation points to the larger problem of many working Minnesotans who don't have access to health insurance through their jobs or can't afford the high premium costs. Some legislators mentioned their interest in HF150 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin), a bill that would make health insurance available to all Minnesotans in this situation.

Day care

Early intervention in a child's life can influence that child's future, says Lisbeth Schorr, author of "Within Our Reach: Breaking the Cycle of the Disadvantaged."

The Washington, D.C. author spoke to the Health and Human Services Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 21. Schorr told lawmakers that research shows behavioral and academic problems arise from the early stages in a child's life. She says studies indicate that risk factors troublesome to third and fourth graders include being born to teenagers, low birth weights, lack of adequate health care in early years, and being socially unprepared for school.

The need exists for linking services by "co-locating" and "co-programming," she says. In these links, people from different agencies match their services and tailor them to fit the needs of the people they're trying to serve.

Schorr says low quality day care harms children, while high quality standards may enhance their abilities and behavior.

Minnesota's heritage 📟

Once upon a time Minnesota had a tropical environment, according to Bill Brice, director of the Minerals Division of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). At an economic development hearing, he told lawmakers about concentric geological formations that indicate ancient volcanic activity. And, he said, ancient volcanoes are sources for diamonds

At some historical point, he said, a glacier rolled the earth around and hid many of the mineral deposits. Brice maintains that it's this situation that prompts DNR supervision of exploratory mining activity around the state.

Minnesota's mineral heritage includes metallic deposits, he said. Examples are chrome, cobalt, platinum, titanium, magnesium, copper, nickel, iron ore, and zinc.

Al France, president of the Blandin Foundation, said, "If legislative policies reflect the world as it really is, Minnesota can attract world dollars in the mineral industries."

Both Brice and France testified Feb. 21 before the Rural Resource Development Division of the Economic Development Committee in support of a future legislative minerals commission.

Brice says a legislative commission would benefit the state in establishing uniform mineral policies, environmental protection measures, and marketing initiatives. And, he says, the commission could study the question of who owns the minerals in Minnesota.

International visitors

The Minnesota International Center (MIC) seeks volunteers from the Legislature to host international visitors.

Bill Dean, an MIC board member, outlined the center's Visitor Program for the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee Feb. 21.

According to Dean, MIC officials plan to conduct an interest survey among legislators, generate a statewide focus for the program, and promote Minnesota to Washington agencies that have international visitor contact.

Dean says legislators make the best

hosts for international visitors because they are able to answer questions about local history and current affairs, and can establish contacts with other professionals. When legislators and other government leaders take part in MIC programs, they foster beneficial international relationships, he says.

Many contacts between Minnesota hosts and international visitors develop into information networks, or international trade opportunities, says Dean. Other benefits include cultural enrichment, reciprocal visitation contacts, and a boost for Minnesota's tourism industry.

Naomi Loper, Visitor Program officer, says that so far, MIC has registered approximately 1,600 host volunteers. An average of 1,000 international visitors come to Minnesota each year, and each of them meets between six and 10 people, she says.

Vending machines

Cigarettes, candy, and chewing gum couldn't be dispensed from the same vending machine if a bill the Commerce Committee considered Feb. 21 becomes law.

Author Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls) says HF223 would ban cigarette sales from vending machines in which other products are sold. Skoglund says he hopes the bill would deter youthful would-be smokers by denying them one point of purchase.

"Their addiction depends upon having a ready supply of cigarettes," Skoglund told committee members.

Vending machine products are mixed in only a few instances, he says. "Now's the time to nip this problem in the bud. If we wait awhile to fix it...every vending machine in the state will carry everything from cigarettes to popcorn."

Supporters of the bill note how easily youngsters can buy cigarettes from vending machines. It doesn't matter whether the machines are limited to cigarettes or are multi-product ones, they say. A 16-year-old girl testified that she had no problems buying cigarettes, and even received help in several instances.

A representative from the Tobacco Institute says the industry doesn't oppose the bill. But, he says, the institute believes the bill "is a solution in search of a problem."

The committee gave the measure preliminary approval.

Sales tax 📟

The Taxes Committee began work on a bill Feb. 21 that could change the Minnesota Unfair Cigarette Sales Act to allow wholesalers to sell cigarettes below the legal price. The act currently regulates cigarette sales and tries to eliminate unfair competition among wholesalers and retailers in selling them.

The Taxes Committee also considered another provision in HF266 which would regulate cigarette sales on federally recognized Indian reservations. The tax regulation would require Indian retailers to charge tax to all cigarette buyers except those enrolled on the reservation, and would further define the tax refund policy to Indian retailers.

The committee took no action on the bill; discussion is scheduled to resume next week.

Electric companies

A bill that would allow communities to change their utility service came before the Regulated Industries Committee Feb. 20.

Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids) says his bill would allow the Public Utilities Commission to change service boundaries if the existing service is inefficient or inadequate. Such a provision would give communities the opportunity to change electric companies if another utility offers more competitive rates.

Mayor Elwyn Tinklenberg of Blaine testified in favor of HF619, and asked lawmakers to give municipalities a greater voice in establishing utilities. Minnesota law now defines service area boundaries for utilities. Tinklenberg says that Blaine's major problem is in deciphering the confusing maze of service district boundaries.

"We have a situation in our community where neighbors who live literally across the street from each other, and businesses across the street from each other, pay widely disparate utility rates—as much as 20 to 30 percent and more—from one side of the street to the other," says Tinklenberg.

Opponents of the bill say the service territories the Legislature created in 1974 to regulate electric service without duplication in an area is a good system. The committee plans to hear more testimony before acting on the bill.

Teacher education

Should law require teacher education instructors to spend some time in high school classrooms? And should high school teachers lecture in college education classes?

Legislators discussed these questions in a meeting of the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee Feb. 20 when the Board of Teaching presented budget requests.

Those who answer "yes" to both questions say many college secondary education instructors need periodic reminders about high school classroom needs. Some instructors may be too far out-of-touch to provide adequate training for new teachers, they say.

Supporters of the idea also say that high school teachers should spend some time teaching college education courses, and that college instructors could use their input and expertise to help define the content of teacher education curricula.

Education task force

Parents want more from their schools than just academics; they want schools to help prepare their children for life beyond the classroom as well, says Ken Kelsey, chair of the Advisory Task Force on Education Organization.

He told the Education Committee Feb. 20 that education should focus on students and what they need to know to become better members of society once they graduate.

The task force, part of the Legislative Commission on Public Education, looks at ways to improve the quality of education and the way it's delivered to students. Kelsey's panel outlined goals that would enhance learning opportunities, involve the community in education decisions, and challenge students to go beyond the minimum requirements. It also developed objectives and activities to meet those goals.

Some lawmakers are concerned about the task force's plans to make final recommendations later this year. They say the pace seems too slow and frustrating for some of their constituents.

"We want to take it slow because we want to get it right," says Rep. Bob McEachern (DFL-Maple Lake), committee chair and task force member.

Veterans issues

Issues involving Bronze Star grave markers, cost-of-living allowances, and Agent Orange settlements head the legislative agenda for the state's veterans organizations.

State commanders of various Minnesota veterans groups recently testified before a joint meeting of the House General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming and Senate Veterans and Military Affairs committees. The Feb. 16 meeting was part of Veterans Awareness Day.

Bernie Melter, state commander of Disabled American Veterans and chair of the State Commanders' Task Force, presented an agenda that state veterans' organizations support. The initiatives would:

• reinstate funding for Bronze Star grave markers;

• increase the cost-of-living allowance for veterans' benefits;

 ensure that Agent Orange settlements be discounted as income for public assistance requests; and

• ask for three new state veterans' nursing homes by fiscal year 1991.

Bob Flaherty, state commander, told committee members that the American Legion wants to keep the veteran recreation camps on Big Island in Lake Minnetonka and Big Marine Camp in Washington County. He also presented resolutions to:

• support a May 30 observance of Memorial Day in Minnesota;

• set aside classroom time to observe Memorial Day; and

• allow legion posts to use charitable gaming profits for buildings and grounds upkeep and improvements.


Young inventors showed lawmakers robot arms and other high-tech products they've made with the help of state research grants. They testified before the International Trade and Technology Division of the Economic Development Committee Feb. 21 in favor of HF738 (Reding, DFL-Austin), a bill that would establish a Small Business Innovation Research Bridge Grant program. Minnesota Project Innovation, a non-profit group that promotes high technology innovation in small business, would administer the program. The committee gave the bill preliminary approval.

Postsecondary students may not be "dropping out" as much as "stopping out," educators say. Stopping out of an educational program may more accurately describe what happens when a student leaves school—for employment, financial, or personal reasons—and opts to return to school later. It also would better describe a vocational program which students may not have to complete to compete in the job market. Last week, educators and legislators discussed the "stop out" theory during two meetings of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee. Corporate raiders cause economic upheaval in local communities. The Community Stabilization & Development Division of the Economic Development Committee heard testimony Feb. 23 about corporate takeovers. Dr. Ken Zapp, finance professor, Metro State University, says the state can help local business owners protect themselves from hostile takeovers. Business owners need information about plans of succession, alternatives to takeovers, and financing.

Jailers could not hold juveniles in an adult facility for more than 24 hours in most cases if HF76 becomes law. Bill author Rep. Kathleen Vellenga (DFL-St. Paul) says it's important to make the change for humanitarian reasons and also to meet federal grant requirements. Most states already limit the time to 24 hours or less. The Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division gave the bill preliminary approval Feb. 22.

Educators presented legislative initiatives for educational restructuring, mentorship, and minority recruitment programs to the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee Feb. 22. In educational restructuring, administrators, teachers, parents, and students would design education programs. The mentorship program would allow new teachers to work with experienced teachers to better learn the profession. And because fewer minorities enter teaching as the number of minority students increases, educators say a program would be needed to recruit more minority teachers.

Former Rep. Harold J. Dahl, 58, died of cancer Feb. 20 at a Minneapolis hospital. Dahl was elected to represent District 22B in 1972, and in 1977 was appointed a Wright County judge by Gov. Rudy Perpich. In 1987, Dahl retired from the bench. Legends tell of book bannings and denunciations from the pulpit. A quote from a woman in 1921 says the Nobel Laureate would have faced a lynching party if he returned to his hometown, the model for the novel's Gopher Prairie.

Slowly that anger turned to adulation until in 1985, a century after Lewis' birth, the community wholeheartedly honored the Charles Dickens of America.

Besides the real Main Street, Sauk Centre has Sinclair Lewis Avenue, Main Street Theater, Main Street Cafe, and Winters Main Street Drug Store. Nearby is the Sinclair Lewis Interpretive Center.

Lewis did return to Sauk Centre. His ashes were shipped from Rome, where he died of alcoholism and heart disease in 1951. His remains are in the local

cemetery. His marker reads: "Sinclair Lewis

1885-1951 Author of Main Street"



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
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
It's a fact!

Up until 1920, only male trouser legs showed below voting booth curtains. Thanks to Susan B. Anthony, in 1920, hemlines of female voters appeared.

Anthony was a schoolteacher who worked for \$2 a week. She fought for women's right to vote, and organized the National Women's Suffrage Association.

She traveled in the winter by uncovered wagon across the country to lecture on women's voting rights. In 1872, she voted in Rochester, New York, 48 years before the women's suffrage amendment passed.

That vote resulted in Anthony's arrest and a trial where she couldn't speak in her own defense. The ridicule and conflict only strengthened her determination and resolve that "failure is impossible."

Highlights

Vulnerable adults 🚥

Con artists who target seniors or other vulnerable adults would face stiffer penalties if a bill the Commerce Committee approved March 2 becomes law. Under HF622 (Milbert, DFL-South St. Paul), con artists could face another \$10,000 per violation penalty in addition to the fines under current Minnesota law.

State Attorney General Hubert H. Humphrey III says the measure would target people who prey on seniors or adults with mental or physical impairments. He says the bill focuses on sales pitches that lure these people into spending a significant amount of money.

"We're talking about situations like home repair, mail order sales, telephone sales, investment schemes, medi-gap insurance schemes, pyramid schemes, and miracle medical products," Humphrey told the committee.

The bill would allow the state to use a portion of any money it recovers to educate people on protecting themselves against such con artists. The state Board of Aging would run the education programs.

"This legislation on the one hand sends a very strong signal to those individuals who would be involved in this kind of activity to deter them," Humphrey says. "Secondly, in the instance...where the courts are able to levy those kinds of fines, [they] will go to situations that will remedy the [problems] by education."

AFDC benefits 📟

Lawmakers heard testimony March 2 from Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) recipients and the program's supporters.

The speakers urged members of the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division, to increase AFDC benefits to provide better nourishment, living conditions, and a more wholesome life for children.

Jim Addington, director of the Lutheran Coalition for Public Policy, told lawmakers that costs of housing, food, clothing, and child care put impossible pressures on low income families, more than on other people.

He told the committee that low income people have a strong set of values. "In a paradoxical kind of way, these people tend to express most dramatically, traditional American values of hard work and self reliance," Addington says. The momentum of our economy does not favor low income families, he says. It only increases their problems.

The coalition supports an increase in AFDC grant money, to help recipients reach or exceed the federal poverty line.

Driver's license test

If you apply for your driver's license through the Department of Public Safety (DPS), they'll test you on outdated equipment, says Gary Cunningham, the department's chief examiner.

On March 1, he told the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee about the department's equipment needs. He says that nowadays state-of-the-art equipment is automated.

Cunningham presented the Automated Driver License Testing (ADLT) system to the division. The system is a two-byfour foot unit with a video screen, an examiner's console, and a testing station.

Examiners can compile data at the console as applicants take the driver's test, says Cunningham. Examiners can also monitor types of tests and difficulty of questions, and measure test results.

The testing station is set up with motion picture examples of each question on the driver's test. The ADLT will shut down as soon as the applicant makes seven incorrect answers, he says. Correct answers and scores appear on the screen after the applicant answers each question, so the ADLT serves as an educational device as well.

According to Cunningham, the ADLT would save time for both the examiner and license applicant. People who have trouble reading could understand the test, and it would enable the DPS to test more people and administer a greater variety of license tests.

Supplement insurance

Senior citizens gained a victory in the Insurance Committee March 1. On a 19 to 2 vote, the committee recommended passage of HF611, a bill that would give seniors more protection against insurance agents who mislead them about Medicare supplement policies. The bill would also set standards for policies that insurance companies can sell as Medicare supplements.

Insurance industry lobbyists and some lawmakers criticized a provision that senior groups support. Author Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls) says the provision would prevent an unscrupulous agent from replacing a policy solely for the sake of making a bigger commission. Rep. Brad Stanius (IR-White Bear Lake) offered an amendment that opponents said would weaken the provision. The committee defeated the Stanius amendment.

The bill goes next to the Judiciary Committee.

Accident reduction

Urban segments of the interstate highways are dangerous places to drive because most drivers are traveling over the speed limit, according to officials from the Department of Public Safety.

The Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee heard plans March 1 to control driver behavior on urban interstate lanes.

Tom Warner, director of the Traffic Safety Division, says that since the state raised the speed limit on interstate freeways to 65 miles per hour, people drive fast everywhere. But urban and suburban segments of the interstate freeway are more dangerous and accident prone.

Warner told legislators about the Top Accident Control Target (TACT) program, a pilot project in Minneapolis that monitors traffic areas where accidents and traffic violations are heavy. The program aims to change driver behavior to reduce accidents, he says. TACT strategies include: adding left turn lanes, placing traffic signals and signs; rerouting traffic; and improving plowing, salting and sanding on the roads. Other situations call for more police officers on the road during peak traffic hours.

The department plans to transfer the TACT program to the interstate high-ways.

Pari-mutuel betting

A proposal to allow race tracks to conduct pari-mutuel betting on horse races run at tracks in other states gained initial approval from the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Feb. 28.

HF707 (Kostohryz, DFL-North St. Paul) is a response to financial losses at Canterbury Downs, the state's only licensed race track. The bill would allow the track to televise races during winter and off-season months. Legislators say year-round operations might help make the track profitable. Canterbury Downs presently stands idle for half the year.

The bill would permit the track to broadcast only races run by breeds that ran there the previous year. Provisions would require the Minnesota Racing Commission to approve commingling of pari-mutuel pools at Canterbury with those of another state's track. And the bill would allow Canterbury to offer whatever forms of pari-mutuel pools the sending track offers.

Timber and jobs '


Aspen stands need thinning; some Minnesotans need work. Timber industry managers are proposing legislation to study resource management techniques in Minnesota's forests...and tap unemployed residents as the potential workforce.

John Berguson, Natural Resources Research Institute, presented such a proposal to the Rural Resource Development Division of the Economic Development Committee Feb. 28.

Current information suggests that aspen trees need tending to produce a profitable harvest and a future supply. Institute officials say thinning aspen saplings will increase growth and harvest potential.

Thinning techniques include hand thinning and mechanical thinning. Hand thinning requires 13 labor hours per acre at a cost of \$80 per acre. The mechanical method is strip-plowing the stands into rows at a cost of \$18 per acre.

Division members plan to develop a legislative package for aspen management that would provide jobs in the hand thinning program.

Affordable health insurance for all Minnesotans came one step closer to becoming a reality Feb. 28 when the Health and Human Services Committee gave the Healthspan bill preliminary approval.

HF150 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) would require all Minnesotans to enroll in a health insurance plan by July 1990. A state program would cover people unable to get insurance through an employer, Medicaid, or Medicare. Financing for the \$150 million program would come from a payroll tax on businesses and individuals which would tentatively begin next January.

Edina transit

The City of Edina plans to build a transit system linking shopping malls, apartment complexes, and health care facilities in the southwestern portion of the city. Rep. Mary Forsythe (IR-Edina) presented HF7 to the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee Feb. 28.

The bill would establish a bus line between France and Xerxes avenues, beginning at the Edinborough apartments, and going by the Galleria and Southdale shopping malls to Fairview-Southdale Hospital. Forsythe says the free bus service would help alleviate traffic congestion in the area. And businesses along the route would absorb all bus service costs.

Workers' compensation

Workers' compensation claims need better processing. That's the goal of two budget increase requests the Appropriations State Departments Division heard this week. The Department of Labor and Industry (DLI) and the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals want the funds to improve their computer information systems.

Commissioner Kevin Peters presented the DLI request on Feb. 27. He says his department wants to restructure the workers' compensation data base, computerize tracking of workers' compensation files, and enable remote entry of data from workers' compensation insurers and self-insured employers.

The DLI computers can't keep pace with changes in workers' compensation laws, according to Peters. Management didn't really commit to using the computer system when it was installed, he says, and increasing tasks facing the department require a system update. DLI is asking for almost \$1 million for computer system changes.

On Feb. 28, Chief Judge Paul Rieke presented the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals request of \$31,000 for the next biennium. He says the court needs the new information system to provide efficient and timely services, and to prevent the need for more support staff.

School cooperation

Sharing resources to help enrich learning and erase barriers between school districts is great, school administrators say. But the cost in time to make these interdistrict cooperative efforts work needs examination.

Cooperative ventures use state money to develop new programs or improve existing ones, education officials told Education Committee members Feb. 27. Cooperation is an agreement between school districts to share personnel, facilities, educational programs, or extracurricular activities to enhance students' learning experiences.

While increasing educational offerings to students is desirable, some educators and lawmakers ask whether the time needed to move students from one school to another hurts learning. According to school officials, some cooperating school districts adopted common calendars to address this problem. For example, the schools begin and end the day at the same time, and have the same lunch period. They also have the same number of class periods, and try to schedule teacher development time outside of the school year when possible.

Several representatives suggested that schools having cooperative agreements explore common calendars voluntarily because lawmakers might make such calendars mandatory.

Right-to-Know Act

All workers who come in contact with dangerous materials would receive training about those materials under a bill the Labor-Management Relations Committee heard Feb. 27.

HF300 would remove an exemption for certain employees under the Employee Right-to-Know Act, which the state's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) handles. The state classifies these employees as technically qualified individuals and exempts them from training programs on dangerous materials because of their education or professional expertise. Author Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) says removing the exception would bring the state act in line with federal OSHA regulations.

Proponents of the measure argue that technically qualified individuals may not be able to keep pace with changes in handling hazardous materials, particularly in the health-related fields. Opponents say requiring training classes for all employees may be redundant for some who are knowledgeable in particular areas.

The bill also would allow judges to award up to three times the amount of damages an employee sustains, if a judge finds a dismissal or discrimination charge valid. Currently, the law allows a judge to award only back pay.

The committee gave the bill preliminary approval.

Japanese Language Village

The Department of Education wants the Legislature to make a \$50,000, onetime appropriation for FY'90 to the Japanese Language Village. The money would help defray startup costs for the program's second year. Concordia Language Villages and the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Board operate the two-week summer program at a ski lodge near Biwabik.

Concordia College operates several language villages, where students learn the foreign language and experience the country's culture and heritage. Last year,



During a press conference in the governor's reception room at the Capitol Feb. 28, Chancellor Robert Carothers announced that the Japanese government selected the Minnesota State University System to establish a branch campus at Yuwa Machi, a suburb of Akita in northern Japan. Carothers noted that this campus is only the second one the Japanese have established in partnership with American universities. The Minnesota system ranked as one of three finalists in national competition for the right to operate the Japanese campus. The University of Maryland and the University of Idaho were the other two finalists.

7,000 students, ages seven to 18, attended the programs.

Education Department officials say this is the first Japanese language program of its kind in the nation. The program would use the funds for additional curriculum development, materials, and staff training. Officials made the request at the Education Committee's Education Finance Division meeting Feb. 24.

Regional treatment centers

Minnesota citizens with mental retardation and developmental disabilities may be moved from regional treatment centers (RTCs) and into community group homes of up to six people. A proposal that would implement this action received unanimous support at a Feb. 27 Appropriations Health and Human Services Division meeting.

Sue Abderholden, executive director, Association for Retarded Citizens of Minnesota, asked lawmakers to consider the \$21 million proposal for the next two years in relation to the entire mentally disabled service system. The package, she says, would develop a good, comprehensive service system for the mentally disabled and their families. Failure to act on the proposal will cost the state a lot of money, Abderholden says.

Elderly people, and those who are chemically dependent or mentally ill would stay in the RTCs for care. Mentally retarded and mentally disabled people would be released to group homes within the next six years.

Electric companies

Hearings continued Feb. 27 on HF619 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids), a proposal that would allow the Public Utilities Commission to change electric service boundaries if the existing service is inefficient or inadequate, provided that the change agrees with public interest.

The bill originally pertained only to electric rate problems in Blaine. But other committee members offered amendments to include their own districts in the bill, extending its impact statewide.

The Regulated Industries Committee plans no action on the bill in the near future, but may continue hearings during the interim to gather more testimony.

Drug-free school zones


School children told state representatives that drug dealers frequently try to peddle crack and other drugs at schools and local hangouts. The kids say most of the dealers are high school students, but some are adults in their early twenties.

Washington Junior High School students testified before the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division Feb. 24. Rep. Andy Dawkins (DFL-St. Paul) and Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls) presented similar bills to the division that would create drug-free school zones. People whom courts convict of various drug offenses on school premises, around public parks, or within 1,000 feet of a school bus stop would face more severe penalties than if they were caught and convicted outside the so-called drug-free zones.

Several lawmakers proposed legislation this session that they say would give students greater protection against drug dealers. The division plans to hear more testimony on these and other drug bills.

Tax and child support dodgers could be big losers, if a bill that would permit a state-run lottery becomes law. A provision of HF66 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids) would allow the lottery director to submit information about people who win at least \$1,000 to the departments of Revenue and Human Services. If officials find the winner owes delinquent tax or support payments, the lottery director could deduct the payment from the individual's winnings, and send it to the appropriate recipient. The Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee heard the bill March 2.

Forty-two percent of Minnesota's hospitals suffered losses in 1987, says Rep. David Battaglia (DFL-Two Harbors). He presented a bill to the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee March 2 that he says would give municipalities an opportunity to save the hospitals. HF529 would allow counties, cities, and towns to grant money to private, nonprofit, or public hospitals for construction, maintenance, and capital improvement. Battaglia says the proposal would help small rural hospitals, which are often far from medical centers, to remain open. Dozens of people gave their thoughts to lawmakers at a Ways and Means Committee meeting March 1 on the governor's budget recommendations for FY'90-91. Testimony covered a variety of topics, including housing, education, business, jobs, health care, nursing homes, and children's issues. When the marathon meeting adjourned at 8 p.m., several people still hadn't testified. So Rep. Robert Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) scheduled another meeting for March 6 at 3:30 p.m. to hear more public testimony on the budget.

Technology in criminal apprehension is entering the world of genetics. Officials from the Department of Public Safety presented information to the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee. Officials say DNA identification systems work best for catching suspects involved in major crimes, including rape, assault, aggravated assault, and homicide. DNA identification involves testing bodily fluids, such as blood, semen, and hair follicles left at the scene. Officials say using DNA testing to identify a suspect has 1 to a trillion odds of error.

It's easy to recycle pop cans, but what about houses? A bill heard in the Financial Institutions Housing Division meeting Feb. 27 could help house-movers recycle older homes without having to meet new building codes when moving them from one area to another. HF595 would save homes displaced by new developments. Author Rep. Rich O'Connor (DFL-St. Paul) says the bill would help prevent wasteful destruction of good homes.

Along with a high quality of life, Minnesota has one of the highest illegal drug use rates, according to Commissioner Paul Tschida, Department of Public Safety. Tschida told the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee about drug use and drug dealers in Minnesota. Minnesota had the largest marijuana confiscation in the history of the United States, Tschida says. Statewide, Minnesotans use cocaine most often. But crack, a cocaine derivative, stays primarily in the Twin Cities. Crank, an amphetamine, has only seasonal use; motorcycle gangs use it most often. The heroine population has remained constant. Minnesota has 50 to 60 known drug dealers, but no resources to go after them, Tschida says.

"People helping people" is the strength of credit unions, according to representatives from the Minnesota League of Credit Unions, who say that the member-owned and cooperative nature of credit unions helps drive the \$11 million industry. League members gave an overview of credit unions' financial health in Minnesota to the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee March 1. Some interesting facts: one million members belong to Minnesota's 160 state chartered credit unions — Honeywell, Inc. alone boasts 16,000 members.

Postsecondary students who incur large debts may be learning a bad lesson. State University System Chancellor Robert Carothers told the Appropriations Education Division March 1 that debt influences other facets of students' lives, and infers that it's okay to be deeply in debt as they begin their lives after college. Carothers says channeling state money into campus work-study programs rather than into loan programs is the way to go. Then, he says, students could work in their chosen discipline and study under the guidance of teachers in that field. "Dancing in the Dark" is the name of a song and, in the verb sense, may become legal in Minnesota if a bill heard in the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee becomes law. HF620 (Kostohryz, DFL-North St. Paul) would repeal 1923 era laws that restrict dancing and dance halls. The committee gave the bill initial approval Feb. 28.

Baseball and hotdogs may be a familiar combination, but what about football and cheese? The single largest retail cheese sales occur one week prior to professional football's Superbowl,

according to Peter Hardin, editor/ publisher of "Milkweed," a monthly dairy economics report. He told the Agriculture Committee Feb. 27 that 1988 was the best year so far for cheese sales.

Victims of sexual assault may have more time to bring civil actions against their assailant if HF461 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) becomes law. The bill would allow victims to file suit up to two years after they discover they have suffered psychological difficulties or other problems as a result of the crime. Current law requires victims to file a lawsuit within two years of the crime. The Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division gave the bill preliminary approval Feb. 28.

Do you know

Students like to see the month of March roll 'round. To them, it means spring break. The Irish, and the would-be Irish, welcome it because of St. Patrick's Day. But nationally, and in Minnesota, it's also Women's History Month. The governor proclaimed it such on March 17, 1987 as a time to recognize efforts and achievements of Minnesota women.

Nationally, it began in 1977 when women in a Sacramento, California community discovered that few books in school libraries related to lives of women. That's when Molly MacGregor and Bette Morgan organized a move to do something about it. They teamed up with the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women and got Sonoma County Schools to designate the week of March 8 as Women's History Week. The rest, as they say, "is history."



Women have come to the Capitol each year for the last five years to talk to legislators about their concerns. On Feb. 27, about 300 women representing 170 organizations from around the state marched from Christ Lutheran Church to the Capitol. The Minnesota Women's Consortium sponsored the "Women Come to the Capitol" event.

Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain) made it to the speaker's chair during the Feb. 27 session. Redalen, the Independent-Republican nominee for speaker of the House earlier this year, lost the contest to Rep. Robert Vanasek (DFL-New Prague). In accordance with tradition, he appointed Redalen acting speaker while he was off the House floor.

The ten enrollment options programs available to students led the Department of Education to ask the Legislature for two new staff positions. The positions would help the department's Education Finance and Analysis Section analyze student involvement in the programs. The state's responsible for transferring funding among school districts that have gained or lost students, developing program-based funding, and analyzing factors causing changes in enrollments due to the enrollment options programs.

Although Minnesota had the highest voter turnout in the last election, state officials want even more people at the polls. A provision in HF630 (Osthoff, DFL-St. Paul), would allow election judges to pass out "I Voted" stickers to people as they leave the polls. Individuals, companies, or foundations would donate the stickers to the state.

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
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It's a fact!

From its founding in 1851 until the late 1800s, women weren't part of the University of Minnesota campus scene.


It changed forever in 1869 when William Watts Folwell, a man with a vision for a "Twentieth Century University," became the University's first president, and the school became the first state university in the country to offer classes for both men and women.

Although Folwell's bold, visionary ideas eventually cost him the University presidency, the institution attracted many female students, some of whom became well-known in the traditionally male fields of chemistry and medicine. In the fall of 1988, the University's day-school enrollment totaled 25,962 females and 28,555 males. (See Do you know? on page 5.)

Highlights

Gaming department

A bill that would create a department of gaming and separate divisions for charitable gambling, pari-mutuel horse racing, and a lottery earned unanimous approval from the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee.

On March 9, the division approved HF66, a comprehensive bill that outlines duties of a gaming commissioner and division directors. A fourth division of inspection and enforcement would fall under the commissioner's direct control.

Bill author Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids) says the commissioner would not have absolute control over gambling or games. For example, he says, the lottery director would operate and manage that division independently.

"This is a gaming division, but it's a confederation. It's not an entity where there's a czar, a kingpin, or an absolute controller," says Quinn. "That commissioner is not the sole [source] of power in that agency."

He says the commissioner would have appointment authority for agency executive positions and would sit on all division boards.

The Gaming Division sent the bill to the full committee for further consideration.

State mandates

A bill that would require the state of Minnesota to back up its mandated programs with funds became a topic of debate in the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee March 9.

HF523 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley) defines "mandate" as a requirement the Legislature, a state agency, or a judicial authority imposes on political subdivisions (cities, towns, school districts, or counties). Under the bill, the state auditor's department would estimate financial costs to local governments for legislative- or agency-mandated programs.

Committee members praised the idea of making the state pay for its mandated programs, but criticized the bill's first draft, saying it needs clarification.

HF523 will need approval from two more committees before it reaches the full House.

Bilingual interpreters

Minnesota is home to some 55,000 people of the Asian-Pacific population. More than half of them speak Cambodian, Hmong, Lao, or Vietnamese as primary languages, according to information from the Department of Human Services (DHS).

During a March 8 meeting of the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division, the DHS asked the Legislature to add more than \$300,000 during the next two years to the Medical Assistance program to pay for bilingual interpreters.

The money would go out in grants to local health care providers to hire paraprofessional foreign language interpreters, so refugees and others who speak little or no English can obtain health care. The department says both clients and health care providers need interpreter services to make sure they properly communicate symptoms and diagnoses.

The information also states that 20 percent of the Hispanic population needs interpreters to obtain adequate health care services.

MHFA audit report 📟

Legislative auditors reinforced the central message Commissioner Jim Solem of the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency (MHFA) stated earlier this session: that people are being priced out of home-ownership markets, and changing demographics for the 1990s will soften the rental and home-ownership markets.

Between the years 1995 and 2000, a major decline will occur in the number of households headed by those under age 35, says Elliot Long, Legislative Auditors' Office. Long, the audit project manager, spoke to the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee March 8, saying that fewer starter homes will lead to a softer market, with a slow-down in new home construction.

Auditors suggest that the MHFA challenge state housing policy to seek better ways of serving low-income people. Long agrees with MHFA's policy of preserving the livability of existing homes and residential buildings.

The MHFA has done an outstanding job in serving low-income people, auditors say, and their programs (e.g., Single Family Mortgage Program, Home Improvement Loan Program, Multi-Family Development Loan Program) are well-run.

Academic excellence

Academic achievement should be in the limelight, not the shadow of athletic accomplishments, according to the Minnesota Academic Excellence Foundation. On March 8, the Education Committee heard several ways the foundation spotlights academic competence, including academic letters or pins, statewide recognition of top high school seniors, and academic competitions.

The foundation specifically recognizes outstanding academic achievement of students, teachers, or school administrators from kindergarten through 12th grade. Besides recognizing learning and school-based activities, the foundation also notes community leaders' contributions.

The foundation plans to set up an academic association to foster scholastic

competition and recognition, similar to the Minnesota State High School League's aim to highlight athletic and arts achievements. A task force designed the association's structure to include membership, models for programs and recognition, uniform rules and regulations, and information coordination among schools, districts, and communities.

Child care

Nearly 4,665 undergraduate students with dependent children attended Minnesota Schools in 1987-88. They had a total of 8,460 children. Of those, only 351 children enrolled in on-campus child care facilities, with 427 on waiting lists.

The Governor's Task Force on Child Care in Higher Education gave its recommendations to the Higher Education Division of the Education Committee March 8.

Pat Gosz, task force chair, says the student's average age is increasing, and they're more likely to have children. Parent-students want to attend institutions that have child care facilities, Gosz says, and they're demanding more campusbased child care facilities.

The task force report indicates that the need for child care often discourages parents from continuing their education. Students have erratic academic and employment hours. Parent-students need child care that's affordable, safe, and developmentally appropriate.

Task force recommendations include giving parent-students support and information, establishing more campusbased child care, offering better coordination of financial aid for child care needs, and accrediting child care centers.

International trade

Minnesota should increase its efforts to educate and prepare interested businesses in exporting, says Rep. Leo Reding (DFL-Austin).


The Economic Development Committee's International Trade and Technology Division met March 7 to develop a bill that would improve programs that help small- and medium-sized businesses export products and services to the world market. The bill would call for more workshops, written materials, and videos to give business people resource information about markets and trade leads.

The Minnesota Trade Office (MTO) currently offers some services that meet the division's goal. However, lawmakers and MTO officials agree they should increase outreach efforts to help more Minnesota businesses. Dr. Richard Bohr, MTO executive director, says his office also wants to strengthen efforts to help farmers export agricultural products.

The bill would also encourage the state to increase its presence in other countries through foreign trade offices that help develop the MTO's long-range goals of more public/private partnerships and lasting trade relationships.

Roger Prestwich, MTO education coordinator, told the division that smalland medium-sized business owners are becoming aware of the internationalization of Minnesota's economy. "New opportunities are opening up in world markets that can yield very positive benefits for Minnesota in the shape of new jobs and new wealth," says Prestwich.

Bohr says he's optimistic that Minnesota's enormous success in trade with China and other countries will enable Minnesota businesses to find increasing success in both traditional and new markets. Bohr also points out that academic, cultural, and civic relationships build solid ties with other nations and strengthen international trade.



St. Peter may have become Minnesota's capital city some 130 years ago, but legislator "Jolly Joe" Rolette stole the bill that would have authorized the move, hid in a hotel for eight days, and returned just as the 1857 session adjourned — too late, of course, for action. Craig Nelson of St. Peter revives the story as he atones for this crime before a mock court. He recommends St. Peter as the site for a new veterans' home in southwestern Minnesota. St. Peter is one of four sites the Legislature is considering for the project. The event took place in the Capitol Rotunda March 6.

Bronze Star grave markers

Minnesota veterans want the Legislature to reinstate the Bronze Star Grave Marker Program. The idea gained initial approval in the Veterans Affairs Subcommittee of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee March 7.

HF121 (Beard, DFL-Cottage Grove) would allow the commissioner of veterans affairs to provide burial markers for eligible veterans to county veterans service officers or any congressionally chartered veterans' organization.

The Department of Finance expects the program to cost about \$30,000 each year. A department survey indicates an immediate need for more than 3,600 markers for veterans who died during the last year. And, since the program ended in 1981, the organizations need 14,000 markers to satisfy back demand.

The bill goes next to the full committee for further consideration.

Casino video games

Joe Novak, state director of Liquor Control, says there are 1,700 video gambling machines in Minnesota. Some operators pay game prizes in cash. And this is illegal, Novak says.

The Department of Public Safety gave a brief overview on video gambling machines March 7 to the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee.

Indian gambling practices, which the federal rather than state government regulates, may have caused the problems with illegal cash prizes, Novak says. Until October of last year, casino operators on Indian reservations could legally pay cash prizes. Since then, the federal government prohibited the practice.

Novak says the state plans to prosecute 24 operators who have paid video game prizes in cash. If a court finds the defendants guilty, the state would confiscate and auction off their video gambling machines.

Finding the video casino games is difficult. And proving the owner guilty is another problem, he says.

The state licensing system for video machines works interdependently with counties, cities, and state government. "It becomes increasingly difficult to determine proper licenses and payoffs, but it's not a serious problem to us," Novak says.

Wetlands •

Wetlands recharge and hold ground water, natural resource officials say. They act as a natural filter, serve as flood control, and provide wildlife habitats.

More than 75 percent of Minnesota's original wetlands have been drained or filled, says Don Dinndorf, Minnesota Conservation Federation. And the state has lost more than nine million acres of surface water in less than a century. Other natural resource officials report that Minnesota annually loses about 5,000 acres of wetlands.

The Environment and Natural Resources Committee considered a proposal March 7 that would make draining wetlands illegal.

"We're finally realizing that these wetlands are not wastelands," says

Rep. Marcus Marsh (IR-Sauk Rapids), and that "...they're extremely important to this state and this nation."

Marsh says HF31 would stop wetlands drainage. But it would allow land users to drain a wetlands area it they can open another of equal size elsewhere.

Critics of Marsh's proposal say many farmers drain their wetlands to make croplands. Passing this bill would prevent them from continuing that practice. And, they say, the bill would adversely affect land developers.

But Marsh says those whom the bill impacts "would be eligible for the Waterbank Program so they can be compensated for their property."

Farmamerica

Rod Searle spoke to legislators at a March 6 Agriculture Committee meeting, but this time he wasn't in the speaker's chair.

Searle, a former speaker of the House, urged lawmakers to support Farmamerica, the agricultural interpretive center in Waseca County. Searle told lawmakers that the center displays Minnesota agriculture from the 1850s to the present. He says approximately 4,000 people visited the center last year, during the May through October season. The center charges admission — \$2 for adults, \$1 for children.

Farmamerica supporters asked the Legislature for \$604,000 over the next two years to cover operating costs.

The committee recommended that the bill pass and rereferred it to the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

Enlistment incentives

The Minnesota National Guard wants to recruit and retain members, and provide more educational opportunities for them.

To help reach these goals, Guard representatives asked legislators to make some changes in, and provide additional funding for, the Tuition Reimbursement and the Cash Bonus Payment programs.

The Tuition Reimbursement Program reimburses up to 50 percent of a Guard member's tuition costs. The Cash Bonus Payment Program pays \$100 to members who aren't participating in the tuition program. The Guard wants the Legislature to combine the programs into one appropriation, enabling administrators to exchange funds between them to deal with possible shortfalls in either program. Also, they want the Legislature to raise cash bonus payments to \$300.

The Guard presented its biennial budget request to the Appropriations State Departments Division March 6. Their request for these programs totals \$10.2 million.

Student work hours

A bill that would impose a curfew for students on school-night work passed its first test in the Labor-Management Relations Committee March 6.


If it becomes law, HF331 would place an 11 p.m. employment deadline for 16and 17-year-old student workers. It also would impose a \$50 fine per employee if the employer violates the curfew.

Author Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury) says late-night work may mean students juggle their time between their jobs and other activities. He says classes often begin around 7:15 a.m. or 7:30 a.m., and, if students work past 11 p.m. the previous evening, it "doesn't leave a lot of time for them to get the rest they need, let alone complete their homework or participate in extracurricular activities."

Supporters of the bill also say attention in class and school work suffer when students work late into the night.

Opponents say parents or guardians should decide whether children work. They also ask whether banning late-night working hours would result in students paying more attention to their studies.

"Where...do we stop making choices for outcomes that take place in other areas of life? asks Rep. Steven Sviggum (IR-Kenyon). "There's a whole bunch of situations other than work that [affect the] students in the classroom."

Victims' rights

Sexual assault victims may have more time to bring civil actions against their assailants under HF461 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), a bill the Judiciary Committee approved March 6.

The bill would allow victims to file suit up to two years after they discover they have suffered psychological difficulties or other problems as a result of the crime. Current law requires them to act within two years of the time the crime occurred.

A provision in the bill would open up some cases that the courts denied because the time limit expired. These victims would have until Aug. 1, 1990 to file a civil action.

Crime victim advocate Fern Sepler says it's essential that victims have more time to sue for such things as the high cost of psychological treatment they've received. Sepler points to reliable medical evidence that suggests many victims don't realize the cause of their problems until several years after the crime.

Tenant rights

Building owners and tenants would be able to resolve disputes at a neighborhood organization bargaining table instead of bringing their cases to court under HF136, a bill the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee considered March 6.

High court fees and fear of rent increases discourages some tenants from pursuing cases against building owners who fail to make repairs when inspectors cite building code violations, according to bill author Rep. Andy Dawkins (DFL-St. Paul). He says a neighborhood organization monitoring building safety could also force landlords who operate fallen-down and vacant property to improve their buildings.

Dawkins says his bill aims to eliminate the "bad apples at the bottom of the barrel," who disobey housing code citations. It's not directed at those who lawfully correct violations.

"It simply requires landlords to comply with the law and correct housing code violations, and for those landlords...[who refuse to follow] the law, there are some consequences," says Dawkins.

MAXIS

Minnesota could save over \$71 million by 1999 with a new statewide automation system called MAXIS.

The computerized system would automatically determine a client's eligibility, and calculate and issue their benefits, says a spokesperson from the Department of Human Services (DHS). It would also handle case management and accounting, and give highest priorities to the AFDC and Food Stamp programs.

He told the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division March 6 that the program would automate tasks that local agency financial workers throughout Minnesota routinely perform. The program would help eliminate errors, and provide faster and more coordinated client services.

The DHS wants more than \$7 million and 29 positions over the next two years to complete system development and implementation.

Do you know


Warren Clark Eustis and Henry Martyn Williamson made their mark in Minnesota history, not as explorers, legislators, or sculptors, but as the first graduates of the University of Minnesota.

In 1873, the citizens of Minneapolis gave a public banquet to honor the graduating class of two.

University President William Folwell, pushing his muchopposed dream of a "Twentieth Century University," spoke at the celebration.

Even though he said, "Had we pursued a different policy heretofore, we could have shown you a greater number of graduates today," he didn't apologize.

Instead, he quoted an old Greek fable: "A wolf upbraided a lion for bringing forth only one cub at a time. 'Yes,' said the lioness, only one, but a lion!" And then, triumphantly, Folwell said, "We present you twin lions of whom we have no reason to be ashamed."




Bicycle owners can travel more than 5,670 miles on bike routes along Minnesota's highways. There are more than 2.5 million bicycle owners in the state, according to the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT). Minnesota has 5,072 miles of railroad tracks; 132,700 miles of streets and highways; 19,400 bridges; 141 airports; 231 miles of navigable waterways; and four major ports. MnDOT officials say maintaining and improving public transit systems will be their goal for the next few years.

Real estate appraisers would need licenses to continue their trade under provisions of a bill the Commerce Committee heard March 9. HF624 (Morrison, IR-Burnsville) would require real estate appraisers to have licenses and keep up with any changes in their field. It also would establish a real estate advisory board and a fee structure.

Ambulance service operators told the **Governmental Operations Committee** March 9 that the Department of Health hasn't addressed serious problems in the training and testing of emergency medical service (EMS) workers. EMS workers testified in favor of HF428 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey), a bill that would transfer authority of EMS matters from the Health Department to the Department of Public Safety. Proponents say the Health Department is too big and the interests of the EMS workers aren't a priority there. They contend that Public Safety would better handle the current problems. Many lawmakers support the change, saying the battle over "turf" isn't as important to them as ensuring quality emergency medical services to Minnesotans.

Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples) received a Bush Foundation Fellowship. He applied to the Harvard School of Management, and likely will begin the program in late summer. The program leads to a master's degree in public administration.

What should determine how long students receive postsecondary financial aid? The Education Division of the Appropriations Committee will consider that question when fashioning the Higher Education Coordinating Board's (HECB) budget. Students now receive financial aid for four consecutive years of attendance. It starts when they first enroll and ends four years later, regardless of whether they finish their programs. On March 7, HECB asked the division to eliminate the consecutive-years requirement.



Veterans packed a committee room to hear presentations for a new veterans' home in southwestern Minnesota. Representatives from the seven cities vying for the home testified at a joint meeting of the House Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming and the Senate Veterans and Military Affairs committees March 8. Legislators will decide the location this session.

Minnesota's water resources may be depleted before the next century, says Ron Nargang, director of the Department of Natural Resources Water Division. Glacier movements left aquifers, or underground lakes. Nargang recommends better management of water resources in ways that won't hurt the agricultural industry. Right now, farmers don't understand the need to conserve water, says Nargang. But when they do, they'll be smart water resource managers. Nargang says the state of Texas depleted its largest aquifer, and now its land mass is slipping under the Gulf of Mexico. Minnesota has a similar aquifer holding up the land mass, and an opportunity to manage it wisely, Nargang says.

Adults who buy liquor for underage drinkers may face increased sentences under a proposal the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division approved March 7. HF445 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul) would impose a five-year prison term on the buyer if the minor suffers death or serious injury after drinking the alcohol.

Auto parking at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport leads the list of concession receipts (food, beverages, gifts, etc.) and accounts for 26 to 28 percent of the Metropolitan Airport Commission's (MAC) operating revenue since 1985. That's more than total traffic fees and terminal rentals. The MAC owns and operates the airport, leases land, buildings and runways to airlines, services the airport and airfield, and provides fire and police protection services.

MAC administrators spoke to a joint meeting of the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs and the Transportation committees considering a commission budget overview March 3.





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

Under coats of paint in the State Capitol Cafeteria are German and English inscriptions that once gave the eating place a rathskeller (tavern) decor. The inscriptions, which a Minnesota Historical Society project is now restoring, have a "here-today-and-gonetomorrow" history.

In 1917, Gov. J.A.A. Burnquist, concerned about anti-German feelings of World War I, ordered the inscriptions painted over. They remained covered until 1930 when Gov. Theodore Christianson began a restoration. At the request of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Christianson changed the wording of three mottoes, but the inscriptions stayed until 1940. Then redecorators again put them under paint.

Now, almost 50 years later, they'll return, bringing back a flavor of history that was repeatedly brushed away.

Highlights

State flag

Rev. William M. Becker, associate pastor of the Church of St. Pius X in Rochester, wants Minnesota to adopt a new state flag. He explained the flag's history to the Governmental Operations Committee March 16, and brought along a sample of the new design.

Designers of the flag say it better identifies Minnesota and its ideals. The wavy field in the flag represents the Dakota Indian word "Minisota," which means "sky-tinted waters." They say the North Star symbolizes Minnesota's statehood, northern location, and our guidance and hope for the future. It also recalls the explorers, pioneers, and immigrants whom the star guided northward to Minnesota. It bears a trefoil which marks due north on a compass. A sprig of Norway pine (state tree), two loons (state bird), and a lady slipper (state flower) make the three-pronged shape.

The colors in the flag represent Minnesota's natural qualities: blue for lakes and rivers, green for fields and forests, yellow for mineral wealth, and white for winter snows. Some lawmakers suggested that the flag should have more white, in light of a recent snow storm.

Many committee members support studying the proposal.

School breakfast

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day, teachers reminded the Education Committee March 15.

"It's very difficult to pay attention in class and learn all the wonderful things the world has to offer if your stomach is talking and your mind is resting," says Brenda McDaniel, a teacher from St. Paul's Webster Magnet School.

The committee discussed HF789 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul), which would authorize schools to survey parents to determine interest and need for a breakfast program. And it would appropriate \$400,000 to help more schools provide breakfast.

Teachers told legislators that, for a variety of reasons, school meals may be the only meals some children get. They also say students perform tasks better and pose fewer discipline problems if they've eaten.

The bill would require schools to offer free or reduced-price breakfasts by the 1991-92 school year if more than 35 percent of the parents surveyed express an interest. It would make the breakfast program mandatory in districts where more than 40 percent of the students qualify for free or reduced-price lunches.

The committee sent the bill to its Education Finance Division for further consideration.


Soy-based ink

Ink technology has reached a point where soy-based ink compares with other ink standards and applications, says Jerry Schoenfeld, representing the soybean growers. He says soybean oil is fast becoming printers ink.

The Rural Resource Development Division of the Economic Development Committee heard a bill March 15 that would require the state printer to use soybased ink.

Berry Conway, from the state printer's office, says that requirement would put his office at a competitive disadvantage.

"Regarding supplying soy-based ink, there's an issue of cost," Conway says. "Each pound of ink [costs] thirty-five bucks. There are about 700 colors we would have to stock at five pounds each. It just doesn't make any sense. We buy it as we need it."



The red caps are coming. John Lennes of Minnesota Business Partnership, Inc. sits among boxes of red caps, all sporting the motto, "Put a cap on state spending." His organization distributed the caps March 13 to legislators to kick off a statewide campaign to restrain state spending. But during the organization's press conference, members of the Minnesota Federation of Teachers peered through the windows of the room in the State Office Building carrying protest signs and chanting, "Red caps...No; Children...Yes!

Schoenfeld says state initiatives and soy-based ink research have merged in a timely manner. Soybean growers anticipate demand for the supply, he says.

The division plans to hear a comprehensive presentation about the printing industry before deciding whether to send the bill, HF1142 (Winter, DFL-Fulda), to the full committee.

Lottery

A proposed state lottery moved a step closer to becoming a reality on March 14 when the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee voted to recommend passage of HF66 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids).

The bill would create a department of gaming with divisions to regulate charitable gambling, pari-mutuel horse racing, and a lottery.

The committee removed language in the bill that would have allowed people

who win lottery prizes of \$50,000 or more to withhold personal information from the public.

Rep. Linda Scheid (DFL-Brooklyn Park) supports removing the provision for the sake of credibility and the public's perception that the state is running the lottery openly and honestly. Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul) says the public needs to know that "there are some genuine winners" to have confidence in the lottery.

Rep. Gil Gutknecht (IR-Rochester), who originally amended the provision into the bill in the committee's Gaming Division, says the issue is one of exploitation. He notes that when people's names become public, they often have to move and change their phone numbers because they're threatened, robbed, and badgered. "I don't think [that] because someone buys a dollar ticket...[the] state [has] the right to further exploit [them]," Gutknecht says.

The bill goes next to the Judiciary Committee.

Real estate appraisers

Spirited debate preceded the Commerce Committee's initial approval March 14 of HF624, a bill that would regulate real estate appraisers.

Author Rep. Connie Morrison (IR-Burnsville) says the regulatory measure anticipates new federal requirements for real estate appraisals for federal loans. The bill would put the state Department of Commerce in charge of licensing, and would require real estate appraisers to attend education courses for license renewal.

Committee members debated an amendment that would exempt from licensing any bank and savings and loan employees who perform real estate appraisals for their institutions.

But Morrison argued against the amendment, saying that no real estate appraisers should be exempt, and that expected federal changes would make the exemption meaningless.

The committee changed the amendment to require appraisers to notify customers in writing if they aren't licensed. Committee members approved it, and sent the bill to the Governmental Operations Committee for further review.

Immigrant services =

Christopher Thao, a Twin Cities Hmong resident, urged lawmakers at a March 14 meeting of the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division to establish and fund programs to help mentally and emotionally disturbed immigrants. The federal government helps with employment, he says, but personal injury problems don't get attention.

Thao told legislators that coming to the United States was like starting over. New immigrants are like injured workers, he says. They need medical care, retraining, and rehabilitative services to perform again. Thao says it's time for the state to step in.

Earlier this month, the Department of Human Services asked the Legislature for more than \$600,000 during the next two years to help selected counties with refugee social adjustment intervention programs and to reduce the risk of longterm mental illness.

RICO

Law enforcement officials would have more power to prosecute criminals who engage in so-called money laundering and racketeering activities under HF837, a bill the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division approved March 14.

According to author Rep. Phil Carruthers (DFL-Brooklyn Center), the racketeer influenced and corrupt organization (RICO) bill would give law enforcement officials new tools to remove the incentive of illegal profits from drug trafficking and other violent crimes. He told the division that "RICO is one of the most important bills that we're considering this session in terms of fighting crime."

The bill would also allow prosecutors to go after corrupt organizations or enterprises, as well as individuals. Critics argue that RICO laws are too broad and give prosecutors too much authority. Carruthers says the bill would make it easier for law enforcement officials to confiscate illegal profits that feed criminal activities.

Consumer taxes

The Minnesota Merchants Retail Association supports an environmental protection bill even though retailers would have to collect additional taxes. HF417 (Munger, DFL-Duluth) would create new consumer taxes on hazardous products.

Supporters say passage of the bill would require retailers to tax such products as paint, motor oil, and rechargeable batteries.

But Rep. Wayne Simoneau, (DFL-Fridley) says the bill would unfairly apply the taxes to retailers because some products would be taxed at a higher rate than their original value. He says it would cause retailers to set up multiple price systems in their stores and switch product container sizes to accommodate the new taxes.

The Environment and Natural Resources Committee gave the bill preliminary approval March 14.

Electronic monitoring

Employers' needs to electronically monitor their workplaces would balance against employees' constitutional rights, under a bill the Labor-Management Relations Committee heard March 13.

Rep. Steve Trimble (DFL-St. Paul), author of HF256, says employers should be allowed to use advanced electronic technology for supervision, but employees and the public also have rights against monitoring that could become surveillance.

"We're going to try to...develop an initial set of policy guidelines...to balance...the rights of Minnesota employers to use the emerging monitoring technologies, but at the same time protect the workers and the public from those who would step beyond the area of supervision and into the arena of surveillance," Trimble says.

The bill would require employers to notify employees about monitoring activities, and would give employees access to information the employers collect during monitoring. It also outlines types of information employers may or may not collect, and what information they can give out. Another provision covers union contracts and electronic monitoring.

The committee plans to continue hearing testimony on the bill.

Light-rail transit

Light-rail transit is one tool in a transportation system's family of transit tools, according to light rail experts. They say a good rail system's lifeblood is its simplicity in design, availability, and careful integration with bus systems.

Legislators listened to light-rail experts discuss rail transit for the seven-county metropolitan area at a joint meeting of the House and Senate transportation and local government committees March 10.

Tom Matoff of the Sacramento (California) Regional Transit District and Donald MacDonald of the Edmonton (Alberta) Regional Rail Authority say that the metro area is ready for light-rail. But they warned legislators to consider the cities' fragmented transit structure. A successful light-rail system needs a central authority to set policy and control management, they says.

Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul) introduced HF1136 March 13 which would abolish individual county rail authorities and call for the Metropolitan Council to oversee the light-rail project.

Affordable homes

Affordable housing may not be pie in the sky for low-income families wanting to own their own homes, under a bill the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee heard March 13.

Author Rep. Andy Dawkins (DFL-St. Paul) says HF140 would create five pilot housing projects around the state. The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency would manage the projects with grant money from governmental units or nonprofit organizations. The bill would appropriate \$1 million, allocating \$200,000 to each pilot.

Dawkins says the project would link public housing with neighborhood social service agencies. Together, they would work to preserve the level of housing stock in blighted neighborhoods.

"It empowers neighborhood organizations, stops blight and crime, and turns have-not tenants into have-stake homeowners," Dawkins says.

Homebuyers eligible for the program must be "at risk," according to Dawkins. Those at risk would include people who recently lost their jobs, those on public assistance, and recovering chemical abusers. Homebuyers would pay 30 percent of their income for property taxes, utilities, hazard insurance, and home maintenance costs.

Utility rates 🛚

Competition may enter the electric utility marketplace according to a bill the Regulated Industries Committee heard March 13.

Under HF951 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids), regulated electric utilities would be able to compete with unregulated utilities when serving large electric customers. The bill would enable regulated electric companies to cut rates to customers using a connected load of 2,000 or more kilowatts and who may otherwise seek power from another unregulated electric supplier, a cogenerator, or an unregulated power producer.

The bill would set guidelines for establishing competitive rate schedules for utilities and place the Public Utilities Commission at the helm to monitor rate schedule requests.

Indian education

The Department of Education (DOE) wants the Legislature to provide more funding to increase the number of Indians attending teacher preparation courses, and provide financial help for postsecondary education for Indian students.

On March 13, David Beaulieu, DOE manager of Indian programs, presented the department's Indian education budget proposals to the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee.

The DOE reports a critical shortage of Indian teachers throughout Minnesota. The department wants to increase the number of Indians in teacher preparation programs from last year's seven participants to 45.

The University of Minnesota-Duluth currently has the only Indian teacher education program. But the Red Lake School District is working through Bemidji State University, and the White Earth Tribal Council through Moorhead State University, to create programs.

The DOE wants to enroll older, paraprofessional Indian adults in the teacher preparation programs, hoping that some of them could help adapt the programs to better reflect Indian students' culture and serve their needs.

Postsecondary financial assistance for Indian students is another area in which the DOE seeks increased funding. Beaulieu says the department turned away more than 500 Indian students applying for such assistance last year. He says the funds available have remained constant, but both the number of pupils applying for aid and the cost of postsecondary education have risen.

Court system 🔳

District court referees, judicial officers, court reporters, law clerks, and district administrative employees would become state employees under a bill the Judiciary Committee considered March 13.

Peter Popovich, chief justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court, testified in favor of HF1065 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey), a bill that would transfer the costs of district courts and public defenders from the county to the state.

Popovich urged legislators to make this change to ensure equal service and treatment for all Minnesotans, make judicial resources equally available to all parts of the state, and provide uniform court services.

Judicial officials say a major criminal case can create a huge financial burden for taxpayers in counties with limited resources, because counties use property taxes to pay many court costs. They say a state-funded system for all districts would prevent that problem.

The committee will consider the bill again March 20.

Highway Helper

Highway Helper helps stalled motorists, free of charge, with gas, battery jumps, or a push to get a car off the road quickly. The idea of the Highway Helper Program is to help stalled motorists and get them out of the way of passing traffic, says Larry McNamara, assistant commissioner of operations at the Department of Transportation (MnDOT).

Stalled motorists on the highway cause traffic delays, he says. If a car blocks a lane for four minutes, it will take 40 minutes for passing traffic to regain a normal flow.

MnDOT presented the program's budget request to the Appropriations Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division March 13. The department will expand the program if the Legislature approves their budget request.

Healthspan

Insurance Committee members continued discussion on HF150 (Ogren, DFL-Aitkin), or Healthspan, a proposal that would make health insurance available to all Minnesotans, at a March 13 meeting.

Approximately 400,000 Minnesotans don't have access to health insurance or can't afford the high cost of insurance premiums, according to the bill's proponents. Most of the uninsured are low-income working people whose employers don't offer health insurance. One witness told the committee it's ironic that many people who don't work at all get better health care than the "working poor," most of whom are not eligible for public assistance.

Jim Addington, director of the Lutheran Coalition for Public Policy, told legislators that the United States and South Africa are the only industrialized nations that don't provide their citizens with access to a national health plan. He says it's important that the Legislature develop a health plan because the chances for a federal plan are grim.

Though many committee members expressed concern about the number of uninsured Minnesotans, some say they want to address funding issues and other provisions in the bill before they vote on Healthspan.

The Insurance Committee is the second House committee to consider the bill.

Notes

Roseville may become home to a new ice center if the Legislature passes a capital bonding bill the Appropriations Committee approved March 16. Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls) supports a provision that would appropriate \$600,000 to build a center for speed skating and playing Bandy, a sport similar to ice hockey. She also suggests calling it the John Rose Memorial Center, in memory of the late Rep. John Rose, an Independent Republican who represented District 63A, which includes Falcon Heights, Lauderdale, St. Anthony and part of Roseville. He passed away last year.

Do you like to hunt? Do you like to vote? If you've had trouble doing both, your problems may be solved. HF629 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park) would require the Department of Natural Resources to include an absentee ballot application with every deer hunting license it issues in a general election year. The bill awaits action in the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee.

Elementary teachers have to negotiate class preparation time through contracts while state law sets aside preparation time for secondary teachers, according to Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park). She presented a bill to the Education Committee March 13 that would bring elementary teacher preparation time under state law, too. HF436 would require the State Board of Education to develop rules, and explain them to the Legislature next February, noting any accompanying costs. Legislators at that time would decide whether to implement the rules.

People whom the courts convict three times of criminal sexual conduct may face a penalty of life in prison with no chance of parole under HF315 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul), a bill the Judiciary Committee recommended to pass unanimously March 10. Many lawmakers expressed concern that the sentence is more severe than the penalty for first-degree murder. They say it would give sex offenders an incentive to kill their victims because the offenders would have nothing to lose. However, the committee plans to hear another bill in the next few weeks that would impose life in prison without parole for people whom courts convict three times of firstdegree murder.

Are political campaigns long enough for you? Well, they might get one day longer. To bring state law into compliance with a judge's ruling, legislators may repeal a prohibition against election day campaigning. The repealer is in HF630 (Osthoff, DFL-St. Paul), a bill introduced on behalf of the Secretary of State. It awaits action on the House floor.

Doctors say insurance consumers would have more protection against an insurance company's "arbitrary and capricious" denial of medical claims if HF1155 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) becomes law. The Insurance Committee gave the omnibus life and health insurance bill preliminary approval March 15. The bill covers many consumer concerns. including deceptive life insurance commercials that usually appear late at night. It would also require insurance companies to give consumers an answer within 10 days for medical services that require preauthorization. Medical professionals testified that many patients have to wait too long for services they need immediately because insurance companies delay the authorization process.

Eurasian Water Milfoil, a foreign aquatic weed, is choking out Minnesota lakes. Aquatic biologists say they don't know how the weed got into the country. And there are no natural pathogens that would control the weed's explosive growth. Its growth can cause property damage, decrease water recreation, replace native plants, and breed mosquitoes in its floating weed mats. The Department of Natural Resources wants the Legislature to appropriate funds for research on the problem.

Shared housing in Minnesota would include handicapped and developmentally disabled people as well as the elderly under HF1045, a bill the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee approved March 15. Home sharing is a growing trend in alternative housing for elderly citizens who want to avoid nursing facilities and stay in their homes. Home sharing agencies would facilitate matches, and the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency would oversee technical assistance and administrative functions for program sponsors, according to author Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park).

What's wrong with wanting to be yourself and not worrying about how you compare and rank with others, the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee asked. During a University of Minnesota budget meeting March 14, committee members wondered why institutions feel compelled to rank themselves with other similar institutions. Comparisons and rankings have their place, but "we have to start looking at ourselves and what we want to become," says Rep. Jim Heap (IR-Plymouth).

Muskrats will become targets of annoyed property owners if the Legislature passes HF827 (Stanius, IR-White Bear Lake). Under the bill, muskrats would join the ranks of mink, squirrel, rabbit, hare, raccoon, lynx, bobcat, fox, and beaver. State law allows landowners to kill any one of these animals if it causes damage on their land. The law prohibits landowners from poisoning the animals or using artificial lights to aid the kill.







It's a fact!

Highlights

World trade

Small- and medium-sized businesses may receive more help to export products and services to the world market if HF1162 (Reding, DFL-Austin) becomes law. The Economic Development Committee's International Trade and Technology Division gave the bill preliminary approval March 21.

The bill encourages the state, through the Minnesota Trade Office (MTO), to enhance two international trade activities. First, it calls for the state to increase efforts to educate and prepare interested businesses in exporting. Second, it would increase the state's presence in other countries through foreign trade offices that would develop public/private partnerships and lasting trade relationships.

The bill also would coordinate efforts between government, communities, and educational and cultural institutions, to establish and maintain international sister-state relationships. Richard Bohr, MTO executive director, told the division that the state, in choosing sister cities and state province partners, has shifted its focus to those countries that offer Minnesota economic and trade benefits.

Doing business with people around the world depends on strong, personal, and trusting relationships, according to Bohr. Therefore, he says it's wise to develop these relationships to maximize their benefits.

The bill also includes an international initiatives grant program. It would offer matching grant funds to nonprofit organizations that support cultural and educational exchanges, which proponents say often lead to long-term trade relationships.

Groundwater protection

Farmers listened to testimony at the Environment and Natural Resources Committee meeting March 21 about the need to change farming practices to protect Minnesota's groundwater. The committee heard HF534, a bill that would require five state agencies to monitor and enforce groundwater protection regulations. The proposed regulations would affect current farming practices.

But the emphasis should be on education rather than regulation, says A1 Christopherson, Minnesota Farm Bureau president. "One of the greatest concerns we have is that the government will be telling us how to farm. We, as farmers, get nervous when that happens," he says. Farmers will maintain a cooperative attitude if they receive help to understand the impact of farm chemicals and to develop best management practices, Christopherson says.

Christopherson agrees with bill author Rep.Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth), who says that farmers aren't the only people responsible for groundwater contamination. But, Munger says, all members of society will have to cooperate to correct contamination problems.

Lawn care contracts

Written contracts between lawn care companies and their customers would be mandatory under provisions of a bill the Commerce Committee approved March 21.

Besides requiring written contracts, HF1090 (McGuire, DFL-Falcon Heights) would also require lawn care companies to include an ending date in their contracts. And if an agreement goes beyond a year, the company would have to obtain written verification from the customer to continue service.

Assistant Attorney General Jim Jacobson says his office receives complaints about unauthorized lawn care service. "We've had...an ongoing problem with consumers...[contending] unauthorized lawn care service," he says. "Oftentimes we found these problems related to the fact that the agreement between the consumer and the company was never [in] writing; everything was done verbally."

The measure is part of the consumer protection package from the state attorney general's office.

Corporate raids

Corporate mergers and takeovers that destroy jobs and displace workers would not be allowed in Minnesota if the Legislature passes HF631 (Clark, DFL-Mpls).

Under the bill, the state would monitor any corporation that applies for state grants for its own benefit, and the governor and the Legislature would review its performance records.

Other provisions in the bill would hold corporations accountable to the state, the public, and their employees for any management decisions that would displace employees from their jobs. And employers who cause mass layoffs or plant closings would have to pay the local government a fee for displaced worker support services and programs.

Community organizations could apply for state grants to study alternatives to plant closings. The bill would also set guidelines for community organizations to consider employee ownership, new ownership, new product lines, or public

assistance to keep a plant open.

The Community Stabilization and **Development Division of the Economic** Development Committee heard the bill March 21.


The DNR

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) presented its budget requests to the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee March 13-21. The governor has recommended a 13 percent funding increase for the DNR.

Fish and wildlife, parks and recreation, and forest management programs received the largest recommended increases. The Division of Forestry wants lawmakers to double its annual appropriation for the emergency firefighting fund from \$750,000 to \$1.5 million.

The department wants more money for its regional business offices, field operation support, and enforcement programs. And they'd like more staff in their regional business offices to provide better service statewide and to continue the decentralization program.

The DNR expects to generate over half of its budget in revenues. Most revenues come from the fish and wildlife, water recreation, and forestry programs.



Electronic monitoring

On March 20, the Labor-Management Relations Committee narrowly defeated a bill that would have regulated electronic monitoring in the workplace.

Employers' use of electronic technology for supervision should balance with the employees' and the public's rights against monitoring that could turn into surveillance, says the author of HF256, Rep. Steve Trimble (DFL-St. Paul).

The bill would have required employers to tell their employees about monitoring activities, and give the employees access to information the employers collect during monitoring. It also outlined types of information employers would be allowed to collect, and what information they could give out.

Opponents to the bill said it would have barred employers from using taped phone conversations as training tools, and could have interfered with security. Bill supporters spoke at an earlier meeting.


The committee voted 9 to 8 against the bill.

Year of the City: URAP ==

First class cities --- Minneapolis, St. Paul. and Duluth — would be eligible for the Urban Revitalization Action Program (URAP) that HF541 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul) proposes. The Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee met March 20 to hear testimony from city officials and people familiar with the problems of dilapidating inner-city neighborhoods.

The bill, part of the governor's Year of the City proposal, aims to revitalize Minnesota's deteriorated neighborhoods. It would provide financing for housing in blighted areas, with cities matching local money to state money.

Shiitake mushrooms

The shiitake mushroom is the second most commonly consumed mushroom in the world, says Joe Deden, executive director of the Forest Resource Center in Lanesboro, Minnesota. He brought bags of shiitake (pronounced she-TAH-key) mushrooms to lawmakers at an Agriculture Committee meeting March 20.

The mushroom is known as a delicacy in the Orient, and is renowned for its high nutritional value, according to literature Deden gave the committee. The Japanese regard shiitake cultivation as their most successful rural development initiative, and their largest agricultural export. The mushrooms grow on certain low grade hardwood logs, and can be harvested at least twice a year (spring and fall) with minimal equipment.

Deden spoke in favor of HF91, a bill that would authorize a grant to further study the culture of shiitake mushrooms in Minnesota. Bill author Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain) says the mushrooms could become a local Minnesota product and a new cash crop for the state's southeastern region.

The bill received unanimous preliminary approval.

Telephone companies

A telephone bill that has support from the Minnesota Attorney General's Office, U.S. West Communications, United Telephone, and the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) came before the Regulated Industries Committee March 20. HF1056 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids) is a technical, non-controversial bill that fine-tunes telephone service regulation laws the 1987 Legislature passed.

The bill would change and clarify traditional and alternative telephone company regulations, including rate schedules, price lists, dispute settlements, rate complaints, and emerging competition.

Mike Bradley, assistant attorney general, talked about the bill's costsaving provision, saying that it would maintain, or possibly lower, rates under an incentive telephone regulation plan. Under the plan, the phone company would have to share increased earnings with customers.

"Incentive regulation would provide telephone companies with the opportunity to improve their earnings through cost savings, new programs, better sales, or better management...without raising rates," says Bradley.

The incentive program would require telephone companies to submit costsavings plans to the PUC. The PUC would then notify customers of a company's incentive plan, and hold meetings for public testimony.

"This is a win-win provision for Minnesota, with benefits for both sides," Bradley says.

Rental property taxes

Reducing rental property taxes sparked discussion on a bill the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee heard March 20.

HF727 would change tax capacities for some class four properties to 2.5 percent of market value. Tax capacities would drop from 3.5 percent to 2.5 percent on residential nonhomestead properties and nonresort rental dwellings of three units or less. The bill would also extend the 2.5 percent tax rate to low and moderate income housing developments that local governments finance and would remove the restriction that nonprofit or limited dividend entities own such property. Some committee members say the drop in the tax rate would translate into reduced rents for low-to-moderate income people.

"The bill basically deals with trying to expand the 2.5 percent tax rate to a few more entities throughout the state..." says author Rep. Wally Sparby (DFL-Thief River Falls). "The taxing structure for rental housing is considerably higher than other states, and basically, the highest in the nation. We are attempting, through this bill, to correct some of those inequities," he says.

The bill reflects recommendations from the Governor's Commission on Affordable Housing. The committee gave the bill preliminary approval.

Life sentence; no parole

People whom the courts convict of first-degree murder may face a penalty of life in prison without parole under HF3 (Wenzel, DFL-Little Falls), a bill the Judiciary Committee recommended to pass March 20.

Current law states that those convicted of first-degree murder are eligible for parole after serving 20 years. Several witnesses told the committee that the state should "lock up murderers and throw away the key." Under the bill, the Board of Pardons is the only authority that could approve the release of a person convicted of first-degree murder. The board could not grant parole or a pardon until the person has served at least 30 years in prison, according to the bill.

Critics of the bill point out that return rates for convicted murderers are lower than those of other crimes, and that releasing certain offenders is not a threat to society. They agree that some offenders deserve life in prison, but say the bill is too broad and would waste limited resources without solving the crime problem.

The bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Residential academies


Minnesota's state residential academies for the deaf and the blind want the Legislature to increase funding for their programs and personnel. Wade Karli, state academies administrator, presented the Department of Education's (DOE) budget requests to the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee March 20.

Minnesota's residential academies include the State Academy for the Deaf (MSAD), the State Academy for the Blind (MSAB), and two state resource centers for the academies in Faribault.

The DOE wants each academy to receive additional funds for its resource center, extended school year, integration and transition programs, and physical maintenance. The department also requested more funding for MSAD's hearing impaired health, wellness, safety, and instructional support programs. MSAB put in requests for low vision and early childhood programs and services. The governor recommended increased funding for only the academies' extended school year programs and for MSAD's health and safety request.

The Extended School Year Program, which both academies conduct, serves students who attend school in their home

districts, but go to the academies during the summer. They generally participate in programs which their home districts don't offer. For example, blind students can participate in athletic competition, public speaking, and computer training programs designed for the visually impaired student.

MSAD also wants a security officer, so both campuses will have full-time night security coverage. The campuses are 1.5 miles apart, and currently have one night security officer patrolling both.

Death penalty

Lawmakers rejected a move to reinstate the death penalty in Minnesota after more than six hours of testimony on March 17. The Judiciary Committee defeated the proposal on a 21 to 2 bipartisan vote.

Some crime victims and law enforcement officials testified in favor of HF998 (Heap, IR-Plymouth). However, law professors, feminists, scholars, writers, prosecutors, several crime victims, and other interested people told committee members that capital punishment is not the answer to crime in Minnesota.

Critics of the bill cited evidence showing that the death penalty doesn't deter crime. In fact, many states that execute criminals have experienced much larger increases in murder than Minnesota. They also said the history of the death penalty "reeks with discrimination."

Many lawmakers said they disagree with the death penalty because it's irrevocable. One member told the committee that 25 executions have taken place in the United States in which evidence was later produced that proved the executed person's innocence. Studies also show that execution costs more than life imprisonment, though lawmakers say finances aren't the crux of the issue.

Other states look to Minnesota as a model on how to deal with violent criminals, according to Professor Franklin Zimring, University of California-Berkeley, an expert in criminal law and the death penalty. He said it's a myth that Minnesota sentences violent criminals to shorter prison terms than most states. Zimring pointed out that the average length of murder sentences in Minnesota is longer than the average in at least 40 other states.

He also reminded lawmakers that there's no absolute cure for crime. Zimring said fear, anger, and frustration are just as prevalent in states that execute as they are in Minnesota.

Committee deadlines

On March 20, the House adopted a series of deadlines to help move bills through the legislative process. • After Friday, April 14, the House must refer committee reports on House Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action.

• After Wednesday, April 26, the House must refer committee reports on Senate Files to the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee before the bills can go to the House Floor for action.

These deadlines don't apply to committee reports from the Appropriations or Taxes committees, or to the education finance bill.

• After Friday, May 12, the House can only act on conference committee reports, bills that the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee report (Special Orders), and bills in messages from the Senate or governor.



Notes

Truth in taxation strives to inform property taxpayers of tax changes through mailed notices and special assessment hearings, giving them a forum to discuss tax policy. The subject topped the agenda at a Property Tax Subcommittee hearing March 21 when committee members heard testimony from the Department of Revenue and the Association of Minnesota Counties.

The University of Minnesota and Gov. Rudy Perpich hope the Legislature will appropriate \$250,000 to help fund a chair honoring Roy Wilkins, long-time NAACP president and Minnesota native. Besides funding the chair, the one-time allocation would also help fund the Center for Human Relations and Social Justice, which would operate within the Humphrey Institute. University officials explained the request to the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee March 21.

William Heaney's appointment to the state Ethical Practices Board received initial approval from the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee, March 21. Heaney, from Minneapolis, lobbied for Northern States Power Company over the last eight years, and before that, for Minnesota Power of Duluth. He would fill a DFL seat on the board and serve until January 1993. The recommendation now goes to the full House for a final okay. HF1065 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey) came one step closer to becoming law March 20 when the Judiciary Committee gave the bill preliminary approval. Chief Justice Peter Popovich of the Minnesota Supreme Court came back to testify in favor of the bill that would transfer employment of certain court employees from the county to the state. The bill now goes to the Governmental Operations Committee for further review. Small- and medium-sized businesses need help to integrate advanced manufacturing techniques into their operations so they can retain and expand the number of jobs they offer, according to Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples). He presented HF1240 to the Economic Development Committee's International Trade and Technology Division March 21. The bill would appropriate money to the Minnesota Advanced Manufacturing Technol-

ogy Centers Inc. (MAMTC), a partnership of private business, state government, and education leaders. MAMTC would use the funds to establish a plan to help manufacturers modernize. The division sent the bill to the full committee with a favorable recommendation.

An endowed chair for Hispanic Studies is one of the University of Minnesota's budget requests. During a March 21 budget hearing with the Appropriation Committee's Education Division, university officials said the chair would help promote inter- and cross-cultural studies. Though the university system isn't seeking funding, the governor recommends a \$400,000 appropriation in the 1991 fiscal year.


Active community organizations and citizens may now have access to state money for neighborhood projects. On March 21, the Community Stabilization and Development Division of the Economic Development Committee recommended passage of HF1072 (Williams, DFL-Moorhead). The bill would establish guidelines for community improvement projects.

Local governments could impose more stringent smoke detector laws for single-family homes if HF892 (Brown, DFL-Appleton) gains final approval. The bill would also create a position for a state public fire safety educator in the Department of Public Safety. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee recommended passage of the bill on March 21. It goes next to the Appropriations Committee. If you're touring historical sites, St. Paul's Summit Avenue has much to offer. With large stone and brick homes adjacent to one another, the street holds years of history.

Do you know

At 240 Summit Ave. is the James J. Hill House. Hill, a railroad tycoon, had the house built in the late nineteenth century, with Minnesota winters in mind. The 32-room house includes 22 fireplaces. Other features that attest to the home's place in history are the carved woodwork, stained glass, and skylighted art gallery. Hill, a simple, forceful, and direct man, was a dominant force in the building of the house. Dismissing architects when they ignored his orders, he built the house to suit himself, not to compete with other fanciful mansions of his peers.





It's a fact!

Statues surrounding the State Capitol honor political figures, soldiers, explorers, and Minnesota's youth.

One statue, "Monument to the Living," uniquely honors living veterans of all wars. Its sculptor, Roger Brodin, suggested the idea of honoring living veterans, since many sculptures pay tribute to those who died.

"The Promise of Youth," near the Veterans Service Building, was a controversial addition to the Capitol area. The fountain sculpture, a metal water lily, opens to reveal the figure of a woman looking toward the sky. Some people protested the figure's nudity. The sculptor removed the figure for a time, until the controversy died down. The figure's back in place now. And because the sculpture is a water fountain, the lily opens in summer and closes in winter. (See Do you Know? on page 17.)

Revenue forecast

What's likely to happen over the next 28 months to Minnesota's economy? Slower but positive growth through the next biennium, according to state economists and the Department of Finance.

Finance department officials appeared before the Taxes Committee March 30 to discuss the governor's budget and an increase in revenue from state taxes. Finance Commissioner Tom Triplett projects a net increase of \$219.9 million in available resources—a 1.3 percent increase over last November's forecast.

Four major revenue sources make up the bulk of tax revenue, totaling \$229.5 million: individual income taxes (the largest revenue), sales taxes, corporate/ bank excise taxes, and motor vehicle excise taxes.

To quickly figure the budget, add \$50.4 million to the \$229.5 million in other resources (debt service savings, fee incomes); subtract the variance from November and December the governor included in the January budget (\$35.7 million); and subtract expenditure increases, which is \$24.3 million higher than the November forecast, for an available amount of \$219.9 million.

"This forecast does not assume a recession," Triplett told committee members. "What it's saying is continued economic growth, but at a substantially slower rate than we've been seeing in this country and in this state over the past two years. We're confident in this projection. But...we want you to know that the risk of a recession is growing at the same time."

Drug Abuse

Minnesota needs a coordinated effort to prevent drug abuse, according to proponents of HF621 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), a bill the Governmental Operations Committee gave preliminary approval March 30. It would create a drug abuse prevention resource council to coordinate community efforts to prevent drug abuse.

Stephen Winfield, a board member of the David M. Winfield Foundation, says that Minnesota's drug problems aren't as bad as that of some states. But if the state doesn't enhance its efforts to prevent drug abuse, the problems could get much worse. "If we don't deal with coordinating the resources that we have in...Minnesota now...we're going to definitely pay later," says Winfield. He and his brother, the foundation's namesake and a New York Yankee outfielder, are Minnesotans who have worked nationally to coordinate efforts to prevent drug abuse.

Rep. Bob Johnson (DFL-Bemidji) says he strongly supports a coordinated effort to deal with the problem. Johnson told the committee that prevention is more than just school curriculum—it's totally encompassing. He says "the community should be the engine that drives the train" against drug abuse.


Compulsive gambling

Gambling may be addictive and deserves state attention, proponents of a compulsive gambling bill told the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee March 30.


HF236 (Jaros, DFL-Duluth) would direct the Department of Human Services to set up a treatment program for compulsive gamblers. The department could work with nonprofit agencies with expertise in treating compulsive gambling in operating the program.

"We're getting all this revenue from gambling so I think we have to be aware that there are casualties out there, " says Rep. Gil Gutknecht (IR-Rochester), who sponsors a similar measure, and agreed to support Jaros' bill.

Steve Dentinger, president of the Minnesota Council on Compulsive Gambling, calls compulsive gambling "a pure addiction. It's an ingestion of a high that's self-created. They're addicted to the action; the high of being in action. A gambler can continue sustaining that high as long as he's in action."

Battered Women

Approximately 63,000 women in Minnesota are battered each year, according to statistics the Department of Corrections gathered, says Pat Murphy from the Minnesota Coalition for Battered Women.

Shelters throughout the state annually turn down more than 50 percent of the requests for their services, according to Murphy, and in the metro area, the figure is higher. She also notes that 61 of Minnesota's 87 counties have no services for battered women. "We're looking for some support for legal systems, welfare systems, housing systems, advocacy, public awareness, and looking at issues that are important to children..." Murphy says.

She urged the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division March 29 to support the coalition's request for a \$14.5 million budget increase for the next biennium, along with a yearly inflation adjustment for current battered women's programs. Murphy says \$10 million would go toward statewide services such as a telephone network, access to advocacy services, housing, transportation to a shelter or safehouse, and translator services for bicultural and disabled women.

Good Thunder


Good Thunder, a southern Minnesota township, got an unexpected economic boost from the efforts of the Minnesota Regional Arts Council.

The township developed a new tourism economy by way of an arts project the council facilitated, says Ann Christenson from the Good Thunder Development Corporation.

Ta-Coumba Aiken, Minnesota's leading mural artist, painted a historical montage on Good Thunder's grain elevator. It features a portrait of Good Thunder, a Dakota Chief, and other historical and contemporary scenes of the town. The project generated media attention and a tourism industry, according to Christenson.

"People are measured by their arts, not by their wars. We're not all going to be mathematicians, by the same token, we're not all going to be artists. But math and art are integral to a culture," says Christenson.

Regional arts council members urged the Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division of the Appropriations Committee March 29 to approve its budget request.

Wage protection

Workers who lose wages because their companies leave Minnesota, file bankruptcy, or are subject to corporate takeover, could seek payment under a bill the Labor-Management Relations Committee approved March 29.

HF970 would set up a fund in the Department of Labor and Industry (DLI) to assure payment of lost wages. The maximum payment would be four weeks' pay or \$2,000, whichever is less.

"People call us about their checks not being good and we find that their employer's skipped out of state or filed bankruptcy," says Dan Gustufson, representing the Minnesota AFL-CIO.

Employees would first try to collect from the company, says bill author Rep. John Sarna (DFL-Mpls). If that fails, the state could pay the employee, then try to recover the payment from the company. The bill would also entitle the commissioner of labor and industry to collect attorney's fees and a penalty of 25 percent of the recovery. If the state recovers money after paying the employee, the DLI would deposit it in the wage protection fund.

Manufactured home parks

Residents of manufactured home parks and members of the All Parks Alliance for Change (APAC) crowded into a hearing room March 29 to listen to testimony on a bill that could make it easier for mobile home owners to form a cooperative and buy a mobile home park.

Bill author Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park) has two mobile home parks in her district. She drafted HF88, a bill that would help mobile home owners purchase their park when it goes up for sale.

Under the bill, mobile home park owners would have to notify park residents at least 60 days prior to executing an agreement to sell the park. The 60day period gives residents the opportunity to form a cooperative and buy the park, according to Johnson. A "good faith" provision in the bill would require park owners to consider a cooperative offer from a majority of park residents.

Manufactured home parks give people of low-to-moderate income a place to live in homes acceptable to them, Johnson says. And they provide low-cost housing—a tool needed to ease the overall housing problem for individuals and families.

The Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee plans to continue hearing the bill next week.


Animals as prizes 📟

If a proposed bill gets final approval, commercial ventures could no longer give animals as prizes or inducements to enter a game, place of amusement, or business agreement if the offer of the animal is part of the venture.

HF1121 aims to stop fairs, carnivals, and circuses from giving away rabbits, chicks, ducklings, and goslings, according to author Rep. Marvin Dauner (DFL-Hawley). Often, he says, people who win animals as prizes end up not caring for them. The American Humane Association estimates that 9 of 10 animals given away as prizes are either abandoned or fatally hurt.

The bill would not affect enterprises that give animals as a prize, inducement, or incentive to promote the equine and livestock industries, or to promote animal and wildlife conservation in Minnesota. Also, Dauner says he doesn't want to prohibit nonprofit groups, such as county 4-H organizations, from giving away animals. He says people who win these animals usually care for them.

The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee heard the bill March 28.

Juveniles: DWI, jail

Some juveniles whom the courts find guilty of drunken driving would face jail time under HF1016, a bill the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division approved March 29.

Author Rep. Connie Morrison (IR-Burnsville) says the state should give adult courts the authority to put habitual juvenile offenders on probation, and if they violate probation, in jail. The bill would also extend the court's authority to some juveniles whom law enforcement officials find possessing small amounts of marijuana, or those who violate local ordinances, such as curfew.

Proponents of the bill say a similar law in Oregon led to a significant drop in driving-while-intoxicated (DWI) and drug offenses. They say the threat of losing their licenses and possibly going to jail gives kids reasons to say "no" to drugs and alcohol.

But Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul) reminded lawmakers that county jails are already overcrowded. She says the state should try more creative alternatives to incarceration, such as mandatory work programs, before putting a juvenile in jail.

Women's economic initiatives -

"The Women's Economic Development Corporation (WEDCO) has one of the most distinguished records for economic development of any organization, not only in Minnesota but in the nation," says Rep. Gene Pelowski, Jr. (DFL-Winona).

The Economic Development Committee heard a bill to provide state funding to WEDCO and the Minnesota Cooperative Office (MCO) March 28. Both organizations provide technical assistance, educational services, and financing to new business entrepreneurs.

The WEDCO has helped 3,700 women start businesses, and has assisted 110 women obtain financing for their businesses, Pelowski says. The MCO provides a network of information and advisory services to its clients. It maintains contacts with the business, academic, and financial communities. Pelowski reports that the MCO helped start 28 new high growth companies which created 828 jobs as of last September.

Private sector funding for these two groups has dwindled, Pelowski says, so that they can't continue their economic development activities. State funding would help the organizations continue their efforts and work towards selfsufficiency.

Housing impact statement =

A bill that would help offset the significant loss of low-income housing came before the Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee March 29. The goal of HF241 is to preserve low-income housing, says author Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls).

She says the bill would assure that adequate housing exists for displaced individuals and families, and would help alleviate Minnesota's homeless situation.

It would require local communities to prepare a housing impact statement when they displace at least five housing units in one year. The community would have to provide sufficient replacement housing within 36 months after demolishing, converting, or acquiring the original housing.

Special diet I.D. card

People on special diets may soon be able to bring their own food and beverages into public facilities, if a bill the Legislature is considering becomes law.

HF1116 (Swenson, IR-Forest Lake) would allow those who require special diets to carry special identification cards from the commissioner of health. The cards would exempt them from certain prohibitions on outside food and drinks. The exemption would apply to facilities such as auditoriums, concert halls, sports stadiums and arenas, and theaters.

The commissioner would make the cards available to physicians, who would issue them automatically to diabetics, and would have the option to issue them to those with other conditions requiring special diets. The cards would be valid for five years after the application date.

The bill would also give public facilities authority to limit the amount of food and drink that cardholders may bring into the facility, and would authorize them to ask cardholders for another form of identification.

The Health and Human Services Committee gave the bill unanimous preliminary approval March 28.

Restraint of trade

Retailers who feel manufacturers and competitors are squeezing them out of pricing competition would have a legal remedy against such tactics if a bill the Commerce Committee considered March 28 becomes law.

HF511 would "make it tougher for wholesalers and retailers to price-fix," says author Rep. Rich O'Connor (DFL-St. Paul). The bill would allow retailers to sue if they believe manufacturers cancelled contracts because they listened to competitors' complaints about unfair pricing.

Proving price fixing is difficult, O'Connor says, because nothing is written. However, the bill would allow the courts to consider communication from a competitor to the manufacturer in restraint-of-trade suits. If a retailer files a lawsuit, the manufacturer would have a chance to rebut the charge.

Opponents say the measure would shift the burden of proof from the plaintiff to the defendant. Also, they say, retailers could capriciously use the proposal to harass manufacturers. "This bill turns anti-trust law on its head," says Richard Silverman, a Chicago attorney representing several electronic companies.

The committee gave the bill preliminary approval.

Dangerous dogs

A bill that would clarify state regulations governing dangerous dogs got a recommendation to pass from the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee March 28.

HF543 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park) would define a proper enclosure for housing dangerous dogs. Under the bill, porches, patios, or buildings that a dog could leave of its own will would not be acceptable. Neither would buildings with open windows or in which door or window screens are the only obstacles that contain the dog. The bill would also require owners to attach identifying tags to the collars of all dogs registered as dangerous.

The bill would exempt dogs that are provoked into attacking an individual, such as someone who is trespassing or in the process of committing a crime, or who has repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal.

A provision would also prohibit local governments from singling out specific breeds as dangerous or potentially dangerous. A Hennepin County judge recently declared unconstitutional a Minneapolis ordinance that regulated ownership of certain breeds of dogs, mostly pit bulls.

Financial disclosure =

State Auditor Arne Carlson says some local government officials should have to make their financial interests open to the public to avoid a conflict of interest.

Carlson told the Governmental Operations Committee March 28 that these local officials should face the same financial scrutiny that state representatives and constitutional officers do. "When you hold a position of public trust," he says, "you have the same obligation as legislators do, as constitutional officers do, to disclose your own private, personal holdings to avoid a conflict of interest."

Carlson's proposal would also set uniform standards for reimbursing local government employees for mileage and expenses. He says local governments that fail to comply with the policy would lose state aid.

The committee expects to hear Carlson's proposal in the form of a bill later this session.


Bottom of the well

You'd be surprised to find what turns up in wells, says Ray Renner, a specialist in well construction. He testified March 28 before the Environment and Natural Resources Committee about wells in Minnesota in connection with HF534 (Munger, DFL-Duluth), the comprehensive groundwater protection bill.

E. H. Renner & Sons, Inc., a well construction company, uses video technology to view the condition of wells before entering them. Renner showed the committee a videotape of various wells his company has inspected.

Renner says they've seen newspapers, piles of grain, and abandoned well appliances at the bottom of some wells. A Minneapolis well had 30 feet of coffee grounds at the bottom. He points out that rust and bacteria can grow on these things. "It's easy to see why damaged or polluted wells need to be repaired or sealed," he says.

Many of the aquifers (underground lakes) that wells draw from have downdrafts that enter another aquifer, according to Renner. Downdrafts will carry pollutants from one aquifer into another. And, he notes, many counties and cities rely on common aquifers for their water supply.



Organizations that conduct charitable gambling could use their net profits for building repair and maintenance under provisions of HF555 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids). The Charitable Gambling Control Board would have to approve work on any building in advance. The bill would also specify that other nonprofit or community organizations use the building extensively, and would prohibit building owners from collecting rent from such organizations. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee's Gaming Division gave the bill preliminary approval March 30.

Automobile dealers would pay more for dealer plates if a bill the Transportation Committee considered March 29 becomes law. HF633 (Lasley, DFL-Cambridge) would increase the fee to \$75 for each of the first four plates the state issues to a dealer. If the dealer wants additional plates, the cost would decrease to \$40 each. The committee gave the bill preliminary approval, and rereferred it to the Appropriations Committee.

One-stop shopping for credit cards? It could happen if a bill the Commerce Committee approved March 28 gets a nod from the full Legislature. HF511 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul) would require credit card application distributors to file with the state treasurer reports having information that state law allows them to disclose. This information would include annual interest rates, grace periods, annual fees, and other information, such as consumer rebates or charitable contributions. The state treasurer's office would feed the information into a database and make it available to the public on request.

Lefse isn't good enough? Not for two koalas coming to the Minnesota Zoo, says Kathryn Roberts, director of the zoo. She says koalas only eat eucalyptus, which the zoo will bring in from Florida. Zoo officials plan to open the new exhibit on Mother's Day, May 14.

Child mortality dominated the Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division March 28 and March 29. Lawmakers gave preliminary approval to HF788 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would create a state child mortality review board to study children's deaths, including those in which maltreatment was the cause or a suspected factor. The bill also would create a new crime of child endangerment. The crime may apply to people who willfully cause or permit a child to go into a situation that's likely to produce bodily harm, emotional damage, or death.

Emergency medical services (EMS) may come under the authority of the Department of Public Safety if HF428 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey) becomes law. The Department of Health currently has authority over EMS matters. The Governmental Operations approved the bill March 29.

Just look in the mirror if you want to see who's responsible for groundwater pollution, says Gunnar Isberg, Olmsted County Planning director. Isberg testified March 30 in support of HF534 (Munger, DFL-Duluth), the comprehensive groundwater protection bill, at the **Environment and Natural Resources** Committee. "There's a need for everyone to modify behavior and attitudes towards controlling pollutants," Isberg says. The state will face two consequences if legislators don't act now to protect groundwater-more lawsuits, and a tremendous burden for future generations.

Charitable gambling taxes may go up under a bill the Tax Laws Subcommittee heard March 28. The proposal would bring in an additional \$79 million in revenue to meet the governor's budget goals, according to a Department of Revenue spokesperson. The bill would change the charitable gambling tax from a 10 percent tax on profits to a 6 percent tax on gross receipts. Most state lotteries tax 30 to 40 percent of gross earnings, say revenue officials. To pay the higher tax, charitable organizations could offer smaller prizes rather than reduce the funds they would normally receive.

Surplus soybeans could supply the ink industry's total oil need throughout the nation, reports Rep. Ted Winter (DFL-Fulda). He presented statistical information about soy-based ink production to the Economic Development Committee March 30. A survey indicates that 46 million bushels of soybeans could supply the ink industry's needs. That's only 3 percent of the national soybean surplus stock. Farmers would benefit from increased prices, and ultimately the state economy would benefit, according to Winter.







Statues on the Capitol Mall in St. Paul honor three Minnesota governors who rose from poverty to become political leaders. "Three years a soldier in the Civil War. Three times a member of Congress. Twice governor of Minnesota. Five times our United States Senator." These proud words describe Knute Nelson governor of Minnesota from 1893-1895. A farmers' revolt and a three-way split helped in his 1893 election bid. He was our first governor of Norwegian birth.





"This monument is raised to his memory by one hundred thousand of his friends" is the inscription for John Albert Johnson, Minnesota's first native son to become governor (1905-1909).

Floyd B. Olson governed during the Great Depression (1931-1936). His administration started a state income tax to fund schools, 13 state forests, and temporarily prohibited mortgage foreclosure. He could possibly have become a third-party presidential candidate, but he died in office at age 45.

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
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Highlights

Budget resolution


Minnesota lawmakers adopted a budget resolution for fiscal years 1990 and 1991 at a Ways and Means Committee meeting April 5.

Legislators showed bipartisan support for a provision in the resolution that would move several special accounts, previously considered off limits for the budget, into the general fund. Members of both political parties say this move would bring more accountability and oversight into the budget process. Minority Leader Rep. Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) says "This [budget consolidation] clearly is a step in the right direction for the public and for the members of the Legislature to better understand expenditures within the overall state government budget."

Lawmakers gave preliminary approval to funding increases for agriculture, transportation, housing, education, public safety, trade and economic development, children's initiatives, health programs,

You *really* know Minnesota if you recognize these names: Bethel, Biwabik, Cerro Gordo, Derrynane, Graceville, Grygla, Hamre, Heidelberg, Kalevala, Lee, Mahtomedi, Macville, Odessa, Parent, Ronneby, Winona, and Wouri. They're all names of Minnesota cities and townships. Though the names may be difficult to spell and pronounce, they symbolize the large variety of nationalities that settled in our state. Immigration in Minnesota reached its peak in 1890 when Swedes, Norwegians, Finns, Germans, Russians, Poles, Scots, French, and Irish (to name a few) came to farm, work on the railroads, in the lumber mills,

and in the iron ore mines. These pioneers named their towns and villages for places in their homelands, or to honor early settlers. Or they adopted the Dakota and Ojibwa Indian names. (See "Do you Know" on page 21.)

veterans affairs, natural resource protection, and a variety of other state programs. The resolution also includes a \$500 million adjustment to provide property tax relief, which most lawmakers say is one of their highest priorities.

After nearly three hours of debate on April 6, the full House adopted the resolution on a vote of 72 to 59.

Televised horse races

People could stay in their home towns and indulge in an afternoon at the races under provisions of a bill the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee heard April 6.

HF485 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids) would allow an individual, group, or business to televise Canterbury Downs horse races. Supporters say the bill would restrict the races to those originating at a Minnesota track. Those applying for a license to televise the races would have to meet the same application requirements needed for a race track facility license.

The Canterbury Downs racing pool would include bets people place at home town facilities, says Cort Holton, Minnesota Horse Breeders Association. Also, the bill would outline specific facility requirements, such as size, seating, and location.

"Our desire is that people would enjoy the sport," Holton says. "This would extend the live race track, by election, by moving it out to some of the other communities."

The division postponed action on the bill so members could study the proposal.

Golf course taxation

Country club golf courses would have to provide equal access playing time to women golfers under proposals the Taxes Committee heard April 6. Reps. Dave Bishop (IR-Rochester) and Sally Olsen (IR-St. Louis Park) presented bills that would clarify golf course membership requirements for open space property tax treatment.

Some country clubs issue restrictive golf memberships to spouses or dual memberships at an added high cost, say the authors. As a result, clubs keep women off the courses during peak playing times, according to testimony from women club members, who say they do not have equal access to play on club golf courses.


Current Minnesota law makes golf courses eligible for tax deferments, as well as other recreational real estate, such as ski slopes, and archery and firearms ranges. The law provides guidelines for golf course usage and golf club memberships if the club wishes to receive open space property tax treatment.

Handicapped accessibility


Minnesota's hearing, vision, and physically impaired communities have often found difficulty when participating in the political process. That's because these groups often can't hear, see, or reach the activities going on. But that may change. The Elections Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee considered HF354 (Jefferson, DFL-Mpls) March 3. The division did not act on the bill at that time, but amended and recommended it to pass April 6.

The bill originally would have required major political parties to provide sign interpreters for the hearing impaired, preparation for Braille translations for the visually impaired, and buildings that could accommodate the physically handicapped. But legislators say it's inappropriate to require these services because political activities often occur simultaneously, which could lead to an inadequate supply of interpreters and buildings.

The amendment would require the parties to make good faith efforts to apply requirements to precinct caucus and party convention sites. If an accessible location is not available, the bill would allow the party to hold the caucus outside the




Hundreds of realtors and rental property owners rally on the steps of the Capitol April 5 in support of lower taxes for rental property.

Land grants, free education

"Not many people know...that American Indians can attend the University of Minnesota - Morris campus free of tuition," says Rep. Steve Trimble (DFL-St. Paul).

The Higher Education Division of the Education Committee gave a favorable recommendation to Trimble's bill, HF398, that would require the State University System and the State Board of Vocational Technical Education to study tuition-free education for American Indian students.

Trimble says the idea behind land grant universities and colleges was to provide services and education to the society surrounding the campus. Since the American Indian population is shifting from rural to urban areas, he says a study may determine that other campuses ought to waive tuition for them as well.

The University of Michigan grants American Indian students tuition-free education throughout the system, so Trimble suggests inquiring there about the study.

Rep. Tony Kinkel (DFL-Park Rapids) says his constituents told him that the Morris campus has high admission standards that discourage or prevent American Indian students from enrolling there.

Fund consolidation

The Appropriations' State Departments Division considered a proposal April 5 that would consolidate several state spending accounts (special revenue funds) into the general fund. Supporters say consolidation would give the Legislature better oversight of state spending and would simplify accounting systems for executive branch agencies. The proposal would redirect about \$170 million and 570 state jobs back into the general fund for accounting purposes, according to House fiscal analysts.

Special revenue funds originate from several sources. The Legislature may create such a fund when it legally restricts (dedicates) a revenue source to a specific purpose, or when the money comes from the federal government. The Department of Natural Resources' Game and Fish Fund includes both of these special revenue funds. The Snowmobile Account represents another special revenue fund, where self-generated revenue totally supports the cost of an activity or government service. The Environmental Trust Fund is an example of a special revenue fund which the state constitution creates.

The State Departments' proposal would reduce the number of special revenue fund accounts from 26 to 16. Accounts that get money from both fees and the general fund, and those that provide money for similar purposes would go into the general fund. The proposal would also create three broader special revenue fund accounts.

It would not: restructure or eliminate programs; reduce agency budgets; affect those revenues and expenditures which, under the state constitution, must be accounted for in funds other than the general fund, nor those where user fees provide a primary benefit to fee payers.

The division unanimously adopted a resolution supporting the proposal's goals which they referred to the Ways and Means Committee. (See "Budget Resolution," page 1)

Toll free helpline


Families could receive 24-hour support and assistance to resolve parenting crises, if a bill the Legislature is considering becomes law.

HF615 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul) would establish a statewide 24-hour telephone helpline. The helpline would provide families with support, information, and assistance in preventing child abuse and neglect, and promoting healthy family relationships.

Services would include crisis counseling, child development information, referrals to appropriate local services including mental health services, and parent and child support groups. Families throughout the state would have access to the line. Users of the helpline could remain anonymous.

Vellenga told lawmakers at a Health and Human Services meeting April 5, that the project would cost \$171,000 if fully funded using volunteers, and slightly more if fully funded using professionals.

The bill received unanimous preliminary approval.

Community resources

A bill that would provide \$21 million to address inner city social problems got a favorable recommendation from the Economic Development Committee April 4. HF540 (Clark, DFL-Mpls) would create a community resource program in Minnesota's cities of the first class: Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Duluth.

Rep. Donald Frerichs (IR-Rochester) criticized the bill as leaning too far in favor of the Twin Cities. He says the same social problems exist in other cities and offered an amendment that would have expanded eligibility requirements to include other cities in the community resource program. Committee members voted 20 to 14 against the amendment.

The bill drew support from a rural legislator, Rep. Diane Wray Williams (DFL-Moorhead), who says she "wholeheartedly" endorses the proposed community resources program, and the money to spend for it.

"I would hope that what we find in this program is...a recipe discovered, or rediscovered...that will help check the crack from spreading to Moorhead. And I can support it on that basis," she says.

Affordable housing

"The cost of owning and renting housing has increased at a rate greater than that of increases in incomes for families and individuals with low incomes. Homelessness has increased, especially among families with children," reports the Governor's Commission on Affordable Housing for the 1990s.

Upon the commission's recommendation, legislators are drafting bills to remedy Minnesota's housing ails. The Housing Division of the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee has considered several parts of the report; the latest on April 4.

Legislators will bundle the bills into an omnibus bill, HF535 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul), that will include measures to improve housing statewide. Provisions will touch on issues that have become social problems in recent years, such as the lack of affordable housing for lowincome people, the elderly, and the handicapped, and an increasing homeless population statewide, not just in urban areas.


The Housing Division's omnibus bill reflects the commission's agenda for improved housing in Minnesota with programs that would subsidize rental housing for low income families, individuals, and the chronically mentally ill, and programs that would involve state and local governments, neighborhood groups, for-profit and nonprofit housing developers and lenders working together for better housing.

Regional bargaining

The Education Committee delayed action on regional bargaining for teachers. On April 3, the committee voted to lay over HF1076 (Kelso, DFL-Shakopee) until the Legislative Commission on Employee Relations issues a report on the collective bargaining matter.

The proposal would allow the State Board of Education to appoint regional labor relations boards and school district bargaining regions. It also would transfer from the school board to the regional labor relations board the authority to negotiate contracts with district teachers.

Supporters say the bill would help eliminate some of the hard feelings between teachers and local school boards that crop up during contract negotiations, and would allow local officials to concentrate on educational issues. Opponents say it would not speed up the negotiation process nor would it consider disparities among districts.

Gambling legislation

Bills that would establish a treatment program for compulsive gamblers and allow organizations to use charitable gambling proceeds to pay for certain building expenditures topped the agenda in the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee April 4.

HF236 (Jaros, DFL-Duluth) would direct the Department of Health to set up a program to treat compulsive gamblers. The program would include a toll-free telephone number, a resource library, and public education seminars to help compulsive gamblers. Also, it would provide regional training at in-service seminars and conferences for health care professionals, educators, treatment providers, employee assistance counselors, and criminal justice professionals.

The bill would also set certification standards for these programs and treatment providers, and for inpatient and outpatient treatment and rehabilitation services. The committee recommended passage of the bill; it goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Charitable gambling organizations would be able to use profits to pay for certain building costs if HF555 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids) gains final approval. Organizations could use profits to repair and maintain a building the organization owns if other nonprofit or community organizations use the building extensively. Provisions would prohibit an owner organization from charging a fee to nonprofit groups using its building. and would permit the owner organization to use profits to pay expenses that insurance does not cover. Also, the Charitable Gambling Control Board would have to give prior approval to organizations wanting to use their profits on building projects.

The committee adopted an amendment to the bill that would bring video games of chance under the board's control. The bill received a favorable recommendation; it awaits further action on the House floor.

Plant closing notification 📟

A bill that would require employers to tell workers 120 days before they close a plant or conduct massive layoffs cleared the Labor-Management Relations Committee April 3. It now goes to the Commerce Committee.

"It's only fair," says Rep. Tom Rukavina (DFL-Virginia), author of HF882. "We have to recognize that these people are worth something."

Rukavina says the bill reflects the federal plant closing law, but differs from it in several ways. For instance, Rukavina's proposal would affect employers with at least 50 full-time employees, and would require them to pay severance and health benefits for a specific time after the closing or layoff. Federal law affects employers with 100 full-time employees, and does not require them to pay severance or health insurance. Also, federal law requires only 60 days' notification.

Bill supporters say it gives dignity and worth to employees' loyalty to the company. Opponents say that mandating items like severance pay and health benefits may cost the state potential business startups.

Historical interpretive center 📟


Indian people will once again give land to the state of Minnesota—this time, for a cooperative economic development venture.

Officials of the Leech Lake Chippewa tribe presented a budget request to the Appropriations' Agriculture, Transportation and Semi-State Division April 3. The tribe asked legislators for \$90,000 to advance plans for a historical interpretative center.

The tribe wants to build the center on Battle Point, one of the battle grounds where a military clash occurred between Indian people and the United States, according to John Thompson, tribal planner. They plan to donate 122 acres to the state to locate the center near the reservation. The center will include a museum, theatre, campsite, and a boat landing, he says.

Minnesota Historical Society (MHS) officials contributed technical assistance and advice to the Leech Lake tribe, says John Wood, MHS deputy director. "The area is rich in archaeological resources, and definitely a historical site," he says.

Tribal officials say they will employ tribal elders as historical interpreters. Thompson says the tribal government plans to make the center a national model for preserving and demonstrating traditional Indian culture.

School milk program

Minnesota students in kindergarten through grade six may receive free milk each school day, if a bill the Agriculture Committee heard April 3 becomes law.

HF625, which Rep. Rick Krueger (DFL-Staples) authors, would provide at least one serving of milk daily for the health and well-being of elementary pupils in public and nonpublic schools. A current state program provides milk only to kindergartners.

A legislator who supports the bill told lawmakers about a teacher who recently testified that the milk and lunch program meals are the only meals some students receive. Krueger says his bill would provide added resources to school districts throughout the state, and would encourage all school districts to participate.

The committee recommended passage of the bill.

Insurance sales, scams

Seniors would have more protection against dishonest insurance agents and con artists if two bills the Judiciary Committee approved March 31 become law.

HF611 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) would regulate Medicare supplement insurance policies to protect seniors from agents who use deceptive sales tactics. Unscrupulous agents may face prison time if they deceive seniors about Medicare insurance.

The bill also would set standards for Medicare supplement policies and require an agent to take a consumer's insurance needs into consideration before recommending a policy. Proponents say the bill would prevent agents from recommending only the policies that pay the highest premium instead of those that best suit the consumer.

HF622 (Milbert, DFL-South St. Paul) would enhance civil penalties for con artists who intentionally target seniors and handicapped people. The bill calls for educational materials and seminars on consumer protection issues of particular interest to seniors and the handicapped. Supporters say it would address community concerns about such things as people posing as contractors who grossly overcharge homeowners for repair work. The bill would also cover insurance scams and other deceptive acts.

School district consolidation

Smaller schools are losing students due to open enrollment, says Rep. Elton Redalen (IR-Fountain). These districts are also losing money because the state provides funding based on the number of students in a school, he says. Loss of state funds can lead to an operating debt, which can make it harder to consolidate with another district.


"This may be the first effect of open enrollment," Redalen told the Education Committee's Education Finance Division March 31. He presented HF844, a bill that would provide \$1 million to the Department of Education for school districts that need to pay off operating debts before they can consolidate with another district.

Dr. Kent Nelson, superintendent of the

Peterson School District, says his district carries a 16-mill referendum and a 16mill referendum levy override, and still anticipates a \$150,000 debt by next summer. The district has lost 17 students since last year, resulting in a \$54,460 loss of state revenue. Nelson fears losing more students if the district cuts academic programs and proposes consolidation with another district. Money to clear their debt would make a consolidation easier, he says.

Sexist language is on its way out of lawmakers' terminology. Rep. John Burger (IR-Long Lake) objected to using the term "sister" to describe a proposed community program. During the Economic Development Committee meeting April 6, Burger moved to amend HF1072 (Williams, DFL-Moorhead) to remove the word "sister" from "sister community program" and replace it with "cousin." The committee upheld the amendment on a 15 to 10 vote.

Homeless and displaced veterans and their families may find temporary shelter on surplus government lands under a resolution the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee adopted April 5. The resolution asks the President, Congress, and United States General Services Administration to promptly release state property for emergency shelter use.

Vietnam era veterans would have perpetual status as a protected group for state employment under a proposal in the Legislature. Vietnam-era veterans would continue to receive specific consideration in affirmative action programs and expanded certification on employment eligiblility lists. Current state law ends their protected group status this year.

Bars could stay open until 1:00 a.m. Monday through Sunday, under HF528 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids), which the Regulated Industries Committee heard April 3. The bill would extend on-sale hours for intoxicating liquor sales from midnight to 1:00 a.m. on Sundays and Mondays, thereby closing sales at the same time every night. If the Legislature approves the bill, retailers could also sell liquor on New Year's Day and the Fourth of July. Current Minnesota law prohibits retail sales on both holidays. State agencies may see STARS in their future—the Statewide Telecommunications Access and Routing System, that is. The system would provide statewide coordinated planning, and costeffective leasing and availability of quality voice, data, and video telecommunications services to state, county, and private agencies. Randy Young of the State Planning Agency explained the STARS project to members of the Appropriation Committee's Education Division April 4.

The Regional Transit Board (RTB) would have to approve any light rail transit system the Twin Cities metro area develops, if HF1408 (Carruthers, DFL-Brooklyn Center) becomes law. The bill would create a joint light rail transit (LRT) board consisting of county and Metropolitan Transit Commission (MTC) officials who would prepare a management plan and a regional LRT system design. The bill would also expand the RTB and MTC's membership. The Transportation Committee approved the bill April 5, and rereferred it to the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee.


Cold and curious? The Economic Development Committee's International Trade and Technology Division gave the okay April 5 to HF1295 (Neuenschwander, DFL-International Falls), a bill that would create a Cold Weather Research Center (CWRC) in International Falls. The CWRC would coordinate and provide services to companies and others doing cold weather research in the state.

The oilspill that happened in Alaska March 24 will not happen in Minnesota, says Rep. Bob Johnson (DFL-Bemidji). He told the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 4 that while the global community may have an attitude that such accidents can't happen, Minnesota has a different attitude. HF534 (Munger, DFL-Duluth), a bill that would establish Minnesota's groundwater protection policy, would not allow that kind of environmental accident to happen here, he says. Groundwater protection legislation moved one step closer to becoming law when the Governmental Operations Committee gave HF534 preliminary approval April 6. Author Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth) says "The approach we take in the bill recognizes that education, research, monitoring incentives, regulation, and partnership with state and local government is necessary." The bill goes next to the Agriculture Committee.

The Old Jordan Forty would become a park under a bill the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee heard April 6. The city of Maplewood would preserve 48 acres of land in Ramsey County that overlooks the Mississippi River to use as a recreational park. The park would tie into the metropolitan park system.



Immigrants put a touch of home on a strange land when they gave cities and townships of Minnesota names that reflect their varied heritage.

A large population came from Scandinavia and settled in places like Lee (for Olaf Lee, Norwegian pioneer), Hamre (for a district in Norway), and Ronneby (a small town in southern Sweden on the Ronneby River).


Finlanders named Wouri (Finnish for mountain) and Kalevala, meaning "the abode or land of heroes," in honor of Finland's national poem.


Scotch, French, German, and Irish influence is evident in names such as Macville (Scotsmen McAninch and McPheters chose it); Parent (for French farmer Auguste Parent and his family); Heidelberg (for the city of Heidelberg, Germany); and Derrynane (for Derrynane Abbey, southwest Ireland).

Religion had an impact, too. Quakers settled Bethel; its ancient Palestinian name means "House of God." And Catholics named Graceville for Thomas Langdon Grace, bishop of St. Paul, 1859-1884.

Russian, Polish, and Spanish influence shows in the names of Odessa (after the city of Odessa in southern Russia); Grygla (for Frank Grygla, "the father of the Polish National Alliance," of which he was president for 10 years); and Cerro Gordo ("Big Mountain" in Spanish; the suggestion of Colonel Samuel McPhail, Mexican War veteran of the battle of Cerro Gordo). Native American names of Dakota and Ojibwa origin dot the Minnesota map. Among them are Biwabik (Ojibwa, meaning Iron), Winona (Dakota Indian name for a female eldest child);

and Mahtomedi (Dakota for "White Bear").

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
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Highlights

Medical leave

Adults could take up to two weeks of unpaid leave from their jobs annually for the catastrophic illness of their spouses, children, in-laws, or parents if a bill Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls) sponsors becomes law.

The Labor-Management Relations Committee April 12 narrowly approved HF367 and sent it to the House Floor.

The bill would allow adults to take the unpaid leave if a serious health condition exists that involves inpatient care in a health care facility or continuing medical treatment from a health care provider. The measure also would allow up to two weeks' leave for an employee with a serious health condition. Employees would be eligible for either type of leave after working one year with the employer.

Employees also could use accumulated sick leave to care for a sick relative. McLaughlin says the bill does not add to paid sick leave; rather, it removes the potential of an employee lying to an employer about the reason for taking a sick day.

Opponents of the bill say small businesses may have difficulty complying with the measure, and that the state would be mandating a fringe benefit.

It's a fact!

A combination of Minnesota winter and a new legislative session can mean some stormy days, but we hope nothing like the storm that made its way into the St. Cloud, Sauk Rapids area on April 14, 1886. That high wind weather disaster is known for taking the most lives. No one knows which was the most severe storm of all time, but several

could compete for the title, such as the Great Hailstorm of July 20, 1903,

which laid waste to entire townships in Lincoln, Pipestone, Rock, and Nobles counties, and the Thursday Storm of June 20, 1974. The Thursday storm caused almost immeasurable wind damage, and the July storm holds the record for damage from hail.

Surrogate mothers 📟

Lawmakers say they don't want "babybrokering" in Minnesota. So, the House Judiciary Committee gave preliminary approval April 12 to HF41, a bill that would prohibit businesses that act as intermediaries between surrogate mothers and people who want to buy babies. Author Rep. Ann Rest (DFL-New Hope) says the goal of the bill is to "discourage the practice of commercialized surrogacy in the state of Minnesota as a matter of public policy."


The bill would make surrogacy contracts, which are now narrowly defined, unenforceable and void in Minnesota. It would also propose a ban on advertising in Minnesota for surrogate mothers.

Supporters of the bill say that treating babies as commodities is harmful to children and shows lack of concern for their rights. They also point out that it's mostly the privileged and professional classes who hire the working poor to carry a child.

A significant rise in infertility rates among younger women in industrialized nations has increased the demand for surrogate mothers, compounding the problem, according to a surrogacy critic.

Several spokespersons for women's groups told the committee they support the legislation. One woman testified that "There's no way possible to know how most surrogate mothers will feel after the birth of the baby, or how how the biological father and his wife will feel if it's not the 'perfect baby' they're expecting."

The bill goes next to the full House.

Midwives '

Some Minnesota parents want to chose where, when, how, and with whom to give birth to their children. And they want their choices to include a traditional midwife.

Minnesota parents now have the right to have a midwife, but restrictions apply to the midwife. HF1258 (Pappas, DFL-St. Paul) would remove those restrictions.

The bill would remove the requirement that the state Board of Medical Examiners license and regulate the practice of midwifery. Instead, it would define the practice of traditional midwifery and provide certification if an applicant meets certain requirements of the Minnesota Midwives' Guild (MMG).

Approximately one-half percent of Minnesota parents give birth at home, according to information presented to a Health and Human Services subcommittee April 11 and 12. Two kinds of midwives practice in Minnesota: traditional midwives, who are independent practitioners but collaborate with physicians; and certified nurse-midwives, who have postgraduate training in midwifery.

Gretchen Musicant, speaking for the Minnesota Nurses Association (MNA) told the committee that the association supports certification from the MMG, but that state regulation is needed to enforce certification standards. Dr. Ann Montgomery, a family physician representing the Minnesota Medical Association (MMA) and other medical organizations, urged lawmakers to oppose the bill to uphold quality medical care in Minnesota.

The subcommittee gave the bill bipartisan support and sent it to the full Health and Human Services Committee for further consideration.

Service stations

Gasoline refiners and producers would have to provide security measures to their franchisees if the refiners and producers expect gas stations to remain open 24 hours, according to a bill the Commerce Committee okayed April 13.

HF1292, which Rep. Loren Solberg (DLF-Bovey) sponsors, would regulate agreements for gasoline franchises. It would not ban 24-hour service stations, Solberg stressed, but would allow a franchise to close a between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless the producer or refiner installs security devices. The gas supplier would be liable for the amount of losses or expenses incurred during that time if the supplier requires that a station remain open.

Opponents say the bill fails to consider the total time a station stays open, and that overnight losses could be offset. They say the bill is discriminatory because it singles out a small portion of total service station operations.

Truancy

A bill that would seek to prevent children's school-skipping tendencies before they take hold cleared its first hurdle in the Education Committee April 12.

Author Rep. Wes Skoglund (DFL-Mpls) says HF996 would give school districts the option to require enrolled pupils under age 7 to attend school.

Skoglund and others testified that truancy habits often begin in elementary school, and that correlation between truancy and delinquency is high. Parents often enroll their children in kindergarten, then simply not take them to school.

"These children are most likely not being read to at home during the evenings," he says. "The television set is on, and it's not tuned in to 'Sesame Street'."

Skoglund stresses that the bill would not lower the compulsory attendance age, but would simply give school officials another tool to combat truancy.

Teaching assistants

Some University of Minnesota (U of M) teaching assistants need to improve their speaking skills so that their students can understand them, says Rep. Connie Morrison (IR-Burnsville).

She presented HF1442 to the Higher Education Division April 12. The bill would request the U of M to train to all teaching assistants in oral communications, teaching skills, and American classroom protocol. It would also appropriate funds to the U of M for the training program.

Rep. Alice Johnson (DFL-Spring Lake Park) wants to make the request less specific. She says the bill is a good idea, but its effects may be discriminatory.

"I have no quarrel with the bill and I'm pleased something is being put forward. I am uncomfortable, however, with trying to say that someone who doesn't speak like me is ineffective," Johnson says. She pointed out that minority or international students may disagree about who lacks good oral communication skills.

Committee members recommended passage of the bill and suggested that Morrison and Johnson work out a compromise before the full Education Committee hears it.

Fishing opener 🚥

Lawmakers gasped at the idea of opening the fishing season on Mother's Day more often. But, after hearing convincing testimony, they recommended passage of a bill that would allow just that.

Rep. Tony Kinkel (DFL-Park Rapids) presented HF831 to the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 11. He points out that under the current schedule, the opener would occur only nine times on Mother's Day. However, he says, "...this bill would double the times it would open on Mother's Day to 18 out of 22 opening dates."

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) gets a lot of angry calls when the opener falls on Mother's Day. Nonetheless, DNR officials support a plan to create uniform opening dates. And the department would continue to close certain lakes to fish harvesting.

Opening the fishing season earlier would have a beneficial economic impact on the tourism industry, Kinkel says. He notes that the Minnesota Resort Association, Minnesota Congress of Resorts, and the Campground Motel Association support the bill.

Sibley High School

West St. Paul School District officials want the state's help to pay for repairs at the recently vandalized Sibley High School. They say it's important to get funding immediately to complete the repairs before the next school year begins.

The school district wants authorization to issue bonds to pay for the repairs. The district would use the money for asbestos abatement and disposal, repairing structural damage, and replacing and repairing building equipment and fixtures. Officials estimate the damage at about \$5 million.

District officials want the state to pay the bond's debt service levy payments. They estimate the cost would exceed \$700,000 annually, but insurance money the district collects would be applied to the debt service.

The district is pursuing federal loan and grant aid, including aid from the Environmental Protection Agency. Federal aid, however, may not be available until next year.

Rep. Tom Pugh (DFL-South St. Paul) presented HF1587, the aid request, to the Education Finance Division April 11. The full Education Committee will consider the request next.

Regional Transit Board 💻

A bill that would reorganize the Regional Transit Board (RTB) withstood a series of amendments in the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee April 11 as legislators continued hearings on it. The main thrust of HF1408, according to author Rep. Phil Carruthers (DFL-Brooklyn Park), is to reorganize all transit board functions, including bus system oversight and metro mobility. But the provision receiving the most attention would set up a joint planning board to manage and plan for light rail transit in the seven-county metropolitan area.

The committee amended the bill to expand planning board membership to include an additional representative from the Hennepin County Regional Rail Authority, and someone from the Minnesota Department of Transportation. The bill would require the board to submit transit plans to the RTB in 1990.

Another amendment would require the light rail transit system to be accessible for the handicapped. The bill moves next to the House Floor for further consideration.

Jail employees

Some jail employees would need specific training and licensing under a bill that received preliminary approval from the Governmental Operations Committee April 11.

HF207 would create a board of jail employee training and standards to train, license, and establish standards of conduct for employees who have administrative, supervisory, custodial, or programmatic responsibilities within local adult detention and corrections facilities.

Bill author Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids) says jails need professionals to help reduce the number of liability suits against the state and ensure the safety of inmates. Quinn says "...you have a situation in a jail that is potentially brutalizing....Young people...brought in there...for shoplifting...could be in the same jail with someone there for the most brutal crimes."

Lawmakers show strong initial support for the bill. It now needs approval from the Appropriations Committee before the full House can vote on the measure.

Water shortages

In the wake of last summer's drought and water shortage, the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee heard a bill April 11 that would require the Metropolitan Council to develop plans for water shortages. Rep. Loren Solberg (DFL-Bovey) authors the bill that calls for short- and long-term plans for water use and supply in the Twin Cities metropolitan area.

The bill would direct the council to identify alternative courses of action in case of a drought, such as water conservation and economic options. A complete study, due in 1990, would involve the Army Corps of Engineers, the Leech Lake Reservation Business Committee, the Mississippi Headwaters Board, and the Environmental Quality Board.

The committee gave the bill overwhelming support. It goes next to the Appropriations Committee.

Rattlesnakes

Rattlesnakes are really shy and timid creatures, says veterinarian Barney Oldfield. He says rattlesnakes are an endangered species and Minnesota ought to abolish its rattlesnake bounty.

Rep. Bob Waltman (IR-Elgin) presented HF930, a bill that would do just that, to the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 11.

"Rattlesnakes are really very timid and secretive animals. Most people who have hunted them for a number of years would walk right by them and never find them or know they were there," says Oldfield, Minnesota Herpetological Society. Rattlesnakes just lie there in silence, he says.

Other states have lifted their bounties on rattlesnakes and haven't seen any kind of population explosion. Available habitat and food supply seems to control native species quite well, Oldfield says.

Minnesota has paid bounty on nearly 29,000 rattlesnakes over the last 13 years, according to Waltman. He says the figure shows that people bring in snakes from elsewhere to take advantage of Minne-

sota's bounty.

Bounties range from \$1 to \$3 per snake, Waltman says. The state could save some money if the Legislature would abolish the bounty.

Postsecondary enrollment -

The postsecondary enrollment option, which allows secondary (high school) students to attend a postsecondary institution while in high school, would undergo changes if a bill Rep. Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn) sponsors becomes law.

The Education Committee heard testimony on the bill April 10, and expected to act on it later in the week.

HF1314 would require the postsecondary institution to file periodic progress reports with the high school, the student, and the student's parents. And it would direct the school district and the postsecondary institution to offer students pre-enrollment counseling.

The two biggest changes, however, would direct students to complete required courses at the high school, and pay for postsecondary classes they take for college credit. Existing law doesn't have those requirements, and legislators say they've heard complaints about students who essentially get part of their college education at state expense.

Students and parents spoke against the proposal that would require them to pay for the courses. Some say the restriction would discourage students from seeking a postsecondary education; others note it would prevent students from getting a jump on their college coursework.

Hate crimes 📟

Rising numbers of hate crimes on the state and national level motivated the Judiciary Committee to approve HF700 April 7, a bill that would increase penalties for such incidents.

The bill would target individuals who commit crimes against victims because of their race, color, religion, sex, physical or mental disability, age, sexual orientation, or national origin.

Bill author Rep. Lee Greenfield (DFL-Mpls) says the legislation is carefully worded to protect all members of society. He reminded committee members that anyone can feel the effects of bigotry.

Leaders from almost every religion, the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association, and others testified in favor of the bill.

Opposition came from political activists who fought against a St. Paul City Council measure last year that would have expanded civil rights to include a person's sexual orientation. Proponents told the activists that the bill would also protect them if someone harassed them because they're heterosexual.

The bill goes next to the full House.


Class size

Class size definitely affects a child's education, according to state education officials. They told members of the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee April 7 that there's an inverse relationship between class size and the quality of education youngsters receive.

The difference shows up in percentage scores on achievement tests given to similar students from classes of different sizes. For example, a class of 21 or fewer students, on the average, scored higher on tests than classes with 30 or more students. Educators feel that class size for kindergarten through third grade should be about 15 students. The average class size today is about 24.

Achievement isn't the only area that class size affects, according to educators. Students' attitudes suffer, along with their opportunity to participate and develop, and the amount of individual attention they receive.

But, as officials told lawmakers, to reduce class size schools will need more teachers and more classrooms, and more money to pay for both.



Communities savaged by recent flooding along the Red River will receive financial aid from the state. The House suspended its rules April 12 to give immediate approval to HF1586 (Lieder, DFL-Crookston), which includes a \$250,000 appropriation for the flooded areas. The Department of Natural Resources will administer the money through its emergency relief account. The Senate approved the bill April 13; it now goes to the governor for his signature.

Hearing impaired individuals could make telephone calls from bus and airport terminals under HF1498 (Lynch, IR-Andover), a bill the Regulated Industries Committee considered April 10. The bill would require bus and airport terminal operators to install telecommunications devices for the deaf, commonly known as "TDDs," under designated public pay phones.

Don't litigate...mediate! HF1478 (Orenstein, DFL-St. Paul) calls for the state court administrator to adopt guidelines and provide training for arbitrators and mediators for community dispute resolution programs. The guidelines would have to insure that participation is voluntary and include case processing procedures and criteria for qualifying for court referrals. The Judiciary Committee gave the bill preliminary approval April 12. Legislators selected Luverne and Fergus Falls as sites for two new veterans homes. The state currently operates three veterans homes, with a fourth in Two Harbors awaiting state funding. Veterans groups hope to have the new homes operating by 1991. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee recommended the sites April 11; the Appropriations Committee will hear the proposals next.

Itasca State Park will be 100 years old next year. Every Minnesota state park will schedule special events in 1990 to honor the 100th anniversary of the state park system. Members of the Environment and Natural Resources Committee approved a bill that would appropriate \$100,000 to the commissioner of natural resources for the anniversary events. The bill would also direct the commissioners of natural resources and trade and economic development to coordinate efforts to inform the public about the celebrations.

The housing omnibus bill moved intact through the Financial Institutions and Housing Committee on its way to the Appropriations Committee April 11, but only after lengthy debate and testimony in Housing Division meetings. HF535 (O'Connor, DFL-St. Paul) incorporates recommendations from the Governor's Task Force on Affordable Housing which address Minnesota's housing problems.

Anyone listening? HF815 (Carruthers, DFL-Brooklyn Center) would make it easier for law enforcement officials to obtain the authority to intercept a wire, oral, or electronic communication if an emergency situation exists that involves immediate danger or physical injury to someone and there are grounds to issue a warrant. The Judiciary Committee gave the bill the okay April 12 and sent it to the House Floor. Snapping turtle meat is a delicacy and creates an \$80,000 per year industry for turtle hunters, say Rep. Thomas Pugh (DFL-South St. Paul). He told the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 13 about the snapping turtle population decline. Lawmakers recommended passage of a bill to regulate licenses, bag limits, possession, and methods of trapping the turtles.

"COMBAT WOUNDED VET"

license plates may be appearing on Minnesota highways in 1990. The special plates would be available for combatwounded veterans who have received the Purple Heart medal. This plate will join five other special plates available to certain veterans. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee recommended approval of the plates; the Appropriations Committee will hear the proposal next.

Those who apply for financial aid to attend a postsecondary institution had better have their financial houses in order. A bill from the Higher Education Coordinating Board that the Appropriation Committee's Education Division considered April 11 would limit grant eligibility to students who are not in default on a loan. The division approved the measure, which will be included in the omnibus education appropriations bill.

About 39 percent of the groundwater tested throughout Minnesota showed some type of pollution, according to Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth). He sponsors HF534, a bill that would require the commissioner of agriculture to establish management practices and water resource protection requirements for fertilizer use, distribution, storage, handling and disposal. The Environmental Quality Board would determine the adequacy of state agency groundwater protection efforts. So far, three House committees have recommended passage of the bill.

How a bill becomes law in Minnesota

A bill is an idea for a new law, or an idea to abolish or change an existing law. Several thousand bills enter the legislative process in Minnesota each time the Legislature meets.

Minnesota has a bicameral Legislature, or two groups of elected citizens (senators in the Senate, representatives in the House of Representatives) who study, discuss, and vote on bills, acting for the people of Minnesota. Bills begin their legislative journey in either the House or the Senate, or both. To become a law, all bills must pass in both the House and Senate, and go to the governor for his signature.

The Idea

Anyone can propose an idea for a bill an individual, consumer group, corporation, professional association, governmental unit, or the governor. Most frequently, ideas come from members of the Legislature.

Revisor of Statutes

The revisor puts the idea into the proper legal form as a bill for introduction into the House of Representatives or the Senate, usually both. The revisor also updates *Minnesota Statutes* to include all new laws.

Chief Author

The legislator who sponsors and introduces the bill in the Legislature is the chief author. The chief author's name appears on the bill with the bill's file number for identification as it moves through the legislative process. The chief author may select up to four other authors, whose names also appear on the bill.

Introduction in the Legislature

When the author introduces a bill in the House, it gets a House File (HF) number (HF264, for example), indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction. In the Senate, the bill gets a Senate File (SF) number (SF224, for example). Each House File usually has a companion Senate File. All revenue-raising bills must begin in the House.

Committee Consideration

At introduction, the bill has its first reading. (The Minnesota Constitution requires three readings on three separate days for all bills.) The presiding officer of the House or Senate refers the bill to an appropriate committee for action. All committee meetings are open to the public. A committee may: recommend passage of a bill in its original form; recommend passage after amendment by the committee; or make no recommendation, in which case a bill may die when the session ends. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its actions and recommendations to the House or Senate.

General Orders

After approval of the committee report in the House and Senate, the bill has its second reading and goes onto General Orders—a list of bills awaiting action. Legislators, acting as the Committee of the Whole, discuss bills, debate the issues, adopt amendments, and present arguments. They may recommend; that a bill "do pass," postponement, or further committee action.

Calendar

The calendar is a list of bills the Committee of the Whole recommends to pass. At this point, a bill has its third reading. Amendments to a bill on the Calendar must have the unanimous consent of all Members in this final vote. By committee recommendation, non-controversial bills may bypass General Orders and go directly onto a Consent Calendar, usually passing without debate. Every bill requires a majority vote of the full membership of the House and Senate to pass.

Conference Committee

If the House and Senate do not agree on a bill, a conference committee of three or five senators, and an equal number of representatives, meets to reach an agreement. If both bodies then pass the bill in compromise form, it goes to the governor.

Governor

When a bill arrives at the governor's office, the governor may: sign it, and the bill becomes law; veto it (return it with a "veto message" stating the objections); pocket veto the bill (take no action and let adjournment of the Legislature, in effect, veto the bill); or line veto portions of appropriation bills. If the governor does not sign or veto a bill within three days after receiving it, and the Legislature is in session, the bill automatically becomes law.


The summer of 1894 brought hot winds and high temperatures to Minnesota, creating ideal conditions for the Great Hinckley Fire to sweep through Minnesota's central forest on Sept. 1. The disastrous fire killed 413 people, left thousands homeless and destroyed towns within 400 square miles of Pine County. Without state or federal forestry service, the townspeople were left to squelch the intense fires themselves. In fleeing the fires, townspeople jumped into lakes, ponds, and wells, and buried themselves in potato patches. A lucky few escaped on the No. 4 Limited, a train that drove a mile and a half into the burning flames and caught fire.

Up to 1894, Minnesota had no way of regulating forests, except for a conspicuous Minnesota State Forestry Association. For 15 years, Christopher C. Andrews, statesman and first forest conservationist for Minnesota, introduced several pieces of legislation to help preserve Minnesota's forests. Provoked by the Hinckley Fire of 1894, Andrews' forestry bill passed the 1895 Legislature, designating areas for state fire protection in the event of forest and prairie fires and for the conservation of timber.

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
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Anti-takeover bills

As part of state government's response to the possible takeover of Northwest Airlines, the Commerce Committee gave preliminary approval to three antitakeover measures within the last seven days.

On April 20, the committee heard HF1709, which sponsor Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) says would direct the Metropolitan Airports Commission to approve any acquisition of a major airport tenant whose main executive offices are located in the state. It also contains provisions that would protect employees, and would tax the so-called golden parachutes, or large severance packages for corporate executives.

And Simoneau sponsors HF1689, a resolution asking Congress to review federal legislation on hostile takeovers and stock accumulations. It also asks Congress to enact legislation that would permit states to regulate takeovers and stock accumulations when business enterprises have an adverse effect upon shareholders, employees, communities and the state economy.

Both bills await further committee consideration.

At an April 14 meeting, the committee

considered HF1665, a bill that would allow a political entity to attach a lien to a corporation if the corporation employs at least 10,000 workers in the state and is worth at least \$500 million. The lien would be for the amount of money the state or political subdivision invested in the corporation.

Rep. John Sarna (DFL-Mpls) says the bill "sends a message that we want people to operate in our state," but warns would-be hostile bidders "if you're going to bust up the airline...we want our just due."

On a vote of 115 to 9, the full House passed HF1665 on April 20.

State tournaments

Hockey supporters from Greater Minnesota want the Legislature to approve a bill that would allow an extra tournament for sports that have only one postseason tournament.

Parents, teachers, and community representatives from small outstate schools testified in support of HF1268 (Janezich, DFL-Chisholm) at a special subcommittee hearing April 20 because they want their kids to have an opportunity to play in a state tournament. Many small schools don't have a chance to play in the state tournament, according to testimony, because big, metropolitan hockey teams dominate the competition.


If the Legislature passes the bill, supporters are ready with a proposal for a new hockey tournament. Enrollment size wouldn't be the only determining factor for participation. Smaller schools with successful hockey programs wouldn't have to participate, and larger schools with little tournament play could

participate. The tournament would take place one week before the traditional hockey tournament, and participants would play outside the metropolitan area.

The Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL) opposes the bill. The reason Minnesota doesn't have a twoclass tournament, structure in hockey, according to Roger Aronson, MSHSL lobbyist, is because only 36 class "A" schools play hockey. League rules require 48 teams before they'll form a new class of competition. Aronson also says the MSHSL, not the Legislature, should decide this issue.

The subcommittee recommended passage of the bill. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee plans to hear the bill April 25.

Tax increment financing


Tax increment financing (TIF) cost the state of Minnesota \$53.4 million over the last two years, almost double the 1986 tag of \$27.5 million, according to a House Research brief. The brief reports that cities increasingly use TIF because of changes in financial aid formulas and higher property tax rates. TIF is a state financial tool helping private developers rehabilitate blighted areas they might not otherwise develop.

Bills before the Taxes Committee's Property Tax Subcommittee address TIF criteria and intergovernmental aid costs. The subcommittee met April 18 and 20 to hear testimony from county and city officials concerning four bills on tax increment financing. Committee members heard the bills as part of an ongoing evaluation of Minnesota's property tax structure.


TIF works by first designating districts that are eligible for financing. To qualify, a district might show that a majority of its buildings are structurally substandard and need thorough renovation or clearance; or that existing conditions, such as inadequate street layout, incompatible land uses, or overcrowding of buildings require substantial renovation. Two bills, HF1335 (Valento, IR-Little Canada) and HF1341 (Rest, DFL-New Hope), propose to tighten TIF qualifying requirements. The bills would repeal a clause that qualifies industrial parks containing contaminated sewage lagoons and would clarify redevelopment criteria.

In a TIF district with a TIF financed real estate development, residents help pay for the development through increased property taxes. Revenue the tax increase generates goes to a development authority or city, which uses it for subsidizing development. Both Valento's and Rest's bills would clarify dispersal of revenue by requiring the development authority or city to use the money to correct the conditions which allowed the district to qualify for TIF. Valento's bill would require a 100 percent return; Rest's would require 95 percent.

The committee plans to act on technical modifications to the TIF law and will study the subject further during the interim.

Head Start funding

The only state and federally funded Head Start program in Hennepin County, The PICA Family and Child Development Center, may receive \$16 million from the Legislature during the next two years. The money would enable the program to reach more low income children who don't receive services due to lack of funding.

The Appropriations Committee's Health and Human Services Division approved the proposal April 19, but with limits on the amount of money the program could use for startup costs. The governor also recommended funding for the program.

Some lawmakers expressed concern about the Head Start program having only one facility in Hennepin County, which forces some preschoolers to spend up to one hour on the schoolbus. The division agreed to work toward a solution.

Rep. Kathleen Vellenga (DFL-St. Paul), author of a Head Start bill legislators heard earlier this session, says the program aims to provide more low income preschool children with a comprehensive developmental program to increase their success in preschool.

Emotionally abused children

Children who suffer from emotional abuse held the attention of lawmakers April 19.

The Judiciary Committee's Criminal Justice Division gave preliminary approval to HF604, a bill that would expand the legal definition of a child in need of protection or services to include those children who are victims of emotional maltreatment. Bill author Rep. Brad Stanius (IR-White Bear Lake) says the bill may save victims of physical or sexual abuse where evidence is not attainable.

Under the bill's proposed definition, emotional maltreatment would occur when a person responsible for a child's care consistently inflicts mental harm on the child that has an observable, sustained, and adverse effect on the child's physical, mental, or emotional development.

Some lawmakers are concerned that the bill is too broad and that child protection workers are already overburdened with cases under current law. However, the division approved an amendment that says "reasonable training or discipline" does not constitute emotional maltreatment.

The bill goes next to the Judiciary Committee.

Pets, stray animals

Unwanted pets and stray animals are a serious problem in metropolitan areas and some suburbs, according to Minnesota lawmakers.

The Governmental Operations Committee gave preliminary approval April 19 to HF982 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would establish a commission to study the feasibility of a pilot program in the seven-county metropolitan area to reduce the population of unwanted stray dogs and cats, and encourage pet owners to have their animals sterilized. Also, the bill would direct the commissioner to look at ways to provide low-cost spaying and neutering.

The growing population of these animals poses serious health and safety threats to communities, according to commission supporters. Under the bill, the commission would report its findings to the Legislature at the beginning of next year, and give recommendations on how to solve the problem.

35W demo project

Flexibility could be the key to solving the traffic congestion problems along the Interstate 35W corridor linking Minneapolis and its suburbs, according to a resolution the Transportation Committee okayed April 19.

SF388 would ask Congress to approve legislation that would give Minnesota transportation officials greater flexibility in using federal funds for the 35W construction project.

House sponsor Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) says if Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) officials receive greater latitude to use federal highway dollars, they could examine areas such as light rail transit, traffic management, or carpooling, in addition to the traditional lane expansion.

"This would give us a chance to look at alternatives rather than coming out and laying down a bunch of concrete," says MnDOT official Dick Borson.

The 35W construction project would run along the corridor between Minneapolis, Richfield, Bloomington, and Burnsville.


Game limits

Proposed new laws regulating party hunting would allow one member of the party to carry all of the game without fear of violating small game limits. Rep. Brad Stanius (IR-White Bear Lake) offered SF297 to the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 18 for their inspection.

The bill would allow one member of a hunting party to take or possess more than an individual limit of small game or fish, but not more than the total amount allowed for the entire hunting party.

"One person can end up carrying more than one limit of game simply because the dog keeps bringing the game back to the same person," says Mike Grupa, Enforcement Division of the Department of Natural Resources. "Sometimes the wind is blowing in a direction where one person will get more shots than the others. The problem comes when we can't see who all is in the party, but we know one person is carrying more than his limit of game."

Randy Evans, conservation officer supervisor, says the current practice of conservation officers is to look at the total number of game a party has rather than checking which person got the seventh or ninth animal or fish.

Transportation museum 📟

A museum exhibiting trains, boats, planes, and automobiles and their histories will have to wait a while longer before opening its doors.

The Transportation Committee April 19 did not recommend passage of HF1105, which Rep. Sandy Pappas (DFL-St. Paul) sponsors.

The bill would have sought state funding for a museum that would focus on rail, air and space, highway, and water modes of transportation. Pappas said the museum would have been the first of its kind in the nation.

"We have a heritage to present to the public," said Bill Faulkner, president of the Transportation Museum Development Corp.

But committee members said they wouldn't be able to justify to their constituents spending state money for a museum when other pressing transportation-related needs exist.

Elephant Creek Dam

Elephant Creek provides an opportunity for the U.S. Forest Service and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to work together to create a dam that would benefit wildlife, recreation, and other public purposes. The dam would simulate the effects of a former beaver flowage, according to Rep. David Battaglia (DFL-Two Harbors).

Road damage led local officials to destroy the former beaver dam, Battaglia says. Now with the construction of an earthen dam they feel they can control the flowage and protect that road, he says.

"The Forest Service and the DNR have worked out an agreement where the DNR would front \$16,000 to build the dam and the Forest Service would have the perpetual maintenance and upkeep of the dam," says Battaglia.

The Environment and Natural Resources Committee gave preliminary approval to the proposal, HF1560, on April 18.

Hennepin County jails

A bill that would give Hennepin County the go-ahead to build a jail received approval in the Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Committee April 18. HF1448 (Rest, DFL-New Hope) would give Hennepin County bonding authority to build a jail facility in downtown Minneapolis, just two blocks from the Hennepin County Government Center. The proposed jail would house 850 pre-trial detainees, more than double the number now housed in the existing facility.

But Rep. Sally Olsen (IR-St. Louis Park) says the bonding price is too high. Under the \$130 million proposal, the average cost of a cell would be \$113,000 including jail support services. She offered an amendment, which other Hennepin County legislators also support, to reduce the proposed bonding authority from \$130 million to \$30 million. The committee adopted the amendment, which would also require the county to come back to the Legislature if it needs more bonds.

According to Hennepin County authorities, jail usage is rising due to changes in the law, more arrests involving drugs and crimes against persons, and longer sentences. The bill moves now to the Taxes Committee.


Computer viruses

Computer whizzes who create socalled computer viruses could face jail time if HF647 (Kahn, DFL-Mpls), a bill the Judiciary Committee approved April 17, becomes law. The bill would make it a crime to intentionally distribute a destructive computer program.

Viruses are self-replicating programs that occupy computer memory space and are sometimes designed to destroy data and computer programs. Penalties for the crime would vary according to how much damage the virus causes.

Lawmakers showed strong support for the measure in light of a recent virus that destroyed an enormous amount of data in computers throughout the country. Some lawmakers say the measure may give disgruntled employees an incentive to refrain from sabotaging their employer's computer system.

The bill goes next to the House Floor.

Utility task force

The Regulated Industries Committee April 17 considered HF619 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids), a bill that would create a task force to review electric utility issues. The committee held several meetings earlier this session where members discussed Minnesota's electric utility industry, touching on issues such as competitive rates and service boundaries.

The task force would consist of state representatives and senators, industry people, and the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) chair. It would look at issues involving electric service boundaries, electric rates, consumer problems, investor-owned utilities, cooperatives, and municipal power agencies.

The bill would allow the PUC to hire consultants to complete an interim study due in 1990. The commission could spend up to \$200,000 and assess the costs back to the affected utilities.

The committee gave the bill a favorable recommendation. It goes next to the full House for consideration.

Kindergarten schedule

A proposal to cut funds for noontime kindergarten buses drew criticism from kindergarten teachers at a hearing of the Education Committee's Education Finance Division April 14. They say it could lead to kindergarten students attending classes all day, every other day, rather than the current half-day all week schedule.

Rep. Bob McEachern's (DFL-Maple Lake) proposal would cut transportation funds for noontime kindergarten buses to provide for budget shortfalls. The cut could save up to \$4 million which could go into foundation aid for schools, he says.

But kindergarten teachers need everyday contact with students, according to Diane Jensen, president, Minnesota Kindergarten Association. She says McEachern's plan would hurt both students and teachers. Kindergartners would have trouble learning and retaining lessons taught every other day. And a big gap in attendance due to bad weather or sickness could disrupt an entire week's lessons. Jensen says all day, everyday classes would be best for the children. But money isn't available to operate all day, everyday classes, because the state only gives one-half foundation aid per kindergarten student. Rep. Kathleen Vellenga (DFL-St. Paul) says the state should now look at giving kindergarten programs full foundation aid.

Several other teachers and school officials spoke against the proposal. They say they plan curriculum materials for a daily program, and that children would require more direction from teachers to maintain routines.

On April 17, the division incorporated McEachern's proposal into the education finance omnibus bill.

High school, college credit '

A less stringent version of a bill that would affect the state's postsecondary enrollment option got the nod from the Education Committee April 14.


In the original HF1314, which Rep. Katy Olson (DFL-Sherburn) sponsors, students who choose to attend college while in high school under the postsecondary enrollment option would have had to pay for college courses taken for college credit. The bill would also have directed high school students to complete required courses at their high school, not at a postsecondary institution.

But the committee amended the bill to remove those requirements, as well as a third requiring pre-enrollment counseling. The amended bill would now call only for periodic progress reports from the postsecondary institution to the pupil, the pupil's parents, and school officials.


Several committee members are concerned that some Minnesota high school students can't participate in the postsecondary enrollment program because of distance between high schools and postsecondary institutions.

Critics also say that retaining the existing law without the payment requirement means that students get part of their college education at state expense.

"If this free college attitude is going to be pursued, why not give all students some free college?" Olson asked.


As the price of gasoline goes up, so will the price of marriage license and dissolution fees, if the Legislature approves a proposal the Appropriations Health and Human Services Division heard April 20. The additional funds would go toward the displaced homemakers program in the Department of Jobs and Training and battered women's programs in the Department of Corrections.

Teachers who teach would-be teachers could get reacquainted with kindergarten, a seventh grade classroom, or a 12th grade economics class if a proposal the Appropriations Committee's Education Division heard April 20 becomes part of the omnibus education bill. The provision would allow teacher education faculty to return to a K-12 setting, and permit K-12 teachers to temporarily assume postsecondary teaching posts. Rep. Len Price (DFL-Woodbury) says postsecondary educators could "renew and refresh" their lectures and perceptions, while K-12 instructors could present their experiences to wouldbe teachers.

The Department of Revenue may get 10 new special auditors to examine charitable gambling activities and records. The department audits distributors of gaming equipment and charities that operate games. The auditors will look for illegalities that prevent the state from collecting taxes. The new positions are in the Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division funding recommendations. Mothers may get to fish without a license on Mother's Day. HF831 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids) would open the fishing season on Mother's Day. Rep. Dave Gruenes (IR-St. Cloud) offered an amendment on the House floor April 20 to allow an honorary fishing day for mothers. House members adopted the amendment on a unanimous voice vote.

The Minnesota Zoological Gardens got initial approval April 18 for a \$250,000 grant from the State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee. The Dairy Queen Corporation, a concessionaire at the zoo, will match the grant \$2-to-\$1. The zoo plans to use the money for a new dolphinarium and tropical coral reef exhibit, which zoo officials expect to open next year.

Insurance organizations, agents, and companies would have to provide notice of their information collection practices to individuals if HF162 (Skoglund, DFL-Mpls) becomes law. The bill would also permit individuals to gain access to information on file about them, establish procedures to amend incorrect information, and limit the amount of personal information insurers may disclose to others.




New arrival. The 1989-90 edition of the *Members Directory* is now available to individuals. The directory includes biographical listings of senators and representatives, Senate and House staff information, and Senate and House committee assignments. Some 60,000 postsecondary students in 1990 and another 63,000 in 1991 could receive state-funded grants, if the Appropriations Committee's Education Division's preliminary action April 20 becomes final. An estimated \$72 million would be available in 1990, and about \$80.3 million in 1991 if the allocation to the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB) becomes law. The HECB allocation would become part of the division's omnibus education allocation bill.

Adopted people may obtain their original birth certificate, which contains the name of their birth mother and sometimes the father, at age 19, under a provision in HF1575 (Vellenga, DFL-St. Paul). Current law makes this information available to those over age 21. The bill would shorten the time for a birth parent to file an affidavit refusing to allow disclosure of the original birth certificate to the adopted person, and also shorten the deadline for the commissioner of human services to disclose the original birth certificate to the adopted person.

A resolution that memorializes the President and Congress to set environmentally sound standards and requirements for the packaging of consumer goods received preliminary approval in the Environment and Natural Resources Committee April 18. Rep. Mary Jo McGuire (DFL-Falcon Heights) sponsors HF1183 which asks the President and Congress to address solid waste problems resulting from the amount and types of materials used to package consumer products.

Handicapped people would have easier access to state parks under a bill the House passed April 19. HF1492 (Jacobs, DFL-Coon Rapids) would provide more ways for the handicapped to gain access to state parks. In the past, such individuals needed a special license plate to drive their vehicles into a park. The bill would allow them to show proof of vehicle ownership and a certificate of disability to buy their special park permits.



The state once faced charges of fraud over a copy of the state constitution. A 1976 *Minneapolis Tribune* article reveals the incident.

As the story goes, a woman called in her request for a copy of the state constitution. A state employee told her to send 75 cents and a written request. She did, and received a copy that existed before a 1974 amendment. She called the agency to verify that and asked the employee to go over a copy with her

Apparently, trying to avoid tying up phone time to read the constitution, the employee said, "We're not allowed to give that information."

"Now they've hidden the constitution. That's carrying government secrecy too far!" the woman stormed, and threatened to sue.

However, the story ends undramatically because, in 1976, an up-to-date constitution was printed in the Minnesota Legislative Manual (blue book).

The woman received a free copy of the book, then dropped her threat to claim the fraudulent taking of 75 cents for outdated information.



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
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It's a fact!

Sacajawea, a Native American woman, is included in the five-figure statuary, "Minnesota, Spirit of Government." It has been on display in the House of Representatives since 1938.

Italian-American sculptor, Charles Brioschi, included Sacajawea in the statuary because she contributed to the settlement of Minnesota.

Sacajawea and her French husband, Toussaint Charbonneau, were guides of the Lewis and Clark expedition. She mediated between wary tribes and the explorers during the expedition. She has been credited with many acts of courage.

Sacajawea, born in the southern Rocky Mountain region about 1784, was a member of the Shoshone tribe. She died in Wyoming on the Shoshone reservation in 1884.



Highlights

Game, fish law enforcement

State conservation officers have jurisdictional problems when people violate game and fish laws on Indian reservations, or if Indians violate such laws on treaty rights territories, says Captain Byron Dyrland, from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Enforcement Division.

A conservation officer can't arrest and prosecute an Indian offender in a treaty rights area even if the person has violated tribal game and fish regulations, Dyrland says. And under current law, a tribal game warden can't arrest a non-Indian who has violated state game laws on a reservation.

Cross-deputizing is the solution, according to Dyrland. The Leech Lake Reservation tried the idea in a joint effort with the DNR, and found that it works well, he says.

On April 27, the Environment and Natural Resources Committee considered HF1610 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids), a bill that would cross-deputize special conservation officers to enforce state game and fish laws.

Joe Day, DNR community liaison officer, says the bill would allow the state and the tribes to manage and protect game and fish in Minnesota and on reservations.

Property taxes 🚥

The Taxes Committee began work on the 1989 tax omnibus bill April 25. Throughout the week, legislators worked on HF1734 and heard public testimony on the bill's tax components, including property tax provisions that would affect homeowners, renters, and Minnesota's businesses. Rep. Dee Long (DFL-Mpls), committee chair and bill author, plans to act on the bill by April 28.

One of the bill's primary measures would change the property tax tiers for homeowners. A homestead is currently taxed on its market value which is based on the value of the house, garage, and land. Residential homesteads, including agricultural homesteads, would see a lower net tax capacity rate based on that market value. For instance, property worth \$68,000 would be taxed at a net rate of 0.98 percent, instead of 1.0 percent; property worth up to \$110,000 would see a tax of 2.0 percent, instead of 2.5 percent; and property over \$110,000 would see 3.0 percent, instead of 3.3 percent.

Another measure would extend the property tax refund schedule for homeowners to include those with incomes up to \$80,000 (the current level is \$35,000).

Corporate taxes 📼

Testimony in the Taxes Committee April 26 centered mainly on the corporate tax components of the tax omnibus bill. Under HF1734 (Long, DFL-Mpls), the Minnesota corporate franchise tax would increase from the current 9.5 percent to 10 percent. Business leaders expressed reservations about the bill, including proposed modifications to the alternative minimum tax (AMT) law, which factors sales, property, and payroll. Their testimony sparked debate among legislators.

Opponents to the bill included William Spangler, director of taxes at 3M Corporation, who recalculated 3M's taxes according to the bill. He found that the new figures put a high tax on his company's factors of sales, property, and payroll. "We are going to find that many corporations...with machinery and equipment will fall under the AMT tax, not the regular tax," Spangler told the committee. "You are taxing depreciation on the very tangible personal property that are tools of our workers, where we create the jobs."

Members from the Minnesota State Chamber of Commerce, Minnesota Retail Merchants Association, and the Minnesota Citizens for Tax Justice also testified on aspects of the tax bill.

Vacation time

It's not often that employees say they're willing to share some vacation hours with another employee. But a bill the House passed April 26 would allow state employees to do just that.

HF1027 (Janezich, DFL-Chisholm) would permit state employees to donate up to eight hours of vacation time in 1989 to benefit another state employee, their spouse, or dependent. The money would assist in paying an employee's unreimbursed medical expenses that total at least \$10,000.

Employees who donate time would have to notify their agency director of the amount of vacation time they wish to donate and the name of the employee who would benefit from the donation. The agency director would then

Correction: Head Start funding

In the April 21 issue of the Session Weekly, page 2, the "Head Start funding" highlight stated that the PICA Family and Child Development Center in Hennepin County may receive \$16 million from the Legislature during the next two years. There are approximately 35 other Head Start programs, including those on Indian reservations, that may receive funding from the allocation. determine the monetary value of the donated time, and transfer that amount into a special account the commissioner of employee relations would administer.

Work Readiness

Work Readiness, a program for people who don't qualify for federal assistance or state-funded General Assistance may undergo some changes under an amendment the Appropriations' Health and Human Services Division adopted April 26.

Work Readiness aims to provide services to help employable and potentially employable people prepare for and attain self-sufficiency through permanent work. Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls) says the amendment would improve the current program.

The amendment would remove the sixmonth limit in which a person can receive work readiness services. It would also expand the program, and require it to include an orientation program, an employability plan, referral to remedial training programs, referral to other employment programs, job search programs, and public employment experience. Program participants could face disqualification if they don't fulfill certain requirements.

As part of the expanded program, the division allocated more than \$1 million to assist workers who are dislocated as a result of a plant closing or layoff that has a significant effect on the community. Division members also allocated \$100,000 to the Work Readiness Literacy Program.

In addition, the amendment would require local agencies to provide child care and transportation to enable people to participate in literacy training. The state would have to reimburse local agencies for transportation costs. The counties would have to ensure the availability of child care.

DTED budget 🚥

The State Departments Division of the Appropriations Committee cut funding for the Department of Trade and Economic Development's (DTED) commissioner's office during a budget hearing April 26.

The \$470,000 cut would remove funding for the commissioner and two office positions. The DTED Community Development Division would assume the commissioner's duties.

The DTED works with local governments and private businesses to promote and coordinate economic development and domestic and international trade. The department also includes the offices of Tourism and Science and Technology. The Community Development Division works with community development agencies and local elected officials, providing grants for housing rehabilitation, recreation facilities, and other similar projects.

Campaign spending limits

United States congressional candidates would face campaign spending limits under a bill state lawmakers considered April 26. U.S. Senate candidates would have a \$3 million limit; U.S. House of Representatives candidates would have a \$300,000 limit.

"This bill is really tough on incumbents," says Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids). It would provide public campaign funding to candidates for congressional office if they agree to spending limits. Incumbents generally have a big advantage in fundraising, he says.

HF205 would prohibit candidates from spending more than the named amounts, and would require them to raise one-half of their funds.

Under the bill, a candidate who agrees to spending limits and receives money would not have to abide by the limit if his/her opponent refuses to accept spending limits. If both candidates agree to limits, neither would receive public funding. But, if a candidate exceeds the limits, he or she could face a fine of up to four times the amount of the overexpenditure.

Congressional campaign reform is long overdue, says Norm Petrik, Common Cause president. Senate members receive four times as much political action campaign (PAC) money as their challengers, he says, while House members receive eight times as much PAC money as their challengers.

To fund campaigns, he notes that a U. S. Senate candidate needs to raise an average of \$10,000 a week for six years, while a U. S. House candidate has to raise \$4,000 a week for two years. Petrik says fundraising often takes elected officials away from their elected duties.

Rep. Don Ostrom (DFL-St. Peter) says the bill may help incumbents. Incumbents have many advantages in a race, he says, most notably name recognition. Extensive spending could be a challenger's only avenue to overcome the incumbent's inherent advantages.

The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee laid the bill over for interim study.

Telephone service

A resolution calling for extended telephone service in the metropolitan area received a recommendation to pass from the Regulated Industries Committee April 26.

The resolution supports the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) plan to expand the current metropolitan extended area telephone service to include customers in Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott, and Washington counties. Difficulties in establishing a suitable definition of "metropolitan extended area telephone service boundaries" prompted the committee to draw a resolution and to work with the PUC in solving boundary problems.

The resolution also calls on the PUC to determine fair and equitable rate structures for local telephone exchanges newly included in the extended area service.

Corporal punishment

"Hitting students is no longer an appropriate form of discipline for teachers to use," says Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls), author of a bill that would prohibit corporal punishment in Minnesota schools.

Kahn says hitting students has long been outlawed throughout most of the civilized world, nationally in 14 states, and locally in Minneapolis and St. Paul schools. It often leads to increased physical aggressiveness, broken bones, and profound emotional distress in children. She notes that since 1985, three children have died from physical punishment they received at school.

Kahn's bill, HF1387, would prohibit teachers from hitting, spanking, or using unreasonable physical force that causes bodily or emotional harm to a student. The bill would not prevent a teacher from using force in self-defense or to subdue a student in an emergency.

The Education Committee recommended passage of the bill April 26. It goes next to the House Floor.

Judicial study 📟

Racial bias in the judicial system caught the attention of state lawmakers April 26 when the Judiciary Committee gave preliminary approval to HF1158 (Dawkins, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that would direct the state Supreme Court to study the problem.

The study would examine the extent of racial bias in the court system, including discriminatory treatment of minority litigants, witnesses, jurors, judges, attorneys, and court personnel. It would also review racial correlations in sentencing patterns and look at minority representation (or under-representation) in jury selection and in certain positions, including judges, law clerks, judicial administrators, county attorneys, and public defenders. The court would have to report its findings to the Legislature by January 1993.

The bill goes next to the House Appropriations Committee.

Rattlesnake bounty

The state would no longer pay bounty to rattlesnake hunters under a bill the House passed April 26. Rep. Bob Waltman (IR-Elgin) sponsors HF930, a bill that would remove the bounty on rattlesnakes in four southeastern Minnesota counties.

Research indicates some hunters abuse the rattlesnake bounty, Waltman says. Nearby states no longer pay bounties, so people bring the snakes to Minnesota to collect their rewards. He also reports that some aggressive rattlesnake hunters keep mother snakes and bring in the newborn snakes for bounty.

But Rep. Sidney Pauly (IR-Eden Prairie) wonders whether the bill would arbitrarily take authority away from the counties without their consent.

Waltman says people are still free to kill rattlesnakes if they present immediate danger to individuals or households. The bill received a great deal of publicity in certain areas, he says, and no counties notified him of any problems with it.

Wildflowers, grass

Farmers may reap a new economy from wildflower and native grass seed production under a bill the Economic Development Committee considered April 25. HF1713 (Cooper, DFL-Bird Island) would provide funding for a loan program to encourage seed development and expand marketing opportunities.

The seed production program would establish six regions, and would require each to use 100 acres for grass seed production and 10 acres for wildflower seed production. Farmers could receive loans with 6 percent interest rates to cover operating and capital costs.

The bill would direct the commissioner of agriculture to cooperate with the University of Minnesota (U of M) to develop research and marketing information for the seed production program.

Rep. Don Frerichs (IR-Rochester) criticized the bill saying it would duplicate other state agencies' responsibilities, and would give more money to the U of M.

But Rep. Karen Clark (DFL-Mpls) says city lawns would benefit from wildflower

and native grass fortification. And it would help lawns recover from last year's drought.

The bill would also reactivate the Agricultural Data Collection Task Force to evaluate the financial status of agriculture in Minnesota.

Child care costs

The Appropriations Committee's Education Division, after wrestling with the conflict of helping many or few, approved language that would help defray child care costs for postsecondary students.

Division members weighed the option

of helping to pay child care costs for postsecondary students during school and work hours, or limiting the supplement to the time when students actually are on campus. Noting the restrictive \$4 million biennial budget, members unanimously approved changes April 24 that would restrict child care grants for educational purposes. Lawmakers say they prefer to assist more students with the limited funds rather than give more money to students who work and attend school.

However, on April 25, the division approved language that would allow school financial aid officials to consider providing child care assistance to students for up to 20 hours of work per week.

The division also removed a provision that would have given preference to students already in the grant program over new applicants. They say such a priority could have left out applicants with greater needs.

Higher education budget

The Education Division of Appropriations approved a \$1.9 billion budget April 25 for all the higher education systems in the state, which includes start-up funding to meet the needs of a changing student population.

Recognizing the shift in student makeup, the division included a provision in the bill that would offer child care funding for parents who attend postsecondary institutions. Parents would be eligible for the subsidy for the time they're in school and possibly for up to 20 hours of work per week.

The measure also includes provisions that would permit faculty exchanges between the University of Minnesota and the State University System, and facultyteacher exchanges between postsecondary institutions, and elementary and secondary schools.

Division members also approved a provision that would set up a training program in communication and teaching skills for University of Minnesota teaching assistants.

• State Board of Vocational Technical Education — \$344.4m;

• State Board for Community Colleges — \$188.1m;

• State University Board — \$345.5m;

• Board of Regents, University of

• Mayo Medical Foundation — \$2.1m.

Assault weapons 📟

National Rifle Association (NRA) enthusiasts cheered April 21 when the Judiciary Committee, on a vote of 17 to 8, defeated an amended version of HF330, a bill that would have restricted future sales of certain military assault weapons.

Bill author Rep. Howard Orenstein (DFL-St. Paul) stated that the amended version of the bill did not call for confiscation of any weapons. Under the bill, current owners could have kept their weapons and passed them on by will or inheritance.

A spokesperson for the Minnesota Police Chiefs Association and several law enforcement officials testified that they strongly supported the bill, saying drug dealers using the military assault weapons in the "drug wars."

NRA supporters told committee members that the Second Amendment to the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right to own military assault weapons like the AK-47. Orenstein reminded committee members and the public that he does "not want to ban all guns, period." Proponents of the bill said they do not want to ban legitimate hunting rifles, and that they respect a person's right to own those weapons.


Orenstein noted that recent polls show the public overwhelmingly supports a ban on assault weapons, and that much of the information certain groups distributed to their members about his bill is false.

After the committee defeated the Orenstein bill, they adopted an amendment, on a vote of 13 to 12, that would put assault rifles under the same restrictions as handguns. Rep. Marcus Marsh (IR-Sauk Rapids) then moved to lay the bill over for interim study. The committee passed the Marsh motion on a vote of 13 to 12.

Towing •

To tow or not to tow? That's the question. And HF1697 (Carruthers, DFL-Brooklyn Center) may provide the answer.

The bill would impose a waiting period before towing services could haul vehicles away. It also would prohibit towing services from removing vehicles because of expired tags, or if law enforcement officials have issued fewer than five parking tickets. The bill would also outline when services could tow

vehicles from public or private areas.

Though witnesses praise some parts of the bill, they point out some troublesome provisions.

"If this [bill] is passed, you're doing a great injustice to the towing companies and consumers," says Joseph Sroya, a towing operator. "You're penalizing the...whole state for a Minneapolis problem." Committee members and others called Minneapolis' towing practices "overzealous" and "aggressive."

Several people raised concerns about a section that would provide a four-hour grace period before towing could occur. They say four hours would be too restrictive for private parking lot operators who can't ticket but can use the threat of towing as a deterrent. The committee amended the bill to reduce the time to 30 minutes for vehicles parked in private lots.

The Commerce Committee gave the bill preliminary approval April 25.

DWI repeat offenders


Repeat DWI (driving while intoxicated) offenders may face criminal penalties for refusing alcohol tests if HF978 (Rest, DFL-New Hope), a bill the House Judiciary Committee approved April 24 becomes law.

The bill would make it a crime for some people who have had their licenses revoked previously under certain alcoholrelated laws to refuse a chemical test of their blood, breath, or urine.


Under current law, anyone who refuses the test may have their license revoked for a minimum of one year, even if they don't have a prior record. Those who have a prior record must show proof of treatment and a year of sobriety before they can legally drive.

Proponents say the new crime proposal targets individuals who have previous convictions, refuse treatment, and continue to drive without a license.

The bill received unanimous committee support; it now goes to the House Floor.



Tenants who lose essential utility services may have some help getting them back under a bill the House passed April 26. Essential utility services include heat, electricity, hot water, and running water. HF1107 (Jefferson, DFL-Mpls) would provide emergency relief procedures for tenants who lose these services and find that landlords will not make repairs. Under the bill, a tenant would file an emergency petition with a county court if the landlord fails to fix the service. The court would then order the owner to repair the problem or order the tenant to do so and deduct the cost from the rent.

Private sector employees would have a legal right to review their personnel files under HF260 (Trimble, DFL-St. Paul), a bill that received preliminary approval from the Judiciary Committee April 21. The bill would also provide exceptions where an employer would not have to release the information, such as when it would jeopardize a co-worker's right to privacy. State officials say there's a real need for this type of legislation because they receive calls each week from private sector employees who don't have access to their personnel files.

Manufacturers' sales representatives would have some protection against capricious contract terminations if a bill the Labor-Management Relations Committee approved becomes law. HF1641 (Blatz, IR-Bloomington) would direct manufacturers to terminate sales representative agreements only for good cause. Some former sales reps say manufacturers released them because the manufacturer or a large customer wanted the reduced prices that result from eliminating the representative's sales commission. "They shouldn't be able to cut people off without good cause," says Rep. Kathleen Blatz.

Producers of "wet alcohol," a fuel additive, could join ethanol producers in receiving production payments from the state if HF415 (Sviggum, IR-Kenyon) gains final legislative approval. Wet alcohol is agriculturally derived fermentation ethyl alcohol. The state would pay only for ethanol or wet alcohol fermented in Minnesota. The Department of Finance estimates that this year the state will pay producers about \$2.5 million, of \$10 million available. Students wanting to attend the Akita, Japan, campus of the State University System could get some state financial help under a provision the Education Division of Appropriations considered April 24. Division members approved language that would set aside \$250,000 to start a grant fund for students participating in the Akita program, in which the State University System operates a campus in cooperation with the Japanese government. The provision is part of the division's omnibus higher education funding bill.





Owners of pet snapping turtles would face regulation under HF811 (McGuire, DFL-Falcon Heights), a bill the House passed April 20. The bill would require owners who have more than three turtles at any time to obtain a license to catch and possess them. Congratulations! Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth) received the Minnesota Recreation Park Association's highest citizen award April 27. The award recognizes Munger's outstanding leadership in establishing sound public policies through law that would protect and enhance the environment and natural resources.

Frank DeGroat is the only known American Indian to have served in the Minnesota House of Representatives in the 20th century. DeGroat, a Republican, took office in 1962 and served seven terms in the Legislature. He served as Agriculture Committee chair and Natural Resources Committee vice chair. DeGroat, born May 7, 1916, is a descendant of the East Coast Brotherton tribe. His grandparents settled in Minnesota in 1887. Biographical data indicates he was born on the Morton Reservation and grew up on the White Earth Reservation.

Health facilities would have to make reasonable efforts to notify a family member of the admission of a patient and allow the family to participate in the patient's treatment if SF218 (House author: Clark, DFL-Mpls) becomes law. The bill would permit an exception if the facility has reason to believe the patient would not want a family member notified. The bill goes next to the House Floor.

People who pay money to winners of video games of chance, such as poker and blackjack game machines, could face a \$700 fine. The machines are for amusement only, but some bars make illegal payments. Those who pay cash prizes would not be eligible to obtain or hold a license to operate the video games, under HF1648 (Price, DFL-Woodbury), which the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee recommended to pass April 27. Veterans and civilian medical staff who served in a combat zone and are confined in a Minnesota correctional facility could have their combat service evaluated. Under HF759 (Welle, DFL-Willmar) a combat veteran or someone having served with a civilian medical staff in a combat zone would undergo evaluation. If their service was unusually stressful and they suffer from post traumatic stress disorder, the bill would direct corrections officials to consider the information in the individual's corrections plan. The bill awaits action on the House Floor.



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


It's a fact!

Happy birthday, Minnesota! Minnesota, the 32nd state to enter the Union, will celebrate its 131st birthday on May 11.

Early in 1856, Henry M. Rice, a fur trader who later became one of Minnesota's first U.S. senators, initiated the enabling act in Congress that led to Minnesota's statehood. The act laid out Minnesota's boundaries, called for the election of delegates to a constitutional convention and the assembly of such a convention, authorized establishment of a state government (with approval from the general population as well as Congress), specified a census, and dedicated public land for certain purposes.

Congress approved the enabling act on Feb. 26, 1857. But because of pressure from other national issues, including slavery and a civil war in Kansas, Congress didn't approve Minnesota's proposed statehood until

•Highlights

Regent selections v

The four new members of the University of Minnesota Board of Regents represent several demographic factors: two women, two men, two Greater Minnesotans and two Twin Cities residents.

The House and Senate, meeting in joint convention May 3, approved the slate on first ballots for each position. Jean Keffeler, Minneapolis, fills the 5th Congressional District vacancy; Darrin Rosha, Owatonna, assumes the student regent seat; and Mary Page, Olivia, and Alan Page, Minneapolis, undertake the two at-large positions.

Keffeler is chief operating officer of Metropolitan-Mount Sinai Medical

Center; Rosha is an agricultural economics and political science major at the university; Mary Page is co-owner of Page-Snyder Drugs in Olivia; and Alan Page is an assistant attorney general and former Minnesota Viking.

A joint meeting of House and Senate education and funding committees on May 1 agreed to nominate the four to fill the vacancies. None of the incumbents sought reappointment to their sixyear terms.

Vehicle registration fees


Motor vehicle registration fees may increase if lawmakers pass HF1758 (Rice, DFL-Mpls), the semi-states appropriations bill. The Appropriations Committee considered a provision in the bill May 1 that would raise the registration filing fee from \$3.25 to \$3.75.

There has been no fee increase since 1981, according to author Rep. Jim Rice. He says the increase will generate \$360,000 for state funds. That's a 15 percent increase, or a 2 percent increase per year for a period of eight years, he says.

Registrars have asked for the increase, Rice says, because the number of vehicle registrations is lower now than in previous years.

Rep. Donald Frerichs (IR-Rochester) offered an amendment to reduce the fee increase to \$3.50. There are three million license plate renewals per year, he says. Twenty percent of them take place in Minnesota.

"It's true that the registrars haven't had a raise in quite a number of years, but I don't think any of them have suffered too much," Frerichs says. "Deputy registrars

can sell their businesses or make them profitable and lucrative."

But Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul) opposed the amendment, saying if deputy registrars and counties return this function to the state, it would cost taxpayers more money than the bill's proposed 50-cent increase.

The committee defeated Frerichs' amendment.

The full House passed the bill May 4.

Education funding

The Appropriations Committee, after making some adjustments to the state aid formula, okayed a \$3.5 billion school funding bill. The formula changes in HF654 (K. Nelson, DFL-Mpls) would increase the amount of aid the state distributes to school districts.

During the May 4 meeting, the committee defeated an amendment that would have given school districts the option to take part in a regional information gathering network. Rep. Ron Abrams (IR-Minnetonka) offered the amendment that would have permitted school districts to gather their own information and send it directly to the state Department of Education. Currently, districts work through regional management information centers that collect information and transfer it to the state.

Opponents to the amendment argue that district-based data collection could result in less uniform information. Also, members are concerned about the increased number of entities reporting to the Department of Education. Such a move could be more time consuming, they say, because the information may need more editing to conform to department needs.

SCORE '

A solid waste reduction and recycling bill (SCORE) would achieve a stringent and timely recycling effort in Minnesota, author Rep. Willard Munger (DFL-Duluth) told the Taxes Committee May 4. The committee recommended HF417 to pass, but only after changing recycling fees and problem materials provisions.

Measures in the bill would address: • state government and private waste generators' efforts to reduce solid waste; • waste recycling and a county-by-county goal of 25 percent recycling by July 1, 1993;

recycling market development;

• litter prevention;

• recycling of problem materials such as batteries, pesticide containers, and pollutant fibers; and

• waste education programs.

To fund the programs, Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls) offered an amendment that would place state recycling fees on solid waste which operators of disposal or resource recovery facilities accept. He says the fees would encourage reduction of growing landfills and impose a "sin tax" on solid waste tons the resource recovery facility receives. Originally, the bill would have imposed a 6 percent sales tax on solid waste collection and disposal services.

The bill reflects study recommendations from the Governor's Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment (SCORE). The Appropriations Committee will study the bill further.

High School League

Two issues involving the Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL) received special attention in an omnibus bill the Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division approved May 3. The division's bill supports one effort that failed to pass the Legislature earlier this session, and another conflicts with a bill awaiting action on the House Floor.

The state departments bill would direct the MSHSL to develop a plan that would establish a two-class state high school hockey championship tournament. The MSHSL would have to report to the Legislature on its plan by Aug. 15, 1990, and begin a two-class high school hockey championship tournament in the 1990-91 school year.

Earlier this session, the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee postponed action on HF1268 (Janezich, DFL-Chisholm), a bill that would allow an additional state tournament for sports with only one such tournament. Many class "A" schools with hockey programs supported that bill, saying it's unfair having to compete with larger, metropolitan schools.

The state departments bill would also direct the state auditor to continue auditing the MSHSL and to review any private audits of the league. HF1636 (McEachern, DFL-Maple Lake), currently on the House Floor, would permit the MSHSL to choose an independent accountant to perform an audit.

Year of the City

Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Duluth would receive money for urban housing revitalization programs for eligible neighborhoods through Year of the City matching grants if lawmakers adopt provisions the Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division approved in its omnibus bill May 3.

The program would support activities to provide housing and related services for people and families of low or moderate income. The funds would go to cities with neighborhoods that meet two of these criteria:

• residential dwelling units in need of substantial rehabilitation;


• a median household income of less than half the average; or

• an unemployment rate twice the rate of a standard metropolitan statistical area.

A city could use the money to build new buildings, or repair existing ones, and provide energy improvement loans and grants for residential property in targeted neighborhoods.

The division approved \$5 million for each year of the biennium to use for matching grants. The cities would have to raise their share of the money through nonpublic sources for revitalization programs. The Department of Trade and Economic Development would distribute the state's matching grants.

The Appropriations Committee will consider the division's omnibus bill next.

Deer hunting licenses

Deer hunters would pay more for an individual license, but could buy a family license, under provisions of the Appropriations Committee's State Departments Division omnibus bill. The division recommended the bill to pass May 3; the full committee will consider it next.

The bill would create a "family hunting license" that would cost \$84 and be available only to families (husband, wife, and their children under age 18 who live at home) who are Minnesota residents. The license would allow the hunters to take four deer, and would be available in March 1990.

The bill would also increase the deer license fee for individual hunters who are Minnesota residents from \$20 to \$22, and the fee for nonresident deer hunters from \$100 to \$110. The fee changes would take effect in March 1991.

Hostile takeovers '

Anti-takeover sentiments dominated the Governmental Operations Committee May 2 when lawmakers gave preliminary approval to HF1709 (Simoneau, DFL-Fridley), a bill that would discourage hostile takeovers.

Supporters say the bill would protect workers and consumers from potentially adverse impacts of high-powered buyouts. Employers would have to give current employees a 90-day notice of plant closings, and pay six months of health insurance premiums and severance benefits to certain workers they lay off after a takeover. The bill would impose an excise tax on so-called golden parachutes which give top management officials lucrative severance packages when they leave the company after a takeover.

Minnesota needs the legislation to stop corporate raiders from ignoring employees while dismantling companies, according to bill author Rep. Wayne Simoneau. He compared the need for the legislation to Teddy Roosevelt's antitrust actions in the early part of the century and the government intervention on Wall Street after the stock market crash of 1929. Simoneau told the committee that "we all have a stake in a corporation, whether we're a supplier, or an employee, or a resident of the community where they're located."

The bill would also create the employee-owned business act, which would encourage the formation of employeeowned businesses to broaden community investments, increase productivity, stabilize local economies, and anchor business activities.

The bill goes next to the Taxes Committee.

Edina transit system

A bus transit bill that would help lighten traffic congestion in the Edina retail and residential corridor of France and Xerxes avenues received a favorable recommendation from the Taxes Committee May 2.


Sponsor Rep. Mary Forsythe (IR-Edina) says HF7 would authorize the city of Edina to build a transit system that would link the shopping malls, apartment complexes, and health care facilities in the southwestern part of the city. Retailers, hospitals, and apartment residents support the transit system that would also serve the proposed Centennial Lakes project.

The bill now goes to the full House for further consideration.

Crime omnibus bill

Minnesota courts could admit DNA test results as evidence in civil or criminal trials or hearings under a provision the Appropriations Committee adopted May 2 as part of HF59 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), the crime omnibus bill.

The committee amended the bill to allocate more than \$1 million to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension for DNA testing. The bill would direct the bureau to analyze and compare DNA

from human biological specimens for identification purposes in cases involving criminal sexual offenses. Money for the testing program came out of a \$10 million allocation for the Urban Revitalization Action Program.

Lawmakers approved another allocation of more than \$18 million to cover startup and operating costs over the next two years to convert the Faribault Regional Treatment Center to a mediumsecurity correctional facility for adult males.

The committee recommended passage of the bill. It moves next to the full House for consideration.

Child abuse

Children may have more legal protection against child abuse under SF493 (House author: Wagenius, DFL-Mpls), a bill the full House unanimously approved May 1.

The bill would expand the definition of a "child in need of protection or services" to include children who have lived with an abused child, or those who now live with or would live with an abuser. Bill supporters say it's important to expand the protection to prevent an occurrence of child abuse, rather than waiting to intervene after someone victimizes a child.

Under the bill, a juvenile court could allow out-of-court "hearsay" statements from certain children who have seen abuse or neglect of other children. The court would admit the children's statements as evidence, which could prevent them from experiencing the trauma of a court appearance. The bill, however, would not apply to criminal proceedings.

The bill awaits final action in the Senate.

Sibley High School

The House passed a bill May 1 that would allow a school district to issue bonds without a referendum vote to repair a damaged school. Author Rep. Tom Pugh (DFL-South St. Paul) first introduced HF1488 as an emergency measure to enable cleanup of Henry Sibley High School in Mendota Heights. But lawmakers later amended the bill to expand coverage to all schools needing repair due to extreme damage.

Pugh, whose district includes Sibley High School, says this measure would help schools repair substantial damage which calamity or vandalism causes. Vandalism at Sibley High closed the school last March.

School district officials estimate cleanup costs, including asbestos abatement procedures, to reach between \$6 and \$8 million. The district hopes to clean up in time to reopen the school for fall classes.

The bill now goes to the governor for his signature.

Health, human services 📟

The Appropriations Committee, without much debate, approved the Health and Human Services omnibus bill and sent it to the full House May 1.

HF1759 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls) would appropriate a total of \$2.7 billion for the 1990-91 biennium to the departments of Human Services, Jobs and Training, Corrections, and Health, and to various boards, commissions, and ombudsman organizations.

To meet the division's goal of more than \$63 million in budget cuts, lawmakers reduced the base of larger agencies; reduced, eliminated, or delayed change requests until 1991; and included a projected savings of \$42 million in the Department of Human Services (DHS) under the Medical Assistance Program due to recent federal Medicare changes.

Some major spending items include: • \$18 million to downsize and reconfigure regional treatment centers; • \$16 million to maintain present prison populations without changing existing laws;

• \$16 million for Head Start programs; and

• \$10 million to develop and operate the MAXIS computer system in the DHS.

World Trade Center

The World Trade Center (WTC) is a private franchise, says Rep. Phyllis Kahn (DFL-Mpls), and should be treated as a private franchise. She addressed the Appropriations Committee May 1 with concerns about precedent-setting language in a division bill.

Kahn offered two amendments to HF1758, a bill that would provide funding for the Agriculture and Transportation departments, and various semistate agencies. Her amendments would either declare the WTC a state agency, or create language that would clearly define it as a private corporation.

"The World Trade Center Association is really not the United Nations. It's a private commercial franchise organization. It's good and effective as it goes, but I'd be very leery of delegating state powers to the organization in the name of the state. That's a dangerous step," Kahn says.

Rep. Jim Rice (DFL-Mpls) counters Kahn's point, saying that designating the WTC as the state's official foreign trade office "will be more than just a clearinghouse for information. It will be the place where the deals will be put together." He says that small- and medium-sized industries could receive the WTC's assistance.

Most committee members agreed with Rice's arguments and defeated both amendments.

Visitation expediters

Parties could resolve child visitation disputes more quickly with the help of an expediter, if HF729 (Pappas, DFL-St. Paul), a bill the full House passed April 27, becomes law. Lawmakers say this could help speed impending decisions, such as a dispute over who gets a child on a holiday.

Under the bill, state courts may appoint visitation expediters to resolve disputes over child visitation orders—if all parties agree to use the expediter. The court would apportion the cost of the expediter, if any, among the parties, with each paying what the court sees as fair under the circumstances.

If one party does not agree with the expediter's decision, he or she could go back to court to resolve the dispute.

The bill awaits Senate action.

Notes

Minnesota's Vietnam veterans may have a memorial built in their honor. Rep. Doug Carlson (IR-Sandstone) proposed an amendment to the State Departments Division's omnibus bill that would provide \$400,000 to the Capitol Area Planning Board to create a memorial in the State Capitol area for Vietnam veterans.

The Battle Point Indian Historical Center is on its way to becoming a reality. A provision in HF1758 (Rice, DFL-Mpls), the semi-state agencies funding bill, would provide \$50,000 to the Leech Lake Chippewa Tribe to pay for the center. The bill received approval from the full Appropriations Committee May 1, and from the full House May 4.

Gender bias in the use of charitable gambling profits may come under legislative scrutiny. The Appropriations State Departments Division's omnibus financing bill would direct the Department of Revenue, when auditing organizations, to consider potential gender bias in the organization's use of profits. The department would report its findings to the Legislature in January 1991.

Get well soon! Rep. Sylvester Uphus (IR-Sauk Centre) is at the University of Minnesota Hospitals for surgery, and due for release around May 6. Do you know



Deciding boundaries for the proposed state of Minnesota was a major issue in the 1850s. The 1849 Territorial Act set Minnesota's present boundaries to the south, east, and north. But the territory stretched out west to the Missouri and White Earth rivers. in what is now North and South Dakota. An east-west proposal would have put the state's northern boundary along the 46th parallel (just north of the present city of Little Falls in Morrison County) and would have extended the western boundary to the Missouri River. Without the northern forests, northeastern iron mines, or the beginning of the Great Lakes, Minnesota would have been primarily an agricultural state, and St. Paul may not have been the capital city. The north-south proposal extended the northern boundary to the Canadian border and cut off the the state's western edge along the Red River of the North. Henry M. Rice favored this proposal and included its description in the Enabling Act of 1857, which eventually led to Minnesota's statehood.

Airport improvements

A proposal that would pair the Metropolitan Airports Council (MAC) and Metropolitan Council to address shortand long-term air transportation needs received final approval from the full House May 11.

SF1358 (House author: Wynia, DFL-St. Paul) would require MAC and Metropolitan Council officials to work in tandem toward the more immediate improvement needs at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport (MSP), and explore the broader goal of preliminary planning and development if a new facility is needed in the future, says Rep. Ann Wynia.

The dual track set-up in the bill "makes sure there isn't bias in favor of the current airport location or a possible new facility," she says. "It isn't biased in favor of anyone."

The bill would direct officials to, among other things, report and make recommendations to the Legislature about MSP's status and any long-range policies on expanding the existing facility

It's a fact!

People across the country call Minnesota the Gopher State, the Land of Sky Blue Waters, or the North Star State. Those of us who live here simply say Minnesota.

Some early frontier citizens had hoped to name our land of promise "Jackson." Others opted for "Washington" or "Chippeway."

But the name Minnesota won out. However, spellings differed. Minnesotor, Menesota, Minisotah, and Minnay sotor were among the variations. It was at an 1848 congressional convention that delegate Henry H. Sibley introduced the spelling we know today—Minnesota.

The name comes from two Dakota Indian words: "mini" meaning water, and "sota" meaning "varying color of a turbid, cloudy sky." Together, they mean "cloudy, churning water" or "sky-tinted waters," earmarking our state as river and lake country.


Elections 🚥

Minnesota taxpayers could once again receive tax credit for political contributions under a bill the Taxes Committee recommended to pass May 11. HF629 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park) would authorize full tax credits — on both long and short forms — for campaign donations of \$50 dollars per individual and \$100 dollars per couple.

The bill would also tighten campaign contributions and solicitations for legislative candidates while the Legislature is in session. According to the measure, a candidate could neither solicit nor accept contributions from registered lobbyists, political committees, or political funds during a regular legislative session. Violators could face a fine up to \$500.

To help school children understand the electoral process, the bill would direct county auditors to supply sample ballots to classrooms for educational instruction during a primary or general election.

The bill now moves to the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

Healthspan

A bill that would have imposed a 1 percent payroll tax on Minnesota employers to finance a health care access program took on several amendments at the Taxes Committee meeting May 9. Rep. Paul Ogren (DFL-Aitkin) sponsors HF150, the Health Care Access Program (Healthspan) bill, that would have provided basic health insurance and preventive medical care to working people who don't have health insurance or those not eligible for general assistance medical care.

After reviewing the bill's proposed tax policy, the committee removed a provision that would have placed a payroll tax on employees, but retained a provision that would create a study commission to take a deeper look at Minnesota's health insurance situation.

According to Ogren, more than 300,000 Minnesotans are without health insurance; 61 percent are full-time working adults. And one-third of them are children who forego preventive care, immunizations, and basic medical and dental treatment.

The Healthspan study commission

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would consist of 11 members representing consumers, the health care field, and small businesses. The bill would direct the commission to explore program financing options, the payroll tax, and the makeup of those at risk of living without health insurance.

The Healthspan bill goes next to the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

Lottery

Last fall, 57.2 percent of Minnesota residents voted to authorize the Legislature to establish a lottery. The Appropriations Committee, with much debate, recommended passage of a lottery bill May 10.

HF66 would create a state lottery department under the supervision of a director whom the governor would appoint. "It's very important that the first director of the lottery be depoliticized," says bill author Rep. Joe Quinn (DFL-Coon Rapids). The lottery would be a business, he says, and as such, should be run professionally.

Some provisions in the bill would: • limit administrative costs to 15 percent; • prohibit awarding prizes to winners under age 18; and

• regulate lottery advertising.

The state lottery department would receive \$11.4 million from the general fund, and \$2.6 million from the state lottery account. Also, the committee approved more than 170 positions for the state lottery department.

Rep. Mike Jaros (DFL-Duluth) sponsors an amendment that would establish treatment programs for compulsive gamblers. Lawmakers voted to appropriate \$600,000 over the next two years for the program.

The bill received preliminary approval and now goes to the full House for further consideration.

Public employees' pensions 📟

Lawmakers considered a bill May 10 that would make several changes to the benefits available to public employees who are members of the Minnesota State Retirement System (MSRS), Teachers Retirement Association (TRA), Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA), and first-class city teachers' funds. The Governmental Operations Committee approved SF783 (House author: Jaros, DFL-Duluth) May 10.

State employees who earn the same income and work the same number of years may receive different pensions when they retire under the current pension system, according to lawmakers.

Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) says proposed changes would ensure that employees who earn the same income for the same number of years would receive the same benefits. He says it's not fair that some people receive better benefits for the same service.

The pension proposal would provide uniformity in all major plans, offer early retirement benefits, develop a level formula, and remove future subsidies for new employees. Simoneau told the committee no "takeaways" would occur under the proposal.

Simoneau says the House and Senate plan to appoint a conference committee later in the session to settle on a final version of a pension bill.

State departments' funding

The House and Senate passed different versions of HF372 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey), the state departments funding bill, May 8. A 10-member conference committee is at work on a compromise. Here are two provisions regarding tourism loans and the Game and Fish Fund in the House version of the bill:

Tourism loans

The Department of Trade and Economic Development (DTED) could make loans to tourism-related businesses under one provision in HF372.

The provision would allocate funds to the DTED for loans to resorts, campgrounds, lodging facilities, and other tourism-related businesses. Businesses could use the money to pay up to 50 percent of the cost of projects, such as equipment purchases, building construction and improvement, site improvement, and other related construction and engineering undertakings. The maximum term of a loan could not exceed the property's useful life or 80 percent of the equipment's or machinery's useful life.

The provision appropriates \$2 million to the DTED to create a tourism loan account; payments that borrowers make would go back into the account. The DTED would set interest rates for the loans, and require collateral to secure all loans.

Game, fish fund

Lawmakers would take a look each biennium at fees that go into the state Game and Fish Fund under another provision in HF372. Under current law, the Legislature randomly reviews fees.

Hunting and fishing license fees, fines, and other money related to game and fish activities finance the fund. The proposed change would allow the commissioner of natural resources to request fee changes as part of a biennial fee report to the Legislature. Supporters say this procedure would provide better management of the fund and help prevent yearly fluctuations. An earlier proposal would have allowed the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to index fees annually.

The proposal would also direct Department of Finance to review and make recommendations about DNR fee requests, and submit a six-year projection on revenues and expenditures to the Legislature.

Drivers' licenses, I.D.s

Youths might have a harder time passing as someone else, and those who check identifications would have an easier time copying information from drivers' licenses and permits, if a bill the Appropriations Committee considered May 9 becomes law.

HF1461 (Kalis, DFL-Walters) would appropriate \$120,000 to the Department of Public Safety (DPS) over the next two years to improve the security and legibility of drivers' licenses, instruction permits, and Minnesota identification cards. Improvements would include using a better quality ink for licenses, I.D.s, and permits. Kalis says the ink the DPS now uses tends to fade away over time. The bill would also direct the DPS to improve security in the cards' photo areas to make tampering more difficult.

The committee approved the bill and sent it to the full House where it passed without opposition May 10.

Takeover resolution 📟

Enough is enough, says one Minnesota lawmaker. It's time for the federal government to step in and revise its laws to help protect companies against hostile takeovers and stock acquisitions.

Rep. Wayne Simoneau (DFL-Fridley) guided HF1689 through committee hearings to a final vote on the House floor May 9. The measure is a resolution asking the president and Congress to do some housecleaning in federal laws to discourage hostile takeovers and stock accumulations. The resolution says such business transactions adversely affect stockholders, employees, creditors, suppliers, customers, and the state and national economy. The resolution also asks Congress to grant states the power to enact their own anti-takeover legislation.

"We're asking Congress to take a look at their policies and laws...and the policies of the SEC [Securities and Exchange Commission] regarding takeovers," Simoneau says. "We'd like the United States to look at its [federal] laws in an attempt to deter the takeover mania that's occurring now."

The House unanimously approved the resolution. It's one of several antitakeover measures the hostile takeover bid for Northwest Airlines sparked.

Military spending

"Minnesota paid \$4.7 billion in taxes in 1987 for federal defense spending and got back \$2.9 billion. That's a net loss of \$1.8 billion dollars in one year for Minnesota taxpayers," says Rep. Andy Dawkins (DFL-St. Paul).

On May 9, the Economic Development Committee heard Dawkin's proposal to convert Minnesota's defense tax dollars into social spending dollars.

"While Minnesota receives a low share of Pentagon spending, we receive a disproportionately high share of other government spending," Dawkins says. "So, if we spend less on defense and more on other government spending, [we] stand to benefit."

The seven-county metro area receives over 96 percent of the state's defense

contract work, he says. The number of defense-related jobs totals 116,345 or 5.5 percent of all the jobs in Minnesota.

Citing a study from the Minnesota Task Force on Economic Conversion, Dawkins says Minnesota would net "an additional 9,400 jobs over and above what we have right now" if Congress would cut 20 percent from the military budget.

K-12 funding

Minnesota educators teaching kindergarten through grade 12 may get more money than they expected, according to lawmakers at a Ways and Means Committee meeting May 8.

Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) moved to dedicate more than \$10 million in unappropriated funds to K-12 education. Rep. Bob Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) says he wants to give schools some flexibility with the newly discovered funds. School districts would be able to spend the new money as they see fit.

The committee unanimously adopted the Wynia motion; the full House later amended it into HF654, the education finance omnibus bill.

A budget increase like this demonstrates Minnesota's commitment to education, says bill author Rep. Ken Nelson (DFL-Mpls). "We're providing for the education of at least 700,000 young people in...Minnesota for the next two years. That's a pretty tremendous task," says Nelson. "We're doing that with at least \$3.3 billion of state monies matched...by local levy...[which] comprises 26 percent of the total state budget."

The amendment to add \$10 million to the education budget may prevent personnel lay offs in schools, help reduce class sizes, and assist special education programs. The increase translates into a 3.4 percent budget increase in 1990 and a 3.3 percent increase in 1991. Increased appropriations send a message to local governments that lawmakers favor classroom size reductions and encourage discipline in local school spending, he says.

After long debates proposing changes to funding formulas and school levies, the House passed the bill; the Senate passed it May 9. A conference committee is now working toward a compromise.

Higher education

Provisions in the higher education appropriations bill should help correct some of the recently publicized problems in the technical college system, says Rep. Lyndon Carlson (DFL-Crystal).

On May 5, the full House approved SF1625 (House author: L. Carlson), the \$2.0 billion higher education spending package. The bill includes provisions that would:

• direct postsecondary education systems to report on their responses to rapid enrollment growth;


• provide child care subsidies to qualified parents; and

• provide funds to address disabled students' needs.

Carlson says the bill also addresses some concerns about technical institutes' credibility and accountability, subjects in recent newspaper accounts. And it would direct the system to report on its newly developed tracking system for job placement after graduation.

The bill would also direct the Higher Education Advisory Council to set marketing standards for all postsecondary systems, and direct the Community College System and the University of Minnesota coordinate campuses to examine whether they can place more students in their technically oriented programs.

The bill goes next to a conference committee where House and Senate members will work on a compromise.

Crime omnibus bill

After several hours of debate on the House Floor May 5, lawmakers passed HF59 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), the omnibus crime bill, on a vote of 127 to 4. The crime package would address, among other things, drug crimes, sexual assault and other violent crimes, drug abuse in schools, "cocaine babies," and the lack of community resources to deal with crime and poverty.

The bill proposes increased penalties for a variety of crimes, including car theft, drug dealing and possession, murder, and sexual assault. Key provisions would call for a sentence of life without parole for people whom courts convict of first-degree murder, and certain sex offenders who have a record of two consecutive convictions for criminal sexual conduct.

Lawmakers expect to settle differences between the House and Senate bills in a conference committee.

Sexual violence

A provision would require the commissioner of corrections to establish an intensive sex offender treatment program for certain prison inmates, and another similar program within a juvenile correctional facility. Juvenile courts would have to order both an independent professional assessment of juvenile sex offenders' treatment needs, and the necessary treatment.

It would also require the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension to develop uniform procedures for evidence collection in sexual assault cases, including collecting biological specimens for DNA analysis.

Drugs

A key measure would create a drug abuse prevention resource council. The council would develop guidelines for a statewide drug abuse prevention program, distribute information, and coordinate and provide technical assistance to local governments, groups, and individuals who seek funding for prevention programs. The council would also analyze the public and private costs of drug abuse

prevention, enforcement, intervention, and treatment efforts.

Community resources program


The bill would also provide a community resources program to help stabilize families, increase self-sufficiency, reduce crime, and increase the capacity of neighborhood programs. Lawmakers say the program is designed to help neighborhoods deal with some of the underlying causes of crime and poverty.

Corrections

In the May 5 issue of the *Session Weekly:* • page 3, first column, the highlight should refer to the Urban Revitalization Action Program or "URAP." The program is part of the governor's "Year of the Neighborhood" initiative, formerly called "Year of the City."

The House passed a resolution honoring Richard R. Green, former superintendent of the Minneapolis School District and most recently Chancellor of the New York City Schools. The resolution commemorates his achievements as an educator. Green died May 11 in New York at the age of 52.

Prisoners shouldn't spend their days in their cells, says Rep. Ron Abrams (IR-Minnetonka). Instead, they should work. Abrams successfully amended the omnibus health and human services budget bill May 4 to include a provision that would require inmates to work a full day. The amendment would also direct the corrections system to stay within its current budget when making necessary changes to bring about full-time employment for prisoners.

Corporate contributions through the "chickadee checkoff" would be possible under a provision in the state departments omnibus funding bill. Individual taxpayers can make contributions to Minnesota's Nongame Wildlife Management Account when they fill out state income tax forms. The contributions are either deducted from a scheduled refund or added to the taxes due.


Rattlesnake hunting will no longer be profitable in Minnesota. On May 9, the governor signed a bill into law that removes the bounty award for rattlesnakes. Rep. Bob Waltman (IR-Elgin) sponsored the House bill. County administrators will see a savings from the bounty's removal, he says. Get ready to place your bets on races at Santa Anita, Churchill Downs, and Hialeah. Both the House and Senate approved a bill that would let Canterbury Downs conduct pari-mutuel betting on televised races on days when Canterbury isn't racing. The House agreed to changes the Senate made to HF707 (Kostohryz, DFL-North St. Paul), and repassed the measure on May 9.

A "computer virus" is a destructive program designed to destroy a computer's data, occupy its memory, or disable it. Those who pass along such programs could face criminal penalties ranging from 90 days in jail and a \$700 fine to up to 10 years in jail and a \$2,500 fine, under a bill both the House and Senate passed. The bill now goes to the governor for his signature.

U.S. marshalls will celebrate their bicentennial Sept. 24. President George Washington created and appointed the first 13 U.S. marshalls 200 years ago. Presently, 94 marshalls, whom the president appoints, serve in 94 judicial districts. Employees would have guaranteed meal breaks under a bill both the House and Senate approved. HF30 (Carruthers, DFL-Brooklyn Center) would direct employers to provide a meal break to employees for every eight hours on the job. The House repassed the Senateamended bill May 10.

State employees could donate vacation time to other employees to help pay for their noninsured medical expenses under a bill on its way to the governor for his signature. HF1027 (Janezich, DFL-Chisholm) would transform the time into a cash pool to pay the bills. The time/cash pool would benefit other state employees, their spouses, or dependents, and would help pay unreimbursed medical costs that total a minimum of \$10,000.

Minnesotans celebrated "Statehood Day" May 11. President James Buchanan signed the bill to make Minnesota the 32nd state on May 11, 1858. Southern politicians opposed statehood for a free state. So Minnesota had to wait a year until the U.S. admitted Kansas, a slave state.



Do you know



Many people have come to know Minnesota as "the land of 10,000 lakes." They've seen that inscription on everything from license plates to souvenir cups and tee-shirts. But what most don't know is that Minnesota has more than 12,000 lakes within its boundaries.

According to P.S. Welch, an authority on lake terminology in the mid-1900s, a lake is "an area of open, relatively deep water, sufficiently large to produce somewhere on its periphery (outer surface) a barren wave-swept shore." Welch described ponds as "very small, very shallow bodies of standing water in which quiet water and extensive occupancy by higher aquatic plants are common characteristics." Minnesota's largest lake is Red Lake in Beltrami County, with a water surface area of 451 square miles. In all, Minnesota has more than 90,000 miles of lake and river shoreline.



Highlights

Waste recycling

A bill that aims to have each Minnesota county recycling at least 25 percent of its annual solid waste by July 1993, received unanimous approval from the Appropriations Committee May 17.

HF417 (Munger, DFL-Duluth) would appropriate nearly \$37 million during the next two years to, among other things, establish plans and programs to reduce and recycle waste, develop markets for recyclables, address special problems that materials cause in the waste stream, and educate the public on proper waste management.

The bill also would direct state offices in the metropolitan area to recycle at least 25 percent of their waste within the next three years, and school districts to recycle used paper. It would allow counties to use special levies to generate matching funds and impose a 6 percent surcharge on solid waste collection and disposal services.

Major spending items in the bill include:

• nearly \$28 million to help counties meet recycling requirements;

• \$1.8 million for a problem materials program; and

• \$1.7 million for market development programs.

The full House passed the bill May 18.

Groundwater protection

The comprehensive groundwater protection bill declares groundwater a precious natural resource on which Minnesotans depend. The bill would set goals for maintaining groundwater in its natural condition for the use of future generations.

The House amended SF262 (House author: Munger, DFL-Duluth) May 17 and approved it for final passage. On May 18, however, the Senate refused to concur with House amendments, and sent the bill to a conference committee.

The bill includes provisions that would:

• establish guidelines for best management practices to protect groundwater and the environment;

• designate five state agencies as regulating authorities charged with adopting and enforcing water resource protection requirements;

• set guidelines for fertilizer, chemical, pesticide, and compost use; product labeling; hazardous waste; civic and criminal penalties; education; licenses; fees; and investigations; and

• provide for sealing abandoned wells. This bill belongs to everybody, says author Rep. Willard Munger. It will protect the groundwater supply for future generations.

Low-income energy needs

The House passed a bill May 17 that addresses low-income energy needs and energy conservation in Minnesota. HF1532 would modify the "cold weather rule" which prevents utilities from disconnecting heating services during cold weather months if customers fail to pay for the service.

"This bill addresses some of the energy needs of low-income Minnesotans, and at the same time has intended benefits for all Minnesotans, including lowered utility rates, increased conservation of energy, streamlining state government, and improving the environment," says author Rep. Andy Dawkins (DFL-St. Paul).

According to Dawkins, the bill would reform the cold weather rule and transfer responsibility for the state's conservation improvement programs from the Public Utilities Commission to the Department of Public Service.

Under the current cold weather rule, utilities must continue to provide heating service between Oct. 15 and April 15, even if customers have not paid any portion of their bills. This rule causes problems, according to Dawkins, because people fall far behind on bill payments, and can't catch up. Utilities may not reconnect those customers the following October and they may end up homeless.

The bill would require customers to pay at least 10 percent of their gross income to the utilities during the heating season, and would prohibit utilities from cutting off service to anyone who has paid that portion of their bill.

Another change to the cold weather rule would extend eligibility for energy protection to those earning less than 185 percent of the federal poverty level. In return, those who receive protection from the cold weather rule would have to accept budget and conservation counseling and weatherize their homes, says Dawkins.

The bill now goes to the Senate for further consideration.

Lottery

The fate of Minnesota's lottery lies in the hands of a House-Senate conference committee.

On May 15, the House approved its version of the lottery, HF66 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids), on a 98-33 vote. The Senate approved its version May 14.

The House bill would create a lottery division within a newly created state department of gaming. The department would oversee the lottery, charitable gambling, and horse racing. The bill would also allow both instant winner scratch-off tickets and on-line computerized lotto games.

A 10-member conference committee will settle differences between the two versions. One difference concerns prize limits. The House version would not set limits; the Senate version would set a \$10 million limit on individual prizes. Also, the House bill would create a department of gaming and three divisions, while the Senate measure would call for three separate agencies.

Voters last November authorized the Legislature to enact a lottery. The state's share of lottery proceeds would go to an environmental and natural resources trust fund (which voters also approved), and to rural economic development and research.

Veterans home

Luverne, a southwestern Minnesota city targeted for a new veterans home, received another nod of approval from lawmakers at an Appropriations Committee meeting May 17. The General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee also had recommended the city earlier this session.

HF723 (Steensma, DFL-Luverne) would permit construction of a 60-bed (minimum) skilled nursing care home. Luverne, about 200 miles from the Twin Cities, is closer to a federal Veterans Administration (VA) medical center than any other site the Department of Administration (DOA) considered, according to information the committee received. The DOA also considered sites in Fergus Falls, St. Peter, Willmar, and Worthington.

Construction costs would be \$3.7 million for a 60-bed facility, and \$5.6 million for a 120-bed facility, according to Steve Perkins, Luverne city administrator.

Over the next two years, the federal government would pay 65 percent of the cost and the city would pay 35 percent. The state would not pay any construction costs during that time; however, lawmakers appropriated funds to study the need for more such homes.

Besides proximity to a VA facility, factors that determined the new facility site include: availability of local medical resources (hospitals, doctors, and nurses); availability of local funding and staff; and site potential.

The full House passed the bill May 18.

Check cashing

The commissioner of commerce would oversee the check-cashing service industry if SF353 (House author: Jefferson, DFL-Mpls) becomes law.

On May 17, the House approved the measure 133-0. The bill would regulate businesses that exist to cash checks, not businesses for which check cashing is incidental.

Under the bill, business operators would have to obtain licenses from the commissioner. The bill would require applicants to file their fee schedules for check cashing services and would prohibit currency exchanges from charging excessive rates for cashing checks. It also lists criteria — such as previous rate schedules, amount of risk involved in the type of check cashed, or the reasonableness of profit — to help the commissioner to determine whether proposed rates are unreasonable.

Sports training

Minnesotans hoping to make the state a major Olympic sports training area got a boost May 16 when the House passed a bill that would grant \$50,000 to the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission for a location feasibility study. The grant would be in addition to the commission's approximately \$200,000 operating budget.

HF1418 allows the commission to fulfill its mission, says author Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul). The 1987 Legislature created the commission and directed it to develop a statewide 16-site amateur sports training network that "would allow Minnesota to become the Midwestern center of Olympic competition training."

According to Kelly, the commission already identified a "premier site" for the facility near Metropolitan State University in St. Paul. The commission likes the location, he says, because it's near a campus for any classroom needs and a larger sports facility (the St. Paul Civic Center) where athletes could "culminate their training by having an event" in their sport. The indoor facility would house sports such as judo, karate, badminton, basketball, boxing, volleyball, gymnastics, table tennis, and wheelchair sports, he said.

Even so, the House removed a provision that would have restricted the commission's study to the St. Paul area.

"They've apparently already determined a location," says Rep. Tony Onnen (IR-Cokato). "But I'd feel more comfortable if they had an opportunity to look at other places (outside the metropolitan area)."

Working capital fund

Certain minority business enterprises would have an opportunity to get the loans they need for short-term capital under HF42 (McLaughlin, DFL-Mpls), a bill the House passed unanimously May 16.

The bill would permit state agencies and local jurisdictions to make grants to a guaranty fund. A private non-profit organization would administer the loan guaranty fund for certain minority business enterprises that have difficulty in getting bank financing.

Sponsors of the bill say it would put in place a public/private partnership with various private businesses and foundations in Minnesota, some of which have already committed monies to a project fund for the same purpose.

The bill awaits Senate action.

Housing omnibus bill

A bill that would appropriate \$5 million in state funding to help relieve Minnesota's housing problems received unanimous approval from the House May 16.

Rep. Rich O'Connor (DFL-St. Paul) says his bill, HF535, addresses housing affordability, an increase in the homeless population, and blighted neighborhoods. Provisions in the bill would rehabilitate current housing and revitalize urban neighborhoods.

The House passed the Senate version of the housing bill, but added an amendment to change a section regarding housing impact reports. The amendment would require a government unit to draft an annual housing impact report when 10 or more units of low-income housing are displaced. Rep. Donald Frerichs (IR-Rochester) successfully offered another amendment that would require only cities of the first class (Minneapolis, St. Paul, Duluth) to prepare housing impact reports.

Since the House and Senate passed different versions of the housing bill, a conference committee will attempt to reach a compromise.

Drivers' licenses, plates 🚥

Provisional drivers' licenses may be in the black a while longer. Two years longer in fact.

Drivers under age 21 would have to use a provisional driver's license under SF139 (House author: A. Johnson, DFL-Spring Lake Park), a bill the House passed May 16.

Bill sponsors say people between ages 19 and 21 would have a more difficult time trying to alter their driver's licenses to buy alcohol. Provisional licenses have a black stripe at the top of the card and regular licenses have a red stripe. The bill also would make it unlawful to fraudulently use a Minnesota identification card.

Other provisions in the bill would allow veterans to use special license plates on self-propelled recreational vehicles, and the surviving spouses of former prisoners of war (POWs) to use special license plates for POWs on their vehicles.

The bill awaits the governor's signature.

Crime bills

House members called for a conference committee May 16 to iron out differences with the Senate about criminal sentencing and other crime issues.

One of the key differences between the two versions of HF59 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul), the crime omnibus bill, is the sentence for first-degree murder. The Senate bill would increase the sentence from 17 years to 25 years, while the House version calls for life without parole.

The House bill also would call for life without parole for certain sex offenders who have two prior convictions of sexual assault. The Senate bill would allow judges to increase sentences for so-called dangerous offenders.

House and Senate members differ on a variety of other issues, including "cocaine babies," sentences for property crimes, and how much to spend on certain programs.

Lawmakers expect to come up with a compromise bill before the session ends May 22.

Campaign reform

Political fundraisers during a legislative session would become a thing of the past under a bill the House passed May 15.

HF629 (Scheid, DFL-Brooklyn Park) would change the Elections and Ethics in Government Act to restrict contributions to legislative candidates during a regular legislative session. Candidates could no longer solicit contributions from registered lobbyists, political committees, or political funds during that time. Supporters say the bill responds to criticism that legislators receive money from groups interested in current legislation.

Also, the House amended the bill to prohibit candidates from accepting lobbyists' unsolicited contributions during a legislative session. The amendment responds to critics who said the solicitation ban was unenforceable as it was written. Candidates, lobbyists, or other restricted parties who violate these provisions could face a civil penalty up to \$500. However, the bill wouldn't prohibit candidates from fundraising in their own districts during legislative sessions.

The bill would also provide for distributing public money to candidates in special legislative elections, and would restore the income tax credit for Minnesotans who contribute to political parties, judges, and other state candidates who agree to follow campaign spending limits.

Special services 💻

Rep. Teresa Lynch (IR-Andover) provided sign language interpretation on the House Floor as Rep. Richard Jefferson (DFL-Mpls) presented a bill that would require major political parties to provide special services for communicatively and physically impaired people at political functions.

The bill, HF354, would require the parties to make good faith efforts to provide sign language interpreters for the hearing impaired, advance copies of material to allow preparation of Braille translations for the visually impaired, and buildings that could accommodate the physically handicapped.

The House unanimously passed the bill May 17; it awaits Senate action.



Many people consider woodticks the same kind social menace as mosquitoes. The governor signed a bill that establishes a research and control program for disease-vectoring ticks in the sevencounty metropolitan area. It becomes effective Aug. 1, 1989.

Legislators and staff took a break from fast food this week, courtesy of the Minnesota Council of Retail Trade Associations (MCRTA). The MCRTA served a fried chicken lunch May 16 and 17 to hundreds of hungry people. The MCRTA is a group of trade associations that represent most of the state's retail businesses.

Minnesota dairy, pork, honey, and other agricultural processing companies contributed taste treats for Agriculture Day at the Capitol, May 18. The legislative reception, which the Agriculture Committee sponsored, featured Minnesota products as taste samples for lawmakers and staff.

People who lease hangars at airports in small cities would not have to pay property taxes if SF46 (House author K. Olson, DFL-Sherburn) becomes law. To qualify for the tax-exemption, individuals must: use hangars to store or repair aircraft; provide aviation goods, services or facilities to an airport or the general public; locate in cities with populations under 50,000; and not lease property the Metropolitan Airports Commission owns.

Proposed changes in state pension plans received the endorsement of the full House May 18 on a vote of 130-1. The pension bill would provide uniformity in all major plans, offer early retirement benefits, develop a level formula, and remove future subsidies for new employees. The bill awaits further action in the Senate. Moms, take heart! For 18 of the next 22 Mother's Days, you won't have to listen to fish tales about the ones that got away. The House and Senate agreed to changes in HF831 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids) which would regulate the walleye opener. The changes would allow moms to fish free when the fishing opener falls on Mother's Day weekend. Under the proposal, the opener would be the Saturday two weeks before Memorial Day weekend, instead of the current Saturday nearest to May 15. The bill awaits the governor's signature. If you're looking for authentic Minnesota homegrown wild rice, look for a package clearly labeled "100 percent naturally grown, lake and river harvested." A provision added to HF878 on the House Floor May 16 would require labeling wild rice as naturally grown only if it's 100 percent lake or river-harvested. Labels on packages of cultivated wild rice would have to clearly state the words "paddy grown" or "cultivated."


Do you know The High School Page Program, a nonpartisan effort, brings high




The House Desk: paper in motion



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
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Recycling bill

On May 22, in the final minutes of the 1989 legislative session, the House decided to hold over a \$37 million recycling bill for further discussion.

HF417 (Munger, DFL-Duluth) would set a goal for counties to recycle at least 25 percent of their annual solid waste by 1993, and would establish plans and programs to reduce and recycle waste, develop markets for recyclables, address special problems that materials cause in the waste stream, and educate the public

on proper waste management.

A conference committee met earlier in the evening to iron out differences in the bill. But Rep. Peter McLaughlin (DFL-Mpls), one of the conferees, refused to sign the report, and told House members there wasn't enough time to resolve some problems. He continued speaking on the issue until after midnight, the adjournment deadline, thus preventing the House from voting on the report.

The bill may receive further discussion during the interim or the 1990 legislative session.


It's a fact!

The names of some Minnesota counties introduce us to people in history. Twenty-seven of the state's 87 counties bear the names of Minnesotans of time gone by.

Politicians, founding pioneers, and journalists have a part in our state's county names: Joseph Renshaw Brown (Brown County) one of the founders of the Minnesota territory and an influential member of the Legislature; James Madison Goodhue (Goodhue County) the first printer and editor in the state; and Henry Hastings Sibley (Sibley County) pioneer, governor, and military defender of Minnesota.

The largest county by population today is Hennepin, bearing the name of Louis Hennepin, a Franciscan missionary, explorer, and author. The smallest by population is Lake of the Woods.

Lottery

The House and Senate approved a conference committee report on the lottery bill May 22. If the governor signs HF66 (Quinn, DFL-Coon Rapids), Minnesota will become the 30th state, along with the District of Columbia, to offer the game of chance.

The bill would create a lottery and a department of gaming to oversee the lottery, charitable gambling, and horse racing. It also would set up a division of enforcement within the Department of Public Safety to enforce all gambling regulations.

House and Senate conferees eliminated a provision that would have given anonymity to winners of more than \$50,000, but retained a section that would call for treatment of compulsive gambling. They also removed a proposed \$10,000 limit on prizes, and agreed to a proposed advertising limit within a certain time.

Two types of lottery games will be available to Minnesotans within a year. Instant scratch-off games could be available as early as December or January; the computerized lotto game should be available next summer.

Education funding

School districts would receive more state money per pupil and an increase in the base operating formula under provisions of HF654 (K. Nelson, DFL-Mpls), a \$3.5 billion bill the House approved May 22.

Besides spreading more money across the state's school districts for students from kindergarten through grade 12, the House-Senate compromise would restrict open enrollment policy, but not so far as to prevent a transfer student from participating in varsity athletics.

To help prod negotiations between districts and teachers' unions, the bill would require them to settle contracts by Jan. 1, 1990, or the district would loose per-pupil aid, according to author Rep. Ken Nelson. "This encourages school districts to get done with it (contract talks)...." he says.

Rep. Steve Sviggum (IR-Kenyon) argued against adopting the conference committee report. "We aren't moving...toward equity," he said. However, the House passed the bill on a vote of 114 to 19.

On May 20, the only Saturday meeting this session, the House unanimously approved a \$2 billion funding package for the state's higher education systems. SF1625 (House author: G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham, for the Appropriations Committee) would provide more money for student grants and scholarships, and student work-study. It also would subsidize child care costs for qualified parents while they attend classes.

Healthspan "

A watered-down version of Healthspan, a proposal that would provide health insurance for some 400,000 uninsured Minnesotans, received unanimous approval from the House May 22.

SF491 (House author: Ogren, DFL-Aitkin) would call for a study on how to fund and implement the plan in the future. Lawmakers stripped a funding mechanism from the bill earlier in the session saying problems in financing the proposal are complex and need further analysis.

Some lawmakers are concerned about the cost of the plan. However, author Rep. Paul Ogren says the plan would be a Chevrolet, not a Cadillac. And, he says, it's important to offer a minimal level of health coverage to those people who can't afford it and are ineligible for public assistance.

Studies show the uninsured are mostly the "working poor" who can't afford the high cost of health insurance premiums and don't receive health benefits from their employers.

Proponents of the plan say it makes

more sense to offer preventative medicine to offset serious medical problems, rather than to offer state assistance after people become very sick and can no longer afford to pay for medical services. The state would save money in the long-run, they say, because the plan would reduce some incidents of serious illness for which the state already pays.

The bill now goes to the governor's desk for final approval.

Veterinary drugs 📼

A bill that would regulate veterinary prescriptions for livestock, over-thecounter livestock drug sales, and product labeling received final approval from both the House and Senate May 22.

Rep. Steve Dille (IR-Dassel) says SF1378 is a model veterinary drug bill that would benefit livestock producers because "...they're going to be able to get more information easily from their veterinarian." Drug regulations would provide stricter guidelines in the livestock industry, he says, and would "...reduce the drug residue problem in our food supply."

The bill also would require veterinarians to provide livestock producers with written as well as oral instructions for prescriptions. Other provisions would affect labeling requirements and the use of over-the-counter drugs.

Rep. Brad Stanius (IR-White Bear Lake) says the bill needs stricter product labeling guidelines and drug sales registration to curb veterinary drug abuse among young people.

Dille agreed to work with Stanius during the interim to consider uses or abuses of veterinary drugs.

Crack dealers

Law enforcement officials may soon have more power to combat drug dealers who operate so-called crack houses under HF159 (Dawkins, DFL-St. Paul), a bill the House approved May 22.

The bill would make it easier for landlords to evict tenants who deal drugs. It would also make it easier for authorities to confiscate the property of landlords who fail to take action against drugdealing tenants. Lawmakers say the threat of forfeiture and increased power to evict certain drug dealers would be incentives for landlords to keep dealers out of their apartments.

During committee hearings earlier this session, community members expressed dismay about drug dealers who disrupt neighborhoods and create a bad influence for children. Bill sponsors say the legislation would address those concerns as well as others, such as crack dealers who literally take over apartment buildings, and absentee landlords who show little concern for the community.

The bill awaits the governor's signature.

State departments funding

On May 22, the House and Senate passed HF372 (Solberg, DFL-Bovey), a \$1.2 billion bill that would provide funding over the next two years for the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of state government, and for state constitutional officers, departments, and agencies. About \$927.0 million would come from the general fund; the remainder from various special revenue funds and accounts. Here are a few highlights from the bill:

Economic development

Businesses would receive assistance from the state through two programs under HF372. The Minnesota Project Outreach Corporation (MPOC), a new state corporation, and a loan program would help businesses that otherwise might not be eligible for a loan.

The MPOC would help businesses move forward in today's technologybased economy. It would work with the University of Minnesota to supply technology and scientific advice and help

small- and medium-sized businesses find technical and financial assistance. It also would establish a system to provide technical assistance from Minnesota's higher education systems, and would provide a toll-free telephone number for advice statewide.

The Department of Trade and Economic Development, along with state financial institutions, would operate a new capital access program to provide loans to industrial, commercial, and agricultural businesses, and target smalland medium-sized businesses that represent higher-risk borrowers.

Trial court costs

Under the bill, the state would pick up some of the costs of the state trial court and public defender systems. Currently, counties pay for the two systems, which has led to unequal service around the state. The bill would direct the state to begin collecting fees and fines to help offset the additional costs.

Accounting procedures

The bill also would consolidate certain special revenue fund accounts into the general fund to simplify accounting procedures and give a better picture of state spending. The consolidation would not restructure nor eliminate programs, reduce budgets, nor redirect user fees from their current uses.

Taxes

On May 20, two days before the close of the 1989 legislative session, the House passed a compromise version of the omnibus tax bill.

HF1734 is a comprehensive tax bill, and according to author Rep. Dee Long (DFL-Mpls), its main provisions would: • provide a total amount of property tax relief equaling \$355 million — \$270 million in state aid, \$25 million in levy reductions, \$35 million in school levy reductions, and \$25 million in tax increment savings;

provide a new corporate alternative minimum tax based on the federal alternative minimum taxable income. (Long says this would replace the "factors tax" — a tax on property, sales, and payroll — and would be revenue neutral over a period of three years. The bill would maintain corporate income tax at 9.5 percent, and set alternative minimum taxable income at 7 percent);
increase income thresholds for child care credit eligibility;

• target two major groups for property tax relief — homeowners and renters. (The bill would extend eligibility for property tax refunds to homeowners with household incomes between \$35,000 and \$50,000; and for renters, would increase the percentage of tax qualifying for renter's credit by 15 percent);

• help homeowners whose property taxes have increased over 10 percent and for whom real estate values are increasing rapidly;

• reduce the qualifying capital equipment tax from 4 percent to 3 percent for

businesses in the state;

• extend the sales tax to telephone access charges that hotels charge their guests; and

• increase taxes on lawful gambling, which Long says would raise approximately \$49 million.

Both the House and Senate passed the compromise bill. It now awaits the governor's signature.

Presidential primary

Minnesotans could once again vote in a presidential primary under provisions of a bill the House passed May 20. Legislators approved an elections bill that would allow the secretary of state to restore a presidential primary to Minnesota.

The state held primaries in 1952 and '56, but discontinued them when political party leaders became dissatisfied with the results. Currently, Minnesota participates in pre-presidential election activities through precinct caucuses.

Rep. Tom Osthoff (DFL-St. Paul), sponsor of HF630, supports a Senate amendment that would restore the primary.

"I think...it's a unique opportunity [for] every voter in this state...to go to the polls on the fourth Tuesday in February and express their preference for a presidential candidate," he says. Other supporters of the primary say Minnesota will gain national visibility by entering the presidential sweepstakes on Super Tuesday.

Another provision in the bill would repeal a law that prohibits candidates from campaigning on election day. A Hennepin County judge declared the law unconstitutional in 1988.

The bill, which would not require party registration, awaits the governor's signature.

Omnibus health bill

A \$2.7 billion omnibus funding bill for health and human services received a final nod from lawmakers May 20 after a conference committee worked out a compromise.

HF1759 (G. Anderson, DFL-Bellingham, for the Appropriations Committee), which provides spending for the next two years to the departments of Human Services, Jobs and Training, Corrections, Health, and others, is \$12 million leaner than when it left the House earlier this session.

Other changes would provide:

• a four-year delay in moving most of the developmentally disabled residents out of regional treatment centers and into community group homes;

• an additional \$9 million for the Head Start program;

• a \$450,000 increase for independent living centers;

• a \$1 million increase for the Hastings Veterans Homes; and

• a \$4 million increase to fund the Minnesota Employment and Economic Development (MEED) program for another year.

The House passed the bill on an 87-42 vote. It now goes to the governor for his signature.

Viable fetus

After nearly two and a half hours of debate May 20, the House approved a bill that would bar doctors from performing abortions after a certain time.

Sponsor Rep. Kris Hasskamp (DFL-Crosby) says HF962 would require physicians to determine the viability of a fetus, using 20 weeks as a reference point. If doctors perform abortions after the fetus is 20 weeks old, they would have to use the least lethal method available, if the fetus is viable. Also, it would require a second physician to attend an abortion performed after 20 weeks to care for the fetus, if it survives.

Hasskamp says the measure would not interfere with the landmark case, *Roe vs. Wade*, which outlines the state's and mothers' interests in the three trimesters of pregnancy.

Several legislators argued against the bill, saying it would set a precedent and that there's no medical need for it.

The House passed the bill on a 93-28 vote. Its companion in the Senate awaits action in the Senate Health and Human Services Committee.

Crime omnibus bill 📟

The House and Senate approved the final version of the 1989 crime package May 20. HF59 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) addresses, among other things, "cocaine babies," drug crimes, sexual assault and other violent crimes, drug abuse in schools, and the lack of community resources to deal with crime and poverty. The bill awaits the governor's signature.

Cocaine babies

Pregnant women who take certain illegal drugs may face charges of child neglect under HF59.

The bill would require physicians and certain professionals to report pregnant women whom they suspect of illegal drug use. Physicians would have to administer toxicology tests to women they suspect of drug abuse and to certain newborns to determine if there's evidence that a woman used drugs during pregnancy.

In certain situations, local welfare offices would offer chemical dependency treatment and referral for prenatal care to pregnant women who use drugs. A pregnant woman who refuses recommended voluntary services or fails recommended treatment could face commitment to a state treatment facility.

Rep. Kathleen Blatz (IR-Bloomington), chief author of the provision, says it would address the serious problem of "cocaine babies." However, opponents of this approach say the proposal would discourage drug-addicted women from seeking any prenatal care, and further jeopardize the health of babies and mothers.

Another provision would require the commissioner of education to work with school districts to develop and implement programs aimed at preventing and reducing the risk of harm to unborn children whose mothers expose them to drugs and alcohol.

Penalties

HF59 would increase penalties for a variety of crimes, including car theft, drug dealing and possession, murder, and sexual assault. First-degree murderers convicted of certain murder or sexual assault crimes would face a sentence of life without parole; those who don't have a prior record would have to serve 30 years before becoming eligible for parole. People whom the courts convict three

times of sexual assault would serve a 37year mandatory sentence.

Community resources

The compromise package includes a provision that would create a community resources program to help stabilize families, increase self-sufficiency, reduce crime, and increase the capacity of neighborhood programs. Lawmakers say the program is designed to help neighborhoods deal with some of the underlying causes of crime and poverty.

Hate crimes 📼

On May 19, the House gave final approval to a bill that would increase maximum penalties for people who commit crimes against others because of their race, color, religion, or sex.

HF700 (Greenfield, DFL-Mpls) returned to the House Floor after a House-Senate conference committee agreed to remove the phrases "political affiliation" and "membership or lack of membership in a labor union" from a list of groups subject to "bias crimes." The bill list would now include sexual orientation, physical or mental disability, and national origin as well as race, color, religion, or sex.

To monitor groups not included in the bias crime list, the conference committee added a provision that would require the commissioner of public safety to include certain hate-crime information in an annual report.

Fishing opener

Mothers who like to fish can do so without a license when the season opener falls on Mother's Day.


The governor signed HF831 (Kinkel, DFL-Park Rapids) into law on May 23, providing for an official "Take a Mom Fishing Weekend."


The original intent of the bill, according to author Rep. Tony Kinkel, was to set an earlier opening date for certain game fish to encourage tourism and to stimulate local businesses.

Debate picked up as House members learned that Kinkel's proposal meant the fishing opener would fall on Mother's Day more often in the future.

Rep. Dave Gruenes (IR-St. Cloud) proposed the amendment allowing mothers to fish free whenever the season opened on Mother's Day. Lawmakers also amended the bill to direct the commissioner of natural resources to publicize the event as "Take a Mom Fishing Weekend."

Some legislators wondered how game wardens would identify mothers. According to one woman legislator, "A mother doesn't lie." Other suggestions included having the wardens simply ask a woman if she is a mother.






If you recite all 87 Minnesota county names, you will have spoken three different languages. Eight county names are of the Dakota or Sioux language, six have English translations, and one French.

Vote yes



How much state tax will Minnesota lottery winners pay? According to HF1734 (Long, DFL-Mpls), this year's tax omnibus bill, the state lottery would withhold 8 percent, on winnings larger than \$5,000 (as provided under federal withholding rules). Winners would pay taxes on smaller prizes when they fill out their income taxes. And if a person lives outside of Minnesota? The bill provides that winnings from a Minnesota state lottery paid to a non-resident are considered Minnesota income.

Anabolic steroids are considered controlled substances under a new law the governor signed. Penalties for possession of the drugs can be up to three years in prison, and a fine of up to \$20,000. Anabolic steroids which the Food and Drug Administration approved for use on cattle or other nonhuman species are not considered controlled substances.

Spearfishing will be less expensive for Minnesota senior citizens come Aug. 1, 1989. Under a bill the governor signed May 17, seniors will no longer have to buy a spearfishing license if they already have an angling license. The law requires seniors to possess an angling license, proof of age, and proof of residency, and carry these forms of identification while spearing and while transporting the fish. And since the seniors can apply for a refund of the price of their angling licenses, they can spear fish for free.

Con artists targeting seniors and other vulnerable adults, beware! Minnesota legislators have your number. On May 19, the House unanimously approved SF536 (House author: Milbert, DFL-South St. Paul), which would increase civil penalties against people the courts convict of conning senior citizens or vulnerable adult groups. Interested in government? The Department of Employee Relations (DOER) will provide grants up to \$3,000 to state employees for short-term research projects that examine state, federal, or foreign government practices and provide recommendations for better service. The DOER will approve the grants on a competitive basis, and make them available to people who have worked for the state at least three years, and whose agency agrees to match the grant.

State prison adult inmates who didn't graduate from high school would have to work toward a high school diploma equivalent if they want to earn time off their sentence, under provisions of a bill the House passed May 19. HF618 (Bauerly, DFL-Sauk Rapids) also would require prisons to offer diploma-oriented programs to inmates. The bill passed the House on a vote of 131-0. However, the Senate did not act on the bill this session.

The transportation omnibus funding bill squeaked through the House May 19, on a 69 to 60 vote. HF1764 (Kalis, DFL-Walters) would overhaul the depreciation and tax tables for motor vehicles. It also would appropriate money to other highway- and transportationrelated projects. The Senate also passed the bill May 19 on a vote of 37-22.

Anglers can keep their fish houses on the ice a little longer now. The governor signed a bill May 19 that extends the length of time fish houses can be on the ice after Feb. 28 each year. Current law permits anglers to have a fish house on the ice from 7:00 a.m. to midnight. As of Aug. 1, 1989, the new law extends the time from one hour before sunrise until midnight.

Private sector employees would have the right to look at their personnel files if the governor signs HF260 (Trimble, DFL-St. Paul), a bill both the House and Senate approved. A key purpose of the bill is to give people a chance to correct inaccurate information in their work records. Public employees already have this right. Sponsors of the bill say many Minnesota employees don't realize that employers now can deny them access to their personnel files.

Legislative Session Statistics 75th and 76th Sessions

Each legislative term, or "biennium," lasts two years, with the first session of the biennium lasting longer than the second. The 76th Legislative Session began in 1989, and in this chart, stands in comparison to the previous biennium. The tallies for the number of bills passed is a total of bills that passed the House and bills that passed the Senate.





QUESTIONS YOU'VE ASKED

How long does the governor have to sign or veto a bill?

—Three days after the House and the Senate pass the bill and present it to the governor for his signature (not including Sundays) while the Legislature is in session. If the governor doesn't sign or veto the bill within three days, it automatically becomes law.

—Fourteen days (including Sundays) after the Legislature has adjourned "sine die" to sign any bill the Legislature passed during the last three days of session. If the governor doesn't sign or veto a bill within 14 days, it doesn't become law (also known as a "pocket veto").

Does the word "session" always refer to the two-year biennium?

In the Legislature, use of the word "session" may have five meanings: 1) Session: the biennial (two-year) period during which the Legislature meets, i.e., "The 76th Session."

2) Regular session: the annual meeting of the Legislature between the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January (this session, Jan. 3), and the first Monday after the third Saturday in May (this session, May 22).

3) Special, or extra session: session after expiration of 120 legislative days in a biennium, or after the date the law prescribed for annual adjournment. The governor calls the Legislature into special session. But the governor may not dictate the matters the Legislature will consider, nor the length of the special session. 4) Daily session: a meeting of the House or Senate in its chamber. Most people use the term "daily session" interchangeably with "legislative day."

5) Joint session: meeting of the House and Senate together, same as joint convention.

What does "interim" mean?

The interim is the time between the two sessions of the biennium. When the first session adjourns, members set and announce the date on which the Legislature will begin meeting for the second session of the biennium. In other words, they adjourn until a certain date. This is different from the final adjournment at the end of the second session of the biennium when the Legislature adjourns "sine die."

What does "sine die" mean?

Sine die means "without a day." When the Legislature adjourns at the end of the second session of the biennium, the Speaker of the House will say, "The House is now adjourned sine die." That is, without naming a day certain on which the Legislature will meet again.

When will the next regular session start?

Monday, Feb. 12, 1990 at 2:00 p.m.

What does the term "bill status" mean?

A bill's status refers to where the bill is in the legislative process. For example, a bill may be in a committee waiting for a hearing. Or its status may be that it is on one of the calendars (lists of bills waiting House action) or it may have passed both the House and Senate and be on its way to the governor. To find the status of a bill, call the House Index Department at (612) 296-6646.

What is a "legislative day"?

A legislative day is a day when either the House or the Senate is in session; a 24hour period beginning at 7 a.m.

What is the House Journal?

The daily journals of the House and Senate can be weighty, legal tools because Minnesota courts consider them proof of legislative intent. Minnesota is a journal entry state, as are a number of states in the Union. But most states use the final bill the Legislature delivers to the governor for signature as enforcing properly passed legislation, not the journal record, when someone challenges a law.

However, many years ago, Minnesota courts established the journals' legal clout when they used the journals as proof of the Legislature's intent, overrode, and revoked a new law.

Who can introduce a bill in the Legislature?

Only elected representatives and senators can introduce bills in the House and Senate. The legislator who introduces a bill then becomes its chief author. At the time of introduction, the bill gets a House File (HF) number indicating the chronological order of the bill's introduction in the House. In the Senate, it gets a Senate File (SF) number.


Who is the chief author of a bill?

The chief author is the legislator who sponsors a bill and whose name appears after the file number on the bill. A chief author may select other authors whose names also appear on the bill. A bill may have a total of five authors in the House and five in the Senate.

What does "majority" and "simple majority" mean?

A majority, needed for final passage of a bill in the House, is 50 percent plus one of all elected members of a legislative body: 68 votes in the House; 34 votes in the Senate.

In a committee, subcommittee, division, and Committee of the Whole, a simple majority is 50 percent plus one of those members present and voting.
