


It's a fact!

The name, Charles H. Graves, may not be one you know. But 100 years ago it was prominent in Minnesota, when Graves served as speaker of the House. Graves was a merchant, who moved from Springfield, Mass. to Duluth in 1877. He served as mayor of Duluth and as a state senator before becoming speaker in 1889.

The speaker's post, which is that of presiding officer of the House, wasn't the first officer position that Graves held. In the 40th New York Volunteers, a military organization, Graves rose from the rank of private to lieutenant, and then, captain. He also held offices as assistant adjutant general, brevet lieutenant colonel, and captain in the United States Volunteer and Regular Army.

Highlights

76th Legislative Session

Speaker Robert E. Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) rapped the gavel Jan. 3 to begin the 76th Legislative Session of the Minnesota House of Representatives.

During the largely ceremonial opening session, Secretary of State Joan Growe presided as Minnesota Supreme Court Chief Justice Douglas Amdahl administered the oath of office to the members present as their families and friends watched from the floor and the galleries.

Representatives voted to change the time when the House meets, from 2 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. The change allows for a

lunch break between scheduled committee meetings.

Vanasek, in his second term as speaker, pledged to hear and work with all members, make use of all members' talents, provide policy direction and "enhance public respect for the legislative process."

Fifteen new members took the oath of office during the opening session.

Besides approving changes in committees' scopes, the membership also nominated and elected House administrative officers.

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

1989 House leaders

Speaker of the House

Rep. Robert E. Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) has served in the Legislature since 1972.

Vanasek graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1967 with a B.A. in political science. His interest in politics led to his legislative career.

Vanasek's colleagues elected him assistant majority leader in 1978, 1980, and 1982. In 1985, he received a Bush Fellowship to attend the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University where he earned an M.A. in Public Administration. He became majority leader in 1986 and speaker of the House for the 1987 Special Session. The Minnesota VFW Ladies' Auxiliary and *Politics in Minnesota* magazine named him "Legislator of the Year" in 1987.

Vanasek's not only a seasoned legislator, he's also active in his community. In 1979 and 1984, the U.S. Jaycees named him "Outstanding Young American." Many other organizations have given Vanasek service awards, including the Minneapolis/St. Paul Archdiocese.

Majority Leader

Rep. Ann Wynia (DFL-St. Paul) is a seven-term veteran of the House. She chairs the Rules and Legislative Administration Committee and has served on several other committees.

Wynia earned a B.A. in government from the University of Texas and an M.A. in political science from the University of Wisconsin. As an instructor in political science, she shares her knowledge of government with students at North Hennepin Community College in Brooklyn Park. In 1986, Hamline University appointed her adjunct professor of public affairs. She's also on the executive committee for the Minnesota Center for Women in Government at Hamline.

The St. Paul Business and Professional Women's Organization named her "Legislator of the Year" in 1982. In addition, Wynia has received several other public service awards during her years of service in the House.

Minority Leader

When he's not working at the state Legislature, Rep. Bill Schreiber (IR-Brooklyn Park) runs a potato growing and packaging business.

Schreiber, a Minnesota native, studied business at St. Cloud State University. After serving as a member of the Brooklyn Park City Council for five years, Schreiber moved on to the Legislature. First elected to the House in 1972, he chaired the Taxes Committee when Independent-Republicans controlled the House in 1985.

Schreiber has received many honors for his dedication to the Legislature and his community, including the Excellence in County Government Award from the Association of Minnesota Counties.

And Hennepin County named Schreiber, his wife Carol, and children Rob and Wendy, Farm Family of the Year in 1980.

Youth in government 📟

The YMCA Youth in Government program sets the stage for students to learn and experience how real government works. High school students from around the state filled the Capitol Jan. 5, as they took on the roles of legislators, judges, lobbyists and reporters.

They began preparing for their days (Jan. 5-8) at the Capitol last September. Eight hundred-fifty students, from grades eight to twelve, are participating in this year's program. Students join one of the House, Senate, Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, Administrative Cabinet or the Executive Branch model groups. They spend weeks studying the functions of each branch of government. It all comes together during the weekend at the Capitol, the final performance of their roles.

Here, young legislators present their bills to peers who, in turn, point out flaws and make recommendations. Youthful judges hear prosecution and defense lawyers in court cases. New to the program, eighth grade students work as pages and decide what they would like to do next year. Ambitious lobbyists converse with legislators. The model press corps plays their newscast tape every day on closed circuit television.

The students close their session Sunday, and then participate in a major cleanup of the Capitol.

Nonsmoking policy

Smoke-filled rooms and corridors will be a vision of the past for the House of Representatives beginning in 1989.

At a Jan. 4 meeting, the House Rules and Legislative Administration Committee adopted a resolution designating nearly all of the State Office Building as off-limits for smokers. Private offices and the third floor lounge are the only exceptions to the nonsmoking rule.

The resolution defines smoking to include anyone who carries a lighted cigarette, cigar, or pipe, or uses any other smoking materials, such as smokeless cigarettes.

Also included in the resolution, House employees who participate in a stop-smoking program and who demonstrate that they haven't smoked for at least a year can receive partial reimbursement for the program's cost.

The nonsmoking provisions apply only to portions of the State Office Building that fall under House jurisdiction.

State of the State

Gov. Rudy Perpich delivered his seventh State of the State address in the House of Representatives Chamber at the State Capitol Jan. 4. Speaking to a joint session of the Legislature, the governor reported on a "much stronger" state with an unemployment rate of 4.5 percent, an increase of 450,000 jobs in six years, sound fiscal management and a \$550 million dollar rainy-day fund.

Perpich stressed job creation, the central goal of his administration, in the areas of education, research and development, the environment, and tax reform and fiscal management.

Perpich proposed state-wide testing for teachers in core curriculum areas of math, English, science and social studies at the sixth and tenth grades to build a stronger education system. "Choice, supported by testing," he said, "will create a marketplace for education that is accountable and responsive to the individual needs of our students."

In research and development, Perpich wants the state to compete in the global economy with advances in biotechnology, supercomputers, natural resources, and agriculture. To balance a robust economy, Perpich asked the Legislature to make nature conservancy a priority in the 1989 Session, noting the need for water protection and interstate environmental cooperation.

The governor called for budget restraints to protect Minnesotans against possible downturns in the economy. He also appealed to legislators to reform the tax system for a better business climate and to preserve and enhance jobs already created.

Committee Coverage

The Minnesota Legislature creates, abolishes, and changes laws to meet the needs of Minnesotans. Legislators introduce hundreds of bills each session with only a small portion passing both bodies of the Legislature to land on the governor's desk for a signature. The House of Representatives and the Senate consider bills separately but must agree on a bill before it becomes law.

The Legislature relies on committees, divisions, and subcommittees to carefully study and review all bills. In the House, the speaker names the committees and their topics, appoints members to the committees and selects chairs to lead them. Once the committee assignments are made and the House convenes for its session, the speaker assigns bills to the appropriate committee.

Here's a list briefly describing the function of each 1989 committee and division:

Agriculture:

Sets out farm policies and programs to assist farmers, promote interstate and international trade, marketing commodities, and soil conservation.

Appropriations:

Recommends objectives and goals in appropriating state money; reviews the governor's budget proposals; recommends funding levels for all state agencies and programs the state finances; provides estimates of appropriations to the Ways and Means Committee; reviews every bill that needs an appropriation even if the bill had its first hearing in another committee. For example, a proposal having to do with agriculture that involves spending money, would go first to the Agriculture Committee or one of its divisions.

Agriculture, Transportation

& Semi-State Division: Reviews and recommends funding for agricultural programs, transportation projects, the departments of Agriculture and Transportation, all public safety activities, the Minnesota Historical Society, and boards and organizations the state partially funds.

Education Division: Handles legislative funding for the state's four higher education systems and the Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Health & Human Services Division: Reviews governor's budget; recommends funding for state health and human service programs; reviews funding needs for legislation the Health and Human Services Committee recommends to pass.

State Departments Division: Reviews and recommends appropriations for state departments and agencies.

Commerce:

Deals mainly with consumer affairs, professional licensing, tourism, and small business issues.

Economic Development:

Covers rural development, community development, international trade, technology development and applying technology to the marketplace; considers job development, training, and retraining, business finance and technical assistance issues; recommends allocation of private activity bonds; reviews programs in the Department of Trade and Economic Development.

Community Stabilization & Development Division:

Reviews and proposes strategies for communities or neighborhoods to counter negative impacts, such as: population dislocation, economic, criminal, environmental, or geographic upheaval; focuses on enabling citizens to survive the effects of such destabilizing forces and to realize creative opportunities for community development; considers both rural and urban communities' concerns.

International Trade & Technology Division:

Examines Minnesota's economic and job needs, emphasizing world competitiveness; makes recommendations for smalland medium-sized businesses to improve manufacturing techniques and enhance exporting opportunities; promotes technology transfer from learning institutions to industry.

Rural Resource Development Division: Examines areas of forestry and minerals, agriculture (except agricultural production); looks at experimental farms, stations and University of Minnesota extensions, diversifying rural resource economies, and promoting value-added production.

Education:

Handles policy areas such as statewide funding and structure of public education for K-12, and organization of educational districts.

Education Finance Division: Reviews and recommends funding for school systems and educational programs; creates a formula to distribute funds among school districts.

Higher Education Division: Makes recommendations for the goals and objectives of technical institutes, state universities, community colleges, and the University of Minnesota; assesses the quality, availability, governance, and administration of these institutions; considers student enrollment, educational/professional advisement, and financial aid.

Environment & Natural Resources:

Examines hunting and fishing regulation and promotion, pollution, waste management, wildlife protection, forestry and mining, ground water protection, solid waste reduction and recycling.

Financial Institutions & Housing:

Reviews laws and bills for banks, savings and loans, credit unions, and industrial thrifts.

Housing Division: Reviews and proposes programs and regulations to improve access to quality housing.

General Legislation, Veterans Affairs & Gaming:

Handles gambling matters and regulations, election concerns, veterans' programs, and general miscellaneous legislation.

Elections Division: Considers election issues and ethics, voter registration, and ballots.

Gaming Division: Handles areas such as charitable gambling, horse racing, betting, the lottery and other related issues.

Governmental Operations:

Reviews any bill that substantially changes or creates a new state department, agency, commission, board or bureau, though the bill may have had its first review and hearing in another committee; deals with public employee pension plans, and state workers' bargaining procedures.

Health & Human Services:

Receives all bills relating to health issues and various social services in the state; reviews issues relating to health maintenance organizations; deals with the licensing of health care providers and social workers; reviews and recommends welfare programs' policies, goals, objectives, reform and creation.

Insurance:

Examines consumer rights in insurance, and affordability and availability of insurance for individuals and companies.

Judiciary:

Considers sentencing guidelines, bail requirements, citizen rights, corrections, custody cases, and child abuse; evaluates structure and organization of courts.

Criminal Justice Division: Examines sentencing guidelines, procedures in juvenile delinquency, child abuse, support and custody cases, and adoption.

Labor-Management Relations:

Considers unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and labor standards, i.e., hours, wages and working conditions.

Local Government & Metropolitan Affairs:

Looks at local government and makes recommendations concerning relations between state and local governments, the impact of federal and state programs on local government, and local government's jurisdiction, control and bonding authority; reviews metropolitan agencies' structures, goals and programs; considers transportation, sewers, roads, bridges, parks, airports, and bonding for state construction projects in the metropolitan area.

Regulated Industries:

Examines controls on industries the state regulates, such as liquor, phone, power, and commercial soliciting.

Rules & Legislative Administration:

Establishes a budget for House committee expenses; determines House rules, joint rules, and administrative duties of the House.

Taxes:

Reviews bills that affect state income, sales, use, or property tax policy; in 1989 session, will fine-tune property tax reform.

Transportation:

Addresses policy matters concerning highways, truck weights, transit systems, airports, and the departments of Transportation and Public Safety.

Ways & Means:

Sets overall spending and taxing policies and limits for the Appropriations and Taxes committees, and the Education Finance Division of the Education Committee.

Do you know

At the voting polls, the words "privacy" and "secrecy" fulfill their meaning. People enter voting booths alone to mark their ballots for or against candidates or issues that affect their government and their lives.

Back in 1889, Minnesota established a secret voting system, known as the "Australian ballot," for cities with 10,000 or more people. The procedure, similar to the Australian voting system, had three types of ballots—white, blue, and red—that listed candidates' names.

It worked as follows: the voter would enter the booth alone, indicate his choice (at this time, women were not allowed to vote) by placing an "x" opposite the candidate's name, sign and fold the ballot so the ballot clerk's initials appeared outside, and hand it to the election judge. The judge would deposit it in the appropriate box: white for state elections, blue for county, and red for city.
