

It's a fact!

People are asking, "When will we be able to buy lottery tickets?" Voter approval in last fall's election changes the state constitution to permit a state lottery. But much has to happen before money and tickets change hands. A statewide election requires the secretary of state's canvassing board to certify vote totals to be sure that a majority of those voting approved the amendment. Then, the Legislature holds committee hearings where people can give their opinions. If a bill defining how a lottery would run in Minnesota comes out of the committee process, passes the Legislature, and gets the governor's approval. people can buy lottery tickets. Lottery information


Lawmakers sought answers on operations, advertising and social fallout during a Jan. 12 informational meeting of the Gaming Division of the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee.

Members quizzed representatives of the Washington State Lottery Commission about its setup, advertising limits, and any possible socio-economic problems arising from its lottery.

Evelyn Sun, Washington's lottery director, told the panel the lottery is a state-operated, revenue-producing agency that runs as a business to inspire public support. "If confidence fails, so will sales," she says. Advertising is "consistent with the dignity of the state," Sun says, explaining that television commercials are lighthearted, not hard-sell, and in good taste.

The lottery hasn't caused a jump in crime, according to Sun. Citing a 1986 study, she reports, "The lottery has not been compromised by anyone...the lottery has not promoted illegal gambling activities and there's no evidence to show that the lottery actually causes compulsive gambling."

Nothing herein is admissible as legal proof of legislative intent.

Higher education images

"We found a great deal of misperception and misunderstanding about postsecondary education among our survey group," says Kathleen Kies, acting executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB).

"There's been a terrible thunderstorm that has come across the University of Minnesota," says Nils Hasselmo, president of the University of Minnesota. "But, you know how fresh the air can be after a good thunderstorm." Hasselmo says he's confident the public is ready to rally behind and support the university.

Kies and Hasselmo talked to the Higher Education Division of the Education Committee Jan. 11 about improving the public image of postsecondary institutions.

Kies says continued financial aid and enrollment support for students are top priorities. She presented a report on the goals HECB has for the year 2000. Committee members asked Kies to prioritize student funding needs.

Hasselmo says his primary concern is to improve working conditions to retain outstanding faculty. He also asked for time "put the house in order." Committee members had many questions and concerns about University of Minnesota governance. Some members suggested that Hasselmo move his office away from the Twin Cities campus. They also noted that he should be more sensitive to needs and issues of the whole university system.

Child care

While children dream about what they want to be when they grow up, many adults worry about whether these dreams can come true.

The concern of children's health, education, and welfare took the front seat on the agenda in a Joint House and Senate hearing in the State Capitol Jan. 10. Lt. Gov. Marlene Johnson told legislators, "Our goal not only in rhetoric, but in reality, will be to make 1989 the year where children are clearly the priority for our state."

The "Children's Agenda" included testimony from 17 Minnesotans on children's topics such as child care, education, nourishment, and welfare reform. Speakers cited suggestions and goals to make Minnesota's children healthier from birth to adulthood.

Minneapolis Mayor Don Fraser says that of the 5,500 children born in Minneapolis each year, 20 to 30 percent are at risk at birth. Risk factors include being a product of teen pregnancy, drug abuse, crime, or jobless parents.

Deputy Commissioner Robert Wedl, Department of Education, says the department's goal is the number 96—to have a 96 percent high school graduation rate by 1996.

Racing commission

Canterbury Downs lost almost \$7 million during the last racing season, says Don Price, executive director of the Minnesota Racing Commission. He blames the loss on ineffective marketing and a population base too small for a facility of Canterbury's size.

Price says attendance at the track is down about 30 percent over the last two years. He told the General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Gaming Committee Jan. 10 that the track wants simulcast broadcasting this season, which he says would help the track break even or make money.

But legislators questioned whether the broadcasting would further lower track attendance. They voiced other concerns about the commission's performance, such as issuing a racing license for a Little Falls racetrack which the developers returned, too little communication with Canterbury Downs, and perceived short-term rather than long-range planning.

Labor seminar

Unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, and a crash course in labor movement history highlighted a half-day seminar on labor relations issues for Minnesota lawmakers.

About 100 Minnesota legislators and staff members attended the Jan. 10 seminar at the University of Minnesota's Earle Brown Center.

George Seltzer, a U of M professor, says unemployment insurance fund reserves need a boost during boom years because "you need it to pay off in the bad times."

"In the long view, the Legislature must maintain a responsible, watchful oversight, not complacency, in regulating unemployment insurance," says Seltzer.

U of M professor Art Williams cited several workers' compensation issues that could come before lawmakers this year, such as whether:

• the worker's degree of disability is accurately measured;

• minimum benefits are too high;

• Minnesota's approach to permanent partial disability works;

the dispute resolution system is too complex and uncertain; and
to limit temporary partial disability benefits to 90 days after maximum medical improvements.

"If you could solve one or two of these questions, that'd be great," Williams said.

Seminar sponsors included the Minnesota Bureau of Mediation Services, Metropolitan State University Labor Studies Program, and several U of M divisions.

Super school districts

Minnesota students can get a broader education thanks to about 30 "super" school districts, the Education Committee learned Jan. 9. Neighboring local school districts agree to create such districts.

Minnesota law requires that the districts provide a number of services, says Bob Buresh, interdistrict cooperation/management assistance specialist for the Minnesota Department of Education. Vocational education, academic enrichment, or community education are such services.

About 55 percent of eligible schools take part in the cooperative venture, according to Buresh. Each district also has a "super" school board that handles district money and program matters, but doesn't replace the local school district board, he says.

State and local money share funding responsibilities, according to Buresh. The state may provide up to \$60 a pupil. He says the education department doesn't oversee district spending, but it may recommend that districts develop longrange plans and discourage using the money to "supplant revenue or a business-as-usual type thing."

Six-member juries

The first bill introduced in the House this session addresses a constitutional amendment that permits the use of sixmember juries in nonfelony cases. Voters approved the amendment in the 1988 general election.

Why the amendment? Last spring, the Minnesota Supreme Court declared unconstitutional the law which allows fewer than 12 people on juries in misdemeanor and gross misdemeanor cases. The Court ruled that framers of Minnesota's Constitution intended a 12member jury when they set forth the right to a jury trial in criminal cases.

HF1 (Kelly, DFL-St. Paul) would reenact the law permitting six-member juries. The Judiciary Committee recommended the bill to pass Jan. 9. It goes next to the full House.

Victims' rights

Victims' rights headed the Judiciary Committee's agenda Jan. 9. Rep. Randy Kelly (DFL-St. Paul), committee chair, introduced HF14, a bill he says would improve the restitution system in Minnesota.

Kelly's bill incorporates recommendations in a recent study from the Minnesota Victim Witness Advisory Council and the State Court Administrator's Office. Council director Fern Sepler says Kelly's bill "...proposes to make modifications in Minnesota law which will, we [the council] believe, strongly and vastly improve the likelihood that a victim of a crime will receive financial compensation from the individual who should pay that personal, individual debt, as well as the debt to society."

The committee laid the bill over to give members more time to discuss and possibly amend it.

Minnesota housing

Demographics are changing the housing scene in Minnesota, and the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency (MHFA) is trying to keep up, focusing more on apartment rehabilitation than new apartment construction.

"We have changed direction at the agency in the last two or three years in terms of more preservation and rehabilitation and less new construction in the rental area," says MHFA Commissioner James Solem. "Where we do finance new construction we are trying to target very low-income activities...to use federal rental tax credits as much as we can and link up with local governments, foundations and non-profits...to achieve affordable housing," he told the Financial Institutions' Housing Division meeting Jan. 9.

MHFA provided funding for nearly 14,000 units of housing in 1988, Solem reports. In addition, the agency manages a rental portfolio in over 260 developments around the state and provides mortgage financing for those developments.

Solem estimates the agency's total portfolio of loans, including mortgage loans and home improvement loans, at


around \$1.6 billion, with resources stemming from 20 programs. Two-thirds of the resources come from the sale of bonds, most of which are tax exempt, and go to pay for the Single Family Mortgage Program.

MHFA runs an apartment renovation program, the first of its kind in the country, which started last year. It uses taxable financing for renovation, as well as permanent mortgage financing for rental units.

Higher education

Higher education progress and goals topped the agenda at a meeting of the Education Division of the Appropriations Committee Jan. 9. Gerald Christenson, chancellor of the Minnesota Community College System, and Nils Hasselmo, newly appointed president of the University of Minnesota, presented informational overviews.

Minnesota's 18 community colleges serve a student population of 50,000, according to Christenson. Of this figure, he says more than half are over 25 years old, 61 percent are women, and 56 percent attend on a part-time basis. He says that because the community college system includes "more and more older students," and "more and more diversity," it's "performing a vital function for the state."



One hundred thirty-four people took an oath of office in the House last week; 133 are at work this week. Rep. Gordon Voss (DFL-Blaine) resigned Jan. 4 to become chief administrator at the Metropolitan Waste Control Commission. Voss represented District 52A, including parts of Blaine, Circle Pines, Lexington, Mounds View, and Shoreview. Gov. Rudy Perpich called a special election for Feb. 4 to fill the vacancy.

Chances are good that children born in Minnesota will begin their educational life in the Gopher State. Department of Education statistics show that about 90 percent of children born in any year will attend Minnesota public schools five years later. The rest attend private or home schools. Movement of preschool children in and out of the state helps balance the figures.

Student enrollment will increase by 5 percent or more in the Twin Cities, St. Cloud and Rochester areas by the 1991-92 school year, according to Department of Education projections. On the down side, the Arrowhead Region could see a loss of 5 percent or more. The estimates are for a five-year period beginning in 1986-87.

Each member of the House of Representatives serves on several of the nineteen committees and thirteen divisions.

The committee system, where the most detailed work of the Legislature takes place, is the heart of the legislative process. Each committee's job is to hold public hearings on bills, put bills into their best form, and send to the full body with their recommendations those bills the committee feels merit further consideration.

A committee may recommend passage of a bill in its original form, recommend passage after amending the bill, or make no recommendations. After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report stating its action and recommendations to the House.

To get an idea of what legislators will consider during the first year of the 76th Legislative Session, House Information staff writers surveyed House committee chairs and administrators to determine what's ahead in the way of topics. For each committee, writers have listed several topics in order of descending importance. Some committees, at this point, have definite agendas; others are still open. With this in mind, here are the survey results.

Who represents you at the State Capitol?

The House Public Information Office can tell you which legislative district you live in, and who represents that district.

Do you need legislators' districts, addresses, phone numbers, office locations, biographical details, and photos?

You can get copies of various publications in the House Public Information Office when the information becomes available.

What legislation did your representative introduce?

The House Index Department has a Cathrode Ray Tube (CRT) which shows information on a television-like screen. The CRT lists each member's name and the bills he/she sponsored in the current session. Staff members can help you use the CRT.

Who's in the United States Congress?

The House Public Information Office can give you names of Minnesota's members of Congress.

To write your legislator, address him/her as follows:

The Honorable (name) Minnesota House of Representatives (or Minnesota Senate) State Capitol St. Paul, MN 55155

Dear Representative (or Senator) name:

Need a copy of a bill?

The Chief Clerk's Office can give you copies of bills and resolutions.

Want to know a bill's author, status, or committee assignment?

The computerized House Index tracks all bills through the legislative process. You can get the information you want about bills on the CRT. House Index lists bills by committee and by over 150 topics (e.g. environment, taxes, education) on the CRT.

You can call the House Bill Status Line for a 24-hour recorded message on the day's committee activities on bills, (612) 297-1264.

Which bills become law?

Bills that became law are on the CRT in the House Index Department. The House Public Information Office also publishes brief summaries of new laws each session. Call the Information Office to get on the summary mailing list.



Canvassing boards, at various levels of government, certify all election results for elected officials and questions that are on election ballots. The lottery vote, for example, was certified by a canvassing board. In city and town elections, the board consists of the city council or town board.

In counties, the board consists of two county commissioners, the county auditor, clerk of courts for the county, mayor of the largest city in the county, or chair of the town board of the county's largest township.

County boards must also certify vote totals for all state and federal elected officials and questions in counties that have only one legislative district. The secretary of state's canvassing board certifies all elections and questions that involve more than one county. The secretary of state, two justices of the Supreme Court, and two judges from district court make up this board.
