Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

On page 2, Sec. 5 add the following sentence: "No indemnities shall be payable hereunder, nor shall an initial program of indemnification be instituted, unless moneys are available from the United States to pay part of the cost of such indemnities."

And when so amended, that the bill do pass, and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

S. F. No. 23 was re-referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Zwach, from the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense, to which was referred House Concurrent Resolution No. 3. House Concurrent Resolution relating to subsistence living expenses during the legislative session.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the resolution be adopted. Report adopted.

Mr. Vukelich moved that House Concurrent Resolution No. 3 be laid on the table. Which motion prevailed.

SECOND READING OF SENATE BILLS

S. F. Nos. 14, 313 and 314 were read the second time.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

Mr. Vukelich moved that House Concurrent Resolution No. 3 be taken from the table. Which motion prevailed.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 3. House Concurrent Resolution Relating to Subsistence Living Expenses During the Legislative Session.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota, the Senate concurring, that the respective bodies of the legislature do find that the reasonable subsistence living expenses of members thereof are increased in an amount equal to or greater than the amounts of reimbursement therefor hereinafter set forth.

Be It Further Resolved that it is the intention of the respective bodies by this Concurrent Resolution to comply with all of the requirements of federal law and the regulations of the treasury department in regard thereto as they relate to subsistence living expenses of legislative members attending a legislative session.

Be It Further Resolved that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized and directed to prepare and issue warrants in payment of subsistence living expenses to each member of the House of Representatives; and the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed to prepare and issue warrants in payment

of subsistence living expenses to each member of the Senate, from their respective expense funds, for each calendar day of the 1965 legislative session.

Be It Also Resolved that per diem subsistence living expenses in the sum of \$21.00 per diem shall be paid to such members who have moved from their usual place of lodging during a substantial part of the 1965 session of the legislature; and that the per diem subsistence living expenses of members of the legislature who have not so changed their place of lodging for such session shall be the sum of \$14.00 per diem.

Resolved Further that each member of the legislature shall certify in writing to the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives, or to the Secretary of the Senate, prior to the issuance of the first of such warrants for such subsistence living expenses whether or not he has moved from his usual place of lodging.

 $\operatorname{Mr.}$ Vukelich moved that House Concurrent Resolution No. 3, be now adopted.
