***Election Year: 2016**

*Special Circumstance regarding District 32B: The MN Supreme Court ruled on September 8, 2016 that Rep. Bob Barrett was ineligible to run in the November election because he did not reside in his district. Minnesota Statute 204B.13 prescribes a February special election for this situation. This data does not include this seat and is based on 200 open seats rather than the usual 201.

44 (new legislators) – 5 (new legislators with prior service) = 39

Divide that number by 200 and multiply by 100 to equal percentage
